Title: Canopy Growth Corporation request for a meeting with \$.15; \$.19

Issue: Canopy Growth Corporation (Canopy) has asked to meet to discuss cannabis production in B.C. Revitalization.

Background: In 2017, BC Tweed was established when Canopy Growth Corporation entered a joint venture with B.C.'s Sunselect (Greenhouse producer) to develop a 1.3 million square foot greenhouse in Aldergrove B.C. for cannabis cultivation. In February 2018, the Aldergrove site received a licence to produce medical cannabis from Health Canada. In April 2018, a second BC Tweed site in Delta B.C. received a production licence for 900,000 sq. ft. greenhouse. A recent online news article indicates that in May 2018, "Canopy Growth-Canada's largest licensed cannabis producer, which is aiming for a New York Stock Exchange listing-bought out greenhouse operator BC Tweed Joint Venture for \$289 million in shares" (Fortune.com, June 8, 2018).

Canopy is a major investor in commercial cannabis production in Canada. Canopy has large scale facilities in Ontario and B.C. In B.C., Canopy entered into a joint venture with B.C.'s Sunselect, a large scale greenhouse producer. According to recent online news, in May 2018, Canopy purchased the majority of the B.C. Tweed shares from Sunselect. Presumably, as Canopy is now a major investor in the B.C. cannabis cultivation industry, Canopy is now looking to engage with the provincial government.

On June 8, 2018 an email was received requesting s.15; s.19 meet with Jeff Ryan, Vice President of Government and Stakeholder Relations and Stephanie Tan, Director of Government and Stakeholder Relations for Western Canada Canopy Growth Corporation. They would like to discuss Canopy's plans for cannabis production in B.C. and how those plans might be impacted by the Revitalization of the Agricultural Land Reserve and the Agricultural Land Commission. As Canopy has already invested millions of dollars into its two B.C. sites, it would be in the company's best interest to ensure that future provincial regulations and legislation will not impact current or planned future investments.

The federal government announced its intent to legalize non-medical cannabis by October 17, 2018. Provinces and Territories are working to develop the provincial framework that includes a distribution and retail system that aligns with the federal legislation. The Province established the Cannabis Legalization and Regulation Secretariat (the Secretariat) to coordinate provincial planning for the safe implementation of legalized non-medical cannabis. The Ministry of Agriculture (AGRI) has staff actively participating in the Secretariat to address policy issues related to cannabis on the Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR). The goal is for the Province to be ready by the deadline that has now been announced.

Discussion: Currently medical cannabis is a designated farm use on the ALR, meaning local governments cannot prohibit it. Legalization of non-medical cannabis has brought to the fore front the question of whether or not non-medical cannabis will be a designated farm use on the ALR.

The public and some local governments have raised concerns related to cannabis production facilities on the ALR impacting food security and future use of agricultural soil. Two local governments, Central Saanich municipal council, and the District of North Saanich, as well as the Union of British Columbia municipalities have requested that a moratorium be placed on cannabis production on the ALR.

In January 2018, the Minister of Agriculture appointed an independent nine member Minister's Advisory Committee that is responsible for leading a comprehensive public engagement process to develop legislative recommendations that respond to the Minister's mandate letter commitment to 'Revitalize the ALR and the ALC'. The Advisory Committee travelled to nine communities to hear from local governments, key agricultural organizations and stakeholders. British Columbians were encouraged to submit their opinions through an online survey and written submissions which closed on April 30, 2018. Over 2300 British Columbians responded confirming that it is a priority of the Province to preserve the ALR in recognition of food security, prevent further erosion of the land base, and make farming and ranching the number one priority The Minister's Advisory Committee's public report, expected this summer, will include the legislative recommendations, and additional regulatory and administration recommendations for the Province to consider.

- To date, BCFIRB has received 13 cannabis complaints, involving 3 different cannabis operations, all of which are currently in process.
- All 13 involve odour and some involve other issues, such as light.
- 10 of the complaints involve an operation in Chilliwack, 2 involve an operation in Abbotsford and 1 involves an
 operation in Aldergrove (Canopy Growth).
- All 13 are in various stages of the complaint process, none have been set for hearing yet. BCFIRB continues to
 work with the parties to see which complaints may be settled or resolved before having to go to a hearing.

- Let's potentially revise this bullet (changes in red) to read: The Act lists the types of local government nuisance bylaws, like for noise[MWA1] or disturbances (given authority through the Local Government Act in Sections 318, 323, 325, 326 or Community Charter in section 8(3) and (5)), in which the farm practices protection applies to; however the Act does not exempt farm operators from other types of bylaws, such as for zoning.
- Farms on land outside of the ALR do not necessarily protect farm operations from local government nuisance bylaws.[MWA2]
 - There's been a lot of discussion about farm practice protection outside of the ALR I've attached an email that helps explain this matter.
- Also, an interesting fact in the FPPA, Section 12 allows the Lieutenant Governor in Council to make a regulation respecting standards for the purpose of defining a 'normal farm practice'. I don't think this has ever happened. Would this mean through an OIC, the Ministry could say that absolutely no odour from a cannabis facility would be 'normal farm practice? So that if a facility were cause an odour complaint, it would not be normal farm practice and thus the local government could use their nuisance bylaws and enforce compliance?

Hi s.15: The questions that s.22 could provide insight involve comparison's to other provinces or US states standards around odour in particular but also size of operations, standard production facilities and practices.

Specifically related to odour; have there been attempts at measuring odour and determining acceptable thresholds? Have setbacks been established based on odour, what odour mitigation practices are common? The reason for these questions relate to a recent court case on a FIRB decision involving an odour complaint from a stable, below. The issue of common and accepted practices carries a great deal of significance and as legal cannabis and recreational cannabis are so new we have little local experience to base current normal practices on.

The Court concluded that the 2013 panel made an error by effectively enforcing BC Ministry of Agriculture guidelines (Guide for Bylaw Development in Farming Areas) as a regulation [para 247] instead of determining the issue based on evidence of "proper and accepted customs and standards as established and followed by similar farm businesses under similar circumstances" [para 234] as a basis for a decision. The Court noted that "the FPPA does not instruct the FIRB to consider provincial guidelines and zoning bylaws" [para 241].

I left you a voice mail as well. I am copying s.15; s.19 as well. We have received a media request from a reporter who is looking into a cannabis growing operation on the ALR.

Here is the email from the reporter:

A company called Canopy Growth, that operates in 8 provinces at this time, has purchased a greenhouse operation where peppers were once grown, and planted some 200,000 marijuana plants. They plan to expand that after October when recreational use comes into play.

The net result of the operation is that marijuana smells...very bad. The 30 or so neighbours of the grow-op complain that the smell has made their life unbearable.

I have been around and the odour is clsoe to the smell of rotting meat. These folks have a valid complaint. The company has responded with the installation of "misting cannons" that spray a chemical mixture into the air. Now the smell on the surrounding properties is of rotting meat and Febreeze.

The company insists that the misting cannons have worked elsewhere and cited their operation at Niagara n the Lake, but when I reached out to the neighbours of that operation, they say that the smell is hideous and the situation is definately not resolved.

The group here has reached out to Health Canada who have referred them back to the Province, and the local politicians are similarly saying it's beyond their control and point to the Provincial gov't.

I would like to get an interview with the appropriate Minister to answer these questions.

Was there any consideration of the odour problems that an operation of this sort presents before they were granted permits to operate?

Under whose authority can this problem be addressed?

Why are there no regulations such as those governing other ag applications like mushroom farms where direct venting is not allowed and air scrubbers are mandatory?

What is the Minister's suggestion for the people whose lives have been seriously impacted by these operations?

I have written a project charter that I aim to inspect the cannabis facilities on Health Canada's website: https://www.canada.ca/en/health-canada/services/drugs-medication/cannabis/industry-licensees-applicants/licensed-cultivators-processors-sellers.html.

Currently, 22 facilities have been inspected to date in the lower mainland, on the island and in the Okanagan. Some of these have be inspected under the previous Agricultural Waste Control Regulation, and others under the new Agricultural Environmental Management Code of Practice. It has not been decided at this time if some of the facilities that were inspected will be visited again while I am in this role. After October 22, 2019 I believe the cannabis facilities will go into the general compliance inspection plan and these facilities will be inspected by all officers if they are on the plan for the year, or if an issue comes up through our reporting line as a complaint, a member of our reactive team may follow up with it.

I believe one of our section heads is drafting up a response to the message below as it was sent through to the Minister of Environment, but the information above should help a little in your responses. Good morning all.

I am a s.22 in Aldergrove, which is approximately 4 country blocks from the above referenced pharmaceutical cannabis grow facility.

In approximately late 2017/January 2018, we noticed some changes at the greenhouse (previously growing hothouse tomatoes, peppers and cucumbers) such as installation of barbed wire and high security fencing, exterior lighting etc. There was no community engagement - we had no idea what was going on.

Shortly thereafter we started experiencing bright orange lights escaping the facility at all hours of the night, effectively lighting up our night sky. The lights were so bright that I literally could walk to my barn in the middle of the night - no flashlight required - it was like daylight. The light was intrusive and distracting.

Through complaints and media attention we were able to engage with representatives of Canopy Growth / BC Tweed and were informed that nightshades were being installed so as to alleviate the disruption. For the most part, so far, this problem has been resolved, although there have been hiccups along the way - most recently a few weeks ago. I am not sure if the nightshades are automatically drawn when the lights are on or if someone has to flip a switch to draw the nightshades but whatever the case, sometimes the nightshades are not drawn in time or not at all. We complain - they apologize, there was a mechanical failure and they are investigating the source of the problem.

In late February/early March 2018 we started experiencing cannabis odour. It started slowly and then quickly became overwhelming. The odour invades homes and vehicles and causes headaches, nausea and exacerbates asthma symptoms. It equates to a family of skunks spraying your front door every day. Again, we engaged media and were able to meet with representatives of Canopy Growth / BC Tweed. They assured our community that they want to be "good neighbours" and they will work with us to rectify the odour issue. First, they installed odour cannons which spewed a fragrance into the air in an attempt to negate the odour. The sickening smell from the odour cannons made things worse. We asked for a copy of the Material Safety Data Sheet for the fragrance chemical that they were spraying into the air and

through weeks of follow up we were finally provided with one, only to learn the chemicals were "proprietary" in nature and left us questioning what cancer causing agents were being used. Thankfully, through multiple complaints, they were shut off. We lived through the entire spring, summer and fall of 2018 with varying degrees of cannabis and chemically fragranced air. When winter came, we were thrilled to have a break.

Moving forward to late February/early March this year, we started experiencing cannabis odour again. Through complaints we met with Canopy Growth/BC Tweed representatives, and were advised they just completed an installation of 100 carbon filters - more than enough to effectively manage the 40,000 plants that they had growing. To date, the obnoxious odour is still present. Further, they have capacity for, and intend to grow, 300,000 plants. This is alarming considering they cannot control their odour at 40,000 plants.

In short, their odour mitigation efforts are NOT working.

As a result, over this past year and a half, we have laid hundreds of complaints with Metro Vancouver Air Quality. We have met with media, the Township of Langley council and mayor, Provincial officials such as s.15; s.19 and his advisor, our s.15; s.19 - the list goes on. We are receiving support but to date there has not been any change in odour. We are subjected to opnoxious odour day in and day out with loud generators running all day and all night.

One of our community members has initiated a formal complaint with the Farm Industry Review Board and she is awaiting the outcome of this process.

Interestingly Health Canada, who issues the license to grow, specifically states in their regulations that the facility housing the production and processing of cannabis must "prevent the escape of odour". They are directly open venting the greenhouse into the air and attempting to mitigate the odour after it is released. How could this be permitted? The air filtration system should PREVENT the escape of odour. I believe they are relying on the Provincial Right to Farm Legislation to protect them against nuisance claims – including odour. The Provincial Right to Farm legislation was intended to protect legitimate farmers from nuisance claims such as intermittent odours, noise and dust from the result of farming activities. This legislation was not intended to protect multi-billion dollar companies who spew cannabis odour into the air 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Honestly, this facility is NOT farming – it is an industrial pharmaceutical cannabis facility and should NOT be permitted in rich food producing farm land.

Further, just last week s.22 came across someone testing the water in the ditch adjacent to the holding pond that the facility uses. When questioned the person was very tight lipped on why the ditch water was being tested. We can only deduce the high concentration of nutrients used to grow the cannabis is in the recycled water in the holding pond. The holding pond overflow pipe drains directly into the ditch that drains into Bertrand Creek - a protected wetland. As an negatively affected and concerned stakeholder - what is our Federal and Provincial government's plan with respect to enforcing or enacting legislation to assist our community with this negligence on all levels?

The rights of the surrounding farming community have been completely disregarded, in my opinion. I have lost the ability to enjoy my home and farm land including gardening in my vegetable garden, mucking out my horse and goat stalls in my barn, cleaning out my chicken coop, playing outside with my children and entertaining my friends on our deck due to the constant nauseating and headache inducing cannabis odour. Our water is potentially threatened as well as the drone from the generators running 24/7 at the facility have drowned out the beautiful sound of country living.

Please advise at your earliest opportunity. We are tired of being driven into our homes as a result of this pharmaceutical cannabis facility.
