British Columbia is Canada's most ethnically diverse province as demonstrated by the city of Vancouver where the population is just over two million of which 43% have a first language other than English. The population of downtown Vancouver is 578,000 comprised of over 200 different ethnic origins. Multiculturalism is threaded throughout the region through the restaurants, festivals, and unique neighbourhoods that make up the Greater Vancouver area.

Approximately 20% of the entire Indian community in Canada resides in the Vancouver area. The highest concentrations of Indo-Canadians are found in Vancouver, Surrey, Burnaby, Richmond, Abbotsford and Delta. The city of Surrey has over 107,000 South Asians, comprising almost one-third of the city's population. International access is seamless with the Vancouver International Airport (YVR) serving more than 18 million passengers annually. It is a hub for North American air travel and a premier







culture. One prominent multicultural/multi-religious channel, Vision TV, presents a non-stop marathon of Indo-Canadian shows on Saturdays. These television shows often highlight Indo-Canadian events in Canada, and also show events from India.

CREATIVITY THRIVES IN BC

British Columbia has more than 600 digital media companies, which employ about 16,000 people and generate \$2.3 billion in annual sales, and live music, theatre and dance thrives in BC.

reater Vancouver accounts for more than 60 per cent of the digital media companies in the province.

Digital media companies currently operate in five areas: interactive design; digital entertainment and games; digital film, animation and special effects; mobile content and applications including games; and E-learning.


As a measure of British Columbia's commitment to the sector, the World Centre of Digital Media was established in Vancouver — it is a collaboration between the British Columbia Institute of Technology (BCIT), Emily Carr University of Art and Design, Simon Fraser University (SFU) and the University of British Columbia (UBC). The World Centre for Digital Media will be one of a small number of specialized graduate programs in North America that teach advanced topics in the business and creative management of digital media. It aims to create a digital media hub in Vancouver that will drive growth, competitiveness and innovation in the sector from coast to coast.

Vancouver is packed with creative and original minds, and digital media companies cite access to a vast talent pool as a top reason for doing business in Vancouver. A tolerant and welcoming attitude towards other cultures, ethnicities and lifestyles draws talented individuals and globally-oriented companies to Vancouver from all over the world.

Vancouver is geographically positioned to leverage relationships with L.A.'s entertainment hub, software centres in Seattle and Redmond, Washington, and strong markets for services in Asia.


The Vancouver International Digital Festival is an annual event for creative professionals working in digital media, and has been held for the last four years in Vancouver. The event includes an international business partnering forum, industry parties, digital entertainment screenings, conference sessions on the latest trends and markets for digital media, and educational workshops for creators, designers, and producers in games, mobile, animation, film, and interactive design.






Other film-related festivals are the Vancouver Film Festival, Indie Music Video Festival, Vancouver Jewish Film Festival, DOXA Documentary Film Festival, and Vancouver Queer Film Festival.

With more than 32 professional groups, a major international theatre festival (The Fringe), two outdoor theatrical events (Bard on the Beach and Theatre Under The Stars) and more than 21 venues, theatre is a major cultural activity in Vancouver. There are also a number of local theatre companies that put on a variety of plays and musical productions, including classic and contemporary productions. Vancouver's dance scene is one of Canada's best with regular performances by Ballet British Columbia and more than 25 other professional local dance troupes.





IIFA WORLD FILM PREMIERE AND IIFA FILM FESTIVAL

Celebrating 100 Years of Indian Cinema

n April 21, 1913, Dadasaheb Phalke's film
Raja Harishchandra was shown at the Olympia
Theatre in Bombay and the world received a very
special gift – the birth of indigenous Indian cinema.
Since then, India has become the largest producers
of movies in the world, creating iconic stars such as
Dilip Kumar and Amitabh Bachchan (named by BBC
as Star of the Century). Now commonly referred
to as "Bollywood", the industry has reached the
century mark and grows in influence every year.

While many tributes and celebrations of the 100th anniversary continue to occur in India, IIFA 2013 in Vancouver presents a unique opportunity to showcase Indian cinema to new audiences.

British Columbia is one of the most active film centres in the world. In fact, British Columbia is the third largest production centre for film and television in the world, after Los Angeles and New York City, with over 246 motion picture projects

and \$1.5 billion dollars spent on production in 2010 alone. Vancouver is known as "Hollywood North" for its role as a production centre for US feature films shot in British Columbia.

Celebrating the distinct role film can play in showcasing cultures and fostering understanding, the 2013 IIFA World Film Premiere will recognize 100 years of Indian Cinema and could take place at any number of Vancouver's diverse venues from the Orpheum Theatre to the Centre in Vancouver for the Performing Arts. 
IFA CHARITY CRICKET MATCH





Furthermore, the Games had an estimated 3.5 billion worldwide television viewers, and approximately 24,000 hours of TV coverage worldwide. This event clearly demonstrated that Vancouver has the capability and willingness to host the IIFA Weekend, and run a Media Centre covering all participating media.

A SPECIAL FRIENDSHIP

he foundation of India's deep relationship with British Columbia can be found in excerpts of a speech given by Premier Christy Clark as part of her recent trade mission to India in November 2011:

British Columbia has deep historical, cultural and business ties to India. For more than a century, people from India have been building our province, creating jobs and making our communities stronger. Today, those relationships help us do business across the Pacific.

The ocean between us weaves us together. It has brought us together for over a century. Our peoples and our perspective.

Canada has a history of immigration. For generations, people have come to our shores, they have laid down roots, and they have built a country.

We are reaching out, to the countries that made Canada what it is, and continuing our passion for discovery, here on your soil, with you.

Even though we are from different countries, we are not foreign to each other – people of Indian ancestry are woven into the fabric of our province, and they have brought your culture with them and made it part of our identity.

Although I am here today seeking new investment for BC, this is not a one-way street. We have lots we want to share with India.

WHY INDIA

In India, two thirds of your population is under the age of 35. Your middle class is already larger than Canada's entire population. And economists are saying that in less than 50 years, you will be the third largest economy in the world.

Clearly, there's a boom happening in India. I'm here to tell you that BC wants to help you grow.

As I said, BC has deep ties to India, but so far this year only 6% of Canada's exports to India came from BC.

In Surrey – the second largest and fastest growing city in BC – 28% of the population is South Asian. The South Asian community there has created jobs for thousands of people, and continues to build up our economy with their entrepreneurial spirit.



Clearly we can do a lot better – and the ties between our places in the world will help us do that.

As the people of India continue to prosper, they will look for a high quality of life, and that means demand for increased infrastructure and technology. As India urbanizes and enjoys more economic prosperity, BC will be ready and waiting to provide you with the exports to support your growth: forestry and mining products; water treatment; health delivery systems for rural areas; shale gas technology; and clean energy alternatives.

So I'm here tell you today, with full confidence, that no one is in a better position to support India's prosperity than BC. The thing I have noticed most when traveling in India is how much we have in common. How at heart, our values are the same. How even though an ocean divides us, we find much common ground.

I know that we're here today to talk about business — but in the end, I believe the reason we care so much about business is because we want to care for our families. If you strengthen the economy, you strengthen families.

Above all, we're trying to look out for the people around us. That's what I call putting families first.

I care about families because its families that give children morals, a compass to guide them



through life. They give them a sense of character. They teach them about hard work, diligence and respect. The strength of our nations begins with the work that families do.

Families of Indian descent have helped shape British Columbia's identity, and they have set an example that has made our province stronger.

And we've been inspired by how each generation in Indian families play a crucial role – how they keep grandparents close to home to be caregivers and teachers for future generations.

What all of that comes back to is the idea that families need to provide for each other. And to do that, families need jobs.


Families are the simple, most important element of any great country. It's a value that we share.

Right now, we have an incredible opportunity to do great things together – back home, I've been calling it a generational opportunity.

The advantages BC has to offer means we can be a great partner for India, and that partnership will allow us to prosper together.
