Business and Structure

The University of British Columbia, established in 1908, educates a student population of 58,284 (from Canada and 140 countries) on major campuses in two cities and holds an international reputation for excellence in advanced research and learning. It is a publicly funded research-intensive institution committed to the discovery of knowledge and the enhancement of understanding, as well as to the expression, preservation and dissemination of knowledge and culture. UBC has strong core values: critical and independent thought; a constant search for new knowledge and understanding through research and scholarship; the pursuit of cultural literacy; and civic engagement.

University revenue for the 12 months ended March 31, 2015 totalled \$2.19 billion, a \$8 million increase over the previous year. <u>University's consolidated financial statements as of March 31, 2015</u>

<u>The UBC system</u> includes the Vancouver campus, the Okanagan campus, UBC Robson Square, and the Great Northern Way campus. Each contributes a distinctive dimension to UBC's programs, research and outreach activities.

At <u>UBC's Vancouver campus</u>, teaching and research activities are conducted in 12 faculties and 11 schools, with each offering a broad range of programs of study. The current student population, including graduate students, exceeds 49,890 (plus more than 40,000 non-credit, certificate and distance education learners).

<u>UBC's Okanagan campus</u> offers students an intimate learning environment, opportunities for region-centered research, international perspective and access to UBC's assets and research capabilities. More than 8,380 students are enrolled in undergraduate and graduate programs in eight faculties and schools.

There are over 15,170 faculty and staff at UBC's Vancouver and Okanagan campuses (combined). Also employed on campus are several thousand non-UBC employees, including staff at University Hospital, TRIUMF, and numerous other affiliated organizations.

Governance Structure

The University of British Columbia is governed by the <u>University Act</u>, which provides for a Board of Governors, an Okanagan Senate, a Vancouver Senate and a Council of Senates.

Board of Governors

UBC's 21-member Board of Governors is comprised of the Chancellor, the President, eleven persons appointed by the Lieutenant Governor, three faculty members elected by faculty (two from UBC Vancouver, one from UBC Okanagan), three full-time students elected by students (two from UBC Vancouver, one from UBC Okanagan) and two persons elected by and from the full-time employees of the University who are not faculty members (one from UBC Vancouver, one from UBC Okanagan). (*University Act* s19.2)

The Board of Governors is responsible for the management, administration and control of the property, revenue, business and affairs of the University, including the appointment of senior officials and faculty on the recommendation of the President. The Board is responsible for the appointment of the President of the University, who is responsible for the administration of the University.

The Board of Governors conducts its business at five meetings annually, and through its Standing Committees:

- Audit Committee
- · Employee Relations Committee

Senates

Under the terms of the *University Act*, academic governance is vested in the Senates, whose powers include the responsibility to:

- consider, approve and recommend to the board the revision of courses of study, instruction and education in all faculties and departments of the university;

<u>Monitor and Report</u>: Monitor organizational performance against strategic plans and compliance with applicable legislation and government direction; account to government and stakeholders through appropriate reporting.

Communications: Oversee organization's communications policy.

Additional meetings and events are held throughout the year, including a recognition dinner for retiring Board members.

Term


