Aboriginal learners building job skills for the future

VANCOUVER – A community-based approach to education and training will enable Aboriginal learners in the Lower Mainland to access training that will help prepare them for further education, and develop skills for careers in the trades.

Province-wide, 27 _{s13} Aboriginal Community-based Delivery Partnership Programs (ACBDPP) totalling nearly \$5.6 million are providing education and training opportunities for Aboriginal learners to develop job-ready skills in a wide variety of fields.

Over the last two years, the program committed \$10 million in Canada – British Columbia Labour Market Agreement funding, \$4 million in Ministry of Advanced Education funding and \$3 million s13 Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada s13 over 50 projects in 39 Aboriginal communities s13 s13 was first announced in June 2012 and delivers on the commitments of the *Aboriginal Post-Secondary Education and Training Policy Framework and Action Plan: 2020 Vision for the Future* to improve partnerships between public post-secondary institutions and Aboriginal institutes and communities by 2013. Its goal is to increase the number of Aboriginal learners in rural and remote communities accessing post-secondary education and training programs by 2016.

Under the BC Jobs Plan, government is committed to providing funding for community-based delivery of programs that meet Aboriginal learners' needs.

BACKGROUNDER

Aboriginal Community-Based Delivery Partnerships Program (ACBDPP)

The program committed \$10 million in Canada – British Columbia Labour Market Agreement funding, \$4 million in Ministry of Advanced Education funding and \$3 million through Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada's Active Measures Program. The following projects were funded in fiscal 2013/14:

Partners: BC Institute of Technology (BCIT) & Squamish Nation

Funding: \$101,240

Program summary: The program provides skills training for the Restoration of Tl'alhemá7elkw MacKay Creek Estuary. Restoration activities will be matched with a training program that will provide 15 Squamish Nation members with skills to secure future ecological restoration work and the knowledge to confidently pursue a degree or diploma in a related field.

Partners: University of Northern BC & Nisga'a First Nation

Funding: \$222,627

Program summary: The First Nations Environmental Monitoring Training Program will ensure that local Aboriginal expertise will be utilized in development activities that take place near their traditional territories. The program will train 36 participants as Environmental Monitors and provide a direct work placement for 18 participants.

Partners: Vancouver Island University (VIU) & Coastal First Nations

Funding: \$282,890

Program summary: The Coastal First Nations (CFN) Stewardship Training Program will be delivered to 16 participants in CFN communities inpartnership with First Nations and First Nations-controlled higher learninginstitutes. The program will provide participants with the skills, knowledge and experience for careers in stewardship and in further post-secondary education and training.

Partners: Nicola Valley Institute of Technology & the Hey'way'noqu' Healing Circle for Addictions Society **Funding:** \$484,279

Program summary: The Chemical Addictions Worker Certificate and the Chemical Addiction Worker Diploma Program will be delivered in Bella Coola (Nuxalk). Sixty participants will gain the skills and education necessary to enter positions in the field of chemical addiction counselling. **Partners**:Vancouver Island University & Tla'amin Nation **Funding**: \$154,290

Program summary: The Bridge to Success Program will provide 12 participants with appropriate and relevant training for entry level positions in the pulp and paper industry. The program will run for 18 weeks and program delivery will be shared between the Tla'amin community, the Catalyst Paper mill site in Powell River, and Vancouver Island University.

Partners: College of New Caledonia & Nak'azdli Band

Funding: \$261,430

Program summary: The Community Trades Access Training Program will develop and enhance the employability and occupational skills of participants. The program will provide appropriate and relevant training to 24 Nak'azdli members to access entry level positions in the construction and mining sectors as well as other industries.

Partners: Justice Institute of BC & Tahltan Central Council

Funding: \$129,595

Program summary: The Feathers of Hope: Aboriginal Women and Girls Leadership Career Preparatory Project delivers leadership training toFirst Nations women in the northern and remote location of Dease Lake. The project will provide 17 women with the skills to obtain coordinator, management and supervisory positions.

Partners: University of the Fraser Valley & Sto:lo Nation

Funding: \$602,816

Program summary: The Xe'lts't: Turning the Page Program provides academic preparation, personal development and work readiness skills in addition to training for two cohorts of 12 participants in Residential Building Maintenance Worker and the Stó:lō Studies Certificate programs.

Partners: Capilano University & Vancouver Community College

Funding: \$71,931

Program summary: The Aboriginal Youth Ambassador Program is an experiential education and training program. Through the themes: discover, build, and share your story, 12 youth ambassador participants (aged 18 to 30 years old) will receive a combination of industry recognized training, exposure to the post-secondary education environment, and relevant work experience opportunities at the Squamish Lil'wat Cultural Centre located in Whistler.

Partners: Northern Lights College & Blueberry River First Nations **Funding:** \$146,016

Program summary: The Career and College Preparation Program - Aboriginal Career Training in Various Employment (ACTIVE) Program focuses on two training levels for 16 participants within the community. The participants will be enrolled in either fundamental or intermediate English and maths depending on their initial assessment. All participants will complete the education and career planning components.

Partners: Okanagan College & Okanagan Indian Band **Funding**: \$148,287

Program summary: The Continuing Studies Program offers a wide variety of employment focused training for 14 participants throughout the North Okanagan Region. Programming includes a myriad of industry-focused skill development pre-employment training and adult academic and career preparation.

Partners: Camosun College & Esquimalt Nation

Funding: \$91,672

Program summary: The Size gwə gweč'el'es or "Getting Ready for Tomorrow" Program will provide 15 participants withpractical skills-oriented training that enables them to more effectively seek and sustain employment or ongoing education and training that will result in employment. In addition, the program offers participants the opportunities to develop and enhance leadership skills.

Partners: Vancouver Island University, Camosun College, Cowichan Tribes & Tsawout First Nation **Funding**: \$304,923

Program summary: Introduction to the First Nations Culinary Arts Program provides 32 participants with the opportunity to acquire the knowledge and skills to find immediate employment working in the food and hospitality industry. In recognition of the unique history and circumstances of Aboriginal education, the content of this culinary arts program has been indigenized. It will be delivered in a manner and learning environment that is both culturally sensitive and supportive to adult Aboriginal learners transitioning back to school and ultimately to employment.

Partners: Northwest Community College & Kyah Wiget Education Society

Funding: \$164,469

Program summary: The Brighter Futures Program is a comprehensive and integrated approach to training for the community of Moricetown, including essential skills, cooks helper, foundation trades or professional cook training, and will transition 26 participants to employment.

Partners: Nicola Valley Institute of Technology & Sto:lo Tribal Council

Funding: \$205,117

Program summary: Two separate programs will be offered to 20 participants: 1. Office Administration Certificate Program which ladders participants into business administration programs orinto employment in that field. 2. Employment Skills Program for the service industry which will ladder participants into NVIT programs. Upon completion of the program participants can either go straight into work in the service industry or return for further studies. **Partners**: Nicola Valley Institute of Technology, First Nations Training and Development Centre & Metlakatla First Nation

Funding: \$36,088

Program summary: The Trades Preparation Program will provide six participants with course credits that will move them closer to an Adult Dogwood Diploma. Participants will also receive the necessary pre-requisites to enter trades training at a public post-secondary trade school.

Partners: Thompson Rivers University & Northern Shuswap Tribal Council (NSTC) **Funding**: \$353,206

Program summary: The NSTC Journey Program provides 50 participants with education and training that will continue to pave the way to address present post treaty needs in Northern Secwepemc communities. The program will provide training and certification in language, business administration, governance and guardianship of the lands.

Funding: \$131,545

Program summary: The Adult Upgrading Program is intended to provide 20 participants with essential skills and training towards an AdultDogwood Diploma certification.
