## Questions and Answers- Bulletin # 1 April 29, 2014

## 1. How many positions will be impacted?

- All positions at Victoria -54 regular and 10 auxiliary employees (53 FTEs) and 7 employees at Burnaby are anticipated to be impacted.
- The outcome of the pre-layoff canvas may impact the reductions at Burnaby.

## 2. How does the pre-layoff canvas work?

• Please refer to the detailed pre-layoff canvas memorandum and the supporting questions and answers bulletin for further information.

# 3. Given there is no change to the operating capacity at Burnaby, why are there staff impacted at that centre?

• In 2007 when Burnaby Youth Custody Services relocated to the current Fraser Park site, the operating capacity at Burnaby was reduced from 96 to 84 with no corresponding adjustments to the staffing model. This overage was temporarily intended to allow for the transition period, in anticipation of higher attrition rates than have occurred to date, and was sustained by the mass and subsequent arrival of migrant families since 2010. Adjustments have been made to the base staffing model to account for these historical overages and the continued reduced daily count. Burnaby remains resourced for an operating capacity of 84.

## 4. Why was closing Victoria the option chosen?

- The level of resources required to maintain core functions which ensure safety, security and provide for the needs of youth could not be achieved by general reductions at all centres.
- The proximity of Victoria to the Burnaby centre provides for accessible transportation and greater support for youth visitation and reintegration and release planning.
- On average 50-60% of the youth in custody at Victoria on any given day are from other areas of Vancouver Island or the province and can be directly transported to Burnaby.
- The majority of youth admitted to custody in the province are generally from the Lower Mainland catchment area.

### 5. Were other alternatives for the Victoria site explored?

 Yes, however, there have been no identified occupants for the use of the facility to date. Government continues to review viable options for this site and will continue to do so after the closure.
