There are way you could make it easier for citizens to engage on legislative changes. At the recent Queen's Printer Hackathon one of the developers created an application called www.yourule.ca. The idea is to allow citizens to review changed sections of legislation and make comments similar to YouTube. They could also subscribe to channels, say the Environment channel, so they would be notified if their were changes to environmental legislation. Ideally the developer would like to serve out proposed changed to legislation for the public to comment before a bill was enacted.

However, one wonders if such social media tools will re-engage a public that is increasingly detached, as Mark rightly notes, from an interest in public life? If you believe that much political engagement stems from the personal relationships and common interest of groups, such as professions, neighbourhoods, and church, many of which are less central to life as individuals have gained greater autonomy, then you would be doubtful. Thoughts?

As requested, here is a bit of background information on the Southern Interior Municipal Employers Association (SIMEA).

SIMEA is a non-accredited employers association, a volunteer association that collectively bargains on behalf of a group of municipal employers. It has registered as a society (non-profit) in B.C.

The attached corporate summary from BC Registry Services provides a bit of background on SIMEA's history as a society. The organization has annual reports on file and they are available upon request through BC Registry Services. Here are instructions on how you can request them:

- Online: To obtain a copy or an extract of any document or record, go to <http://www.bcregistryservices.gov.bc.ca/bcreg/corppg/crsearch.page?#other>.
- Via mail: The fee to obtain a copy or an extract of any document or record is \$10 plus a photocopy fee per page of \$0.50. Contact BC Registry Services at 250 387-5101 for information on the exact number of pages to be copied. Phone hours of operation are 10:00 am to 3:00 pm, Monday to Friday, excluding statutory holidays.

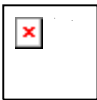

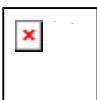
