## The Fisheries Protection Program Operational Approach

#### Context

Through amendments to the Fisheries Act, and renewal of the policy framework that supports Fisheries and Oceans Canada's (the Department's) management of impacts to fish and fish habitat, the Department will apply a risk-based approach to manage threats to the sustainability and ongoing productivity of commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries. This means adapting the way that the Department administers its responsibilities under the Fisheries Act, and the program that administers those responsibilities.

#### Purpose

This document is intended to provide an overview of the approach that will be applied to the administration of the new fisheries protection provisions of the *Fisheries* Act, and to the establishment of the new Fisheries Protection Program (the Program) within Fisheries and Oceans Canada.

#### Introduction

Changes to the Fisheries Act were made to better manage threats to the sustainability and productivity of commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries. Once in force, the new fisheries protection provisions of the amended Fisheries Act will continue to prohibit unauthorized impacts to fish and fish habitat, and project proponents will continue to be responsible for complying with those elements of the law. The Act will also continue to provide the Minister of Fisheries and Oceans with tools to promote and compel compliance with the Act. Under the amended Act, project proponents will continue to be encouraged to avoid and mitigate their impacts to fisheries, and will not need to contact the Department if they can avoid impacts to fish and fish habitat.

'Serious harm to fish' is defined in the Fisheries Act and interpreted by the Department through its Policy Statement on fisheries protection. The Department will focus application of the fisheries protection provisions of the Fisheries Act to those projects most likely to result in serious harm to fish. Projects resulting in serious harm to fish will require authorization to be in compliance with the Act. To be considered for an Authorization, project proponents will need to follow a formal process for applying for a Fisheries Act authorization. This will include submitting an application that meets detailed information requirements set by the Department in regulation. The completed authorization will include terms and conditions to avoid, mitigate and offset the serious harm resulting from the relevant elements of the project, and failure to abide by these terms and conditions will represent a contravention of the Act.

The new Fisheries Protection Program organizational structure took effect on April 2, 2013, and signaled the shift that would soon take effect with the coming into force of the fisheries protection provisions of the Fisheries Act.

The new organization is run out of sixteen offices across the country with a more centralized presence in each departmental region. The regulatory review process in each region is managed by a regulatory review team that includes a Triage and Planning unit, and Regulatory Review units. While Regulatory Review units may be housed within various offices across a region, the Triage and Planning units are located in one office per region to facilitate coordinated management of reviews and priority setting. The location of these Triage and Planning units are: Vancouver (Pacific Region), Burlington (Central and Arctic Region), Mont-Joli (Quebec Region), Moncton (Gulf Region), Halifax (Maritimes Region), Saint John's (Newfoundland and Labrador Region).

The Regulatory Review teams are further organized into sector-specific clusters that enable the Program to have virtual networks of fisheries protection staff that are reviewing similar project types, and that facilitate information sharing and increased consistency in how these projects are assessed and managed across the Program. The sector-base regulatory review clusters include: 1) Mining, Oil and Gas, 2) Linear Development, 3) Marine and Coastal, and 4) Hydro and Flows.

Within each regional headquarters office the Program now also has a Standards, Guidelines and External Liaison team that will act as a focal point for developing partnership arrangements and clear requirements for complying with the fisheries protection provisions of the Act.

In order to align program delivery with the new organizational structure, work plans and Program priorities, and to prepare for coming into force of the new Act (expected to take place in the fall of 2013), a national approach has been developed to focus resources on projects posing a higher risk to the ongoing productivity of fisheries.

#### The Operational Approach

This approach recognizes that operational tools and technical resources exist to avoid impacts to fish and fish habitat, and that by following established best practices and applying professional advice, project proponents can ensure compliance with the law without the Department's intervention. These tools and resources include industry-, regionally-, and provincially-based guidelines and best practices, as well as advice from qualified professionals with expertise in managing impacts to fish and fish habitat.

The Department will continue to provide site-specific review of projects where available best practices cannot avoid or mitigate all impacts to fish and fish habitat. Conversely, the Department will not review or provide site-specific advice on projects that are not likely to result in impacts to fish and fish habitat that would affect the ongoing productivity of fisheries. Where the Department historically provided a high level of site-specific advice on these low risk projects, the onus will now be on proponents to retain advice from other sources.

To support this approach, the Department will establish a minor impacts list identifying impact types that can be avoided or mitigated using existing practices such that impacts to the ongoing productivity of fisheries are not likely, and will identify marginal waterbodies where it is also unlikely that impacts to ongoing productivity of fisheries would occur. Projects resulting in these minor impacts or taking place in these marginal waterbodies will be able to proceed using standard tools and resources without a review by the Department.

At the same time, the Department will identify in advance sensitive species or habitats that will be subject to site-specific review by the Department, regardless of the potential level of impact to fish and fish habitat.

The Department will continue to build upon these lists and criteria to release new standards and guidelines (including regulations), as they are developed, that will provide further direction and guidelines on project types and measures that avoid or mitigate impacts to fish and fish habitat.

In cases where no review by the Department occurs, the onus will be on proponents to ensure that their project is designed in a way that avoids impacts to fish and fish habitat by following available best practices or external professional advice. To support this, the Department will remain active in ensuring that clear standards, guidelines and other best management practices are available to proponents,

consultants and regulatory partners to assist them in avoiding and mitigating impacts to fisheries productivity.

Proponents of projects that are not on the Minor Impacts List, and that are not found in marginal waterbody types, can request a regulatory review of their projects by the Department to determine if additional avoidance and mitigation measures are appropriate. A mandatory request for review form will need to be completed following the Program's defined information requirements for review. This information will be used to support a site-specific review of the impacts of the project and an analysis of the risk to fish and fish habitat. Based on the site-specific review, the Department will then recommend: that the project proceed following the appropriate avoidance and mitigation measures; that the proponent should seek an authorization for serious harm to fish likely to result from the project; or that the project should be relocated or re-designed given the likelihood of unacceptable impacts to fish and fish habitat.

A project proponent may decide, at any point in the planning process, based on available resources, the advice of a qualified professional, or the review by the Department (where applicable), that a *Fisheries Act* authorization is warranted because serious harm to fish is likely to occur. In such a case, the proponent can prepare and submit a formal request for authorization, including all of the required information set out in regulation.

#### Operational Guidance

In preparation for coming into force of the new fisheries protection provision, on-line guidance is being developed for external stakeholders focussing on information related to:

- how to avoid and mitigate impacts to fish and fish habitat (including generic avoidance measures and recognized best practices),
- when to submit a project to the Department for review,
- the process and information requirements for submitting a project to the Department, including a mandatory request for review form, and
- the Program's decision framework for triage and planning, regulatory review and authorization processes.

This guidance will allow proponents, consultants and partners to identify when projects require Departmental review.

Guidance is being developed to identify two types of fish species or habitats: those that are least sensitive and those that are most sensitive to impacts to the ongoing productivity of fisheries. This guidance is offered in terms of the priority assigned to them by the Department in providing site-specific regulatory reviews and advice.

Marginal Waterbody Types — Guidance is being developed to identify waterbody types that are unlikely to support fish and fish habitat that are part of, or support a Commercial, Recreational or Aboriginal fishery. Projects occurring within these waterbody types are therefore unlikely to cause impacts to the ongoing productivity of fisheries, and would not receive project-specific review by the Department. Examples of these marginal waterbodies may include, but are not limited to:

- non-fish bearing-waters
- watercourses not providing migratory corridors or in-stream habitat

 man-made irrigation, water supply, water management, or industrial waterbodies not connected to aquatic systems that support fish

Sensitive Species and Habitats – Guidance is being developed to identify specific species and areas that are at greater risk of impact to the ongoing productivity of fisheries. Site-specific review by the Department of projects affecting these species and/or habitats types should be conducted regardless of work, undertaking or activity proposed. These sensitive species and habitats may include, but are not limited to:

- designated species at risk and their residences or critical habitat
- defined limiting or rare habitats (including spawning, rearing, nursery, feeding and migratory routes), for instance areas that have been identified as important in support of local fisheries management objectives

The Minor Impacts List – The list of minor impacts to fish and fish habitat will identify impact types, and by extension project types, that are unlikely to result in effects to the ongoing productivity of commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries. Due to the low-risk nature of these impacts, DFO will not provide a site-specific review of these projects, and proponents will be responsible for implementing existing best practices to maintain compliance with the Fisheries Act. Implementation of these best practices will minimize cumulative effects to the greatest extent possible. Minor impacts may include, but are not limited to:

- watercourse alterations, such as channel realignment or vegetation removal, that are temporary or can be done in the dry
- temporary obstructions that take place outside critical migratory, spawning and nursery periods for local fish species
- spatial impacts, such as infilling, dredging or excavation activities, that occur within the existing
  footprint of previous works or that are of a footprint small enough that local effects on fisheries
  productivity would not likely occur

In determining the likelihood and severity of impacts to the ongoing productivity of fisheries, historical and more recent development activities in the vicinity of the project should also be considered by project proponents. It is important to emphasize that these criteria and thresholds, as captured in the Operational Guidance section of this document, remain under development, and are subject to change. In addition, through their application and continued collaboration with external stakeholders, they will evolve into the development of further guidance, policy interpretation, and new regulatory tools that will further clarify and codify the operational approach to administering the fisheries protection provisions.

#### Monitoring

Compliance, effectiveness and fisheries status monitoring is required to demonstrate Program performance, allow for Program improvement, and ultimately provide indications as to whether fisheries productivity is being protected.

Compliance monitoring will be carried out primarily on projects which the Department reviews, provides advice, authorizes, or issues requests or orders, to determine if Fisheries Act requirements are being complied with. Compliance and enforcement activities will be carried out by the Department's Conservation and Protection staff and supported by partnerships with other regulatory agencies. Compliance and enforcement for project types that the Department is not routinely involved in will be

informed by reports of incidents of potential non-compliance (i.e. occurrences) and mandatory reporting by proponents, and will be carried out when deemed appropriate using a risk-based approach.

Effectiveness monitoring will be carried out by the Program on projects with the Department's involvement to ensure that measures being required and implemented to manage impacts to fisheries are having expected results.

Broader monitoring and determination of the status of fisheries and aquatic ecosystems will be carried out in collaboration with regulatory partners and external stakeholders willing to contribute to collection and analysis of data important to maintaining the ongoing productivity of fisheries.

All types of monitoring activities will be coordinated across the Program through a national strategic monitoring planning framework, and coordinated by regional monitoring strategic plans.

#### **Partnering**

Strong partnerships will be required to support the sustainability and ongoing productivity of fisheries and the Department will take a leadership role in developing strategic partnerships, recognizing the importance of stakeholder involvement in supporting fisheries.

These partnerships include regulatory arrangements with other federal agencies, and provincial regulators, which will allow for the requirements of the fisheries protection provisions of the *Fisheries Act* to be administered by organizations best positioned to do so, thereby reducing overlap and filling regulatory gaps. These arrangements can lead to the development of instruments to support equivalency, incorporation by reference, and delegation to formalize and ensure transparency of these partnerships.

Existing regulatory partnership arrangements will continue to be supported by the Department and efforts will be made to renew and improve these partnerships. In keeping with the spirit and intent of these arrangements, existing processes that already allow for regulatory streamlining and best-placed delivery of services will be maintained to the extent possible.

Partnership arrangements with non-regulatory stakeholder organizations will facilitate information exchange and feedback on not only regulatory issues, but also non-regulatory activities, such as the Recreational Fisheries Conservation Partnerships Program, that provide a catalyst for bringing organizations and resources together to improve fisheries habitats.

#### **Next Steps**

The Program will continue to develop, implement, evaluate and refine operational tools and processes over time. As the new Program evolves, feedback on the operational approach will be used to improve efficiency and effectiveness of the Fisheries Protection Program and to inform the development of regulatory tools and regulations under the *Fisheries Act*.

# **Fisheries Protection Policy Statement**

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#### 1. Ministerial Statement

Fisheries have long been valued by Canadians for economic, environmental, cultural and ceremonial purposes.

The Fisheries Protection Policy Statement, 2013 supports changes made to the *Fisheries Act* in 2012. These changes: focus our efforts on protecting the productivity of commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries; institute enhanced compliance and protection tools that are more easily enforceable; provide clarity, certainty and consistency of regulatory requirements; and enable enhanced partnerships with stakeholders such as other agencies of government and local groups to ensure a comprehensive approach to fisheries protection.

The intent of this policy is to provide guidance to Canadians to ensure they are complying with the *Fisheries Act*. It will strengthen the Government's ability to address key threats to the productivity and sustainability of our fisheries, through standards and guidelines to avoid, mitigate and offset impacts to fisheries and to ensure compliance with these requirements.

Our approach to fisheries protection will ensure these valuable commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries thrive, while encouraging the responsible development of Canada's natural resources.

I am confident that responsible resource development and sustainable fisheries can both be achieved. I look forward to our continued collaboration on fisheries protection so that our grandchildren, and their children, will also enjoy the benefits of Canada's rich fisheries resources.

#### 2. Disclaimer

The Fisheries Protection Policy Statement is for information purposes only. It is not a substitute for the *Fisheries Act* or its Regulations. In the event of an inconsistency between the policy statement and the *Fisheries Act* or its Regulations, the legislation will prevail.

## 3. Approval authority, effective date and review date

The Fisheries Protection Policy Statement was approved by the Minister of Fisheries and Oceans and it is effective as of November 2013. The policy statement will be reviewed at least every 10 years.

## 4. Application

The Fisheries Protection Policy Statement will be used by officials of Fisheries and Oceans Canada (the Department) and the Department's regulatory partners<sup>1</sup> when administering the fisheries protection provisions<sup>2</sup> of the *Fisheries Act*.

The Fisheries Protection Policy Statement applies to proponents of existing or proposed works, undertakings or activities (hereafter referred to as projects) that are likely to result in impacts to fish or fish habitat that are part of or support commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries, including projects that have the potential to affect the passage of fish or modify the flow of watercourses.

#### 5. Context

#### 5.1 Background

The Fisheries Act became one of Canada's first laws in 1868. In recognition that healthy and productive fisheries require healthy fish habitat, the habitat protection and pollution prevention provisions were incorporated into the Act in the 1970's. In 2012, changes were made to the Fisheries Act to enhance the ability of the Department to manage threats to the sustainability and productivity of Canada's commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries. Changes were also made to enable:

- enhanced compliance and protection tools;
- expanded use of standards and other tools that make regulatory requirements clear and consistent; and
- partnerships with agencies and organizations best placed to provide fisheries protection services.

The changes to the *Fisheries Act* include a prohibition against causing *serious harm to fish* that are part of or support a commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery (Section 35), provisions for flow and passage (Sections 20 and 21), and a framework for regulatory decision-making (Sections 6 and 6.1). These provisions guide the Minister's decision-making process in order to provide for sustainable and productive fisheries.

The Fisheries Protection Policy Statement was prepared by the Department to explain the fisheries protection provisions of the *Fisheries Act* and to outline how the Department will

implement these provisions. In particular, the policy statement focuses on the regulatory aspects of the Department's Fisheries Protection Program.

## 5.2 Importance of fish and fish habitat

Fish have long had economic, environmental, cultural, and spiritual value to Canadians.

Aboriginal peoples have been fishing for many generations in Canada's seas, along the coasts, in lakes, and in rivers. Commercial and recreational fisheries also generate billions of dollars every year within the Canadian economy.

Fish need healthy places to live, feed, and reproduce. They also need healthy corridors to migrate between these places. Canada's myriad water bodies, including coastal and marine areas, lakes, ponds, rivers, streams, and wetlands, and riparian areas provide important habitat for fish.

#### 5.3 Threats to fisheries

The sustainability and productivity of fisheries today are threatened by multiple and interacting stressors, including:

- habitat degradation or loss, which may occur as a result of the fragmentation of habitat, infilling of lakes or streams, conversion of wetlands or other activities in a watershed such as logging, urbanization, or the clearing of riparian or aquatic vegetation;
- flow alteration, which may alter habitat characteristics or cause the death of fish, and may be caused by dams or other impoundments, water diversion, stream crossings or water extraction for uses such as municipal, industrial, or agricultural uses;<sup>3</sup>
- aquatic invasive species, which may threaten fish through competition, predation or habitat impacts;
- · overexploitation of fish, which may lead to depleted or unsustainable populations; and
- pollution of many kinds, which may adversely affect water quality and fish health.

Fisheries productivity is often subject to impacts from multiple, different stressors at a given time or from repeated stressors over time that pose significant threats. All of these stressors take place in the context of a changing environment. Changes in seasonal temperatures, ice cover, precipitation, and evaporation patterns can lead to changes in water quantity and quality, ultimately affecting fish and fish habitat. In turn, each of these stressors may have associated effects on the ability of fish to carry out their life processes and on their habitat. While many of these stressors are beyond the control of any single regulatory body or individual, their impacts can be managed collectively to provide for sustainable and productive fisheries.

Although overexploitation, aquatic invasive species and pollution are all threats to the

sustainability of fisheries, the Fisheries Protection Policy Statement focuses on the management of impacts to fish resulting from habitat degradation or loss and alterations to fish passage and flow. Other components of the *Fisheries Act* and various pieces of federal, provincial, and territorial legislation address these other threats.

## 6. Roles and responsibilities: Protecting fisheries is a shared responsibility

Many partners and stakeholders, including federal departments, provincial and territorial governments, Aboriginal peoples, recreational fishing and angling groups, conservation organizations and industry groups, share a common interest in the conservation and protection of fisheries. Sustainability and ongoing productivity of fisheries may best be achieved when these partners and stakeholders work together to conserve and protect fish and fish habitat.

#### Proponents

Canada's fish and fish habitat are a shared resource that provide great social, economic and environmental benefits but they are also finite and vulnerable. They must therefore be protected and managed to maintain these benefits for present and future generations.

Development activities taking place in or near water may affect fisheries by adversely affecting fish or fish habitat. Proponents of these activities should:

- understand the types of impacts their projects are likely to cause;
- take measures to avoid and mitigate impacts to the extent possible; and,
- request authorization from the Minister and abide by the conditions of any such authorization, when it is not possible to avoid and mitigate impacts of projects that are likely to cause serious harm to fish.

Furthermore, proponents are required to ensure that their projects conform to all other statutory requirements.

#### Federal government

The Fisheries Act and, more specifically, its fisheries protection provisions, establish authorities for the protection of commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries. These authorities include the prohibition against carrying out projects that result in serious harm to fish and the powers related to fish passage and flow.

Other federal legislation such as the Oceans Act, the Species at Risk Act and the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, 2012 consider fish and fish habitat. These other statutes may complement the fisheries protection provisions of the Fisheries Act.

#### Provinces and Territories

While management of inland fisheries has largely been delegated to the provinces and the Yukon

Territory, the administration of the fisheries protection provisions remains with the federal government across Canada. However, provincial and territorial authorities deliver a range of natural resource conservation initiatives under various provincial and territorial laws that complement those of the federal government. For example, land-use decisions made by these authorities may have a significant bearing on the quality and function of fish habitat in a given watershed.

Arrangements between the Department and other federal, provincial and territorial authorities provide effective mechanisms to collaborate on managing threats to fisheries.

#### 7. Statement

#### 7.1 Purpose

The purpose of the Fisheries Protection Policy Statement is two-fold:

- to set out how the Department and its regulatory partners will apply the fisheries protection provisions of the Fisheries Act and guide the development of regulations, standards and directives; and
- 2) to provide guidance to proponents of projects on the application of the fisheries protection provisions of the Fisheries Act.

#### 7.2 Goal

The goal of the Department in applying this Fisheries Protection Policy is to provide for the sustainability and ongoing productivity of commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries.

#### 7.3 Objectives

Through the Fisheries Protection Policy Statement, the Department's objectives are to provide consistent guidance through regulations, standards and directives, and to make regulatory decisions in a timely manner. In this way, proponents will have the necessary information and direction to avoid, mitigate and offset harmful impacts to fish and fish habitat so that they will meet the goal of this policy, and thereby comply with the fisheries protection provisions of the Fisheries Act.

#### 7.4 Principles

To meet the goal and the objectives of the Fisheries Protection Policy Statement, the Department will be guided by the following principles:

- Avoid harm: Whenever possible, the Department's preference is to maintain the
  productivity of Canada's fisheries by avoiding impacts to fish and fish habitat. Proponents
  are responsible for managing and mitigating impacts resulting from their projects.
- Promote sound decision-making: In making regulatory decisions, the Department will be
  informed by the best available science, technical information and traditional knowledge. The
  Department will also be guided by the application of precaution<sup>4</sup> and a risk-based approach
  to decision-making.
- Enable best-placed delivery: Other entities across Canada may be well-placed to achieve
  and deliver the objectives of the fisheries protection provisions. The Department will thus
  seek to collaborate with partners who have the knowledge, capacity and interest in fisheries
  conservation and protection when these align with the Department's mandate, priorities and
  objectives.
- Employ a standards-based approach: The Department will develop and support the use of standards that provide clarity and certainty to proponents while maintaining the sustainability and ongoing productivity of Canada's fisheries.
- Consider the ecosystem context: The consideration of cumulative effects on the state, resiliency, and natural biodiversity of the ecosystem will guide the Department in achieving the objectives of the Fisheries Protection Policy Statement.

## 8. Fisheries protection provisions of the Fisheries Act

#### 8.1 Scope of application of the prohibition (Section 35)

The prohibition against *serious harm to fish* applies to fish and fish habitat that are part of or support commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries. Definitions of "fish", "fish habitat", "fishery", and "commercial", "recreational", and "Aboriginal", in relation to a fishery, are found in the *Fisheries Act* and in the glossary of this document.

Fish that are part of commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries are interpreted to be those fish that fall within the scope of applicable federal or provincial fisheries regulations<sup>5</sup> as well as those that can be fished by Aboriginal organizations or their members for food, social or ceremonial purposes or for purposes set out in a land claims agreement.

Fish that support these fisheries are those fish that contribute to the productivity of a fishery (often, but not exclusively, as prey species). The "fish that support" may reside in water bodies that contain the commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries or in water bodies that are connected by a watercourse to such water bodies.6

In Canada, most water bodies contain fish, or their habitat, that are part of or support commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries and are therefore subject to the prohibition against serious harm to fish. These areas include: i) all three of Canada's oceans; ii) areas of fishing for food, social, or ceremonial purposes or under land claims agreements by Aboriginal peoples; and iii) areas covered by federal or provincial fisheries regulations. Notwithstanding the above, some water bodies may be specifically excluded from the application of federal or provincial regulations.7

In addition, some water bodies may not contain fish or provide fish habitat that are part of or support commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries. Such water bodies may not be subject to the prohibition. These would need to be determined on a case-by-case basis. In these circumstances, proponents are advised to use appropriate and recognized scientific methods to consider whether any such water bodies would be affected by their projects.

#### 8.2 Serious harm to fish (Section 35)

35. (1) No person shall carry on any work, undertaking or activity that results in serious harm to fish that are part of a commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery, or to fish that support such a fishery.

Section 35 of the Fisheries Act prohibits serious harm to fish which is defined in the Act as "the death of fish or any permanent alteration to, or destruction of, fish habitat."

Proponents are responsible for avoiding and mitigating serious harm to fish that are part of or support commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries. When proponents are unable to completely avoid or mitigate serious harm to fish, their projects will normally require authorization under Subsection 35(2) of the Fisheries Act in order for the project to proceed without contravening the Act.

The Subsection 35(1) prohibition will be applied to those projects that have the potential to cause serious harm to fish. These projects are likely to reduce the ability of the fish habitat to directly or indirectly support the life processes of fish or result in the death of fish. Relationships between typical project impacts (e.g., temperature change, sedimentation, infilling, reduction of nutrients

and food supply, etc.) and the consequences to fish or fish habitat are described in various Pathways of Effects diagrams.8

Projects requiring authorization are those likely to result in a localized effect to fish populations or fish habitat in the vicinity of the project. Localized effects may also lead to more widespread impacts on fish and fish habitat and, in turn, affect the ability of the area to produce fish. Box 1 provides considerations for understanding when *serious harm to fish* is likely to occur.

The Department interprets serious harm to fish as:

- · the death of fish;
- a permanent alteration to fish habitat of a spatial scale, duration or intensity that limits or
  diminishes the ability of fish to use such habitats as spawning grounds, or as nursery, rearing,
  or food supply areas, or as a migration corridor, or any other area in order to carry out one or
  more of their life processes;
- the destruction of fish habitat of a spatial scale, duration, or intensity that fish can no longer rely upon such habitats for use as spawning grounds, or as nursery, rearing, or food supply areas, or as a migration corridor, or any other area in order to carry out one or more of their life processes.

## 8.3 Provisions for flow and fish passage (Sections 20 and 21)

The Fisheries Act includes sections that may require the provision of sufficient water and unimpeded passage for fish (Sections 20 and 21). In summary, these provisions:

- allow the Minister to request studies and evaluations related to obstructions or other things that may be hindering fish passage or harming fish;
- allow the Minister to request: the removal of or modifications to obstructions or things
  that are harmful to fish or impede flow or fish passage; the installation of fish-ways,
  screens and guards; or that sufficient water flow be provided for fish passage; or
- prohibit the damage or removal of fish-guards, fish-ways, and screens.

Projects that have the potential to obstruct fish passage, modify flow or result in the entrainment of fish may also cause *serious harm to fish*. In these situations, an authorization under Subsection 35(2) is required. The conditions of authorizations include avoidance, mitigation and offsetting measures to provide for fish passage around the obstructions. The conditions may also require water flows necessary to permit the free passage of fish and the need for fish-guards or screens over water intakes. The Minister must also consider the factors set out in Section 6 of the

Fisheries Act prior to deciding whether to issue such an authorization or when the Minister makes a request under sections 20 or 21.

#### 8.4 Factors to be considered (Section 6)

Section 6.1 of the Fisheries Act sets out the purpose of the fisheries protection provisions "to provide for the sustainability and ongoing productivity of commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries."

Once it has been determined that a regulation will be made or a Ministerial power will be exercised, such as the issuance of a Subsection 35(2) authorization or a request to provide for fish passage or sufficient flow, the four factors in Section 6 of the *Fisheries Act* must be considered by the Minister. These factors establish a clear structure for the regulatory review process. The four factors in Section 6 are:

- a) the contribution of the relevant fish to the ongoing productivity of commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries;
- b) fisheries management objectives;
- whether there are measures and standards to avoid, mitigate or offset serious harm to fish that are part of a commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery, or that support such a fishery; and
- d) the public interest.

Further guidance on how these factors should be considered is provided below.

 a) Contribution of relevant fish to the ongoing productivity of commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries

The contribution of relevant fish relates to the role of the fish and fish habitat affected by the project in the overall productivity of the commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery. 9 Ongoing productivity is the potential sustained yield of all fish populations and their habitat that are part of or support commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries. Effects on productivity may be assessed using a variety of tools. In general, the metrics and level of detail used to provide estimates of impacts to productivity will depend on both the type and scale of the impact.

For projects with a low likelihood of causing impacts to productivity, or in which the impacts are relatively small, proponents only need to qualitatively document the key impacts and their

associated links to components of productivity (e.g., growth, performance, survival, migration, and reproduction).

For projects likely to cause large-scale impacts on the quantity or quality of fish habitat, metrics of productivity should be chosen based on the type of impact. These include metrics of productivity related to habitat area or metrics related to components of productivity that are linked to the life cycle of the fish.

Very large-scale impacts that are likely to result in ecosystem transformation will require the most detailed estimates of impacts to productivity, likely involving quantitative fish population models.

Proponents are responsible for documenting and providing information such that an analysis describing the contribution of relevant fish may be undertaken. This analysis will help inform how the project may affect the relevant fisheries management objectives (factor 6b) and the amount and type of avoidance, mitigation and offsetting measures required (factor 6c).

### b) Fisheries management objectives

Fisheries management objectives are the stated socio-economic, biological, and ecological goals for a fishery that are typically established by federal, provincial or territorial fishery managers. Other entities, including wildlife co-management boards established under land claims agreements may also set fisheries management objectives.

Fisheries management objectives may range from high-level objectives applying widely to multiple fisheries or fish stocks to objectives that are limited in scope to a specific fishery, stock or region. Where they exist, fishery-specific objectives found in federal, provincial, territorial or co-management board fishing plans will be considered foremost when making regulatory decisions related to the fisheries protection provisions.

Where fishery-specific objectives do not exist, overarching strategies and policy objectives established by the Department or other fisheries managers should be considered. In areas where other entities manage the fishery, discussions with relevant authorities may also occur.

Where fisheries management objectives are available, proponents should consider and document how the impacts from their projects may affect fisheries management objectives. Proponents should also describe any effects their projects may have on the achievement of these objectives. Fisheries management objectives may guide proponents in the selection of any required avoidance, mitigation and offsetting measures (factor 6c).

#### c) Measures or standards to avoid, mitigate, or offset serious harm to fish




Figure 1. Conceptual diagram of the hierarchy.

The Minister must consider whether measures and standards have been applied by proponents to avoid, mitigate or offset *serious harm to fish* that results from their projects. The fundamentals of "avoid, mitigate and offset" build on a hierarchy that is internationally recognized as a best

practice in reducing risks to biodiversity <sup>10</sup> (Figure 1). This hierarchy emphasizes that efforts should be made to prevent (avoid) impacts first. When avoidance is not possible, then efforts should be made to minimize (mitigate) impacts caused by the project in question. After these actions, any residual impacts would normally require authorization and should then be addressed by offsetting. A conceptual diagram of the hierarchy is provided in Figure 1.

Projects can negatively affect fish and fish habitat (red boxes). Efforts should be made to avoid impacts first (grey boxes). When avoidance is not possible, then efforts should be made to mitigate impacts caused by the project in question (green boxes). After these actions, any residual impacts should then be addressed by offsetting (blue boxes). Note: the size of these boxes is for illustrative purposes only.

Fisheries dynamics and fish habitat functions are complex. It is much more difficult and expensive to repair or restore damaged ecosystems to maintain fisheries productivity than it is to avoid adverse impacts. For this reason, the Department emphasizes avoidance and mitigation as the main steps in the hierarchy, followed by offsetting as a means of last resort.

Proponents will be required to demonstrate that measures and standards have been fully applied to first avoid, then mitigate, and then finally, offset any residual *serious harm to fish* that are part of or support commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries. Measures to avoid, mitigate and offset, as well as requirements for monitoring and reporting, may be included as conditions of authorizations.<sup>11</sup> The policy interpretation of these measures is as follows:

#### Avoidance

Avoidance is the undertaking of measures to completely prevent serious harm to fish. Avoidance measures may include locating infrastructure or designing a project or one or more of its components to avoid serious harm to fish. Careful timing of certain activities may also avoid harm to fish and fish habitat.

For some projects, *serious harm to fish* may be fully avoided while for others, *serious harm to fish* may only be partially avoided. When *serious harm to fish* cannot be fully avoided, mitigation measures should be undertaken.

#### Mitigation

Mitigation is a measure to reduce the spatial scale, duration, or intensity of *serious harm to fish* that cannot be completely avoided. The best available mitigation measures or standards should be implemented by proponents as much as is practically feasible.

Mitigation measures include the implementation of best management practices during the construction, maintenance, operation and decommissioning of a project.

#### Offsetting

After efforts have been made to avoid and mitigate impacts, any residual serious harm to fish should be addressed by offsetting. An offset measure is one that counterbalances unavoidable serious harm to fish resulting from a project with the goal of maintaining or improving the productivity of the commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery. Offset measures should support available fisheries management objectives and local restoration priorities.

Offset measures are actions taken after the application of avoidance and mitigation measures. They are intended to provide tangible conservation outcomes for fish and fish habitat that may reasonably be expected to counterbalance the loss of fish habitat and fisheries productivity as a result of the negative impacts of projects.

Offsetting measures could take a variety of forms ranging from localized improvements to fish habitat to more complex measures that address limiting factors to fish production. The choice of appropriate offsetting measures will be guided by threats to fisheries productivity and fisheries management objectives. In some instances, the most desirable offsetting measures may be a replacement of the same type of habitat that is affected by the project. In other situations, better

outcomes for fisheries may be achieved by undertaking offsetting in water bodies or for fish species other than those affected by the project. For example, improving access to off-channel habitats or the removal of anthropogenic barriers might be acceptable offsetting measures.

Proponents will be required to submit an offsetting plan to demonstrate that the measures and standards will be fully applied to first avoid, then mitigate, and finally offset any residual serious harm to fish that are part of or support commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries. Proponents will also be required to demonstrate that the offsetting measures will maintain or improve the productivity of fisheries. <sup>12</sup>

## d) The public interest

Finally, the Minister must take into account the public interest. In most cases, the public interest will be served through the consideration of the first three factors: a) the contribution of relevant fish; b) fisheries management objectives; and c) measures and standards to avoid, mitigate or offset serious harm to fish.

However, factor 6(d) the public interest allows the Minister to consider a range of issues deemed relevant to the well-being of society at a given place and time. These may range from issues related to economic development to long-term sustainable development to impacts on ecosystem goods and services. Discretion on how to apply this factor rests with the Minister.

Proponents may wish to document any information relevant to the public interest considerations.

#### 8.5 Review and decision-making process




Figure 2. Summary of the development proposal review and decision-making process.

An overview of the review and decision-making process is provided in Figure 2. General advice on understanding when a regulatory review or *Fisheries Act* authorization is required is provided in Box 1 and in steps 1 to 3 of Figure 2. When a regulatory review is required, proponents should be prepared to gather detailed information about their project and its impacts, as outlined in Box 1. The information used to answer these questions will also help to satisfy some of the information requirements outlined in the *Applications for Authorization under Paragraph* 35(2)(b) of the Fisheries Act Regulations.

# Box 1. When considering whether a project is likely to cause serious harm to fish and requires an authorization, proponents should identify:

- 1. Impacts to fish and fish habitat caused by the project: For example, have all potential impacts been considered? Pathways of effects diagrams, available on the Department's website, may help proponents determine what kinds of impacts can be expected from typical developments.
- 2. The expected duration of impacts: For example, is the duration short enough that it does not diminish the ability of fish to carry out one or more of its life processes? It is important to note that, for many projects, the duration of impact will be longer than the duration of the work taking place in or near the water.
- 3. The geographic scale of impacts: For example, is the scale small enough that the disturbance will not displace fish that would otherwise be occupying the habitat?
- 4. The availability and condition of nearby fish habitat: Is the habitat that is being altered or destroyed the only habitat of its type and quality in the area of the project?
- 5. The impact on the relevant fish: For example, are the fish that are affected by the proposed project likely to experience increased mortality rates, increased stress and reduced fitness as a result of direct injury or reduced habitat function such that a localized effect on a fish population or stock is possible?
- 6. Proposed avoidance and mitigation measures: Will measures to avoid and mitigate serious harm to fish be applied such that all serious harm to fish is avoided? If so, an authorization is not required. If serious harm to fish remains after all avoidance and mitigation measures have been applied, an authorization may be required. Proponents should apply for an authorization following the Applications for Authorization under Paragraph 35(2)(b) of the Fisheries Act Regulations.

Using standard guidance made available by DFO, or by seeking expert advice as required, proponents are responsible for determining whether their projects are likely to require authorization and, if so, to apply for authorizations. DFO is responsible for reviewing applications for authorizations and determining whether or not to authorize the project, based on the consideration of Section 6 factors. The answers to the questions in steps 1 to 4 should be informed by the advice in the Fisheries Protection Policy Statement. More specifically, step 1 is informed by section 8.1 "Scope of the application of the prohibition"; steps 2 and 3 are informed by sections 8.2 "Serious harm to fish" and 8.3 "Provisions for flow and fish passage", and the material in Box 1 and step 4 is informed by the section 8.4 "Factors to be considered".

## 9. Requirements

#### 9.1 General compliance

The Fisheries Protection Policy Statement is a guidance tool to help proponents comply with the fisheries protection provisions in the *Fisheries Act* and related regulations. This includes compliance with Section 35 of the *Fisheries Act*, all supporting regulations, all relevant operational directives, the terms and conditions of all Subsection 35(2) authorizations, and the

various duties specified in Section 38 (e.g., the duty to notify and to take corrective measures, etc.).

## 9.2 Additional powers of the Minister (Section 37)

Section 37 of the *Fisheries Act* sets out the provisions that allow the Minister to request plans and specifications for projects that may result in *serious harm to fish*, and that allow the Minister to make orders to modify, restrict or close these projects.<sup>13</sup>

In addition, under Section 37, anyone proposing to carry out a project in an ecologically significant area, as defined in regulations, is required, upon request of the Minister or in circumstances set out in regulations, to provide information on their project to the Minister. If the project is likely to result in harm to fish in that area, the Minister may require modifications or restrict or stop the carrying on of that project for as long as necessary.

Before making decisions under Section 37 with regard to an offence under Subsection 40(1) or with regard to harm to fish, the Minister must consider the factors in Section 6 of the *Fisheries Act*.

#### 9.3 Duty to notify (Section 38)

The Fisheries Act imposes a series of obligations upon persons responsible for projects that lead to occurrences that result in serious harm to fish that are part of or support a commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery. There is a duty to notify an inspector when this serious harm to fish is not authorized under the Act, or when there is a serious and imminent danger of such an occurrence.

Moreover, the *Fisheries Act* imposes duties to take corrective measures and to provide written reports when there are occurrences that may result in *serious harm to fish*. Failure to notify, take corrective measures or report in such situations may result in penalties.

An inspector or fishery officer has the authority to order the immediate action necessary to correct the situation and these actions may be at the expense of the person(s) identified as responsible. Those powers are designed to be used to maintain the productivity of commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries when serious harm to fish has resulted from unplanned or unexpected situations for which the responsible person has not received an authorization prior to causing this harm or for which the serious harm to fish was greater than authorized.

## 10. Consequences of non-compliance with the fisheries protection provisions

There are consequences for non-compliance with the prohibition against carrying on any project that results in *serious harm to fish* or non-compliance with the conditions of an authorization. The *Fisheries Act* outlines minimum and maximum penalties, depending on different classes of offenders, type of offence, and whether it is a first or subsequent offence.

Imprisonment is also a possibility for repeat offences. Fines collected for convictions under the fisheries protection provisions are directed into the Environmental Damages Fund to use for proactive measures to enhance the conservation and protection of Canada's fisheries resources.

## 11. Monitoring and reporting

The Department will monitor and report on progress toward meeting the objective of this policy statement through its performance measurement strategy and related reporting initiatives, as appropriate.

Aboriginal, in relation to a fishery: means that fish is harvested by an Aboriginal organization or any of its members for the purpose of using the fish as food, for social or ceremonial purposes or for purposes set out in a land claims agreement entered into with the Aboriginal organization. (Subsection 2(1))

avoidance: measures to completely prevent adverse impacts to fish and fish habitat.

Canadian fisheries waters: all waters in the fishing zones of Canada, all waters in the territorial sea of Canada and all internal waters of Canada. (Subsection 2(1))

**commercial, in relation to a fishery**: means that the fish is harvested under the authority of a licence for the purpose of sale, trade or barter. (Subsection 2(1))

**contribution (of relevant fish):** the role of the relevant fish or fish habitat in the overall productivity of a commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery that could be affected by a given project.

destruction of fish habitat: an elimination of habitat of a spatial scale, duration, and intensity that fish can no longer rely upon such habitats for use as spawning grounds, or as nursery, rearing, or food supply areas, or as a migration corridor, or any other area in order to carry out one or more of their life processes.

Environmental Damages Fund: a specified purpose account, administered by Environment Canada, to provide a mechanism for directing funds received as a result of fines, court orders and voluntary payments to priorities that will benefit the natural environment.

fish: includes (a) parts of fish, (b) shellfish, crustaceans, marine animals and any parts of shellfish, crustaceans or marine animals, and (c) the eggs, sperm, spawn, larvae, spat and juvenile stages of fish, shellfish, crustaceans and marine animals. (Subsection 2(1))

**fish habitat:** means spawning grounds and any other areas, including nursery, rearing, food supply and migration areas, on which fish depend directly or indirectly in order to carry out their life processes. (Subsection 2(1))

fish that are part of: fish that may be fished as part of a commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery.

**fish that support:** fish that contribute to the productivity of a commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery.

**fishery:** includes the area, locality, place or station in or on which a pound, seine, net, weir or other fishing appliance is used, set, placed or located, and the area, tract or stretch of water in or from which fish may be taken by the said pound, seine, net, weir or other fishing appliance, and

also the pound, seine, net, weir, or other fishing appliance used in connection therewith. (Subsection 2(1))

fish-way: means any device, work or other thing that provides for the free passage of fish, including a canal, a fish pump, a fish ladder, a fish elevator and a fish lock. (Subsection 2(1))

mitigation: measures to reduce the spatial scale, duration, or intensity of adverse effects to fish and fish habitat that cannot be completely avoided.

**obstruction:** means any slide, dam or other thing impeding wholly or partially the free passage of fish. (Subsection 2(1))

offsetting: measures to counterbalance serious harm to fish by maintaining or improving fisheries productivity after all feasible measures to avoid and mitigate impacts have been undertaken.

ongoing productivity: the potential sustained yield of all fish populations and their habitat that are part of or support commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries.<sup>15</sup>

Pathways of Effects: diagrams developed by Fisheries and Oceans Canada as a tool to communicate potential effects of projects on fish and fish habitat. These diagrams describe, for a range of activities, the type of cause-effect relationships that are known to exist and the mechanisms by which stressors ultimately lead to effects in the aquatic environment. Each cause-and-effect relationship is represented as a line, known as a pathway, connecting the activity to a potential stressor, and a stressor to some ultimate effect on fish and fish habitat. Each pathway represents an area where avoidance and mitigation measures can be applied to reduce or eliminate a potential effect.<sup>16</sup>

permanent alteration to fish habitat: an alteration of fish habitat of a spatial scale, duration and intensity that limits or diminishes the ability of fish to use such habitats as spawning grounds, or as nursery, rearing, or food supply areas, or as a migration corridor, or any other area in order to carry out one or more of their life processes.

**prescribed authority:** a person designated by regulation for a specific role in the administration of a provision of the *Fisheries Act*.

project: one or more existing or proposed works, undertakings or activities.

recreational, in relation to a fishery: means that fish is harvested under the authority of a licence for personal use of the fish or for sport. (Subsection 2(1))

regulatory partners: those with whom the Department has established partnership arrangements for the administration of the fisheries protection provisions.

relevant fish: all fish that are involved (either as part of the fishery or in a supporting role) in a commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery, and that could be affected by a given project.

riparian area: the areas bordering on streams, lakes, and wetlands that link water to land. The blend of streambed, water, trees, shrubs and grasses directly influences and provides fish habitat.

serious harm to fish: the death of fish or any permanent alteration to, or destruction of, fish habitat. (Subsection 2(2))

sustainability: achieving a balance between the carrying out of current day activities while allowing for future generations of people to meet their needs related to fisheries.<sup>17</sup>

watercourse: a flowing water body, such as a river, stream, or creek, as well as watercourses that may be ephemeral, intermittent, temporary or seasonal in nature.

Appendix 1. Overview of the fisheries protection provisions of the Fisheries Act.

Provision	Intent
Section 6	Factors Once it has been determined that a Ministerial power will be exercised, the following four factors must be considered by the Minister:  • the contribution of the relevant fish to the ongoing productivity of commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries;  • fisheries management objectives;  • whether there are measures and standards to avoid, mitigate or offset serious harm to fish that are part of a commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery, or that support such a fishery; and  • the public interest.

In addition, under Section 37, anyone proposing to carry on a work, undertaking or activity in an ecologically significant area (as defined in regulations) is required, on request of the Minister or in circumstances set out in regulations, to provide information on their project to the Minister.

Section 38	Duty to notify The Fisheries Act imposes a series of obligations upon persons who have the responsibility for projects that lead to occurrences that result in serious harm to fish or who cause or contribute to such occurrences. There is a duty to notify an inspector, fishery officer or a prescribed authority of any unauthorized serious harm to fish that are part of, or support, a commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fishery. Moreover, the Fisheries Act imposes duties to take corrective measures and to provide written reports when there are occurrences that may result in serious harm to fish.

Dear Minister Shea:

On June 27, 2012, the federal government announced its intention to engage and consult with public and stakeholders over the summer and fall to develop the policy and regulatory framework to support changes to the *Fisheries Act* (the Act). On behalf of the British Columbia (BC) Government's Natural Resource Sector, we would like to express our desire to be formally involved in this process as soon as possible.

British Columbia recognizes that several changes under the Act will address issues that our province has been seeking to resolve for some time. We are pleased to see these changes and are looking forward to assisting with their implementation. These changes include:

- Economic benefits for BC's commercial fishing sectors. We support the development of mechanisms to
  allocate fish to fund science and management activities, but would like to understand how any
  broadening of the use of fish allocation will be managed to avoid harm to licensed fishing enterprises.
- Greater management of aquatic invasive species and introductions and transfers. BC is currently
  revising the Controlled Alien Species Regulation (under the BC Wildlife Act) to prohibit the possession,
  breeding and trafficking of high-risk aquatic invasive species. We hope to coordinate our efforts with
  yours and ensure federal and provincial legislation is complementary and well aligned.
- Greater efficiencies and clarification of each jurisdiction's roles through administrative and equivalency
  agreements and regulatory streamlining. This promises to reduce duplication and overlap in
  federal/provincial authority (such as wastewater effluent).
- Enhanced compliance and enforcement mechanisms that increase fines for offences, establish the ability to charge and set penalties, and clarify and expand powers of inspectors.

There are also areas where we have identified policy concerns and potential issues with the Act amendments. In the immediate term, these include the designation of commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries and how to define the concepts of "ongoing productivity" and "permanent alteration." BC's concerns are outlined in detail in the attachment to this letter.

We appreciate the recent information meeting with Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) ADM Kevin Stringer on September 4, 2012, and his presentation to the Canadian Council of Fisheries and Aquaculture Ministers on

September 6, 2012, which provided an overview of changes to the Act. These meetings provided an excellent forum to begin the conversation on future consultation opportunities. However, if formal consultation does not begin shortly, BC is concerned there will not be adequate time to meaningfully contribute to the development of policies and regulations in support of the Act. We are eager to work together, both in areas where we see increased opportunities for BC as well as areas where potential challenges exist, both federally and provincially.

Please have your staff contact the Deputy Minister for the Ministry of Environment, Wes Shoemaker, as the provincial lead for this engagement. The Ministry of Environment will coordinate the Natural Resource Sector approach and liaise with key contacts within the Province.

Thank you for your attention to these critical issues and we look forward to working together on this important matter.

I am following up on a recent meeting with Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) Assistant Deputy Minister Trevor Swerdfager, Pacific Regional Director General Sue Farlinger and British Columbia (BC) Ministry of Environment and Ministry of Agriculture representatives concerning recent *Fisheries Act* amendments. We appreciate the confirmation of the importance of collaboration between our governments to establish the best possible regime for fisheries management in British Columbia.

BC Natural Resource Ministries are ready to provide coordinated input concerning potential implications of *Fisheries Act* amendments and draft regulations in BC, I understand the DFO is working toward bringing key regulations into force in July 2013. I am pleased to note that provincial staff have already been contacted by DFO Pacific Region and are ready to engage in discussions to inform the development of policies and regulations in March 2013.

BC presents a unique situation for fisheries management in Canada. BC has diverse fish populations, most of the province is not under treaty and our recreational fisheries management approach uses a low intensity management model that considers ecosystems as well as species. West Coast fisheries are an integral part of British Columbia's economy, local and First Nation culture and recreation. We take the management of this resource very seriously and recognize our shared responsibility to ensure the long term health of fish in British Columbia.

Our Natural Resource Ministries are assessing how changes to the Fisheries Act may affect fish and fish habitat in BC. We are developing our responses to the '10 Questions' tabled by the DFO at the November Canadian Council of Fisheries and Aquaculture Ministers (CCFAM) Inland Fisheries Committee meetings. The priority areas of interest to BC overlap with the first three questions posed by the DFO; defining recreational and aboriginal fisheries, serious harm, and ongoing productivity. Some of our initial interests and concerns are outlined in the enclosed table.

BC has a broad interest in fish, aquatic environments and in all fisheries within the province, both freshwater and marine. We have focused our comments on freshwater recreational fisheries in the enclosed table as we are concerned they are at risk of losing habitat protection under the new *Fisheries Act*. All of the components in the combined fisheries and seafood sector contribute significantly to the socio-economic well-being of BC, and are an important heritage to protect. BC is committed to conserving fisheries and maximizing the socio-economic benefits from fisheries. This is done in close collaboration with the Government of Canada.

Continued consultation and collaboration between our governments is essential to establish the best possible approach to fisheries management. On behalf of all British Columbia resource management agencies, we look forward to engaging in these discussions with you and your staff in the near future.

I appreciate the opportunity to submit comments in response to the 'Application for Authorization under Paragraph 35(2)(b) of the Fisheries Act Regulations' posted on Canada Gazette 1, April 13, 2013, on behalf of the British Columbia Natural Resource Ministries.

In our discussions with Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) staff we were made aware of several supporting documents that were developed relating to *Fisheries Act* changes, including a policy discussion paper and a number of scientific papers that define key concepts such as *serious harm* and *ongoing productivity*. We requested copies of those documents in previous communications and would have benefited from reviewing them in advance of providing comments on the regulation. Although DFO's supporting documents were released on May 6, 2013, comments provided here were developed without an appreciation of the additional material that has since been made available. We intend to provide additional comment on the supporting documents at a later date.

We would like to emphasize that the short timelines outlined by DFO for provincial review of a large volume of material in support of multiple simultaneous proposals for regulatory changes to the Fisheries Act (others include Aquatic Invasive Species and Release of Aquaculture Substances) have challenged our province's ability to confidently understand the proposed changes and respond on behalf of all affected ministries and programs. Given the likely requirement for changes to provincial regulations and related operational repercussions, we are concerned there is not enough time to have thoughtful discussions on the unique circumstances in British Columbia and we will not be prepared for the Fisheries Act regulations to come into force July 1, 2013.

Within the 30-day time frame for DFO's review, we have summarized our comments and questions on the regulation in the enclosed table. We request the opportunity to review any additional guidance documents that DFO develops to assist with the implementation of this regulation and align federal and provincial approaches.

Thank you for the opportunity to review and comment on the Application for Authorization Regulation. We look forward to hearing from you. Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments in response to the discussion paper entitled 'Implementing the New Fisheries Protection Provisions under the *Fisheries Act*' (April 2013) distributed for review May 6, 2013. These comments are submitted by the BC Ministry of Environment on behalf of the British Columbia natural resource ministries.

As you can appreciate, because of the timing of the release of the discussion paper, we were not able to cross-reference the information contained within when commenting on the regulation. We believe BC's provincial response would have benefited from an appreciation of the policy discussion paper.

With another condensed timeline for review, the natural resource ministries have not had time to fully analyse and understand how DFO's policies would work within the context of the proposed *Fisheries Act* regulatory amendments, organizational changes within DFO, or BC's current legislation, regulation and programs for related provincial ministries and programs.

Initial high level review of the policy discussion paper have highlighted concerns regarding the definition of "serious harm" and the ability of the revised *Fisheries Act* to address cumulative effects. There is currently substantial integration between federal and provincial programs for management and authorization of fisheries and impacts to fisheries in BC, and we are unclear how these shared roles will be defined going forward.

In addition, we have not yet had time to complete a full legal review of the potential changes to provincial legislation and regulations. Without clarification on these key issues and further discussion with DFO around more specific concerns and questions identified in the attached table, we are not confident that the province will be able to successfully support the federal government's current timelines for the *Fisheries Act* regulations to come into force July 1, 2013.

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It would be in the interest of both BC and Canada to have provincial review of any additional guidelines or policy documents that DFO has to further assist with the implementation of the regulation and align federal and provincial approaches.

Thank you for the opportunity to review and comment on the Discussion Paper. We look forward to hearing from you.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit comments in response to the draft Fisheries Protection Policy Statement distributed to Provinces and Territories for review on August 27, 2013. These comments are submitted by the BC Ministry of Environment on behalf of BC's natural resource ministries, including the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure.

We understand that the draft Fisheries Protection Policy Statement reflects an updated version of the Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) 'discussion paper' that was released in May, 2013. While the document provides context on the new policy direction DFO is taking, it still does not address many of the key issues and questions that BC previously identified as needing additional clarification. We appreciate that under Canadian Council of Fisheries and Aquaculture Ministers (CCFAM), the renewed inter provincial Inland Fisheries Committee (IFC) and a new ad-hoc ADMs working group has been charged with overseeing the development of guidance regarding many of these issues, however, we had expected the revised policy statement to better reflect our feedback and provide greater clarity on the decision making process.

On review, the policy statement has reinforced BC's concerns regarding DFO's policy interpretation of definitions of "serious harm," "permanent alterations," "Commercial, Recreational, and Aboriginal fishery (CRA)" and "fish that support." At some point, further guidance will be required to understand how provincial Fisheries Management Objectives will be applied, how cumulative effects will be understood and addressed and how the opportunities for offsetting will be evaluated with consideration for ecosystem impacts that may fall outside the scope of "fishery productivity." We also remain uncertain as to where this guidance will come from and whether provincial resources will be required to develop and review this work.

The province would also like to better understand how DFO's Working Near Water website will operate as the primary source of information for proponents, the public and provincial staff, particularly in this time of transition.

While we understand that DFO has adopted a mitigation framework very similar to BC's, there is no indication how to determine whether mitigation opportunities have been exhausted, or if offsetting is even appropriate. The policy statement appears to suggest that offsetting is always a viable option, which is a significant difference from BC's framework. Of particular concern is the example in 8.4 (c) (pg. 14) under "Offsetting" where removing (presumably natural) obstructions to migration is suggested as an off-setting measure. Provincial staff were troubled this was proposed as an example of acceptable offsetting as it does not replace any lost habitat, rather just changes the distribution of species - usually to the detriment of those species that existed above the barrier. This is illustrative of where BC sees a significant consequence of narrowing the scope of fisheries protection to only consider the outcome for the fishery, rather than the full biodiversity of the aquatic ecosystem.

While the CCFAM ad-hoc ADM working group has outlined a workplan to review operational guidance regarding many of BCs outstanding concerns, without a terms of reference for this group we do not understand how and when this work will be implemented. In the absence of operational guidance, the province is being asked to respond to single policy statements with short deadlines. This process for policy review limits our perspective and ability to respond with thoughtful appreciation for the full impact of all DFO's new policies. Although we appreciate the efforts of regional DFO staff engaged in bilateral discussions, our progress on understanding the new operational environment has been similarly restricted and many of the verbal assurances we received have yet to be reflected in written policy.

BC also remains unclear about how to identify gaps in our respective agency roles, which may need to be filled, and what new resources and roles may be required of provincial agencies, local governments, First Nations and others. BC would like an update on DFO's process for engagement on compliance and enforcement and clarity on the role of the province and the federal government. For example, when and how will provincial conservation officers and staff be trained on identifying compliance issues?

We would like to convey that clarification on key issues and questions (summarized in the attached table), and the context of DFO's operational policy statement are required for BC to feel comfortable the federal and provincial approaches are substantially aligned to effectively work together on implementing the changes to the *Fisheries Act*. On that note, BC still awaits DFO's more detailed guidance materials that will support the Fisheries Protection Policy Statement and would appreciate having sufficient time to review and respond before it is officially endorsed by DFO.

In closing we would like to acknowledge the recent federal provincial partnership under DFO's new Recreational Fisheries Conservation Partnerships Program. This collaboration will benefit shared recreational fisheries, the economy and strengthen our stewardship community. We strongly support expanding this partnership with DFO, and

As a co-regulator of fish and fish habitat protection BC would appreciate the option to
		participate in these discussions to hear firsthand stakeholder's views. It would also assist the provincial understanding of the roles and responsibilities DFO foresees in relation to the conservation of fish and fish habitat.

To date we have not seen adequate explanation of how scale, duration, or "diminish the ability" will be interpreted in regards to the permanence of an alteration.

Short-term alterations to habitats can have substantive implications even though there is no "death," permanent degradation of ability to carry out any life process, and no destruction of fish habitat. Some concerning examples include:

- The survival of a small stocks and populations, races, or fish otherwise limited in their resilience to low
  impacts due to size or distributions, or both. These may not be considerations in a fishery context but
  represent a concern in regards to genetic representation and overall conservation of biodiversity.
- Whole cohorts ("brood year," "age class" or "year class") of species such as salmonids may be eliminated
  due to an inability to complete a part of their life cycle. Because two or more age classes of salmon
  species may be present in a habitat/ecosystem at one time, this could mean the elimination of several
  year's worth of population cycles, and several consecutive brood years of a population.
- Special or unique salmon populations where a potential development (e.g. IPP) could permanently alter selective passage conditions for summer Coho salmon and summer steelhead. The loss of a physical feature (falls or chute) that naturally separates two races of salmon; winter versus summer runs does not permanently affect the fishery.
- Many of non-permanent types of alterations, dredging, channel maintenance, etc. still require mitigation
  to be considered "low risk." Communications on this issue has suggested that proponents engaged in
  these activities no longer have to apply for an authorization. However, they may still have to engage in
  mitigation. The messaging around these scenarios needs to be clarified.

How will impacts in the above examples be evaluated in the context of the new provision? How will cumulative impacts be assessed if alterations are not considered permanent?

We understand the desire to reduce effort spent dealing with low risk activities (e.g. drainage maintenance in agricultural areas), but we are concerned that fish protection goals will be compromised by excluding all temporary alterations or disruptions from consideration.

## Jason and Brad:

We are very pleased you and your colleagues from Ottawa are coming to Victoria to update us on the development of the Fisheries Act regulations. On behalf of the natural resource team here in Victoria, we want to ensure we are all on the same page for our March 20 meeting.

We understand the agenda is meant to cover policy work, reg. work and fisheries program restructuring. Although we are interested in a general update on federal progress, our desire is to use this time for some of the more specific areas of interest to British Columbia. Here are some of the policy and regulatory areas we would like to discuss:

- 1. How would commercial, recreational and aboriginal fisheries be defined in the regulation?
- For BC, we currently manage our recreational fisheries using a low intensity model that considers ecosystems as well as species; we want to know how this will be recognized in the new regulations and policies.
- We would like to understand how you will be defining ongoing productivity and how this will be implemented and measured.
- 4. How will you be defining and dealing with serious harm in the future, and what is your thinking in regard to policy and regulatory development in relation to this?
- 5. For low risk activities, what will the changes mean and how will we coordinate in the field?

We are not expecting draft language or wording, but would like to hear more about the intentions of where you are heading in these areas. We also understand there is going to be a policy session led by Nick Winfield prior to our meeting in Victoria, so we are hoping to hear some of the thinking coming from those discussions. As a result of this sharing of information, we will then be able to narrow our focus and input so it is of the most use to you.

We are finalizing a detailed table outlining BC's interests and advice, we hope to share it with all of you in advance of your internal policy discussions and to make our Victoria meeting as productive as possible.

In looking ahead over the next six months the provincial natural resource agencies would also like to discuss and understand:

- The respective roles of the federal government and province in coordinating project reviews;
- How the province and federal government can ensure a smooth transition through communication and training on the Fisheries Act changes for provincial operational staff; and

Hi Andy and Vicki. DFO has received a question from an environmental consultant about what species require provision for fish passage. The consultant has provided his understanding of the provincial view and has asked if that is consistent with the new Fisheries Act. I have provided a summary view on this below. I would like to discuss this with the appropriate people from BC to see if we can come up with a suitable way to address the issue. There was no specific timeline described when the question was posed to DFO, but this appears to be something that requires a discussion as soon as we can. Have a look at this and let me know what you think. Jason

- Fish that are part of commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries are interpreted in the DFO Fisheries Protection Policy Statement to be those fish that fall within the scope of applicable federal or provincial fisheries regulations as well as those that can be fished by Aboriginal organizations or their members for food, social or ceremonial purposes or for purposes set out in a land claims agreement.
- The idea presented as the view of BC in the Peace is understood by DFO as it comes from guidance developed previously under the BC Forest Practices Code, however, this guidance is inconsistent with the DFO Policy Statement based on the current interpretation of the application of the fisheries regulations in
- In addition, the view that is presented does not address consideration for aboriginal fisheries and does not consider potential effects to fish that support CRA fisheries.
- DFO and BC are currently having discussions on whether the fishery regulations in BC appropriately scope the fisheries that BC wants to manage. These discussions may result in additional interpretive guidance, but this is expected to take some time to develop.
- In conclusion, from a DFO perspective, the appropriate interpretation of a CRA fishery is the one that is described in the Fisheries Protection Policy Statement. This view attributed to BC in the Peace is not consistent with DFO's Policy Statement, and is not appropriate for determining whether the Fisheries Act S 35 prohibition applies.

As far as fish passage is concerned for stream crossings, is DFO only concerned with recreational/commercial/aboriginal fish species? We are hearing from the province (the Peace in particular), that they only consider a fish to be that as defined as follows:

"It has been our practice to use the definition of fish stream as cited under the Forest and Range Practices Act (Forest Planning and Practices Regulation) which states:

"fish stream" means a watercourse that

(a) is frequented by any of the following species of fish:

- (i) anadromous salmonids;
- (ii) rainbow trout, cutthroat trout, brown trout, bull trout, Dolly Varden char, lake trout, brook trout, kokanee, largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, mountain whitefish, lake whitefish, arctic grayling, burbot, white sturgeon, black crappie, yellow perch, walleye or northern pike;
- (iii) a species identified as a species at risk;
- (iv) a species identified as regionally important wildlife. "

So in summary, can you confirm that non recreational/commercial/aboriginal fish species will not be covered under the Fisheries Act and that any direction concerning these species should come from the province?

#### November 6, 2013 BC -DFO briefing: Implementation of Federal Fisheries Act changes

#### Meeting Summary

#### Attendance:

#### 1. Provincial overview of DFO ADM level call announcing coming into force of FA changes:

- MOE, FLNRO, and AGR participated and summarized the fed-prov call.
- The final Fisherles Protection Policy (FPP) Statement and Operational guidance were released publically last week. Considered "evergreen."
- OIC will bring the second stage of FA legislative amendments and the regulation on timelines in CG2 into force on November 25, 2013.
- Additional guidance for proponents (interim for existing and new authorizations) now on website.
- Two new documents will be coming soon: 1) offsetting policy and 2)proponents selfassessment guide.
- · Face to face meeting will occur in Ottawa at end of November
- · Now satting up calls with First Nations, industry and conservation groups.

#### 2. DFO Overview and orientation on new materials

- FPP statement comes into effect on Nov 25<sup>th</sup>, and follows the framework of the
  original discussion document. Replaces national habitat / No Net Loss policy and is
  oriented to the changes and key concepts in the FA. Provides policy intentions for
  implementation of serious harm, scope of application (CRA fisheries—which for BC, is all
  lish), permanent alterations, death of a fish, destruction of fish habitat, and origing
  productivity. Appears only small clarifications have been made since earlier draft. DFO
  to clarify what has changed.
- Operational Approach a high level piece to describe DFO's new perspective. Focuses
  on a risk based approach to managing threats to CRA fisheries, and projects that result
  in serious harm. Puts the onus on proponents to avoid and mitigate impacts, and
  recognizes existing approaches, guidance, expertise, and tools that work already.
  Intention us to bring these online as per discussions with provinces. Low risk works will
  be managed through self assessment, although there will be some site specific guidance
  available from DFO.
- Guidance for existing authorizations recognition that there may be existing
  authorizations with conditions no longer required under the new FA regime. Proponents
  have 90 days to request a DFO review of their authorizations. Following the review, DFO
  will determine whether to amend, rescind, or leave the authorization conditions as it.
  DFO doesn't have feedback on this approach yet.

#### November 6, 2013 BC -DFO briefing: Implementation of Federal Fisheries Act changes

- Guidance for new authorizations relates to the CG2 regulation that was released today. There are two versions for two types of authorizations: standard, and emergency. Information requirements and timulines in regulation are only triggered once a proponent has applied for an authorization. However, one can still have a preauthorization discussion. Incentive is to avoid impacts, and the approach is designed to work with proponent.
- Overview of the changes to the Fisheries Act useful document that details all the changes in one place.

#### Questions:

- Authorization in an emergency seems like a lat of wark given demand for resources?
- DFO response; not intended to slow emergency response down. Designed to issue an authorization quickly, where feasible.
- Are the operational statements (self assessment guides) that are on the web accurate?
- DFO: It is expected that this material will be replaced with other documents. It may be part of the self assessment criteria, there may be a national approach to standardizing guidance as far as it goes. Likely what is there now will be repackaged.
- What will the website look like as of Nov 25<sup>th</sup>?
- DFO: It will be a national site, regional pages will be taken down. The site will have self
  assessment tools to guide works and the process for authorization will be clear. If there
  are regional pieces that should stay, please advise.
- Between now and Nov 25, what advice do we give proponents?
- DFO: In the context of EA's the website should satisfy those needs.
- Lists of marginal waterbodies, minor works, is there on appartunity to review?
- DFO: No, in the beginning the lists are fairly small, ie, man-made water bodies not connected to a natural waterway. These may evolve over time.

#### 3. Further detail on key concepts

- Commercial Recreational Aboriginal fisheries definition nationally means a fish that
  requires a license to fish, or is identified as a treaty right. Broader in BC i.e. does not
  currently exclude any fish. May discuss narrowing that down the fine, as there are tools
  to do this by regulation. Currently includes non-native and aquatic Invasive (AIS)
  species. Nothing as extreme as snakehead, but recreational species would be
  considered.
- . Question on how Al5 regulation is connected to this. DFO to look into it.
- Fish that support definition may seem redundant but can be invoked later to identify exceptions.
- Serious Harm this is being looked at through the lens of "what it means to a fish" Necessary to take this approach to get at productivity of fishery. Concept of localized effect (not entire population but not one fish) is to give an indication of how this is applied.

4. Next Steps

Comment (DI. Individual phase are particular as under the section of equivalence as under their prerepars to purposent section.

#### November 6, 2013 BC -DFO briefing: Implementation of Federal Fisheries Act changes

- Coordination on Fisheries Act Authorizations how does BC want to be involved in FA authorizations? Would authorizations involving marine, freshwater resident fisheries, or salmon be of interest? There have been agreements in the past but centralized model requires some new consideration moving forward.
- BC Response: We approach things from an ecosystem perspective so aligning interests based on species doesn't make sense. Need to consider appartunities for efficiencies moving forward.
- Fisheries Management Objectives (FMO) these have been implicitly considered in the
  past. New legislation requires that DFO justify authorizations in light of FMO's, BC may
  want to consider how they want to be involved and identify their objectives.
- Coordination and priorities for short long term engagement: DFO is revisiting this
  given the new statutes and authorities. What are the provincial issues?
- BC: Project reviews need to look at the entire fish community. Provincial responsibilities
  are concerned with the ecosystem perspective. When can we begin to engage more
  effectively on the process of developing guidance relevant to BC?
- DFO: in the absence of national guidance, we can work on it bi-laterally. The material that comes nationally will provide high level guidance.

#### Short Term :

- Operational level coordination required. Need to discuss with section heads, water licenses, etc. May be more relevant once proponent self assessment is available.
- Strategic policy level priority setting provincial agenda and interests e.g. Riparian Area Regulation (RAR)?
- DFO communications being lead nationally and regionally with industry and conservation groups. Opportunities for provincial involvement? DFO will look into it.

#### Action Items:

- 1. DFO to clarify what has changed in latest version of the FPP statement (and regulation).
- 2. DFO to look into how AIS regulation is connected to the inclusive definition of CRA in BC
- 3. BC to identify if there are regional pieces of guidance on DFO website that should stay.
- 4. BC to consider how they want to provincial FMOs and other guidance to be identified.
- 5. BC to consider provincial priorities and interests for engagement moving forward with DFO.
- 6. BC-DFO to coordinate an operational level discussion in the short term (before Nov 25).
- DFO will look into opportunities for provincial involvement in communication sessions on changes being coordinated with industry and conservation groups.

#### Meeting Summary

#### 1. Clarify how the DFO triage process works

DFO provided an overview ppt on the Fisheries Protection Program Implementation. Areas discussed included changes to legislation and policy, Program overview and organizational structure, the Regulatory Review or "triage process", a review of the DFO partnerships and guidelines standards unit, and an update on roles and responsibilities

NRS FA working group remains the central point of contact for DFO in reviewing materials and correspondence, as well as for cross-cutting issues needing higher level interagency consideration for the record those items have been flagged as [ALL]. Provincial agencies are otherwise responsible for setting up their own bilateral meetings with DFO on the action items identified to date and will report back any updates, changes or decisions to the working group. Provincial agency/ program contacts have been indicated for reference on follow up items coming out of the case study conversations.

## 1. Clarify DFO triage process.

# Presentation

- Questions on DFO . What will the future policy guidance document look like and how will it be linked to the act and used?
  - A) Aprox. 12 pg document that will inform guidance on implementing the act with more detail than the draft Policy Discussion Document (May 2013). Similar to the 1986 document, but may be broader than just prohibitions focussing on management.
  - What is the process for integrating comments on policy documents and regulations?
  - A) Process being lead out of Ottawa, regional influence is limited.
  - Will the organizational structure mean a reduced field presence? What is the staff complement in the Vancouver / Nanalmo Offices?
  - A) Not necessarily, priority files will still get attendance, however it will require more travel. There are aprox, 20 staff at each office.
  - What is DFO's role in upfront planning prior to referrals? How do the referral unit and partnership unit work together?
  - A) Partnership guidelines and standards will coordinate planning work to the degree that DFO has the mandate to engage. While this unit is removed from referrals to the degree it can be, there will be significant coordination between the two units. Fisheries Management Objectives (FMO) will require engagement with prov
  - What is the level of information required for an authorization?
  - A) There are 2 levels. First level basic information: an enquiry regarding the need for an authorization, Second level - more detailed information: Apply for the authorization.
  - How are timelines for authorization applied?
  - A) Information requirements need to be fulfilled before clock starts.
  - . How do you know if a proponent who has not requested an authorization is engaging in work?
  - A) Proponent notification is requested but not required as per Fisheries
  - · How will compliance and enforcement of non-authorized work be engaged? Won't this new process leave room for proponents to take advantage or misinterpret the requirements for an authorization?
  - A) Investigations will depend on complaints and recommendations taken through the reporting hotline/ website. C&E is a different unit in the Fisheries and Aquaculture branch. This is not a change in policy as FA authorizations have always been subject to self assassment. Public complaints have been the main source of investigation. Less regional presence means that the public have to learn a new mechanism for registering concerns.

- What is the link to the provincial guidance and policy for works in and about a stream?
- A) Need to include this as a link on the DFO website.
- How does high/low risk defined?
- A) Not specifically defined in policy. Still using current risk management framework. Additional screening tools may be developed.
- . What is the role for DFO managing fish SAR?
- A) Includes all fish, including mussels. Will include consideration in all authorizations. Still working out coordination of roles for SARA. Will consult with internal experts. Recognize that freshwater species are a joint management process.
- Given DFO is no longer participating in BC-only EAD, will that just be future or current projects?
- A) Both. May still attend select working group meetings as part of aboriginal engagement and information source. EA unit within DFO is gone. Capacity is limited through the FPP unit.
- Do the triage and C&E hotlines also apply to provincial communications? If not who are our key contacts?
- A) Previous contacts may no longer be useful due organization restructure. Recognize need for a process to work with the province moving forward, but largely depends on the context/ situation.



Dear Minister Shea:

On June 27, 2012, the federal government announced its intention to engage and consult with public and stakeholders over the summer and fall to develop the policy and regulatory framework to support changes to the *Fisheries Act* (the Act). On behalf of the British Columbia (BC) Government's Natural Resource Sector, we would like to express our desire to be formally involved in this process as soon as possible.

British Columbia recognizes that several changes under the Act will address issues that our province has been seeking to resolve for some time. We are pleased to see these changes and are looking forward to assisting with their implementation. These changes include:

- Economic benefits for BC's commercial fishing sectors. We support the development of mechanisms to allocate fish to fund science and management activities, but would like to understand how any broadening of the use of fish allocation will be managed to avoid harm to licensed fishing enterprises.
- Greater management of aquatic invasive species and introductions and transfers. BC is currently
  revising the Controlled Alien Species Regulation (under the BC Wildlife Act) to prohibit the possession,
  breeding and trafficking of high-risk aquatic invasive species. We hope to coordinate our efforts with
  yours and ensure federal and provincial legislation is complementary and well aligned.
- Greater efficiencies and clarification of each jurisdiction's roles through administrative and equivalency
  agreements and regulatory streamlining. This promises to reduce duplication and overlap in
  federal/provincial authority (such as wastewater effluent).
- Enhanced compliance and enforcement mechanisms that increase fines for offences, establish the ability to charge and set penalties, and clarify and expand powers of inspectors.

There are also areas where we have identified policy concerns and potential issues with the Act amendments. In the immediate term, these include the designation of commercial, recreational and Aboriginal fisheries and how to define the concepts of "ongoing productivity" and "permanent alteration." BC's concerns are outlined in detail in the attachment to this letter.

We appreciate the recent information meeting with Fisheries and Oceans Canada (DFO) ADM Kevin Stringer on September 4, 2012, and his presentation to the Canadian Council of Fisheries and Aquaculture Ministers on September 6, 2012, which provided an overview of changes to the Act. These meetings provided an excellent forum to begin the conversation on future consultation opportunities. However, if formal consultation does not begin shortly, BC is concerned there will not be adequate time to meaningfully contribute to the development of policies and regulations in support of the Act. We are eager to work together, both in areas where we see increased opportunities for BC as well as areas where potential challenges exist, both federally and provincially.

Please have your staff contact the Deputy Minister for the Ministry of Environment, Wes Shoemaker, as the provincial lead for this engagement. The Ministry of Environment will coordinate the Natural Resource Sector approach and liaise with key contacts within the Province.

Thank you for your attention to these critical issues and we look forward to working together on this important matter.






# Changes to Legislation


- A new section 35(1) prohibition focuses regulatory activities on threats to fisheries:
  - "No person shall carry on any work, undertaking or activity that results in <u>serious harm to fish that are part of a commercial</u>, <u>recreational or Aboriginal fishery</u>, or to fish that support such a fishery.
- Serious harm to fish is defined as "... the death of fish or any permanent alteration to, or destruction of, fish habitat."
- "Purpose" (S 6.1) and "Factors" provide direction for decisionmaking (S 6)






# Changes to Legislation


- Other important changes include:
  - Focus on Commercial, Recreational and Aboriginal fisheries (and fish that support)
  - Duty to notify of unauthorized harm to fish habitat (section 38(4)).
  - Conditions of authorization are now individually enforceable (section 40(3)(a)).
- Some changes in force now, others come into force later
- Information and Timelines Regulation in process






# FPP Key messages

- Legislative changes "serious harm to fish that are part of or contribute to CRA fishery".
- from area-based delivery ( HMP local habitat biologists) to centralized management of referrals and industry section Fisheries Protection Units.
- The FPP has reduced footprint (5 offices) and resources (compared to previous HMP)
- Implementation of a consistent and structured regulatory review process (triage):
  - Reliance on best placed delivery/partnerships (lower risk projects)
  - Refocus of effort on higher risk projects requiring a FA authorization.




- DFO is not responsible for conduct of federal EAs
- CEA Agency, NEB, and CNSC are responsible authorities under CEAA 2012
- DFO is no longer a decision-maker but provides expert advice on fish, fish habitat and aquatic SAR to the responsible authority
- DFO provides expert advice to BC EAO for substituted or equivalent EAs managed by BC (same as for standard federal EA)

### DFO role in BC EA

- At this time DFO is not participating in BC-only EA

Hi Andy and Vicki. DFO has received a question from an environmental consultant about what species require provision for fish passage. The consultant has provided his understanding of the provincial view and has asked if that is consistent with the new Fisheries Act. I have provided a summary view on this below. I would like to discuss this with the appropriate people from BC to see if we can come up with a suitable way to address the issue. There was no specific timeline described when the question was posed to DFO, but this appears to be something that requires a discussion as soon as we can. Have a look at this and let me know what you think. Jason

- Fish that are part of commercial, recreational or Aboriginal fisheries are interpreted in the DFO Fisheries
   Protection Policy Statement to be those fish that fall within the scope of applicable federal or provincial
   fisheries regulations as well as those that can be fished by Aboriginal organizations or their members for food,
   social or ceremonial purposes or for purposes set out in a land claims agreement.
- The idea presented as the view of BC in the Peace is understood by DFO as it comes from guidance developed previously under the BC Forest Practices Code, however, this guidance is inconsistent with the DFO Policy Statement based on the current interpretation of the application of the fisheries regulations in BC.
- In addition, the view that is presented does not address consideration for aboriginal fisheries and does not
  consider potential effects to fish that support CRA fisheries.
- DFO and BC are currently having discussions on whether the fishery regulations in BC appropriately scope the
  fisheries that BC wants to manage. These discussions may result in additional interpretive guidance, but this is
  expected to take some time to develop.
- In conclusion, from a DFO perspective, the appropriate interpretation of a CRA fishery is the one that is
  described in the Fisheries Protection Policy Statement. This view attributed to BC in the Peace is not consistent
  with DFO's Policy Statement, and is not appropriate for determining whether the Fisheries Act S 35 prohibition
  applies.

Hi Jason, I listened in on your teleconference last week when you were summarizing the recent changes to the DFO Fisheries Act and policies for the IPP group. I was hoping that you might be able to clarify a quick question for me on that topic?

As far as fish passage is concerned for stream crossings, is DFO only concerned with recreational/commercial/aboriginal fish species? We are hearing from the province (the Peace in particular), that they only consider a fish to be that as defined as follows:

"It has been our practice to use the definition of fish stream as cited under the Forest and Range Practices Act (Forest Planning and Practices Regulation) which states:

- (a) is frequented by any of the following species of fish:
  - (i) anadromous salmonids;
  - (ii) rainbow trout, cutthroat trout, brown trout, bull trout, Dolly Varden char, lake trout, brook trout, kokanee, largemouth bass, smallmouth bass, mountain whitefish, lake whitefish, arctic grayling, burbot, white sturgeon, black crappie, yellow perch, walleye or northern pike;
  - (iii) a species identified as a species at risk;
- (iv) a species identified as regionally important wildlife. "

So in summary, can you confirm that non recreational/commercial/aboriginal fish species will not be covered under the Fisheries Act and that any direction concerning these species should come from the province?

#### Ministry of Agriculture

Many of the scenarios on agricultural lands are likely to be works of a relatively small scale compared to larger industrial projects such as pipelines, hydro-electric installations and mines. Questions arise how particular small projects will be dealt with under the new DFO structure and interpretation of the revised role of DFO in fish protection and the interpretation of serious harm. Some of the small works on agricultural lands are presented below:

- 1. How will referrals regarding aquatic SAR on agricultural lands be dealt with in particular regarding questions of: designation of critical habitat; evaluation of BMPS that support critical habitat, designation of farm practices and their compatibility to recovery strategies and action plans objectives and what will be the process of enforcement of SAR recovery objectives if compliance is in question? For example, how will critical habitat provisions be implemented under species at risk recovery plans with respect to Nooksack Dace and Salish Sucker these have substantial implications to the agriculture community.
- How will drainage maintenance approvals be obtained? Currently there is a drainage management guide that was approved by DFO and it likely has to be updated. This is of particular importance for both individual farms and local governments that wish to do drainage maintenance

- 3. What will be the referral process for farmers doing works in drainage channels on their farms such as riparian protection works, installation of culverts, bridges etc. Will these continue to be carried out through a Section 9 of the Water Act referral process or will there be changes to this process?
- 4. How will referrals and authorisations for either riparian vegetation management or larger activities like land clearing on ALR/agricultural lands be dealt with under the new mandate?

Stephen Lewis is a Distinguished Visiting Professor at Ryerson University in Toronto. He is the board chair of the Stephen Lewis Foundation, which is dedicated to turning the tide of HIV/AIDS in Africa, and he is co-founder and co-director of AIDS-Free World, an international advocacy organization.

Mr. Lewis is a Senior Fellow of the Enough Project. He is an immediate past member of the Board of Directors of the Clinton Health Access Initiative, and Emeritus Board Member of the International AIDS Vaccine Initiative. He served as a Commissioner on the Global Commission on HIV and the Law; the Commission's landmark report was released in July 2012.

Stephen Lewis' work with the United Nations spanned more than two decades. He was the UN Secretary-General's Special Envoy for HIV/AIDS in Africa from June 2001 until the end of 2006. From 1995 to 1999, Mr. Lewis was Deputy Executive Director of UNICEF at the organization's global headquarters in New York

From 1984 through 1988, he was Canada's Ambassador to the United Nations.

# Strong Fiscal Futures

A Blueprint for Strengthening BC Local Governments' Finance System

This plenary, scheduled for Tuesday, September 17, features a presentation of the July 2013 report from the UBCM Select Committee on Local Government Finance. Policy Paper #1, which seeks endorsement of the report, will be debated on Sept. 18. Consequently, this session is designed to inform that debate and to allow members to ask questions of the Committee prior to considering the Policy Paper.

Finance system reform has been an important priority for the UBCM Executive, and the report proposes a number of key directions aimed at improving the way services and infrastructure are financed through smarter expenditures and fairer, more economically responsive revenue tools. If endorsed by the membership, these key directions can establish a policy framework for the reform over the next decade or more.

A Green Policy Book will be sent to all members next week - come prepared for an engaging dialogue on finance with members of the Committee.

From 1970-1978, Mr. Lewis was leader of the Ontario New Democratic Party, during which time he became leader of the Official Opposition.

Mr. Lewis is the author of the bestselling book, Race Against Time. He holds 35 honorary degrees from Canadian universities, as well as honorary degrees from Dartmouth College and Johns Hopkins University in the United States.

In 2003, Stephen Lewis was appointed a Companion of the Order of Canada, Canada's highest honour for lifetime achievement.
