

Q11. Will the rate of inflation fall once PST/GST is re-instituted in BC?

A:

Key Messages:

- Inflation will likely decrease as a result of the reintroduction of the PST's exemptions on services and certain goods.
- Based on our analysis and that of various private sector institutions, we estimate that the implementation of the HST increased the provincial inflation rate by between 0.5 and 1.0 percentage points in the year since its introduction (July 2010 to June 2011).
- The reintroduction of the PST will likely reverse the additional inflation caused by the HST
- Inflation is expected to fall for one year following the re-introduction of the PST.

Q13. Will going back to PST/GST put BC at a competitive disadvantage compared to other jurisdictions?

A.

Key Messages:

- The PST system will increase the cost of producing goods and lead to decreases in profits and reduce the potential for return on investments.
- Studies show that going back to the PST will lower competitiveness and lead to less output and fewer jobs.
 - According to the Independent Panel on the HST's study, the impact is not severe.
- Within Canada, BC will be at a competitive disadvantage with regard to provinces with value-added sales taxes: Ontario, Quebec, Alberta and the Maritime provinces (excluding PEI).
- The impact on competitiveness will be more severe if the US, or US states, adopt a value-added tax, as recommended by some prominent economists and newspaper editorials.
 - A value-added sales tax would reduce the volatility of government revenues compared to income, corporate and property taxes.

Q14. Who will be BC's winners and losers if PST/GST is reinstated?

A. Key Messages:

- Virtually all economic analysis finds the HST increases economic growth, productivity, wages and the quality of jobs compared to the PST/GST.
- However, there is no consensus on the value and timing of those benefits.
- These benefits would be lost by going back to the PST/GST system.
 - A move back to the PST/GST will likely have a negative impact on business and investor confidence. A limited number of sectors that don't qualify for HST rebates would benefit in the short run.
 - Consumers would see an immediate benefit as the tax rate on some services is reduced. In the medium and long-term however, consumers would pay a higher tax rate on goods and would see higher prices on those goods due to the "embedded" PST.
 - The provincial government will see a reduction in tax revenues and increased tax system administration costs and debt servicing costs stemming from government reimbursement of Federal transition payments funded with debt.






Ministry forecast remains prudent relative to private sector


BC employment recovering slowly

BC employment (000s, sa)






BC housing starts trending flat while prices are elevated

BC total merchandise exports (\$ billions, sa)



Slowing pace of US real GDP growth


US Real GDP (Second Estimate,

US consensus outlook deteriorates in 2011


Forecast annual per cent


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Three-year cumulative changes before HST referendum

(\$ millions)


Total cumulative change: (\$537) million



Three-year cumulative impact of reverting to PST/GST system



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Managing the change

- Government will consult with British Columbians on measures to close the \$458M deficit gap in 2013/14
- Measures must consider:
 - Slower revenue growth of 2.8% compared to 3.3% at *Budget 2011*
 - The need to direct resources towards increasing demand for services
 - Negotiating wage mandate
 - Infrastructure requirements to rehabilitate and modernize existing facilities

Other challenges

- **Economic risks**
 - Return to recession in the US economy.


PST to be Restored

- PST will be restored at 7%
- Target date is 18 months, consistent with independent panel window of 18-24 months
- Permanent exemptions return, may make some administrative improvements
- \$230 HST low-income credit replaced with \$75 PST credit
- Discussion with federal government on exiting CITCA and return of transition funding
- Public consultation on fiscal plan impact

BC employment recovering slowly



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RE-IMPLEMENTATION OF PST


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Target Timeline to Re-implement PST (est. months)
