Issue(s):

 - up-front needs-based grants
 - o eliminating interest on student loans
 - o expansion of the Open Textbook Project

Background:

- BCFS is a provincial-level organization of 13 affiliated university and college student associations that collectively represents 130,000 students. (See Appendix A for members.)
- BCFS meets regularly with elected officials to advocate for issues of importance to postsecondary students, including: access and affordability; tuition fees; student aid; and housing.

Discussion:

For its October 2018 meetings, the following issues have been identified for discussion:

Issue/BCFS Position	AEST action to date
Eliminate interest charged on all BC student loans	 In August 2017, government reduced the interest rate charged on B.C. student loans to Prime (from Prime plus 2.5%). Further reductions will be phased in. This initial interest rate reduction provides approximately \$11 million in interest relief and benefits to approximately 200,000 current borrowers.
Provide up-front, needs-based grants to combat financial barriers to studying at college or university	 AEST is currently reviewing student financial assistance policy, including best practices for grant funding to ensure grants are designed to support students when and where they need it most.

Expansion of the Open Textbook Project to develop resources that are a viable alternative to high-priced textbooks

• Discussion points for other BCFS 2018/19 priorities:

Issue/BCFS Position	AEST action to date
International tuition fee limits and regulation	 AEST is working with stakeholders, including students, to develop a new strategic approach to international education focused on a positive student experience.
Implementation of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action relating to post- secondary education	Post-secondary institutions and AEST are committed to implementing the Calls to Action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.
Building a consent culture on campuses and working with institutions on effective sexual assault policies	 The Sexual Violence and Misconduct Policy Act requires all B.C. public post-secondary institutions to have a sexual violence and misconduct policy in place. AEST recently launched an awareness campaign around consent.



Need for proactive services vs. response- based measures	 Over the past year AEST consulted with sector partners and students, including the ABCS, to understand challenges and gaps around mental health supports at post-secondary institutions; including the need for both proactive supports (e.g. counselling) and responsive measures (e.g. interventions in cases of substance abuse and addiction).

Need to review policy for accessibility grants and student loans	 access federal and provincial financial assistance and/or equipment and service grants, they must have a verified disability and demonstrate financial need (i.e. meet eligibility criteria for a student loan). In cases where students with disabilities do not meet student loan criteria but wish to access grants to offset equipment/services costs, AEST works applicants to include disability-related costs as part of its needs assessment. In the majority of cases, this consideration results in students receiving equipment/service grants. RESPONSE: AEST will continue to actively to support access and success of students with disabilities in BC's post-secondary education. If there are gaps in funding policy staff will work with partners to resolve them as fairly and effectively as possible.
Monitoring/reporting of sexual violence at public post-secondary institutions Need for monitoring and reporting at institutional level	 As of May 19, 2017 public post-secondary institutions are required to establish sexual violence and misconduct policies and report annually to their governing body on policy implementation. Currently, institutions are not required to report or track the number of incidents, or make public reports to governing bodies. An outreach campaign, in winter 2017/2018, solicited feedback on how policies may be strengthened. Awareness campaigns, education and workshops were among the top themes. Increased reporting and accountability were also raised. RESPONSE: AEST will continue review feedback and consider further actions to support students and institutions in creating safer campuses.

Back pocket Notes for Jeff in preparation for October 2018 Student Society Meetings:

1. Follow-up AEST Staff-level meeting with BC Federation of Students scheduled for October 30:

- Several weeks ago the BCFS Chairperson approached Ministry staff and requested a meeting.
- Purpose of the meeting is to establish stronger lines of communication, which AEST supports.
- Meeting is scheduled for October 30th at St. Ann's; it will be general in nature and provide an opportunity for relationship building.
- The BCFS delegation consists of 10 representatives, including Aran Armutlu (Chairperson).
- Draft agenda topics include:
 - Update from Students on what student issues are being highlighted with MLAs
 - Sexual Violence Prevention on campus (Dean Goodman / Yael La Rose)
 - Student Housing Initiative (Jeanne Sedun)
 - International Education (Jamie Edwardson / Laurie Brucker)
 - Open Education Resources (Melanie Nielsen / Andrei Bondoreff)
 - Student Loans and Needs-based Grant System (Philip Davidson)

2. Status of U-Pass BC Program Renewal:

- The current Metro Vancouver U-Pass agreement is supported with an annual provincial contribution of \$12 million from Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure (MOTI).
- The current agreement covering 10 Lower Mainland public post-secondary institutions expires December 2019.
- Over the past year, MOTI has been meeting with student society representatives to discuss terms for renewal. Key negotiating points for the students:
 - a longer term agreement (more than the current 3 year term); ideally an agreement in perpetuity;
 - a cost model that maintains student fees at \$41/month through to May 2020, with subsequent increases at 2% per year, consistent with other annual student fee increases.
- MOTI has completed a Treasury Board submission for discussion on October 31, 2018.
- In keeping with government campaign commitments to 'make education more affordable and to continue to support U-Pass', MOTI is recommending continuation of provincial funding. The recommended option includes:
 - a five year agreement (January 2020 May 2025)
 - increased annual provincial contributions
 - a cost model that maintains student fees at \$41/month until April 2020; with modest increases over the term of the agreement
- MOTI advises student reps will support a higher increase in the first year if a 5 year agreement is reached.
- Comparison of the Metro Vancouver U-pass rates with similar programs in other BC regions and across Canada indicates the proposed option compares favourably.

- 1. The Ministry engages in consultation processes that provide insight and information on the needs of students with disabilities at post-secondary institutions including:
 - a. Students with Disabilities Committee BC is the provincial chair of this committee which brings together federal/provincial/territorial agency staff tasked with the provision of financial resources and services to students with disabilities. The committee examines national trends and issues impacting students with disabilities (funding, accommodation, barriers, etc).
 - b. Advanced Education/Disability Service Providers Technical Advisory Committee Advanced Education staff engage with disability service providers (BC Institute of Technology, Langara College and Assistive Technology BC) to review development and implementation of specialized communication access, alternate resource material and assistive technology projects and services to assist public post-secondary institutions with the accommodation of students with disabilities
 - c. Advanced Education/Accessibility Advisors Consultation Committee Advanced Education staff chair consultation process with Accessibility Coordinators at all BC public post-secondary institutions. The committee directly addresses the challenges faced by students with disabilities at the institution level

(funding, barriers, etc.) and assists the ministry with understanding the needs and requirements of this population of students.

- d. The ministry gathers data on students with disabilities who access our disability related programs. We have data on the number of students who access financial assistance and/or assistive service and equipment programs. The ministry also tracks students who do not complete their programs and can identify those who are receiving ministry disability related program supports.
- At present a student with a disability must apply, and be eligible for a student loan before they would be eligible for most ministry disability related programs. This is true for provincially delivered, federal disability related programs and some provincial financial assistance programs. The federal programs

are subject to federal Canada Student Loan Program policy.
The province does support the delivery of assistive technology and services to non-post secondary (Adult Basic Education, English Second Language and Adult Special Education) students who are ineligible for student loans, through the Assistance Program for Students with Disabilities.

- c. The province also supports communication access and alternate resource format services to all post-secondary students with disabilities at public post-secondary institutions regardless of student loan status, through the Post-Secondary Communication Access Services and the Centre for Accessible Post-Secondary Education Resources programs.
- The province also supports the delivery of assistive technology to these students through the Public Post-Secondary Loan program and the Program for the Institutional Loan of Assistive Technology.
