Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act

[RSBC 1996] Chapter 165

Disclosure harmful to law enforcement

- The head of a public body may refuse to disclose information to an applicant if the disclosure could reasonably be expected to
- (a) harm a law enforcement matter,
- 9 prejudice the defence of Canada or of any foreign state allied to or associated with Canada or harm the detection, prevention or suppression of espionage, sabotage or
- (c) likely to be used, in law enforcement, harm the effectiveness of investigative techniques and procedures currently used, or
- (b) reveal the identity of a confidential source of law enforcement information,
- (e) reveal criminal intelligence that has a reasonable connection with the detection, repetitive criminal activities, prevention or suppression of organized criminal activities or of serious and
- (F) endanger the life or physical safety of a law enforcement officer or any other
- (g) reveal any information relating to or used in the exercise of prosecutorial discretion,
- (E) deprive a person of the right to a fair trial or impartial adjudication
- Ξ reveal a record that has been confiscated from a person by a peace officer in accordance with an enactment,

- 8 facilitate the commission of an offence under an enactment of British Columbia or Canada, or

- (2) information The head of a public body may refuse to disclose information to an applicant if the
- (a) is in a law enforcement record and the disclosure would be an offence under an Act of Parliament,
- (b) expose to civil liability the author of the record or a person who has been quoted or is in a law enforcement record and the disclosure could reasonably be expected to paraphrased in the record, or
- (c) supervision and the disclosure could reasonably be expected to harm the proper is about the history, supervision or release of a person who is in custody or under custody or supervision of that person.

- (3) The head of a public body must not refuse to disclose under this section
- (a) a report prepared in the course of routine inspections by an agency that is authorized to enforce compliance with an Act,
- 9 a report, including statistical analysis, on the degree of success achieved in a law to interfere with or harm any of the matters referred to in subsection (1) or (2), or enforcement program unless disclosure of the report could reasonably be expected
- (C) statistical information on decisions under the Crown Counsel Act to approve or not to approve prosecutions.
- 4 The head of a public body must not refuse, after a police investigation is completed, to disclose under this section the reasons for a decision not to prosecute
- (a) to a person who knew of and was significantly interested in the investigation, including a victim or a relative or friend of a victim, or
- (b) to any other member of the public, if the fact of the investigation was made public.

Disclosure harmful to personal privacy

- 22(1)The head of a public body must refuse to disclose personal information to an applicant if the disclosure would be an unreasonable invasion of a third party's personal privacy.
- (2) In determining under subsection (1) or (3) whether a disclosure of personal information public body must consider all the relevant circumstances, including whether constitutes an unreasonable invasion of a third party's personal privacy, the head of a
- (a) the disclosure is desirable for the purpose of subjecting the activities of the government of British Columbia or a public body to public scrutiny,
- (5) protection of the environment, the disclosure is likely to promote public health and safety or to promote the
- (c) the personal information is relevant to a fair determination of the applicant's rights.
- (b) the disclosure will assist in researching or validating the claims, disputes or grievances of aboriginal people,
- (e) the third party will be exposed unfairly to financial or other harm,
- (f)the personal information has been supplied in confidence
- (8) the personal information is likely to be inaccurate or unreliable, and
- E the disclosure may unfairly damage the reputation of any person referred to in the record requested by the applicant.
- (3)A disclosure of personal information is presumed to be an unreasonable invasion of a third party's personal privacy if
- (a) the personal information relates to a medical, psychiatric or psychological history, diagnosis, condition, treatment or evaluation,
- 9 the personal information was compiled and is identifiable as part of an investigation prosecute the violation or to continue the investigation, into a possible violation of law, except to the extent that disclosure is necessary to

- 9 the personal information consists of the third party's name, address or telephone number and is to be used for mailing lists or solicitations by telephone or other

- (a) the third party has, in writing, consented to or requested the disclosure,
- 9 there are compelling circumstances affecting anyone's health or safety and notice of disclosure is mailed to the last known address of the third party,

- (b) the disclosure is for a research or statistical purpose and is in accordance with
- (e) the information is about the third party's position, functions or remuneration as an officer, employee or member of a public body or as a member of a minister's staff,
