#### Re: Enforcement of the PCA Act on commercial farms

I am writing to provide an update on an evolving issue regarding the BC SPCA's enforcement of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act (PCA Act) on commercial farms.

In 2019, the BC SPCA received a complaint and a video appearing to depict the unacceptable treatment of animals allegedly at Excelsior Hog Farm in Abbotsford. In response to this video, BC SPCA special constables, with prior notice to and subsequent later approval from Excelsior, attended at the farm with experts in porcine welfare to investigate the allegations, but observed no evidence of code violations at the time of the inspection. As the only evidence in the investigation was a video that was subsequently discovered to be obtained illegally following a break-in to the property, the BC SPCA was advised by Crown counsel that the case could not move forward as the evidence would not be admissible in court. From an investigative perspective, the file was then closed.

As you are no doubt aware, the Excelsior case has resulted in significant media attention and public protests, many of which have been directed against the BC SPCA. The protesters and their supporters (a number of which are BC SPCA donors and supporters) mistakenly believe that the decision to not proceed with a prosecution was solely that of the BC SPCA. More concerning is the belief that the BC SPCA is condoning acts of animal cruelty perpetrated by Excelsior and protecting the interests of industry by failing to take action in this case.

While I fully support the decision made by our Cruelty Investigations Department not to pursue the allegations further criminally, there is no doubt that this incident has caused significant and potentially long lasting challenges for the organization including recent protests at both our Abbotsford and Vancouver facilities this week, impacting the operations of our animal care, hospital and provincial office teams. This is particularly challenging to address during a pandemic. In addition, some of our staff have been subjected to unacceptable personal attacks on social media as a result of the case. Moreover, the BC SPCA has lost financial support from a number of long time donors, who now believe the Society is not doing enough for farm animals.

The BC SPCA has been active in advocating for higher standards of care for farm animals throughout its 125-year history. In addition to our work in B.C., our farm animal experts actively participate in the NFACC Code development process that brings together industry, animal welfare, veterinarians, scientists and others to seek mutually agreed improvements to farm codes of practice. We have always been a strong supporter of this inclusive process, believing that more is achieved through collaboration rather than adversarial relationships. That approach, however, is based on the premise that Codes of Practice are indeed implemented by industry

associations and we are growing increasingly skeptical that this is the case.

While we cannot confirm the veracity of the claims made on the Excelsior video, we are extremely concerned by a trend we see developing, namely that industry lead verification schemes are not achieving a level of public accountability and trust and that what is needed is government mandated regulation and oversight, perhaps through a third party auditing program that provides the assurance needed for British Columbians that commercially raised farm animals are being raised according to industry supported Codes of Practice.

At present, it appears the task of regulating industry appears to fall to the BC SPCA, via its enforcement function. This is a wholly unacceptable situation on at least three levels. Firstly, enforcement is not an effective tool to regulate an industry. Secondly, the BC SPCA, as a donor funded organization, has no capacity to regulate the more than 6,000 commercial farms in British Columbia, nor does it wish to be involved in such an endeavor, and finally we are well aware of the apparent lack of trust that industry has in the work of the BC SPCA.

We understand that no new directives can be taken at this time prior to the formation of government and Cabinet members being sworn in, but hope it is my hope that you will prioritize this issue for the incoming Minister, as well as provide them with a brief on the challenges raised. We look forward to scheduling a meeting with the new Minister to discuss the issue further upon their appointment.

#### FOR CONSIDERATION

Subject: Recommendations for commercial farm animal welfare compliance in B.C.

#### **Purpose**

This briefing note outlines: criteria for assurance of acceptable standards of animal welfare in British Columbia; gaps between the current state and a credible, effective system of accountability; and recommendations for consideration.

#### **Background**

As of 2017, more than 115 million terrestrial farm animals were raised annually on approximately ten thousand farms in B.C<sup>1</sup>. We offer that three elements are required in order to provide public assurance that the needs of these animals are met and that they are not suffering:

- 1. Auditable **standards of care** and a legitimate process for updating those standards over time to reflect science and public expectations within a practical framework for farmers;
- 2. A proactive system of regular third-party **on-farm inspection or auditing** that assesses compliance and provides transparent reporting on the outcomes; and
- 3. An enforcement mechanism to address non-compliances not satisfied through the audit system.

At present, British Columbia relies on two structures to meet these goals, the sufficiency of which we believe must be called into question:

- A. The Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act (PCAA), enforced on an entirely complaint basis by a registered charity (the BC SPCA) at no cost to the tax-payer, with Canada's Codes of Practice<sup>2</sup> referenced in regulation as instruments for defense against prosecution.
- B. Voluntary application of Canada's Codes of Practice through industry-operated assessment programs.

#### **Current Situation**

A number of recent developments are noteworthy in examination of the situation and our pathway forward:

- Scientific knowledge regarding the impacts of conventional farming practices on the well-being of farmed animals has grown substantially over the past decade, producing much greater understanding of the needs of these species and the deficiencies of current practices.
- 2. Public expectations have shifted significantly, with a dramatically heightened concern about conventional farming practices and a lack of sufficient legislation and enforcement in this area. 42% of British Columbians surveyed in 2020 indicated the provincial government is doing too little or far too little to protect farm animals (compared to 38% who feel the province is doing enough or too much).

- 3. In our view, industry's on-farm assessment programs have proven insufficient at implementing the Codes quickly enough or with sufficient rigor to serve as a reliable compliance system to satisfy public expectations for accountability and transparency.
- 4. As a result of the gaps in accountability and transparency, independent activists have taken it upon themselves to access these farms (through illegal trespass or legal employment) in order to document practices. The BC SPCA and other authorities are then left to handle legal investigations with the evidence available evidence that is often challenging or impossible to make use of.
- 5. These activities have become more common and more adversarial over the past 5 years; these cases disproportionally impact the BC SPCA's organizational resources.
- 6. The animal agriculture sector's pursuit of "ag-gag" laws that prevent whistleblower actions on farms have further damaged public trust of this sector, as evidenced by research conducted at UBC<sup>3</sup> and polling showing only 21% of British Columbians would support such measures.
- 7. The ability now exists under the PCAA (section 15.1) for the proactive inspection of all animal agriculture sectors and commercial dog and cat kennels by an authorized agent as "regulated activities".

We offer that the resultant environment has produced a misalignment between the prevailing system and what is required to meet public expectations.

The BC SPCA has shouldered an onerous amount of public concern on this issue. We have noted that when asked about farm animal welfare compliance measures, the Government of British Columbia generally refers to the BC PCAA and its enforcement by the BC SPCA. We believe it is imperative to acknowledge that the BC SPCA's election to provide complaint-based enforcement of the PCAA was not designed to and cannot possibly satisfy the need for proactive compliance with animal welfare on commercial farms in B.C. In 2021, the BC SPCA will be conducting trial inspections of commercial farms under s. 15.1 of the PCAA to assess application of that provision in practice, and will share outcomes with government.

## Consideration

Our assessment is that significant gaps exist in the accountability and transparency of farm animal welfare practices in B.C., and that these gaps present substantial risk to public trust in the provincial government, the BC SPCA, and to the farming industry itself. We offer that an intentionally designed proactive compliance system for the welfare of commercially raised farm animals is urgently needed. We request an opportunity to work in partnership with the provincial government on options for: proactive third-party monitoring; compliance measures; and transparent reporting of aggregated anonymized results of audits to the public.

The BC SPCA has met with the Honourable Lana Popham, Minister of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries, as well as the Deputy Minister and Ministry staff, to advise of our intention to begin unannounced proactive inspections of regulated activities. The Ministry has confirmed that the <u>Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act</u> (PCA Act) provides the BC SPCA the authority to conduct proactive inspections under s.15.1.

The Government of British Columbia, through the *PCA Act*, created the British Columbia Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA) in 1895 and gave the Society the power to enforce the *PCA Act*. In 2011, the BC government amended the *PCA Act* to include broader inspection powers for "regulated activities." Section 15.1 of the *PCA Act* provides the BC SPCA, as authorized agents, the ability to enter "any premises or a vehicle where an operator is engaging in a regulated activity for the purpose of determining whether this *Act* and the regulations made under it are being complied with."

In 2019, the provincial <u>Animal Care Codes of Practice Regulation</u> under the *PCA Act*, classified commercial dairy cattle farming as a regulated activity. This gives the BC SPCA the ability to enter and inspect commercial farms during ordinary business hours to ensure the farm is following the *PCA Act* and associated regulations.

To date, the BC SPCA has not used this section of the *PCA Act*, inspecting farms only after a cruelty complaint is received. In part, this is due to a resource and capacity issue of limited numbers of constables and large file loads. The BC SPCA will now be visiting a subset of farms in 2021 to perform inspections under section 15.1, even if no cruelty complaint has been received. This program is targeted to begin mid-year, with possible timeline adjustments owing to factors outside of our control such as the COVID-19 pandemic.

We respectfully request that you share this information with your members and inform them of their responsibility to allow BC SPCA inspectors access to their farm during business hours. A veterinarian with experience in commercial dairy cattle production will also be in attendance. The inspection will include all animals currently housed on the premises and utilize the Animal Care Assessment framework (ProAction – Animal Care module) developed through the National Farm Animal Care Council in order to assess compliance with the requirements of the National Farm Animal Care

Council's Code of Practice for the Care and Handling of Dairy Cattle.

BC SPCA staff always follow strict biosecurity protocols when visiting farms, including handwashing, disposable coveralls, boot covers, following any reasonable biosecurity requests from the operator, and spacing out visits between farms by several days when possible. Our protocols are based on the Government of Canada's <u>National Biosecurity Standards</u> for each sector. We welcome any additional biosecurity instructions from your association for consideration in our biosecurity protocol.

Further, BC SPCA inspectors will be following additional safety protocols for COVID-19 by ensuring all staff are wearing masks and other PPE, performing additional handwashing/hand sanitizing, and social distancing. We ask all that while the BC SPCA staff are in the barn, farm personnel remain at least 6 feet from inspectors and wear a mask to ensure COVID-19 safety protocols are followed.

The BC SPCA has met with the Honourable Lana Popham, Minister of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries, as well as the Deputy Minister and Ministry staff, to advise of our intention to begin unannounced proactive inspections of regulated activities. The Ministry has confirmed that the <u>Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act</u> (PCA Act) provides the BC SPCA the authority to conduct proactive inspections under s.15.1.

The Government of British Columbia, through the *PCA Act*, created the British Columbia Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA) in 1895 and gave the Society the power to enforce the *PCA Act*. In 2011, the BC government amended the *PCA Act* to include broader inspection powers for "regulated activities." Section 15.1 of the *PCA Act* provides the BC SPCA, as authorized agents, the ability to enter "any premises or a vehicle where an operator is engaging in a regulated activity for the purpose of determining whether this *Act* and the regulations made under it are being complied with."

In 2019, the provincial <u>Animal Care Codes of Practice Regulation</u> under the *PCA Act*, classified commercial chicken farming as a regulated activity. This gives the BC SPCA the ability to enter and inspect commercial farms during ordinary business hours to ensure the farm is following the *PCA Act* and associated regulations.

To date, the BC SPCA has not used this section of the *PCA Act*, inspecting farms only after a cruelty complaint is received. In part, this is due to a resource and capacity issue of limited numbers of constables and large file loads. The BC SPCA will now be visiting a subset of farms in 2021 to perform inspections under section 15.1, even if no cruelty complaint has been received. This program is targeted to begin mid-year, with possible timeline adjustments owing to factors outside of our control such as the COVID-19 pandemic.

We respectfully request that you share this information with your members and inform them of their responsibility to allow BC SPCA inspectors access to their farm during business hours. A veterinarian with experience in commercial broiler production will also be in attendance. –The inspection will include all animals currently housed on the premises and utilize the Animal Care Assessment framework developed through the National Farm Animal Care Council (*Raised by a Canadian Farmer* Animal Care Program) to assess compliance with the requirements of the National Farm Animal Care Council's *Code of Practice for the Care and Handling of Hatching Eggs, Breeders, Chickens and Turkeys*.

BC SPCA staff always follow strict biosecurity protocols when visiting farms, including handwashing, disposable coveralls, boot covers, following any reasonable biosecurity requests from the operator, and spacing out visits between farms-visits by several days when possible. Our protocols are based on the Government of Canada's National Biosecurity Standards for each sector. We welcome any additional biosecurity instructions from your association for consideration in our biosecurity protocol.

Further, BC SPCA inspectors will be following additional safety protocols for COVID-19 by ensuring all staff are wearing masks and other PPE, performing additional handwashing/hand sanitizing, and social distancing. We ask all that while the BC SPCA staff are in the barn, farm personnel remain at least 6 feet from inspectors and wear a mask to ensure-to COVID-19 safety protocols are followed.

We are having a hard time finding current information pertaining to your member farms and would greatly appreciate your assistance in providing details for the farms. Please forward a list of all broiler farms that are members of your organization, including name(s) of owner, address, and contact details (phone/email) as well as approximate number of animals, if available. We ask that you please forward this list by July 9. It will be kept strictly confidential and used only for the purposes of inspections under s.15.1.

Thank you for sharing this advance notice of s.15.1 inspections of farms within your industry. Please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions regarding this initiative.

- Ongoing collaboration;
- · Enforcement on commercial farms; and
- The BC SPCA's 2021 Budget Submission.

## **Background:**

#### The BC SPCA

The BC SPCA is a not-for-profit charitable organization, funded primarily by public donations, with a mission to protect and enhance the quality of life for domestic, farm, and wild animals in British Columbia (B.C.). The BC SPCA was created in 1895, and it has authority under the *Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act* (PCA Act). The PCA Act creates legislative force to prevent cruelty to animals in B.C., including family pets (companion animals), livestock, and working animals, but excluding wildlife. The BC SPCA is the only animal organization in B.C. with the authority to enforce laws under the PCA Act. The BC SPCA operates in 44 locations and employs 645 staff members and approximately 5,500 volunteers throughout B.C.

There are two distinct functions of the BC SPCA in B.C.: a regulatory function and a community outreach function. The BC SPCA is mandated under the PCA Act to respond to animals in distress. BC SPCA enforcement actions are performed by Special Provincial Constables. Currently, the BC SPCA has 34 full time Special Provincial Constables who are authorized to investigate complaints of animal abuse and neglect. BC SPCA constables investigate approximately 8,500 complaints of animal cruelty each year, at a cost of approximately \$3.5 million annually. The BC SPCA does not receive annual, dedicated funding from the Province for their enforcement actions.

### Enforcement on commercial farms

The Animal Care Codes of Practice Regulation (the Regulation) came into force on June 1, 2019, under the PCA Act, to provide further protection for farm animals by establishing reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management. The Regulation applies to all farming and ranching operations in B.C. where the animals listed in section 2 of the Regulation are kept for the purposes of breeding, boarding, grazing, selling, training, and for the production of certain farm and ranch products and byproducts. While failure to abide by the Codes of Practice is not necessarily an offence, following the Codes is a defense from conviction of animal distress. Referencing the Codes of Practice in regulation therefore provides an incentive to farmers and ranchers to follow these practices.

Approximately 20 percent of complaints received by the BC SCPA involve farm animals. Most of these complaints relate to either hobby farmers or equines. A very small percentage relate to enforcement on commercial farms (approximately 10 to 20 complaints per annum).

Hello all,

I am following up on the August 4, 2021 meeting between the BCSPCA, livestock commodity boards, producer associations and the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries.

First, thank you for including BCFIRB staff in the meeting.

BCFIRB supports recommendations for a collaborative, transparent and accountable approach to animal welfare under the respective jurisdictions of the BCSPCA (*PCAA*) and the commodity boards (*NPMA*).

We heard at the meeting that ensuring animal welfare in the public interest through transparent and accountable processes is a shared goal.

In BCFIRB's view, a collaborative/cooperative approach to proactive inspections and issues resolution would help achieve this goal in a timely and resource effective way.

Animal welfare and public accountability are important components of sound marketing policy and orderly marketing in BC's regulated marketing livestock sectors.

BCFIRB (supervisor) and the commodity boards (regulatory boards with legislated authorities) are responsible for sound marketing policy and orderly marketing under the *NPMA*. Boards have the authority to establish mandatory animal welfare programs, and to enforce such programs through a series of graduated penalties, including production penalties, administrative monetary penalties, licence suspension or cancellation.

In BCFIRB's view, the ability of the commodity boards to work successfully with regulated marketing producers and the BCSPCA to ensure animal welfare and public accountability depends on-going and open communication. It was apparent in the meeting that there are still outstanding questions regarding BCSPCA's proactive inspection pilot project, including defining what success would look like. BCFIRB is hopeful the BCSPCA will fully address any commodity board questions as appropriate, and in turn, expects commodity boards will work to address any BCSPCA questions and issues.

BCFIRB understands the proactive inspections are to start as early as this week. According to the BCSPCA a written report for the producer will only be made available after an internal writing process. In the interest of animal welfare, BCFIRB encourages the BCSPCA to contact the respective commodity board immediately should animals be identified as being in distress at the time of inspection.

I am now back and can respond to the below. The specific piece of misinformation that we are concerned about is the communication that we would be publicly naming farmers who refuse entry.

At no time did we ever say that farmers would be named publicly if they refused to permit us onto the farm. In fact, I specifically addressed this question a few times where we stated that only general references may be made in any report to government/industry should that issue arise (eg. we attended 14 farms and were granted access to 10 of them.)

Additionally, I addressed the issue of concerns regarding privacy and any ability of the BC SPCA to release information to a commodity group regarding the identity of a farmer in the event that they do refuse us access (some commodity groups had expressed desire to receive that information.) I confirmed that I did

not believe that we could release that information but if the farmer agreed, they could call a contact provided to them to discuss (hence, why contact numbers were provided to us.)

I look forward to the timely correction of the error.

The overwhelming majority of our officers have attended the BC FACC facilitated large animal welfare training paid for through the Grow It Forward Grants obtained and initiated by the Ministry of Agriculture and officers further rely on the support of experts, specialist and those knowledgeable with farm animals including those within industry itself.

Good afternoon Jenn,

I am raising this for your awareness, further to my earlier conversations with Byron.

Regarding the upcoming BC SPCA animal welfare inspections on commercial farm sites; staff have raised concern that AFF presence during inspections, and written support of inspections, is contradictory to AFF communication to industry stakeholder groups between 2018 and 2019.

Please find attached the Q&A document (prepared in August, 2018). This document was shared with industry members (responses also shared verbally) in response to industry inquiries, post-August 2018.

Confirmation is needed to assure industry that the guidance offered in the Q&A document still stands. And additional clarification is needed on a few points:

#### See in attached:

- #15: "...the BC Farm Industry Review Board may hear appeals in relation to certain BCSPCA decisions"
  - Is this process in addition to, or concurrent to standard legal proceedings, should a producer be charged under the PCAA? Or, is this process in lieu of standard legal proceedings?
- #22: "...How can the Ministry support BCSPCA and industry collaboration and shared understanding?"
  - Did additional training or collaborative education opportunities take place?
  - O Were MOU's established?

In addition to the questions and responses contained in the Q&A document, industry has new inquiries that are not covered:

- What third party organization monitors the BC SPCA compliance and enforcement staff to ensure they
  have the appropriate welfare education and training in livestock behaviour?
- How is BCSPCA determining which farms to target?
  - o Is BCSPCA using Premises ID Data?
- Can producers refuse inspections?
  - o Is there a penalty for refusal?

I will add, anecdotally, that the point of contention seems to be the perception that enforcement is at the 'discretion' of inspectors who may have a principle-based objection (agenda) against animal agriculture.

I would be happy to discuss potential next steps in providing communication and clarity to industry, in terms of informing what would be helpful. In the meantime, I have pulled back regional and specialist staff from in-person meetings/Q&A sessions with producers until such point they are prepared to respond.

Please find below a list of items that were raised from the Industry Development Unit's (IDU) Livestock Team regarding BCSPCA's Farm Compliance Inspections.

Members from the IDU are predominately concerned that Ministry presence during these inspections, and written support of BCSPCA's Farm Compliance Inspections is contradicting of direction that was given to industry stakeholder groups between 2018 and 2019 by AFF. This point is summarized in the first bullet below, and is the most important piece that staff, and industry are seeking more information on.

- Will the BCSPCA be requiring compliance with the NFACC Codes of Practice as part of these on-farm inspections?
  - AFF specifically stated in our 2018-2019 consultations with industry that the enforcement of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act (PCAA) is related to animals in distress; the NFACC cannot be used for purposes of enforcing the PCAA and the BCSPCA "cannot require compliance with the Codes". These new inspections appear to contradict recent BCSPCA written communication with industry groups in which they indicated they would be 'inspecting against the Codes'.
  - Industry is concerned that the BCSPCA will use this new pilot-program of inspections to set precedent to enforce the above codes, to where industry was previously told in past years that this would not be the case.
- What third party organization monitors the *BC SPCA compliance and enforcement staff* to ensure they have the appropriate welfare education and training in livestock behaviour?
- How is BCSPCA determining which farms to target?
  - o Are they using Premises ID Data?
- Can producers refuse inspections?
  - o Is there a penalty to refuse?

# Questions and Answers BC Ministry of Agriculture Outreach to Industry Enshrining the NFACC Codes of Practice for Care and Handling of Farm Animals in Regulation

#### Background

The Ministry intends to enshrine, in regulation, the National Farm Animal Care Council (NFACC) Codes of Practice (Codes) for the care and handling of farm animals.

#### **Questions and Answers**

#### 1. Why is the Ministry of Agriculture reaching out to industry on this issue?

Farm animal welfare is important in BC, to government, industry, and citizens. Strong expectations exist but there are few identified BC standards. Issues can arise where animal care and handling is misunderstood. Enshrining the Codes of Practice in regulation will ensure better understanding of reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management and support industry where these practices are misperceived or challenged.

There is a need to hear from industry on how to best implement this work. The Ministry worked closely with the dairy industry to enshrine the dairy code in regulation. The Ministry will seek input from industry associations on how to best share information and address issues their members may have. Through outreach the Ministry will:

- Understand industry needs
- Ensure greater clarity and consistency of understanding across all stakeholders
- Develop a plan for effective implementation including partnering with industry on education/communication

#### 2. What is the National Farm Animal Care Council (NFACC)?

The NFACC is a collaborative partnership of a diverse range of Canadian agriculture stakeholders including industry associations, the federal government, enforcement agencies, animal care and welfare bodies, and provincial ministries across the country. NFACC's primary focus is responsible farm animal care and welfare. NFACC coordinates and leads the Code development process.

#### 3. What are "the Codes"?

The Codes are developed by the NFACC to serve as a national understanding of animal care requirements and recommended practices. NFACC intends the Codes to be used to promote sound management and animal welfare for animal housing, care, transportation, and other animal husbandry practices. The NFACC process for developing and revising codes includes extensive consultation with all parties involved in farm animal care and welfare.

#### 4. How are the Codes Developed?

A Scientific Committee and Code Development Committee work together to develop a Code based on both science and consensus. Industry stakeholders are active participants during each Code development process, which typically takes approximately 3 years to complete. The Codes, therefore, include up-to-date research and have multi-stakeholder involvement.

#### 5. What specific Codes would be included in regulation?

The Ministry intends to include all Codes for the care and handling of farm animals developed and released through the NFACC process. The Ministry does not intend to include Codes that were not developed through the NFACC process, even if they are currently available on the NFACC website. This includes the current Codes for Farmed Deer, Goats and Transportation.

The Ministry intends to include the 12 Codes developed and released through the process:

- Beef (2013)
- Bison (2017)
- Hatching Eggs, Breeders, Chickens, and Turkeys (2016)
- Dairy Cattle\* (2009) (BC regulation 2015)
- Equines (2013)
- Farmed Fox (2013)
- Farmed Mink (2013)
- Pigs (2014)
- Pullets and Laying Hens (2017)
- Rabbits (2018)
- Sheep (2013)
- Veal Cattle (2017)

#### 6. What about older Codes?

It is not clear to what extent a judge may consider the age of a Code, or determine whether or not the specific information contained in a Code is still relevant. In this situation it may be necessary for a farmer or rancher to provide supporting information to demonstrate how current reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management have evolved.

#### 7. Why does the Ministry want to enshrine the Codes in regulation?

Identifying reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management would provide an incentive to follow these practices. While failure to abide by the Codes would not necessarily be

an offence, following the Codes would be a defence from prosecution of animal distress. The Codes are also industry supported standards that promote animal care. The Code of Practice for the Care and Handling of Dairy Cattle was enshrined in regulation in 2015. This was a successful collaboration between the BC Dairy Association, Ministry of Agriculture, and the BCSPCA. The BC Dairy Association requested the NFACC Code be referenced in regulation to support industry practice. The Ministry intends to take this approach to other Codes that were developed under the fulsome NFACC process.

8. How would the Ministry enshrine the Codes? How could they assist industry?

The Ministry would build the Codes into one regulation under BC's *Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act* (PCAA) to serve as reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management. Under the PCAA, a person must not be convicted of causing distress to an animal if it can be proved they followed reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management (see the Defence section 24.02 (c)).

9. What is the difference between "requirements" and "recommended practices" in the Codes? Requirements refer to a minimum expectation, while recommended practices refer to a higher standard of care. As the Codes will be utilized as a defence, if an operator meets the requirements, they likely should not be convicted of causing distress. If they are also able to provide evidence showing they have followed the recommended practices, it should further bolster their defence.

**Requirements:** These refer to either a regulatory requirement or an industry imposed expectation outlining acceptable and unacceptable practices and are fundamental obligations relating to the care of animals. Requirements represent a consensus position that these measures, at minimum, are to be implemented by all persons responsible for farm animal care. When included as part of an assessment program, those who fail to implement Requirements may be compelled by industry associations to undertake corrective measures or risk a loss of market options. Requirements also may be enforceable under federal and provincial regulation.

**Recommended Practices:** Code Recommended Practices may complement a Code's Requirements, promote producer education, and can encourage adoption of practices for continual improvement in animal welfare outcomes. Recommended Practices are those that are generally expected to enhance animal welfare outcomes, but failure to implement them does not imply that acceptable standards of animal care are not met.

#### 10. Will this approach change how the PCAA is enforced?

No. The enforcement of the PCAA is related to animals in distress; the Codes cannot be used for purposes of enforcing the PCAA. There may, however, be links between the two, such as overlap of reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management with preventing "distress" under the PCAA (e.g. providing potable water). In these cases, the Codes would serve as an educational tool and not an enforcement mechanism.

#### 11. Would a farmer or rancher who does not meet a Code be charged under the PCAA?

The trigger for charges under the PCAA is whether or not an animal is in distress, not whether the Code is met. Under the PCAA, an animal is considered to be in distress if it is:

- deprived of adequate food, water, shelter, ventilation, light, space, exercise, care or veterinary treatment;
- kept in conditions that are unsanitary;
- not protected from excessive heat or cold;
- injured, sick, in pain or suffering; or
- abused or neglected.

If a farmer or rancher causes an animal distress but the specific practice or activity in question is considered a reasonable and generally accepted practice of animal management under the Code, the farmer or rancher must not be convicted under the PCAA. Conversely, if a practice or activity causes distress and it is not supported by the Code that may lead to a farmer or rancher being charged as already the case with the PCAA.

## 12. Is it possible a farmer or rancher undertaking a common practice might still be convicted under the PCAA for animal distress as a result of a Code being ambiguous or outdated on certain animal husbandry practices?

The Codes would be adopted in full, and the PCAA is clear that a person must not be convicted of causing distress if an activity is carried out in accordance with the requirements and recommendations contained in the Codes. If a Code contains ambiguous provisions, a judge would have discretion as to how it is to be interpreted and applied to the evidence presented.

#### 13. What are the current penalties under the PCAA?

The maximum penalties that can be levied under the PCAA against a person who is convicted of causing distress to an animal are a fine of up to \$75,000, up to 24 months imprisonment, or both. A judge may also make an order that limits or bans an individual from having animals for a certain period of time.

### 14. What is the enforcement role of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA) in BC?

The BC SPCA is mandated by government under the PCAA to respond to animals in distress. However, the SPCA independently establishes policy and procedures in executing cruelty investigations. BC SPCA enforcement actions are performed by special provincial constables appointed under the *Police Act*. With respect to the Codes, the BC SPCA can use the Codes as reference material when conducting investigations; however, they cannot require compliance with the Codes. There may, however, be cases of overlap if a certain requirement under the Code would also be a requirement for relieving an animal from distress (e.g. providing sufficient and potable water).

#### 15. What happens if I disagree with an SPCA decision?

Under the PCAA, the BC Farm Industry Review Board may hear appeals in relation to certain BCSPCA decisions, including:

- A decision to take custody of an animal;
- A decision to affirm notice that the animal will be destroyed, sold or otherwise disposed of;
- The costs for which an owner is liable; and/or,
- The costs that an owner must pay before the animal is returned to the owner.

This external appeal mechanism provides an opportunity for farmers, ranchers, and other animal owners to have decisions of the BCSPCA independently reviewed, while keeping this kind of dispute out of the court system.

#### 16. Do other provinces include the NFACC Codes in regulation?

Yes, several provinces include the NFACC Codes of Practice in regulation, although there is variation among provinces in how this is done. For example, some provinces create a regulation that makes the requirements contained in a particular Code legally enforceable standards. Other provinces take an approach similar to BC's, with the Codes functioning as a defence for those accused of causing distress. Referencing the Codes as reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management is considered a less invasive approach than enshrining the Codes as enforceable standards, because the specific practices referenced in the Codes are not for purpose of inspection/compliance.

# 17. If each province has a different approach to the Codes, what would a farmer, rancher or transporter do in the case of animals being transported across provincial borders where the Code is not enforceable in one province but in the adjoining one it is?

In this type of situation, farmers, ranchers or transporters must be knowledgeable of the specific legal requirements in each province. Once the animals are transported across a provincial border, different laws apply. In addition to provincial requirements, federal transportation requirements apply. For the most part, provincial transportation requirements support and/or supplement federal transportation requirements.

It is important to note the Code of Practice for the Care and Handling of Farm Animals — Transportation was released in 2001, prior to NFACC's Code development process. Therefore, the current transportation Code would not be included in regulation in BC. Note: federal legislation establishes overarching rules for transporting animals under the *Health of Animals Act* and Part XII (Transportation of Animals) of the federal Health of Animals Regulations. These Regulations are currently being reviewed.

### 18. How will the Codes apply on and off farm (i.e. will they apply at fairs, at auction, etc. or only on farm)?

The Codes will apply in any situation contemplated in the Codes themselves. For example:

- The dairy code reads: "This Code applies to dairy cattle (including bull calves and bulls) on dairy farms. It does not apply to associated industries (e.g. veal, beef, or bull artificial insemination units)".
- The farmed mink code reads: "This Code applies to all mink on farms in Canada".

### 19. Will I have to change any of my existing farming or ranching practices as a result of the Codes being regulated?

While the requirements in the Codes would not become enforceable standards in and of themselves, the Ministry would recommend farmers and ranchers comply with the Codes. The Codes represent reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management. In addition, a farmer or rancher who chooses not to comply with the Codes would put themselves in a position where, if charged with causing distress to an animal, they would not be able to use adherence to the Codes as a defence against conviction. Therefore, farmers and ranchers should take the necessary steps to become compliant with the Codes.

### 20. How will this approach affect third party assurance programs (Verified beef plus, Verified sheep etc.)?

While most, if not all, third party assurance programs for farm animals are based at least in part on the Codes, these programs are developed and implemented by industry. Therefore, they serve a distinctly different purpose and function than the regulation of Codes as generally accepted animal management practices under the PCAA. Because it is recommended farmers and ranchers comply with the Codes, industry may choose to modify their third party assurance programs to become consistent with the Codes.

### 21. What on-going forms of support or training will BCSPCA constables receive around the specific requirements and recommendations in the Codes?

Through GF2 funding, BCSPCA special constables received farm animal welfare training administered through the BC Agriculture Council in 2014, 2015, and 2016. Future training needs are still to be determined and the Ministry wants to engage with industry stakeholders through this consultation process to determine what the level and scope of training should be. An important part of the training process with BCSPCA special constables would be to articulate how the Codes can and cannot be used as part of a new regulatory approach (i.e. the specific activities required in the Codes could not be inspected for compliance).

# 22. Some BC farmers have expressed concern about the dual role of BCSPCA as an enforcement body of provincial regulation and a charitable organization accepting donations. How can the Ministry support BCSPCA and industry collaboration and shared understanding?

The Ministry encourages the use of farm animal expertise and collaboration between stakeholders in farm animal cases. Through this industry outreach process, the Ministry hopes to explore ways in which this could happen. Some examples might include:

 Additional training for BC SPCA, or collaborative education opportunities between industry associations and the BC SPCA

 Development of MOUs – or revised existing MOUs – between industry sectors, the BCSPCA and the provincial government on recommended ways to proceed in farm animal cases.

#### 23. What input process is the Ministry undertaking with industry?

The Province recognizes the value of industry input and is seeking collaboration on this important project. The Ministry is contacting all BC-based industry associations to share the Questions and Answers, ask related questions, and seek feedback on best approaches to engaging industry. In addition, the Ministry will arrange opportunities for discussion between the BCSPCA and industry associations to address any questions or issues to support clarity of information and understanding.

#### BC SPCA compliance inspection – AFF Observer participation

The Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries (AFF) is seeking agreement with the British-Columbia Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BCSPCA) to confirm an observer role for one ministry staff person to attend on site for each commercial farm inspection.

The purpose of the AFF observer is to gain an understanding of on farm SPCA compliance inspections and verify that inspections are done in accordance with BC SPCA policies and operational procedures of the society for administering the enforcement of the *Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act*.

#### We agree to:

- The BC SPCA is recognized as the lead agent responsible for all inspection related activities.
- The BC SPCA will provide to the AFF contact 24 hours notice (during weekdays) or 72 hours if a farm inspection takes place on a Monday the community location for the planned inspection, the address and time for a pre-meeting with the BC SPCA inspection team prior to the planned inspection. This information is necessary to deploy AFF staff to the general community on the day of the inspection. Ideally the community location is within 1 hour drive time of the farm location.
- If an AFF staff member is not available to attend the inspection on the date and location provided, the inspection will proceed without AFF in attendance.
- The AFF contact will provide the BC SPCA with confirmation of attendance and name of AFF staff
  person as soon as possible after receiving notice.
- All information will be maintained as confidential in accordance with the BC Public Service Standards of Conduct:
  - Confidential information, in any form, that employees receive through their employment must not be disclosed, released, or transmitted to anyone other than persons who are authorized to receive the information.
- Specifically, no information provided by the BC SPCA regarding the farm name, location or date for inspection will be shared with industry.
- Upon arrival at the property, the AFF representative will confirm approval from the farm owner to observe the inspection.
- The AFF representative will follow all on farm biosecurity, health and safety protocols.
- The AFF representative may make records during the inspection for ministry use.
- The AFF representative will remain a neutral observer during all inspection related activities.
- AFF will strive to maintain a consistent AFF representative for all inspections; however the representative may change depending upon government operation needs (e.g. fire response) and staff scheduling.
- This agreement ends November 30, 2021.

Wanda Gorsuch (FIRB) Kristen Pederson (FIRB) **Reg Ens:** We want to start with an agreement that animals are treated approprtiately and we can help farmers refine and enhance care. As we outlined in our letters to you is to better understand BC SPCA objectives, how this will unfold and how we can work together. Lets jump into the 4 questions we had. Brief comment to each question. Any ministry comments?

Jennifer McGuire: No lets get to the questions

**RE:** understanding change in approach. Group wants to know what's changed, and what outcomes thye'd like to see. And what success looks like to the spca.

**MM:** Intro. It's helpful to look at PCA act that in the past it always had a sec 15 inspection power (built in) it was confined to sits where animals ar ekept for sale, hire, exhibit. In the past we've used proactive function. We're complaint based. Example: Sled dog case, there was major change ot legislation at that time. Concept of a 'regulated activity'. Not in our scope at the time to be that 3<sup>rd</sup> party inspection role, even though there was a big push. More recently of course, by way of regulation codes of practice incoprporated into the act. Being as a defense to causing distress. As codes started to be incorporated those industries became regulated activites therefore sec 15.1 scheme applies. We now have this ability as the enforcement agency to take on inspection capacity.

Why now? 1) we still have limited resources, which impacts our ability to be conducting signigicant proactive inspections. For discussion, we've talked to govt, about is this our role? 3<sup>rd</sup> party? 2) public shift on variety of different levels. People wanting assurance and transparancy around good welfare. Number of stakeholders came forward with concerns, govt was receiving concerns. Typically reassurance we have strongest PCA act in Canada. That in turn comes back to us to say "we have legislation, so what are bc spca doing to ensure good welfare'. We decided this was an oppoprtunity to do small sampling of some commodities to utilize this power under the act to determine if this is something we're prepared to do. We want to see animals are being well cared for and codes of practice are being upheld. I'm aware codes are a defense, so our job is "are animals meeting definition of distress, if so, is it consideed generally accepted practice?" Then we bring in the codes

**JM:** I will add that spca did come in a few times over the past 2 years for briefing w/Minister and staff about the spca's stakeholders raising concerns around authorities spca has and inspections or some type of assessment like function should be done to confirm animal welfare and the broad level of compliance that exists. SPCA has briefed minister and staff about their intention to move forward.

Derek Sturko: Curious, what's the intended use or application of the results? How will they be utilized?

**MM:** Just as we would with any inspection or complaint our duty is to work with the farm and animal owner. As we always do, we give the owner a reasonable opportunity to relieve the distress (given a notice) and then work w/individual to ensure compliance is met. As we do with any other inspection. Obviously if owner wants to share the report with their own industry or with gov't, and from our perspective the document is between us and the individual. General overview of findings for gov't meetings after inspections.

Jack DeWitt: can you give me an example of the stakeholders asking you to do these inspections?

**MM:** After excelsior there was a huge response. IN terms of other agencies who have written to govt about transparency in farming there are a bunch of advocacy groups (VHS, furbearers etc)

**RE:** Second question: Let's not get into commodity specific questions, but in general. More around process, how will this happen, how are farms selected and notified. Often small farms where owner/operators are involved in day to day activities. If someone shows up it can throw a wrench into the day's operations.

Kaley Pugh: Intro. Intention is not to pre-announce any inspection at any particular facility. But I hear concern about it being disruptive to the operation. So we'll have to have some understanding that if we show up in the middle of milking that obviously can't stop. So we will be flexible and minimize disruptions. General process: have a look around farm, see various aspects of animal care and potentially record keeping. Verifying compliance with PCA act and using NFACC codes and industry's own standards, making sure we're verifying all relevant areas of the farm. Minute by minute logistics of each inspection I don't think it's necessary to get into that. But I want everyone to know we'll comply with any and all biosecurity measures for each farm.

**JM:** One thing I'll make everyone aware of, the SPCA and MoA have an agreement where there will be one MoA staff person accompanying the BC SPCA inspection team. The MoA person will be there in an observer capacity and when the agri staff person arrives they will be asking all farmers for permission to be on site (for inspection purpose), and follow all biosecurity protocols too.

Byron Johnson: Industry might need to know who is attending like a veterinarian etc.

MM: We'll have a veterinarian attend, who is well versed in the species/commodity we're inspecting.

Elaine Stoben (cattleman): Are you able to give us a better idea of the records you will be reviewing?

**KP(SPCA):** For groups that have publically available animal care assessment models we'd look at requirements or critical aspects of those records. Eg I was involved in turkey care models, and there are stringent record keeping requirements and in our supply management program I know there's a lot of paperwork required too. We'll have a peek at those too, I don't think we'll be taking photocopies of giant binders for example if a regulation is to have a written emergency plan, then we'd ask to see that.

**Jeremy Dunn:** Clarification in terms of: Are you assessing the farmer's practices/performances to the code or is the code used as guidance around understanding and quantifying any animal that might be in distress.

**KP(SPCA)**: Yes. We're looking from perspective of PCA Act, and then using the codes of practice and the industry's own guides to determine generally accepted processes.

**JD:** Your example w/emergency management plan. If you find out they didn't have one (which doesn't impact animal welfare), what would you do with that finding.

**MM:** under the act 9.2 is a positive duty to ensure animals are free from distress. So that's a learning opportunity to talk w/the farmer. It won't go to issue of 'does the animal meet definition of 'distress' but in context of duty to protect.

KP(SPCA): Maybe not best example, emergency preparedness is top of mind right now.

**Vicki Crites:** Follow up to Jeremy, could you elaborate a little bit about the diff roles of the inspector/constable versus the vet that's on farm, and how you plan to report that out. You mentioned animal care assessments, and we have a lot of training and it's very subjective, so I'd be interested in hearing more about both those.

**KP:** SPC who attends is there as a special constable which is requirement of PCA Act. Primary assessment of the intensive livestock operation will be between myself and the vet b/c of our intensive agriculture background. We won't be writing the report on site, we're going to observe on site and then collaborate after the fact about our observations in a report that is essentially internal. Marcie can jump in to the exact format of the report. Intention is not to do full compliance inspection, I don't have certifications, but to do broad observations about adherence to codes when PCA Act is not applicable.

**MM:** We can get a sample to you if industry like, basically a column chart, and all tied to the distress of an animal. Although we do have the authority to. But we're happy to share a sample, e.g. definition of distress, here's what's relevant to your own assessment practice. We aren't enforcing codes of practice; it isn't a requirement but it does

define when distress is there if it's 'a generally acceptable practice'. If you have your own industry assessment available, we don't have it so please send it over

**VC:** I would be interested in seeing the report template.

**Jim Collins:** The issue is between the farmer and the SPCA. Here we have the right hand (our auditing program) and you're the left hand. How do we work together to strengthen each other?

**MM:** As Jennifer mentioned we've met w/MoA multiple times and raising the fact that there's an opportunity to look at the best way for British Columbians to have that transparency. To get a 3<sup>rd</sup> party auditing system that gets reports to the public so that can happen. I don't see SPCA in the role of compliance agency, but I think an opportunity to look at what that looks like in the future. Because this is done under PCA Act privacy is big concern which is why only between us and farmers. If we see something way off the charts THEN that's when inspection /enforcement comes in, but not what we want to be doing.

**Kristen Pedersen (FIRB):** Wondering how the privacy of producers will be protected by the BC SPCA in terms of the results of these inspections. Curious if you can indicate internal to whom, and to what degree are you ensuring these reports won't become public or that the privacy of producers will be protected.

**MM:** Just like any of our other 8 thousand complaints we receive each year, it's always private unless it becomes public in the sense of a warrant or through the FIRB procedure. Any notices, documents, anything given to the individual would be between SPCA and farmer. What that farmer decides to do with that, whether they want to make it available to anyone else that's up to them, we do not.

KP(FIRB): So inspection reports won't be made public by the SPCA?

MM: Definitely not

**Shawn Eccles:** With respect to Kristen's concern w/privacy. BC SPCA falls under PIPPA but not FOIs because not a public institute. So industry doesn't need to be worried about that. Legislation we are subject to is PIPPA.

**Katie Lowe (BC Egg):** Going back to records, you mentioned codes are defense. So first we must find distress. I understand sec. 9.2 and duty to prevent distress, but how would reviewing records help you determine if there's distress and therefore a further inspection.

**SE:** Certainly I was going to address this over the transparency and accountability of inspection process. Our ability to access hose records is permitted under the act. Regardless of who is causing distress (farmer or not) we have to have some type of communication telling them the distress and if they have records a vet has been attending then those are the records we want. Also going back to Kaley's comments for emergency management. There is a duty for owners to prevent animals from situations likely to cause distress. Concerns w/wildfires is that if you don't have those plans, Sec 11 under the act, we're required to inform the owner of the distress and give them chance to relieve distress. So for this case, fi you don't have vet records or indication of emergency plan then we'd make recommendations that you may wish to change or develop those.

KL: I'm concerned you were going to look over records, then find animals in distress.

**SE:** Authorized agent is required to be on site to do inspection, required by act, and they have ability under act to bring in experts (specialized knowledge). So Kaley and Veterinarian have that expertise.

**Wanda Gorsuch:** Following up on Katie's question on definition of distress. Has there been any consideration of if there's a dispute? E.g. SPCA determines animals are in distress, where farmer disagrees w/SPCA's definition of distress or commodity disagrees.

**MM:** As with all of our inspections/investigations. We rely heavily on veterinarians and we find that courts too, on what vet's opinion/definition of distress. Obviously that individual would have the ability to provide expert evidence that demonstrates animal doesn't meet definition. If we're provided of counter evidence especially vet, that pretty much ends the case. We wouldn't be granted a warrant, which I hope it never escalates to, but in that situation it would be up to the courts to determine what's sufficient. I hope we don't get to that stage.

Derek Sturko: Is there a place where these documents will be so everyone has a written copy of expectations etc?

**MM:** We're taking notes during this meeting, and we've sent out those letters. I know this is novel, for an enforcement agency to sit down and go into great detail about an unexpected inspection we want to be transparent.

RE: Danielle is taking notes and writing action items. Includes next steps.

**Jack DeWitt:** Some of this driven by dissatisfied stakeholders, understanding confidentiality of your reporting will this satisfy them?

**MM:** We're not here to satisfy stakeholders. We're here to uphold a piece of legislation that is there to protect animal welfare. So that's our only goal of an inspection or investigation is to ensure animals free of distress. Kept very separate. As for stakeholders asking why we won't use our sec 15.1 powers, we may say we've started a limited inspection program (can't give details). Hopefully this won't happen, but should we attend and we are denied our ability to enforce legislation then that's a discussion we'd have to bring back to the group again.

**JC:** What producer boards need to do with their commodities is if we can have some confidence between BC SPCA on how to properly communicate this it would be helpful. When we get into codes and animals in distress, is that boards should be able to clarify what codes mean in each circumstance. Working together to answer these questions so when issues arise we know how to deal with them.

Harvey Sasaki (chicken marketing): Marcie mentioned and the purpose of us getting together is to avoid situation of being denied. As Jim said we want to provide our members with enough info so they have confidence in the system to achieve desired outcomes. You said if we got to that situation if SPCs denied you'd bring it back to the group. What group would you bring it back to? I hope you'd bring it to commodity group or this larger group.

**MM:** Absolutely, I think a discussion would also happen at the govt level. We've said it a few times, we feel that a 3<sup>rd</sup> party auditing system should be happening. So if for example, we were denied at 50% of farms. I could see a statement in supporting our 3<sup>rd</sup> party auditing system referencing that the response to "we have strong legislation" but we aren't being allowed to enforce it. So what I can say, is it may be referenced in a broad statement but individual specifics we would bring to individual commodity while respecting farmer's privacy. We aren't able to give specific details to anyone outside of that farmer. I want to be honest. Intent is not to target anyone but to enforce legislation.

**RE:** Following up on that, is that an action item? A mechanism for the SPCA that enables them to notify associations or boards if a commodity or farm wasn't providing access? Would that be helpful from industry perspective?

**HS:** As we said at the outset, our desire is transparency and to ensure we can legitimately say we have robust animal welfare system in BC. I guess I would like from my perspective if SPCA team was having a problem w/broiler industry in terms of getting access that we would like to hear about that. And be able to help you resolve that.

**MM:** Our intent is to proceed immediately with this, in the context of wildfires so obviously not doing the interior or anywhere where there's a fire threat. That letter that was sent out in the beginning, feel free to send that out to your

members. And let's say we have that situation, we could ask permission from that farmer to give that info to the commodity.

**KP:** Curious if you have any sense at this time the number of inspections that your organization is contemplating. My understanding is the SPCA is shifting from a complaint driven model to a proactive en masse inspection model. Please correct me. With that in mind, given the number of livestock related operations in province, how many inspections are you envisioning even on an annual basis.

**MM:** At beginning I mentioned our intent is not to be compliance agency. Our plan is to do 2 per commodity. This is a pilot to see. We don't have the resources nor desire to do this ongoing. We are asking for a 3<sup>rd</sup> party

**JC:** I think it's important for communication going back, farmer to SPCA and SPCA to board. He should know everyone is in the loops (farmer can go to board and board to SPCA).

**Michel Benoit:** Concern w/denying of access. So many times where I try to get ahold of my farmers and they're doing errands or on the road. Or the wrong person might be at the house (not farm operator) so there are circumstances where access is denied or should be. Is that going to be some ammunition or repercussions if the farmer can't accommodate? The unannounced part is going to cause most angst to farmers.

**MM:** An announced visit comes with its own challenges. So that's something the act provides for, just like for other inspection based programs (which I won't compare to). By and large, unannounced is how this happens for total transparency. If an individual has to drop off their kids, we can wait; We're able to accommodate that. We hope there will compliance and respect to the fact that a constable is requesting access under a piece of legislation. We will be reasonable.

**MB:** I know for a fact that will be the biggest hurdle to alleviate the concerns of the farmer. We need to figure out how to deal with that.

**MM:** Yes, and I think as long as it's the exception not the rule. There's validity to ensuring transparency in inspection process.

**KL:** If producer wants to deny access, SPC should have list of contact numbers. E.g. layer farm could call me directly and I could speak to producer. It's nerve wracking for them.

MM: That's a good one, and if there are any privacy lawyers on this call, I think it would be a good idea. Let's say we go to complaint; you don't want to be telling mom & dad about kid being in trouble at school. But I think we can make that call to you if that's OK. If industry can please send us that list, sooner than later, send it to Shawn by the end of the week.

**ES**: 1) going back to communications, not all industries are regulated. Ours for example has volunteer membership. While we want to ensure our members are well aware of inspection process, we have concerns taking on responsibility of taking this on to our membership. Have you given thought to not all commodities are regulated and we don't have contact info for everyone. We might need to rethink how beef producers get this info.

2) You mention 3<sup>rd</sup> party, can you tell me who you think is appropriate for this. Most industries already have auditing systems in place.

**MM**: 1) I can't really answer that. That's an industry discussion around contact. We are just enforcement arm under PCA Act. We can speak to anyone about that.

2) Again, a discussion to explore with govt and industry. I don't have that answer for you, maybe Kaley or Shawn? Absolutely each commodity has diff assessment programs, some of them have 3<sup>rd</sup> party, but some don't have a true 3<sup>rd</sup> party element to it.

**JD:** Biosecurity in hog sector is #1 concern. Would inspection team be totally able to shower in and out, and all PPE? A family farm wouldn't have proper clothing requirements for biosecurity for group of 5+ people. How is that managed?

2) Mentioned several times your resources are stretched, and people are thinking this, who is picking up the tab for this?

**SE:** Respect to biosecurity, absolutely our people can shower in/out as necessary. Our officers bring in boots, Tyvek suits, we can clean all PPE. Intent is not to contaminate any farms, and in the event we do 2 inspections a week we wouldn't do 2 of the same species.

JM: BC SPCA is aware of BSF alert in Canada? SO that's why twitchy nature in pork industry.

**KP:** I am well aware of biosecurity requirements for high held herds. Top of mind issues and we'd be doing anything required of us. As Shawn alluded to we will maintain a chronological space between inspections as well.

**MM:** to #2, the BC SPCA doesn't receive any govt funding to enforce PCA act. So like all cruelty investigations this is funded by donors. And this is from our general cruelty investigations budget. This project was not specifically funded by anyone.

**RE:** No intention of billing or charging the farmer?

MM: No, we're happy to receive govt money for it

JD: you intend to start soon?

MM: Yes, we sent the letter out a while ago. We will be commencing soon.

JD: What do you hope to learn from this pilot project?

**MM**: It's a small sample. And this meeting is learning. This whole thing is a dialogue and learning process, so again it's a very small sampling and I think our ability to be aeffect9ive as an agency enforcing PCA Act is something we want to see whether that's possible. If it's not possible, and if industry and govt don't say it's possible, it leaves us in a precarious position as enforcement agency.

**HS:** Again, in terms of setting this up for success. I don't think anyone wants to see this initiative, and that we received this notification end of June, but it took us time to get to this step and exchange of info. I guess in terms of you mentioning the novel approach, to go into detail on unannounced inspections. I think in terms of trying to get to success of what we're trying to achieve. The last thing we want to do is have your inspection team show up and being denied access. What is the urgency in terms of the need to conduct these immediately (or within next week) if buying a bit of time to ensure we can get the communications out to as many as we can to ensure it goes smoothly.

**MM:** I appreciate that; I'm looking at the letter. That was 5 weeks ago, and I appreciate it's through the MoA, but we had brought up our intention to do these inspections many months ago. When we went that letter, that was putting industry on notice, and that was the opportunity over the last 5 weeks to speak to your members about this. We again, we have scheduling on our side, making sure right veterinarian comes to each farm etc. What I can say, I guess, I feel that we were very genuine in giving these 5 weeks. This letter to me constitutes notice.

**HS:** I appreciate that, but at the same time if we sent out notification to our members that it raised more questions than it answered. That's the intention of us working as an industry and coming to you get this clarity and understanding so we can relay that to our producers. We aren't challenging your authority to do this, but to me it's Important we can convey that content to our members so ensure success.

**MM:** I appreciate that. It isn't to catch out any industry, but I can say being mindful of the vet's schedule that we did believe that we gave enough notice.

**BJ:** Observing discussion and feeling my roots to how I'd feel about an SPCA truck rolling down the road. You notice who is coming and going from neighbor's house and there's an unspoken stigma here, and you're not out for broken taillights. Is there a way you can make it discrete as you do these inspections? In a rural area, SPCA truck = animal cruelty complaint. Trying to make you aware of it, not sure if you can make it discrete. You have to be cognizant of that. You are a 3<sup>rd</sup> party, but your name is still SPCA and it carries that stigma.

**MM:** We can take this offline, we might have unmarked vehicles but we certainly won't be renting one specifically. With COVID we have to be mindful of human safety so we need to bring multiple vehicles etc. We are mindful and cognizant of this.

**RE:** Action items during discussion:

Sharing of sample report from SPCA (per commodity) → Industry contacts Kaley CC Shawn

How to integrate existing commodity compliance checks

How to boards help farmers prepare for audit?

Commitment from industry: Shortlist of contacts for when access denied

Do we want to meet again, 5 weeks?

**HS:** I think if we could come back after inspections are done to have a session to talk about what the experience was and findings are. If you're planning future inspections, then what lessons can we learn from this?

**MM:** We're open to a meeting; we're looking at months long process with the fires etc. We'd like to have it completed in Nov but with the wildfires our timeline is off. If we have a better idea I can get back to Reg, but I don't think we'll have a better idea until fire season ends.

I am writing further to the meeting that took place between the BC Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA), BC Agriculture Council (BCAC), Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries (MAFF) staff and various commodity groups on August 4<sup>th</sup>, 2021. A number of action items were identified for follow up during that meeting and some questions or clarifications were sought by the BCAC. A response to those questions can be found attached to this letter. In addition, you asked to confirm that we would not be contacting the commodity group at any point if we have been denied access, rather, we would have the names/numbers available for the farmer if they wish to contact them. This is correct as we need to respect a farmer's privacy. As requested, I have also included a draft sample of the inspection forms to be used by the constable during the farm visit.

Matters have subsequently been complicated by the fact that there was a public Facebook posting by a Country Life reporter, who had obtained details of the meeting from one of the commodity groups, that contained erroneous and misleading information. This has resulted in, amongst other things, serious threats, including violence, against our special provincial constables. When this issue was raised with the BCAC by way of email on August 6<sup>th</sup> and a request was made that the BCAC follow up with Country Life to correct the error, BCAC indicated that they would pass on this request for action to the commodity group who held the meeting. The BC SPCA has since received on August 10<sup>th</sup> a response from the BC Chicken Marketing Board in which they decline to take any action, even though they are directly responsible for the release of this erroneous information. As a result of that communication, I feel it necessary to provide the below comments.

The BC SPCA proactively notified industry of our intent to utilize our inspection powers pursuant to s 15.1 of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act (the "PCA Act") on June 24, 2021 (the "Letter.") The intent of that Letter was to help B.C.'s livestock farmers to understand the section 15.1 inspection process as it applies to regulated industries and the BC SPCA's intention to, on a small scale, begin to exercise these powers granted by government.

Upon hearing from the Ministry of Agriculture that industry groups had concerns and additional questions about the program, we agreed in good faith and without any obligation to a meeting with industry groups and government to further clarify details of the program. This meeting was not scheduled until August 6<sup>th</sup>, however, it is important to note that the Letter sent June 24, 2021 had invited each industry to reach out to the BC SPCA at any time to ask questions. With one exception, no industry group took us up on that offer. I point this out as I feel it goes to the allegation by some industry groups that they feel rushed and blame the BC SPCA for not further delaying the inspections. There was at least five week time period available for any questions to have been clarified.

As noted above, the meeting was held virtually on August 6<sup>th</sup>, 2021. During the course of the meeting it became apparent that some of the industry groups had not shared the Letter with their members, despite the fact that the anticipated start date was included in the original letter. As such, the BC SPCA expected farmers to be notified well in advance.

The decision by some industry groups to apparently not distribute the Letter or otherwise disseminate the information led to rushed communications in some cases to their members. In one instance, the communication took place over a virtual meeting where a member of the media (reporter for Country Life) was also present. As a result, communication regarding the pilot program that the BC SPCA believed was a matter between industry, their members and government, became public. As referenced above, an outcome was an inaccurate Facebook post regarding the program that left B.C.'s farmers with questions and more concerning, threats of violence towards BC SPCA constables, who are sworn peace officers under the Police Act. Many of these questions were addressed in the BC SPCA's Letter, so clear and early communication from industry groups to their members could have prevented the confusion and animosity generated by this misinformation.

During the meeting with BC SPCA, industry groups, and MAFF, there was extensive discussion regarding privacy of farms that are subject to inspection, and how the BC SPCA must follow the *Personal Information Protection Act*, which would prevent the BC SPCA from telling industry groups the details of a farm that denied access to inspectors. The BC SPCA expressed there was the possibility that anonymized information such as "X percentage of farms denied inspectors access," could be shared but that specific farms would not. It is disappointing that from this discussion, media received the impression that the BC SPCA would publically name a farm who denied inspection access, as this was never our intention nor is it permitted as per PIPA.

To add insult to injury, the industry group that held the meeting where the media allegedly inadvertently gained access, in subsequent correspondence with the BC SPCA blamed us for their hurried communication that resulted in this error and stated they had no control over what the media printed. While the latter may be true, the former as explained above is simply false as the BC SPCA had provided plenty of notice to industry. They have indicated they will not be providing a correction to Country Life and feel that it should be up to the BC SPCA to provide this correction. As such, the BC SPCA will be taking further action to attempt to see that this misinformation is corrected.

Needless to say, the events that have transpired over the course of the past number of weeks has led the BC SPCA to the unfortunate conclusion that good faith efforts on our part have not been valued and reciprocated by some in industry. Given that the misleading information now circulating in the public is directly the result of industry actions/inaction, we believe the onus now firmly rests on industry's shoulders to clearly demonstrate its good faith intentions going forward. It is our expectation that if misinformation is circulating that all parties make reasonable attempts to correct so that instead of

allowing fear and mistrust to thrive, there is a joint message demonstrating a desire to see good animal welfare for farm animals in BC.

Dear Deputy Minster Ethier,

I am writing further to the meeting that took place between the BC Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA), BC Agriculture Council (BCAC), Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries (MAFF) staff and various commodity groups on August 4<sup>th</sup>, 2021. This meeting was attended by the BC SPCA in good faith and in keeping with our desire to work cooperatively with both industry and the MAFF in ensuring the welfare of animals as required under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act (PCAA). While it was the BCAC that expressed the desire to meet, it is our understanding that they first approached the MAFF with concerns about the section 15.1 inspection program that had been outlined in a letter sent to industry and government on June 24, 2021. As a result of BCAC's concerns, the MAFF acted as an intermediary between industry and the BC SPCA, and we participated in a pre-meeting with government to address any concerns or questions.

At the August 4<sup>th</sup> meeting, the BC SPCA provided an overview of the farm compliance program and responded to the industries' and government agencies' questions as identified on the agenda as well as others that arose during the course of the meeting. A detailed copy of the notes is attached to this letter for reference.

We understood this meeting was to be for the purpose of sharing information and maintaining working relationships. Therefore, we were surprised and extremely disappointed when false and inaccurate information related to the inspection scheme was made public by an industry representative via the media (Country Life Facebook post.)

As a result of the erroneous and misleading information that was printed, there have been public posts threatening violence against our officers, who are sworn peace officers under the Police Act and as such agents of government, as well as comments critical of the BC SPCA and its enforcement role. Given the Ministry's direct knowledge of very recent gun violence perpetrated against a BC SPCA special constable in the execution of her duties under the PCAA, we believe it is incumbent on the Ministry to understand and be pro-active in demonstrating its commitment to the safety of our officers.

When we asked the BCAC, the organizers of the meeting, to provide a correction to Country Life, they chose to decline to do so and instead passed on the ask to the commodity group that was responsible for this "leak" to rectify the situation. The BC SPCA has subsequently received a letter from BC Chicken Marketing Board in which they refuse to correct the misinformation and go as far as suggesting that the

BC SPCA was to blame for any confusion/misinformation that Country Life posted. This failure to take action is extremely disappointing and we are left with no other choice then to respond to Country Life and provide a balance to the story publicly. We have since written to BCAC to express our concerns over the lack of action and to demonstrate publicly their commitment to building dialogue and good faith with the BC SPCA going forward. A copy of this letter is attached.

Over the years, Minister Popham has asked us repeatedly to try to work with industry as good partners with a goal of good animal welfare in mind. We heeded this call by participating in good faith discussions with industry, even though there was no obligation on our part to do so. In addition, as you are aware, the BC SPCA has been attempting for the better part of a year to engage the Ministry in a discussion around the future of farm animal enforcement. With that in mind, we would appreciate receiving the Ministry's position on what actions, if any, the Ministry will take to ensure these unfortunate circumstances be avoided in the future, as we believe we have demonstrated good faith throughout this process. Ultimately, the events that have transpired in the past few weeks have led us to the conclusion that the BC SPCA has been left in the untenable position of having to unilaterally defend itself for simply trying to enforce legislation that government has enacted and entrusted to us and which has been undertaken at no cost to government and without major incident for more than a century.

We believe the Ministry's agriculture responsibilities extend beyond promotion and include compliance and regulation beyond that of neutral observer and in that regard, we request that moving forward, the Ministry extend to the BC SPCA the same courtesies that have been provided to commodity groups in regard to stakeholder relations.

Currently, our priority is the safety concerns of our officers and we look forward to receiving feedback on the public role that the Ministry will play in safeguarding the interests of its enforcement agency moving forward.

- \* Ministry of Agriculture Food and Fisheries is aware of the BC SPCA's intention to proceed with animal welfare inspections on commercial farm sites.
- \* The ministry understands the focus of the inspections will be to assess animal distress. Ensuring animals are not in distress is of interest to the Ministry, the SPCA, farmers and the public across British Columbia.
- \* The BC SPCA is an independent organization and has legislated authority under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act (PCAA) to conduct these inspections. The purpose of the inspections are to determine whether the PCAA and the regulations made under it are being complied with.
- \* The ministry has been in recent discussions with the BC SPCA to understand the inspection methodology, process and communications surrounding these proposed inspections.

**Issue:** Minister Popham is meeting with representatives from the British Columbia Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA) on February 2, 2021 to discuss:

- Ongoing collaboration;
- · Enforcement on commercial farms; and
- The BC SPCA's 2021 Budget Submission.

## **Background:**

### The BC SPCA

The BC SPCA is a not-for-profit charitable organization, funded primarily by public donations, with a mission to protect and enhance the quality of life for domestic, farm, and wild animals in British Columbia (B.C.). The BC SPCA was created in 1895, and it has authority under the *Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act* (PCA Act). The PCA Act creates legislative force to prevent cruelty to animals in B.C., including family pets (companion animals), livestock, and working animals, but excluding wildlife. The BC SPCA is the only animal organization in B.C. with the authority to enforce laws under the PCA Act. The BC SPCA operates in 44 locations and employs 645 staff members and approximately 5,500 volunteers throughout B.C.

There are two distinct functions of the BC SPCA in B.C.: a regulatory function and a community outreach function. The BC SPCA is mandated under the PCA Act to respond to animals in distress. BC SPCA enforcement actions are performed by Special Provincial Constables. Currently, the BC SPCA has 34 full time Special Provincial Constables who are authorized to investigate complaints of animal abuse and neglect. BC SPCA constables investigate approximately 8,500 complaints of animal cruelty each year, at a cost of approximately \$3.5 million annually. The BC SPCA does not receive annual, dedicated funding from the Province for their enforcement actions.

## Enforcement on commercial farms

The Animal Care Codes of Practice Regulation (the Regulation) came into force on June 1, 2019, under the PCA Act, to provide further protection for farm animals by establishing reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management. The Regulation applies to all farming and ranching operations in B.C. where the animals listed in section 2 of the Regulation are kept for the purposes of breeding, boarding, grazing, selling, training, and for the production of certain farm and ranch products and byproducts. While failure to abide by the Codes of Practice is not necessarily an offence, following the Codes is a defense from conviction of animal distress. Referencing the Codes of Practice in regulation therefore provides an incentive to farmers and ranchers to follow these practices.

Approximately 20 percent of complaints received by the BC SCPA involve farm animals. Most of these complaints relate to either hobby farmers or equines. A very small percentage relate to enforcement on commercial farms (approximately 10 to 20 complaints per annum).
