Dear Minister Chong:

I write to you on behalf of the BC Wheelchair Sports Association to request financial support to host the 2012 Canada Cup International Wheelchair Rugby Tournament, which will take place at the Richmond Olympic Oval from June 18th to 23rd. The Canada Cup is not only one of the world's most prestigious wheelchair rugby tournaments, but this year it is also the final internationally sanctioned tournament for competing teams prior to the London 2012 Paralympics. As such, we expect the top eight teams in the world to attend.

The Canada Cup was created in 2004 both to give BCWSA international hosting experience and to provide the Canadian wheelchair rugby national team with a high-quality competition opportunity in Canada. The experience we garnered hosting this biannual event allowed us to win the rights to host the 2010 World Wheelchair Rugby Championships (2010 WWRC), which brought an estimated 2.8 million dollars to the City of Richmond and set several records for parasport events. It is estimated that the economic impact of this year's Canada Cup will be 1.86 million dollars.

Hosting the 2012 Canada Cup at the Richmond Olympic Oval will allow us to enhance a variety of program elements that could not be accommodated at other facilities in the Lower Mainland, such as the Burnaby Bonsor Community Centre. This decision, however, will have financial implications. This year, our budget to deliver the 2012 Canada Cup is \$560,000, which is nearly double the 2008 Canada Cup's \$310,000 budget. The increased budget not only allows us to host the event at the Olympic Oval, but it will also permit us to implement several legacy projects that will have a positive impact on the sports system in BC. For this reason, we are requesting a hosting grant in the amount of \$125,000 from the Ministry of Community Sport and Cultural Development.

These legacies will build on those already created thanks to the 2010 WWRC and include the following initiatives:

- Delivering a successful schools program, including a demonstration team program, curriculum support and an equipment (wheelchair rugby sport wheelchairs) program.
- Creating and implementing a comprehensive communications plan, including a social media plan.
- Contracting the development of a "Social Media 101" resource to be shared across the sports sector in BC.
- Fully webcasting the tournament in order to expand its audience and the messages of our sponsors.
- Revising the 2010 WWC website to promote the 2012 Canada Cup and future Canada Cups.
- Creating and implementing a successful marketing and advertising program to maximize spectator attendance.



As a legacy of hosting the 2012 Canada Cup, we plan to create a "Social Media 101" resource for the sport sector in BC. BCWSA will contract the creation of this resource to our current communications coordinator, who was responsible for the successful 2010 WWRC social media plan and will spearhead the 2012 Canada Cup social media campaign. The 2010 WWRC taught us the power of a coherent social media strategy and we want to share our learnings with the sport sector in BC. The anticipated cost to complete this resource will be \$15,000 and is included in our total request for financial support.

Since we began hosting international wheelchair rugby events in 2004, BCWSA has established a reputation as a world leader and we are excited to continue to set the bar high with the 2012 Canada Cup International Wheelchair Rugby Tournament. Already, the 2012 Canada Cup has generated significant excitement. We have a waiting list for countries wanting to attend the tournament and have already received enthusiastic support from past 2010 WWRC sponsors. Darin Hurnanen, Marketing Manager for Coloplast Canada, recently wrote, "I've spoken with Clara [The International Project Manager for Coloplast] and she continues to proclaim that the World Wheelchair Rugby Championships in 2010 are still the model to which all other tournaments are compared. It's exciting to think that you are bringing that same excitement and expertise to the Canada Cup this year."

With the generous support of the Province of BC, we were able to set the bar high with the hosting of the 2010 WWRC. This year, we hope to continue to build on the learnings and legacies of event management as we host what is known as the best international wheelchair rugby tournament in the world outside of the world championships and Paralympic Games.

Re: 2012 BMX Supercross World Cup - Abbotsford

In 2011, Cycling BC was fortunate to receive "bid funding" from the Government of British Columbia to help secure the rights to a 2012 BMX World Cup. I am delighted to report that the International Cycling Federation (Union Cycliste Internationale) has awarded the final leg of the 2012 BMX Supercross World Cup series to British Columbia. This prestigious event will take place from September 10th to 15th in Abbotsford. The event will be located in Abbotsford's West Riding (Michael de Jong, Minister of Health) and Abbotsford's Electoral District (Ed Fast Minister of International Trade & Minister for the Asia-Pacific Gateway).

BMX Supercross made its Olympic debut as a cycling event at the 2008 Summer Games in Beijing and will make its second appearance at the London 2012 Games – the Abbotsford race will crown a World Cup Champion for both the men and women as it is the last leg of the 2012 BMX Supercross World Cup series and the the first race after the Olympics. This event will attract over 120 international athletes, 50 overseas media outlets, and an estimated 1000 out-of-town spectators.

Olympic Success Celebration

Tory Nyhaug, a 20-year-old BMX athlete from Coquitlam, will represent British Columbia at the 2012 Olympic Summer Games in London. We are delighted to report that Tory's performance over the last 12 months has proven him to be a medal contender for both the 2012 Olympic Games as well as the 2012 BMX World Championships being held in May. The Abbotsford World Cup will provide British Columbians the opportunity to see Tory and the rest of British Columbia's elite BMX athletes perform on a world stage. It will also provide an opportunity to celebrate the performance of other BC athletes competing at the 2012 London Olympics:

- Catherine Pendrel (2012 World Champion Cross Country Mountain Bike)
- Zach Bell (Silver Medal 2012 Track World Championships)
- Jasmin Glaesser (Silver & Bronze Medal 2012 Track World Championships)
- Gillian Carelton (Bronze Medal 2012 Track World Championships)



These athletes are all projected to win medals at the 2012 Olympic Games and a World Cup event will provide a great opportunity for public congratulations on behalf of the Provincial Government. Other athletes, such as Ryder Hesjedal from Victoria and Svein Tuft from Langley, are 2012 Tour de France participants and will contend for a medal in the Men's Road Race & Time Trial.

2015 Pan Am Games - Canada

Hosting this level of competition in Canada (BMX Supercross World Cup) as an annual event has become even more critical since Canada was awarded the 2015 Pan Am Games. The Pan Am Games include BMX as on of its medal events. A domestic World Cup can support the preparation of athletes for the Pan Am Games in 2015.

We have already secured substantial financial support from the City of Abbotsford, who have committed to completed significant upgrades to the BMX track. These improvements will add more permanent bleachers to increase the capacity of the venue and ensure a suitable power supply is available for the TV production. As an Olympic discipline, this event meets Sport Canada criteria for sport hosting and we have submitted a concurrent application to Canadian Heritage. Cycling BC is funding the redevelopment of the BMX track to meet Olympic standards and underwriting the financial operation of the event.

Worldwide Broadcast

This event will be broadcasted live across the world through major TV networks as well as via the Internet. IMG Media is currently negotiating the North American broadcasting rights for this event and we anticipate coverage through Canadian and American networks. The 2010 UCI BMX Supercross World Cup was distributed as follows:

- Europe; 600 minutes, estimated viewers app 1,000,000
- Asia & Middle East; 350 minutes, estimated viewers app 800,000
- America; 500 minutes, estimated viewers app 1,000,000
- Oceania; 300 minutes, estimated viewers app 500,000
- In 2010 all events were broadcasted live or delayed live (Pan Europe)
- In 2010 all events were shown live on Freecaster.tv

Together with hosting the last leg of the BMX Supercross World Cup series, Cycling BC is organizing a Community Mountain Bike Festival that will include skills clinics, skills competitions and a mountain bike race.

Healthy Living & Schools Initiative

Cycling BC will also be using the formal announcement of this event to launch our new High School Cycling Initiative. Cycling BC will be offering all Middle & High



Schools in British Columbia a free cycling program. The program consists of a sixweek bike skills course for grade 6/7/8 students. Cycling BC will provide all equipment and instruction at no cost to the schools or students. Our organization has already purchased two full sets of equipment including cargo trailers to transport the equipment, bicycles, and helmets. One trailer will be located on Vancouver Island while the second will be based in the Fraser Valley. This initiative is part of Cycling BC's ongoing commitment to help young British Columbians adopt a healthy lifestyle through cycling.

The Provincial Government's continued support of major events has perhaps been one of the most important legacies from the 2010 Winter Olympic Games. The Provincial Government has played a critical role in supporting the recent Davis Cup Tie held at the UBC Arena (\$100,000), the Olympic Soccer Qualifiers (\$250,000) and the 2014 Special Olympic Canada Summer Games (\$1 million). We would like to ask the Government of BC to consider a similar level of support for the 2012 BMX Supercross World Cup.

Cycling BC asks for consideration of a grant of \$187,500, bringing the total Provincial Government support for this event to \$200,000. A comprehensive business plan and budget to support our request are attached. Myself and other members of our organization would be available at a time of your choosing to discuss the event in more detail. The economic impact of this event is estimated in excess of \$1 million providing a substantial return of government support. A full post-event economic impact study will be completed immediately following the event.

Thank you for your continued support for sport and healthy living in British Columbia.





Bicycle moto cross (BMX) started in the late 1960s in California, around the time that motocross became a popular sport in the USA.

In April 1981, the International BMX Federation was founded, and the first world championships were held in 1982. Thus, since January 1993 BMX has been fully integrated into the Union Cycliste Internationale.

The main BMX areas in the world were and are the U.S.A., Europe and Australia, whilst South America has also been growing rapidly over the past years.

The International Cycling Union (UCI) is cycling's International Federation recognised by the International Olympic Committee (IOC). The UCI was founded in Paris in 1900.

The UCI administers and promotes the development of the eight disciplines of cycling all around the world (road, track, mountain bike, BMX, para-cycling, cyclocross, trials and indoor cycling).

Over 2400 competitors from 38 countries participated in the 2009 UCI BMX World Championships that was held in Brisbane, Australia and in 2010 UCI BMX World Championships in Pietermaritzburg over 1600 competitors where on hand.

In August 2008, BMX made a successful debut at the Summer Olympic Games in Beijing, China. For the 2012 Olympic Games, BMX has moved into the Olympic Park and is predicted to make a huge impact scheduled for 3 competitions days in the second week of the Olympics.







RIGHTS OF THE ORGANISERS

The UCI respectively through Global SX Events hold the marketing and sponsorship rights to the 2012 UCI BMX Supercross World Cup. However, the UCI and GSX grant the organizer an average of 50% of the visibility depending on the location. The marketing rights are described in appendix 2.




Commitments of the Organizers & the UCI

GSX acquired the rights from UCI and is the owner of the worldwide broadcasting rights (including radio, TV, internet and any other multimedia broadcasts) of the 2012 UCI BMX Supercross World Cup. However, if the Organiser supplies the technical equipment for the TV production, GSX may grant the broadcasting rights within the host country to the Organiser (or host broadcaster).

- 2. Supply trophies for the final overall standing.





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Business Plan for the Hosting of a 2012 BMX World Cup in Abbotsford



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2012 UCI BMX World Cup Abbotsford, BC

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1 Executive Summary

On January 31st, 2012 Union Cycliste Internationale awarded Cycling British Columbia the final round of the 2012 UCI BMX Supercross World Cup. The importance of hosting this level of event has never been greater as Canadian athletes like Tory Nyhaug ascend the world rankings and prepare for the 2012 and 2016 Olympic Games.

Mission Statement - Organizing Committee

The Organizing Committee's mission statement is as follows:

To organize world-class cycling competitions that lead to International success for elite Canadian athletes.

Key Objectives - Organizing Committee

- To host a World Cup Supercross Event that helps Canadian athletes prepare for International competitions
- To promote Canada, British Columbia and Abbotsford as through international media exposure
- To host a World Cup Supercross event that encourages participation the sport of BMX in Canada

The hosting of this event in 2012 will specifically support the development of Canadian BMX athletes in the training to win stage of LTAD and most notably the development of Tory Nyhaug who finished 5th overall in the 2011 World Cup standings. This athlete's performance at the highest level of the sport now makes him a serious medal contender for both the 2012 and 2016 Olympic BMX events. Cycling British Columbia spearheaded the construction of a new BMX Super-cross start hill in 2011, which has in turn allowed us to secure the final round of the 2012 World Cup season.

The construction of a Canadian Supercross Track and the hosting of a regular World Cup event are essential for the proper preparation of current and future Olympic athletes. Until the construction of the Abbotsford Supercross track in May 2011, Canadian athletes were forced to train at the USOC BMX Facility on San Diego. Securing a World Cup event has facilitated the opportunity for Canadian athletes to train year round on home soil prior to the 2012 Olympic games. Importantly, the Abbotsford track re-construction will happen in June and provide Tory Nyhaug with valuable training on an Olympic standard track. The USOC has already placed considerable restrictions on access to the facilities in San Diego.

Hosting a regular Supercross World Cup in Canada provides valuable preparation for Canada's elite BMX riders and will play a critical role in their preparations for other rounds of the world cup, the World BMX Championships and future Olympic games. This event will also play a critical role in providing accessible World Cup competition other younger Canadian athletes who have entered the Training to Win stage and are looking toward competing at the 2016 Olympic and Paralympic Games in Rio, Brazil.

A World Cup BMX event in Canada will attract considerable national and regional media coverage. The media exposure will be further enhanced by the projected success of Tory Nyhaug at World Cups, World Championships and Olympic games. The combination of these two factors can and will encourage young athletes to pursue BMX

CSC-2013-00033 Page 42 as an Olympic sport and help ensure that Canadian's secure future international success.

Recent changes to the design of World Cup/Olympic standard tracks and the adoption of the Supercross start hill as a standard has created steep learning curve female athletes in the Training to Win stage. The first jump and the aggressive features of Olympic standard tracks make the presence of a domestic competition even more critical for female competitors.

With an estimated 125 elite competitors and as many as 2000 people expected to visit Abbotsford during the event, an economic impact of \$200,000 on the local economy can be expected. With a large proportion of visitors coming from the western United States, the event can help to stimulate tourist visits to Abbotsford, the Fraser Valley and the Lower Mainland.

The Canadian Cycling Association's Mission Statement is as follows:

To create and sustain an effective system that develops talented Canadian cyclists to achieve Olympic, Paralympic and World Championship medal performances.

Operational Strategies

Cycling BC has set up a separate events team to organize all aspects of this event and other smaller races (2012 Cyclo-cross Nationals, etc). All the 2012 BMX World Cup events are operated in partnership with the Union Cycliste International (UCI) and the global Rights Holder (GSX events) and the specific responsibilities of each level of organization are specified in the UCI BMX Supercross Organisation Guide

Economic Impact

The economic impact of international BMX events is substantial. The 2007 World Championships resulted in \$5.1m of direct, indirect and induced impact on GDP across the province as a whole, \$3.7m of that accruing to Victoria. The total impact on Industry output is estimated at \$8.1m in Victoria plus an additional \$3.1m in the rest of B.C. Total tax revenue at federal, provincial and municipal levels of government amounted to \$2.4m.

Using previous World Cups as a guide, we can expect the average length of stay for out of country and out of province visitors to be a minimum of 3 days with a maximum of 6. During their stay they will spend, on average, \$200 per day. And the majority of them will likely return to British Columbia for future holidays or events.

As a partnership of Cycling British Columbia and the Abbotsford BMX Club, the 2012 BMX World Cup will achieve a number of objectives shared by senior levels of government and the sport community.

Both federal and provincial governments are committed to optimizing the economic social and sport development impacts of hosting international sports events. These benefits include the potential to increase physical activity and the health of citizens, especially youth; to increase participation in sport. Governments are also interested in showcasing British Columbia and Canada as a successful sporting nation in the years following the 2010 Winter Olympics. The 2012 BMX World Cup offer governments an opportunity to advance all of these objectives.

Hosting the world's best BMX athletes will provide a unique opportunity for British Columbia's BMX racers to compete in front of an enthusiastic and supportive crowd and to push their training and competition to higher levels.

This business plan spells out the nature and scope of the event, its potential to positively impact the development of cycling in British Columbia and Canada and its significant economic impact. It provides a justification for an investment by the federal and provincial governments in a spectator-friendly, youth oriented, and strategically important World Cup BMX event.

History of BMX Cycling

Inspired by Motocross Racing, Bicycle Motocross (BMX) racing started in the 1970s as California youth copied their motorcycle racing heroes by taking their bicycles "off-road" onto dirt tracks. BMX holds an "extreme" sport appeal and it represents a strong youth movement within cycling. Since its inception, it has grown into an internationally recognized sport with more than 60,000 licensed BMX riders with Union Cycliste International (UCI) affiliated organizations worldwide and another 40,000 in the United States not affiliated with the UCI.

This youth aspect is one of the primary reasons the International Olympic Committee accepted it into the Summer Olympic schedule in 2004. The 2012 Summer Olympics in London will include BMX as part of its competition schedule and Canada has a potential gold medalist in Tory Nyhaug. Inclusion as an Olympic event will capture the interest of the youth market and result in anticipated additional participation growth worldwide.

In 2004, the UCI introduced the first high-level training program for BMX athletes and coaches, leading up to the Beijing Olympics. National Cycling Federations were invited to send athletes and trainers to the World Cycling Centre in Switzerland to take part of the first BMX training course of its kind.

Abbotsford 2012 World Cup will be one of the most important pre-Olympic events, as results will help prepare the National team members for the Olympics. Reflecting the growth of the sport around the world, the World Cup are now contested by athletes from more than 40 nations.

Bid History

The construction of the new Supers-cross start hill has proven to be a significant catalyst in biding for a BMX World Cup. As with other sports, a prior commitment of funding from government is critical to the success of the bid to host a BMX World Cup. Consequentially, Cycling BC is applying for Provincial and Federal funding prior to being formally awarded a BMX World Cup. As a result, all government commitments to funding would be contingent on the bid being successful.

Principal Players

Cycling British Columbia

Affiliated with the CCA, CBC is the provincial governing body for the sport of cycling in British Columbia. It is a not-for-profit association registered under the BC Societies Act and represents the full range of cycling disciplines including Road, Track, Cyclo-cross, Mountain Biking and BMX.

CBC's main responsibilities include:

- Licensing riders, coaches & officials
- Developing racing calendars
- Training coaches & officials
- Supporting local clubs
- Sanctioning & insuring cycling events

- Providing training and development courses & clinics
- Developing athletes
- Operating a Cycling Resource Centre

The Board of Directors, elected by members at the Annual General Meeting, provides policy direction to staff. Other important volunteers serve Cycling BC as race organizers, coaches, commissaires, instructors and committee members.

Abbotsford BMX Club

Abbotsford BMX Club is the society that operates the Abbotsford BMX Track and offers racing opportunities to BMX athletes in Abbotsford and other parts of the Fraser Valley. The clubs has extensive hosting history of both National and International events. This includes two National Championships in the past 5 years and the BMX Pre-world event in 2007.

The Canadian Cycling Association (CCA)

The CCA is Canada's oldest sport governing body. The Association was known as the Canadian Wheelmen's Association when it was founded in 1882. In 1968, it was officially named the Canadian Cycling Association. The CCA is the recognised authority by the UCI on all aspects of sport cycling in Canada.

Today, more than a century later, the CCA continues to pursue its mission to lead and support the development and growth of cycling in Canada through programs, leadership development and technical expertise. The CCA has an excellent high performance program led by full-time professional coaches at national and regional cycling development centres, a strong calendar of national and international events. In 2003 launched a national introduction to cycling program for youth called Sprockids.

The CCA is the sum of its member provincial/territorial cycling associations and is governed by a board of directors comprising a president, five directors at large and a national team athlete director. Expert volunteers and staff lead programs for athlete, coach, officials and event development. The association's national office is located in Ottawa.

Membership of individuals, clubs and trade teams is processed through the affiliated provincial and territorial associations, including Cycling BC.

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Purpose of Business Plan

The purpose of this business plan is to bring into focus the full scope and context for the BMX World Cup, including the strategic advantages for Canada in hosting this sport at such a critical stage of its evolution to Olympic Games status.

The plan will outline a vision of the future for the Sport in Canada as a result of this event and will provide reasons why investment in this event and this sport are integral to future sport development, strong community health indicators, community development initiatives, and environmental impacts.

The plan will also indicate how this event can assist in the delivery of healthy community and family initiatives; how it can showcase and position the city, province and country in the years following the 2010 Olympic Games; how it act as a valuable ally in supporting the international Olympic family and how it can help develop sport connections to over 25 nations world-wide.

2 Description of the Event

Sport Governing Body

The UCI governs the sport of cycling and operates a World Cup Series for a variety of cycling disciplines including Road, Track and BMX, Mountain Bike and CycloCross. It is affiliated with the International Olympic Committee (IOC).

The UCI is a non-profit organization founded in 1900, and is the association of the National Cycling Federations, including the CCA. Its headquarters are in Aigle, Switzerland. UCI believes that cycling should be valued as a competitive sport, a popular leisure activity and an environmentally friendly means of transport around the world.

The aims of the UCI are as follows:

- Regulate cycling at the international level;
- Promote cycling in every country throughout the world and at all levels;
- Organize the World Championships for all disciplines;
- Encourage friendly relations between members of the cycling family;
- Promote sporting ethics and fair play;
- Represent the sort of cycling and defend its interest on national and international bodies;
- Collaborate with the International Olympic Committee with respect to Olympic cycling events.

The UCI is also concerned with the following areas:

- Training and development
- The fight against doping
- Developing equipment
- Ethics
- Good governance
- Protecting the environment
- Promoting women's cycling
- Involving disabled people.

General Description of BMX

This sport is primarily a focus for young riders between the ages of 5 and 18. Participation also includes adult categories with riders as old as 55+. This dynamic has evolved the sport to be one with a strong family orientation and one that encourages life-long participation. It is not unusual for entire families to compete in various age and gender categories. Also, because of the young average age of participants, parents travel with their kids and are very involved with the operation of local tracks and the running of events.

The sport is reasonably cost effective for families from an equipment and participation standpoint. Single design bikes with simple components, track memberships and competition entry fees are affordable.

This sport is primarily a focus for young riders between the ages of 5 and 18. Participation also includes adult categories with riders as old as 55 and older. Because of this dynamic, the sport has evolved into one with a strong family orientation that encourages life-long participation. It is not unusual for entire families to compete in various age and gender categories. Also, because of the young average age of participants, parents travel with their kids and are very involved with the operation of local tracks and the running of events.

On the competitive side, there is a well-established professional circuit for elite competitors. These riders range in age from 16 to 25 and up. The World Cups provides classifications for the elite competitors as well as "all-comers" classifications, thus ensuring large participation bases for competitors and spectators alike.

The sport itself takes place on closed circuit made of dirt and featuring bumps, jumps, corners and straights. Courses are generally between 300-400 metres in length and can feature elements unique to the elite competitors.

The sport itself takes place on closed circuit made of dirt and featuring bumps, jumps, corners and straights. BMX races are held on circuits of around 350 metres, including jumps, banked corners and other obstacles. Eight riders compete in each heat (qualifying rounds, quarter finals, semi-finals, finals) with the top four qualifying for the next round.

The main BMX areas in the world were and are the U.S.A., Europe and Australia, whilst South America has also been growing rapidly over the past years. BMX has been integrated with many national cycling federations. Currently, there are 75 national federations with official BMX activities recognized by the UCI.

UCI BMX World Cups

The UCI BMX Supercross World Cup is the world's most prestigious BMX racing series, open only to junior and elite racers. The Abbotsford World Cup would mark the debut of regular high profile international BMX Racing in Canada. Besides offering valuable International Cycling Union rankings points and a healthy prize purse, the Abbotsford event provides valuable preparation for athletes attending the subsequent World Cups, World Championships and Olympic competition.

Race classes & criteria's

Combined class for Elite Men & Junior Men (17 Years and older) and combined class for Elite Women & Junior Women on selected events. Riders must carry an international license issued by their National Federation.

Ranking points

The UCI BMX Supercross World Cup is a class 2 event and will count for individual points in the UCI BMX Ranking, also eligible for the Nations ranking functioning as the Olympic Qualification criteria. Every year the UCI shall bestow upon the first-place overall finisher in each 20" competing class at elite and junior level recognized by the UCI, the title of "UCI BMX Supercross World Cup Champion".

Track layout and features

The Supercross track is similar to traditional BMX racing, however the track is much more challenging, with major double-jumps, step ups and a very technical "rhythm section". The track also needs to have a very large (scaffolding) start ramp, to be able to gain the necessary speed. The start ramp is 8 meters high, 10 meters wide with an 18/28° sloping angle.

Total length of the track:

minimum of 300 metres, maximum of 350 metres with an average lap time of 30-40 seconds.

Area of track: minimum 90 x 60 meters

Width of the track:

minimum of 5 meters

Height of the scaffolding starting ramp:

minimum of 8 meters

Participation Numbers - Competitors

Traditionally, sport participation reaches peak levels when the event is hosting in Europe. North American based competitions are the next most attended events while South American and Australian events, due to the distance from strong participation regions tend to fare the worst attendance-wise. With the sport's Olympic announcement in 2004, participation surged dramatically.

Participation Numbers – Spectators

The large competitor participation numbers, combined with the relatively young age of the majority of the competitors and the family aspect of the sport, means that most of the competitors travel with family members. It is estimated that each competitor will travel with a minimum of 2.5 additional people. As a result, close to 2000 competitors, family members, officials and media are expected to visit the host community as part of the immediate "BMX Supercross Family".

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Additional spectators drawn to the event will add to these numbers. It is expected the majority of these spectators will travel from the Pacific Northwest region (BC, WA, OR), Alberta and California.

3 Strategic Considerations

The International Perspective

The North American West Coast is the birthplace for this sport and continues to be one of the most active regions in the world for sport participation levels. As the sport prepares for participation in the 2012 Olympic Games the Abbotsford World Cup will be part of a series seen to be a vital link moving the sport from its strong grass roots levels to a greater level on the International sport stage.

The West Coast of Canada is seen as an ideal location to host a World Cup in the pre-Olympic year due to its proximity to the Western United States and British Columbia's strong connections to China and Asia. It is also centrally and conveniently located between the two other BMX hotbed locations of Europe and Australia.

As the IOC continues to build its Olympic brands (Summer and Winter), it is making adjustments to its sports rosters with a view to adding sports with a younger demographic both in terms of participants and in terms of its fans. The addition of "X-Sports" like Snowboarding in the winter Olympics was made for this reason. The addition of BMX Cycling is the Summer Olympics equivalent to Snowboarding.

The Canadian Perspective

The Canadian BMX system is undergoing change as it moves to its Olympic status. These Worlds are seen as a strategic opportunity to strengthen the CCA BMX brand, build greater awareness of the sport and establish a proper grass roots to high performance development system that ties into and reinforces the development systems of other cycling disciplines. The overall objective is to develop cyclists that evolve from one cycling discipline to another as the skill sets evolve. BMX is a critical first step in this perspective as the explosive nature of the sport lends itself well to developing high performance athletes in quick times. From here the natural progression would move athletes into Track, Mountain Biking and finally Road Cycling.

The Provincial/Regional Perspective

The majority of Canada's best BMX riders have come from BC and Alberta. Currently, British Columbia boasts one of the hottest Olympic prospects in the world - Coquitlam's Tory Nyhaug. The World Cup will provide Tory, other National Team Members, and others from the region the opportunity to compete at the highest levels on their home turf, while preparing our athletes for Olympic and World opportunities.

The Local Perspective

As Sports Town Canada, Abbotsford is a natural location for high performance cycling. The Fraser Valley region boasts ideal year around weather for training, a good variety of roads and terrain for riding, and a strong cycling infrastructure. This event will be instrumental in building and utilizing a world class BMX facility that will aid in attracting, on a regular basis, additional important BMX events. These additional events will be an instrumental fiscal legacy of the games, driving economic impacts, athlete development and community support well into the future.

Additional Perspectives

This event also offers the following benefits:

- It provides an opportunity for the host facility operator to develop stronger connections to the sport system and opens up partnership opportunities with the sport
- It provides the host facility operator to develop additional infrastructure through the development of a new track and the redevelopment of the existing track to all-year sport field and parking use – both uses support identified high need requirements
- The development of this infrastructure and related programs leads to additional opportunities for recreational and competitive pursuits for local citizens and complements Provincial goals for being the fittest jurisdiction to ever host an Olympics
- It provides an opportunity for Canada's cycling industry to showcase its products to an international marketplace
- It provides an opportunity for British Columbia to export its knowledge to other jurisdictions hosting major sporting events.
- It will provide an opportunity for the Province to host members of the Olympic Family, the London Organizing Committee and other guest
- It can provide the Canadian Bicycle Trade Industry with important exposures internationally.
- It will drive important Sport Tourism based rubber tire visitors from throughout Western Canada and the Pacific North West, as well as international visitors arriving by air.

4 Impacts of hosting

Legacy

The legacy of these events is measured in hard legacy items and soft legacy items. The legacy from this event is already evident and will grow through and beyond the event. The legacy of this event will stretch from coast to coast to coast across our great land.

Hard Legacy

Most visibly, the greatest legacy of this event is a world-class track to be re-developed on 1.5 acres of land at the Abbotsford Athletic Park. This track will feature the best in international starting gates; a design that ensures the integrity of the track is retained even in inclement weather and an infrastructure to support multiple club use, National Team Programs and recreational programming.

In addition through funding support, Cycling BC has secured a set of BMX bikes for use at the track for disadvantaged youth. This program will be fully developed in time for the World Cup and will assist in providing barrier free access for the Fraser Valley youth looking for an outlet for their energy.

A net profit is another important legacy we are striving to achieve and our motivation is in building a stronger future for BMX and cycling in general in Canada. Cycling BC and Abbotsford BMX will share in financial legacy with other affiliated tracks in BC through a grant. Importantly, these monies would be tied to program development in support of BMX in their respective community.

Soft Legacy

Our soft legacies, those that are harder to quantify and measure include the development of human capital; the training of athletes, coaches and officials; the training of volunteers and the implementation of programs to assist disadvantaged youth participate, barrier-free in the sport. This investment connects to societal legacies including a healthier more active population, pride in sport achievements by local and Canadian athletes and pride in community. As we near 2012, our province is garnering additional attention and events like these support the positive aspects we wish to portray to our international observers.

Impact on Cycling in Canada and on BMX in particular

BMX represents an important youth movement within cycling. With its "extreme" sport reputation and its inclusion as an Olympic event a greater interest and participation rate from the youth market is being seen.

Hosting the event in Canada provides additional awareness of the sport across the country and will further the growth of the sport amongst young Canadians in particular those from Abbotsford and British Columbia. BMX is an excellent feeder system for other cycling disciplines. Its youth focus and relatively barrier free access to participation creates a much larger pool of cycling talent in the country. BMX teaches good fundamental cycling skills, which can ultimately be applied to other cycling disciplines such as track and mountain bike and, indeed, other sports such as luge and skeleton (all

these sports share a common theme - manoeuvring an object with your body along a track at speed).

At the provincial level, British Columbia will benefit from increased profile of BMX. This increase in profile will encourage for the emergence of more clubs and tracks and ultimately to more organized cycling programs and initiatives.

Impacts on Canadian Athlete Development

BMX is an excellent discipline to develop athletes through all the stages of cycling's Long-Term Athlete Development Model, which is has been developed by the CCA and is being rolled out across the country. Good BMX riders develop explosive power, excellent motor co-ordination, high technical skills and a good tactical brain. This makes BMX is a natural training ground for future cyclists in all disciplines.

The CCA benefits in terms of youth development, as there is the potential for BMX to feed athletes to other cycling disciplines. BMX teaches good fundamentals which can ultimately be applied to any cycling discipline. Growth in BMX will lead to more organized cycling programs and initiatives at the national level.

The event will also help to expand/demonstrate the capacity within BC in terms of participation and volunteerism. It will demonstrate the capability to deliver top-level events while encouraging a sense of pride within BC and Canada to host world events.

Canada's potential to take medals

As a relatively new and still developing cycling sport, BMX offers Canadian athletes to opportunity be competitive with the best in the world. Canada's best medal potential exists with Tory Nyhaug from Coquitlam.

Impact on Canadian Coaches and Officials

As host country, we will supply the majority of officials to manage the competition. Canada currently has two active international status officials. In 2003 the CCA implemented a plan to add to this number in preparation for hosting Worlds and the anticipated growth of BMX in Canada as a result of hosting. International level events have been hosted in Canada since 2003 to provide needed experience and development of officials.

It is already confirmed that UCI will continue to assign Canadian international officials to the World Cups and the 2012 Summer Olympics. Through the active encouragement of this process from the CCA a trickle down effect will be one of increased levels of recruitment and training of more provincial level officials. The CCA will work closely with its provincial and territorial associations to support the development of provincial level officials.

With the announcement of Olympic status, Sport Canada funding and Coaching Association of Canada funding has now become available. This has facilitated the hiring

of Adam Muys (Cycling BC Director of BMX) as National BMX Team coach and the addition of BMX programs to the network of National Cycling Centres. BMX athletes have also been added to the national team list and are working more regularly with National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP) certified coaches. As these athlete numbers increase, so too will coaching teams and coaches with BMX specializations. In anticipation of this growth, the CCA has created NCCP courses specific to BMX.

Impact on Active Lifestyle & Active Communities

The BMX World Cup 2012 will enhance Abbotsford reputation as host for international sporting events. The exposure will lead to more citizens becoming involved in cycling as a recreational pursuit and an added influx of people from outside Abbotsford seeing the city as a tourist destination for cycling holidays. The event will have a significant positive impact on the Fraser Valley region as a location of choice as an active community for people who are looking for active lifestyles.

Impact on Skills Development for Volunteers

This event will attract a large number of local, as well as lower mainland based volunteers involved with the 2010 Olympic games. An orientation and training program will provide this core of volunteers with skills and experience they can put to use in other volunteer activities.

Parents and volunteers already experienced in setting up BMX competitive events will be exposed to an international level event with competitors from more than 40 countries. This will improve the level of competence within the sport in the Fraser Valley region and provide a team of volunteers for future high calibre events at the legacy track.

Impact on Activities Prior to and after A World Cup

The level of activity around the organization of the BMX World Cup will grow leading up to the event. There will be an increased awareness of BMX and involvement in the sport before and after the event. This awareness will be further enhanced because of the involvement in BMX in the London Olympic Games. A significant legacy will be left in Abbotsford relating to the sport of BMX in the form of an updated facility and enhanced presence of BMX through the Provincial and National programs. The economic spin-offs to the community will be significant this has been addressed in another section of this plan.

Economic Benefits of Hosting the BMX World Cup

The economic benefits of hosting this international event are best measured through economic impact of direct and indirect spending associated with the event and the exposure a local community generates through TV and other Broadcast exposures. For this event these measurements provide an extremely convincing case for a strong level of funding support from the agencies that benefit from these impacts.

Economic Impact

Based on a established standards for calculating Economic Impacts, the 2012 BMX World Cup is expected to generate in almost \$1 million of direct economic impact for the Fraser Valley. Using an average (x2.25) of standard industry ratios (x2.0 to x2.4) this direct impact is equivalent to approximately \$3.1 million in indirect spending.

This estimated impact is largely generated by 1500 expected out of town visitors directly attributable to the event. These people will largely remain in the Abbotsford area for an average of 5 days and will require approximately 2000 room nights. The indirect spending includes the re-spending of this money by the wage earners, suppliers, contractors and other recipients of the direct spending.

A breakdown of the event participants is listed on the following tables:

* Attending spectators are the family members travelling with the participants. A 2.5:1 attending spectator to participant ratio is estimated.

The large number of participants travelling to Abbotsford directly as a result of this event is unique for a single event World Cup. This component makes this event extremely attractive to host communities and the funding agency who invest in the event, due to the sheer size of this contingent.

The 2003 World Championships in Adelaide Australia are the last BMX event to have generated a post event economic impact report. The 2003 Worlds with 1412 competitors recorded an economic impact in excess of \$3.3 million (Australian). The following additional impacts were clarified:

- Average length of stay for out of country and out of state visitors was 12 days
- Average daily spending for out of country and out of state visitors (excluding airfares) was \$222 (Australian)
- Out of country and out of state visitors accounted for 69% of event ticket sales
- 72 % of out of country and out of state visitors indicated they were likely to return or would highly recommend others to visit

 A \$1 (Australian) investment in the event resulted in a \$15 (Australian) return on investment to the State

TV Broadcasting Impact

The UCI BMX World Cups have been telecast internationally since their inception and the annual worldwide viewing audience of these events are measured in millions of cumulated viewing audiences and many more millions in reach.

UCI was unable to provide a broadcast coverage schedule for North and Central America. The tracked coverage throughout the rest of the world took the message to over 30 distinct countries while also broadcasting over Pan Regional broadcasters in Europe, the Middle East and Africa, substantially adding to the world-wide reach enjoyed by the event.

Canada enjoyed very strong coverage of the sport and the 2005 Worlds in 2005. CBC TV had a crew in Paris producing 4 x 30 min features planned to run during the fall of 2005. This BMX coverage was in addition to the Canadian Championships and a Quebec BMX World Cup race they covered earlier in the season.

Competition Schedule

The World Cup Super-cross competition is scheduled over 2 days of competition and 2 days of training. Using the temporary indoor track at the adjacent Agrifair building, Cycling BC is proposing a schedule for the event that includes a major challenge event for non-elite riders (the same format used at the BMX World Championships).

Additional Events Schedule

A schedule of additional events is currently being developed. Once confirmed, these events will comprise the full complement of activities taking place during the World Cup time period. These potential events include but are not limited to the following:

- BMX Challenge Competition
- Extreme Sport Demos and Competitions
- Music Concert
- Vendor Fair
- International Food Fair

6 AIMS & OBJECTIVES

Our Core Strategic Objectives

There are several objectives in hosting this event in Canada. They can be summarized as follows:

NSO/PSO Objectives

- To use this event to develop a stronger high performance BMX system in Canada and BC
- To prepare high performance athletes for Beijing and the 2008 Summer Olympics
- To increase the awareness of BMX nationally and provincially
- To increase the CCA and CBC presence in BMX cycling in Western Canada and
 on Vancouver Island
- To lead the amalgamation or joint cooperation of BMX groups in Canada under the CCA/UCI Brand
- To increase participation levels in BMX and in cycling as a whole
- To showcase Canadian and BC athletes
- To provide greater participation opportunities and access for Canadian athletes

Local Objectives

- To provide a facility legacy for the continued development of BMX cycling in Abbotsford
- To continue to showcase Abbotsford and BC as a world-class host for major sporting events in the wake of a successful 2010 Olympics
- To showcase BC and Western Canada as the most active BMX regions in the country
- To develop new standards for the planning and delivery of this event through improved transfer of knowledge to future host communities, improved data collection on the economic impact of the event and the general overall delivery of the event
- To provide volunteer training opportunities that may tie-in to future international level events
- To provide a health and wellness message to citizens, especially youth
- To provide the legacy, resources and infrastructure to position Abbotsford as a prime and regular host for future BMX events of a provincial, national and international level

Relevance to key stakeholders

This event supports the objectives of key stakeholders as follows:

Governments

Both federal and provincial governments are committed to optimizing the benefits of sport hosting; to increasing physical activity and the health of citizens, especially youth; to increasing participation in sport; and to maximizing the economic impact of hosting international sports events. They are also interested in showcasing British Columbia and Canada as a successful sporting nation in the years following the 2010 Winter Olympics.

The 2012 BMX World Cup offer governments an opportunity to advance all of these objectives.

Sport Bodies

A world class BMX facility will be left as a legacy of this event that will provide significant opportunities for local athletes and the general public to participate in organized recreational and competitive BMX programs. At the provincial level a regional BMX program will be established that will see provincial level athletes training at this facility. The new BMX track will become an integral part of the expanded National Cycling Centre that see national team BMX riders in residence using the facility. In additional many competitions will be held annually at all levels providing expanded opportunities for athletes, coaches and program development.

Tourism Agencies

The 2012 BMX World Cup will see a significant influx of athletes, supporters, officials and the general public to the Fraser Valley region. These visits have a major impact on tourism and the tourism infrastructure. Not only will this benefit the local economy in 2012, but also in the longer term as the facility will host numerous regional, national and international BMX events in the years to come. The spin-off to the tourism industry specifically and to the economy of the region in general will be extensive.

Community Stakeholders

The bid includes a commitment to expand the lasting BMX legacy for the city and the country. With support from the local, provincial and national sport organizations discussions are underway to integrate BMX into the designation of the Abbotsford Track as a National BMX Training Centre. Long-term plans envision a permanent year-round BMX training and competition track. To support preparations for the World Cup, Abbotsford will have opportunities to host Provincial and National Championships.

7 PROJECT TEAM

Host Organizing Society and Biographies

The Abbotsford BMX World Cup society will be established to take on the responsibility of organizing this event.

The Society will fulfill the following purposes:

- To prepare the formal bid for a BMX World Cup event in 2012
- To plan, manage and deliver a 2012 BMX World Cup and any other events or activities related to this event (subject to a successful bid);
- To maximize the economic impact to Abbotsford and the Fraser Valley as a result of these events;
- To establish a legacy from these events to benefit cycling within Abbotsford.
- To establish a legacy from these events for the general benefit of cycling in BC and Canada

- Previous to his current role he held the post of Executive Director with the British Columbia Soccer Association for four years where he managed a budget of \$4.5 million and led a team of 16 staff.
- Keith has extensive experience with International events and in 2004 launched a professional soccer event called the International Pacific Soccer Series.
- Keith has also been very successful in securing large sponsorship agreements with values between \$30,000 and \$1.4 million.

Plans for Recruiting Key Positions

The Board will review the proposed organizational charts and recommended staffing levels. Once these have been confirmed by the board key positions will be recruited as follows:

<u>Senior Volunteers (Committee Chairs)</u> – Recruitment will be managed by the Board through a process of identifying key community leaders with experience in related areas of responsibility and making individual requests for participation.

<u>Paid Staff</u> – The Board will ratify the decisions of the General Manager in the hiring of Board identified staff positions. Responding to a public call for employment, candidates will be considered based on major event experience and the ability to work well under pressure. Sport specific experience will be weighted according to the position.

<u>Event Volunteers</u> – Each Committee Chair will be responsible for identifying their specific volunteer team needs and working with the GM and the Volunteer chair will seek out their own team members.

8 FINANCIAL BUDGET & CASH FLOW

Budget Summary

To ensure the validity of the budgeting process, budgets and input from previous BMX World Cups as well as budget from other major events hosted in the region were compared, adjusted for the Abbotsford market and vetted by experienced major event planning specialists. This process led to the development of a budget in excess of

Revenues

Revenue opportunities fall into four main areas as described below:

Government/Public Agency Funding

At the municipal level, commitments in providing 1.5 acres of land (market value \$900,000) to build the competition venue and additional services (site preparation, staff assistance) and facilities (complimentary meeting space) are providing the organizing committee with approximately \$100,000 in value in kind services. Through Sport Canada and the Government of BC, funding applications, consistent with existing funding programs for hosting World Cup for Olympic sports is underway. Previous funding support for other World Cups events provide some guidance in our budget projections of \$237,500 (\$50,000 Federal, \$187,500 Provincial) from this source.

Registration Fees

The UCI provides 100% of the registration fees to the host organization. With 125 elite competitors expected this revenue is estimated at 20,000 CHF or \$21,000 CDN based on current exchange rates.

Ticketing

Due to the large competitive contingent and their accompanying support team (ie. most of the competitors travel with their family) a large portion of ticket sales is guaranteed. Our ticket prices will be comparable to ticket prices at the 2004 – 2006 Worlds. Based on UCI estimates we are estimating over 1500 spectators. The sport's current relatively low profile with the general population provides a caution to budget for low-ticket sales from the population at large.

Sponsorships/Merchandising

The proximity of the 2012 Olympic Games and the current economic climate will influence the amount of sponsorship revenue available for this event. Merchandise and Trade Booth sales are expected to be relatively strong for this type of event.

Expenses

The budget's expense side includes the following expense categories:

Executive

The major outlay in this section is the hosting rights fee due and payable to UCI prior to the event.

Finance & Administration

Staffing comprises the majority of this budget section.

Technology & Broadcasting

It is anticipated that a host broadcaster will be interested in managing the broadcast and production on our behalf without our need to cover full costs Consequentially, the budget contains Broadcasting support costs of \$50,000 based on previous bids to cover the 2007 World BMX Championships in Victoria. The balance of this budget section comprises costs for the Telecommunications, Scoreboards, Sound, and other related costs.

Sports

Anti doping and the majority of commissaries costs are mostly the responsibility of host organization. Our costs cover medical support costs (ie. Doctors, First Responders), event specific track equipment costs and other miscellaneous sport specific needs.

Venues

Venue costs are our largest single budget item. This includes three major components:

- Venue Construction –This track is considered the event's major legacy item as it will be designed to support National Team needs, future event hosting for local, regional, national and international events and local club use.
- Venue Overlay –The the provision of some additional seats has been secured by a sponsorship agreement with Fortis BC. Working with other major local events and local governments we are working on an arrangement that would see some of these seats purchased and left in the community as a legacy for future sporting and cultural event uses. The balance of these seats will be rented. This line item also includes expenses to return the site to its post event configuration.

Operations

The operations budget o includes security, transportation, materials management and accreditation support.

Volunteers

The budget includes funds to train, outfit and recognize our team of 100 volunteers.

Communications and Awareness

Included in the communication budget are items related to developing awareness of the event and ticket sales, media relations, the printing and publication of necessary materials like programs, tickets, posters, banners, signs, website development and hosting and other miscellaneous costs associated with the development and communication of our event brand.

Protocol, Ceremonies and Special Events

The hosting of VIPs, and the planning, preparation and delivery of opening, closing and awards ceremonies is a critical component of the event and includes a back drop that will include substantial recognition of Government and Corporate Partners.

Marketing and Selling Costs

A budget item has been established to support the generation of sponsorship, ticketing and merchandise sales.

Contingency

A 5% operating contingency has been allocated.

Reporting procedure & controls

Cycling BC is underwriting the initial support for this event and as a result managing the budget and tracking and paying approved expense items.

Meeting the UCI Hosting Requirements

The hosting requirements specified by the UCI are outlined in the UCI's BMX Organization Guide. These two documents provide the direction required to develop and host the actual operation of the sporting component of the event. The event marketing and promotion and the development of value added activities and services, as part of the Worlds is the responsibility of the host society. The contract and guide provide minor guidance in these areas.

The key requirements imposed by UCI in hosting a BMX World Cup include:

- The final competition timetable must be agreed to by the UCI
- The host society must provide appropriate trophies for top placements in each category.
- Video Screen
- Start/Finish Line Archways
- TV Camera Platforms
- + 150 Room Nights for the Rights Holder (GSX)
- Local Sponsorship agreements to be submitted to GSX/UCI before final approval
- Production of an official poster and an official program
- Insurance coverage
- A competition venue
- Event services areas including:
 - Accreditation Centre
 - Registration room
 - Race Headquarters
 - Race Administration Office
 - Commissaires Room
 - Team Manager Meeting Room
 - VIP Area

Facility and Track Development Plan

The Abbotsford Track has all the major facility components in place to host a BMX World Cup. This includes a new Supercross Start Hill partially funded by B2Ten and paved corners which were funded by the BMX community.

Accommodation Plan

It is anticipated that in excess of 2000 people will travel to Abbotsford as a result of the World Cup. The average length of stay during the event is anticipated to be 5 days with many of these people staying in the region for personal enjoyment and exploration for upwards of another week. BMX cycling enjoys a rich tradition of families within a region travelling from event to event with their own recreational vehicle; as such an important part of the accommodation plan for these people is access to campground facilities.

Communication Plan – External

To build awareness and ticket sales, an external communication plan will be developed that comprises elements focused on the following audiences:

Sport

- The National Sport Federations from participating countries and their riders and families
- Provincial and State (United States) Sport Federations and their riders and families
- BMX Clubs (riders and families) in Canada and the United States

Media

- Canadian national and regional Sport Media in general
- American regional Sport Media in general
- National and International sport media with specific Cycling or BMX interest

General Public

General awareness campaign for Island, Provincial and Regional publics

The plan's key messages will include the following themes:

- BMX is a fast, exciting sport with spills and thrills
- BMX is enjoyed by all ages from 5 to 55
- BMX is one of the newest Olympic sports (part of the 2012 Summer Olympics)
- The UCI BMX World Cup features the best riders in the World

The communications plan will feature a multi-lingual website with downloadable information to assist in the travel, accommodation and hospitality of our visitors. The URL, will be secured in the event of a successful bid,

The development of an event logo consistent with UCI standards has been completed and confirmed by the UCI Management Committee. This logo will be featured on all of our communication pieces and promotional activities.

Additional delivery vehicles under consideration for the plan include a short promotional video, posters, a countdown newsletter, key banners and signage along streets and highways, earned media and bought media and direct marketing activities.

A complete communications plan is currently under development and will be forwarded upon completion.

Communication Plan – Internal

Internal communications, those made available to event participants, will include:

Athletes & Coaches

- Moto and race notice boards for posting moto sheets, results and other relevant information for the athletes and coaches.
- Mailboxes each team will have a mailbox for distribution of notices, meeting information, start lists, results and other relevant information
- Team Manager meetings daily briefings with team managers will be conducted

 Signage – appropriate signage, both informational and directional, that ensures riders and coaches are familiar with how to get around the site and get to the areas they need for various activities from accreditation to medals ceremonies.

Spectators

- Announcer the announcer is the main link between the spectator and the event activities.
- Video screen a large scale video screen will serve as the point of information for spectators to see start lists, results and instant replays (during championship races)
- Event program an event program will be produced that describes the sport and its history, provides profiles on top competitors, describes the intricacies of the sport and any other information relevant to their understanding and enjoyment of the event.

Transportation Plan

This event will attract upwards of 2000 visitors to Abbotsford from those directly connected to the event. A larger number these folks travelling from Western Canadian and the North and Western States are expected to arrive by vehicle and many of these will be travelling in an RV.

Security Plan

Security for this event is minimal. The athletes, officials, UCI family do not require any security for their activities. Security for the event site will include access control teams during event times and overnight site security to protect the venue from possible vandalism or inappropriate use.

Timing and Results Plan

The UCI/GSX operates its own timing and results system for the World Cups and is responsible for the people who operate it and the equipment needed to operate it.

A minimum of one large video projection screen will be installed in the stadium and in part will be used to communicate start lists, unofficial finish placements and final results. The screen(s) will also accommodate live video feeds of the races as provided by the broadcaster.

Volunteer Plan

It is anticipated that over 100 volunteers will be needed to support this event. Hours of operation of the event can reach 15 hours on some days and therefore volunteers will be working in shifts throughout the day.

Volunteers will be recruited both through the existing local sport system as well as more globally in the region through a general call for volunteers.

Volunteers will be supported with general event and task specific training, team uniforms, and a recognition program, including a final wrap-up social event.

Media Support Plan

Our media team will comprise an Event Press Officer and a UCI Press Coordinator as well as additional media team volunteers. The UCI/GSX Press Coordinator will be responsible for publishing official photos, results and reports and who will act as the link between the Organizing Committee and the UCI in all media related issues. The Press Officer will operate the media room, arrange and run press conferences, write and issue stories and contact the media as necessary to increase interest in the event.

Our media room will provide attending accredited media with full access and services to support them in researching, writing and filing their stories. A separate area will be established for the daily UCI Media Conference. A post race interview area will also be established near the finish line.

Photographers and broadcasters will be provided with competition area access in designated areas through the use and distribution of bibs.

Broadcasting Plan

UCI retains exclusive worldwide broadcasting rights to the event. The host organization has the option to pay for production costs in exchange for the Standard TV rights for Canada.

Medical Response Plan

All medical facilities will be available during official practice times and the competitions. At least one, but preferable two, licensed physicians will be present and available at the track at all times during practice and competitions. A Red Cross team will provide First Aid, and injured riders will be treated in the triage area to be located in the Bear Mountain Arena. An evacuation plan will be in place to support the needs of more seriously injured athletes. This plan will include support from two ambulances stationed at the site at all times during training and competition times.

A separate Red Cross team will circulate the event site to care for spectators and volunteers in need of medical assistance.

Anti-Doping Plan

In July 2004, UCI became compliant with IOC/WADA international anti-doping standards and all of their World Cup events fall under these testing requirements. For the BMX Worlds UCI will be responsible for the appointment of the Anti-Doping inspector and the costs of tests. The organizing committee will appoint an assistant inspector to act as the liaison between the organizing committee and the inspector and to assist the UCI Antidoping Inspector throughout the entire event. The UCI is also responsible for notifying all member countries about the Anti-Doping program in effect for the event.

Riders will be made aware that they must bring their license with them when they are drug tested. Riders to be drug tested will be chaperoned at the finish line by a specially designated person. Riders will be made aware that, according to UCI rules, a positive result will be noted if the rider is not present for his/her test, and that it is their responsibility to check if they have been appointed to be drug tested.

Anti-Doping facilities

Facilities for this program are secured within the Agrifair complex and will include 3 separate areas as follows:

<u>Waiting room</u> - furnished with drinks, TV, magazines, books, and comfortable seats. <u>Changing/Bathroom</u> – with separate men's and women's toilets for taking the samples and a shower or washbasin.

Administration room - with two desks, a phone &/or radio handset and electrical outlets

Risk Management Plan in case of Doping Infraction

Doping tests in this discipline involve a 2-week turn-around on results. As a result doping infractions will be announced by the UCI and will affect the nation and rider affected. The event will be well over by that point and the event organizer will not be involved in the notification and announcement processes.

Ticketing Plan

The competitor's travelling companions, family and friends purchase the greatest majority of tickets. Because of this our ticket strategy will fall in line with traditional World Cup ticket prices:

Event Tickets for non-locals will be offered directly from the event website and available at the venue on the event days. Additionally, we will work to develop ticket promotions that provide local citizens with the opportunity to purchase tickets at reduced prices through the retail outlets of the partner and/or sponsor.

Entertainment Plan

As a sport, high-energy, knowledgeable announcers provide much of the feel at a BMX event. We will secure the services of top announcers and build our event entertainment to complement these people. The nature of the sport means there are predictable breaks between rounds of competition and during these breaks we have high-energy, extreme entertainment activities taking place. Activities under contemplation include other X-Sport demonstrations like Skateboard half-pipe, BMX freestyle, and King of the mountain bike jumping.

Ceremonies Plan

BMX is considered an extreme sport and as such our ceremonies plan will use ideas from the "extreme" world and will incorporate the "feel" of the World Cup event we are hosting. There are three types of ceremonies to be held during the event as follows:

Opening Ceremonies

Features an introduction of the participating countries, words of welcome from the host organization and the UCI and appropriate entertainment indicative of the host region.

Medal Ceremonies

Medal ceremonies will take place on a dedicated stage located at one end of the stadium. These ceremonies will provide opportunities for VIPs and sponsor representatives with visible opportunities to be involved in the event. Trophies and awards will reflect a uniquely British Columbian image, object or representation.

Closing Ceremonies

Traditionally low scale, these ceremonies will draw an exciting conclusion to the event and invite everyone to participate in other BMX events.

Sponsorship Plan

The host organization is responsible for developing its own sponsorship program and can secure any local sponsors that do not conflict with the UCI's Presenting and Main sponsors.

Accreditation Plan

All athletes, coaches, officials, media and VIPs register directly with UCI through and existing web based application. The on-site system will provide options for late accreditations of VIPs and media (athletes and coaches must all be pre-registered) and for making changes to existing accreditations.

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Executive Summary

The following analysis provides an estimate of the tourism economic impact of competitors (and the family and friends who accompanied them to) the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships held in Colwood, B.C. from July 26 to July 29, 2007 as generated by the Sport Tourism Economic Assessment Model.

The 2007 UCI BMX World Championships is a participant driven event, with a much larger economic impact attributed to participants and "accompanying spectators" (people who come with competitors, media, coaches, and officials) than "regular" spectators. A questionnaire was given to each of the 1495 competitors via their registration package. The questionnaire solicited information about the competitor and their traveling party regarding their place of origin, the size of the traveling party, their main mode of travel to Victoria, the length of stay in Canada and in Victoria, and the type accommodation and length of stay in that accommodation in the Victoria area. Similar questionnaires were distributed to media, coaches, officials and VIPs.

Canadian competitors made up the largest team, accounting for almost one-third of people entered in the Championships. The USA sent the second largest contingent - one out of every five competitors. A sizeable contingent (210 competitors) came from Latin America; the Columbian team was the largest from that region (49 competitors). France (73 racers) and the Netherlands (60 racers) were the largest European representatives.

The 2007 BMX World Championships were a major success, making a substantial economic contribution to Victoria. Direct spending is estimated at \$5.2m. This resulted in \$5.1m of direct, indirect and induced impact on GDP across the province as a whole, \$3.7m of that accruing to Victoria. The total impact on Industry output is estimated at \$8.1m in Victoria plus an additional \$3.1m in the rest of B.C. This level of economic impact supported 122 jobs (but not full-time equivalent jobs) in Victoria, paying \$2.8m in wages and salaries, and another 31 jobs (paying \$0.8m in wages and salaries) elsewhere in the province. Total tax revenue at federal, provincial and municipal levels of government amounted to \$2.4m.

1.0 Background

The 2007 UCI BMX World Championships were held in Colwood, B.C. between July 26th and July 29th, 2007. This annual event, last held in Sao Paulo, Brazil in 2006 and in Paris, France in 2005. The Brazil competition attracted over 1200 competitors from 37 countries ranging in ages from six to sixty. Paris saw almost 2400 competitors from 36 nations. Results from the 2007 event were used to determine qualifying points towards the sport's Olympic debut at the 2008 Beijing Games.

The Championships are distinctive in the sporting world because of their youth and family orientation. The 2007 event, as in the past, encompassed both elite level and challenge level competitions. As a result it drew a high proportion of challenge competitors aged 16 or younger and in many instances more than one family member competed in the championships among the different classes.

These features contribute to the participant-driven nature of the event, that is, competitors and the people accompanying them to the event. The economic impact of competitors and the people in their traveling parties (referred to as "accompanying" spectators), far exceeds the economic impact of spectators who do not have a direct connection to competitors (referred to as "regular" spectators). Therefore the focus of the research on which this report is based was participants – competitors and the accompanying spectators - as defined above.

Royal Roads University was asked: (i) to act as project manager and (ii) to develop and implement a methodology to assess the tourism economic impact. Royal Roads worked on this project in partnership with the B.C. Ministry of Tourism, Sports and the Arts (MTSA), Tourism BC and the Westshore Economic Development Association (WEDA).

The following section (Section 2) describes the survey methodology employed to collect data on competitors and accompanying spectators who attended the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships. Section 3 summarizes the characteristics of these groups. Capital and Operational expenditures of running the event are discussed in Section 4. In Section 5, the data gathered are used to generate an estimate of the economic impact of the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships using the STEAM model developed by the Canadian Sport Tourism Alliance (CSTA). Section 6 concludes the study. Additional information about the traveling parties is reported in Appendix 1 at the end of this report. The survey instrument is detailed in Appendix 2.



2.0 Project Methodology

The 2007 UCI BMX World Championships is a participant driven event, with a much larger economic impact attributed to participants and "accompanying spectators" than "regular" spectators. The survey methodology that was used canvassed the whole population of participants rather than drawing a random sample from the list people who registered as competitors. The major factor in choosing to distribute a self-completion questionnaire rather than conduct intercept interviews was the fact that registration data indicated that 54% of competitors were under sixteen years of age. Research ethics dictated that competitors aged 15 years or younger could not be approached unless an accompanying adult was present. This restriction would have seriously limited the feasibility of conducting intercept interviews of young competitors. By contrast, given the family oriented nature of the event, it was quite feasible to ask competitors aged 15 years or younger to have an accompanying adult complete the questionnaire with them.

Distributing a self-completion questionnaire also helped to address the possibility of repeat sampling of different members of a single traveling party over the course of a multi-day event. These problems were acute at the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships because multiple members of a family could be competing in the Challenge classes. Since information on travel patterns (mode of travel and length of stay for example) is gathered on the basis of traveling party (defined as family and friends accompanying the competitor), not individuals, the introductory letter asked competitors to return only one questionnaire per traveling party to avoid double counting.

Another advantage of the self-completion format is the opportunity to provide the questionnaire in more than one language. With competitors from 39 countries, it would be prohibitively costly to cater for every possibility regardless of whether an interview or questionnaire approach was taken. Table 1 below shows the distribution of languages amongst the competitors.

Spanish speakers made up almost 15% of the total number of competitors. This made translation of the questionnaire and the introductory letter into Spanish a priority. While competitors from France made up only 5% of the total population, the percentage of Francophones was higher due to sizable contingents from Quebec, and potentially others

¹ The number of French speakers listed in Table 1 is likely to understate the true number Francophones (as explained in the text. Therefore the figure in Table 1 is an estimate of the "lower limit" of French speakers. As a result, the number of English speakers is a slight over-estimate as it includes Francophone Canadians. from multilingual Belgium and Switzerland. As a result, and because of Canada's official bilingualism, a French translation was also made available.

A questionnaire was given to each of the 1495 competitors via their registration package: 1203 in the Challenge classes and 292 in the Elite classes. The questionnaire solicited information about the competitor and their traveling party regarding their place of origin, the size of the traveling party, their main mode of travel to Victoria, the length of stay in Canada and in Victoria, and the type accommodation and length of stay in that accommodation in the Victoria area. The Spanish version was distributed to all participants from Latin America and Spain. French versions were distributed to competitors that a French version was attached advising Canadian and Swiss competitors that a French version was available at the main entrance where the questionnaires were to be dropped off.

Drop boxes for completed questionnaires were available at the main entry to the venue on the two practice days preceding the Championships and on the four race days. Copies of the questionnaire, in English, Spanish and French, were available at the drop-off desk at the main entry so competitors could complete them on the spot. Returning a questionnaire made the competitor eligible for a prize draw.

Similar questionnaires soliciting information about the traveling parties accompanying media, officials and VIPs were distributed through a number of outlets: at team manager meetings; via notice boxes for team officials; at the registration centre; hand-outs by volunteers in the VIP lounge; and, in the media centre. Spanish and French were made available at all distribution points. Drop boxes were available at these distribution points for completed questionnaires.



3.0 Visitor Profiles

The focus of the study was on competitors and accompanying spectators because the project's stakeholders had concluded that the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships was a participant-driven event (see, for example, the Economic Impact Forecast conducted prior to the Championships). Tourism economic impacts are generated largely through "bed nights" in paid accommodation, and meals eaten away from home. The Economic Impact Forecast suggested that the vast majority of competitors and accompanying spectators were likely to spend at least one night away from home in order to attend the competition. Regular spectators were expected to be largely drawn from the local population of Southern Vancouver Island. For those who live locally, any spending on the event displaces spending they would make in the region regardless of the presence of the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships.

Information on the number of registered competitors, and media, coaches, officials and VIPs, was provided by the event's organizing committee.

3.1 Competitors

Registration data provided by the event organizers showed a total of 1675 racers were registered for the Challenge classes (Standard and Cruiser). A further 423 racers were registered in the Elite classes. However analysis of the registration data showed these figures were deceptive, as individuals could register in more than one class of racing, e.g. both Standard and Cruiser classes, or Elite and Elite Cruiser classes. Competitors did not compete in both Challenge and Elite competitions. Eliminating the multiple registrations, revealed that 1495 distinctive competitors were registered for the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships in Victoria.

Canadian competitors made up the largest team, accounting for almost one-third of people entered in the Championships. The USA, where BMX originated, sent the second largest contingent - one out of every five competitors. A sizeable contingent (210 competitors) came from Latin America; the Columbian team was the largest from that region (49 competitors) – see table A.1 in Appendix 1 for full details by country. France (73 racers) and the Netherlands (60 racers) were the largest European representatives. The sport is also very popular in Australasia², and access to the West Coast across the

² Australia and New Zealand.

Pacific along with Australia's host country status for the 2009 Championships, drew 68 Australian and 42 New Zealand riders to Victoria.

Victoria is a distinctive venue for an international sports event because of its island location. Access to the city and the Championship venue is very difficult on a "day trip" basis, with almost anyone attending from outside of lower Southern Vancouver Island likely needing to stay overnight in the Victoria area. This would be true in particular for competitors who required an early start to practice and to race on competition days. As a result, almost 100% of competitors (and accompanying spectators) were expected to be spending at least one night away from home in the Victoria area (made up of eight municipalities: Victoria, Colwood, Langford, Metchosin, Esquimalt, View Royal, Saanich, and Sidney).

A total of 331 competitor questionnaires were returned, of which 28 were deemed incomplete or duplicates from a traveling party. The 303 valid returns contain information about 1245 individuals from an estimated total population of 3933 competitors and accompanying spectators, which gives the study a confidence interval of 2.3% (19 times out of 20).

Competitors from 22 of the 39 countries represented at the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships returned questionnaires. The majority of returns were from Canada and the USA, which is not surprising since these two countries had by far the highest levels of participation at the Championships. Seven countries from Latin America were represented in the returns, as well as nine European countries and four from other parts of the world. This wide geographic spread of returns means that the sample is likely to represent the mix of competitors who have traveled to Victoria, and validated the effort to translate the questionnaire into Spanish and French.

3.2 Accompanying Spectators

Accompanying spectators are the family members and friends who have traveled to the event with the competitors. The questionnaire surveyed competitors about both the total party size and the number of competitors and officials (coaches, media, etc.) in their party. Party members who are not competitors or event officials are deemed accompanying spectators. The average number of accompanying spectators per traveling party from the survey is used to estimate the total number of accompanying spectators. **Table 4: Estimate of the Number of Accompanying Spectators**

3.3 Media, Coaches, Officials and VIPs

The logistics of organizing a major international sporting event depends on the efforts of a large number of people. At the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships, 494 people were officially registered by the Union Cycliste Internationale (UCI) under categories that included media, coaches, officials and VIPs. While a higher proportion of these people came from the Victoria area (especially media and event organizers) compared to competitors and accompanying spectators, coaches and officials from the 39 participating countries contribute a highly diverse group.

Sixty-two valid questionnaires were returned by media, coaches, officials and VIPs from 20 different countries. The information gathered represented the travel details of 272 individuals out of an estimated total of 713 people accounted for in the traveling parties that included at least one person who was registered as media, coaches, officials and

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VIPs.³ This gives a confidence interval of 4.7% (19 time out of 20). **4.0 Capital and Operating Expenditure**

The Victoria BMX 2007 World Championship Society was established to organize and host the Championships. The Society's accounts showed capital expenditures of \$370,881 and operating expenditures of \$633,319. In addition, the Society received donated land for the venue, valued at \$900,000, and volunteer labour time to run the event, for which no specific monetary value is estimated. Food and labour were also donated from various sponsors for the VIP lounge. However, the value in kind donations are not included in the expenditure figures – estimates of GDP for example only include the value of market transactions. Therefore the direct operating and capital expenditures for the 2007 UCI BMX 2007 World Championships is \$1,004,200, which resulted in indirect and induced expenditures that are estimated by the STEAM model and reported below.

³ The low number of accompanying spectators per party reflects the fact that many media, coaches, officials and VIPs traveled to Victoria on their own, or in the company of other competitors, media, coaches, officials and VIPs.



5.0 Results

The economic impact of the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships was estimated using the STEAM model developed by the Canadian Sport Tourism Alliance (CSTA). The model uses expenditure data from Statistics Canada⁴ and parameters estimated through data collected by the questionnaire survey⁵ to estimate direct, indirect spending and induced economic impact that resulted from holding the event in Victoria.⁶ The overall economic impact of the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships is summarized in Table 7 (see Appendix 2 for a glossary of terms used by the STEAM Model).

The impact on GDP (direct, indirect and induced) was estimated to be \$5.1 million across the province as a whole, and \$3.7 million in Victoria. Industry output was estimated at \$11.2 million for BC and \$8.1 million in Victoria. Spending by competitors and accompanying spectators and by the organizing committee supported the equivalent of 153 jobs across BC, 122 of those in Victoria, paying \$3.6 and \$2.8 million in wages and salaries respectively. The 2007 BMX World Championships also generated \$2.4 million in federal, provincial and municipal taxes.

⁶ Results from the STEAM model are based on using Victoria as the event's site, though the venue was in Colwood. This is because many of the competitors and their accompanying parties stayed in paid accommodation across the Victoria area's different municipalities. Using Colwood as the event site in the STEAM Model does not substantially change the results, and the exact district within which the venue is located is not the crucial factor in estimating sport tourism impacts. Other studies of sport tourism economic impact use the widely known "city" name to connote an event's location.

5.0 Conclusions

The 2007 UCI BMX World Championships were a major success. Anecdotal evidence, from comments made by competitors around the venue, suggests that the competitors were very happy with the venue and the organization of the event. The UCI President said "Victoria took it to the highest levels in staging the 2007 Worlds." The event leaves a major legacy to the community: a brand new BMX track, rated as one of the best and most technically challenging in North America and by far the best in Canada, which is valued at between \$350,000 - \$400,000 (cash and value-in-kind).

Equally importantly, the 2007 UCI BMX World Championships made a substantial economic contribution to Victoria through the spending of competitors and their accompanying spectators, and the capital and operational expenditures of the organizing committee. Direct spending is estimated at \$5.2m. This resulted in \$5.1m of direct, indirect and induced impact on GDP across the province as a whole, \$3.7m of that accruing to Victoria.

The total impact on Industry output is estimated at \$8.1m in Victoria plus an additional \$3.1m in the rest of B.C. This level of economic impact supported 122 jobs (but not fulltime equivalent jobs) in Victoria, paying \$2.8m in wages and salaries, and another 31 jobs (paying \$0.8m in wages and salaries) elsewhere in the province. Total tax revenue at federal, provincial and municipal levels of government amounted to \$2.4m.

Appendix 2: Glossary of Terms used by STEAM



CSC-2013-00033 Page 89 **Initial Expenditure -** This figure indicates the amount of initial expenditures or revenue used in the analysis. This heading indicates not only the total magnitude of the spending but also the region in which it was spent (thus establishing the "impact" region).

Direct Impact - Relates ONLY to the impact on "front-line" businesses. These are businesses that initially receive the operating revenue or tourist expenditures for the project under analysis. From a business perspective, this impact is limited only to that particular business or group of businesses involved. From a tourist spending perspective, this can include all businesses such as hotels, restaurants, retail stores, transportation carriers, attraction facilities and so forth.

Indirect Impact - Refers to the impacts resulting from all intermediate rounds of production in the supply of goods and services to industry sectors identified in the direct impact phase. An example of this would be the supply and production of bed sheets to a hotel.

Induced Impact - These impacts are generated as a result of spending by employees (in the form of consumer spending) and businesses (in the form of investment) who benefited either directly or indirectly from the initial expenditures under analysis. An example of induced consumer spending would be the impacts generated by hotel employees on typical consumer items such as groceries, shoes, cameras, etc.. An example of induced business investment would be the impacts generated by the spending of retained earnings, attributable to the expenditures under analysis, on machinery and equipment.

Gross Domestic Product (GDP) - This figure represents the total value of production of goods and services in the economy resulting from the initial expenditure under analysis (valued at market prices).

NOTE: The multiplier (A), Total/Initial, represents the total (direct, indirect and induced) impact on GDP for every dollar of direct GDP. This is a measure of the level of spin-off activity generated as a result of a particular project. For instance if this multiplier is 1.5 then this implies that for every dollar of GDP directly generated by "front-line" tourism businesses an additional \$0.50 of GDP is generated in spin-off activity (e.g., suppliers).

The multiplier (B), Total/\$ Expenditure, represent the total (direct, indirect and induced) impact on GDP for every dollar of expenditure (or revenue from a business perspective). This is a measure of how effective project related expenditures translate into GDP for the province (or region). Depending upon the level of expenditures, this multiplier ultimately determines the overall level of net economic activity associated with the project. To take an example, if this multiplier is 1.0, this means that for every dollar of expenditure, one dollar of total GDP is generated. The magnitude of this multiplier is influenced by the level of withdrawals, or imports, necessary to sustain both production and final demand requirements. The less capable a region or province is at fulfilling all necessary production and final demand requirements, all things being equal, the lower the eventual economic impact will be.



GDP (at factor cost) - This figure represents the total value of production of goods and services produced by industries resulting from the factors of production. The distinction to GDP (at market prices) is that GDP (at factor cost) is less by the amount of indirect taxes plus subsidies.

GDP (at factor cost) - This figure represents the total value of production of goods and services produced by industries resulting from the factors of production. The distinction to GDP (at market prices) is that GDP (at factor cost) is less by the amount of indirect taxes plus subsidies.

Employment - Depending upon the selection of employment units (person-years or equivalent full-year jobs) these figures represent the employment generated by the initial expenditure. These figures distinguish between the direct, indirect and induced impact. "Equivalent Full-Year Jobs", if selected, include both part-time and full-time work in ratios consistent with the specific industries.

NOTE: The multiplier (B) is analogous to Multiplier (B) described earlier with the exception being that employment values are represented per \$1,000,000 of spending rather than per dollar of spending. This is done to alleviate the problem of comparing very small numbers that would be generated using the traditional notion of a multiplier (i.e. employment per dollar of initial expenditure).

Industry Output - These figures represent the direct & indirect and total impact (including induced impacts) on industry output generated by the initial tourism expenditure. It should be noted that the industry output measure represents the **sum** total of all economic activity that has taken place and consequently involve double counting on the part of the intermediate production phase. Since the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) figure includes only the **net** total of all economic activity (i.e. considers only the value added), the industry output measure will always exceed or at least equal the value of GDP.

Taxes - These figures represent the amount of taxes contributed to municipal, provincial and federal levels of government relating to the project under analysis. This information is broken down by the direct indirect and induced impacts.

Imports - These figures indicate the direct, indirect and induced final demand and intermediate production requirements for imports both outside the province and internationally.

I need some counsel.

Unless I am very much mistaken, it appears as though the Government of BC is about to decline any meaningful level of funding for the BMX World Cup in September and as as result I am faced with the very real prospect cancelling this event as well as the 2013 event for which we just secured the rights. As we anticipate they will also decline funding of the Mountain Bike World Cup, we will also have to decline the opportunity to host this event which has been presented to us by our international federation.

It seems as though enhanced sport hosting revenue is available under only very special circumstances and not necessarily based the previously communicated metrics. Based on the most recent email from Doug Wrean with Sport Branch, it feels like the goal posts are moving constantly to suit the ministry's position that our BMX and Mountain Bike events should not be funded.

For funding the Davis Cup tie for \$100,000, they argue that it has a great National and International audience. (They also made their funding decision for this event in less than 3 months from start to finish).For the Canada Cup Wheelchair Rugby (75,000 plus \$50k from gaming), they argue that its a Para Sport, for the Olympic Soccer Qualifier (\$250,000) they argue that its revenue positive and benefits PAVCO. Not too mention, \$300k for Canadian Special Olympics in 2014, \$2million for one venue of the Womens World Cup, \$1 million for the 2007 U20 World Cup (500k Victoria/500k Burnaby), and \$550 k for the Grey Cup festival.

All these events are great and they all deserved the funding they received, I am just not sure what I do to have cycling considered in the same context.

I have to make a decision on the 2012 BMX event in the next few days and it looks like cancellation is the only option. Of course, if I do cancel, it will end any chance of hosting events under the UCI (our international federation) for many years to come as the cancellation of this event will cause them tremendous embarrassment.

In my discussions with Warren Hansen of the Canadian Curling Association, he indicated that it would take a commitment of \$250,000 to \$300,000 from the Province to ensure the Event would be held in Kamloops. From that information, we approached our Kamloops MLA's and met with Terry Lake. He advised that there was funding available through Ida Chong's Ministry and through BCLC of \$150,000 and \$100,000 respectively. Without funding of this level, it would be very difficult to complete this bid.

That said, I contacted Warren Hansen, CCA's Director of Event Operations, and he provided these comments:

"If we can everything moving in the right direction with Kamloops we would probably agree in the spring that the event will go there and we will start to put all of the necessary agreements in place. We would hope to have all of this done by October and make the official announcement in either October or November."

Hi Bruce/Doug,

I hope your summer has been a good one.

August has zipped by and we are now just 2 weeks from hosting the worlds best BMX athletes and all the associated media.

I recently provided an email update to David Galbriath and Minister Chong and noted that notable media outlets such as ESPN have already been accredited for the event. The bulk of the Olympians have booked their flights and accommodation and will start arriving next weekend. Several of the Olympians are being scheduled for live interviews on CTV, CBC and Global over the next two weeks. International broadcasters such as the BBC will be tracking the success of TEAM GB who are sending 4 athletes.

We will also be contracting the deployment of the Provincial Government's Mobile Medical Unit (<u>http://www2.news.gov.bc.ca/news_releases_2009-2013/2011HLTH0056-000985.htm</u>). This will be the unit's first deployment at a major sports event since the 2010 Winter Games. In addition, we have also contracted directly with BC Ambulance for 13 paramedics. one ambulance, one gator, a communications officer and logistic support person. The collective cost of the medical expenditures alone will be easily in excess of \$60,000. The overall budget of the event is closer to \$380,000.

Your last email expected that you would provide me a response by mid August and our telephone conversation in early July provided some hope that there was at least some support for this event within the Ministry. I truly recognize that BMX might not have the comfortable feel of Tennis or other very "main stream" sports but none the less BMX is an Olympic sport in which BC and Canada has a very bright future. We very much need your support.

My email to the Minister was appreciative of the all the support we receive from the Provincial Government but it also says that this level of event is not viable without the assistance of the Provincial Government. We by no means expect the Provincial Government to provide the majority of funding for the event but the funding is as essential to this event as it is to a Davis Cup event and the Canada Cup Wheel Chair Rugby. These events received \$100,000 and \$75,000 respectively.


As mentioned in my previous email we intend to bid for either the 2015 (July) or 2016 (May) BMX World Championships at BC Place. A event of this level at BC Place would demonstrate once again the versatility of BC Place and be a great asset to the event because provides the option of closing the roof in wet weather conditions. If our bid is successful we would host a World Cup at BC Place in the preceding year (2014?) at BC Place. The retractable roof would the flexibility to host the event at a time when BC Place would not normally be booked for another event. A World Championship in BC Place would attract over 1500 athletes alone and generate a direct spend in excess of \$5 million.

There is so much to celebrate through this event. The construction of a world class facility (see attached computer graphic), the partnership with the City of Abbotsford, and the use of legacy equipment from the 2010 Games. I hope to hear from you very soon regarding funding for what will be a great World Cup event.

2012 Request

Our most urgent funding request is for the 2012 World Cup BMX event in Abbotsford We have asked for a much smaller amount (\$180k) for this event even though it is a World Cup

The Economic Impact estimates are based on the International and National spend and not based on the spending on BC residents.

Looking at possible solutions - Cycling BC created a separate society when we built the facility and secured bid funding from the Provincial Government to secure rights to host the 2012 BMX World Cup event. We applied for a small gaming grant for a large cycling festival component of the event perhaps this application could be given the fullest of consideration. Access to the festival is free of charge and includes a free music component, bike demonstrations, kids skills park, kids racing, etc.

A Few Key Points

90% of all athletes, coaches and support are from out of country The World Cup will be revenue positive for the BC Government through PST We intend use **BC Place** as host venue for a bid for the 2016 BMX World Championships (May 2016) The BMX world cup has a national and global audience similar to that of the Davis Cup

My sincerest apologies of our application is out of sync with the wishes/needs of the ministry - it was never meant to create problems. The BC Hosting Grant program seemed to encourage bids for World Cups and when we received the bid funding we pursued the event and raised the \$200k for the construction of the BMX Supercross Track. As well, all the post 2010 communication from Legacies 2010 et all seemed to indicate a strong support for hosting this level of event especially when tourism is a major component. So once again, my sincerest apologies.

Tx for the note. David's recent e-mail to you said:

"But I am aware of the time pressure you are under and, in the interest of fairness, have to advise you that the \$470 K you have requested for the 2013 UCI Mountain Bike World Cup greatly exceeds the amount of funding the Ministry has available to allocate to "mid-sized" events this fiscal year. Further, a number of sports are seeking funding or additional funding for mid-sized events right now".

I would expect that this is likely what the Minister will indicate: that regardless of the merits of your event (which are numerous) the Ministry simply does not have this amount of funding (\$470 K) available.

We appreciate the effort you/Cycling BC are going to in explaining the economic and other benefits of cycling events. In these days of tight financial resources this is important. But not simple. In making business case arguments the Ministry completely ignores all spending by BC residents – we assume this would take place anyway. We just count the out-of-province stuff. It isn't always easy to make this distinction, but it is critical. With respect to the size of your request, I thought you should be aware of its size relative to other assistance which we have been able to provide in recent years.

- \$2 M for 2015 Women's World Cup of Soccer revenue positive to the Province (including benefit to Pavco). It took us more than a year to secure this funding.
- \$300 K for Special Olympics this is the event related portion and relates to two events, both key in disability sport.
- \$250 K for CONCACAF Women's Olympic Soccer Qualifier again revenue positive to the Province (including benefit to Pavco).
- \$100 K for Davis Cup an enormously visible event nationally and internationally.

Relatively speaking yours is a very large request – the annual allocation for mid-sized events is \$500 K. To obtain larger amounts (i.e. from central government) generally takes a robust, revenue-positive business case and many months (minimum six in our experience).

Dear Doug/Bruce,

David had mentioned in his last email that that a notification of funding was forthcoming and was a possibility for last week. I am wondering whether you can provide an update. We were delighted to be awarded \$5000 two years ago to try and secure the rights to the event and we are excited about the prospect of organizing a great event. For a variety of reasons expressed in previous emails we feel this event provides the the Government of British Columbia the maximum return on investment. The event is already generating great media exposure for all the stakeholders in sport (Provincial Government, BC Sport Agency, etc). Most recently we secured some great media exposure as a result of our ribbon cutting event which formally opened the facility. In addition to a sports segment on the Global News we secured a 5 minute interview on the Global News. The interview provided me with an opportunity to highlight the continued support provided by the provincial government to the sport of Cycling:

Jay Janower "When you look at other sports that get government funding, I think BMX has to be near the bottom" Keith Ryan "We are really changing that and the Provincial Government have been just awesome with the sport of cycling"

Global BC dominates the news rating. A quick glance at core news viewers the A25-54 (M-F) numbers:

- Morning News with Steve Darling and Sophie Lui surged ahead of its closest competitor, Citytv's Breakfast Television by 300%
- The audience for Noon News with Sophie Lui and Jay Durant was 15 times higher than CTV Noon News
- Early News with Deborra Hope stayed ahead of CTV News at 5pm by 271%
- News Hour with Chris Gailus outperformed CTV News at 6 by 264%
- News Hour Final with Randene Neill and Squire Barnes surpassed CTV Late News by 158%
- The audience for Weekend News Hour with Robin Stickley was 363% higher than CTV Evening News Weekend
- News Final with Anne Drewa bested CTV Late News by 191%

Radio and local print media provided great exposure the week of the ribbon cutting including on on-air radio interview during the morning commute. The Abbotsford Times quoted Cycling BC in its article:

"Securing the rights to host this great event for a second year was made possible because of the amazing support received from the City of Abbotsford and the provincial government," said Keith Ryan, CEO for Cycling BC.

This past weekend was another great weekend for British Columbia on the international stage. British Columbian's took to the podium once again in both Cross Country and Downhill. I am pleased to report that Catharine Pendrel won the New York leg of the World Cup and as a result has locked up the overall World Cup title for 2012. While, Steve Smith (age 21) from Nanaimo finished won Silver at the downhill event - currently ranked 6th in the world; this result will vault him up the World Cup standings.

As further proof that the popularity of cycling is at an all time high in Canada and BC, a nationwide poll conducted by CBCSPORTS.CA concluded this past weekend and proclaimed <u>Catherine as the people's choice</u> to be flag bearer at the 2012 Olympic Games. Catharine beat out Canadian greats such as Simon Whitfield, Christine Sinclair, and Adam Van Koeverden. Here is what the CBC had to say about the results of the poll:

The mountain bike world champion — seeded No. 8 on the women's side and only in the tournament as a replacement after the sudden retirement of rower Tracy Cameron — knocked off top-seeded soccer star Christine Sinclair in the first round before toppling Cockburn and multisport star Clara Hughes to win the women's division.

Pendrel capped her shocking run with her most improbable upset, getting 50.79 per cent of your votes in the final to beat Whitfield by just 544 votes.

Afterwards she tweeted: "Thank you Canada & cycling fans for voting me as people's choice for flag bearer. You honor and inspire me!"

What can we say, Catharine? Congratulations, and we should have had you in the bracket from the beginning.

In fact, Canadians would do well to remember the name Catharine Pendrel when the Olympics begin. As the reigning women's mountain bike world champion and the winner of last year's Olympic test event in London is a top contender for a gold medal

Thanks again for your continued efforts on our behalf, an update would be most appreciated.

Deployment of a Legacy from the 2010 Olympic Games

Cycling BC is very pleased to report that we will be deploying the Province of BC's Mobile Medical Unit at the World Cup. The mobile hospital was purchased by the Province of British Columbia after the 2010 games and this will be its first deployment of the unit at a sports event. We will be working with PHSA and the communications staff in your ministry to prepare an announcement regarding the units use at the World Cup. The World Media is Coming

ESPN will be amongst the world's media accredited for the event and providing global exposure to British Columbia and Abbotsford. The next few weeks will see numerous media activities with Canadian broadcasters including Global, CTV and CBC.

Go Ride in BC Schools

Cycling BC is using the 2012 BMX World Cup to formally announce the launch of our Go Ride in BC Schools program. This free "bike skills program" will be made available to <u>all</u> public schools in British Columbia at zero cost. The program was beta-tested during the 2011-12 school year and provided enormously successful. Olympic bronze medalist Jasmin Gleasser and Olympian Tory Nyhaug will be on hand to discuss the importance of the program. This program would not be possible without the ongoing support of the Government of BC through the BC Participation Grant and the Community Gaming grant program. We are also anticipating a Victoria based announcement with the assistance of Olympic Bronze medalist Gillian Carelton and her coach Richard Wooles.

Olympians (and their medals) at the Event

The World Cup will include most of the athletes who recently participated in the BMX event at the 2012 Olympic Games in London including BC's very own Tory Nyhaug. Tory has a great chance to finish win a World Cup on home soil as well as finish in the top three of the world cup series.

Government of BC Recognition at the World Cup

The Government of BC will be recognized at the event on the podium backdrop, on the official poster, in the official program and on the official event website (see attached proofs).

We have continued dialogue since the spring with ministry staff in the hopes that this event can receive greater hosting support and we hope that an announcement can be made soon as the financial pressures of this event have been substantial in its first year. We were very fortunate to receive bid support and a small hosting grant and we remain appreciative of this help. In reality, a World Cup event in any sport requires the assistance of the host Province to remain viable. I have included a summary of the economic impact of this event that clearly demonstrates that this event will generate \$192,000 in provincial taxes alone. The vast majority of these taxes will be generated by out of country visitors.

I would once again like to thank you for your ongoing support of the sport of cycling. The success of BC athletes on the world stage in 2012 has been truly exhilarating for all concerned and Ministry support has been integral to that success. Young BC athletes like Gillian Carelton, Jasmin Glaesser and Tory Nyhaug will ensure that this excitement continues through to the 2014 Commonwealth Games, the 2015 Pan AM Games and the 2016 Olympic Games. On a closing note, it has been great to celebrate an Olympic medal being won (Womens Team Pursuit) in a building clad in Western Red Cedar from right here in British Columbia http://blog.gov.bc.ca/bctradeinvest/2012/07/27/london_velodrome/

This past weekend was another great weekend for British Columbia on the international stage. British Columbian's took to the podium once again in both Cross Country and Downhill. I am pleased to report that Catharine Pendrel won the New York leg of the World Cup and as a result has locked up the overall World Cup title for 2012. While, Steve Smith (age 21) from Nanaimo finished won Silver at the downhill event - currently ranked 6th in the world; this result will vault him up the World Cup standings.

Thanks for your continued efforts on behalf our our application for funding.

I have attached a rationale/report for our World Cups that identifies some of the characteristics that ensure the government gets a good ROI. This short report threw out a few interesting numbers that surprised most in our office. For example, our estimates indicate that the Odlum Brown Tennis event provides a greater economic impact that the recent Davis Cup Tie. The numbers also suggest that the tourism benefits of the Women's Olympic Qualifier would not be substantial. The report cites the Provincial Governments new strategic plan for tourism and supports some of our previous submissions.

Hi David,

I am wondering if you can provide confirmation of our request for funding for the two World Cups (2012 BMX and 2013 Mountain Bike).

The UCI Management committee met last Thursday and postponed a decision on formally announcing a 2013 Mountain Blke World Cup Schedule as they are very keen to host one of the events here in British Columbia and we could not give them a firm commitment. However, they have an application from Windam (New York) to host the event as well as an option to host the event in Europe on the site of the 2014 World Championships and are getting ready to pursue those options. At the same meeting, the UCI Management did approve the 2013 BMX World Cup Calendar and we have been successful in securing a BMX World Cup for Abbotsford in 2013. We are making the formal announcement of this event next Tuesday at the ribbon cutting for the Abbotsford BMX Track and have invited Minister Chong.

The exciting "British Columbia/Canada" news from the sport of cycling is that the 2012 Olympic selections have been all but finalized for all our disciplines and BC has 9 out of 17 athletes representing Canada in the different cycling disciplines, 3 of 5 the five Olympic cycling coaches and 2 officials assigned to officiate at the games. Here is the tentative list (We believe Ryder will be confirmed for the Mens Road and Tory is being announced next week for BMX).

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A Sport Hosting Rationale for Cycling Events

Why Mountain Bike and BMX World Cups generate a greater economic impact for BC than other sports events

Overview

Hosting a UCI Mountain Bike or a BMX World Cup offers greater financial and tourism benefits compared to other sports events recently hosted in British Columbia:

- Sales Tax
- Media Exposure in BC's Key Target Markets
- Male and Female Audience
- Global and Domestic TV Audience
- Fans Interest & Mobility (Potential Tourists)
- Total Athlete and Team Participation
- British Columbia's Competitive Advantage
- Location of Event outside the Lower Mainland
- Provincial Tax Revenue

Provincial Sales Tax

A STEAM economic impact estimate for the 2012 BMX World Cup revealed that the event would generate **\$186,503** in provincial sales tax. A similar study for a 2013 Mountain Bike World Cup reveled that this event held in Kamloops would generate **\$495,118**. Cycling BC has asked the Provincial Government to consider **\$470,000** for a Mountain Bike World Cup and a request of **\$187,500**. These calculations used conservative figures to estimate the financial impact of these events and demonstrate that both events have the ability to be a financial benefit or at worst break-even to the Provincial government.

Key Markets

The Government of BC recently developed a new strategic plan for tourism. This plan identified the following key target markets:

- Japan (18 mtb) (8 BMX)
- Australia (37 mtb) (24 BMX)
- Germany (41 mtb) (11 BMX)
- UK (52 mtb) (10 BMX)
- China (4 mtb) (4 BMX)

- USA (51 mtb) (38 BMX)
- Can/Ontario (53 mtb) (8 BMX)
- Mexico (14 mtb) (2 BMX)
- South Korea
- India

Eight of these key tourism markets have athletes participating regularly on the Mountain Bike World Cup circuit (the number of athletes is indicated in parenthesis). Several of the key markets have a substantial number of athletes competing at the World Cups. Australia, the USA, and the United Kingdom would all have athletes that consistently podium at World Cups and World Championships so amount of media impressions in these three countries would be notably higher. A BMX Supercross World Cup will have a similar marketing reach with multiple athletes in each of the same key markets.

Male and Female Audience

Appealing strongly to both genders also provides for greater marketing reach and tourism benefits. In BMX, Australia is home to the current men's World Champion and Southern California is home to the Men's 2012 World Cup leader. The Women's BMX World Cup leader is Australian and the World Champion if French. For Cross Country Mountain Bike, the current Women's World Cup leader and World Champion is Catharine Pendrel. For men, the World Champion is from the UK and the World Cup point's leader is from California.

Global and Domestic TV Coverage

In 2007, over 30 million television spectators watched the UCI Mountain Bike World Cup races. International rights holders likely to take live coverage are:

The mountain bike world cup races are all live webcast. In addition to live TV coverage, more than 250 print, new media and photojournalists from over 25 nations will cover a World Cup. The host broadcaster delivers live TV and web coverage plus a highlights program to an even wider range of countries.

The 2010 UCI BMX Supercross World Cup (4 events) was produced and distributed as follows:

- Europe; 600 minutes, estimated viewers app 1'000'000
- Asia & Middle East; 350 minutes, estimated viewers app 800'000
- America; 500 minutes, estimated viewers app 1'000'000
- Oceania; 300 minutes, estimated viewers app 500'000
- In 2010 all events were broadcasted live or delayed live (Pan Europe)

Potential Tourists

The ability to generate tourism revenue is a critical difference between a Mountain Bike World Cup and other major sports events hosted in British Columbia. Athletes from over 60 countries have participated in the 2012 UCI Mountain Bike World Cup series so far and over 40 countries on average participate in each leg. This is substantially more than most other international sports events recently hosted in BC. For example, the recent Davis Cup playoff was contested between just two teams; Canada and France. The Women's Olympic Soccer Qualifier held in Vancouver hosted only 7 other countries including Haiti, Cuba, Guatemala, Costa Rica and the Dominican Republic. The lack of countries participating limits the events ability to attract tourists to BC. Further, media exposure in countries such as Haiti, Cuba, Guatemala will simply not lead to increased tourism because the vast majority of the population from those countries is not financially capable of vacationing in BC.

The Mountain Bike and BMX events are broadcast around the world to key markets and to many consumers who have the financial ability to vacation in BC. This is not to say that these other sports events are not worthy of government support. The Davis Cup Tie provided exposure for British Columbia in France and the rest of Canada while the Olympic Qualifier provided exposure in the USA. However, both the Mountain Bike World Cup and BMX Supercross World Cups and can provide a far greater return on investment simply as a function of which countries broadcast the events.

Socio-demographics of cycling ensure that the target audience is financially capable of actually vacationing in British Columbia. Many sports events hosted in BC cannot hope to translate media exposure into person visits to British Columbia. The recent Olympic Soccer Qualifier provides a perfect illustration. The qualifier was a great success by most measurements. However, the tourism benefit is negligible if the audience is not financial able to travel to BC or not motivated by a personal need.

Total Athlete and Team Participation

The amount of visiting athletes and coaches plays a substantial role in the ability of a sports event to generate economic impact for British Columbia. The Olympic Soccer Qualifier and Davis Cup both provide another valuable comparison when we compare their food and accommodation spending to that of a Mountain Bike World Cup.

Using just competition days for the calculation, this table shows that the participation levels of a Mountain Bike World Cup over 5 days can generate a far greater spend that the Olympic Soccer Qualifier.

Competitive Advantage

Hosting a Mountain Bike World Cup will demonstrate British Columbia competitive advantage to a viable tourism audience – an audience with the personal interest and the financial capability to vacation in British Columbia. To use a Government of BC marketing slogan – BC is the BEST PLACE ON EARTH to go mountain biking. British Columbia has 7 mountain resorts that operate world class Bike Parks in the summer months not to mention an unprecedented network of trails throughout the province.

The mountains, resorts and trails of British Columbia our competitive advantage . Other sports like tennis, soccer, rugby are delivered on relatively ubiquitous facilities; most cities have soccer pitches, tennis courts, or a stadium. Few regions of the world can offer the world-class mountain bike facilities available in BC. No other country can boast such facilities within less 4-6 hours travel time of each other. Abbotsford is home to one of only two permanent BMX Supercross tracks in North America and one of only a handful of tracks in the world. This once again creates a competitive advantage for British Columbia.

Location of Event Outside the Lower Mainland

Locating an event outside the lower mainland turns local fans into sports tourists. Specifically, events held outside the GVRD stimulates additional purchases of food, gas and accommodation within the BC economy. Events held in the lower mainland require far less expenditures by fans and participants.

The following provides you with a description of each initiative being put forward for a one-time grant request to Gaming:

1. Social Media 101 Resource – BCWSA will utilize the expertise we garnered while hosting the 2010 World Wheelchair Rugby Championships (2010 WWRC) to create a web-based "best practice tool" for sport event organizers who are not familiar with social media. PSOs, clubs and event organizing committees throughout British Columbia will have free access to this tool which they can use to generate more interest in particular events, particular sport participation and sport participation more generally.

This resource would help organizers to discover:

- a. Which social media tools are best suited to their event and/or their target audiences;
- b. How to create a social media action plan;
- c. How to maximize social media reach while minimizing human resources required to implement a social media plan;
- d. How to use social media to foster an online community and encourage stakeholders to feel invested in this community;
- e. How to create engaging content;
- f. How to avoid the pitfalls of social media;
- g. How to evaluate social media outcomes using analytics.

Amount requested: \$15,000

Expenses related to contract services to support the development, writing and logistics for the project which will be designed to be easily used by other PSOs, clubs and event organizing committees.

 Live Streaming (webcasting) – includes hiring a webcasting company to live stream the 2012 Canada Cup International Wheelchair Rugby Tournament. The purpose of webcasting the event is to reach out to a broader audience provincially, nationally and internationally and provide them with an opportunity to watch the 2012 Canada Cup. By webcasting the event, we will increase the exposure of wheelchair rugby and create a legacy of high-quality wheelchair rugby video resources that can be used to showcase the sport in the future.

Other sports will be able to observe the advantages of webcasting in showcasing any event and sport to a wider audience in order to build interest and spur participation.

Live streaming of the 2012 Canada Cup will also help to help promote British Columbia as a sport tourism destination of choice and reinforce the province's reputation for excellence in event hosting

Amount requested: \$10,000

Expenses include the cost of equipment to set up the webcasting platform, equipment required and webcaster quote and announcer fees.

3. Event website development – The purpose of this initiative is to re-brand the 2010 World Wheelchair Rugby Championships website to support both the 2012 Canada Cup and future Canada Cups. By repurposing the existing resource, we will save considerable time and money and also maintain the brand consistency we developed during the 2010 World Wheelchair Rugby Championships. We will also ensure that the tournament's online presence is supported by a professional, well-designed website that can also be used as a model for other events and sports going forward.

Amount requested: \$10,000

The cost is based on a quote from the website designer.

4. Schools Program – The purpose of this program is to build on the 2010 World Wheelchair Rugby Championships' successful schools program and continue to use wheelchair rugby as a way to build awareness about the abilities of people with physical disabilities among B.C. youth. The schools program will also provide an additional audience for the Canada Cup, since school children will attend the event.

The Schools Program goals are:

- a. To increase and sustain the interest in the sport of wheelchair rugby beyond the 2010 WWRC.
- b. To have educated, enthusiastic students and teachers who have participated in the wheelchair rugby schools program attend the Canada Cup.
- c. To promote independence, motivation and inspiration in individuals with and without disabilities throughout the school system.

- d. To educate and encourage family, friends and communities to become interested in the Canada Cup.
- e. To engage students in an international experience and learning environment.
- f. To educate school children regarding the abilities of individuals with disabilities and the value of an inclusive, physically active society

Elements of the Schools Program include:

- Wheelchair Rugby educational resource designed by teachers to support the education system. The resource includes lesson plans and extension activities ensuring teachers have the necessary tools to implement the program easily and effectively.
- Provide hands on experience in the sport of wheelchair rugby for the students through the demo team program.
- Rugby wheelchairs will be available for the demos in the schools.

Amount requested: \$15,000

Costs relate to revising the 2010 WWRC schools resource to become a generic resource for future wheelchair rugby events and hiring a manager to coordinate the schools program arrangements, including demo team training, demo promotions, demo logistic details, and booking schools to attend the Canada Cup.

In support of Event Hosting Transfer of Knowledge the resource materials and templates developed for the 2012 Canada Cup Social Media and Schools Programs would be made widely available to organizers of future events in British Columbia.

Hi Doug & Bruce, thank you for taking the time to discuss this with me yesterday. We all appreciate the continued support from the Branch with respect to funding and staff support. As discussed the following will provide you with an overview of three different funding levels to consider and the anticipated impact at each level:

Gold Level - \$125,000

- Reflects the cost of hosting the event at the Richmond Olympic Oval
- Allows us to fully webcast the event (22 games)
- Allows us to revise the 2010 WWRC website to support future Canada Cups
- Allows us the opportunity to expand our social media program which will provide further information to support the creation of the Social Media 101 Resource
- Allows us to contract the writing of a 'Social Media 101" resource to support the sport sector in BC
- Allows us to engage in an advertising campaign to support maximizing spectator attendance
- Allows us to expand our Schools program reaching new students and supporting their attendance
- Allows us to purchase 6 new wheelchair rugby chairs to use during the schools program and support the growth
 of wheelchair rugby around the province post event
- Allows us to hire the necessary staff support to deliver all of the above initiatives

Bronze Level - \$60,000

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- We are still able to host at the Oval, however this reduction impacts other delivery areas due to increased facility and fit out costs

- No sport wheelchair inventory
- Web cast final games only
- Not able to revise website
- Limited social media program due to lack of staff support

- Will reduce the number of contracts/staff we will hire to maximize our plans by 50%

Always nice to hear from the dynamic duo!!

Doug is tied up for another hour but when he's free I will ask him about next year's budget rollout. My concern is that it might be months before we know with any certainty what the 2012/13 hosting budget will look like. In a typical year we have approx. \$1miillion for event hosting, one-half goes to Hosting BC and the other half is set aside for larger scale events. Since our budget for this fiscal year is spoken for and there are no guarantees that additional hosting money for middle-tier single sport events such as World Cups and Canada Cups will be made available next year, I would strongly recommend that BCWSA apply to Hosting BC before December 15th.

I would also write to Minister Chong in early January asking for funding to take the Canada Cup to the next level. It would be important to demonstrate how the funding would benefit the disability sport movement and provincial sport system. I mentioned to Kathy that the Branch would do its best to support a transfer of knowledge program that could be linked to the successful 2010 WWRC and made available to other PSOs and/or event hosting committees throughout the Province (i.e. resources/tutorials on schools program, web streaming, social media, etc.).

Trust that helps for now and I will give you and Kathy a shout after speaking with Doug.

BCWSA (Kathy Newman) has submitted funding requests to the Gaming Branch for the following programs/events:

 PSO Reclassification – Community Gaming Grant Funding Eligibility BCWSA has asked to be permanently reclassified within the Gaming Branch funding criteria due to the high costs of delivering programs and services to athletes with a disability. BCWSA is currently treated as a Provincial Sport Organization, however their community grant funding has been capped at \$100K annually. If Gaming agrees to the reclassification request, BCWSA would be eligible for a maximum of \$250K in annual funding.

Ursula Cowland recognizes that BCWSA faces unique and specialized program delivery costs; however she advised BCWSA that the financial information on file does not support the highest level of support as Gaming Branch allocates funding based on the size and scope of PSO programs. She added that if the appeal is successful, BCWSA's reclassification would not take effect until the 2012/13 fiscal year. She recommended that BCWSA apply for 2011/2012 funding as part of the Special Intake for Community Gaming Grants announced by Minister Chong on January 26th (see point 2).

- Special Intake Adult Arts, Sports and Environmental Groups (\$52,000) At Ursula's request, BCWSA submitted a special request for \$52K to support existing ongoing programs in the 2011/12 fiscal year. Ursula clarified that that the special intake funding is intended for adult cultural, sport and environmental groups that were previously ineligible and not for program expansion.
- 3. 2012 Wheelchair Rugby Outreach Programs (\$50,000) Special One-time request In January, MCSCD received a BCWSA request for \$125K to support hosting of the 2012 Canada Cup at the Richmond Oval. The Minister approved an allocation of \$75K and noted she is not in favour of double-dipping between the "mid-sized events pot" and Gaming. Although Ursula indicated to BCWSA that the Sport Branch is providing funding for the Canada Cup which would typically preclude Gaming's involvement, David has since advised staff that Sport Branch funding would be targeted for field of play and technical operational costs whereas the social media and community outreach programs of the Canada Cup are stand-alone value added components worthy of consideration by Gaming.

Based on advice from the Sport Branch, BCWSA submitted a gaming grant request for \$50K to support the Canada Cup outreach programs on February 22. The Sport Branch supports the funding request for the complementary programming due the legacy benefits that would accrue to the disabled sport community and provincial sport system.

Here is the anticipated revenue for the Canada Cup:

- How many volunteers will be involved? 100-125++ (this is a directly involved # similar to the numbers used when DC was in Toronto, Montreal and Calgary)

- What's the estimate economic benefit of the event: As a guestimate, conservatively \$2.5M based on running lower tier Davis Cup events from around the Country--could be significantly more since this is the top tier Davis Cup World Group round with an iconic opponent in France)

- How many will attend, watch on tv etc. attendance: conservatively approx. 15000 over the 3 days. For national TV coverage on Sportsnet, we are looking at around 100,000 cumulative over the 3 days but depending on how our 2 rising stars fare on day 1 this number could increase substantially(keep in mind there will be "wall to wall" national TV

coverage on Sportsnet! In France, it could be around 10million (they had 13 million viewers for their last tie). Tennis in France is similar to hockey in Canada (13 million viewers for a Davis Cup tennis event with a total population of 64 million!)

- Any other tidbits that will help! We have not been in the Vancouver marketplace with Davis Cup for almost 20 years. Tennis Canada and the local organizing committee need to deliver an excellent event in all aspects for the fans, teams and media in order to produce a successful hosting model that can be replicated again in the near future--and in so doing Vancouver is well positioned to claim national venue bragging rights for the following Davis Cup matches in Canada. Keep in mind the Davis Cup in Vancouver also serves as the launching pad in Tennis Canada's plan to bring an annual men's top tier ATP indoor event to Vancouver--so definite added economic potential to expand with recurring tourist \$\$ and national/international promotion of Vancouver and BC.

Also when is your drop dead date for having provincial commitment? I was correct on the timing, the ITF will be doing the site visit at the end of next week (with Tennis Canada officials present in the chosen City for the major media announcement---by the way if applicable the communications group working with Tennis Canada would of course include the Minister in the program should the Minister so wish).

I received a call from Rob Mackay-Dunn yesterday regarding the attached October 23rd request from Tennis Canada. It is my pleasure to advise you of an exciting opportunity to enhance our Province's global image as a sports-oriented community.

Davis Cup tennis is the largest single sport team competition in the world, involving over 125 countries on an annual basis. Canada is currently ranked 14th and our exciting young team has earned a birth in the prestigious Davis Cup World Group, a playoff of the world's best 16 countries, for the second consecutive year. A 22 year old British Columbian, Vasek Pospisil, is a key member of the team and has enjoyed tremendous success in both singles and doubles in Davis Cup competition.

The first World Group play-off will take place in Canada from January 28–February 3, 2013 and we have an exceptional opportunity to bring the event back to British Columbia. Canada will host the perennial powerhouse and defending World Champion, Spain, in a winner take all competition that will present incredible opportunities for British Columbia to build upon its track record as an outstanding host. Spain's Davis Cup team, featuring stars such as Rafael Nadal and David Ferrer, are a huge fan and media attraction wherever they play.

Last February, with your Government's assistance, Tennis Canada was able to bring the Davis Cup to Vancouver for the first time in over twenty years. The event was a tremendous success and engaged British Columbians across the Province as can be seen in this video Tennis Canada produced for the event. The very strong pride and enthusiasm that British Columbians displayed was reminiscent of the Olympic Winter Games. I am sure your colleague, Minister Chong, can attest to the very successful outcome and to the high profile role the Provincial Government played in the media and public engagement that surrounded the sold out events.

Last year's Davis Cup event in Vancouver drew fans from across the Province to sold out events, and over 10% of last year's attendees came from out of Province – the interest in Spain this year will be even higher. The matches drew a national audience of over 600,000 on Sportsnet and TVA and were

The potential opportunity to host Team Canada's next Davis Cup match in British Columbia is an important one for the near-term profile of our Province and will deliver immediate economic benefits. A track record of success in Vancouver would greatly enhance our opportunity to secure the longer term potential for an annual one-week ATP Pro Tour tennis tournament in Vancouver. Tennis Canada currently has long standing ATP and WTA tournaments in Toronto and Montreal named the Rogers Cup that generate over \$40 million of economic value per city per year and are watched globally by more than 40 million viewers. A winter season ATP event in Vancouver would draw significant international tourism visitation to British Columbia.

Tennis is a sport that is played by a great many British Columbians. Players of all ages participate on courts throughout the Province. This event will generate excitement for not only those players, but will encourage more active participation by all. The event will also be used to provide promising local junior players with the opportunity to showcase their skills on the same court at the Davis Cup players. Many of these players will come from a new National Junior High Performance Development program we recently started in Vancouver with the re-location of a world-class coach from Israel. At last year's event over \$50,000 was raised to support aspiring British Columbian tennis players and this year our target is to double that amount. As a measure of the success of the program, this year North Vancouver's Filip Peliwo won both the Wimbledon and US Open Junior titles, a first for any Canadian.

Based on the success here in British Columbia, Alberta and Manitoba are both anxious to host the event and are expected to offer the kind of support that British Columbia so generously provided last year. Our preference is to return to British Columbia and we are currently in discussions with the City of Vancouver to seek a contribution equal to the \$100,000 they provided last year to help defray the cost of the event.

We are respectfully requesting that the Province match its contribution of \$100,000 last year. We appreciate that this request is coming late in the fiscal cycle (the draw for hosting of the event only occurred three weeks ago) and Tennis Canada could manage staged payments into the Fiscal 2014 period if required.

Last year's event was a watershed for tennis in British Columbia (please refer to the link which includes a video summary of the 2012 Davis Cup celebration in Vancouver http://video.tenniscanada.com/video/28/canada-vs-france-davis-cup-recap



Issue: Immediate direction is required on funding for a bid to host a Davis Cup match in Vancouver in February, 2012 as well as funding for other medium-sized events.

Background:

The following table summarizes funding available for medium-sized events in 2011/12 and 2012/13, from an annual allotment of \$500K (2010 Sport Legacy). The remaining \$500K in the \$1 M hosting budget is committed to smaller events supported through Hosting BC. For 2011/12 approximately \$300 K was distributed through the first Hosting BC intake and the remaining \$200 K will be distributed through a second intake to be announced later in November.


In my discussions with Warren Hansen of the Canadian Curling Association, he indicated that it would take a commitment of \$250,000 to \$300,000 from the Province to ensure the Event would be held in Kamloops. From that information, we approached our Kamloops MLA's and met with Terry Lake. He advised that there was funding available through Ida Chong's Ministry and through BCLC of \$150,000 and \$100,000 respectively. Without funding of this level, it would be very difficult to complete this bid.

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That said, I contacted Warren Hansen, CCA's Director of Event Operations, and he provided these comments:

"If we can everything moving in the right direction with Kamloops we would probably agree in the spring that the event will go there and we will start to put all of the necessary agreements in place. We would hope to have all of this done by October and make the official announcement in either October or November."

Bruce and I need to understand fully what timing flexibility there is around the Brier bid.

Mayor Milobar's letter indicates a provincial commitment to \$150 K of financial support is required by January 30th. We appreciate that other provinces are likely interested in the event and likely willing to support it financially. So a lesser dollar commitment may not be sufficient.

It is the time line that is causing us trouble right now. We have four other "mid-sized" requests in the hopper right now and these have to be dealt with as a group – the requested funds significantly exceed what the Minister has to allocate even under the most optimistic assumptions.

Is it possible from Kamloops to wait until February 17th to hear what the Minister's decision is? We see this as the time frame in which we can bring these five events before her as a comprehensive package.

Pls let us know what flexibility, if any, exists here.

The World Media is Coming

ESPN will be amongst the world's media accredited for the event and providing global exposure to British Columbia and Abbotsford. The next few weeks will see numerous media activities with Canadian broadcasters including Global, CTV and CBC.

Go Ride in BC Schools

Cycling BC is using the 2012 BMX World Cup to formally announce the launch of our Go Ride in BC Schools program. This free "bike skills program" will be made available to <u>all</u> public schools in British Columbia at zero cost. The program was beta-tested during the 2011-12 school year and provided enormously successful. Olympic bronze medalist Jasmin Gleasser and Olympian Tory Nyhaug will be on hand to discuss the importance of the program. This program would not be possible without the ongoing support of the Government of BC through the BC Participation Grant and the Community Gaming grant program. We are also anticipating a -

Victoria based announcement with the assistance of Olympic Bronze medalist Gillian Carelton and her coach Richard Wooles.

Olympians (and their medals) at the Event

The World Cup will include most of the athletes who recently participated in the BMX event at the 2012 Olympic Games in London including BC's very own Tory Nyhaug. Tory has a great chance to finish win a World Cup on home soil as well as finish in the top three of the world cup series.

Government of BC Recognition at the World Cup

The Government of BC will be recognized at the event on the podium backdrop, on the official poster, in the official program and on the official event website (see attached proofs).

We have continued dialogue since the spring with ministry staff in the hopes that this event can receive greater hosting support and we hope that an announcement can be made soon as the financial pressures of this event have been substantial in its first year. We were very fortunate to receive bid support and a small hosting grant and we remain appreciative of this help. In reality, a World Cup event in any sport requires the assistance of the host Province to remain viable. I have included a summary of the economic impact of this event that clearly demonstrates that this event will generate \$192,000 in provincial taxes alone. The vast majority of these taxes will be generated by out of country visitors.

I would once again like to thank you for your ongoing support of the sport of cycling. The success of BC athletes on the world stage in 2012 has been truly exhilarating for all concerned and Ministry support has been integral to that success. Young BC athletes like Gillian Carelton, Jasmin Glaesser and Tory Nyhaug will ensure that this excitement continues through to the 2014 Commonwealth Games, the 2015 Pan AM Games and the 2016 Olympic Games.
