PURPOSE: For INFORMATION for Suzanne Anton, Attorney General and Minister of Justice

ISSUE: Release of a public report detailing government action taken in response to the MWCI Report recommendations.

SUMMARY:

- This public report provides a summary of all actions that the BC Government has taken in response to recommendations from the Missing Women Commission of Inquiry (see attached draft).
- The public report reinforces that action has been taken on over three quarters of the recommendations directed at the province, and commits to continued consultation with stakeholders to ensure a meaningful approach to completing the work.
- Some information contained in this report will be made public for the first time, including:
 - government will not be replacing The Honourable Steven Point; and
 - some recommendations will not be addressed (e.g. recommendations around research projects (Rec 4.8, 5.6, 6.5) and recommendations that are being addressed through work already underway on related recommendations (Rec. 7.5, 7.10 & 7.11).
- In addition to detailing progress made on the recommendations, the report also speaks to the current and future actions that government is committed to taking to address the broader issue of violence against women.
- The Ministry is still awaiting new information from the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure on the issue of transportation in the North for inclusion in the public report. Once this information is received, the report will be finalized.

BACKGROUND:

 In November of 2013, the BC Government released a Status Report that outlined progress on the recommendations contained in Forsaken – The Report of the Missing Women Commission of Inquiry (MWCI Report).

 In June of 2014, Cabinet was provided with an overview of progress made on the implementation of the MWCI Report recommendations and supported the release of a public report describing the action that has been taken to date.

- The public report organizes the progress made on the recommendations into four major themes: compensation and healing, improvements to policing, safety for vulnerable women and supports in missing persons' investigations.
- It highlights a number of recommendations that the province is acting on, including:
 - Rec. 3.2: Establishing a Compensation Fund for each of the living, biological children of the sixty-seven women identified in the MWCI Report.
 - Rec. 8.1: Passing legislation that will provide police with timely access to relevant information to help locate a missing person in cases where there is no suspicion that their disappearance is the result of a criminal offence (Missing Persons Act).
 - Rec. 4.10: Providing funding to the Justice Institute of British Columbia to facilitate the integration of cultural competency and bias free policing core values throughout training curricula for police. (\$205K).
 - Rec. 6.1, Urgent Measure #2: Providing funding to Carrier Sekani to support community safety workshops held in communities across Highway 16 (\$350K since 2012).

The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI) traveled to and engaged in face-to-face discussions with over 80 community and First Nations leaders representing 13 municipalities and districts and 12 First Nations communities over the months of June and July 2014. The meetings were initiated to garner a firsthand understanding of existing transportation services and challenges along the Highway 16 corridor from Prince George to Prince Rupert and to provide practical and affordable solutions to address these challenges.

Through these discussions it was evident that there's no "one size fits all" approach to solving the transportation issues along the Highway 16 corridor. However, a number of themes surfaced that have been used to develop strategies and an action plan that would help address common transportation concerns. These themes include:

- the impact of an aging population in all communities and the need for transportation services to support vulnerable seniors/elders and youth was considered the main issue;
- > Lack of driver education for First Nations youth, lack of opportunity to own or legally operate a vehicle, and lack of First Nations members with a valid Class 4 licences;
- > No centralized source of information or communication about transportation services (public or private);
- > Unreliable services (i.e. buses and trains not showing up on time or a lack of information about schedule changes);
- > Existing schedules for Greyhound, BC Transit and Northern Health Connections do not meet the expectations of communities;
- > Cost of taxis and/or other private transportation is seen as prohibitive and service is unreliable or non-existent;
- > Lack of access to operational versus capital grants, and barriers to applying for funding;
- > The impact on community services, housing and transportation needs as a result of economic growth in the region; and,

The Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MoTI) traveled to and engaged in face-to-face discussions with over 80 community and First Nations leaders representing 13 municipalities and districts and 12 First Nations communities over the months of June and July 2014. The meetings were initiated to garner a firsthand understanding of existing transportation services and challenges along the Highway 16 corridor from Prince George to Prince Rupert and to provide practical and affordable solutions to address these challenges.

Through these discussions it was evident that there's no "one size fits all" approach to solving the transportation issues along the Highway 16 corridor. However, a number of themes surfaced that have been used to develop strategies and an action plan that would help address common transportation concerns. These themes include:

- > s. 13 , the impact of an aging population in all communities and the need for transportation services to support vulnerable seniors/elders and youth was considered the main issue;
- > Lack of driver education for First Nations youth, lack of opportunity to own or legally operate a vehicle, and lack of First Nations members with a valid Class 4 licences;
- > No centralized source of information or communication about transportation services (public or private);
- > Unreliable services (i.e. buses and trains not showing up on time or a lack of information about schedule changes);
- > Existing schedules for Greyhound, BC Transit and Northern Health Connections do not meet the expectations of communities;
- Cost of taxis and/or other private transportation is seen as prohibitive and service is unreliable or non-existent;
- > Lack of access to operational versus capital grants, and barriers to applying for funding;
- > The impact on community services, housing and transportation needs as a result of economic growth in the region; and.

Chronology of meetings

1. MoTI staff recently (May 2014) met with the Omenica Beetle Action Coalition (OBAC), as part of OBAC's regular board meeting, to discuss general transportation topics in the North, including transportation on Highway 16.

The main issues identified were affordable and convenient corridor-wide travel, and a need for safe travel alternatives between neighbouring towns. It was clarified that transit service is cost-shared with municipalities, with BC Transit contributing 46.69% of the funding and local governments contributing 53.31% which comes from property taxes, fares and advertising.

Discussions also included Greyhound's "end to end" service from Prince Rupert to Prince George, and although it services the communities along Highway 16, the stops are often at odd hours which are inconvenient for users. However, since Greyhound reduced its service along the route, use has increased, so there may be an opportunity for the company to increase its service. BC Transit would take this into consideration for any service additions, as it wouldn't want to compete with Greyhound.

Transportation service for medical appointments provided by Northern Health was also discussed.

There was also a constant theme of the unfairness of northern-generated tax revenues being spent in Vancouver/Victoria, and that more transportation money should be flowing to the area.

OBAC would like to work with the province over the next few months in preparation for a follow-up meeting at UBCM on this topic. The ministry has also committed to the Mayors that there will be a consultation/conversation period over the next 4 weeks.

The OBAC includes the region from Valemount to Mackenzie and west to Smithers. Each member local government is represented on the Board by its Mayor or Chair or by an elected official designated by the Mayor and council.
