

#### Tanker Ban Vote – Implications for Northern Gateway

<u>Yesterday</u>, an Opposition motion in the House of Commons calling for a ban on tanker traffic at three of B.C.'s West Coast ports was passed by a slim margin by Opposition Members of Parliament.

Although disappointing to us, the Opposition motion is not binding on the government and it will not impact the rigorous regulatory process currently underway to consider Enbridge's Northern Gateway Project. While we recognize that opponents will most certainly use yesterday's outcome to add legitimacy to their objections about the project, it hasn't changed Enbridge's commitment to Northern Gateway.

We certainly understand that some Northern Gateway stakeholders are concerned about marine safety, the risk of a leak into waterways and the protection of the environment. Those are very legitimate concerns and ones that need to be addressed. As we've outlined in detail in our application to the Joint Review Panel, we will take every precaution to protect the environment along the right-of-way, at the Kitimat Terminal, and along our nation's west coast. We are putting in place a model of worldclass safety protocols and environmental protection.

Northern Gateway is under regulatory review with the National Energy Board and the Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency through a Joint Review Panel (JRP). A public hearing will take place for the proposed project to address two fundamental questions: In terms of the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, will the project cause significant adverse effects on the environment? In terms of the National Energy


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Board Act, is the project in the public interest?

Despite some vocal opposition, Northern Gateway enjoys strong support. Yesterday, the <u>Northern Gateway Alliance</u>, a community coalition established to support the regulatory review of the Northern Gateway project, spoke out on the project's behalf through <u>full-page ads</u> placed in the National Post, Globe and Mail and the Ottawa Citizen. The ads outlined the facts as to how the project will deliver economic and social benefits to Albertans, British Columbians and Canadians. John Ivison, a columnist with the National Post published a <u>front-page opinion piece</u> articulating the strategic benefits of the project to Canada as a trading nation, and the long term benefits of opening our energy markets to Asia. Tomorrow, Colin Kinsley, Chair of the Gateway Alliance, is scheduled to appear before the Senate Standing Committee on Energy, the Environment and Natural Resources to discuss Northern Gateway in the context of the current state and future of Canada's energy sector.



# Interested parties sign up to have a say at Northern Gateway pipeline hearings

With less than a week to go before the deadline, the province of British Columbia signed up as an intervener in next January's public

hearings on Enbridge's proposed \$5.5-billion Northern Gateway oil pipeline.

By registering last Friday, the province joined more than 100 interveners and government participants who have already signed up to get involved in the hearings. As interveners or government participants, groups or individuals have the right to make information requests of the federal review panel and question Northern Gateway officials or other interveners during the hearings.

The deadline for sign up as an intervener or government participant is Thursday.

Archie Riddell, a project director with the B.C. Environmental Assessment Office, said the province has not yet identified "strategic issues of importance" to the province, but will be doing so during the next couple of months.

"That's why you'll see that in the filing we did keep it pretty open," said Riddell.

In its intervener registration, B.C. lists its topics of interest as all of the issues set out in the hearing order from the National Energy Board.

Those issues include the need for the project, and its impact on the environment, First Nations and socio-economic matters such as employment. Also on the list is the pipeline route and safety and accident prevention.

B.C. Premier Christy Clark, unlike Alberta premier Ed Stelmach, has been unwilling to tip her hand on the mega project. Clark has said the project should be judged after the review process is complete.

The controversial 1,170-kilometre pipeline, which will transport crude from the Alberta oil sands to B.C.'s northwest coast at Kitimat for delivery overseas to Asia, has attracted increasing criticism from First Nations, environmental groups and some northern B.C. communities over the risks and impact of an oil spill.

On the list of interveners and government participants are First Nations such as the Lake Babine Nation in north-central B.C., oil behemoth Imperial Oil, rival pipeline company Kinder Morgan, the town of Fort St. James, and environmental groups such as the Living Oceans Society.

#### A message from John Carruthers - President, Enbridge Northern Gateway

For over two years now, you've met with us to learn about the Northern Gateway Project; to hear about the world class safety measures planned; and to understand what the economic benefits would be when a \$5.5 billion investment is made in the North.

Our communications materials highlight pipeline integrity, marine safety and incident response measures. But on July 26<sup>th</sup>, those assurances were challenged when 19,500 barrels of oil were spilled near our pump station in Marshall, Michigan. That leak is among the most serious incidents in Enbridge's long history. We sincerely regret that we disrupted people's lives and created a mess on properties, public places and local waterways.

We are working hard on the cleanup, and have made very good progress at the Michigan oil spill site and also along the affected creek and river. Week to week, the state of the river continues to significantly improve, and community members appreciate that worker and heavy equipment activity is now decreasing in many areas. Our work plans related to the cleanup have been approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Enbridge will continue working to meet our commitment to restore the area to its previous condition.

One of our main priorities is to reach out directly to anyone who may have been affected by the spill. We have accepted responsibility for all costs related to emergency response or payment of claims that are a direct result of this incident. A toll free call in number was established and two Enbridge Community Centers have been operating seven days a week in the communities of Marshall and Battle Creek, Michigan, so the public can find out more information, ask questions and/or submit claims. More information about the incident and Enbridge's response can be found at response.enbridgeus.com.

We take our responsibility to prevent leaks very seriously. As the operator of North America's largest crude oil pipeline system, Enbridge prides itself on safely and reliably delivering energy to people across the continent. Pipelines have been proven to be one of the safest forms of transportation.

That being said, we understand that you may have questions and concerns arising from the Michigan oil spill. The cause of the spill is under investigation by the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) and the U.S. Department of Transportation's Office of Pipeline Safety. Any information from the investigation that will help make our pipelines safer will be taken into account.

We share people's regard for the environment and the protection of B.C.'s pristine North Coast. Enbridge would not have proposed the Northern Gateway Project if we didn't believe it would safely transport petroleum products. We hope that the public information coming out of the comprehensive regulatory review now underway will enable people to have their concerns addressed and questions answered. Of course, the Northern Gateway Project team and I are also happy to answer any questions you may have.

We are concerned about the recent oil spill, but I feel proud to be part of a company that has taken such quick and effective action in responding to the incident. We will continue communicating with all Northern Gateway stakeholders and remain committed to delivering a project that truly represents a model of world-class safety on both land and water.



**II ISSUE:** John Carruthers, President and CEO of Enbridge's Northern Gateway Project requested a meeting to discuss the proposed pipeline project from Bruderheim, near Edmonton, Alberta to Kitimat, BC.

#### **III KEY POINTS:**

- Enbridge is approaching the point where it will apply for regulatory approval for its Northern Gateway pipeline project.
- The multibillion dollar project would provide a much needed boost to the northern region's economies. It may also expose other potential resource developments.
- There will be substantial debate related to the risk to the marine environment from increased tanker traffic; as well as land-based environmental concerns.

#### **IV BACKGROUND:**

•

Enbridge and the Northern Gateway Project: (Information drawn from Enbridge's project web site)

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Enbridge operates the world's longest and most advanced petroleum and liquids pipeline system. Its pipeline systems in North America have operated for over 60 years and now comprise approximately 13,500 kilometres of pipeline, delivering more than two million barrels of petroleum a day and supplying natural gas to more than 1.8 million customers.

The Enbridge Northern Gateway Project involves a new twin pipeline system running 1,170 km from Edmonton, Alberta to a new marine terminal in Kitimat, British Columbia to export petroleum and import condensate. The west line will carry an average of 525,000 barrels of petroleum per day; the east line will carry an average of 193,000 barrels of condensate per day (condensate is used to thin petroleum products for pipeline transport). The new terminal will include two ship berths, and include storage tanks for petroleum and condensate.

The Northern Gateway pipeline proposal will undergo assessment by a Joint Review Panel (JRP) led by the National Energy Board (NEB) and the Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency (CEAA). NEB approval is required before interprovincial pipelines can be built. Public consultation processes appear to be underway. A three member JRP was announced in January 2010, with funding to nine (intervener) agencies to participate in the review process announced in March, 2010. No date has been set for the filing of the regulatory application by Enbridge.

Construction is forecast to begin mid-2012 and to last at least three years. Direct employment is forecast at 4,000 jobs.

High Level Considerations:

The Northern Gateway Project is one of the largest projects currently proposed in North America, with equally large impacts. There are:

  - Energy market diversification away from the north central US, toward the Pacific Rim (including possibly California). Canada is the largest hydrocarbon supplier to the US.
  - Potential linkages to additional Asian investments in the Oil Sands, with implications for refinery capacity utilization in Asia versus Canada.
  - New, high-paying job construction and operating opportunities in the particularly hard-hit North Central and North West regions of the Province.

#### V DISCUSSION:

The proposed meeting is likely part of the ramp-up of activities related to Enbridge filing for regulatory and environmental approvals for the Northern Gateway Project. Given major international interest towards investment in and development of the oil sands, including Asian interest from China, Korea, and India (including sovereign funds), the pipeline will create a huge profile for Western Canada.


