Further to my email of July 7, please set up a time when we can complete the licensing requirements for your farm. At our last visit (March 30th) you did not have any enrichments in the pens and the CO tank was on order. I understand you now have the enrichments in the pens, however, we need to see the CO tank and kill box.

Our 2016 licensing will conclude at the end of July and the Canadian Mink Association will be informed of farms in contravention of the *BC Fur Farm Regulations*. A valid provincial license is required to sell pelts. After July, any farms that have not complied with the Mink Code of Practice or the *Fur Farm Regulations* will be required to wait until the next licensing cycle of January 2017 to reapply.

s.79 I encourage you to take care of the licensing of your farm prior to the end of the month. I will be out of the office from July 8-18. We can schedule an inspection after the 18^{th} , or you can request Dr. Pritchard or Dr. Britton to inspect, if that is the only week that works for you.

Here is where our ranch is at as of now. All of our cages meet COP table 3..most meet table 2 for square inches but our breeder pens and cages around our fence are only 12 inches high as per old code of practice. These cages are due to be replaced over the next few years. When replaced they will meet table 1 of the COP. There are approximately 1700 of these pens. Of the remaining 2000 or so cages, 1130 meet table 1 of COP requirements. The remaining 900 meet table 2. All cages are enriched with plastic chains that dangle from the top of the cages. We are experimenting with different shelf/platform ideas for our breeder pens but as they are only 12 inches high makes it tough to put in a shelf that is useful for the mink while still being able to keep the mink cage clean.

Though we appreciate your concern for thinning the mink out at this time, it is felt that does not outweigh the immediate comfort and basic care of the animals. After consultation with Dr. Pritchard you must add shavings to all nest boxes, fix the broken nest boxes, and clean out the manure piled in cages.

Ensure your pens meet the minimum density requirements in Table 2 on page 11 and enrichments are being added.

We have reviewed your inspections from February 29, March 30, and June 23, 2016. Despite advising you of the items which required immediate attention to be in compliance with the Mink Code of Practice, and to obtain a valid Province of BC Fur Farm License, many items were not addressed on our last inspection. At this point, you remain in contravention of the Fur Farm Regulations and do not possess a license to farm mink in BC.

From our conversation on July 5th, I understand you have now added an enrichment to every pen and installed shelves to ensure the minimum floor space is met according to the specifications of the Code. It is your responsibility to understand the Code and apply it accordingly to every pen that is being used on your farm, whether the mink are male, female, whelping, etc.

Our licensing will conclude at the end of July. Farms will be required to wait until the next licensing cycle of January 2017 to re-apply. The Ministry will be advising the Canadian Mink Association of BC farms that have not met the requirements for 2016 licensing. Farms not licensed will not be able to sell pelts.

We will conduct two further inspections of your farm prior to the end of July. One inspection you may schedule with me (604) 556-3093, the other will be a random inspection. The following is a list of items that must be corrected and/or documented and available for review:

- Sheds all roofs have been repaired properly so NO rain will leak in.
- Leaking pipes to water dishes repaired.
- Records of treatments you have been using (medicine, dates).
- All medications you are using are to be onsite, in a cabinet or refrigerated (if label requires).
- Proof of hospital area and red hospital cards are being used, as indicated in your Herd Management plan.

- Written documentation of the sick and dead mink.
- Documentation that your plan to review antimicrobial feeding procedures with a veterinarian and to begin feed submissions to Exova for coliform counts has been initiated.

As discussed today during your farm inspection, the following items must be corrected prior to renewing your license for 2016:

- A manipulative enrichment must be added to every cage (after breeding is fine).
- Old food must be removed from the top of the pens prior to adding new food over top of it.
- Manure piled in cages to be removed and maintained.
- Sheds with holes/gaps in the roof need to be repaired to prevent rain entering the cages.
- Development and approval of a Herd Health Plan

Please continue to improve the drainage on the property as a lot of standing water was noted which will add to the fly and odour issues on the farm.

The cages we discussed (non-conforming 7"x17" plus a nest box of 7"x7") does not meet the minimum requirements in Table 3 on page 2 of the Code and should be removed completely. Though we appreciate there were no mink in these cages, the removal of these from the sheds is best to avoid an error in using them again.

I will call to reschedule a follow-up inspection during the week of March 21 - 24.
