IMMIGRATION DETENTION SERVICES AGREEMENT

BETWEEN:

The Government of Canada (hereinafter called "Canada"), represented by the Minister of Citizenship and Immigration,

OF THE FIRST PART,

hna

The Government of the Province of British Columbia (hereinafter called "British Columbia"), represented by the Attorney General,

OF THE SECOND PART.

WHEREAS

- A. The *Immigration Act* (R.S.C. 1976, c. 52), as amended, (hereinafter called "the Immigration Act"), allows for the arrest and detention of certain persons;
- B. British Columbia maintains detention facilities to detain persons in accordance with provincial and federal legislation; and
- C. Canada and British Columbia desire to establish an agreement in writing whereby British Columbia will detain persons at the request of Canada in accordance with the Immigration Act;

NOW THEREFORE this Agreement WITNESSETH that, in consideration of the covenants and undertakings contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

DOCUMENTATION

- 1. Canada shall provide to British Columbia Orders for Detention for all persons whom it requests that British Columbia detain under the Immigration Act.
- 2. At the time a person is transferred to the custody of British Columbia pursuant to this Agreement, Canada will provide to British Columbia all relevant information and documentation in its possession necessary to ensure the proper security, custody and safety of the person. Such information and documentation may include:

- (a) information on any medical conditions including medical documents;
- (b) information on any psychological conditions including all assessments of risk posed by that person to himself or herself, or to others; and
- (d) additional relevant information and documentation.
- 3. Senior officials of Canada and British Columbia will be designated from time to time to determine, as circumstances may require, the appropriate format for required documentation and the transfer of information.
- 4. British Columbia may request that Canada endeavor to acquire additional pertinent medical, psychological, security or other information from foreign jurisdictions on persons being held by British Columbia pursuant to this Agreement as and when the circumstances warrant to ensure the proper security, custody and safety of those persons and the safety of British Columbia correctional operations and staff.
- 5. A Warrant for Arrest, Order for Detention or any other document issued by Canada pursuant to the Immigration Act, for a person then in custody in accordance with any other Act of Parliament or statute of British Columbia, shall not cause a transfer of custody pursuant to paragraphs 7 of this Agreement until the person would otherwise be released from custody as required by those other acts or statutes.
- 6. Canada and British Columbia agree that, subject to any other legal grounds that require that a person detained by British Columbia pursuant to this Agreement remain detained, the written authorization of an Immigration Officer or an Adjudicator is sufficient authority to effect release of that person.

TRANSFER OF CUSTODY

- 7. Transfer of custody pursuant to this Agreement shall occur:
 - (a) when a Warrant for Arrest, an Order for Detention or any other document approved pursuant to the Immigration Act has been executed against any person and that person has been delivered by Canada to a British Columbia detention facility; or
 - (b) upon execution by Canada of a Warrant for Arrest, an Order for Detention or any other document approved pursuant to the Immigration Act with respect to a person about to be released from custody from a

British Columbia detention facility in accordance with any other act of Canada or statute of British Columbia.

- 8. At the time that a person is transferred to the custody of British Columbia under this Agreement, or as soon thereafter as is practicable, Canada shall transfer all personal effects of that person in its possession to British Columbia and provide British Columbia with a complete accounting of those personal effects including, but not limited to, a statement of account of monies standing to the credit of that person. At its option, British Columbia may refuse to accept any personal effects where the storage of those effects would not be consistent with British Columbia's then current storage policy. If, pursuant to this paragraph, British Columbia refuses to accept a personal effect for storage, Canada shall arrange for the proper storage or disposal of that personal effect.
- 9. Subject to this Agreement, at the request of Canada, British Columbia agrees to detain persons on behalf of Canada until British Columbia receives a written authorization from an Immigration Officer or an Adjudicator authorizing the release of a person detained pursuant to this Agreement.
- 10. Canada agrees that British Columbia can transfer custody of persons detained pursuant to this Agreement who require emergency medical or psychological treatment from the British Columbia detention facility to any other facility which is equipped to maintain custody and provide medical or psychological treatment. British Columbia shall notify Canada in writing within 48 hours of such transfer forthwith.
- 11. Canada agrees that British Columbia may refuse to take custody of a person as contemplated by paragraph 9 of this Agreement if:
 - (a) the person, in the opinion of the appropriate official of British Columbia, is medically or psychologically unfit to be properly held by British Columbia; or
 - (b) British Columbia does not have the necessary facilities to properly accommodate the person.

British Columbia agrees to provide Canada with reasons in writing for the refusal.

12. British Columbia, at any time or times, on the grounds specified in paragraph 11, may give notice to Canada that British Columbia wishes to return to the custody of Canada a person detained by British Columbia pursuant to this Agreement and Canada agrees that it will receive custody of that person within seven days of such notification. For the purposes of this paragraph, notification may be verbal or written and, if verbal, the notification shall be confirmed

- forthwith in writing. The written notice or written confirmation of verbal notice shall include reasons for the return.
- 13. If Canada intends to take custody of a person detained pursuant to this Agreement or if that person is permitted to attend a hearing held pursuant to the Immigration Act, Canada shall provide British Columbia with not less than 48 hours written notice of the transfer of custody or hearing and, where practical, such notice shall be given not less than seven days prior to that transfer of custody or hearing. In addition, Canada shall make all necessary transportation arrangements for taking custody of such persons and all transportation arrangements required for the person attending such a hearing.

PAYMENT

- 14. Canada agrees to pay British Columbia, in accordance with this Agreement, the Daily Rate, as defined in paragraph 15, for each person detained pursuant to this Agreement regardless of the British Columbia detention facility used for the detention of that person. The parties agree that, with respect to each person detained pursuant to this Agreement, the Daily Rate will be payable for the day of that person's transfer into British Columbia's custody and will not be payable for the day of that person's release or transfer from British Columbia's custody to Canada or any other jurisdiction.
- 15(1) In this Agreement "fiscal year" means a period of twelve consecutive months starting on April 1, and ending March 31.
- 15(2) Canada and British Columbia agree that the Daily Rate will be:
 - (a) in the case of a male, the combined average per diem cost in the preceding fiscal year of an inmate detained at the Vancouver Pretrial Service Centre and the Surrey Pre-Trial Services Centre; and
 - (b) in the case of a female, the average per diem cost in the preceding fiscal year of an inmate detained at the Burnaby Correctional Centre for Women.
- 16. The Daily Rate for each fiscal year shall be calculated and approved in writing by designated officials of Canada and British Columbia. The Daily Rate applicable to the then current fiscal year will be established and approved on or before the first day of September of that fiscal year. Once approved, the Daily Rate is firm and final for the applicable fiscal year. If the Daily Rate to be established for any fiscal year has not been so established by the first day of September of that fiscal year, then British Columbia will notify Canada of the Daily Rate applicable for the fiscal

year, and upon being notified that Daily Rate is firm and final for the applicable fiscal year.

- 17. In any year, until such time that the Daily Rate is approved or set by British Columbia, Canada will pay British Columbia at the previous year's Daily Rate. If the calculation of the Daily Rate for the then current fiscal year results in a credit owing to either party, the party to which the credit has accrued may, upon the establishment of that Daily Rate pursuant to paragraph 16, invoice the other party for an adjustment to the payments made during that fiscal year in order to reflect the applicable Daily Rate.
- 18. In addition to the Daily Rate, Canada agrees to pay British Columbia for:
 - (a) the cost of medical and psychological treatment provided to persons detained pursuant to this Agreement who are not covered by a medical insurance plan, where the treatment is provided on an emergency basis or is approved by Canada; and
 - (b) all extraordinary costs that arise due to the detention of persons under this Agreement where such detention causes British Columbia to incur costs that would not otherwise be incurred in the ordinary course of administering either this Agreement or British Columbia's security programs. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, such costs include extra staffing costs, the cost of employing or acquiring additional equipment, and special handling costs. British Columbia will notify Canada as soon as is practicable after such costs are incurred or, where possible, when such costs are anticipated.
- 19. British Columbia agrees to provide an invoice for each calendar month identifying persons detained pursuant to this Agreement, the number of detention days for each person detained, the total number of detention days for the month, the Daily Rate payable at that time, and the total amount payable under this Agreement. British Columbia further agrees to provide an accounting of expenses payable by Canada pursuant to paragraph 18 herein.
- 20. In the event that a person is detained for any part of a month but Canada is not invoiced for the Daily Rate or costs associated with the detention of that person, British Columbia may invoice Canada for that person's detention by a subsequent monthly invoice.
- 21. Canada agrees to reimburse and pay British Columbia in accordance with each monthly statement, subject to, and in accordance with, procedures specified in the *Financial Administration Act* (Canada) and Canada will endeavour to make such payments within 60 days of receiving an invoice.

EXCHANGE OF INFORMATION

- 22. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, any personal information to be released by Canada to British Columbia shall be governed by the agreement between Canada and British Columbia made pursuant to paragraph 8(2)(f) of the *Privacy Act* (Canada) and dated the 1st day of July, 1983, and subject to paragraph 24, British Columbia agrees to respect the confidentiality of such personal information as provided by Canada and to use that information solely for the purpose it is provided for pursuant to this Agreement. Canada shall not be required to disclose information which is classified or which was obtained in confidence from a third party.
- 23. Any personal information to be released by British Columbia to Canada shall be governed by the provisions of the *Privacy Act* (Canada) and the law of British Columbia applicable in such cases and Canada agrees to respect the confidentiality of such information and to use that information solely for the purpose it is provided for pursuant to this Agreement.
- 24. The parties acknowledge that all information produced by officers of British Columbia in the performance of the Agreement and all information provided to British Columbia by Canada in connection with this Agreement will be subject to application of the *Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act*, S.B.C. 1992, c. 61 and in accordance with the aforesaid statute the Attorney General of British Columbia, at the request of Canada, will respect the confidentiality of any information obtained in connection with this Agreement to the extent permitted under the law. For the purposes of this section, the Minister of Citizenship and Immigration may give notice to the Attorney General of British Columbia indicating the information for which confidentiality is requested.

RESOLUTION PROCEDURES

- 25. In the event of any dispute between the parties, arising out of the interpretation, performance or observance of any of the provisions of this Agreement, it is agreed that the parties will pursue the resolution procedures contained in paragraph 26 in an endeavour to resolve such dispute.
- 26. Any dispute referred to in paragraph 25 will be:
 - (a) referred to the Assistant Deputy Minister, Corrections Branch, Ministry of Attorney General, British Columbia and [Insert Federal Official]; and

- (b) if the said Assistant Deputy Minister, Corrections Branch, Ministry of Attorney General, British Columbia and the [Insert Federal Official] are unable to resolve the dispute, either will forthwith refer the matter the to Provincial Commissioner and the [Insert Federal Deputy Minister] for resolution and they shall use their best endeavours to resolve the dispute within a further period of 45 days provided they may extend the period by agreement; and
- (c) the Provincial Commissioner and the [Insert Federal Deputy Minister] may establish, in writing, procedures for the submission, review and referral of disputes under this paragraph; and
- (d) for the purpose of this paragraph, reference the Provincial Commissioner or the [Federal Deputy Minister] shall mean only the official so appointed and shall not include their delegate.
- 27. The parties agree that the [Insert Federal Official same as 26.(a)] and the Assistant Deputy Minister, Corrections Branch, Ministry of Attorney General, British Columbia may enter into operational protocols, not inconsistent with this Agreement, with respect to administrative and operational matters arising during the term of this Agreement; provided that all such operational protocols shall be in writing and copies are to be provided to the Provincial Commissioner and the [insert Federal Deputy Minister].

GENERAL

28. Canada will indemnify and save harmless British Columbia from and against any and all claims, damages, actions, causes of action, costs and expenses that British Columbia may sustain, incur, suffer, or be put to by reason of or in any manner arising out or the detention of a person by British Columbia pursuant to this Agreement, except where such claim results from the negligent act or omission of British Columbia or its officials, agents or employees.

- 29. Either party may terminate this Agreement at any time upon providing six months notice in writing to the other party.
- 30. This Agreement shall come into force on the date it is signed by both parties and shall remain in effect until terminated pursuant to paragraph 29.
- 31. This Agreement may only be amended by agreement in writing or by exchange of letters signifying mutual agreement between the parties.
- 32. Unless otherwise defined in this Agreement, words defined in the Immigration Act and in the regulations thereunder have the same meaning when used in this Agreement.
- 33. Except as permitted by paragraph 12, any notice, consent, waiver, statement, designation, other document or payment that either party may be required or may desire to give or deliver to the other will be conclusively deemed validly given or delivered to and received by the addressee, if delivered personally on the date of delivery or, if mailed, on the seventh business day after the mailing of the same prepaid post addressed, if to British Columbia:

and if to Canada:

- 34. Either party may, from time to time, give to the other party written notice of any change of address or of the party giving such notice and form and after the giving of such notice the address or therein specified will, for purposes of this Agreement, be conclusively deemed to be the address of the party giving such notice.
- 35. If any provision of this Agreement shall be held invalid, illegal, or unenforceable in any jurisdiction, such provision shall be severed from this Agreement in such jurisdiction and the validity, legality, and enforceability of the remaining provision hereof shall not be affected or impaired thereby.

36. In the event this Agreement is terminated, British Columbia shall return to the custody of Canada all persons previously detained by British Columbia pursuant to this Agreement no later than the effective date of the termination. Canada's obligations to pay British Columbia for all matters arising during the term of this Agreement will survive the termination of this Agreement.

The final VIRCC costs are actuals. I cannot agree with your argument that this has generated additional long term beds for our Branch. The only reason the metal shop (program space) was converted to a dormitory was to house the migrants on an urgent basis. In fact, we are now paying storage costs for the metal shop equipment. Also note that the original estimate to install window screens at ARCC has been reduced to \$7,195.

Please confirm as soon as possible that CIC will cover the above costs over and above our per diem agreement. These costs have already been incurred by the Province and are all directly related to housing the migrants.

We agreed that Building Occupancy Charges (O/M) as identified in my September 24, 1999 letter will be covered under our per diem billing agreement.

I will advise you of any additional one-time expensed facilities costs as soon as they are known. I will try to do this in advance of the Province incurring the costs; however in an emergency situation this may not always be possible.

Additionally, as mentioned, we are still identifying extraordinary operational costs related to the migrants and I will discuss these with you once they are compiled.

Re: Immigration Detainees – Facilities Holding Costs

Pursuant to our existing agreement, this letter will clarify the application and invoicing of extraordinary costs for holding facilities vacant at VIRCC and PGRCC Annex for use by immigration detainees. These procedures and costs will become effective April 1, 2001:

- 1. The Branch will invoice CIC only for those facilities costs directly related to holding the designated space vacant and available at VIRCC and PGRCC Annex for use by immigration detainees.
- 2. These Building Occupancy Charges (BOC) include base rent (mostly amortization costs); operation and maintenance (e.g. HVAC, electrical, plumbing, insurance, fabric maintenance, fire and safety); grants in lieu of taxes; and, administration.
- 3. The BOC for PGRCC Annex covers designated space as well as land.
- The BOC for VIRCC covers space only (two hearing rooms, two two-floor dormitories, a nurse/storage room and an interview room).
- The annual BOC in fiscal 2001/02 for the designated space at PGRCC Annex is \$540,125 plus GST.
- 6. The annual BOC in fiscal 2001/02 for the designated space at VIRCC is \$491,592.82 plus GST.
- 7. The Branch will begin invoicing for these costs as part of its regular monthly invoice effective April, 2001.

- 8. Each monthly invoice will include 1/12th of these annual facilities holding costs plus GST.
- 9. These charges will continue to apply for each full month that the space is held vacant for immigration detainees throughout fiscal year 2001/02.
- 10. The holding costs for either VIRCC or PGRCC Annex will cease to apply when the beds are reactivated for immigration detainees. For partial months, a 15 day rule will apply. If the beds in one of the centres are reactivated within the first fifteen days of a month, there will be no holding costs for that centre for that month. If they are reactivated on the 16th day or later, a full month's charges will apply for that centre in addition to per diem costs for holding migrants in that space. It is acknowledged that the dates of reactivation may be different for VIRCC and PGRCC Annex and that the determination of a partial month may likewise vary between the two centres.
- 11. The Branch will revisit the costs during the last quarter of the fiscal year to determine if there are any rate adjustments required for the subsequent fiscal year.
