For your information, I have attached the Trades Equipment Funding Letter and Funding Guidelines that were e-mailed to your President on December 23, 2014.

I have also attached University of the Fraser Valley's Eligible Trades Equipment List that we had discussed and finalized with you a few weeks ago. Please use the AVED funding to purchase training equipment from this Eligible List in 2014/15 and subsequent years—should University of the Fraser Valley's equipment needs change due to unforeseen program changes, please call Vincent or I to discuss further so that we can officially revise the Eligible List if required.

For 2014/15, we would ask that you send us a note outlining the type of equipment you are planning to procure this fiscal year by January 9, 2015. The easiest way would be to simply highlight the 2014/15 planned purchases in yellow on the attached Eligible List and send the List back to us by January 9.

As noted in the attached funding letter, all of the trades training institutions are encouraged to collaborate in procurement activities in 2014/15. Our role will be to connect all institutions with similar purchasing objectives in order to help reduce the costs of equipment though group purchasing – we do not plan to purchase/procure the equipment on the institutions behalf, and we certainly do not plan to make the process onerous.

It is my pleasure to inform you that under the B.C's Skills for Jobs Blueprint: Re-engineering Education and Training, University of the Fraser Valley is being provided with a three-year notional approval in the amount of \$517,925 to fund the purchase of trades training equipment at your institution.

These funds are part of the \$185 million targeted over three years toward trades training infrastructure, technology and equipment to provide students with up-to-date training facilities and equipment.

The Ministry of Advanced Education (the Ministry) will provide University of the Fraser Valley with \$171,428 in fiscal year 2014/15. Funds cannot be carried forward and must be used prior to March 31, 2015. A Certificate of Approval will follow.

The balance of funds will be contributed over the next two fiscal years in 2015/16 and 2016/17. This is a notional target subject to cash flow performance and to annual Treasury Board appropriation. A funding letter and Certificate of Approval will be issued early in each of those fiscal years.

Funds are to be used for the purchase of eligible trades training equipment in accordance with the attached funding guidelines and your institution's eligible equipment list. Funds cannot be used for facility improvements, including improvements that may be required to render equipment operational.

Your institution is encouraged to collaborate in procurement activities in 2014/15 and to utilize the Post-Secondary Joint Procurement Consortium to pursue joint procurement where applicable in 2015/16 and 2016/17. Please contact the Post-Secondary Administrative Service Delivery Transformation Collaboration Office to assist in facilitating information sharing and identifying opportunities for joint procurement between institutions.

A report detailing the type and quantity of trades training equipment purchased in 2014/15 is to be provided to the Ministry by June 1, 2015. Your institution is also encouraged to proactively seek industry donations to leverage this funding allocation and to communicate the value of such donations (cash or in-kind) back to the Ministry.

In recognition that cooperative efforts around public communications will benefit our respective organizations, I respectfully request that you defer any media releases until our joint communications efforts can be formalized.

I want to thank University of the Fraser Valley for its collaboration and continued efforts to provide students with up-to-date technology and training equipment critical to their success in achieving trades certification.

## Call for Proposals 2014/15

#### Background

Under B.C.'s Skills For Jobs Blueprint, the Ministry of Advanced Education is making one-time funding available to increase access to skills training in Trades Discovery (Introduction to Trades) Programs in 2014/15.

Trades Discovery Programs are to provide students and young adults with an opportunity for trade's career exploration and will seek to build capacity for individuals who aim to progress to foundation and apprentice programs.

Priority will be given to Trades Discovery Programs that align with the high demand trades occupations identified under the B.C.'s Skills For Jobs Blueprint.

It is my pleasure to inform you that the Ministry of Advanced Education (the Ministry), under the B.C's Skills for Jobs Blueprint: Re-engineering Education and Training, will provide University of the Fraser Valley with a one-time grant of \$278,800. These funds will be forwarded to your institution with the next available electronic funds transfer.

The \$278,800 is made available under the Labour Market Development Agreement Skills Development Employment Benefit. Funds are to be allocated as follows:

- 1) Trades Discovery Programming:
  - \$30,000 is to be used by University of the Fraser Valley to deliver 16 seats for a Trades Discovery program. Programs that started on or after February 2, 2015, and/or those programs that are scheduled to start in 2015/16 are eligible; however, all training must be completed on or before March 31, 2016.
- 2) Critical Trades Seats Waitlist Reduction:

- vii. sign and receive all College/University/Institute correspondence pertaining to this Agreement.

### 8. MATERIAL AND INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

I am pleased to advise you that the Ministry of Advanced Education will be providing a payment of \$35,000 to the University of the Fraser Valley for the Adult Upgrading Grant (AUG)<sup>1</sup> for the first period of April 1 – August 31, 2015. These funds will be forwarded to your institution with the next available electronic funds transfer.

This first of three scheduled AUG payments is based on financial forecasts provided by your institution. Further monitoring and forecasting will determine the final two allocations.

This is a change in funding forecast procedures from previous years when a notional annual allocation was communicated in the initial funding letter, with only one forecast request to adjust funding needs prior to the final payment.

Corresponding to the policy announced by Government on December 4, 2014, which gives institutions the option to charge tuition for Adult Basic Education and English as a Second Language courses, the following changes to the AUG program will impact 2015/16 funding allocations:

- As of April 1, 2015, the annual budget for AUG will increase from \$5.7 million to \$7.6 million.
- Students who are 10 percent above the income threshold are eligible for AUG to cover half of their tuition.
- AUG funding will continue to be dispersed throughout the fiscal year. The Ministry will
  closely monitor program demand and adjust funding instalments accordingly.

It is my pleasure to inform you that under the B.C's Skills for Jobs Blueprint: Re-engineering Education and Training, University of the Fraser Valley is being provided with \$192,651 to fund the purchase of trades training equipment at your institution.

These funds are part of the \$185 million targeted over three years toward trades training infrastructure, technology and equipment to provide students with up-to-date training facilities and equipment.

This funding is in addition to the trades training equipment funding provided to your institution in 2014/15 (Ref. 98670). Funds cannot be carried forward and must be used prior to March 31, 2016. A Certificate of Approval will follow.

A report detailing the type and quantity of trades training equipment purchased in 2015/16 is to be provided to the Ministry by June 1, 2016. Your institution is also encouraged to proactively seek industry donations to leverage this funding and to communicate the value of such donations (cash or in-kind) back to the Ministry.

The Ministry respectfully requests that public announcements related to this funding are jointly formalized with the Ministry. ## 2015/16 Trades Training Equipment Funding Guidelines

(Unchanged from 2014/15)

#### Funding criteria:

- 1. Funding is for capital equipment. All purchases must be made in accordance with the Public Sector Accounting Standards and the institution's capitalization policy.
- 2. Renewal of obsolete equipment to reflect current technology and acquisition of additional equipment to maximize capacity is allowed.
- Equipment should reflect industry needs.
- Equipment must support existing priority programs that are, or have recently been, delivered on a regular basis.
- 5. Priority will be given to equipment used on a regular versus infrequent basis, or to equipment that is used for multiple trades programs and/or dual credit programs.
- 6. Funding cannot be used for program start-up, unless a strong business case is provided as to why it should be considered.
- 7. Usage cannot be contingent on obtaining new operating funding from the Ministry of Advanced Education or the Industry Training Authority.
- 8. Space and/or storage facilities for the equipment must be currently available.
- 9. Funding is subject to confirmation of the final, actual costs of the approved equipment and the institution is responsible for any cost overruns that may occur.

Hi Rolf,

I checked my notes and ITA confirmed that there are 48 apprentices registered in the UFV region needing Level 1 training and 8 needing Level 2.

Based on our conversation yesterday and the fact that:

\* UFV has and is delivering several HMT FDN (6 cohorts in total delivered or planned to date), it is reasonable to presume some of those students will pursue level 2 at UFV,

- \* The Trades Seat finder shows limited or no availability for APP level 2 in 2016 in the lower mainland region (red logo)
- \* That there is a good pool (48) of candidates for level 1 this year ready to take on technical training in UFV region (in addition to 8 level 2 registered as indicated by the ITA)
- \* ..... That HMT are in the top 60 occupations list....
- \* And that UFV is being provided the full balance of the 3-year notional allocation this year, therefore not providing UFV an opportunity to scale purchasing strategies over the next 2 years.

  I see the information above as sufficient business case for UFV to purchase HMT equipment if it chooses to in 2015-16.

As you know, additional equipment acquisition to increase capacity cannot rely on additional AVED or ITA seat funding. However, from my perspective, if UFV were to purchase HMT level 2 equipment this year, the information above represents a sufficient business case and therefore meet all funding criteria established under this initiative.

I encourage you to connect with the ITA if you haven't already done so to make sure future composition of your ITA training plan (if I understood correctly you would reduce electrical intakes to accommodate HMT capacity) can accommodate new program offerings (assuming you depend on that source of revenue for that).

I will connect with Erin again on my side as welf.

Let me know if I omitted anything from our conversation.

## 2016/17 Trades Training Equipment Funding Guidelines

### **Funding criteria** (unchanged since 2014/15):

- 1. Funding is for capital equipment. All purchases must be made in accordance with the Public Sector Accounting Standards and the institution's capitalization policy.
- 2. Renewal of obsolete equipment to reflect current technology and acquisition of additional equipment to maximize capacity is allowed.
- 3. Equipment should reflect industry needs.
- 4. Equipment must support existing priority programs that are, or have recently been, delivered on a regular basis.
- 5. Priority will be given to equipment used on a regular versus infrequent basis, or to equipment that is used for multiple trades programs and/or dual credit programs.
- 6. Funding cannot be used for program start-up, unless a strong business case is provided as to why it should be considered.
- 7. Usage cannot be contingent on obtaining new operating funding from the Ministry of Advanced Education or the Industry Training Authority.
- 8. Space and/or storage facilities for the equipment must be currently available.
- 9. Funding is subject to confirmation of the final, actual costs of the approved equipment and the institution is responsible for any cost overruns that may occur.

I am pleased to advise you that the Ministry of Advanced Education (the Ministry) will be providing a payment of \$250,000 to University of the Fraser Valley for the Adult Upgrading Grant (AUG) for the period of January 1 to March 31, 2016. #### MMR

- 1. Minor space renovations to office area (Abbotsford Campus) to allow for more efficient use of space estimated budget for this renovation is approximately \$20,000.
- 2. Increasing the scope of work to the front pedestrian access improvement project that would allow the use of concrete and pavers versus the originally quoted (cheaper) asphalt walkways option. We would also look at repairing some deficiencies found in electrical and data conduit due to the excavation around the front entrance and allow us to improve the site drainage. An additional expense would also need to be incurred to install all the upgraded LED lighting around the front entrance. This can be achieved through change orders so no additional time is lost in the procurement process. Expected cost of this scope increase; approximately \$30,000.

It is my pleasure to inform you that the Ministry of Advanced Education (the Ministry), under the *B.C.* 's Skills for Jobs Blueprint: Re-engineering Education and Training, will provide University of the Fraser Valley (UFV) with a one-time grant of \$60,000. These funds will be forwarded to your institution with the next available electronic funds transfer.

The \$60,000 is to be used by UFV to reduce waitlists in critical trades occupations by delivering training in the following programs:

It is my pleasure to inform you that the Ministry of Advanced Education (the Ministry), under the B.C.'s Skills for Jobs Blueprint: Re-engineering Education and Training, will provide University of the Fraser Valley (UFV) with a one-time grant of \$60,000. Consistent with the Office of the Auditor General (OAG) recommendation in 2012, the Ministry will continue to align payments with forecasted cash flow requirements and calendarize actual payments across the fiscal year. For 2016/17, the Ministry will be requesting three separate funding forecasts corresponding to the three payments. This approach will allow the Ministry to be more responsive to changes in funding demand by utilizing institutions' most up-to-date financial information to better align funding with program utilization.

The Ministry is seeking a financial forecast from institutions based on anticipated AUG program demands for three periods of the 2016/17 fiscal year including: *April 1 to August 31, 2016*; *September 1 to December 31, 2016*; and, *January 1 to March 31, 2017*. We are requesting your estimated projections for these three periods now, and we will review the latter two projections with FAOs closer to those dates, offering opportunities to adjust the original forecasts. Using financial forecasts provided by institutions, along with a review of each institution's expenditures using the electronic system, the Ministry will allocate funding to align with utilization of program funds and pressures.

I am pleased to advise you that the Ministry of Advanced Education (the Ministry) will be providing a payment of \$45,933 to University of the Fraser Valley for the Adult Upgrading Grant (AUG) for the period of April 1 to August 31, 2016. These funds will be forwarded to your institution with the next available electronic funds transfer. This first of three scheduled AUG payments is based on financial forecasts provided by your institution. Further monitoring and forecasting will determine future allocations.

The funding, which is intended to be spent prior to August 31, 2016, is to provide financial support for adults who are enrolled in developmental programs, and who have demonstrated a need for financial assistance in this pursuit. It is expected that any AUG surplus from 2015/16 continues to be used to support students under the umbrella of the AUG.

Corresponding to the policy announced by Government on December 4, 2014, which gives institutions the option to charge tuition for Adult Basic Education and English as a Second Language courses, the Ministry will continue to work with your financial aid office to monitor funding demand. The 2016/17 Ministry budget for the AUG is \$7.6 million.

Please note the recent change to the AUG program that will impact 2016/17 funding allocations:

 Any AUG contributions from the previous year that influenced a student's income shall be deducted for the purposes of determining current year AUG income eligibility.

Dear Ms. Hogan:

I am pleased to advise you that the Ministry of Advanced Education (the Ministry) will be providing a payment of \$242,258 to University of the Fraser Valley for the Adult Upgrading Grant (AUG) for the period of September 1 to December 31, 2016. These funds will be forwarded to your institution with the next available electronic funds transfer. This second of three scheduled AUG payments is based on financial forecasts provided by your institution. Further monitoring and forecasting will determine future allocations.

The funding, which is intended to be spent prior to December 31, 2016, is to provide financial support for adults who are enrolled in developmental programs, and who have demonstrated a need for financial assistance in this pursuit.

Corresponding to the policy announced by Government on December 4, 2014, which gives institutions the option to charge tuition for Adult Basic Education and English as a Second Language courses, the Ministry will continue to work with your financial aid office to monitor funding demand. The 2016/17 Ministry budget for the AUG is \$7.6 million.

Please note the recent changes to the AUG program that will impact 2016/17 funding allocations:

- Any AUG contributions from the previous year that influenced a student's income shall be deducted for the purposes of determining current year AUG income eligibility.
- An updated AUG eligibility income threshold is in effect for programs starting in fall 2016.
