ISSUE(S): Discussion of Skills Training Opportunities in the Squamish Area

BACKGROUND:

Capilano University Programs and Services

- Capilano University's Squamish campus serves the Howe Sound communities of Squamish, Whistler, Mount Currie and Pemberton. The single campus building, at 1150 Carson Place in Squamish, accommodates two mid-size classrooms, two computer labs, a video-conference room and associated office and support space.
- A limited number of courses and programs are delivered here, including: Academic Studies (some Arts and Science courses), Advanced Wilderness Leadership Certificate, Business Administration Certificate, Business in Tourism Certificate, and Preparatory Studies programs including coordination for regional literacy initiatives and the VISION: Cognitive Abilities Development program.
- Capilano University also delivers or coordinates the delivery of a number of Employment Skills Access Program initiatives, funded through the BC-Canada Labour Market Agreement. Capilano received a total of approximately \$2.5 million in program funding in 2012/13, and will receive approximately \$1.5 million in 2013/14. See Attachment 1 for a summary of specific initiatives.

Other Skills Training Programs and Services

- Several employment skills training programs funded by the BC-Canada Labour Market Agreement are currently delivered in Squamish. See Attachment 2 for further details. They include:
 - o Job Options BC (delivered by the local Young Mens' Christian Association);
 - o Targeted Initiative for Older Worker program (delivered by Training Innovations Inc.):
 - o Bladerunners Program (delivered by the First Nations Employment Society).
- The Ministry of Social Development provides funding through the BC-Canada Labour Market Development Agreement to WorkBC Employment Centres which provide skills training to EI eligible participants. The WorkBC Centre in Squamish is contracted to Training Innovations Inc. which provides front end services available to all unemployed Squamish citizens such as access to computers, labour market, career decision making and job search information. WorkBC sites can also offer employment counselling, job search support and other financial supports (i.e. Skills Development training supports) to people eligible for EI benefits.

DISCUSSION:

Squamish - Skills Training Facility

- During the most recent Union of British Columbia Municipalities convention, the Honourable Shirley Bond, Minister for Jobs, Tourism and Skills Training, met with a delegation from the District of Squamish on September 19, 2013 to discuss establishing a skills training facility in Squamish.
- Construction of such a facility would need to be supported and facilitated by a public post-secondary institution

Capilano University - reductions in programs at the Squamish Campus

 Capilano University's budget for 2013/14 includes reductions in programs and services available at the Squamish Campus. Specifically, this includes cancellation of 12 sections of Adult Basic Education (ABE) and 10 section-equivalents in the Squamish Initiatives and Squamish Human Services programs, and reductions of 1.25 faculty and 1.0 staff Full-Time Equivalents.

SUGGESTED RESPONSES:

- I appreciated hearing your ideas about skills training opportunities in Squamish. The Ministry is taking steps through the Skills and Training Plan to ensure that British Columbians throughout the province have access to the skills training they need to find meaningful and sustainable work in their communities.
- As for establishing a new skills training facility in Squamish, I note this was discussed with my colleague Minister Bond in September. Consideration of capital projects by government is subject to available funding and alignment with government priorities. Given current fiscal pressures as well as existing priorities, building a training facility in Squamish is not a priority at this time.
- Capilano University is working through a series of budget challenges this year and I have met with them to discuss the issue. They have had to make some hard decisions but I believe Capilano recognizes the continuing value of the programs and services it offers at the Squamish Campus.

ISSUE:

Establishing a skills training program in Squamish.

The Province has committed to ensuring British Columbians have access to the skills training they need to be first in line for current and future job opportunities. The BC Jobs Plan and the Skills and Training Plan are Government's key mechanisms to deliver on the skills training and advancement needed to enhance British Columbia's labour market and support a strong economy.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION:

In the community of Squamish, the Ministry currently delivers two employment skills training programs. The programs are as follows:

- **Job Options BC** funded by the BC-Canada Labour Market Agreement (LMA), the program provides unemployed individuals with skills to find and sustain employment through providing employment assistance activities such as counselling, resume writing, job search skills, short-term certificate training and work experience. The Squamish program is delivered by the local YMCA and will deliver 3 training sessions for 33 participants by March 31, 2014. The funding allocation for 13/14 is \$180,000.
- Targeted Initiative for Older Worker (TIOW) program is a Canada-BC cost-shared program that provides training and job support to unemployed older workers (55-65) in eligible communities affected by significant downsizing or industry closures. The Squamish program is delivered by *Training Innovations Inc* and will deliver 3 sessions for 33 participants by March 31, 21014. The funding allocation for 13/14 is \$368,263.
- In addition, the Bladerunners Program which provides training and support for at–risk youth to obtain and sustain full–time employment will run in Squamish this fall through the First Nations Employment Society. The Bladerunners program is also funded under the LMA Agreement.

All three programs offer participants employment skills upgrading and work experience opportunities in the local area and have been procured under a Request for Proposal (RFP) process.

To date, the total number of individuals that have participated in skills and training programs are as follows:

- Seventy three (73) LMA participants in a variety of LMA training programs have identified as being from the community of Squamish during the 2012/13 fiscal year.
- Eighty two (82) TIOW participants have been identified as being from the community of Squamish since August 2009.

Other labour market initiatives that currently support skills training for the citizens of Squamish are as follows:

Labour Market Development Agreement

Although not directly funding by the Ministry of Jobs, Tourism and Skills Training, the Ministry of Social Development provides funding through the Labour Market Development Agreement to **WorkBC Employment**Centres which provide skills training to EI eligible participants. The WorkBC Centre in Squamish is contracted to
TII Training Innovations Inc who provides front end services available to all unemployed Squamish citizens such as
access to computers, labour market, career decision making and job search information. WorkBC sites can also offer
employment counselling, job search support and other financial supports (i.e. Skills Development training supports)
to people eligible for EI benefits.

KEY MESSAGES:

- The Ministry is taking steps through the Skills and Training Plan to ensure that British Columbians throughout the province have access to the skills training they need to find meaningful and sustainable work in their communities.
- Government has committed to develop a comprehensive 10-year skills-training plan to ensure a seamless delivery of skills training from high school through to entry in the workforce and ensure skills match jobs.
- Currently, the community of Squamish is also served by Capilano University for post secondary programming as well as a variety of service providers delivering employment and skills training programs.
- The existing LMA and TIOW programs were established through a competitive procurement process. Future opportunities may be available through the renewal of the LMA Agreement in April 2014.
