Hi Minister,

There has been some progress on this. On September 16, the BC College of Social Workers (BCCSW) provided provisional approval for the Douglas' Bachelor of Social Work degree on the condition that Douglas will undertake best efforts to obtain appropriate accreditation for their Bachelor of Social Work (BSW) degree at the earliest opportunity.

The provisional approval is good news as it indicates that BCCSW is open to recognizing the program, and we are cautiously optimistic that ultimately the graduates of the Douglas BSW program will be able to become registered social workers.

However, it is still unclear to us from the attached letter what other routes to accreditation Douglas could take besides BCCSW's current recognized accreditor, the Canadian Association of Social Workers Education (CASWE). Douglas is not eligible for their accreditation, because CASWE only accredits university programs (not college programs) – this is the issue. CASWE is currently reviewing their "university only" eligibility requirement, but as a professional association, there is no guarantee that they will change this policy.

As a next step, the Ministry of Children and Family Development and AEST will jointly write to BCCSW to request further clarification on:

- 1. What are the acceptable routes to accreditation, other than CASWE;
- 2. What "provisional approval" means in the context of their registration process for graduates of the Douglas College BSW program.

We have pursued a collaborative approach with the BCCSW to date s.13 and have also offered our support to BCCSW to assist in identifying a workable pathway to accreditation for the Douglas social work program.

I will provide you with a further update once we have a response from the BCCSW.
