Stakeholder Relations Communications Plan — Prototype Sites May to September 2018

Purpose

To provide stakeholder understanding, and increase interest and applications from eligible providers for Universal Child Care Prototype Sites leading up to the deadline for applications. As well, ensure that stakeholder communications during the selection and contract negotiation period align with public communications/announcements developed by GCPE.

These sites are government's opportunity to partner with existing, experienced child care providers and learn more about how a universal, government-funded system of child care could be applied in our province. As many as 50 prototype sites involving a range of service models may be selected.

Goals and objectives

Primary

- To increase stakeholder awareness and understanding of the Prototype Sites initiative and how the sites fit into the overall child care strategy.
- To encourage a meaningful number of applications from all regions and representing all types of eligible child care facilities.
- To develop information, resources and other materials to help support a successful launch
 of the Prototype Sites through the projects critical phases:
 - Issuing Expression of Interest
 - Proposal selection period
 - Announcement of the chosen sites
 - Evaluation of the sites
 - End of Prototype Sites contracts in March 31, 2020.

Secondary

- Along with other communications related to Child Care initiatives help non-profit and
 private child care providers, early child care educators and other key audiences understand
 where their businesses fit into government's longer term plan for child care
- To establish long-term processes and communications/engagement strategies and channels for ongoing two-way communication with child care providers, early childhood educators, associations and other stakeholders in the child-care sector

- To ensure child care operators in both the non-profit and private sectors feel they are being respected and their voices are being heard, even if they do not agree with every government decision
- Under Federal agreement, the main focus is on infant/toddler care and non-profit, although
 there will be opportunities to look at other types of sites and care to learn more to inform
 government's longer-term plan.

Potential Challenges and Considerations around launch/announcement

While GCPE in collaboration with the minister's office will determine the timing and approach for announcing the successful prototype applicants, each available option has a number of considerations that affect stakeholders and communication to them.

With more than 400 applicants — and an estimated 40 to 50 expected to be successful — there is a large number of operators involving a large number of families who will be anxious to know what their operations will look like in the year and what they can communicate to their clients. Communicating the outcomes of the Expression of Interest expeditiously as possible is recommended. Complicating that will be the time required to conclude negotiations on 40 to 50 contracts.

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Recommendation 3: Advise by phone those applicants who are still under consideration.

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Option 3: Publicly announce selected prototype sites in <u>two phases</u> (approx. late September and late October), pending progress and completion of contract negotiations.

 Creates multiple opportunities to announce sites in a way that draws focus to their impact in specific communities. Ensures that announced sites have completed contract negotiations.

Implications:

- · Permits more-timely public announcements.
- Provides an opportunity to follow up provincial announcements with tolling regional announcements for sustained focus.
- Reduces risk that the ministry may need to publicly amend its list of prototype sites because it was not able to successfully conclude contract negotiations with selected sites.

RECOMMENDATION:

Option 3: Publicly announce selected prototype sites in <u>two phases</u> (approx. late September and late October), pending progress and completion of contract negotiations.

Key messages

General

- The goal of Child Care BC is to offer affordable, accessible and quality child care for British Columbia's families.
- More Child Care BC initiatives will be announced in the weeks and months ahead that will
 offer more resources and supports to child care providers, addressing issues like
 remuneration for staff, early childhood education training support, capital funding options
 and more. The Ministry will be announcing next steps in the months ahead, and are
 committed to keeping you informed every step of the way.

Prototype Sites (Pre-selection) (See below for KMs post selection)

- Prototype sites will be a model for how a universal, government-funded system of child care
 can be done in B.C.
- This is an opportunity for providers of licensed child care private and not-for-profit in all parts of the province to shape the future of child care service delivery.
- As our partner you will help us develop a future funding model to implement universal child care in 2020.
- There are funding benefits in being selected as a Prototype Site including access to grants to improve the quality of child care programs and services, as well as financial compensation for extra administration requirements.
- Parents too will benefit from having fees capped at \$10 a day, and possibly lower in instances where parents are eligible to receive the new affordable Child Care Benefit, formally the Child Care Subsidy.
- We recognize the Prototype Sites will also be a change for selected providers to adjust to.
 We're working hard to ensure that evaluation requirements during the contract period will be minimally intrusive, yet still provide the critical information to move forward with implementing universal child care.

If selected as a Universal Child Care Prototype Site, for the duration of the contract the child care facility will:

- An expert panel including [list] is now reviewing applications. Panel members have been selected on their experience and knowledge of best practices both in the province and across Canada.
- Contracts will be negotiated with selected applicants. When those are concluded we will announce the selected Prototype Sites.
- Prototype Sites throughout the province, using a range of models, are expected to be in operation beginning September 1 and through to March 31, 2020.
- They will provide government a better understanding of factors that affect child care fees, program quality and the effect of affordable child care on families, communicates and child care providers.

KM's Post Selection Process

- Prototype sites will help model how a universal, government-funded system of child care can be done in B.C.
- The strong response to the Request for Proposals to operate Prototype child care sites is
 proof of the overwhelming support for a new system of child care in B.C. one that is
 affordable and universal.

- More than 200 operators responded to the call for proposals, representing more than 10,000 child care spaces.
- There were many quality submissions received; those selected best demonstrated the evaluation criteria.
- Through their participation as prototype sites, they will help inform a future funding model
 to implement universal child care by 2020 not all eligible applicants could be selected as
 prototypes.
- Selected partners include a range of licensed child care facilities— private and not-for-profit
 — in all parts of the province, each of which will provide valuable information to shape the
 future of child care service delivery.
- There are funding benefits in being selected as a Prototype Site including access to grants to improve the quality of child care programs and services, as well as financial compensation for extra administration requirements.
- Parents too will benefit from having fees capped at \$10 a day, and possibly lower in instances where parents are eligible to receive the new affordable Child Care Benefit, formally the Child Care Subsidy.
