- OC also offers a carpentry Interprovincial (IP) refresher program which is designed to prepare individuals, currently working in the carpentry field, to challenge the Carpentry IP Exam.
- OC offers a two-year Trades Technology Teacher Education (TTTE) diploma program. In order to receive a Bachelor of Education degree and qualify for a BC Professional Teaching Certificate, students must also complete academic studies (acceptable to the BC College of Teachers) and the one-year Secondary Teacher Education Program (STEP) at UBC Okanagan.
