This fall government is working to defend and create jobs- a huge part of creating jobs in about opening up the Asia Pacific Gateway.

Asia is our future and we will continue to build and strengthen ties with China to spur investment and trade.

Our location as the Asia Pacific Gateway will lead to an estimated 255,000 jobs and \$76 billion in increased trade with the Asia-Pacific by 2020.

For the first time ever, we are sending more softwood to China than to the US and we are exporting more goods to Asia than to the US.

I am honoured to be with you here today, and to personally thank His Excellency, Ambassador Zhang (Jong) for his attendance today.

The past few weeks have been a time of uncertainty for many of us as we watch events unfold on the global economic stage.

Here in British Columbia, we're going to be focused on defending and protecting jobs.

And I believe that Asia will play a major role as we move forward.

British Columbia has an advantage nobody else in Canada can claim – we are this country's Asia Pacific Gateway.

And I know that the people in this room will play a critical role in creating the future we want for B.C.

Your energy, your ideas and your abilities will help build B.C.'s economic strength and competitiveness.

The Chinese-Canadian community in B.C. is helping us build strong ties with one of our most important trading partners – the People's Republic of China.

We must continue to build our relationship, and develop new markets for our products and resources.

In fact, for the first time ever, we are sending more softwood to China than to the US –

And that has led directly to 27 mills re-opening since 2009, creating jobs for British Columbians and breathing new life into northern and Interior communities.

And for the first time ever, we are exporting more goods to Asia than to the US.

Asia is our future. China is our future, and that's something I've been sharing with people everywhere I go across B.C. and Canada.

Our location as the Asia Pacific Gateway will lead to an estimated 255,000 jobs and \$76 billion in increased trade with the Asia-Pacific by 2020.

To foster our relationship with China, last year we opened new B.C. Trade & Investment offices in Beijing and Guangzhou, in addition to the existing office in Shanghai.

In the next few months I plan to travel to China to build on our existing bonds of friendship and business and create new ones.

The Chinese-Canadian community is a bedrock of our society in B.C. – a foundation we can build on together.

Each year we welcome twice as many new citizens from China than from anywhere else in the world.

In fact British Columbians of Chinese origin now make up close to 10% of our entire population.

And together we celebrate your contributions to B.C.'s prosperity, and to the rich cultural tapestry that makes this such a tremendous place to live.

Regardless of whether you're a new Canadian or were born here, we depend on your input, your support and your partnership to help grow our cultural and economic ties with China.

Our goal is to work side by side with all of you to lead Canada and North America into the Asia Pacific Century.

Kamloops Air Ambulance Service Announcement Tuesday August 30, 2011

Key Messages

- This latest addition means families from the Interior and those travelling through will now have that extra peace of mind.
- In critical emergencies, lives can be saved and lives can be lost in a matter of minutes and this air ambulance will make a huge difference in patient outcomes.
- This is something the community asked for and MLAs advocated for and it is now a reality.
- The decision follows an extensive evaluation of an 8-week trial period last summer.
- The addition of a fourth dedicated helicopter ambulance to the provincial fleet will improve patient care in British Columbia's interior.

I'm honoured to be here today with all of you to make an announcement that will save lives.

Long drives are a reality in this part of the province. And, unfortunately, so are accidents in isolated areas.

In critical emergencies like this, lives can be saved and lives can be lost in a matter of minutes.

So we need to make sure paramedics can get to the scene quickly and transport patients to care.

So I am pleased to announce that a helicopter ambulance service based in Kamloops will immediately begin serving residents of the Interior.

Last year, Interior Health and BC Ambulance Service conducted an eight-week trial of a dedicated helicopter air ambulance service that served the Interior 12 hours a day.

This trial allowed paramedics to transport critically ill or injured patients to hospitals in Kamloops, Kelowna and Vancouver.

And I'm pleased to confirm that the air ambulance will continue to operate as a 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. service, seven days a week, weather permitting.

The service will be operated by BC Ambulance Service and funding will be managed within the existing Emergency Health Services Commission budget.

This is a \$2.35 million investment in patient care.

In cases where saving time is critical to saving a life, air ambulances are vital.

Without the air ambulance, outcomes may be tragically different.

This is something that your community has asked for and something that your local MLAs both Terry Lake and Kevin Krueger have been advocating for and it's now a reality.

This latest addition means families from the Interior and those travelling through will now have that extra peace of mind.

They will have better and faster access to care, and improved outcomes.

Key Messages:

- 1. Encouraging play will help keep kids healthier
- 2. The power of play: not only good for their bodies, but good for their minds as well.
- 3. We are helping B.C.'s public schools and supporting PACs who have recently raised funds for playgrounds.
- 4. PACs who have raised money for playgrounds will now be able to use their funds for other projects that benefit students.

As a mother, I've spent a lot time at the playground with my son.

Watching him make new friends, discover imaginary worlds and yes, even fall down, get up, and brush himself off again – all in the name of fun.

It's something that every parent knows well: kids need to play.

That is why I'm pleased to announce the province is providing \$8 million over the next 2 years...

...To assist with the installation, upgrade or replacement of playground equipment for public elementary and middle schools across British Columbia.

Initial estimates show that 44 schools in BC do not have any playground equipment.

So for those schools requiring new or replacement playgrounds they can expect to get up to \$50,000.

Not only does play keep our kids physically active and healthier – it also helps their brains

Playgrounds are an extension of the classroom.

Children learn more and learn better if they've had a chance to play outside during the day.

And play allows children to use their creativity while developing their imagination.

In addition to the 44 new playgrounds, schools requiring upgrades to existing playgrounds will be valued at \$25,000 per school.

And we'll be reimbursing those that have installed playgrounds since January 1st of this year, up to a maximum of \$50,000 per school.

This equipment is even more important as 37,000 students enrol in full day kindergarten this year.

Playgrounds aren't only used during school hours...

They are a place where families with children of all ages gather on weekends and during the holidays.

Providing access to safe playgrounds helps make kids happier, healthier and ready to learn.

And now every public elementary and middle school in this province that wants a playground will have one.

Introduction

The Natural Gas Industry

I am pleased to be here in the northeast during Oil and Gas week as we celebrate your contributions to British Columbia.

Today I'd like to talk about the future of the natural gas industry:

How you will help lead the way for economic growth in our province;

How your success is a key piece of British Columbia's success as whole.

There are a lot of people out there who have no idea how much the natural gas industry contributes to the lives of families in our province. They don't know what goes on "up here."

They don't understand it and they don't appreciate it.

I think that's a story that needs to be told and it's one I am going to share everywhere I travel.

The natural gas industry here in British Columbia provides jobs to an estimated 5,000 people.

That's 5,000 people with good, family-sustaining jobs: People who are able to put food on the table and look after their kids because of your work.

And the natural gas industry also provides work and helps support thousands of other jobs through small businesses and contractors.

And that's important. But beyond that, you brought in \$1.3 billion to provincial coffers in 2009 and 10.

That's a big number. What does that really mean to the average British Columbian?

Well, \$1.3 billion covers the cost of 14,700 nurses for a year.

Or it pays for 96,000 knee replacements...

Or 52,000 open heart surgeries.

Without your contribution, we couldn't afford the services that people rely on every day.

Your work is important work.

It's worth acknowledging, championing and it is so important to defend it for our future.

Clearly, we in BC are feeling the effects of the global economic downturn. We feel it even though we remain in better shape than many other places.

To the south, the United States continues to grapple with high unemployment.

And our European neighbours are struggling to keep the sovereign debt crisis contained.

As a small, open, export-based economy, British Columbia is not isolated from what is going on around us.

I am not going to sugar coat reality: we are headed for some rough economic times ahead.

That's why we are working so hard on a plan to ensure BC creates and defends jobs for British Columbians.

And your industry will help lead the way.

Jobs Plan

We're focused like a laser beam on how we can defend and create BC jobs for families... the kind of jobs that you can raise a family on.

And we will be rolling out our full plan in the next few weeks.

With all this economic uncertainty, we need to think strategically about how we can insulate British Columbia from the worst of it.

In practical terms the plan is built on three pillars, three areas where we need to focus.

The first is we need to lead the way and clear the way.

Government often gets in the way of job creation, all levels of government. I heard that when I was Fort St. John in March for my first town hall and I've heard it in communities all over BC.

We have to recognize that and take action to get out of the way of job creation.

Second, we have to build infrastructure so that once businesses have created jobs, they can actually get their goods to markets.

And third, we have to open those markets for BC goods, spending time in China and India, where economies are booming and we are well positioned to get a foothold.

Of course underlying the three pillars is the need for a strong, skilled BC workforce, trained for the jobs of tommorow.

And the need to keep our strong economic foundation: to keep those things that make us a safe harbour for investment right now.

So what makes BC a safe harbour?

A safe harbour means keeping our triple AAA-plus Credit rating, a signal to the financial/investment community that we are fiscally prudent managers.

It's a low-tax regime.

And it's having the right infrastructure in place to access markets.

My government is committed through our Jobs Plan to doing whatever it takes to protect and defend BC as a safe harbour. I believe if we focus on these three pillars and maintain our strong foundation, people will have jobs; families will be able to put food on the table and we will all be able to focus on the more important things in life, like raising our kids or helping our parents.

And if we focus on these things we as British Columbians will be able to pay for the services we all want, like funding our world class health care and education systems.

We've seen what happens in the US when a government overburdens itself with debt and loses the confidence of investors... capital flees and it's a downward spiral.

We were there ourselves in the 1990s, watching as opportunity passed us by. We can't go backwards to get to where we want to go.

It's a dead end road we've already been down.

In order to pay for the services we want, we have to grow our economy.

I know Rich Coleman, Blair Lekstrom and Pat Pimm have been doing a lot of the ground work on our jobs plan with the natural gas industry, stakeholders and communities here in the northeast.

I want to thank everyone here who has been involved in those discussions.

As part of that plan, I can tell you we are committed to supporting the natural gas industry's efforts to open new markets in the Asia Pacific.

We must grow and safeguard this industry for the future of our province.

Responsible development of the natural gas industry and the growth of new markets will benefit families and rural communities.

When I was in the northeast in March, I heard people do have concerns. Mostly, they want to ensure they maintain their quality of life.

But people here are also proud of the sector: the \$7 billion dollars the natural gas industry invested last year, and the jobs both direct and indirect.

They want to see a future for this industry, an industry with access to new markets that is able to hire from a local pool of skilled workers and contractors.

Economic opportunities created from the Horn River Basin, Liard and Cordova are spurring growth and potential.

The days of seasonal work are over – the natural gas sector is now busy year-round.

The emergence of shale; new technology and your hard work has changed the sector.

Resource capacity is no longer a concern – the focus now is on what to do with our growth potential.

The International Energy Agency has called natural gas the "only fossil fuel for which demand is higher in 2053 than in 2008."

The World Economic Forum anticipates global trade of liquefied natural gas will increase 50 per cent by 2020.

Yet, US demand is diminishing and they expect to be self-reliant by 2035.

It's no secret – we need export capacity to diversify BC's natural gas sector and secure this economic activity.

There are currently at least five Liquified Natural Gas Terminals under consideration in BC.

We will move on our opportunity to export natural gas to the Asia Pacific.

The question is not "if", but "when."

Because it's also no secret that states like Oregon would be more than happy to have BC's natural gas leaving their ports.

Down there, our potential is their front page news, literally.

We need to fight to defend those jobs and use our strategic advantage as Canada's Pacific Gateway to build new markets in the Asia Pacific.

We are also committed to working with you to ensure the skills training program we have in place helps us capture natural gas jobs in BC.

I know skills shortage is a major concern in this industry.

And I know a lot of great partnership work has been done in recent years to address that.

The creation of the Centre of Excellence/Jim Klassen Industry Training Centre at the Northern Lights College in Fort St. John has helped us meet the energy sector's long-term education and training needs.

It is a remarkable example of industry support and collaboration.

And it is an important contributor to our career development initiatives and investments in job training opportunities.

But we need to look at the future opportunities and ask "Are we are doing enough?"

There will be an estimated 67,000 job openings in the natural gas industry by 2019.

And we want to ensure as many jobs as possible are filled by British Columbians.

Part of our Jobs Plan involves working with everyone in this room to ensure our skills training programs target people who want to live and work in BC.

And it involves working with our partners in Alberta and Saskatchewan to ensure we have the markets in the Asia Pacific for our energy products.

Let's face it, sometimes you have to till the soil far away to create jobs at home.

Through the New West Partnership with Alberta and Saskatchewan, we are committed to using all our collective strength to tell your story overseas.

And I will be working to develop those markets as part of my trade mission to China and India in November.

Talking with Premiers Brad Wall and Ed Stelmach we've come to realize we are much louder when we go out and market these things together.

Louder overseas... And louder in Ottawa.

Part of ensuring we help this industry grow is ensuring we continue to maintain our world class regulatory environment.

B.C. has the expertise, experience and the regulatory structure to ensure natural gas activities are conducted in the safest manner possible.

Yes, there are complex issues associated with petroleum and natural gas activity – that is why we have strict regulations in place and oversight by the BC Oil and Gas Commission.

Appropriate oversight is what maintains a safe and responsible natural gas sector in our province.

Hydraulic Fracturing announcement

That's why I am pleased to announce BC is taking the lead on an ongoing issue for us all: hydraulic fracturing and water use.

The shale gas revolution has increased opportunities, but policy has become just as important as geology and technology.

Markets want to know their investments in shale gas are safe and secure.

Many jurisdictions outside of B.C. are struggling with how to move forward - most do not have the history and expertise that BC has in regulating.

The Province feels strongly that hydraulic fracturing is regulated safely in B.C., and we continue to implement leading, sustainable practices.

And as I mentioned, we are proud of our regulations and oversight by the BC Oil and Gas Commission.

BUT – there is room for improvement.

Industry continues to be attentive - the Canadian Association of Petroleum Producers is announcing plans to improve hydraulic fracturing practices in Canada, as well as support for the voluntarily disclosure of hydraulic fracturing chemicals.

And government applauds this move.

But we are going a step further.

On behalf of Minister Coleman, I am pleased to announce that soon, B.C. will launch an online registry.

It will disclose details about hydraulic fracturing, and about additives used.

The information will be accessible to all.

This is not about being stricter. It's about government leading the way.

Openness and transparency will show how strong B.C.'s regulations are; how responsible industry is.

Many of us know how things are done, but many do not – it is time to show them.

The website is planned for January 2012.

Highway 52/Boundary Road

I am also pleased today to make an announcement on behalf of Blair Lekstrom, Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure.

To strengthen the highway system in the Tumbler Ridge area, we are investing \$4 million in upgrading Highway 52/Boundary Road.

As many of you have probably seen, work is already underway.

The money comes from our oil and gas rural road improvement program.

It's part of our commitment to work with industry to ensure that our road network meets their needs as they continue to invest in the oil and gas industry.

Our highway system is the backbone of a strong economy and we need reliable roads for both our jobs creators and the people who work and live in the area.

Conclusion

As I said at the beginning of my remarks, we are living in times of economic uncertainty.

But I believe that BC's has an advantage compared to much of the world.

We are and will continue to be a safe harbour in stormy seas.

Communities like Fort Nelson offer a good quality of life for families. People want to live here.

If we as government lead the way and get out of the way of job creators;

If we have the infrastructure in place like roads and ports and develop new markets in the Asia Pacific;

If we can grow our markets, invest in a skilled workforce and keep BC's reputation as a safe place to invest;

I believe we can come out of this stronger than when the economic troubles began.

Everyone in this room has an important role in helping us get there;

Helping us build a British Columbia where families have opportunities to put food on the table for their kids no matter what part of BC they call home;

And we can collectively afford the services to look after the most vulnerable among us.

It's about building a province where we all want to live.

The turmoil may scare others into hunkering down.

But I say now is the time to make a concerted effort to lead Canada towards new markets, new investment and new jobs.

This is British Columbia's time to shine.

- British Columbians can be proud of our province's leadership in cancer prevention and treatment, in particular of our Ovarian Cancer Research Program

 but we need to keep pushing awareness.
- Nobody knows for sure the exact cause of ovarian cancer; symptoms are often vague and there are currently no proven population screening methods to detect it.
- That's why awareness is critically important to improving all cancer survival rates, especially ovarian cancer, the disease that whispers.
- Because of our home-grown research here in B.C., we are on the brink of making major advances worldwide in the area of ovarian cancer prevention and treatment.

I'm honoured to be here today as a co-chair of the second annual Ovarian Cancer Awareness luncheon.

And I'm proud our government is a presenting sponsor, to support Ovarian Cancer Canada's awareness and education programs here in BC.

Last year over 1,000 people attended the first ovarian cancer awareness luncheon to honour former business council of B.C. President and CEO Virginia Greene.

Sadly, after a brave fight, Virginia passed away from ovarian cancer three months later, on December 2, 2010.

Starting today, and at every annual luncheon from now on, there will be an empty place setting at the head table to honour the memory of Virginia and of the more than 1,000 Canadian women who die from this disease every year.

Virginia's daughter Justine is here with us today. Justine, I want you to know we're all so proud of the work your mother did to raise awareness of ovarian cancer in B.C.

Ovarian cancer is known as the disease that whispers.

Nobody knows for sure its exact cause; its symptoms are often vague and we don't yet have proven population screening methods to detect it.

That's why awareness and knowing the potential markers is so critically important to getting an early diagnosis.

Many of you know this first-hand – and there's one woman in particular here today who knows it as well as anyone.

Two years ago, Diane Johansen decided to get in shape. She did so well that she lost 50 pounds, so she decided to really go for it and went to a trainer.

The trainer gave Diane exercises, when she noticed that her waist was expanding and thickening, never something you want to see when you're doing your best to get fit.

Diane's smart, and most importantly – Diane's aware – she knew something was wrong so she didn't waste time.

She took action instead.

She went to an internist and to her family doctor, and she had an ultrasound where they found a mass attached to her ovaries.

Dr. Diane Miller did the necessary surgery.

That was in the spring. Diane finished chemo last week and is now starting five weeks of radiation therapy.

Diane Johansen, please stand up. Everyone, let's give Diane a round of applause – she's a fighter and one smart woman.

In fact, I think everyone here deserves a hand – whether you're a patient, a survivor, a doctor or researcher, or you came today to help raise awareness.

Diane, I've heard your motto is "I don't know how to die so I'm not going to die". I love that, and I wish you all the best and every success on your journey and into the future.

But Diane, you're not alone.

About 300 women in B.C. are diagnosed with ovarian cancer every year, and if detected early enough we know we can boost the survival rate to as high as 90 per cent.

We're incredibly fortunate to have a talented and dedicated group of gynaecologists, oncologists and pathologists working at Vancouver General Hospital and the BC Cancer Agency, who together formed the Ovarian Cancer Research Program of BC.

People like Dr. Miller, who's a gynaecologic oncologist at VGH and BCCA.

And like Dr. David Huntsman, the director of the joint VGH and BCCA Ovarian Cancer Research program.

Today Dr. Huntsman will receive the first Virginia Greene Leadership Award, recognizing his outstanding contributions to the cause of raising ovarian cancer awareness. British Columbians can be proud of our province's leadership in cancer prevention and treatment, and in particular of our Ovarian Cancer Research Program.

Because of our home-grown research here in B.C., we are on the brink of making major advances worldwide in the area of ovarian cancer prevention and treatment.

But to help make sure that happens we need to keep pushing awareness – and September is Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month.

After you leave here today I want every one of you to go out there and talk with at least one woman in your life, or even better, two women or more in your life, and make sure they know the facts about ovarian cancer.

If everyone here today does that, then together we'll be honouring Virginia Greene's legacy, together we'll be honouring fighters like Diane Johansen, and together we'll make every month Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month.

The Asia Pacific Success story

Well... what can I say other than... welcome back.

After three years of hard work... of struggle... of knuckling down...

Give yourselves a round of applause.

The forest industry in BC and the companies you represent have an amazing story to tell.

It's a story every British Columbian needs to hear and one I intend to champion everywhere I travel.

There are a lot of people out there who have no idea about your efforts to keep people working, to keep food on the table for BC families.

In the face of the US housing market collapse and a global economic slow-down, you have found a way to survive, get stronger and protect BC jobs.

You banded together, went over to China and captured the attention of their construction sector.

That's no easy task.

It's a market of billions of people. They don't pay attention to small players.

As individual companies going over there on your own, you got little attention.

But by coming together as an industry, and working together with government, you formed a critical mass... a contingent big enough to catch the attention of China.

You are a force leading Canada.

And in June, for one month, China was the numberone overseas destination for B.C. lumber in terms of value.

This was a big first.

Because of your efforts: we've had 27 mills re-open.

We have 10,000 people working – that's direct jobs – putting food on the table for their families.

You have set an example of how we can find and open new markets.

Pat Bell has been with you on this journey. He's been government's voice in a market where government representation is important.

Now we are taking what he learned from working with you and leading efforts to do the same thing, not just in forestry, but in other sectors of our economy.

Your success is the inspiration for our soon-to-be released BC Jobs Plan.

It is proof that even in these difficult times, we can defend and create BC jobs by looking beyond our traditional markets.

To the south, the United States continues to grapple with high unemployment.

And our European neighbours are struggling to keep the sovereign debt crisis contained.

As a small, open, export-based economy, British Columbia is not isolated from what is going on around us.

I am not going to sugar coat reality: the marketplace is sure to challenge us once again.

There is going to be tough sledding ahead.

That's why we are so focused on implementing a plan to ensure BC's economy is sustained despite the challenges.

And the forest industry joins us in leading the way.

Jobs Plan

We're focused like a laser beam on how we can defend and create jobs for BC's families... the kind of jobs that you can raise a family on.

I am in the business of ensuring BC is a great place to live.

What makes a great place? Good caring families, ones where we look after each other: an aging parent, a disabled sibling, a growing child.

The business of raising children matters because its families that instil character and build good citizens.

And good citizens build safe neighbourhoods.

Families create good citizens who build a good province and a good country.

And what do you need to be a good parent? A job.

That's where our goals intersect.

When you create wealth, you create jobs.

And when you create jobs, you provide the essential ingredient for healthy families.

With all this economic uncertainty, we need to think strategically about how we can insulate British Columbia from the worst of it.

That's why we've been working on a plan to attract new investment and strengthen our economy to protect jobs for families in every region of BC. We will be announcing further details of that plan next week.

In practical terms the plan is built on three pillars, three areas where we need to focus.

The first pillar is that we need to be great at producing goods and supporting an environment for robust economic activity.

Government doesn't create jobs but we do impair their creation.

Conversely, we can also enable their creation.

We need a common-sense government that clears the path.

The second pillar is we have to continue to build infrastructure so that once businesses have created jobs, they can actually get their goods to markets.

And the third pillar is we have to open up markets for BC goods, by spending time in China and India, where economies are booming.

We need to be great at expanding and understanding those markets and producing goods to feed those market demands.

When it comes to forestry, the BC Jobs Plan is about doubling those efforts already underway.

We are not going to let up. We've barely scratched the surface.

With competition in Europe and even the US starting to take notice of the opportunities in China, we need to push forward even harder.

We've made good in-roads.

You've changed your products to meet demand.

Cutting new lumber sizes to specific lengths and dimensions...

Switching to the metric system, and...

Educating Chinese buyers on the potential for wood frame housing.

These things have helped.

But we need to do more.

And we are not going to forget about Japan.

It's a country that buys our highest quality manufactured products. And our wood pellets.

They are in the process of rebuilding after last year's tragedy and we know there is growth potential.

And India... India is like China 10 years ago, it is full of unexplored opportunity.

India's middle class is currently more than 50 million people, larger than our entire country.

And that market of middle class consumers is expected to grow to more than 500 million people in the next 15 years.

That market will be larger than the entire population of the United States.

It would be incredibly valuable to develop India as another market for BC forest products.

It would add pricing stability and protect family sustaining jobs.

This relentless focus on expanding into Asia Pacific markets is the third pillar of our jobs plan.

And you have been blazing the trail for the rest of our economy and our country.

Of course underlying these three pillars is the need for a strong, skilled BC workforce, trained for the jobs of tomorrow.

And we also need to keep our strong economic foundation: to keep those things that make us a safe harbour for investment right now.

So what makes BC a safe harbour?

A safe harbour means keeping our triple AAA-plus Credit rating.

It means a low-tax regime.

And it means having the right infrastructure in place to access markets.

I believe if we focus on these three pillars and maintain our strong foundation, people will have jobs; families will be able to put food on the table. And if we focus on these things, we as British Columbians will be able to pay for the services we all want, like funding our health care and education systems.

We've seen what happens in the US when a government overburdens itself with debt and loses the confidence of investors... capital flees and it's a downward spiral.

We were there ourselves in the 1990s, watching as opportunity passed us by. We can't go backwards to get to where we want to go.

Debt is a dead-end street. Ask Greece. Ask the European Union. Take a look at the United States.

In order to pay for the services we want, we have to grow our economy.

Wood Innovation and Design Centre

To support your industry's efforts to create jobs and grow in these new markets, I am pleased to announce some steps today that will help make the Wood Innovation and Design Centre in Prince George a reality.

Thanks to a land contribution from our partners, the City of Prince George, we have a location for this centre of excellence. Mayor Dan Rogers and council. Thank you.

The Wood Innovation and Design Centre will be downtown, at the site of the former Prince George Hotel.

And we are kick starting this project with a call for ideas from architects, designers and engineers.

How do we create the world's tallest wood building in Prince George?

Pat likes to talk about a 10-storey structure: the tallest multi-use wood building in the world.

Home to academic and research programs, it will ensure we remain leaders in wood construction.

It will be the show piece of our aggressive sales pitch for wood around the world.

And we will be selling aggressively. I will be anywhere that government matters, helping you pitch BC wood products.

It will highlight new and innovative wood building products and techniques.

It will help us meet the market demands of tomorrow and continue building on the success you have had in the Asia Pacific markets.

Safety

As this conference gets underway, I'd like to close my remarks by personally thanking you for your efforts to reduce fatalities and serious injuries in the forestry sector.

Safety is families first.

Since this issue was on front pages in 2005, you have reduced the fatality, lost time and serious injury rates significantly.

It has made you more competitive as an industry and more attractive to new workers.

And it means more moms and more dads get to come home every night to their families.

I know at Interfor, under the leadership of Duncan Davies, this improvement has been part of a big culture shift.

Interfor has taken the stance: if you want to work, you follow the safety rules.

I know a lot of other companies share this view. It's more than a slogan, it's a new standard.

I agree: Safety has to be the industry standard.

We have come a long way but I still believe we can do better. I am calling on you to finish the job.

Become a provincial and world leader by taking the next step and make us even more competitive on the world stage.

We aren't done until everyone gets home at night safe and sound.

Conclusion

As I said at the beginning of my remarks, we are living in times of economic uncertainty.

But you have proven that BC and Canada have an advantage compared to much of the world.

We are and will continue to be a safe harbour in stormy seas.

If we as government lead the way and get out of the way of job creators;

If we have the infrastructure in place, like roads and ports, and develop new markets in the Asia Pacific;

If we can work together to grow our markets, invest in a skilled workforce and keep BC's reputation as a safe place to invest;

I believe we can come out of this stronger than when the economic troubles began.

Everyone in this room has an important role in helping us get there.

Helping us to build a British Columbia where families have opportunities to put food on the table for their kids no matter what part of BC they call home;

The turmoil may scare others into hunkering down.

But I say now is the time to make a concerted effort to lead Canada towards new markets, new investment and new jobs.

You have started us down that path and we are now more committed than ever to continuing that journey.

This is our chance to lead.

This is our chance to grasp a generational opportunity.

We sit on the Pacific edge of this country - we face Asia and the world's economic future.

This is our time.

- On Thursday, we are announcing the full details of our BC Jobs Plan and I can tell
 you, the development of export potential for Liquified Natural Gas plays a big role in
 it.
- Right here in Kitimat, the Haisla First Nation has developed agreements with the proponents of the LNG project, EOG Resources and Apache Corporation, which will provide ongoing economic benefits to the Haisla and other communities of the NW.
- This is a great success story and I want to take a moment to say congratulations to the Haisla and the proponents on working to together to develop mutual beneficial agreements.
- Your leadership is paving the way for new jobs and benefits to flow to First Nations and non-First Nation communities across the north.

Second, we have to have the infrastructure so we can get goods to markets.

There are lots of people who don't understand just how important roads, rail, bridges, ports and airports are to supporting jobs.

They form a web that ties our country together in a very real way.

And the third pillar is making sure we know what the emerging markets in Asia want and that they know we can provide it.

As your Premier, I am committed to making sure we sell BC so that businesses grow trade with Asian markets...

...So that more goods move through Metro Vancouver, Prince Rupert and Vancouver International airport.

Diversified markets are key to ensuring people have jobs.

Now you can't have stable pillars without a strong foundation.

These three pillars are supported by a foundation made up of a skilled workforce, and continuing to keep government's fiscal house in order.

Road Rail Utility Corridor

As I said, the importance of our roads, ports, and rail to jobs and our economic stability cannot be overstated.

That's why I am pleased to announce as part of our BC Jobs Plan a significant commitment to connect BC and Canada to growing markets in the Asia Pacific.

We are committing \$15-million towards the \$90-million Road Rail Utility Corridor project on Ridley Island.

CN Rail and the Port of Prince Rupert are each contributing \$30 million towards this project. I want to thank you for that.

Our most important partner in this venture is the federal government.

The support and leadership of Stephen Harper's government has been tremendous.

Today's announcement, with my government, CN and the Port all able to confirm our respective contributions, simply would not have been possible without our national government at the table.

It is the first phase of a \$300-million project.

It will make sure we can get more rail cars and trucks in and out of the terminals on Ridley Island.

It means 576 jobs during construction, with millions in wages going into the pockets of workers.

It means more longshore jobs in the future – good paying jobs here in Prince Rupert.

And it means we can meet the increasing demand for coal and other goods in the growing Asia Pacific markets.

Port Property Tax Act

I also spoke earlier about how important it is for government to support job creators and get out of the way of people who are growing jobs.

So I am also pleased to announce we will be introducing legislation to make permanent the existing temporary municipal tax rate caps for B.C.'s major port terminals.

This will ensure all of our ports are able to attract private sector terminal investments and support future developments.

And we will also review the Ports Property Tax Act, with the possibility of expanding the program to other ports.

Natural Gas

Later today I'll be in Kitimat to lay out some clear goals and markers for the development of Liquified Natural Gas export terminals in this region of the province.

We want to create a new industry with the capacity to export B.C.'s natural gas to overseas markets.

If we don't fight for this opportunity, we could lose it. We have a plan to move forward aggressively.

We want to see the Kitimat liquefied natural gas plant operational by 2015.

And our goal is to work with all the partners to have three new terminals in place in 2020.

I'll also be meeting with members of the Haisla Nation who are very involved with the proposed Kitimat LNG terminal and have benefitted from it.

I'll be talking with the Haisla about future economic development in the northwest.

The BC Jobs Plan is about putting all our families first.

We are fighting to protect jobs that help people put food on the table for their kids.

We are fighting to support a robust private sector that helps us pay for those services, like health care and education.

With markets growing in the Asia Pacific, we believe the future of our country lies in our ability to connect Canada to the world.

Today I have started to outline our BC Jobs Plan and that's what it has to be – a plan for the entire province, by the entire province.

Not a plan for the government, not a plan for one party – but a plan that brings all of us together and moves us all forward ... together.

No matter where you live in this country, in BC we know that Canada Starts Here.

- The International Education Strategy will create jobs and build on the success of universities like Thompson Rivers by targeting specific countries to find prospective students who can best fill our future job needs and increase our connections in the global economy.
- We are also adjusting our skills training to focus on regional needs, making sure labour supply meets demand and we have the most people with good jobs as possible.

Thank you for joining me today.

We are here in the traditional territory of the Shuswap Nation, and the Kamloops Indian Band.

Let me start by congratulating Ron Olynyk, former chair of the board of governors, on the honourary degree he will receive in October for his tremendous contributions to Thompson Rivers University.

It is well deserved.

Thompson Rivers University is an amazing success story.

And Ron, you played a big role in that.

But there's a larger story here that's worth telling.

This is an education success story, but it is also a success story when it comes to growing our economy and creating jobs.

And you know, people don't usually think of events at educational institutions like this as a jobs event. Or see universities as job creators – so let's change that!

Let's see universities for what they are and can be in BC – major BC job creators.

And so... jobs are what I am here to talk about today... defending and creating jobs... that is my government's primary mission - job creation.

Kamloops is an example of what communities coming together can accomplish.

Back in 2003/2004, the Friends of UCC University Society led the charge to get full university status.

You got thousands of people together. You put your shoulders to the wheel for Thompson Rivers University.

And you made it happen.

Kamloops is an example of what thinking big and embracing the global economy can accomplish.

Since then, the number of international students studying here at TRU has almost doubled.

Through the TRU World program, this institution drew about 1,500 international students here last year.

And they pumped \$88 million into the Kamloops economy.

The contribution of TRU to your community creates jobs.

It's part of what makes this a great place to live and raise a family.

On Thursday I'll be announcing the full details of our BC Jobs Plan, but I wanted to come here to Kamloops today to announce **2** big pieces.

The Plan is called Canada Starts Here.

We chose this name because we know BC can pull Canada into the next century – we know we can lead this country like never before.

Canada starts here because we are at the Pacific edge of the nation, and we are literally facing the future of the world in Asia.

But if we want to be successful, every region of BC will have to work together, just like you have.

So, the two parts of the jobs plan I'd like to talk about today are: our international education strategy and our skills training plan.

Chief Gottfriedson, I know that skills training is very close to your heart.

These two announcements are about growing our economy and defending and creating jobs in the short term.

But they are also about how we build on Canada's diversity and grow more talent in BC to meet the skills shortage on the horizon.

International Education

First, international education...

People in Kamloops know that international education creates jobs, it drives growth and it spurs innovation.

We want to grow those job opportunities.

BC's International Education Strategy will help us target specific countries to connect international students with the right schools and communities.

We are known world-wide for the quality education we offer.

Today, I am announcing that the province is setting an aggressive target to grow our international student population in BC by 50 percent over the next 4 years.

Across BC, international education supports 22,000 jobs and puts more than \$1.25 Billion into our economy.

If we meet our targets, we can put 9,000 people to work and put another \$500 million dollars into our economy.

94,000 international students choose BC as a place to study each year.

That's 30 per cent of all the international students in this country.

But I believe we can do better. Canada is recruiting more and more students each year but compared to other countries, on a percentage basis, we are doing quite poorly. This is inexcusable given the tremendous opportunity and amazing feedback we receive from student who come here.

And so I am also announcing that we will create an International Education Council and we will leverage BC's trade offices to help connect students to BC's education opportunities.

We want to showcase our colleges, technical institutes and universities.

If you want to study in BC, there should be no wrong doors to knock on.

Our strategy will make sure communities are ready to welcome students from abroad...

...that we are building long term relationships with existing and emerging economies like China, India and Brazil.

...And we are sending more of our students overseas to prepare them to work in a global economy.

But BC's strategy will be about more than bricks and mortar.

It's about the human relationships that will build connections between BC, Canada and the rest of the world.

Think about it...right now, as I speak, more than 1,000 international students are heading to class at Douglas College in the Lower Mainland.

And do you know what they are learning? Richard, a computer science student from India, said he is doing more than preparing for a job... he is learning to be a Canadian.

Whether students like Richard choose to stay in BC or return to their homes, they will always have a connection here.

This is a big part of BC's plan to create jobs now and help fill jobs in future years when we know skilled workers will be in short supply and high demand.

Let's face it – once you move to BC, it's hard to leave.

Here in Kamloops, International TRU grad Usman Vahidy, is working at the Business Development Bank of Canada for a year.

Coming from the United Arab Emirates, he's bringing a global experience to fill a local demand here in the interior.

Skills Training

And this leads me to the second thing I'd like to speak to you about – skills training.

You know, I was up in Fort Nelson earlier this month and there's a lot of work going on up there in the natural gas industry.

But some of those jobs are being filled by people who don't live or pay taxes in our province.

Now I've got nothing against Albertans, but it's clear in Fort Nelson that skill development hasn't kept pace with industry demand.

That situation isn't unique. We expect to have a million job openings in the next 10 years and 70 per cent of those will require post secondary education.

We won't always have a workforce primed and ready to go. Not unless we start working on this now – together.

That's why as part of the BC Jobs Plan, we are taking the following actions in the area of skills training:

1) We are setting up Regional Workforce Tables throughout BC – a new platform for educators, industry, labour, and small business.

They will work as partners with local chambers of commerce across the province and they will have real input, and real dollars, into how the province delivers skills development programs on a regional basis – including up to \$15 million annually for post-secondary institutions.

- 2) We will work in partnership with industry to ensure job demands in key sectors are met in areas such as forestry, mining, tourism, technology, transportation, the wine industry, and service industries. And we will provide up to \$6 million to help sectors identify their skills and workforce needs.
- 3) The province will ensure that the more than a half a billion dollars spent annually on labour market and training programs is better targeted to meeting regional and industry needs. Moreover, we spend close to \$2 billion a year on post-secondary education. We will make sure we're training people for jobs that will exist when they graduate.

4) In December, we will hold a major provincial training conference to bring together a wide range of stakeholders to explore ways to meet industry apprenticeship needs.

These initiatives are all about open government.

They're about listening and they're about collaborating with the right people to ensure we get things done together.

Why does all this matter? We have to give our young people job opportunities to work WHERE they grow up.

And, in particular, we have to make sure that BC's young aboriginal people have those opportunities too...

Yesterday, I was up in Kitimat talking with the Haisla First Nation about economic development in their region.

Young people there want to work. They want to stay and live in their home community.

They want opportunity.

The Regional Workforce Tables are part of our plan to make sure their young people can work in the Liquefied Natural Gas Industry if they choose to.

Aboriginal young people are the fastest-growing demographic in BC.

The number of First Nations' young people will grow twice as fast the rest of Canada's work force in the next decade.

We must work with First Nations leaders to meet the needs of their young people.

That's why we support agreements like the one we have with Kamloops bands to share mineral tax royalties from the New Afton Mine.

These are real opportunities for First Nations communities to become actively involved in training and development opportunities around the mine.

Right now, as we speak, young people in Kamloops are exploring opportunities at the Aboriginal Trades Forum.

We want to support the hopes and aspirations of all our young people, including those who are committed to staying and growing in their hometowns.

BC Jobs Plan

On Thursday, I will be officially announcing the BC Jobs Plan. It has three key pillars.

First, we have to be good at supporting a thriving business environment.

Government has to know when to lead and when to get out of the way – and that means clearing the path for businesses to create jobs for families.

Second, we have to build the infrastructure to get their goods, ideas and products to markets faster and more efficiently.

That means bridges, roads, ports and airports.

But it also means strengthening the human connections to other countries. That's where the International Education strategy will play a part.

The third pillar of our jobs plan is about opening up markets for BC goods – it's about making sure we know what the emerging markets in Asia want and making sure they know we can provide it.

Education is part that pillar too – it is one of the areas we need to sell hard overseas.

It's also one of our most important exports, with young British Columbians studying abroad and bringing home skills and experiences that build our province in new ways.

I am going to be the best salesperson BC has ever had.

Stable pillars need a strong foundation. Our plan has two.

The first is training a skilled workforce to get the jobs that BC will need people to do tomorrow. And I've talked about that today.

The second foundation is preserving our government's reputation for fiscal discipline.

This foundation is so important – because we can't continue to be a safe harbour for investment if we aren't prudent about our economy.

You've probably heard me say before that everything I do is about putting families first.

Good citizens come from families that instil character ... they become the foundation for strong, stable and safe communities, that make a great province and a great country.

Being a parent is the most important thing I do, and I suspect the same is true for all of you.

And what do you need to be a good parent?

You need a job.

That's why we created the BC Jobs Plan.

Our province is a place of relative economic calm and stability, but we are surrounded by a world of economic turmoil... Europe struggles with a debt crisis and a crisis of confidence.

Our best friend and closest neighbor, the United States, continues to grapple with high unemployment, high debt and political gridlock.

I am not going to sugar-coat reality, the world is facing stormy seas ahead.

But we won't keep our heads above water by hunkering down.

I believe our plan says the best defence is a good offence.

BC has incredible advantages that make us truly unique in the world:

- Our proximity to the world's biggest markets
- Our diverse population
- World class infrastructure
- Sound fiscal fundamentals
- A wealth of natural and intellectual resources

We need to build on our position of strength... and <u>never</u> has this been more important than now, given the global economic uncertainty we are facing.

Building on our strengths is what our BC Jobs Plan will do.

Conclusion

I want to thank everyone in this community who fought to make TRU what it is today.

Post-secondary institutions play an important role in driving innovation, growing connections and building local economies.

Your ability to galvanize around an opportunity is a lesson to every one of us.

The work you have done here hasn't just shaped Kamloops. It is shaping BC.

Your work will help us ensure we can lead Canada in growing our connections in international markets.

That we can defend and create jobs for families. That we can attract and train skilled workers.

That we can afford to provide the quality government services we all depend on.

Today I have started to outline parts of our BC Jobs Plan – and that is just what it has to be – a plan for all of BC.

Not a plan for government, not a plan for one party. But a plan that unites us, a plan that brings us together.

You've helped teach us how to reach out and shake hands with our global neighbours. And those bonds will build a bridge of opportunity for all of our country.

You are taking the best of Canada and making it better.

This is our time. This is our opportunity.

INTRODUCTION

On behalf of the Government of British Columbia, I am delighted to be here tonight to commemorate the 62nd Anniversary of the founding of the People's Republic of China.

Thank you to Consul General LIANG for inviting me and indeed all of us to be here at this important National Day event.

I am honoured to speak about British Columbia's strong relations with China. We are, after all, China's closest neighbour on the other side of the Pacific Ocean.

My government values this friendship with China and we are committed to making the relationship even stronger.

We have worked to strengthen the strong ties between representatives of my government and China's consular representatives in Vancouver, as well as through bilateral arrangements with our sister-province Guangdong, and through engagement with other government and business officials.

ASIA PACIFIC

Since the launch of BC's trade and investment office in Shanghai in 2007, British Columbia has made it a priority to deepen this relationship.

Since then, two more offices— in Beijing and Guangzhou — have opened, and the Asia-Pacific Business Centre was established in Vancouver to help investors from Asia and China connect to business and economic opportunities here in British Columbia.

British Columbia is proud to be Canada's gateway to Asia. China is an important partner – and deeply valued friend.

Which is why China is the first country I will visit when I embark on my first overseas visit as Premier in November. Travelling with me will be a delegation of government officials and industry representatives who, like me, are committed to deepening this important relationship.

Our ties with China not only promote our mutual economic and trade interests; they also promote better understanding – of B.C. in China and of China in B.C.; and they encourage cultural and social connections.

CLOSE TIES TO CHINA

As Canada's Pacific province, B.C. has many personal bonds with China.

These historic bonds predate the creation of Canada itself. Some of Canada's earliest pioneers came from China in search of gold and fortune.

Since those early days over 150 years ago, Chinese entrepreneurs have been building the economy of BC and we continue to look to China to expand our international trade and drive investment in order to create new jobs for both our countries.

Our people-to-people ties with China have also continued to strengthen as a result of decades of immigration and growing family and business connections that have contributed to an emerging global society that has taken hold here in BC. The diversity of our people is truly our greatest strength in a globally connected world.

Today, hundreds of thousands of British Columbians speak a Chinese dialect as a mother tongue, and thousands of Chinese visa students are enrolled in our education system. Our school districts and post-secondary institutions are actively engaged in joint programming and these connections, in turn, contribute to intercultural understanding and friendships between our young people.

And Guangdong is British Columbia's sister province and 16 B.C. municipalities have similar relationships with Chinese counterparts.

We have good friends in China.

My government looks forward to an even stronger, mutually beneficial relationship - with China.

And to continuing our harmonious friendship with your people.

It has been an honour speaking with you today.

Soon, your population will top Vancouver's.

That immigration is part of what makes Surrey so successful, and it is also one of the key advantages that BC has to offer – strong family and business connections to India and other Asian countries.

That's why we're working with our federal counterparts to increase the number of applicants we can accept through our provincial nominee program.

The South Asian community – which makes up 28 percent of the population here – has been essential for driving small business growth at home and for opening up trade for all of us across the Pacific.

And as Surrey grows, your diversity will grow ... it will make your community richer and your small businesses stronger.

CANADA STARTS HERE

Tomorrow I will be announcing the full details of our plan, but today I want to talk about the important role small business has to play.

Our plan is called Canada Starts Here.

We chose this name because we know British Columbia can pull Canada into the next century – we know we can lead this country like never before.

It means we can take the best of Canada and we can make it better ... right here in BC.

Executing on this plan is my central mission as your Premier.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Today, I am announcing three tax initiatives that will help BC small businesses defend and create jobs, while they drive innovation across our economy.

First, we will be enhancing the Small Business Venture Capital Tax Credit by investing an additional \$3 million dollars into it.

This plan already helps small businesses deal with one of their key challenges – getting the capital they need to start up or expand – and that's what we need to create jobs for BC families.

The program will be expanded so that more angel investors can get a 30 percent refundable tax credit for investing in eligible small businesses – and that means these job creators can get a leg up on capital, on hiring and on receiving strategic advice from experienced investors.

This program is already helping companies like Surrey's own Endurance Wind Power, one of the world's safest and most efficient wind turbines for producing clean energy. Glenn Johnson, Endurance Wind Power's CEO, has said that along with a strong business plan and a great team, the Venture Capital Tax Credit has been a key ingredient to Endurance's success.

The second announcement I am making today is an extension of the apprenticeship tax credit that has been helpful to so many small businesses here in Surrey.

BC is expected to have more than one million job openings in the coming decade.

So British Columbia needs a highly skilled workforce.

And this government is committed to helping employers and workers get the skills they need.

That's why we're extending our \$31 million dollar a year Apprenticeship Training Tax Credit for another three years.

Extending this funding will give employers and apprentices the certainty they need to plan their business and their education.

Apprenticeships are a great way for young people to get their careers off on the right foot and to set themselves on a course for a lifetime of good jobs.

And the third announcement I am making today is that the Minister of Finance will be appointing a panel to review BC taxes to see how they can support business competitiveness and economic growth to enable job creation.

This panel will bring together members of the small business community, tax experts and people from the government to develop recommendations to make sure BC's tax regime is attractive to global investors and that it encourages innovation.

As many of you know, Vikram is the owner of Vij's in Vancouver.

It's not just one of the best restaurants in BC – it's one of the best in the world.

One of the best Indian restaurants in the world – and it's not in India – it's right here in British Columbia.

And that's something we should all be proud of.

That's the power of small business in BC.

JOBS PLAN PREVIEW

These initiatives are all key parts of our BC Jobs Plan – as I said, it's called "Canada Starts Here."

While others will hunker down and try to weather the storm of global economic turmoil, we will go out there and find new markets and new investment, to create jobs right here at home.

The BC Jobs Plan is built around the focused pursuit of that first new dollar. This means bringing new investment here so each new dollar can grow, and multiply and circulate – circulate from the initial investment, to our value added sectors, to our small businesses and, finally, to dinner tables, rec rooms and ice rinks from one end of BC to the other.

There are three pillars to our jobs plan.

The first pillar is enabling job creation with a commonsense government that opens doors instead of closing them, that makes things simple for business by getting out of the way when we can.

And that means promoting education that matches the needs of our economy, so that people who live in all parts of BC can find jobs that will allow them to stay close to home ... keeping families together, while building a stronger economy.

And the second foundation is preserving our government's reputation for fiscal discipline.

This foundation is so important – because we can't continue to be a safe harbour for investment if we aren't prudent about our finances.

We all feel a special pride in being Canadians. We are well thought of around the world and respected for our diversity and our tolerance – but Canada also has a well-deserved reputation for fiscal responsibility.

Canada's debt to GDP ratio is 36% - if you look south, it's 72%.

I am proud to say that BC's ratio is only 15%.

Here in BC we take Canada's fiscal prudence onestep further through our commitment to low taxes and balanced budgets. The best of Canada combined with the best of BC allows us to be a safe harbor, with a triple AAA credit rating and a stable banking system.

And I want to take a second to say thank you to my friend Kevin Falcon, one of Surrey's MLAs and British Columbia's Finance Minister. Every day Kevin keeps a firm hand on the budget and I can't tell you how much all British Columbians should appreciate that.

You will notice our BC Jobs Plan is not about figuring out how many tax dollars we can spend ... in fact the spending commitments are really quite modest.

Darn right they are.

I'm quite proud of that – we are being smart and strategic, because I think taxpayers deserve to be treated with respect.

We're not just going to recirculate your money – we're going to go out and get new investments from new markets.

I'd like to acknowledge my caucus members in attendance, as they stand up - please give them a warm round of applause.

lain Black is here today as well.

And most importantly I want to acknowledge all the job creators in the room and that's you.

You know, my grandfather was a member of the trade delegation that went to Japan with this Board of Trade in 1954. I found this wallet of his from the trip when I was cleaning out some boxes in my garage a couple months ago. He worked for a B.C. small business, Nelson Brothers Fisheries. He was the production manager and he went on this trade mission that flew through Anchorage, Alaska and then on to Japan. The whole point was to reach out to open new markets and create new jobs in British Columbia.

I am really proud he did that, and that the Board of Trade had the foresight to lead that mission in the 1950s. Fifty-seven years later, I am standing here before the same organization to talk about the same thing – new markets, new opportunities and good jobs for families.

Back then, it was no small task, but he went anyway.

Just think about it. Nine years after the end of World War Two, imagine how unknown

Japan was to people in our part of the world. You couldn't get live streaming news from

Tokyo over the Internet. And you definitely couldn't watch Iron Chef on TV.

But way more importantly, in 1954, it would have been impossible for British Columbians to provide the kind of help we are providing as Japan recovers from the recent natural disasters. Back then, Japan must have felt like another planet. Yet today, they are B.C.'s third-largest trading partner.

This shows how far a determined effort and a clear vision can take our economy and our province.

And it's time to do it again.

Our plan is called Canada Starts Here.

We chose this name because we know British Columbia can pull Canada into the next century – we know we can lead this country like never before.

It means we can take the best of Canada and we can make it better - right here in B.C.

Executing on this plan is my central mission as your Premier.

Our plan is centered on bringing what we call the "first new dollar" to British Columbia.

This means bringing new investment here so each new dollar can grow, and multiply and circulate – circulate from the initial investment, to our value added sectors, to our small businesses and, finally, to dinner tables, rec rooms and ice rinks from one end of B.C. to the other.

Our BC Jobs Plan is built on three pillars and today I'd like to tell you about some of the key initiatives we'll be implementing as part of this plan:

The first pillar is enabling job creation with a commonsense government that opens doors instead of closing them, and makes things simple for business by getting out of the way when we can.

Does that mean stripping back environmental and other social protections?

Absolutely not. But it does mean taking a businesslike approach focused on the end game – defending and creating jobs for BC families.

Our jobs plan recognizes that sometimes government must lead the way. But sometimes the best thing government can do is get out of the way.

I am announcing today that we will establish a "Major Investments Office" that will help businesses who want to invest in B.C. get the answers they need in a quick, clear way.

This office will facilitate answers, make sure timelines don't slip and negotiate solutions to problems. If the answer is "yes," let's get there as quickly as possible and get the jobs created as soon as we can.

I am also announcing today that we will move aggressively to eliminate one of the big problems inhibiting job growth in our province – the endless delays in permitting approvals.

We will invest \$24 million across natural resource ministries over two years, in order to eliminate the backlog in key authorizations that is preventing projects from proceeding.

Let me stress, we are not changing environmental protections.

And we are also adding more resources to make sure we continue to meet our legal obligations to First Nations – and continue to involve them in the benefits of economic development.

We are going to take the time we need to protect our clean air and water, but we are not going to leave investors hanging because the government that makes the laws can't process the permits.

I am also announcing today that the new BC Jobs and Investment Board will be up and running in 60 days. It will include citizens from across B.C. to promote economic development by holding government's feet to the fire to make sure we are doing everything possible to make B.C. competitive – and not standing in the way of good jobs.

B.C. will only win if we win together, so this board will bring together business leaders and labour leaders, community leaders and government to fight for jobs like never before.

I am also announcing the establishment of an Aboriginal Business and Investment Council to help connect First Nations to capital and expertise, so deals can get done, jobs can get created and progress can be made.

And by 2015 the B.C. government will sign at least 10 new non-treaty economic development agreements with First Nations to further improve economic certainty.

But this plan won't just help Aboriginal people – it will help every British Columbian by increasing investment in our province.

Small business is a key driver of job growth and the cornerstone of many communities. The potential of clean technology and the creative economy, of digital media and the arts, to bolster our economy and enrich our lives is one of the reasons that I announced in Surrey yesterday three tax initiatives to help small businesses in these areas and others.

These include a competitiveness review of business taxation to ensure the film industry and others benefit from streamlined administration.

We will also make the most of B.C.'s natural gas advantage. I will be our top salesperson as we work to grow new natural gas markets in Asia for B.C. – I will market this resource with a single-minded focus and promote the use of natural gas as a transportation fuel.

We will take action to realize the potential of Liquefied Natural Gas. As I announced in Prince Rupert on Monday, we will clear the way and secure the investment required to establish up to three LNG plants by 2020.

We have enough electricity available to launch the first two phases of the project.

And I need to be clear here today – we will not allow a lack of power supply to stand in the way of further important steps in this project.

Earlier this week I met with leaders of the Haisla First Nation to talk about LNG and they have a real problem on their hands – it's going to create more jobs than their community can fill. I think that's a problem a lot of communities would like to have.

The second pillar of our jobs plan is about continuing to build smart infrastructure, and I don't just mean bricks and mortar ... I mean people, too. We need to support the human relationships that help us succeed, the unity we must foster and the education we must strengthen.

That's why earlier this week in Kamloops I announced that the province is setting an aggressive target to grow the international student population in B.C. by 50 per cent in just the next four years.

And our physical infrastructure is the start of a web that also ties our country together in a very real way.

Our ports are not just British Columbia's ... they are Saskatchewan's ports too. The workers building the Port Mann bridge know they aren't just building it for the Lower Mainland – they are building it for families in places like Woodstock, Ontario so they can get auto parts delivered from Asia.

This coast is Canada's coast – and that is why I am announcing today that we will invest \$50 million o improve the B.C.-owned rail corridor that connects Deltaport to Canada's transportation network.

With this contribution, the Port of Metro Vancouver can now move forward on a \$200-million expansion to increase container capacity, enabling the creation of over 600 jobs at port operations and ensuring goods move efficiently. This follows my announcement on Monday that B.C. is committing \$15 million towards the Road Rail Utility Corridor on Ridley Island.

We will also be thinning our border with the United States to help trade and people move more efficiently.

We will be consulting broadly and announcing further infrastructure investments in the coming weeks, many of them with our good partners the federal government – and all of them made with an eye to defending existing jobs and creating new ones.

The third pillar of our jobs plan is about opening up markets for B.C. goods.

It's about doing what my Grandfather did in 1954, but doing it today on a much larger scale and harnessing all of the strengths our B.C. team has to offer.

We will focus especially on China and India, where economies are growing and the middle class is coming to the fore. The middle class in India alone is expected to be more than 10 times the size of Canada's entire population in less than 20 years.

We need to be great at expanding and understanding those markets, and producing goods to feed their demands.

Opening up new markets for B.C. is key to our success, and I intend to lead this effort personally. I intend to be the chief salesperson for our province as we take our place leading this great country.

By selling B.C. wood all over the world, we have created a renaissance in the forest sector – 27 mills have opened in the last two years, including one in Kitwanga. A sizeable chunk of that mill's sales will be going to China, Japan and Korea. I was there when they opened the mill in Kitwanga and I've seen what a positive effect it's had on that community. There are 481 people living there and that mill – which started with that first new dollar – employs 45 of them. And about three quarters of those employees are First Nations people.

Those are real jobs, for real families right here in British Columbia – and it shows the impact of focusing on trade with Asia – and the power that trade can have all over our province, in communities large and small.

It also shows the power of Pat Bell, our Jobs Minister, and it's a great example of why I gave him the job in the first place.

And all over B.C. we see examples of small businesses working in Asia too, leveraging the strength of established local community connections with those Asian markets.

Like Surrey-based Jhajj lumber, who have just recently started shipping their first ever containers of wood to India.

As many of you know, to increase our share I am going to lead a trade mission to China and India, so that I can make sure we're working with the right people, with the best ideas, to open up and expand markets for B.C.

We are launching an investor-focused international marketing campaign and I will have more to say about this tomorrow at the Business Council's Asia Pacific Forum.

These three pillars – enabling job creation, building smart infrastructure and opening new markets – will stand on two key foundations.

The first foundation is creating a strong, skilled B.C. workforce, trained for the jobs our economy needs today and in the future. And that means promoting education that will give our citizens the best chance to get the good jobs that will allow them to stay close to home, keeping families together, while building a stronger economy.

It also means having an immigration system in place to support job creation. That's why we support an increase to the number of applicants we can accept through our provincial nominee program, and we're working with the federal government on any other strategies we can identify.

And the second foundation is preserving our government's hard-earned reputation for fiscal discipline.

This foundation is so important – because we can't continue to be a safe harbour for investment if we aren't prudent about our finances.

We all feel a special pride in being Canadians. We are well thought of around the world and respected for our diversity and our tolerance – but Canada also has a well-deserved reputation for fiscal responsibility. Here in B.C. we take Canada's fiscal prudence one-step further through our commitment to low taxes and balanced budgets.

Canada's debt to GDP ratio is 36 per cent – down south in the US it's a whopping 72 per cent. And I'm proud to say that here in B.C. it's only 17.5 per cent. That's one of the reasons we have a triple AAA credit rating.

This is what I mean about taking the best of Canada and making it better.

We have to stick to our fiscally prudent course – we can't honestly say we are putting families first if we are saddling future generations with more and more debt.

High debt policies won't work for tomorrow and they won't work for today either. Just ask Greece; go ask the European Union; go ask anyone who lived through the 1990s right here in British Columbia.

You will notice our BC Jobs Plan is not about figuring out how many tax dollars we can spend – in fact the spending commitments are really quite modest. I'm quite proud of that.

We are being smart and strategic, because I think taxpayers deserve to be treated with respect.

Our plan is premised on the focused pursuit of the first new dollar. To do this we have identified eight sectors with the greatest opportunity to bring that first new dollar into British Columbia.

These key sectors are:

- Forestry
- Mining
- Natural gas
- Agri-foods
- Tourism
- Transportation
- · Technology, clean tech and the green economy, and
- International education.

These are sectors where our unique advantages – our creativity, our diversity, our resources, our geography – will put us on the path to success. They are sectors that will lift our entire economy by helping the businesses small and large that are the engine of job growth and create the greatest number of spin-off jobs.

They were chosen because they drive export growth. And that means everyone wins.

If you want to see how it works, take the example of the little town of Princeton. Two hundred and seventy people in Princeton now have a good job because of the mine at Copper Mountain – a job they can rely on when they need to buy a new truck – a job that will allow them to renovate their home. And maybe for the first time, they'll be able to put lunch in their children's lunch boxes each and every day.

The mine was shut down in the 1990s, and they were able to re-open Copper Mountain, based on one contract, with one company, in one Asian country.

That's how that first new dollar helps everyone. Because whether you work in manufacturing or the service industry, those dollars move around quickly.

Increased commodity prices make expanded mining a great opportunity for B.C. And the fact that our companies set the global standard for responsible mining means we can take advantage of it.

That means more revenue for health care and education.

We need to create more Princetons.

I've told you what we plan to do - now I'd like to talk about why we are doing it.

Everything I do is about putting families first – families of all shapes and sizes.

Good citizens come from families that instill character – and they become the foundation for strong, stable and safe communities. That's what builds a good province and ultimately that's what builds a great country.

And what makes families strong and stable?

You need a good job.

That's why a thriving private sector is so important. You create wealth, and in doing so, you create jobs. And you also create the revenues needed for education, for health care and for the services we all depend on.

You will notice our plan is about defending the jobs we have as well as working to create new ones. And that's important.

Our province is a place of relative economic calm and stability, but we are surrounded by a world of economic turmoil. Today alone we have seen a global market sell off, a significant decline in our own currency and an escalating crisis in the Eurozone.

Our best friend and closest neighbour, the United States, grapples with high unemployment and high debt. Even their own treasury secretary admits many are questioning whether their political system can deal with the economic turmoil.

I don't have to sugar-coat anything for you, the world is facing stormy seas ahead. But we will not keep our heads above water by hunkering down.

Our plan says the best defense is a good offence.

In the 1990s, North America underwent one of the biggest economic expansions in its history and, I'm sorry to say, British Columbia sat it out. The government of the day raised taxes, drove up debt, and chased away investment. And they killed jobs in every community doing it. They pitted one British Columbian against another, they divided our society and the results were tragic.

Businesses were lost ... families saw their dreams go up in smoke ... and then families were pulled apart as 50,000 people left the province looking for a better life.

They were looking for jobs.

We spent the last 10 years catching up.

B.C. turned the page in 2001 and worked to repair the damage done and end the divisive battles.

We got our fiscal house in order by giving taxpayers the respect they deserve, by using proven economic fundamentals, by cutting taxes and by balancing budgets.

A little common sense went a long way.

We saw our credit rating go up and we improved our quality of life because we could afford investments in health and education.

Now we are going to turn the page again and build on the platform of the last 10 years.

We are going to pull together as one B.C. team, with one focus – good stable jobs for BC families.

B.C. has incredible advantages that make us truly unique in the world:

- Our proximity to the biggest markets on the globe.
- · Our diverse population.
- Our world class infrastructure.
- Our sound fiscal fundamentals.
- And a wealth of natural and intellectual resources.

We need to build on our position of strength... and <u>never</u> has this been more important than now.

I am a proud Canadian and I'm even prouder because B.C. will be leading Canada into the next decade. We will invite our fellow Canadians to join us and we will tell the world "Canada Starts Here."

This is a unique moment in history for us to do more than our fair share for the rest of Canada, to grasp B.C.'s opportunity to help build an even greater country.

Canada starts here because we are at the Pacific edge of the nation, and we are literally facing the future of the world in Asia.

Our location and geography is an asset, but it is just one part of the B.C. story.

Diversity is at the core of who we are: it is a key strength for our society and it enriches every one of our lives.

From New Canadians to the strength of our young First Nations people, to the people of Asian and Indian descent who have been settled here for a century or more now, our diverse population is a key asset to expanding our economy and making sure that B.C. families prosper.

40 per cent of the population of Greater Vancouver identify themselves as Asian. If you want to argue there is an Asian city outside of Asia, Vancouver is it.

There has never been a place like this in the history of the world. And we have a plan to capitalize on our unique advantages.

Today I have outlined our BC Jobs Plan and that's what it has to be – a plan for the entire province, by the entire province. Not a plan for the government, not a plan for one party – but a plan that brings all of us together and moves us all forward. And that means we need to listen

As you know, I am a big proponent of open government.

This jobs plan will be "exhibit A" of that commitment. If you visit the website http://www.bcjobsplan.ca/ you will see that a public engagement effort is now getting underway.

We're also going to initiate regional and sectoral engagement across the province, with communities, with chambers and with everyday British Columbians.

We will also be issuing semi-annual reports to British Columbians to tell them about our progress, but also to ensure we improve the plan using what we've learned from talking to British Columbians.

I am doing this because government doesn't have all the answers and we need your help – because government doesn't create jobs, you do that.

I am optimistic as we look forward to tomorrow. I know our province can lead this country if we are at our best – if we are united, if we are optimistic and if we are confident.

As I worked with our team to prepare this plan, I took my inspiration from what this Board of Trade – and my Grandfather – did so many years ago with the mission to Japan. They were writing the story of B.C. and we are going to keep writing it – today and tomorrow.

We are facing a generational opportunity, and we are going to lead Canada into next century.

This is our time.

This is our chance to lead.

This is our moment.

When it comes to building the future, Canada Starts Here.

It lays out how we will grow our connections with emerging markets in Asia... to defend and create jobs ... and attract that first new dollar into BC.

Because as everyone here knows, a big part of our economic opportunity lies there over there ... that's where our future lies.

In many ways, our success rests on our ability to build on the advantages that come with our diversity – our historic family and business connections to India, China and other Asian countries.

But in stormy seas, it's not just economies that shut down, too often it's people's hearts. Not here.

We have an advantage in British Columbia – embracing diversity is second nature to us.

While other nations facing economic strain will look inward, we will look outward – looking for friends.

Friends from around the world. Friends who have been woven into the fabric of British Columbia for over a century. Because our society is not one that defines itself by how tolerant we are, but how we welcome and embrace others, and become a part of each other's lives.

CANADA STARTS HERE

These ideas are at the heart of our BC Jobs Plan.

It's called "Canada Starts Here."

We chose this name because we know British Columbia can pull Canada into the next century – we know we can lead this country like never before.

We know we can take the best of Canada and we can make it better ... right here in BC.

We won't succeed if British Columbia remains the world's best-kept secret ... that's why I am going be BC's top salesperson – I will be focused like a laser on making the case for our province, our people ... our plan.

Smart Infrastructure Pillar

The second pillar of our jobs plan is about continuing to build smart infrastructure, and I don't just mean bricks and mortar ... I mean people too.

I don't have to tell the people in this room how important that is.

Our BC Jobs Plan sets an ambitious target of growing the international student population in BC by 50 percent in just the next four years. We estimate this will create 9,000 jobs and put another \$500 million dollars into our economy.

But we also get much more. We get the brain power of students like Xu Zhang from Beijing. As part of the Mitacs internship program, she worked at SFU this summer modeling and designing power trains for hybrid vehicles.

And we get social connections with students like Usman Vahidy.

This Thompson Rivers grad is working at the Business Development Bank of Canada for a year and bringing in global experience to fill a local demand.

Now whether Usman chooses to stay in BC or go back to the UAE, he will always have a connection here.

Our plan focuses on strengthening the physical infrastructure as well ... and we are making significant investments in port infrastructure here at Deltaport and at Ridley Island off Prince Rupert.

Opening Markets Pillar

The third pillar of our jobs plan is about opening up markets for BC goods. This is what the announcements made earlier are about – and they're just the beginning.

In November I am going to China and India on a trade mission and I will personally lead this effort as the chief salesperson for our province. One of the most important stops will come on November 14th, when I address the World Economic Forum in Mumbai. Our trade mission will spend time in Guangzhou, China, Shanghai and Beijing as well as Delhi, Bangalore, Amritsar and Chandigarh.

In many ways, these efforts will be about building on success.

Look at (Palisus) Pelesys Learning Systems. With the support of our trade and investment team, (Palisus) Pelesys just signed a contract with the Commercial Aircraft Corporation of China.

Their software will be used to train Chinese pilots flying commercial planes ... but their employees will be working in Richmond.

Business will be a key partner in our efforts. I may be the chief salesperson, but I can't be the only one ... so I hope you'll join us.

When I first started talking with Pat Bell about the BC Jobs Plan, he told me that the most important moment in the renaissance of the BC forest industry was when the whole sector realized they needed to present a united front in China.

And now we need our whole province to do the same thing.

Twin foundations – skilled workforce and fiscal responsibility:

These three pillars – enabling job creation, building smart infrastructure and opening new markets – will stand on two key foundations.

The first is a strong, skilled BC workforce, trained for the jobs our economy needs today and in the future.

And that means promoting education that will give our citizens the best chance to get the good jobs that will allow them to stay close to home ... keeping families together, while building a stronger economy.

It also means having an immigration system in place to support job creation. That's why we support an increase to the number of applicants we can accept through our provincial nominee program. And we are working with the federal government on any other strategies we can identify.

The second foundation is preserving our government's hard-earned reputation for fiscal discipline.

And this foundation is so important – because we can't continue to be a safe harbour for investment if we aren't prudent about our finances.

We all feel a special pride in being Canadians. We are well thought of around the world and we are respected for our diversity and our tolerance – but Canada also has a well-deserved reputation for fiscal responsibility.

Here in BC we take Canada's fiscal prudence onestep further through our commitment to low taxes and balanced budgets. Canada's debt to GDP ratio is only 36% - compare that to the US, where it's a whopping 72%.

And I'm proud to say that here in BC it's only 17.5%.

And that's one of the reasons we have a triple AAA credit rating.

That is what I mean about taking the best of Canada and making it better.

We have to stick to our fiscally prudent course – we can't honestly say we are putting families first if we are saddling the next generations with debt.

High debt policies won't work for tomorrow and they won't work for today either ... just ask Greece ... just ask the European Union ... go ask anyone who lived through the 1990s in British Columbia.

This is one of the reasons our BC Jobs Plan includes very modest spending commitments. We are being smart, we are being strategic ... because I think taxpayers deserve to be treated with respect.

FAMILIES FIRST

I've told you what we plan to do – now let me tell you why we are doing it.

Everything I do is about putting families first – families of all shapes and sizes; families that are however you define them.

Good citizens come from families that instill character ... and they become the foundation for strong, stable and safe communities. That's what builds a good province and ultimately that's what builds a great country.

And what makes families strong and stable?

You need a good job.

If you want to know what a difference a job makes, take the example of the little town of Princeton.

270 people in Princeton now have a good job because of the mine at Copper Mountain.

A job they can rely on when they need to buy a new truck.

A job that will allow them to renovate their home.

And maybe for the first time, they'll be able to put lunch in their children's lunch boxes each and every day.

The mine was shut down in the 1990's, and they were able to re-open Copper Mountain, based on one contract, with one company, in one Asian country.

BC's commitment to families is also a key reason we are going to succeed in our efforts to sell in China – a passionate commitment to families is a fundamental value we share in common.

THREATS

You will notice our plan is about defending the jobs we have as well as working to create new ones. And that's important.

Our province is a place of relative economic calm and stability, but we are surrounded by a world of economic turmoil. Every day seems to bring a new shock. Yesterday alone we saw a global market sell off, a significant decline in our own currency and an escalating crisis in the Eurozone.

Our best friend and our closest neighbor, the United States, continues to grapple with high unemployment and high debt.

Even their own treasury secretary admits that many are questioning the ability of their political system to deal with the economic turmoil.

I don't have to sugar-coat it for anyone here, the world is facing stormy seas ahead.

But we won't keep our heads above water by hunkering down.

Our plan says the best defense is a good offence.

OPPORTUNITIES

BC has such incredible advantages, ones that make us truly unique in the world:

Our proximity to the world's biggest markets
Our diverse population
Our world class infrastructure
Our sound fiscal fundamentals
And a wealth of natural and intellectual resources

As I said earlier, our diversity is a core advantage. We share cultures and values ... family ties and business connections.

40 percent of the population of Greater Vancouver identify themselves as Asian. If you want to argue there is an Asian city outside of Asia, Vancouver is it.

There has never been a place like this in the history of the world. And we have a plan to capitalize on those unique advantages.

Conclusion

Today I have outlined our BC Jobs Plan and that's what it has to be. Not a plan for the government, not a plan for one party – but a plan for our entire province. A plan that brings all of us together and moves us all forward.

That means we need to listen and I hope you will let Pat and I know what you think about it – and how we can make it better.

After all, government doesn't have all the answers ... and government doesn't create jobs, you do that.

I am optimistic as we look forward to tomorrow. I know our province can lead this country if we are at our best – if we are united, if we are optimistic and if we are confident.

We are facing a generational opportunity, and we are going to lead Canada into next century.

This is our time.

This is BC's chance to lead.

This is our moment.

When it comes to building the future, Canada Starts Here.

UBCM ADDRESS

INTRODUCTION

I first want to thank Barbara Steele for the work she has done over the past year as your president. She's been a strong, reasoned voice for UBCM and has made sure the issues that matter to you got the attention they deserve.

All of you give up your time and put a lot of energy into making your communities a better place to live.

It's a real commitment you make.

I also want to acknowledge a few mayors who are stepping down this fall after many years of service:

Chris Causton, the mayor of Oak Bay has served on Council since 1987 and has been mayor since 1996.

Mayor Bernice Magee of Burns Lake has served five terms on council, the last three as mayor.

In Salmon Arm, Mayor Marty Bootsma, who I spent time with this week, has dedicated 12 years to municipal office – half of that as mayor.

And Mayor Joe Trasolini from Port Moody is stepping down after first being elected to office in 1996 and serving as mayor since 1999.

I want to thank you and all the elected officials not seeking re-election for the work that you do.

And it wouldn't be UBCM without acknowledging Mayor Gerry Furney, who has been a leader in the town of Port McNeill in six decades.

I also feel very fortunate that I followed Gordon Campbell, who had a much harder job when he took the reigns. And Gordon also rebuilt our relationship with UBCM, making it one of the most important dates on the political calendar.

So thank you for inviting me today to speak.

It has been a great week of listening to you, and learning about the work you are doing and the needs of the citizens you represent.

This week I've met with individual representatives from more than 50 communities across BC, and I've met a lot of interesting characters ... James Baker ... George Burns ... James Brown.

And after speaking with James Brown ... I feel good. Like I knew that I would.

I feel so good I'm smiling.

One of my critics was with you yesterday and he spent some time complaining that I do that too much.

But you know why I smile? Because I'm optimistic.

I have hope.

And when I look around this room, I see a lot of smiling faces.

Mayor Dave MacDonald is smiling because Liquefied Natural Gas has the potential to make Port Edward a boomtown.

Everyone one of them – and everyone one of you – runs for office because you believe it's possible to make your community better.

You have hope. You are optimistic.

If you didn't believe you could make the future better, why run for office?

Believing you can help create a <u>better future</u> by <u>coming up with a plan</u> and executing on it is the <u>essence of leadership</u>.

And it begins with optimism.

No matter how tough the times get, we have to stay positive. Don't you agree?

I have been reminded again this week about the value our municipal governments provide – in so many ways you are the glue that holds our communities together ... and that means you play a vital role in holding BC together.

The fact that the smallest village can carry the same weight as the largest cities here at UBCM means this is a great forum to listen to each other ... it is also a great forum for all of us to benefit from the wisdom rural British Columbians have to offer.

I believe in rural BC and that's one of the reasons I appointed Donna Barnett as Parliamentary Secretary for Rural Communities ... one of the things Donna has to offer is a background in local government. ANNOUNCEMENT

Today I am pleased to be making an announcement that will help create jobs and strengthen families and communities across BC.

Our government is going to help local communities around BC open the doors to new or improved recreation facilities where they live.

We are creating a \$30 million dollar fund that local governments can apply to for capital projects that will promote healthy living in your communities.

We will partner with you to invest up to 80% of the funds for the recreational facilities and projects that will create jobs and allow families to spend time together, having fun and getting healthier.

You only have to look to Nakusp to see the impact these kind of investments make.

I have heard time and time again from leaders in this room and many of your citizens about the need for these facilities, particularly in rural BC. It's good for families, and it's families that build strong communities.

Today is a proud day for me.

Today is the first day that our government is providing smoking cessation products free to British Columbians who want to kick their habit.

The program started at midnight last night.

Our first call for a prescription came in at 11:58 PM.

By 9:45 this morning, 300 prescriptions had already been filled.

And I'll tell you as an ex-smoker, this is proof that small investments can go a long way.

BC JOBS PLAN

Last week we announced our jobs plan, called Canada Starts Here.

We chose this name because we know British
Columbia can pull Canada forward— we know we can
lead this country like never before.

It means we can take the best of Canada and we can make it better ... right here in BC. And I mean in all parts of BC.

Canada starts at Prince Rupert, the edge of our gateway.

It starts in Kamloops, where they host over 2000 international students.

It starts in the Elk Valley, which feeds Asia's demands, and it starts in the First Nations communities on Vancouver Island, who will provide tomorrow's workforce.

Our plan is about bringing what we call the "first new dollar" to British Columbia.

This means bringing new investment here so each new dollar can grow, and multiply and circulate – circulate from the initial investment, to our value added sectors, to our small businesses and, finally, to dinner tables, rec rooms and ice rinks from one end of BC to the other.

That first new dollar will give small businesses the power to start up and grow, and they will create jobs all over BC.

We will not look inward. We will not be pessimists. we will stand up and reach out like never before.

We will have hope for what is possible if we work hard together.

We are ensuring that BC's reputation as a safe harbour is well known in international financial markets. Minister of Finance Kevin Falcon is on a plane today to visit Europe's financial centres to share B.C.'s success story.

And we have so many unique advantages that are part of BC's story - our creativity, our diversity, our resources, our geography. Each and every one of your communities has something to unique offer and something to gain.

In the little town of Stewart there are new opportunities that can come from a new port ... up and down Vancouver Island the benefits of a growing organic agri-food sector are just starting to be felt ... and in cities like my hometown of Burnaby, the strength of our digital and creative economies are providing great jobs for young people.

That's one thing Derek Corrigan and I can agree on.

Our jobs plan sets a path to follow to build on that position of strength.

The first pillar of our jobs plan is about enabling job creation with a common-sense government that opens doors, and makes things simple for business by getting out of the way when we can.

Our plan moves aggressively to eliminate one of the big problems inhibiting job growth in BC – delays in permitting approvals.

We will invest \$24 million dollars across the natural resource ministries over two years, in order to eliminate the backlog in key authorizations that is preventing projects from proceeding.

The second pillar of our jobs plan is about continuing to build smart infrastructure.

Our government will be working with you to find new ways to invest in the kind of infrastructure that will create jobs and strengthen our communities.

That's why the Evergreen Line here in the Lower Mainland is such an important opportunity.

It will help so many people get to their jobs and will create new jobs doing it.

It's an important step in relieving congestion, but also in providing clean air, protecting our environment and making BC a better place for families. That's why our government is dedicated to seeing the Evergreen Line completed – it's why we have committed \$583 million dollars to it.

I know transportation Minister Blair Lekstrom has had a lot of good dialogue with the Mayors Council and we await their decision.

The third pillar of our jobs plan is about opening up markets for BC goods.

We will focus especially on China and India, where economies are growing and the middle class is coming to the fore.

Expanding trade with markets in the Asia-Pacific region will be the key to our success moving forward.

And that's why opening up those markets is so important to our success and yours.

I'm proud of the work that many of your local governments have been doing to open up new markets through our BC Asia Twinning Project.

To date, 23 BC municipalities have signed Memorandums of Agreement with the province and have received twinning grants for a total of \$1 million dollars, to foster new trade relationships with Asia.

Those relationships are part of our gateway to Asia.

BC JOBS PLAN AND MUNICIPALITIES

Now I've already told you why our plan is called Canada Starts Here.

But when we say that about BC, we are really talking about each and every one of the communities you represent.

Look at the Harmac pulp mill in Nanaimo that employs 325 people or the cellulose mill in Port Alice that employs 385 ... when some people were about to give up, those communities and those workers had hope. They refused to throw in the towel. They came together, worked on a plan supported by government, and implemented it – and in doing so, they defended jobs in their communities.

Those partnerships shouldn't only happen when the chips are down ... that's the lesson of "Initiatives Prince George," where community and business leaders are blazing the trail for new opportunities like their airport expansion ... and that means new jobs.

One of the foundations of our jobs plan is creating a strong, skilled BC workforce, trained for the jobs our economy needs today and in the future, so they can get a job that will allow them to stay close to home.

And we're also working on initiatives like our government's partnership with Telus, which will have a direct impact on strengthening BC communities.

This partnership means better broadband and cellular services in rural BC and First Nations communities, so they can all capitalize on the economic and educational opportunities that being connected provides.

Upgrades in Lytton, Crawford Bay, and Revelstoke have already been completed.

And more are coming in Wyndell and Cape Mudge, which is represented by my friend Jim Abrams.

RCMP

As I said, it's clear that the things that unite us are far greater than those that divide us ... and our work on your behalf to get a reasonable agreement with the federal government for policing is one of those things.

I think 'The General,' Shirley Bond, is doing a great job on behalf of all British Columbians.

Now, I know the federal government is just as committed as you are – and as the province is – to keeping our families safe and our communities secure ... so I am hopeful we can reach an agreement.

We need an agreement that mandates accountability for the RCMP and protects you and your taxpayers by keeping costs under control. We cannot put our property taxpayers on the hook for unchecked spending on things that don't put a single officer on the streets or single criminal behind bars.

It would be easier to simply sign on the dotted line and get it over with, but we need to keep in mind that this agreement is for 20 years.

I don't know where you'll be, but I'll be eligible for CPP by then.

BC JOBS PLAN AND MUNICIPAL AUDITOR GENERAL

We are committed to keeping a strong, steady hand on the wheel when it comes to our finances.

The US's debt to GDP ratio is a whopping 72%.

Canada's is half of that.

And I'm proud to say that BC's is half of Canada's.

That's one of the reasons we have a triple AAA credit rating.

Simply put, staying committed to low taxes and balanced budgets is a key part of our plan to attract investment.

It is necessary to create jobs ... and this approach is critical to maintaining BC's status as a safe harbour in stormy seas.

Respect for taxpayers is the key reason we will be creating a Municipal Auditor General through legislation.

I can certinaly understand why some don't like the idea.

But we have one at the provincial level and he keeps us on our toes. Auditors General ensure the public knows they are getting value for every tax dollar. Value for money audits have led to improvements that have literally put money in the pockets of taxpayers.

The Municipal Auditor General will be able to help the 188 communities in British Columbia learn from each other – because when there's a million ways to do one thing, wouldn't you like to know which ways are working best?

The BC government will pick up the tab for the Municipal Auditor General – but as you save money, it's your communities that will reap the benefits.

I know local governments still have lots of questions – and we will continue to work with the UBCM executive in the weeks ahead.

OPEN GOVERNMENT

One of the key changes I am making in government is a commitment to open government – to making sure that we have the most open provincial government in the country.

As part of this commitment I have been holding open town hall meetings across the province to hear from people directly.

The very first one was in Fort St. John, where we heard about the benefits of shale gas extraction, but also about some of the concerns.

Listening to those concerns encouraged us to launch a detailed health study in North East BC.

I know the issue of gaming grants is of prime concern for many of you – so we committed to an open discussion on how to create a sustainable, predictable funding formula for the non-profit organizations that receive those funds.

Skip Triplett has headed this up and travelled across the province to get input into funding.

That's open government in action.

That spirit of listening is why the meetings I've had this week have been so valuable.

When I met with Mayor Andy Anderson from Ashcroft, he told me about an exciting opportunity for their community. They believe they have the perfect area for tech investment, so I promised I'd work with them on it and be a salesperson for them – so if they need me to meet with investors, I'll be there.

We have also adopted the most robust open data platform of any province in Canada by making 2500 datasets fully available to the public ... and I am happy to say municipal leadership from Surrey, Langley and Vancouver helped lead the way and set the standard.

ECONOMIC THREAT

You will notice our plan is about defending the jobs we have as well as creating new ones. And that's important.

Our province is a place of relative economic calm and stability, but we are surrounded by a world of economic turmoil.

Our best friend and closest neighbour, the United States, grapples with high unemployment and high debt. Just this week we saw consumer confidence in the US stagnate at a two-year low.

And last week we saw a global market sell off and an escalating debt crisis in the Eurozone.

High debt policies won't work for tomorrow and they won't work for today either ... just ask Greece ... go ask the EU ... ask anyone who lived through the 1990s right here in British Columbia.

Businesses were lost ... families saw their dreams go up in smoke ... and communities like yours were pulled apart as 50,000 people left the province looking for a better life.

Our small communities were hit particularly hard ... because when a mill shuts down you can see it on mainstreet when restaurants close, stores are shuttered and small businesses go under.

Kitimat has weathered some tough times and lost its second biggest industrial taxpayer.

But new opportunities are now emerging for the Kitimat community and the Haisla First Nation, in the form of Liquefied Natural Gas. The story in Kitimat shows us that while we face challenges ahead, opportunity is just around the corner if we look for it.

That's why today we're taking a different approach – we are focused on going out into the world and finding new investments that will help improve life here at home.

PARTNERSHIP

But our jobs plan can't be successful if we are going it alone.

Our government wants to work with the UBCM, to identify creative ways to defend and create jobs, together.

Implementing this plan is my central mission as your Premier and I want your help ... so I say "come join me – let's do this together."

As Premier, I know our provincial government can do more to remove the barriers to job creation. There is an awful lot we can do better.

And I ask you to do the same.

Let's challenge ourselves to become the most competitive place to do business, not by compromising environmental safeguards, but by being smart, responsive and nimble.

ADVANTAGES

BC has incredible advantages that make us truly unique in the world:

- Our proximity to the biggest markets on the globe
- Our diverse population
- Our world class infrastructure

INTRODUCTION

I'd like to acknowledge a few people before I start.

- Ida Chong, Minister of Community, Sport and Cultural Development and MLA for Oak Bay-Gordon Head;
- Murray Coell, MLA, Saanich North & the Islands, and
- Mayor Dean Fortin, City of Victoria.

I wanted to come here today because when I think about the things that are going right in this province, I think of the Victoria region. You have shown what can be accomplished when businesses set aside divisions and pull together to do great things. The partnerships between your universities and the technology sector are an example to the rest of BC.

The Vancouver Island Technology Park at UVIC is bringing together industry and bright minds to drive research and innovation.

There's a \$2.6-billion tech industry here in Greater Victoria.

Even during the recession, Victoria's larger high tech firms reported 7.5 per cent revenue growth and an 11 per cent increase in employment.

The sector provides jobs to more than 12,000 people. Good paying jobs.

The work you are doing in technology will support BC's other sectors like forestry, mining and natural gas. It keeps us on the cutting edge.

And Victoria continues to be a leader in areas like tourism, and international education.

CANADA STARTS HERE

Recently we announced our jobs plan, called "Canada Starts Here."

We chose this name because we know British Columbia can pull Canada forward— we know we can lead this country like never before. It means we can take the best of Canada and we can make it better ... right here in BC. And I mean in all parts of BC.

Canada starts in Comox at Shelter Point where they have founded the country's second single malt whisky distillery.

It starts in Nanaimo where 325 people are working at the Harmac pulp mill.

And it starts here in Victoria at CoolEdge Lighting where they are working new LED technology.

Our plan is centered on bringing what we call the "first new dollar" to British Columbia. This means bringing new investment here so each new dollar can grow, and multiply and circulate – circulate from the initial investment, to our value added sectors, to our small businesses and, finally, to dinner tables, rec rooms and ice rinks from one end of BC to the other.

We have identified eight sectors that are best positioned to bring in those first new dollars. Three of those play a big role Victoria's economy: tourism, technology and international education.

Bringing in that first new dollar will give small businesses the power to start up and grow, and they will create jobs all over BC.

The world is facing stormy seas ahead. But we will not keep our heads above water by hunkering down.

BC will not look inward – we will stand up and reach out like never before.

BC Jobs Plans

Enabling Job Creation Pillar

The first pillar of our jobs plan is enabling job creation with a commonsense government that opens doors instead of closing them, that makes things simple for business by getting out of the way when we can.

That's why the Minister of Finance will be appointing a panel to review BC taxes to see how we can support business competitiveness and economic growth to enable job creation.

This panel will bring together members of the small business community, tax experts and people from the government to develop recommendations to make sure BC's tax regime is attractive to global investors.

I am focused on small businesses as part of this plan because of the transformative power they can have on job creation.

Also, we are enhancing the Small Business Venture Capital Tax Credit by investing an additional \$3 million dollars into it.

This plan helps small businesses deal with one of their key challenges – getting the capital they need to start up or expand – and that's what we need to create jobs for BC families.

The program will be expanded so that more angel investors can get a 30 percent refundable tax credit for investing in eligible small businesses – and that means these job creators can get a leg up on capital, on hiring and on receiving strategic advice from experienced investors.

It means a lot to Victoria companies, like General Fusion where they are working on a new green process to create energy using sea water.

They are benefitting from a \$1.2 million tax credit to support their innovative start-up.

As part of enabling jobs, we are also extending of the apprenticeship tax credit that has been helpful to so many small businesses here in Victoria.

BC is expected to have more than one million job openings in the coming decade. So British Columbia needs a highly skilled workforce.

And this government is committed to helping employers and workers get the skills they need.

The Province is supporting B.C.'s robust shipbuilding industry with a \$550,000 investment to develop training strategies for workers within a new industry-led marine training centre that Camosun College will help develop.

It's also why we are backing Seaspan's bid for the National Ship Building Procurement with \$35 million to support training and other labour tax credits.

Seaspan has an opportunity to create 500 jobs here in Esquimalt and an opportunity to train a whole new generation of ship builders. We are doing and will continue to do everything in our power to support that effort.

Smart Infrastructure Pillar

The second pillar of our jobs plan is about continuing to build smart infrastructure, and I don't just mean bricks and mortar ... I mean people too.

I don't have to tell the people in this room how important that is.

Our BC Jobs Plan sets an ambitious target of growing the international student population in BC by 50 percent in just the next four years.

We estimate this will create 9,000 jobs and put another \$500 million dollars into our economy.

94,000 international students choose BC as a place to study each year.

That's 30 per cent of all the international students in this country.

There are currently close to 1,700 international students enrolled at the University of Victoria and another 600 at Camosun College.

These students bring more than \$80 million into the local economy.

There's another 1,700 at Vancouver Island University that bring close to \$60 million.

We are gathering leaders from our educational institutions to work and leverage BC's trade offices to help connect students to BC's education opportunities.

We want to showcase our colleges, technical institutes and universities.

We want an international education expert in every one of our international trade offices.

If you want to study in BC, there should be no wrong doors to knock on.

Our strategy will make sure communities are ready to welcome students from abroad...

...that we are building long term relationships with existing and emerging economies like China, India and Brazil.

...And we are sending more of our students overseas to prepare them to work in a global economy.

Government is supporting our colleges and universities with investments like \$15 million for a new Learning and Innovation Centre at Royal Roads; \$21 million for new buildings at UVIC; and close to \$2 million for buildings at Camosun's Lansdowne and Interurban campuses.

But this strategy is about more than bricks and mortar.

This is about strengthening the human relationships that will build connections between BC, Canada and the rest of the world...something your universities already know a lot about.

Royal Roads is the FIRST university in B.C. to have a graduate program in environmental management approved by the Chinese government.

And Royal Roads students are working in partnership with the Tianjin University of Technology to develop an eco-city in China.

Another example, China's top energy researchers were at UVIC this spring exploring green technology and clean energy solutions with our researchers.

But it wasn't an "ivory tower" event. They were joined by industry, bringing together the key ingredients for partnerships that will drive innovation AND grow business opportunities in the future.

Opening Markets Pillar

The third pillar of our jobs plan is about opening up markets for BC goods. Growing new markets is critical the future stability of our province and our country.

In November I am going to China and India on a trade mission and I will personally lead this effort as the chief salesperson for our province.

One of the most important stops will come on November 14th, when I address the World Economic Forum in Mumbai.

Our trade mission will also spend time in Guangzhou, China, Shanghai and Beijing as well as Delhi, Bangalore, Amritsar and Chandigarh.

In many ways, these efforts will be about building on success.

The global investment community is aware of BC but we want to make sure they know about opportunities here on Vancouver Island.

There are huge opportunities for Victoria when it comes to increasing international tourism.

I know visitor numbers for the first half of the year show visits from the U.S. to BC are down this year.

It illustrates why we can't rely on one just one market.

Last year, the federal government signed the Approved Destination Status (ADS) agreement with China.

Under the new agreement, Chinese citizens are now able to travel to Canada in organized tour groups.

And do you know where the first group from China chose to start their Canadian visit? They came here.

For visitors, the Vancouver Island is magic.

When you live here you tend to forget that we have rainforests and castles and killer whales all within an hours' drive.

There's a reason we can expect to see visits from China grow 15 to 20% annually over the next three years.

As part of the BC Jobs Plan, we want to focus our efforts on promoting those tourism products where BC can achieve growth most quickly, and aggressively focus our promotional efforts in those markets around the world where we can have the greatest impact.

While we work on new opportunities in countries such as China, we will not lose sight of the markets that lie to the south and east of B.C.

Pat Bell, Minister of Jobs, Tourism and Innovation, has been working hard with our tourism industry partners on a new strategy for the sector and he will be announcing those details in the coming weeks.

And I want to applaud the collective vision for a new float plane terminal in Victoria's inner harbor. It will bring more visitors and enhance the visitor experience.

Twin foundations – skilled workforce and fiscal responsibility:

These three pillars – enabling job creation, building smart infrastructure and opening new markets – will stand on two key foundations.

The first is a strong, skilled BC workforce, trained for the jobs our economy needs today and in the future.

To this end, we are setting up Regional Workforce Tables throughout BC – a new platform for chambers of commerce, educators, industry, labour, and small business.

These tables will have real input, and real dollars, into how the province delivers skills development programs on a regional basis – including up to \$15 million annually for post-secondary institutions.

The second foundation is preserving our government's hard-earned reputation for fiscal discipline.

And this foundation is so important – because we can't continue to be a safe harbour for investment if we aren't prudent about our finances.

We all feel a special pride in being Canadians. We are well thought of around the world and we are respected for our diversity and our tolerance – but Canada also has a well-deserved reputation for fiscal responsibility.

Here in BC we take Canada's fiscal prudence onestep further through our commitment to low taxes and balanced budgets. We have to stick to our fiscally prudent course – we can't honestly say we are putting families first if we are saddling the next generations with debt.

This is one of the reasons our BC Jobs Plan includes very modest spending commitments. We are being smart, we are being strategic ... because I think taxpayers deserve to be treated with respect.

Municipal Auditor General

Respect for taxpayers is the key reason we will be introducing legislation to create a Municipal Auditor General next month.

No doubt, Auditors General tend to be more popular with taxpayers than they are with politicians, and I suspect that will be the case with the Municipal Auditor General as well.

We have an Auditor General at the federal and provincial level. And now we will have one to help the 180 communities in British Columbia learn from each other – because when there's a million ways to do one thing, I think we'd all like to know which one is working best?

FAMILIES FIRST

You know the thing I have noticed as I travel this province is how much we have in common ... how the things that bring us together are so much bigger than the things that pull us apart.

We're all trying to look out for the people around us, and that's what I call putting families first.

And the reason I care about families is because it is families that do something that government cannot do, something that schools cannot do, and that's instill character. It gives children, future citizens, a sense of morals, a compass to guide them through life, ethics.

It's families that build character, and when families build character, they build good citizens, and good citizens build great communities, safe communities, and that's what builds a great province.

And that, ultimately, is what makes Canada great. It begins with the work that families do.

Families are as diverse as the people represented here today, but for all of that diversity, families need the same thing.

They need to be able to care for one another. They need to be able to be there in times of crisis, to offer a loving hand for somebody who perhaps isn't doing so well.

OPPORTUNITIES

BC has such incredible advantages, ones that make us truly unique in the world:

- Our proximity to the world's biggest markets
- Our diverse population
- Our world class infrastructure
- Our sound fiscal fundamentals
- And a wealth of natural and intellectual resources

Our diversity is a core advantage. We share cultures and values ... family ties and business connections.

There has never been a place like this in the history of the world. And we have a plan to capitalize on those unique advantages.

Conclusion

Today I have outlined our BC Jobs Plan and that's what it has to be. Not a plan for the government, not a plan for one party – but a plan for our entire province. A plan that brings all of us together and moves us all forward.

Our government wants to work with businesses to identify creative ways to defend and create jobs, together.

After all, government doesn't have all the answers ... and government doesn't create jobs, you do that.

And THIS is a plan for Victoria and all of Vancouver Island. The technology, tourism and international education sectors have a huge role in bringing in that first new dollar. We must work together.

This is a chance for us to do more than we ever have for this entire nation. It is a chance to grasp our opportunity to lead this country. Canada starts here because we are at the Pacific edge of the nation.

This is our time. This is our chance to lead. This is our moment, so let's take it.

Let's be hopeful. Let's be optimistic as we tell the world that Canada -- Canada -- starts right here.

It's a heart and soul commitment you make.

Listening to your thoughts and being open to your ideas is something government must do so we can work in partnership to grow our economy.

BC JOBS PLAN

A few weeks ago we announced our jobs plan, called Canada Starts Here.

We chose this name because we know British Columbia can pull Canada forward – we know we can lead this country like never before.

It means we can take the best of Canada and we can make it better ... right here in BC. And I mean in all parts of BC.

Canada starts in Surrey where Jhajj lumber recently started shipping its first ever containers of wood to Port Kandla, India.

It starts in Kamloops, where they host 1,500 international students at Thompson Rivers University.

It starts in the Elk Valley, where they produce steelmaking coal that is feeding China's growth and building their cities.

Our plan is centered on bringing what we call the "first new dollar" to British Columbia. This means bringing new investment here so each new dollar can grow, and multiply and circulate – circulate from the initial investment, to our value added sectors, to our small businesses and, finally, to dinner tables, rec rooms and ice rinks from one end of BC to the other.

This first new dollar gives our entrepreneurs the power to start up and grow, and it will create family-sustaining jobs all over BC.

The world is facing stormy seas ahead.

We are ensuring that BC's reputation as a safe harbour is well known in international financial markets.

Minister of Finance Kevin Falcon just got back from visiting Europe's financial centers.

He was in London, Paris, Frankfurt, Munich and Zurich, meeting with major investors to share BC's success story and encourage them to continue to invest here.

And he met with Credit Suisse, a leading financial services company that has plans to build a new \$200-million office tower here in Vancouver.

We have so many unique advantages that are part of BC's story - our creativity, our diversity, our resources, our geography...

And the innovative spirit of small businesses who export 47 per cent of the total value of goods from the Province.

Our jobs plan helps us build on that position of strength.

Enabling Job Creation Pillar

The first pillar of our jobs plan is about enabling job creation with a common-sense government that opens doors, and makes things simple for business by getting out of the way when we can.

Our plan moves aggressively to eliminate one of the big problems inhibiting job growth in our province –delays in permitting approvals.

We are investing \$24 million dollars across the natural resource ministries over two years, in order to reduce the backlog in key authorizations that is preventing projects from proceeding.

And we have set up a "Major Investments Office" that will help businesses who want to invest in BC get the answers they need in a quick, clear way.

We have extended our commitment to reduce red tape until 2015.

Also, as recommended by **your** members, we are setting up a Jobs and Investment Board. The board will be up and running in 40 days to hold our feet to the fire, clearing the way for job creation while continuing to monitor key economic and social indicators.

Smart Infrastructure Pillar

The second pillar of our jobs plan is about continuing to build smart infrastructure.

We can't generate those first new dollars if we can't get our products, ideas and resources to growing markets. Our government will be working with you to find new ways to invest in the kind of infrastructure - roads, rails and airports - that will create jobs and strengthen your businesses.

That's why we are investing \$50 million dollars to improve the BC-owned rail corridor that connects Deltaport to Canada's transportation network.

And another \$15-million dollars towards the Road Rail Utility Corridor on Ridley Island near Prince Rupert.

And there is a lot more to come...

Opening Markets Pillar

The third pillar of our jobs plan is about opening up markets for BC goods.

We are focused especially on China and India, where economies are growing and the middle class is coming to the fore.

Expanding trade with markets in the Asia-Pacific region will be the key to our success moving forward.

One of the areas where there is huge potential is clean technology and Liquified Natural Gas exports.

In fact just yesterday we moved a major step closer to further establishing the liquified natural gas industry in BC when the National Energy Board approved a 20-year export licence for the Kitimat LNG facility.

This is the first of its kind in Canada and will help open our natural gas sector to new and important markets. British Columbia is on the verge of growth and new economic opportunity with the diversification of our natural gas sector and we are well on our way of establishing the LNG infrastructure to make it happen.

In November I am going to China and India on a trade mission and I will personally lead this effort as the chief salesperson for our province.

One of the most important stops will come on November 14th, when I address the World Economic Forum in Mumbai.

Our trade mission will spend time in Guangzhou, China, Shanghai and Beijing as well as Delhi, Bangalore, Amritsar and Chandigarh.

We are committed to doubling our trade presence in places like China and India. We will reach out to help B.C. companies entering Asian markets. We will be better equipped to welcome foreign investors through a new hosting and business development program.

By focusing on these three pillars we can defend and create jobs all across our province.

Now I know some of you are thinking: this is great for energy companies and mining companies, but how does this plan benefit businesses that aren't directly involved in exports?

Well, you only have to look to the town of Princeton.

270 people are now directly employed in that community because of the mine at Copper Mountain.

They have a job they can rely on when they need to go down to their auto dealer and buy a new truck.

A job that allows them to spend money at the hardware store and renovate their home.

That allows them to go out for a nice meal at a restaurant.

That mine was shut down in 1996, and they were able to re-open Copper Mountain, based on one contract, with one company, in one Asian country.

The enthusiasm and confidence in Princeton that started with Copper Mountain is now driving other business investment.

The Mayor of Princeton has proudly noted a new \$5-million grocery store, a new apartment complex and fast food business are coming to his town.

Focusing on first new dollars is not a plan for the government, or a plan for one party – but a plan for our entire province. A plan that brings all of us together and moves us all forward.

TWO FOUNDATIONS

The pillars of our jobs plan are built on a foundation of a skilled workforce and fiscal discipline.

Creating a strong, skilled BC workforce means having people trained for the jobs our economy needs today and in the future, so they can get a job that will allow them to stay close to home.

That's why we're extending our \$31 million dollar a year Apprenticeship Training Tax Credit for another three years.

We want to preserve our government's hard-earned reputation for fiscal discipline is so important – because we can't continue to be a safe harbour for investment if we aren't prudent about our finances.

I have asked the Minister of Finance to appoint panel to review BC taxes to see how they can support business competitiveness and economic growth to enable job creation.

And we will be enhancing the Small Business Venture Capital Tax Credit by investing an additional \$3 million dollars into it.

This plan already helps small businesses deal with one of their key challenges – getting the capital they need to start up or expand – and that's what we need to create jobs for BC families.

The program will be expanded so that more angel investors can get a 30 percent refundable tax credit for investing in eligible small businesses – and that means these job creators can get a leg up on capital, on hiring and on receiving strategic advice from experienced investors.

We are committed to make the transition back to the PST plus GST tax system as quickly as we responsibly can.

We are not setting a firm transition date yet, but we are targeting March 31, 2013.

We need to be responsible and get it right the first time. There's no second chance here.

By the time the transition is complete, about 30,000 new businesses in B.C. will have started up under the HST. They will need to learn to administer the PST in tandem with the GST.

Helping businesses across B.C. will be a major part of this transition work, and the Province will embark on an outreach program to help businesses make the transition.

Canada's debt to GDP ratio is 36% - down south in the US it's a whopping 75%.

And I'm proud to say that here in BC it's only 17.5%.

That's one of the reasons we have a triple AAA credit rating.

MUNICIPAL AUDITOR GENERAL

Simply put, staying committed to low taxes and balanced budgets is a key part of our plan to attract investment.

It is necessary to create jobs ... and this approach is critical to maintaining BC's status as a safe harbour in stormy seas.

Respect for taxpayers is the key reason we will be creating a Municipal Auditor General through legislation that will be introduced this fall.

When I stood up and spoke about the Municipal Auditor General at the Union of British Columbia Municipalities two weeks ago, it was not the warmest reception.

And I was not surprised. Auditors general tend to be more popular with the public than politicians.

But we plan to have the office operating in early 2012, with the first audits conducted in 2012.

We have an auditor general at the provincial level and he keeps us on our toes. He ensures the public knows they are getting value for every tax dollar.

Value for money audits have led to improvements that have literally put money in the pockets of taxpayers.

We will be funding the office of the Municipal Auditor

General to help find efficiencies and highlight best

practices that can be shared among local governments.

Whether it is policing, parks and recreation or drinking water management, there's a million ways to do one thing. I think we'd all like to know which ways are working best.

Crown corporations review

I spend a lot of time talking to people and one of the things I've been hearing is they struggle to make ends meet. They feel like they are always fighting to get ahead.

That's why we are looking at our crown corporations to do what we can to make life as affordable as possible.

Planned rate hikes by B.C. Hydro have been reviewed and will be reduced by half.

And starting in January, we will be taking a hard look at all our crown corporations to ensure taxpayers and families are protected and the interests of all British Columbians are well served.

OPEN GOVERNMENT

One of the key changes I am making in government is a commitment to open government – to hearing from people directly.

We consulted with you as we built this and it doesn't stop there.

One of the areas I want to hear from you on is how we ensure we have a skilled workforce now and in the future.

Because government doesn't create jobs, you do.

We want to keep working with you.

That's why as part of the BC Jobs Plan, we are asking you to partner with us to set up Regional Workforce Tables throughout BC.

This will be a new platform for educators, industry, labour, and small business.

Working in partnership with local chambers of commerce across the province, these tables will have real input, and real dollars, into how the province delivers skills development programs on a regional basis – including up to \$15 million annually for post-secondary institutions.

ECONOMIC THREAT

You will notice our plan is about defending the jobs we have as well as working to create new ones. And that's important.

Our province is a place of relative economic calm and stability, but we are surrounded by a world of economic turmoil.

Our best friend and closest neighbour, the United States, grapples with high unemployment and high debt. Last month, we saw consumer confidence in the US stagnate at a two-year low.

And despite some recent positive developments, market uncertainty continues in the Eurozone.

High debt policies won't work for tomorrow and they won't work for today either ... Just ask Greece ... go ask the European Union ... ask anyone who lived through the 1990s right here in British Columbia.

That's why today we're taking a different approach – we are focused on going out into the world and finding new investments that will help improve life here at home.

PARTNERSHIP

But our jobs plan can't be successful if we are going it alone.

Our government wants to work with the business community to identify creative ways to defend and create jobs, together.

Implementing this plan is my central mission as your

Premier and I want your help ... so I say "come join me –
let's do this together."

ADVANTAGES

As I said, BC has incredible advantages that make us truly unique in the world:

- Our proximity to the biggest markets on the globe
- Our diverse population
- Our world-class infrastructure
- Our sound fiscal fundamentals
- And a wealth of natural and intellectual resources

So we need to build on our position of strength... and never has this been more important than now.

This is a unique moment in history for us to do more than our fair share for the rest of Canada, to grasp BC's opportunity and build an even greater country.

Canada starts here because we are at the Pacific edge of the nation, and we are literally facing the future of the world in Asia. We are facing a generational opportunity, and we are going to lead Canada into next decade.

This is our time.

This is our chance to lead.

This is our moment.

BC Jobs Plan

The first pillar is enabling job creation with a commonsense government that opens doors instead of closing them, that makes things simple for business by getting out of the way when we can.

Does that mean stripping back environmental and other social protections?

Absolutely not. But it does mean taking a businesslike approach focused on the end game – defending and creating jobs for BC families.

You know as well as I that government doesn't create jobs – business creates jobs.

And sometimes, the best thing government can do is to get out of the way, and let business get to work.

The jobs plan includes \$24 million for natural resource ministries to reduce backlogs on permits and approvals for resource-based projects.

Once the backlogs are addressed, government will maintain an average target of a 60-day turnaround for mining permits and approvals.

We're now going to tackle the significant backlog of permits and approvals. It's an important part of this plan to create and protect jobs.

INFRASTRUCTURE

The second pillar is continuing to build smart infrastructure – roads, bridges and ports – so businesses can get their goods, ideas and products to markets faster.

Here in Nanaimo with the port, airport and ferries, you know the importance of being a transportation hub...

Earlier this year, we invested \$7.5 million to continue passenger rail service on the E&N Rail line.

People up and down the Island came out to show their support for that project.

And transportation and infrastructure investments continue to flow to Vancouver Island.

We've expanded the airports in both Nanaimo and Campbell River.

From 2009 to 2012, the budget for Vancouver Island roads and bridges is close to \$90 million.

That's a lot of asphalt and a lot of construction jobs for Island workers.

And infrastructure projects have had a budget of \$95.7 million.

We are talking about buildings, sportsplexes, water mains, water treatment plants, sewer upgrades, cruise ship terminals, libraries and pier expansions...

But building smart infrastructure is more than bricks and mortar.

It is also about strengthening the human relationships that help us succeed.

That's why as part of our BC Jobs Plan, we want to increase the number of international students to BC by 50 per cent over the next four years...

Did you know that almost 1,700 international students attended Vancouver Island University here in Nanaimo last year...

And they brought close to \$60 million into the economy.

Whether they choose to stay in our province or return to their home country when they finish their education, international students help us build connections with the world.

OPENING NEW MARKETS

The third pillar of the jobs plan is about opening up markets for BC goods –

Vancouver Island's tourism, education, agriculture and technology are things that we need to share with the world.

We're starting with a trade mission to China and India next month to forge new ties and strengthen existing friendships and business relationships.

International education, BC seafood and agri-products, tourism and forestry are all on my agenda.

In the days ahead, we will also be announcing a new tourism strategy.

Pat Bell, Minister of Jobs, Tourism and Innovation, has been engaging a wide range of industry and government stakeholders to develop this plan and I can assure you, ongoing partnerships will continue to provide a solid foundation for success.

The tourism industry on Vancouver Island has such enormous future potential.

It's so picturesque here they are currently filming Superman in Ucluelet because it looks like Alaska, only better.

The Chinese government has designated British Columbia as an approved destination. We can expect many more visitors and tour groups from China.

Last year, almost 120,000 visitors came to B.C. from China, and we expect that number to increase.

Visitors from China stay an average of 28 days because of the long travel distance.

Vancouver Island can capitalize on this by continuing to market itself as a tourism destination.

Mount Washington had the deepest snow base in the world last year...over five metres by the end of December, and was still open for skiing June 1!

What skier wouldn't want to come here to take advantage of that?

Campbell River – the Salmon Capital of the World – does booming business in outdoor sports...

And just this past weekend, Tofino hosted the Queen of the Peak Women's Surf Championships.

The cold-water surfing draws surfers from around the world.

And of course here, in the historic Harbour City, the heritage areas mix with artists' galleries in an eclectic downtown and stunning harbour walkways.

Talking to buyers in Asian markets about BC's value added forest product is also important.

We want to build on the work we have already done with the forest sector.

China is our fastest growing market for wood products.

More than 25 mills in B.C. reopened as a result of helping China meet the needs of its exploding middle class, creating over 6,000 jobs, including jobs on Vancouver Island.

Today I was speaking with Western Forest Products, who, thanks to new and emerging Chinese markets, are able to invest \$200 million to grow their company.

And they've created jobs for Vancouver Island families.

We want more success stories like Western Forest Products, and as your Premier I am going to be your chief sales person to help make this happen. People on Vancouver Island are committed to the future of the forest industry.

And in Port Alice, the Neucel (pronounced New Cell) Specialty Cellulose mill was bought by Fulida Holdings of China to supply rayon fibre.

They've invested \$35 million in upgrades in the mill.

The cellulose fibre product made here is used around the world – in Asia, Europe and other parts of North America.

We want to attract more investment and more buyers, not just in forestry but all our sectors.

The three pillars of our jobs plan – enabling jobs, building infrastructure and opening new markets- are built on a strong foundations.

The first part of that foundation is a strong, skilled BC workforce, trained for jobs today and in the future.

We want to make sure that people who live in all parts of BC can find jobs that will allow them to stay close to home ... keeping families together, while building a stronger economy.

It's why as part of our BC Jobs Plan, we will be partnering with educators, industry, labour, and small business to set up Regional Workforce Tables throughout BC.

Working in partnership with local chambers of commerce across the province, these tables will have real input, and real dollars, into how the province delivers skills development programs on a regional basis – including up to \$15 million annually for post-secondary institutions.

And the second foundation is preserving our government's reputation for fiscal discipline.

This foundation is so important – because we can't continue to be a safe harbour for investment if we aren't prudent about our finances.

Canada's debt to GDP ratio is 36% - down south in the US it's a whopping 75%.

And I'm proud to say that here in BC it's only 17.5%.

That's one of the reasons we have a triple AAA credit rating.

Simply put, staying committed to low taxes and balanced budgets is a key part of our plan to attract investment.

THREATS

You will notice our BC Jobs plan is about defending the jobs we have as well as working to create new ones. And that's very important.

Our province is a place of relative economic calm and stability, but we are surrounded by a world of economic turmoil ... despite some positive news this week, the Eurozone still struggles with a crisis of confidence.

Our best friend and closest neighbour, the United States, continues to grapple with high unemployment and political gridlock.

I don't have to sugar-coat it for you; the world is facing stormy seas ahead.

But we have to do more than tread water.

Our plan says the best defence is a good offence.

OPPORTUNITIES

BC has such incredible advantages, ones that make us truly unique in the world:

- Our proximity to the biggest markets
- Our diverse population
- Our world class infrastructure
- Our sound fiscal fundamentals
- And a wealth of natural and intellectual resources

We need to build on our position of strength... and <u>never</u> has this been more important, given the global economic uncertainty we are facing.

Building on our strengths is what our BC Jobs Plan will do.

We have so many advantages to attract that first new dollar to BC – and when we do, it will circulate through our entire economy and help every British Columbian.

But first we have to put aside the divisions of the past and pull together as one BC team, with one focus – good stable jobs for BC families.

CONCLUSION

The BC Jobs Plan gives us a path to follow that will help us weather the storm and ensure our success as a province.

It means we will have to give it our all and lead Canada like never before.

We know what we need to do and where we need to focus our efforts so we can defend and create BC jobs.

It means we need to listen – listen to you, listen to our small businesses, to our employees, and to our employers – to all British Columbians.

I am optimistic about the future. I know our province can lead this country if we are at our best – if we are united, if we are optimistic and if we are confident.

BC is at a crossroads and Vancouver Island is home to so much potential.

We are facing a generational opportunity, and we are going to lead Canada into next century.

This is our time.

This is our chance to lead.

This is our moment.

When it comes to building the future, on Vancouver Island, Canada Starts Here.

Introduction

Thank you so much for inviting me back.

It's been an amazing year for me.

Last year I was here talking as to you as a broadcaster, now I am here as your Premier.

You want to know how it is going? I'm looking at you Phillip when I say this, "I'm living the dream."

Last year, I started my talk with a joke about Jim Sinclair and a brothel.

Now that I'm wearing the Premier's hat, those jokes just don't seem appropriate. I'm trying to elevate the conversation.

Not that I can say the same for the opposition. For the last three weeks their conversation has been nothing but Dix and my body.

Oh well: genius has its limitations, stupidity doesn't suffer that handicap.

ICBA contributions

I've got to say, I'm so happy to be here. I like working with people who bring suggestions and solutions to the table, who don't just show up with a sack of problems.

People who don't suffer the illusion that government can

solve the world's problems with a never ending supply of cheques and fairy dust.

People who understand that to pay for government services, you have to grow wealth and have a robust economy.

I want to thank you for that.

Since becoming Premier, I've had some great discussions with Phillip and Kurt, (Krampl, Airstream Heating and Air Conditionin, chair of the ICBA board).

And I am looking forward to future conversations with Phil and Steve (Lornie, Stonecroft Management Ltd.) as he takes the reigns for this organization in the coming year.

BC Jobs Plan

I'd like to talk to you today about our BC Jobs Plan.

As a small, open, export-based economy, BC is not isolated from what is going on in the world.

Our province is a place of relative economic calm and stability, but we are surrounded by a world of economic turmoil.

Our best friend and closest neighbour, the United States, grapples with high unemployment and high debt.

And despite some recent positive developments, market uncertainty continues in the Eurozone.

That's why a few weeks ago I announced the BC Jobs

Plan. My entire cabinet is focused on it.

It is centered on bringing what we call the "first new dollar" to British Columbia.

This means bringing new investment here so each new dollar can grow, and multiply and circulate – circulate from the initial investment, to our value added sectors, to our small businesses and, finally, to dinner tables, rec rooms and ice rinks from one end of BC to the other.

Our plan is built on three pillars.

Enabling Job Creation Pillar

The first pillar of our jobs plan is about enabling job creation with a common-sense government that opens doors, and makes things simple for business by getting out of the way when we can.

Our plan moves aggressively to eliminate one of the big problems inhibiting job growth in our province –delays in permitting approvals.

We are investing \$24 million dollars across the natural resource ministries over two years, in order to reduce the backlog in key authorizations that is preventing projects from proceeding.

We have extended our commitment to reduce red tape

until 2015.

Smart Infrastructure Pillar

The second pillar of our jobs plan is about continuing to build smart infrastructure.

We can't generate that first new dollar if we can't get our products, ideas and resources to growing markets.

Our government will be working to invest in the kind of infrastructure - roads, rails and airports - that will create jobs and strengthen your businesses.

Opening Markets Pillar

The third pillar of our jobs plan is about opening up markets for BC goods.

We are focused especially on China and India, where economies are growing and the middle class is coming to the fore.

Expanding trade with markets in the Asia-Pacific region will be the key to our success moving forward.

We have identified eight sectors with the greatest opportunity to bring that first new dollar into British Columbia.

In November I am going to China and India on a trade mission and I will personally lead this effort as the chief salesperson for our province.

By focusing on these three pillars we can defend and

create jobs all across our province.

STRONG FOUNDATION

The pillars of our jobs plan are built on a foundation strong that includes a skilled workforce and fiscal discipline.

Creating a strong, skilled BC workforce means having people trained for the jobs our economy needs now and in the future.

That's why we are setting up regional tables to work more closely with labour and industry.

We want to make sure that in the regions where jobs are being created, we have people trained to work them.

And the second part of that foundation is preserving our

government's hard-earned reputation for fiscal discipline is so important – because we can't continue to be a safe harbour for investment if we aren't prudent about our finances.

We are committed to keeping a strong, steady hand on the wheel when it comes to our finances.

The US's debt to GDP ratio is a whopping 72%.

Canada's is half of that.

And I'm proud to say that here in BC it's half of Canada's.

That's one of the reasons we have a triple AAA credit rating.

We have to stick to our fiscally prudent course – we can't

honestly say we are putting families first if we are saddling future generations with more and more debt.

High debt policies won't work for tomorrow and they won't work for today either ... just ask Greece ... ask the European Union ... go ask anyone who lived through the 1990s right here in British Columbia.

Our BC Jobs Plan is **NOT** about figuring out how many tax dollars we can spend ... in fact the spending commitments are really quite modest.

I'm quite proud of that.

We are being smart and strategic, because taxpayers deserve to be treated with respect.

MUNICIPAL AUDITOR GENERAL

Simply put, staying committed to low taxes and balanced budgets is a key part of our plan to attract investment.

It is necessary to create jobs ... and this approach is critical to maintaining BC's status as a safe harbour in stormy seas.

Respect for taxpayers is the key reason we will be creating a Municipal Auditor General through legislation that will be introduced this fall.

When I stood up and spoke about the Municipal Auditor General at the Union of British Columbia Municipalities two weeks ago, it was not the warmest reception.

And I was not surprised. Auditors general tend to be more

popular with the public than politicians.

We plan to have the office operating in early 2012, with the first audits conducted in 2012.

We have an auditor general at the provincial level and he keeps us on our toes. He ensures the public knows they are getting value for every tax dollar.

The Municipal Auditor General will be able to look across 188 communities in British Columbia and help them learn from each other.

To help find efficiencies and highlight best practices that can be shared among local governments.

I know your organization has voiced concerns about the cost of local government fees on construction, fees that are growing at five times the rate of inflation.

If a municipal auditor can find ways to save local governments money, then you will save money. And that means more construction and more jobs.

PST

I also want to assure you that we are committed to making the transition back to the PST/ GST tax system as quickly and responsibly as we can.

We are not setting a firm transition date yet, but we are targeting March 31, 2013.

Changing a province's tax system is a complex undertaking for both business and government. We need to be responsible and we need to get it right the first time.

There's no second chance here.

It is not just changing the rate of an existing tax. It's bringing back a whole tax system.

Businesses will need to prepare to comply with a second tax that has its own set of rules and procedures that are separate from those they have to follow for the GST.

We have a solid plan in place with a dedicated team to focus on the transition.

By the time the transition is complete, about 30,000 new businesses in B.C. will have started up under the HST. They will need to learn to administer the PST in tandem with the GST.

Helping businesses across B.C. will be a major part of this transition work, and the Province will embark on an outreach program to help businesses make the transition.

OPEN GOVERNMENT

Since I've taken office I've been working to open government.

Our jobs plan can't be successful if we are going it alone, because let's face it, government doesn't create jobs, you do.

We want to work with the business community to identify creative ways to defend and create jobs, together.

And all joking aside, I do believe there are people out there who want to elevate the level of conversation about the future of our province.

As part of the BC Jobs Plan I am committed to opening doors to have those discussions.

It also gives me a chance to explain to people why I believe creating jobs are so important.

FAMILIES FIRST

Good citizens come from families that instill character ... and they become the foundation for strong, stable and safe communities. That's what builds a great province and ultimately that's what builds a great country.

And what makes families strong and stable?

You need a good job.

That's why a thriving private sector is so important. You create wealth, and in doing so, you create jobs.

And you also create the revenues needed for education, for health care and for the services we all depend on.

Conclusion

In the 1990s, North America underwent one of the biggest economic expansions in its history and, I'm sorry to say, B.C. sat it out.

The government of the day raised taxes, drove up debt, and chased away investment.

And they killed jobs in every community doing it.

They pitted one British Columbian against another, they divided our society and the results were tragic.

Businesses were lost ... families saw their dreams go up in smoke ... and then families were pulled apart as 50,000 people left the province looking for a better life.

They were looking for jobs.

We spent the last 10 years catching up.

BC turned the page in 2001 and worked to repair the damage done and end the divisive battles.

We got our fiscal house in order by giving taxpayers the respect they deserve, by using proven economic fundamentals, by cutting taxes and by balancing budgets.

A little common sense went a long way.

We saw our credit rating go up and we improved our quality of life because we could afford investments in health and education.

Now we are going to turn the page again and build on the platform of the last 10 years.

And it's great to see so many people out there smiling today.

I'm often smiling and I've been smiling a lot more in the last few days, because BC is on a roll.

It's about making sure we know what the emerging markets in Asia want and making sure they know we can provide it.

That's why we're going on a trade mission to China and India next month, to forge new ties and to strengthen the existing friendships and business relationships.

We're taking the lessons we learned from selling our wood to China with us – a focused approach, a team of dedicated people, and a long-term commitment...

And we're looking to repeat those results not only in China, but in other countries with other industries and commodities.

Thank xx for the introduction.

It's great to be here.

Exciting things are happening right now in Alberta, and all across Western Canada.

There is a shift underway in the global economy, with a renewed focus on growing markets in the Asia Pacific and this part of the country is really leading the way for growth.

The natural gas industry

You will help lead the way to economic growth in British Columbia;

And your success is a key piece of B.C.'s and Western Canada's success.

A few weeks back, we launched our BC Jobs Plan. It's called "Canada Starts Here."

One of the sectors we are focusing on is natural gas, because the industry is so important to our economy now and in the future.

The natural gas industry contributes a tremendous amount to the lives of families in my province, And I think that's a story that needs to be told and it's one I've been talking about wherever I go.

The natural gas industry provides direct jobs to an estimated 12,000 people.

That's 12,000 people with good, family-sustaining jobs: people who are able to put food on the table and look after their kids because of your work.

But beyond that, natural gas brought in \$1.3 billion to provincial coffers in 2009 and 10, with the overall oil and gas industry bringing in \$6.8 billion.

Your work is important – and it's growing.

I'm keenly aware that it's worth acknowledging, championing and defending the work you do in our province.

Just last week we moved a major step closer to making a liquefied natural gas industry in B.C. a reality.

The National Energy Board approved a 20-year export licence for the Kitimat LNG facility – the first licence of its kind anywhere in Canada.

What does that mean to us? It means we can open up our natural gas sector to new, important markets in the Asia Pacific.

It means Encana, Apache and EOG can start working towards development of the Kitimat LNG facility.

I don't need to tell you what an incredible opportunity this is for the people in this room and what a great chance it is for the individuals and families who are living in Northwest BC.

But we can do more.

Our goal is to see the Kitimat LNG facility in full operation by 2015, and up to three LNG plants established by 2020.

BC Jobs Plan

Your industry is critical part of the BC Jobs Plan.

There are three pillars to the jobs plan and each one supports the natural gas industry.

The first pillar is enabling job creation with a commonsense government that opens doors instead of closing them, that makes things simple for business by getting out of the way when we can.

One of the most important things we can do as a government is lead the way and clear the way...

That's why we've committed \$24 million to put special teams in place throughout B.C. to reduce backlogs on permits and approvals for resource-based projects.

Once the backlog has been addressed, we'll maintain an average turnaround time of 60 days...

Investors will have the confidence they need that new projects will proceed in a timely way.

And we'll do it while ensuring that environmental standards are upheld and that First Nations are consulted.

The second pillar is to build and maintain infrastructure so that once businesses have created jobs, they can actually get their goods to markets.

And the third pillar is opening up markets for our goods and products – knowing what the emerging markets in Asia want and making sure they know we can provide it.

We're starting with a trade mission to China and India next month to forge new ties and strengthen existing friendships and business relationships.

LNG is on my agenda in both countries.

As my trade specialists like to remind me, shipping routes from Kitimat are actually shorter to northern Asia than from Australia.

Underlying the three pillars of the Jobs Plan is a strong foundation – made up of a strong, skilled workforce and the fiscal responsibility the makes B.C. a great place to invest.

For the past four years, the Centre of Excellence/Jim Klassen Industry Training Centre at the Northern Lights College in Fort St. John has been helping meet your sector's long-term education and training needs.

It's a remarkable example of industry support and collaboration and we need to continue that kind of collaboration.

Right now we are working on an assessment what skills and training development will be required to help our resource sectors grow, including support for an LNG industry.

And we will continue to build partnerships to make sure that where there are jobs, we have people trained to work them.

I know that Rich Coleman, Blair Lekstrom and Pat Pimm have done a lot of the ground work on our jobs plan with the natural gas industry, stakeholders and communities, and I want to thank them for their involvement.

Health Study

One of the things I know you want to hear about is the review of the oil and gas industry with respect to health and safety.

The Province feels that the oil and gas sector is regulated safely, and operations are conducted with the most responsible practices possible.

As anyone in your industry knows, in order to have social license to operate, you need to work with people.

That is why we are moving forward with a public health risk study.

The study will help us understand the concerns and complete an independent review to provide evidence-based recommendations.

The health risk study will be developed in three phases:

We will start with a stakeholder consultation to inform scope and terms of reference.

Second, there will be a human health risk assessment based on scientific review

Third, we will report out to public and stakeholders. We are just starting this process and we will see where it goes but I am confident we will get good advice and feedback from the participants.

Hydraulic Fracturing

Everyone here knows openness and accountability is important.

That's why in September we announced our plan to introduce an online registry to disclose details about hydraulic fracturing activities.

The registry also supports our goal of creating a more open and transparent government.

It's a good move – by government and for industry. Through the registry, we will be able to increase everyone's understanding of the operations occurring in province.

I applaud the Canadian Association of Petroleum Producer's (CAPP) introduction of new 'Guiding Principles for Hydraulic Fracturing'.

We are happy industry supports the disclosure plans and efforts for continuous improvement.

We will work with our provincial neighbours to see if we can work together on this plan moving forward.

Conclusion

I believe that our province has an advantage compared too much of the world.

Introduction:

Thanks Lana for the introduction.

And thank you to everyone in the audience for joining me today.

I'd like to acknowledge my caucus members in attendance, as they stand up - please give them a warm round of applause.

It's been a pretty good couple weeks for families in this province.

Two weeks ago, the National Energy Board approved the first ever export license for liquefied natural gas for a project in Kitimat.

This will create 1,500 person-years of work during the construction phase and 120-140 permanent positions once the terminal is in operation.

The mayor up there says it feels like going from "doom town" to "boom town."

And then, last week Western Forest Products announced \$200-million of capital investment for Vancouver Island mills.

That was pretty good.

And then Seaspan brought home an \$8 billion ship building contract that will drive an entire industry for a generation.

In BC, it feels like we are on a roll.

So is GREAT to be here to today.

Just like natural gas, forestry and ship building, the tourism industry is so important to the future of BC.

You have an enormous impact on our economy. 127,000 people have jobs because of the work you do.

<u>But</u> there's something unique about tourism. The impact of your work goes far beyond the tourism industry.

The impression you leave with visitors defines B.C. It influences whether people want to live, invest and work in our province.

Take John Eckland as an example.

John's first visit to BC was on a fishing trip. He liked it so much that in 2006, he came back through our Provincial Nominee Program.

He put \$2.8 million into buying and renovating the historic Kaslo Hotel and he now has 24 employees and a good business going in the Kootenays.

It all started with that fishing trip... but we were the ones who lured him in.

All the people in the tourism industry – from hotel operators, to tour guides and cab drivers – every one of you are an ambassador for our province.

You tell the story of who we are to the world.

CANADA STARTS HERE

A few weeks back we launched a plan to defend and create jobs in BC. Our plan is called "Canada Starts Here."

We chose this name because we know British Columbia can pull Canada into the next century – we know we can lead this country like never before.

It lays out how we will grow our connections with emerging markets in Asia... to defend and create jobs ... and attract that first new dollar into BC.

In many ways, our success rests on our ability to build on the advantages that come with our diversity – our historic family and business connections to India, China and other Asian countries.

And it rests on our collective ability to do what you all do each and every day...

To tell the world who we are and what we have to offer so they realize that Canada Starts Here.

Our Key Focus

Our plan is centered on bringing what we call the "first new dollar" to British Columbia.

This means bringing new investment here so each new dollar can grow, and multiply and circulate – circulate from the initial investment, to our value added sectors, to our small businesses and, finally, to dinner tables, rec rooms and ice rinks from one end of BC to the other.

To do this we have identified eight sectors with the greatest opportunity to bring that first new dollar into British Columbia.

Tourism is one of those sectors, and it's a **BIG** one.

When Pat Bell and I were working on the Jobs Plan this summer, we knew the Jobs Plan had to benefit every region and every community in BC.

Tourism does that.

Growing this sector will help businesses small and large that are the engine of job growth and create the greatest number of spin-off jobs.

And that means everyone wins.

Tourism Strategy

When we released the BC Jobs Plan earlier this year, we talked about creating sector specific strategies that would help guide our work.

As part of the BC Jobs Plan, I'm pleased to be here today to announce the first of those strategies – a new five-year tourism strategy called 'Gaining the Edge.'

It will maximize economic growth and job creation across our province.

You have put an incredible amount of work into this and it belongs to you as much as it does government. So give yourself a round of applause.

This tourism strategy lays out a plan to capitalize on our recent world-wide exposure from the 2010 Games and deliver the best results for British Columbia's tourism industry.

And like the BC Jobs Plan itself, it is focused, it is targeted, and it leverages our strengths.

It will grow tourism industry revenues by five per cent a year, up to \$18 billion by 2016.

It outlines five areas that will drive growth in tourism.

First, we are going to focus on the key tourism products where BC has a competitive advantage, like aboriginal tourism, outdoor adventure and eco-tourism, touring vacations, conventions and meetings, city experiences and our great winter skiing and snowboarding.

Second, this strategy targets markets where our products have the greatest existing and future potential.

This means focusing on existing markets like Ontario, California, Australia, the UK and Japan, as well as emerging ones like China, India and Mexico.

As Pat Bell likes to say, this strategy is designed to fish where the fish are.

With China granting approved destination status to Canada in 2010, visitor growth from China is expected to be in the 15 to 20 per cent range each year.

Third, the strategy focuses on facilitating world-class experiences.

This means more partnerships with local government and businesses to make sure we are market ready.

And it means better research for growth and planning and working closely with the Aboriginal Tourism Association of BC to grow and promote the authentic First Nations experience.

Fourth, it means working with industry to remove barriers for growth, taking action to ensure you have workers with the skills and training your industry needs.

And fifth, it means creating an action plan for stable and predictable funding.

I am committed to providing the best marketing support for BC's tourism industry.

Pat Bell and staff at his Ministry have been working hard to gather your thoughts on options for a new Provincial Destination Marketing Organization.

And TIA-BC is providing us with advice and industry representation in this process.

I know some people would like a quick decision, but I believe that quick doesn't always mean you get the best results.

We want a marketing plan that industry can stand up and support... that will provide a long term future for strong marketing.

While these actions are specific to the tourism strategy, the BC Jobs Plan includes other actions that will grow BC's economy across all the sectors.

So I'd like take a moment to tell you about those as well.

BC Jobs Plan: Three pillars

Our BC Jobs Plan is based on three pillars.

The first pillar is enabling job creation with a commonsense government that opens doors instead of closing them, that makes things simple for business by getting out of the way when we can.

The second pillar of our jobs plan is about continuing to build smart infrastructure.

We can't generate those first new dollars if we can't get our products, ideas and resources to growing markets.

The third pillar of our jobs plan is about opening up markets for BC goods.

I am going to lead a trade mission to China and India in November, so that I can make sure we're working with the right people, with the best ideas, to open up and expand markets for BC.

We will reach out to help B.C. companies entering Asian markets. We will be better equipped to welcome foreign investors through a new hosting and business development program.

<u>Twin foundations – skilled workforce and fiscal</u> <u>responsibility</u>

So these three pillars – enabling job creation, building smart infrastructure and opening new markets – stand on two key foundations.

We need a skilled workforce and we need to keep our province on a solid footing, building on a foundation of 10 years of strong fiscal management...

...To keep those things that make us a safe harbour for investment right now.

So what makes B.C. a safe harbour?

A safe harbour means keeping our triple AAA credit rating, it means a low-tax regime and it means a stable banking system.

State of the Tourism Industry

The tourism industry just like the global economy is always shifting and changing.

While this year's visitor numbers haven't been great, there are opportunities to expand our markets and create a more stable industry in the long term.

In this business, you have to keep on top of the most recent trend without losing focus on what got you to where you are in the first place.

It is a pleasure to see TIA evolving along with the needs of your industry.

I want to congratulate you on your efforts to reset and refresh your association.

I agree with Minister Bell, we need a strong sector association and we are commitment to working with you to achieve success.

After all, government doesn't create jobs, you do.

Building on our strengths is what our BC Jobs Plan and Tourism Strategy will do.

And one of those strengths is your industry, and your people.

In the coming weeks we will be launching our \$1.1 million North American Winter Ski Campaign for this 2011/12 winter season.

The content for this campaign was brought together by working with our 13 ski resorts.

It will target those areas where we can attract the most skiers: Ontario, California and Washington State.

The tagline is "Get Above it All in British Columbia."

It's an innovative campaign where we will turn elevators and escalators into ski lifts in a targeted event in Toronto, and utilize online advertising and travel media relations across all markets.

And it showcases what BC is known for: our great snow, our spectacular and pristine mountains, our world-class resorts and most importantly our warm hospitality.

Because when it comes to tourism, who we are matters.

Your pride and passion as British Columbians breathes life into the landscape for visitors.

And your skills and knowledge enhance our global visibility and reputation.

CONCLUSION

By working together with the ski industry, we expect good results with this campaign.

We expect even better results next year when our Tourism Strategy is fully underway.

And I'd like to think that of the thousands skiers and snowboarders who will hit BC's slopes this year... maybe there will be a few "John Ecklands" among them.

BC is at a crossroads and every region of our province is home to so much potential.

We are facing a generational opportunity, and we are going to lead Canada into next century.

This is our time.

This is our chance to lead.

For 100 years, Kitsilano Secondary School has been graduating students who have gone on to change their world.

Kitsilano Secondary's alumni have included a World War II flying ace, Jimmy Whalen, Olympic athletes like Kathleen Heddle and famous actors like Ryan Reynolds.

What Kitsilano students learn here needs to prepare for them success not only in today's world, but a world we cannot yet imagine.

It's important they have a sense of belonging to a school with traditions and a proud history.

A proud history that includes two visits and performances from Louis Armstrong and a famous art teacher Jack Shadboldt.

It's also important to give students a safe environment to learn and grow, starting with the building around them.

After extensive consultation with parents, the school board and the community...

I'm pleased to tell you that by 2016, Kitsilano Secondary School will be rebuilt, saving its historic facade.

The school will be built to LEED Gold standard, and the Province is spending \$57.8 million on the rebuild.

Since 2001, we have been studying and seismically upgrading schools across the province to ensure that our children have the safest buildings we can give them.

Sometimes these schools can't safely be upgraded, and we have to rebuild.

Kitsilano Secondary School was given the highest rating for heritage status...

And we knew we needed to launch a heritage preservation project as well as a seismic upgrading and expansion.

The 1,500 students at this school will have a 21st century learning experience, while at the same time, be able to retain a vital link to the school's storied past.

We want to create new learning environments for students that allow them to discover, embrace, and fulfill their passions.

There will be three gymnasiums, a theatre and plenty of room for learning aimed at individual support and collaborative group work.
And we hope that the experience of each student links to what they experience and learn in their everyday lives.

Every child who graduates from this school is unique, and we're proud to be rebuilding this school to provide opportunities for future generations.

Education Capital Plan Hazelgrove Elementary, Surrey Oct 31, 2011

We can bring that experience home and help BC businesses anticipate emerging demands, so that we can move our exports up the ladder from raw resources to desired products.

BC's diversity is a unique advantage – both socially and economically.

In fact, our cultural diversity isn't just an advantage – it's who we are.

With the right steps, those connections are an advantage that we can turn into action.

It is stories like Alexa's that hit home and remind us just how preventable drinking and driving tragedies can be.

As we move into the holiday party season, deciding to not to drink and drive, and finding a safe ride home should be on top of mind for all British Columbians. Drinking and driving continues to take a toll on families in British Columbia and across Canada

In B.C., we feel it's important for us to take a tough stand on people who choose to drive impaired.

The latest statistics show that the new laws are having an effect...

Preliminary data shows a 40% reduction in alcohol-related motor vehicle fatalities in our province.

And an estimated 45 more people are alive today because of them...

That's 45 families who won't have to experience a latenight knock on their door from police – to hear their loved one has been the victim of an accident.

So we'll keep focused on removing these people from the road because we are keeping focused on the victims...

Alexa and families like hers are the reason we'll continue to take impaired drivers off the road, knowing this approach saves more lives.

Thanks to a team effort and numerous contributions from families, private donors, BCAA, MADD Canada, ICBC, the City of Surrey the Alexa's Bus Project is becoming a reality.
