Hi Minister,

The attached news release went out to today about the Professional Reliance Review. It is in the Ministry of Environment's mandate letter to "review the professional reliance model to ensure the legal rights of First Nations are respected, and the public's expectation of a strong, transparent process is met." AEST is involved because of our Ministry's responsibility for two self-governing professional organizations that will be reviewed: **Applied Science**Technologists & Technicians of BC (Applied Science Technologists and Technicians Act); and Engineers and Geoscientists of BC (formerly APEGBC – Association of Professional Engineers and Geoscientists of British Columbia) (Engineers and Geoscientists Act).

The use of Professional Reliance within British Columbia's resource sector is a long standing practice, where activities are overseen by professionals in the private sector, monitored by self-governing professional organizations responsible for enforcing codes of ethics, professional standards and disciplinary processes. Government has committed to conducting a review of the professional reliance model to ensure the highest professional, technical and ethical standards are being applied to resource development in BC. The project is composed of five phases with an expected completion date in spring 2018.

AEST's role in this project is contained predominantly to the first phase, the professional association audit. Ministry staff will support project leads with the assessment of the *Applied Science Technologists and Technicians Act* and the *Engineers and Geoscientists Act*. A final report to be released publicly after project completion will include recommendations on legislation amendments, if any. We will ensure you are fully briefed as this work progresses and any implications for these Acts and regulatory bodies. The final report is anticipated to be released publicly by Spring, 2018.

The briefing document for today's 730 am Labour Force Survey call is attached.

The summary points are below.

B.C.

- In September, employment decreased by 6,700 in British Columbia to 2.473 million. This was largely due to fewer people in the labour force in September.
- There was a gain of 5,000 in full-time employment while there was a decline of 11,600 in part-time employment.
- In the 12 months to September 2017, employment increased by 85,100 (3.6%). This is the fastest year-over-year growth rate among all provinces. Ontario is second with 2.4% year-over-year employment growth.
- The unemployment rate decreased to 4.9% from 5.1% in September as the labour force declined by 12,400 and unemployment decreased by 5,800 to 126,300.
- In September, British Columbia had the lowest unemployment rate among the provinces at 4.9%. Manitoba was second lowest at 5.5% and Ontario is third at 5.6%.
- Youth (age 15-24) employment increased by 3,800 in September. The youth unemployment rate fell to 7.1% from 9.8%. B.C. has the lowest youth unemployment rate in Canada. Quebec has the second lowest rate at 8.7%.

Canada:

• Employment increased in September by 10,000. The number of people working full-time increased by 112,000 while the number of people working part-time increased by 102,000.

- This is the tenth consecutive month of employment gains in Canada.
- The unemployment rate remains at 6.2% in September.



Advanced Education Minister Melanie Mark said her position with the Representative for Children and Youth was eliminated in March 2015, but a job with a nearly identical title was advertised days after she won a byelection 11 months later.

Both the government and the representative's office have said the restructuring that eliminated Mark's position was based on a consultant's report. Neither has provided a copy of the report. Stephanie Cadieux, the advanced education critic for the BC Liberal opposition, said there are still unanswered questions about the severance. "As we've said earlier, there are a lot of questions surrounding Ms. Mark's departure and it seems to be getting murkier," Cadieux said. "We continue to call on her for a full explanation."

1. Enrolment down at B.C.'s post-secondary schools - Albert Van Santvoort - BiV - 05-Oct-2017 [negative]

Operating grants have been rising, but enrolment has been declining at B.C.'s largest post-secondary institutions.

Only one post-secondary school in the province had more students this year than it did in 2013. Selkirk College, 20th on Business in Vancouver's list of B.C.'s biggest post-secondary schools, increased its student numbers 20% to 2,300 students in 2017 from 1,900 students in 2013. Overall, student enrolment at post-secondary schools in the province has dropped an average of more than 38% since 2013. The five largest post-secondary institutions reported a slightly less dramatic decline of 26% in their student enrolment during the same period.

Even though enrolment at B.C.'s five largest post-secondary institutions has dropped since 2013, their base operating grants have increased an average of 3.7% over the same period.

1. One month into school year, union says still too few teachers in B.C. classrooms - CBC Online - O4-Oct-2017 [neutral]

The B.C. Teachers' Federation says one month into the school year, there are still not enough teachers in the province's classrooms. BCTF president Glen Hansman said there are still 1,000 vacancies for contract or on-call teachers. Specialist teachers are being used to teach classes in some cases, depriving special needs students of support. He said forgiving out-of-province teachers' **student loans**, paying for moving expenses or giving mid-year vacation time to teachers from other parts of Canada could entice more people to come.

2. Conflict in Kelowna: UBCSUO fires general manager, begins external review - David Nixon - The Ubyssey - Online - 05-Oct-2017 [neutral]

After two years of steep deficit spending and an investigation by *The Ubyssey* that exposed evidence of mismanaged student funds, the UBC Students' Union Okanagan (UBCSUO) has fired its general manager and hired an accounting firm to conduct an external review.

The UBCSUO's board of directors voted to fire General Manager Bob Drunkemolle during an in-camera meeting on September 28. At the same meeting, the board voted to hire accounting firm Meyers Norris Penny (MNP) to conduct the external review.

About 40 people filled the audience seats at the Monday council meeting as spokesperson Ryan Hughes made the case against the Langley Urban Agriculture Demonstration Project that the city, Metro Vancouver regional authority and **Kwantlen Polytechnic University** are looking at.

"This is the wrong location," Hughes said. "We're going to have problems." Hughe predicted the "destruction of green space" could lead to a rat infestation, and could also attract "homeless and drug users" to the area. He said it might pose public safety problems created by increased vehicle traffic and demands for more parking spaces. "Please stop now, before more taxpayer money is spent," Hughes said.
