<u>Farmed Animal Welfare Framework and Advisory Committee Recommendations</u> <u>Key Messages</u>

- People expect farmed animals in B.C. to be treated ethically and with care which is a priority our government shares.
- This is why we have been working collaboratively for the past year with B.C. producers and the SPCA to evolve B.C.'s farmed animal welfare framework.
- An Advisory Committee has delivered a set of recommendations to the Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Food, and work is underway to see how the objectives can best be achieved.
- This includes looking at how government can enhance farmed animal welfare by inspecting and enforcing animal welfare requirements on B.C. farms.
- This is, and will continue to be, a comprehensive process and we look forward to making progress on the recommendations, and ensuring B.C. has a strong, transparent and accountable farmed animal welfare framework.
- Farmed animal welfare in B.C. is a cooperative effort, and B.C. producers, the SPCA, and animal welfare leaders have all been instrumental and supportive in this process, and we thank each of them for their dedication and commitment to animal care in our province.

Questions and Answers

1. Why was this work undertaken? When did it begin?

- Ensuring animals are treated ethically and with care is a priority for government and this includes evolving B.C.'s farmed animal welfare framework, which is why the Deputy Minister initiated a review in August 2022.
- Ministry staff consulted extensively with the BC SPCA, animal welfare experts, producers, and farming organizations with the goal of ensuring B.C. has a strong framework in place to protect the welfare of farmed animals.
- The assessment included policy analysis, jurisdictional scans, and consultations with a diverse set of stakeholders.
- Over the past several months, an advisory committee comprised from these groups reviewed this information and held meetings. They have now made nine recommendations to the ministry, which they delivered in January 2024.

2. Will the ministry accept all 9 recommendations?

- The ministry is committed to ensuring the welfare of farmed animals in B.C. and will be looking at how the objectives of each recommendation can best be achieved.
- Some recommendation will require collaboration with federal agencies, local governments as well as other provincial ministries.
- The ministry has already adopted recommendation #8 and have publicly posted a transparent description of B.C.'s Farmed Animal Welfare Legislative Framework that was developed in consultation with various stakeholders, including DFO, CFIA, Marketing Boards, and the Office of the Chief Veterinarian.
- 3. The Advisory Committee notes there are several ways to achieve the objectives and outcomes of their recommendations with one exception creating a new enforcement and inspection function in the Ministry of Agriculture and Food. Will the ministry commit to this and what would the timing look like?
 - The ministry recognizes the need for this shift in responsibility and will be looking at options on how to achieve it both financially and operationally.
 - Any change would include legislative amendments to the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act (PCA Act) as well as the time needed for consultation and review, so the timeline is yet to be determined.
 - The BC SPCA will continue to hold the legislated responsibility for inspection and enforcement until these changes are made.

4. Is moving away from BC SPCA enforcement and inspection of the PCA Act an indicator that the current system just isn't working?

- The BC SPCA is a valued partner and they have done good, important work with respect to the inspection and subsequent enforcement of on-farm animal welfare complaints and issues.
- However, the BC SPCA, farmers and animal welfare stakeholders have all publicly stated their desire for government to take over this responsibility.
- The Advisory Committee's recommendations represent a good opportunity for the ministry to explore how to best achieve this change so that we ensure the welfare of our farmed animals.
- As per the Advisory Committee's recommendation, the BC SPCA would still have responsibility under the *Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act* for companion animals, wildlife in captivity and exotic pets.
- This hybrid model of enforcement, with responsibility for farmed animals coming under a government agency, is reflected in other jurisdictions in Canada.
- As we work towards this new model, there will be close collaboration between the BC SPCA and the ministry, ensuring there is accountability and transparency with annual reporting on all animal enforcement activity.

5. Will government provide the necessary funding to ensure there is a robust inspection and enforcement model?

- The ministry is committed to ensuring the welfare of farmed animals in B.C. and will be looking at how the objectives of each recommendation can best be achieved.
- This process will include looking at the funding needed to ensure we have high standards of farmed animal care and welfare well into the future.

6. Currently the BC SPCA receives no provincial funding for inspection and enforcement, so will government commit to funding them so they can continue to investigate animal welfare in companion animals?

- One of the recommendations calls for the Province to provide financial support to the SPCA to investigate animal welfare in companion animals, and we will be looking at it, and the other recommendations carefully.
- The goal of the Ministry and the SPCA is to enhance the level of animal welfare across the province, and we'll continue to work together to achieve it.
- While the BC SPCA receives no provincial operational funding, the Province does provide capital funding from time to time. For example, in 2023, the Province provided BC SPCA with \$12 million towards four of its rescue centres.

7. When will the new Ministry-led enforcement system be in place?

- It's very much dependent on the structure and financial commitments required to implement the system once it is developed.
- We don't have a detailed timeline, but we anticipate this will be a multi-year comprehensive process.

Farmed Animal Advisory Committee Recommendations

Key Messages

- The BC SPCA has called upon the provincial government to review existing laws and practices to ensure the safe, humane treatment of farmed animals while supporting the viability of B.C. producers for many years.
 - For some time, the BC SPCA has been calling on the Ministry of Agriculture to implement a proactive, independent, third-party inspection program for all agricultural sectors involving animals and to incorporate socially accepted minimum standards (e.g. Codes of Practice) for farmed animals as prescriptive standards under provincial law.
 - Since June 2019, when the Government of British Columbia amended the PCA Act expanding Section 15.1 Inspection, which allows for broad proactive inspection powers in on farms raising animals, the BC SPCA has been calling on the government to implement the well-funded system necessary to conduct proactive inspections at this scale. This includes advocating for improved protocols and a third-party auditing system on farms as a critical way to ensure good animal welfare in these facilities.
 - While the BC SPCA has the authority granted under the PCA Act to conduct investigations on farms, pro-actively auditing more than 10,000 commercial farms in British Columbia far extends past the scope and capacity of the non-profit organization.
 - A regular inspection and monitoring system must be put in place to allow for preventative measures that benefit animal welfare before an incident happens, rather than the current system which relies on enforcement of the existing laws following receipt of a complaint where animal mistreatment may already be happening.
- For decades, the BC SPCA has enforced laws pertaining to farmed animal welfare through authority granted under the PCA Act, but the Society firmly believes a new inspection and enforcement function within the Ministry of Agriculture would be a more suitable and appropriately funded body to provide oversight of this work.
 - As a not-for-profit organization, funded almost entirely by the generosity of donors and animal lovers in British Columbia, the BC SPCA does not feel it is appropriate to use these funds to support the regulation of a for-profit farming industry. The implementation of this new inspection function would allow the BC SPCA to reallocate these resources towards other programs and services benefiting animal welfare, including advocating for stronger laws and standards for farmed animals.
 - A growing movement in the animal protection space across North America shows that animal protection within the farmed animal welfare system, which is by in large a food-based system, is more appropriately funded by government than through donor dollars.
- The BC SPCA is not abdicating its responsibility to farmed animal welfare as the
 organization will be closely involved in the creation of a new inspection and
 enforcement function for commercial farms if the recommendations are accepted.

- In 2023, the BC SPCA participated in a committee formed by the Ministry of Agriculture and Food to assess the farmed animal welfare framework in British Columbia. This committee was tasked with making the farmed animal framework more explicit and transparent, providing recommendations to promote higher standards of farmed animal welfare, and supporting those involved in delivering these standards.
- The recommendations formed by the committee, which the BC SPCA fully supports
 provided they are read in totality and actioned collaboratively, have been submitted
 to the Deputy Minister of Agriculture and Food.
- The committee believes that, when actioned collaboratively with transparency and accountability, a new inspection and enforcement function within the Ministry of Agriculture will provide the same, if not a more significant, level of enforcement of the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act as is currently provided by the BC SPCA.
- The BC SPCA will work closely with the provincial government and the other committee members to ensure the system which is put in place is well-executed, closely parallels the level of expertise that the BC SPCA has provided for decades and offers a stronger reporting structure for transparency and accountability.
- With this new function assuming oversight of commercial farm inspection and enforcement, it allows the BC SPCA to become stronger advocates for farmed animals and to further explore recommendations to make farmed animal welfare laws and standards stronger without being in an alleged position of conflict with industry.
- Year-over-year, the BC SPCA has dedicated 20 per cent of all enforcement work conducted by the Society to complaints received about farmed animal activities. Included in this significant volume of work, the BC SPCA has led investigations for a number of precedent-setting convictions in Canada, such as the Chilliwack Cattle Sales Ltd. case where both the owners and operators were held accountable for the animal mistreatment happening in their facilities.

<u>Key Messages – Avian Influenza</u>

- This is an incredibly difficult time for B.C. poultry farmers and we're here to help them.
- While the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) leads the overall response, there is provincial support for testing, mapping, surveillance, and disposal.
- We saw the cases rise during last fall's migration, similar to what we're seeing this year, which is why we proactively introduced a new \$5 million animal diseases response and prevention fund in the spring.
- This investment is supporting farmers with new prevention strategies and stronger biosecurity measures on their farms.
- Ministry staff and our Chief Veterinarian also have been working closely with the CFIA and B.C. poultry producers since late summer to ensure farms have enhanced prevention measures in place.
- While we are doing our best to prepare farms and prevent the disease from spreading, this virus has the ability to adapt and spread so we must remain vigilant.
- B.C.'s egg and poultry farmers have shown great dedication to ensuring they have the necessary safety measures in place, and we will continue to work closely with them to protect their animals and our overall food security.

Key Messages – Animal Welfare

- All animals deserve to be treated ethically with care and respect.
- This is a priority for our government and B.C. producers which is why my Deputy Minister is overseeing a comprehensive review of B.C.'s farmed animal welfare framework to ensure it is strong and remains strong in the future.
- Over the past year, ministry staff have done extensive consultation with animal welfare experts and farming organizations with the goal of developing an inspection system that is fair, and that all parties can understand and support.
- An advisory committee (including representation from the agricultural industry and BC SPCA) are in the process of submitting recommendations for Ministry staff to review.
- We will then be looking at next steps that will strengthen and evolve B.C.'s farmed animal welfare framework.
- Anyone with concerns about animal welfare should contact the BC SPCA directly as they have the legislated authority to respond to animals in distress and investigate any concerns.
- We will continue to work on this important issue to ensure robust animal welfare policies are in place in B.C.
