Issue: Minister Popham is meeting with representatives from the British Columbia Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA) on February 2, 2021 to discuss:

- Ongoing collaboration;
- · Enforcement on commercial farms; and
- The BC SPCA's 2021 Budget Submission.

Background:

The BC SPCA

The BC SPCA is a not-for-profit charitable organization, funded primarily by public donations, with a mission to protect and enhance the quality of life for domestic, farm, and wild animals in British Columbia (B.C.). The BC SPCA was created in 1895, and it has authority under the *Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act* (PCA Act). The PCA Act creates legislative force to prevent cruelty to animals in B.C., including family pets (companion animals), livestock, and working animals, but excluding wildlife. The BC SPCA is the only animal organization in B.C. with the authority to enforce laws under the PCA Act. The BC SPCA operates in 44 locations and employs 645 staff members and approximately 5,500 volunteers throughout B.C.

There are two distinct functions of the BC SPCA in B.C.: a regulatory function and a community outreach function. The BC SPCA is mandated under the PCA Act to respond to animals in distress. BC SPCA enforcement actions are performed by Special Provincial Constables. Currently, the BC SPCA has 34 full time Special Provincial Constables who are authorized to investigate complaints of animal abuse and neglect. BC SPCA constables investigate approximately 8,500 complaints of animal cruelty each year, at a cost of approximately \$3.5 million annually. The BC SPCA does not receive annual, dedicated funding from the Province for their enforcement actions.

Enforcement on commercial farms

The Animal Care Codes of Practice Regulation (the Regulation) came into force on June 1, 2019, under the PCA Act, to provide further protection for farm animals by establishing reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management. The Regulation applies to all farming and ranching operations in B.C. where the animals listed in section 2 of the Regulation are kept for the purposes of breeding, boarding, grazing, selling, training, and for the production of certain farm and ranch products and byproducts. While failure to abide by the Codes of Practice is not necessarily an offence, following the Codes is a defense from conviction of animal distress. Referencing the Codes of Practice in regulation therefore provides an incentive to farmers and ranchers to follow these practices.

Approximately 20 percent of complaints received by the BC SCPA involve farm animals. Most of these complaints relate to either hobby farmers or equines. A very small percentage relate to enforcement on commercial farms (approximately 10 to 20 complaints per annum).

Funding

A facility review in 2013 by the BC SPCA, and updated in 2019 to include all BC SPCA facilities, resulted in their adoption of a long-range Facilities Development and Services Plan (FDSP). The FDSP seeks to improve or replace facilities over a 16-year period (2014 to 2029) at a cost of \$117.5 million. The first phase of FDSP is complete (2014 to 2018) and covered facility replacement or redevelopment at six facilities (at a total cost of \$18.97 million). The second phase of FDSP covers a five-year period (2019 to 2024), and the projected total cost of this phase is \$51.4 million.

The BC SPCA's annual operating expenses grew from \$19.5 million in 2005 to \$38.5 million in 2018 as a result of expanded programing. This was matched by a similar growth in revenue due largely to the increase in donor support.

The BC SPCA received \$1.46 million from the Province as part of COVID-19 response funding to help animal care organizations through the pandemic.

Discussion:

Ongoing collaboration

In the BC SPCA's letter to the Minister requesting this meeting, their request is to "discuss how [AFF and the BC SPCA] can best partner together in the years ahead and help achieve... mutual goals, like promoting B.C.'s animal welfare laws, improving food security and continuing to improve conditions in farming communities".

AFF staff share a positive relationship with the BC SPCA. AFF staff regularly reach out to the BC SPCA for input on work and to include them in relevant consultations.

The majority of BC SPCA investigations involve companion animals, with approximately 82 percent of all investigations are related to dogs and cats. In 2018, BC SPCA's cruelty investigations program made up 12 percent of their total program spending. Because of their inherently small focus on farm animal protection, BC SPCA's expertise and knowledge of farm animals is limited. This is problematic for commercial farm operators; the lack of knowledge erodes trust of the BC SPCA within the farm animal community.

Enforcement on commercial farms

In the BC SPCA's letter to the Minister, their request is to provide important updates "regarding events that have occurred this fall related to concerns with respect to commercial farm investigations which have shifted some of our priorities".s.13

However, it is not the BC SPCA's responsibility to enforce the Codes of Practice, which outline generally accepted management practices for livestock and farm animal operators, including owners, managers, and employees. The Regulation was made to reference the Codes of Practice as reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management (section 24.02 of the PCA Act). A point of

tension in previous discussions between AFF staff and BC SPCA staff has been around the misunderstanding of the Regulation's intention.

The BC SPCA opposes extreme and illegal actions by animal rights advocacy groups, including farm invasions and trespass to install hidden cameras. They support government action to further penalize these illegal activities.

The BC SPCA have been internally contemplating whether they should continue with farm animal investigations. This follows the decision of other provinces (e.g., Ontario) to change their animal inspection model. After internal research and discussion, the BC SPCA decided to continue with their enforcement authorities as it relates to the PCA Act on commercial farms and to seek a solution with government.

3.) Sharing information with the BCSPCA on significant incidents of non-regular animal death or injury incidents

The inability for Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries employees to share information regarding non-regular animal deaths with the BCSPCA is covered in the *Animal Health Act* (AHA). Section 16 of the AHA limits the release of information in the possession of the Ministry related to animals. The classes of protected information in Section 16 include information which would disclose the location, species, or animal owner, whether or not there is a disease outbreak. The AHA does allow for the disclosure of this protected information in some cases under Section 17. Part of the rationale for this limitation in the AHA is to protect farmers from any fallout that may arise due to unfettered access to information about animals for which they are responsible.

Suggested Response:

- Thank the BCSPCA for their commitment and dedication to representing the collective interests of farm animals in B.C.
- The Ministry is interested in reviewing the farm inspection report once completed.
- The Ministry is bound by the requirements of the *Animal Health Act* regarding sharing of information. Should there be situations where sharing is possible, ministry staff will connect with the BCSPCA as appropriate.
- The Ministry looks forward to a continued positive and productive relationship with the BCSPCA.

provincial funding

- The B.C. Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA) is a not-for-profit charitable
 organization with a mission to protect and enhance the quality of life for domestic, farm, and
 wild animals in British Columbia (B.C.). It was created under the auspices of the *Prevention of*Cruelty to Animals Act (PCAA), which falls under the jurisdiction of the Minister of Agriculture,
 Food and Fisheries.
- The BC SPCA is funded primarily by public donations and fundraising activities. Other large sources of revenue include legacy gifts and life insurance; sheltering, medical, clinical, and social enterprise services; and government grants and wage subsidies.
- The Province regularly contributes funding to the BC SPCA, including support for the BC SPCA's eight-year Facilities Development and Service Plan to replace and renovate aging shelters across B.C. Since 2015, the B.C. government has contributed a total of \$10 million towards this plan.
- Other BC SPCA projects funded by the Province include:
 - In the 2020/21 fiscal year, the BC SPCA was granted \$1.463 million for animal care facilities as part of the Province's pandemic response.
 - Funding for the Canadian Agricultural Partnership (CAP) was provided in the 2019/20 fiscal
 year to improve BC SPCA enforcement knowledge with respect to farm animals through a
 credible farm animal welfare training program for BC SPCA inspectors and agents.
 - \$100,000 in funding was given to the BC SPCA in the 2010/11 fiscal year to support their involvement in Code of Practice development for the sled dog industry.

Special Notes / Key Messages:

The BC SPCA receives regular funding from the Province, particularly to replace and upgrade
aging animal shelter infrastructure. In the past decade, the Province has committed over \$11.6
million for this and other projects to the BC SPCA.

Issue: The British Columbia Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA) may be looking for financial support to enforce the *Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act (PCA Act)*, as well as extended animal protections under the *PCA Act*.

Background:

- The *PCA Act* creates legislative force to prevent cruelty to animals in BC. BC SPCA administers the Act which applies to all animals in captivity, including family pets (companion animals), livestock, and working animals, but excludes wildlife.
- Currently, BC SPCA has 26 full time Special Provincial Constables who are authorized to investigate complaints of animal abuse and neglect.
- BC SPCA staff have indicated that the majority of their cruelty investigations involve companion animals as opposed to farm animals; of the farm animal investigations, a very large percentage of cases (approximately 80%) involve very small producers.
- BC SPCA is a non-profit organization funded primarily by public donations.
- In addition to its role as an enforcement agency, BC SPCA is actively involved in animal advocacy and has played an instrumental role in developing national codes of practice for farm animals.
- In July, 2013 the BC SPCA undertook consultations with the agriculture industry as part of their strategic planning process to question among other things, how government can best support animal welfare in BC.

Discussion:

Funding

- Since 2001, the BC SPCA has received approximately \$3.4 million dollars in provincial funding. In 2010/11, the Ministry of Agriculture provided the BC SPCA with a grant in the amount of \$100,000 to enhance the capacity of the BC SPCA to undertake animal cruelty investigations. Government also supports the BC SPCA by providing sponsored crown leases for many of its facilities, and under current GF2 funding, the BC SPCA will receive training in livestock and poultry care for their Special Provincial Constables, worth over \$325,000 over 5 years.
- BC SPCA however, does not receive annual, dedicated funding from the Province for enforcement related to livestock and companion animals as is the case in some other provinces (e.g. Alberta).
- BC SPCA has claimed chronic funding shortages to adequately enforce the PCA Act in BC.
- Early in 2013, the SPCAs in Nova Scotia, Ontario and Saskatchewan threatened to withdraw investigation services without additional government funding.
- SPCA funding may become a greater issue as public concern over animal welfare increases.

Extended animal protections under the PCA Act

- BC SPCA has played an influential role in developing the national codes of practice for farm animals under the National Farm Animal Care Council's code development process; national codes represent the currently accepted standard of care for farm animals in Canada.
- Some provinces reference the codes in legislation such as in Manitoba; BC SPCA may be wanting the Province to consider the same.
- The *PCA Act* may allow for the referencing of codes, however the livestock and poultry industries would likely not be supportive of such a move.

Next Steps: AGRI staff could explore policy proposals that may be brought forward by the BC SPCA.

Issue: The British Columbia Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA) is looking for financial support to implement their Facilities Development and Services Plan (FDSP), which they have projected to require at least \$25.2 million in funding to implement over the next 8-year period.

Background:

Government's Relationship with BC SPCA

- The Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act (PCA Act) establishes legislative requirements to prevent
 cruelty to animals in BC. BC SPCA administers the PCA Act which applies to all animals in
 captivity, including family pets (companion animals), livestock, and working animals, but excludes
 wildlife.
- As a result of public interest and a desire to increase transparency, the PCA Act was amended in 2012 to provide citizens with an appeals process when the BC SPCA has seized an animal. This amendment established the British Columbia Farm Industry Review Board (BC FIRB) as the organization to hear the appeals.
- Currently, BC SPCA has 26 full-time Special Provincial Constables who are authorized to investigate complaints of animal abuse and neglect.
- BC SPCA staff indicate that most cruelty investigations involve companion animals as opposed to farm animals
- In addition to its role as an enforcement agency, BC SPCA is actively involved in animal advocacy and has played an instrumental role in developing national codes of practice for farm animals.
- In July, 2013, the BC SPCA undertook consultations with the agriculture industry as part of their strategic planning process to question, among other things, how government can best support animal welfare in BC.

Funding

- BC SPCA is a non-profit organization funded primarily by public donations.
 - According to the information note they have provided, these donations account for approximately 70% of annual revenue, while fee-for-service contracts and animal related services account for the remaining 30%. The BCSPCA claims to have annual operating costs of \$27 million.
- BC SPCA does not receive annual, dedicated funding from the Province for enforcement related to livestock and companion animals under the *PCA Act* unlike some other provinces (e.g., Alberta).
- Since 2001, the BC SPCA has received approximately \$3.4 million in provincial funding. In 2010/11, the Ministry of Agriculture provided the BC SPCA with a grant of \$100,000 to enhance the capacity of the BC SPCA to undertake animal cruelty investigations. Government also supports the BC SPCA by providing sponsored Crown leases for many of its facilities, and under current Growing Forward 2 funding, the BC SPCA will receive training in livestock and poultry care for their Special Provincial Constables, worth over \$325,000 over 5 years.
- BC SPCA has claimed chronic funding shortages to adequately enforce the PCA Act in BC. These
 shortages may have risen due to additional costs associated with the appeals process introduced
 under the PCA Act in 2012.
- Early in 2013, the SPCAs in Nova Scotia, Ontario and Saskatchewan threatened to withdraw investigation services without additional government funding.
- BC SPCA funding may become a greater issue as public concern over animal welfare increases.

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BC SPCA's Request

- In the information note provided by the BC SPCA, their request is summarized as follows: "The BC SPCA currently operates 40 facilities across the province of British Columbia, the majority of which are old by industry standard, at an average age of 25.5 years. Over the past ten years, the BC SPCA has constructed or upgraded nine of its facilities at a total cost of \$7.4 million. In spite of these initiatives, the Society's ten oldest facilities still range from 29 years (Nanaimo) to 55 years (Vancouver) in age. Most of these facilities require urgent replacement to maintain animal welfare or human health and safety standards.
- To address these concerns, the BC SPCA Board of Directors recently approved a Facilities
 Development and Services Plan (FDSP) which provides approval in principle for nine new capital
 projects and one significant renovation over the next eight-year period to 2021 in: Vancouver, Surrey,
 the Fraser Valley Region, Kamloops, Kelowna, Salmon Arm, Prince George, Dawson Creek, Trail
 and Nanaimo.
- With a total anticipated cost projected at \$50.4 million, this plan will be the largest project undertaken in the history of the BC SPCA. The Society is confident that with financial support from members of the public and all levels of government, it can successfully execute this plan on time and on budget, ensuring the continuation and expansion of animal services and other significant benefits for communities, including job creation through construction projects and additional permanent employment positions at these new facilities.
- The BC SPCA is fully committed to raising half the cost of this project (\$25.2 million) through a
 combination of existing funding designated for capital purposes, capital campaign fundraising, and
 mortgage financing if necessary, but an additional commitment of \$25.2 million from other sources
 will be necessary to ensure completion of this plan."
- Specific to Prince George, the FDSP as outlined states that in 2017, construction will begin on a
 s.17 Community Animal Centre and 3,000 square foot large animal seizure facility at a total cost of \$6.1 million
- The purpose of the meeting is to discuss the FDSP with Minister Bond and request funding from the
 provincial government, including information on any formal process or documentation that is
 necessary to make that request.

Issue: Minister Popham is meeting with representatives from the British Columbia Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (BC SPCA) on February 2, 2021 to discuss:

- Ongoing collaboration;
- · Enforcement on commercial farms; and
- The BC SPCA's 2021 Budget Submission.

Background:

The BC SPCA

The BC SPCA is a not-for-profit charitable organization, funded primarily by public donations, with a mission to protect and enhance the quality of life for domestic, farm, and wild animals in British Columbia (B.C.). The BC SPCA was created in 1895, and it has authority under the *Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act* (PCA Act). The PCA Act creates legislative force to prevent cruelty to animals in B.C., including family pets (companion animals), livestock, and working animals, but excluding wildlife. The BC SPCA is the only animal organization in B.C. with the authority to enforce laws under the PCA Act. The BC SPCA operates in 44 locations and employs 645 staff members and approximately 5,500 volunteers throughout B.C.

There are two distinct functions of the BC SPCA in B.C.: a regulatory function and a community outreach function. The BC SPCA is mandated under the PCA Act to respond to animals in distress. BC SPCA enforcement actions are performed by Special Provincial Constables. Currently, the BC SPCA has 34 full time Special Provincial Constables who are authorized to investigate complaints of animal abuse and neglect. BC SPCA constables investigate approximately 8,500 complaints of animal cruelty each year, at a cost of approximately \$3.5 million annually. The BC SPCA does not receive annual, dedicated funding from the Province for their enforcement actions.

Enforcement on commercial farms

The Animal Care Codes of Practice Regulation (the Regulation) came into force on June 1, 2019, under the PCA Act, to provide further protection for farm animals by establishing reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management. The Regulation applies to all farming and ranching operations in B.C. where the animals listed in section 2 of the Regulation are kept for the purposes of breeding, boarding, grazing, selling, training, and for the production of certain farm and ranch products and byproducts. While failure to abide by the Codes of Practice is not necessarily an offence, following the Codes is a defense from conviction of animal distress. Referencing the Codes of Practice in regulation therefore provides an incentive to farmers and ranchers to follow these practices.

Approximately 20 percent of complaints received by the BC SCPA involve farm animals. Most of these complaints relate to either hobby farmers or equines. A very small percentage relate to enforcement on commercial farms (approximately 10 to 20 complaints per annum).

Funding

A facility review in 2013 by the BC SPCA, and updated in 2019 to include all BC SPCA facilities, resulted in their adoption of a long-range Facilities Development and Services Plan (FDSP). The FDSP seeks to improve or replace facilities over a 16-year period (2014 to 2029) at a cost of \$117.5 million. The first phase of FDSP is complete (2014 to 2018) and covered facility replacement or redevelopment at six facilities (at a total cost of \$18.97 million). The second phase of FDSP covers a five-year period (2019 to 2024), and the projected total cost of this phase is \$51.4 million.

The BC SPCA's annual operating expenses grew from \$19.5 million in 2005 to \$38.5 million in 2018 as a result of expanded programing. This was matched by a similar growth in revenue due largely to the increase in donor support.

The BC SPCA received \$1.46 million from the Province as part of COVID-19 response funding to help animal care organizations through the pandemic.

Discussion:

Ongoing collaboration

In the BC SPCA's letter to the Minister requesting this meeting, their request is to "discuss how [AFF and the BC SPCA] can best partner together in the years ahead and help achieve... mutual goals, like promoting B.C.'s animal welfare laws, improving food security and continuing to improve conditions in farming communities".

AFF staff share a positive relationship with the BC SPCA. AFF staff regularly reach out to the BC SPCA for input on work and to include them in relevant consultations.

The majority of BC SPCA investigations involve companion animals, with approximately 82 percent of all investigations are related to dogs and cats. In 2018, BC SPCA's cruelty investigations program made up 12 percent of their total program spending. Because of their inherently small focus on farm animal protection, BC SPCA's expertise and knowledge of farm animals is limited. This is problematic for commercial farm operators; the lack of knowledge erodes trust of the BC SPCA within the farm animal community.

Enforcement on commercial farms

In the BC SPCA's letter to the Minister, their request is to provide important updates "regarding events that have occurred this fall related to concerns with respect to commercial farm investigations which have shifted some of our priorities". s.13 s.13

However, it is not the BC SPCA's responsibility to enforce the Codes of Practice, which outline generally accepted management practices for livestock and farm animal operators, including owners, managers, and employees. The Regulation was made to reference the Codes of Practice as reasonable and generally accepted practices of animal management (section 24.02 of the PCA Act). A point of

tension in previous discussions between AFF staff and BC SPCA staff has been around the misunderstanding of the Regulation's intention.

The BC SPCA opposes extreme and illegal actions by animal rights advocacy groups, including farm invasions and trespass to install hidden cameras. They support government action to further penalize these illegal activities.

The BC SPCA have been internally contemplating whether they should continue with farm animal investigations. This follows the decision of other provinces (e.g., Ontario) to change their animal inspection model. After internal research and discussion, the BC SPCA decided to continue with their enforcement authorities as it relates to the PCA Act on commercial farms and to seek a solution with government.




