#### Good afternoon,

I'm writing to oppose the government's legislation that would allow it to prescribe an FOI application fee. To be clear, I oppose the ability to prescribe any application fee, whether it is the \$25 fee mentioned by the minister today or a smaller fee.

I regularly file FOIs I would consider to be in the public interest, primarily related to policing. For example, I FOI'd street check data from BC's municipal police departments, which showed police departments disproportionately street check Indigenous and Black people. The Vancouver Police Department records I obtained through FOI led to a complaint from the UBCIC and BCCLA, and BCCLA has cited the records released by other departments. The proposed fees would have turned that work into a \$300 project — \$25 for each of BC's 10 municipal police departments, and an additional \$50 for the two subsequent FOIs it took to obtain any information from the Victoria and Esquimalt Police Department.

Other FOIs I have filed resulted in records showing Victoria and Esquimalt Police Department officers policing people's immigration status, and the police pressuring the media to alter its reporting. Additional records I have obtained provide the only publicly available materials showing VicPD, Oak Bay PD, and Saanich PDs' school liaison officer activities, arrest information for SD61 school properties, and records showing officers policing children under ten years old at SD61 schools.

When community members ask me how to file FOIs, including individuals from marginalized communities, I support them to file their own requests. I mention that there is no application fee to file an FOI in B.C., and I provide advice to avoid fee assessments. Individuals I have supported in the past would be unable to pay any fees.

I am writing to tell you that an application fee — any fee — will absolutely be a barrier to people using FOIs for public interest requests, including myself. I have reviewed the FOIs I have filed in recent years, and I cannot identify any I would consider frivolous. I can tell you, however, that the requirement to pay a fee would have prevented some or all of that work.

Please amend Bill 22 to eliminate the ability for the government to prescribe an application fee.

I am writing to say that I do not think you should be proposing charges for freedom of information requests. People should be able to access their records without financial hindrance.

I have personally had to file over a dozen FOI requests in the last few years in order to access my medical records, as well as for my husband and my father. This wound have cost me over \$300 if each request cost \$25!

By accessing my records, I have been able to make corrections on my own file, as well as advocate for my husband and father when they were confined to hospital. I have also been able to use my medical records in order to self-advocate as a person living with invisible disability, and show them to specialists in order to prove that what I say is true (reduces being brushed off or minimized). Many people who need their records live in poverty and cannot afford these fees.

Please do not start charging citizens for requesting access to our records. It really comes across as a petty way to get funds. There must be a better strategy to get some revenue! For example, I live and work downtown, so do not have to drive. I do not have kids, but have a car for pleasure use. Why are you taking away tolls on bridges, giving ICBC rebates and making transit free for kids, but now proposing to charge people for making FOI Requests? Beyond the FOI usage by opposition parties or the (non-Mackin) investigative news media, we need to instead focus on poor, average folk, who can least afford \$25 fees, and would be most harmed, the innocents caught in the political crossfire, the "collateral damage."

The government assures us that no application fees will be charged for personal requests, just non-personal "general" ones; one problem we have is that the NDP implies that "normal, average" folk usually do not file general requests, and so wouldn't be harmed by fees. This assumption is mistaken.

Note what B.C. Commissioner McEvoy said in the Sun on the fee – "It poses an obstacle to access and accountability, and not just for media," he said. "It could be a parent group, for example, that finds itself making access to information requests to multiple health authorities and to the Ministry of Health and other ministries. You could see how that number could add up awfully quickly and be a deterrent to people making legitimate requests."

David Cuillier, PhD, president, U.S. National Freedom of Information Coalition - "Clearly, \$25 puts many citizens at a disadvantage in interacting with their government – and even worst, it differentially hurts the poor, widening the information gap in our society.... "The public records request system is a way for citizens to interact with their government, and simply should be considered a cost of doing business. So why start making it harder for citizens to know what their government is up to on this front?"

Best of all, my Excel database of 2,000 BC news stories produced by FOI requests can help. <a href="https://canadafoi.ca/british-columbia-foi/">https://canadafoi.ca/british-columbia-foi/</a> I created a new category, not of subject matter, but of a key, overlooked *applicant type* - the average citizen. I wrote:

"For many readers, the most interesting and moving summaries may be found in Category 6 – Personal Requests. These 70 stories are based on FOI requests that were filed not by journalists but by individuals or their family members often in some form of distress. Working to improve their lives, they obtained documents that helped some to clear their names of false allegations, or aided adoptees to find their true parents, or enabled others to obtain redress for childhood abuse, or workplace injuries, botched surgeries, hepatitis C infections, schoolyard bullying, land appropriations and rental evictions. It shows that obtaining records is not solely within the purview of experts, and their usage best demonstrates the professed goal of the FOI law – to empower the average citizen."

Some of those were from personal requests (with no planned fees), but some also from "general" FOI ones. Importantly, some of these citizens made general requests for their whole community's benefit, as local activists (many too poor to pay \$25 fees), beyond their own personal interests. And anyways, their personal cases at times reveal a hidden problem shared by hundreds/thousands of others too. See samples below.

- 1. Allow public bodies to send information outside Canada for storage in any way shape or form.
- 2. Charge \$25., to retrieve information.
- 3. Consider the wilful destruction of records.
- 4. Not present proposed information changes side by side so that comparison with changes and additions can be noted in a meaningful manner.
- 1. In your response you say that by not allowing information to be sent outside of Canada it can make it difficult for universities to deliver online education tools. Not true. \$.22 We have addressed this issue fully. If and when we occasionally choose to use a server outside of Canada we fully inform students, staff and faculty of this. But educational tools are not like my personal health information which is much more personal and sensitive. I do not want my health information outside of Canada. Of course it is also not stated by you where these servers will reside. Ministerial orders should not be permanent, this is not appropriate. Once the pandemic is over BC should be looking at alternate ways in BC, or Canada to allow citizens of BC to access the same

information.

- 2. Charge citizens to retrieve information. I see this as blow back to your Liberal colleagues and the media for FOI requests. I agree with Mr. McEvoy this is a great way to reduce the requests by the media to access information the government would rather not have in the open. As journalism educators, we are deeply disappointed by the B.C. government's plans to begin charging a \$25 fee to file a Freedom of Information (FOI) request. B.C.'s proposed fee would be 5 times as high as a federal request (\$5) and the highest fee in the country, tied with Alberta and Nunavut.

We believe this new fee will be particularly onerous for student journalists, who often use FOI requests to uncover newsworthy information which they then publish through student newspapers. Requiring students who are already struggling to pay for tuition and textbooks to pay \$25 every time they want to access government records will discourage many of them from making such requests.

Journalists, activists and members of the public use FOI requests to hold the government accountable and help inform their fellow citizens. The value to the public of the information uncovered by FOI requests is perhaps best illustrated by the fact your own government publishes all the information released in response to FOI requests online, so all citizens can access it (<a href="https://bit.lv/foisbc">https://bit.lv/foisbc</a>).

We appreciate that some people may abuse the FOI system, placing undue pressure on government resources. But there are better ways of dealing with that challenge than a blanket \$25 fee. The Act already allows government agencies to charge requesters for any search that takes longer than 3 hours. And the government could impose a fee on requesters who make more than, say, 100 requests a year.

This new fee is a step backward for government transparency and openness and is particularly unfair to requesters of limited means, like students. We strongly urge you not to adopt this fee.

Once it is in the cloud, outside of Canada, it is like a ghost and unable to ever control.

Therefore, by repealing section 30.1, you are making the rest of the act un-enforceable because if the Data is stored on foreign servers, it is fully accessible by foreign techs and therefore no longer in the control or purview of the Public Body.

Storage and access must be in Canada

30.1 A public body must ensure that personal information in its custody or under its control is stored only in Canada and accessed only in Canada, unless one of the following applies:

(a)if the individual the information is about has identified the information and has consented, in the prescribed manner, to it being stored in or accessed from, as applicable, another jurisdiction;

(b)if it is stored in or accessed from another jurisdiction for the purpose of disclosure allowed under this Act;

(c)if it was disclosed under section 33.1 (1) (i.1).

New Law

SECTION 17: [Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act, sections 30.1, 30.2, 30.4 and 30.5] repeals provisions respecting storage and access outside of Canada, foreign demands for disclosure, unauthorized

disclosure and notification of unauthorized disclosure. 17 Sections 30.1, 30.2, 30.4 and 30.5 (1) are repealed.

I'm reading that the government is proposing a \$25 fee for FOI requests, which has generated a lot of push-back from educational institutions and journalists, arguing that it would be "a step backward for government transparency and openness."

Also, that the government responds to over 10,000 FOI requests per year. That's a huge number! If government agencies were more transparent about information, and provided it through websites, then the need to process these requests would be much fewer. This is a self-made problem.

I can illustrate with our marina group's experience with the Vancouver Parks Board. (operators of Burrard Civic Marina). In times past, if we wanted to see a copy of the marina financials, or an engineering report, we simply had to ask for it, and eventually a staff member would email it to us. Now we get told that we need to submit an FOI request to the City. This stand-offishness only serves to antagonize people and make them mistrustful of civil servants.

Then there are the delays, delays, delays, which we get from the City. Being told that it "affects the interests of a 3rd party" is a favourite delaying tactic. Finally, when documents are released, several months have passed, often the delay makes it no longer relevant to any time-based need (say, an upcoming budget meeting), and one has to wonder what's been held back in the process.

The experience leads one to conclude that some civil servant has worked really hard to make access to information as difficult as possible. Clearly, some people make careers out of this, and now the government wants to charge us fees, so they can hire even more bureaucrats to stymy public access to information.

It should be government's goal to reduce the number of FOI requests by being more transparent and collaborative with the public, not by setting up roadblocks to discourage people.

#### Good afternoon,

I'm writing to oppose the government's legislation that would allow it to prescribe an FOI application fee. To be clear, I oppose the ability to prescribe any application fee, whether it is the \$25 fee mentioned by the minister today or a smaller fee.

I regularly file FOIs I would consider to be in the public interest, primarily related to policing. For example, I FOI'd street check data from BC's municipal police departments, which showed police departments disproportionately

street check Indigenous and Black people. The Vancouver Police Department records I obtained through FOI led to a complaint from the UBCIC and BCCLA, and BCCLA has cited the records released by other departments. The proposed fees would have turned that work into a \$300 project — \$25 for each of BC's 10 municipal police departments, and an additional \$50 for the two subsequent FOIs it took to obtain any information from the Victoria and Esquimalt Police Department.

Other FOIs I have filed resulted in records showing Victoria and Esquimalt Police Department officers policing people's immigration status, and the police pressuring the media to alter its reporting. Additional records I have obtained provide the only publicly available materials showing VicPD, Oak Bay PD, and Saanich PDs' school liaison officer activities, arrest information for SD61 school properties, and records showing officers policing children under ten years old at SD61 schools.

When community members ask me how to file FOIs, including individuals from marginalized communities, I support them to file their own requests. I mention that there is no application fee to file an FOI in B.C., and I provide advice to avoid fee assessments. Individuals I have supported in the past would be unable to pay any fees.

I am writing to tell you that an application fee — any fee — will absolutely be a barrier to people using FOIs for public interest requests, including myself. I have reviewed the FOIs I have filed in recent years, and I cannot identify any I would consider frivolous. I can tell you, however, that the requirement to pay a fee would have prevented some or all of that work.

Please amend Bill 22 to eliminate the ability for the government to prescribe an application fee.

Dear Minister Beare, and Chief Information Officer:

Beyond the FOI usage by opposition parties or the (non-Mackin) investigative news media, we need to instead focus on poor, average folk, who can least afford \$25 fees, and would be most harmed, the innocents caught in the political crossfire, the "collateral damage."

The government assures us that no application fees will be charged for personal requests, just non-personal "general" ones; one problem we have is that the NDP implies that "normal, average" folk usually do not file general requests, and so wouldn't be harmed by fees. This assumption is mistaken.

Note what B.C. Commissioner McEvoy said in the Sun on the fee — "It poses an obstacle to access and accountability, and not just for media," he said. "It could be a parent group, for example, that finds itself making access to information requests to multiple health authorities and to the Ministry of Health and other ministries. You could see how that number could add up awfully quickly and be a deterrent to people making legitimate requests."

David Cuillier, PhD, president, U.S. National Freedom of Information Coalition - "Clearly, \$25 puts many citizens at a disadvantage in interacting with their government — and even worst, it differentially hurts the poor, widening the information gap in our society.... "The public records request system is a way for citizens to interact with their government, and simply should be considered a cost of doing business. So why start making it harder for citizens to know what their government is up to on this front?"

Best of all, my Excel database of 2,000 BC news stories produced by FOI requests can help. <a href="https://canadafoi.ca/british-columbia-foi/">https://canadafoi.ca/british-columbia-foi/</a> I created a new category, not of subject matter, but of a key, overlooked *applicant type* - the average citizen. I wrote:

"For many readers, the most interesting and moving summaries may be found in Category 6 – Personal Requests. These 70 stories are based on FOI requests that were filed not by journalists but by individuals or their family members often in some form of distress. Working to improve their lives, they obtained documents that helped some to clear their names of false allegations, or aided adoptees to find their true parents, or enabled others to obtain redress for childhood abuse, or workplace injuries, botched surgeries, hepatitis C infections, schoolyard bullying, land appropriations and rental evictions. It shows that obtaining records is not solely within the purview of experts, and their usage best demonstrates the professed goal of the FOI law – to empower the average citizen."

Some of those were from personal requests (with no planned fees), but some also from "general" FOI ones. Importantly, some of these citizens made general requests for their whole community's benefit, as local activists (many too poor to pay \$25 fees), beyond their own personal interests. And anyways, their personal cases at times reveal a hidden problem shared by hundreds/thousands of others too. See samples below.

**Subject:** FOI changes - objection to the pending changes

Dear Premier & Minister Responsible for FOI:

I am writing to object to, and express significant outrage about the regressive changes being pushed through against our BC freedom of information laws. This is the BC NDP party that I believe exists - one that fights for ordinary citizens: so why is the party going against its own principles to thwart our FOI rights? Please Mr Premier I do not like what is happening here, and I am writing \$5.22 to voice my objections and ask that you do not take such regressive action.

Second, the initial FOI legislation was put in place by a BC NDP government that wanted to increase transparency and in so doing, make our laws the most accessible in Canada. The idea was to make the government more accountable, more accessible, but most importantly allow ordinary people the ability to get records on themselves easily, for free, and make corrections. Why is this mandate being changed now? Again, the BC NDP bills itself as the part of working people, and brands itself as "working for you" the ordinary working person. Yet, against media questions, our "people's premier" is deflecting, distracting, and mischaracterizing the issue. - 1. The concern that OIPC is being changed by changing it from substantive legislation which has the oversight of parliament, to "framework legislation" whereby the minister can put through changes without input of our elected reps. This is an affront to our democracy as you are essentially removing public debate and criticism by this regressive approach to government. I ask that the status quo be kept where our province should be leader in public laws, not become "Stephen-Haper-esque" in the approach to government where that government worked against Canadians; we are the NDP and support human rights and open access.
- 2. Changing the data residency rules to remove the protection of our information and using other provisions such as in-Canada residence of the data as an effective surrogate. We have seen the issues with the breach of privacy by Life Labs, and then other security breaches that we all hear back in other countries. Please maintain such protection.
- 3. The deeply troubling "trick" to remove the "office of the premier" as a body covered under the FOI laws, and using weak excuses, justifications when questioned. We all know what happened with the City of Vancouver, when the now ex-"Vision Vancouver" municipal party used similar tricks to thwart access to FOI records where the FOI commissioner rebuked them.. It seems the same

approach and personnel are using the same slippery tactics and this is wrong. Mr. Premier, if you are to be a beacon of hope, please don't use these "Jason Kenney" style tactics to thwart our democracy. The BC NDP is better than that.

- 4. - 5. The imposition of a request fee, which has been touted as \$25 per request, is an affront to our democracy. In the media, it has been noted that the government is doing this to avoid pesky journalists or the opposition, who I note are in fact doing the job of holding politicians to account. The very same approach that the NDP took when in opposition. Could you please tell me what, if anything, I can do to convince you not to go through with the plan to charge a proposed fee for FOIs? I am opposed and I'll tell you why. Powell River City Council is not transparent, it is opaque. Closed in camera meetings are nearing 7 years in arrears of being released and by law they are supposed to be made available to the public in a timely manner as soon as possible. Waiting one year is incredulous but more than 6 years is a travesty.

Minutes are available to be read of council meetings, but minutes don't tell the whole story. No minutes are available of the opaque 'in camera' meetings. The webcasts tell a far more accurate story, but naturally none of the 'in camera' are available for viewing. Apparently our server here is being upgraded and none of the webcasts from Council Meetings, COWM, Finance Committee, Special Council nor Public Meetings from Jan,2016 to current times are available for viewing. Last week I could still watch the webcasts online from 2020 onwards, but they are not available anymore either.

I have requested FOI's in the past asking to be notified if the research would involve more than 3 hours of work that I be notified of the charges, so far my FOIs have not involved any charges but I have gleaned information that should have been easily accessible to the public all along. A request through FOI is a last resort, not the first intervention. An increase in requests is not a problem; it is a symptom of a problem with transparency and openness further up the food chain.

Please do <u>not vote in favour of Bill 22</u> and its repealing of 30.1 of the FOIPPA Act which currently protects BC residents by requiring storage of their personal information to be only in Canada, accessed only by Canadians. Why repealing section 30.1 of the FOIPPA act puts BC residents and their Personal Information at risk along with the BC Economy Sector:

- 1. Personal information (PI) stored on foreign servers is accessible and managed by foreign server admins, without knowledge or control from the BC Public Body.
- 2. Foreign servers distribute Personal Information to cloud servers worldwide without knowledge given to Public Bodies as to whom specifically has access or where specifically it is stored.
- 3. Personal Information stored on foreign internet cloud servers drastically increases the risk of cyber-attacks to steal PI. The July 2021 cyber-attack on the UVM Medical center in Vermont was preventable if the data had been stored and properly secured on local internal network servers by local technicians.
- 4. Once Personal Information (PI) is distributed to foreign cloud servers, there often can be no recourse to have data permanently removed, secured or access traced for FOI requests.
- 5. If Public Bodies are allowed to store PI on foreign servers and hire foreign workers to administer it, BC public sector jobs that do not have an on-site requirement have a high risk of being eliminated.
- 6. The NDP Government should be doing more to secure PI to remain in Canada and to ensure BC public sector jobs are protected, not opening the door to expose PI to foreign access, cyber-attacks and eliminating BC jobs by hiring foreign workers.

Why we need to keep section 30.1 of the FOIPPA Act

1. BC computer technicians working for public bodies are legally required to sign agreements and uphold the FOIPPA act and must participate in mandatory annual privacy and security training.

- 2. Access to Personal Information is currently managed directly by the Public Bodies. Domains like healthbc.org, idir.bcgov, and phsabc.ehcnet.ca allocate what PI BC employees or Canadian contractors have access to.
- 3. Personal Information is stored locally in BC on domain servers on internal networks with firewalls managed by BC Public Bodies employees and protected at multiple physical levels.
- 4. Microsoft has Canadian server data centers where public bodies can access Microsoft 365 services while still keeping PI within Canadian borders, accessed and managed by Canadians.
- 5. Google, Service Now, Airwatch and other services also have Canadian server data centers where public bodies like schools, hospitals and government can access online services while still keeping PI within Canadian borders accessed and managed by Canadians.
- 6. Other online services that wish to sell to BC Public Bodies have motivation to create data centers within Canada, creating jobs for Canadians and keeping the BC IT sector strong while securing PI away from foreign access and cyber-attacks.

s.22 stands with the Information and Privacy Commissioner,
Michael McEvoy, in opposition to the proposed fee for Freedom of Information requests in British Columbia. Our
opposition is based on the following:

- Access to information is the backbone of our democracy. An engaged electorate must have access to
  information if they are to make thoughtful decisions in the interest of the common good. A barrier that
  limits access to this information is a violation of citizens' democratic rights.
- Leadership accountability is compromised when opposition members, journalists who report on
  government actions, and citizens of B.C., particularly those on the margins, who may have legitimate
  concerns are left in the dark.
- Citizens Service Minister Lisa Beare cited escalating costs associated with FOI requests as justification for her decision. Her claim that the government processes approximately 10,000 applications suggesting that a fee of \$25 would bring in \$150.000, is misleading.\* The Federal Treasury Board estimates that the cost to process an FOI request when paid by cheque is \$50.00, twice the cost of the fee proposed by the Province of B.C. This decision is not about cost recovery.
- Beare also stated that the average cost to process an FOI request is \$30,000. Let's do the math. At a clerk
  rate of \$20 per hour, her figures translate to five full weeks of work per request. Given that the FOI Act
  limits recovery of costs to include only the following, this estimate is grossly inflated.
  - Locate, retrieve and produce information
  - o Prepare for disclosure (not including time to redact information)
  - Shipping and handling
  - o Making a copy of the record.
- Beare argues that the suggested fee reflects other jurisdictions yet the only authority to charge \$25.00 is
   Alberta, long considered the most secretive jurisdiction in the country.
- Premier Horgan raised concerns about a few groups submitting an excessive number of requests. A
  request through FOI is a last resort, not the first intervention. An increase in requests is not a problem; it
  is a symptom of a problem with transparency and openness further up the food chain.
- We are living in a time when trust in leadership is at an unprecedented low. Imposing a fee erodes trust
  and will inevitably escalate calls for accountability, further exacerbating the problem.

We call on you to reconsider this decision.

After all that, the information returned is often muddled or irrelevant. So by the time all this is sorted out, too much time has passed for meaningful engagement on the subject matter. This is not a one off but a consistent pattern that makes a farce of the concepts of "transparency" and "accountability." Data residency doesn't protect information – effective privacy controls do, and with these proposed amendments, we are making sure those are in place.

As a government, we are committed to open and transparent access to information. We also believe people are waiting too long under the old legislation for the information they deserve. Right now, B.C. receives more FOI requests annually than the three western provinces combined. The addition of a fee to non-personal FOI requests is in line with other jurisdictions in Canada. Those asking for personal information will continue to not pay a fee at all.

We are also demonstrating the Province's commitment to diversity, inclusion, reconciliation and equity by increasing information sharing with Indigenous peoples, adding Indigenous cultural protections and replacing non-inclusive language FOIPPA is not working for people anymore, and we're making these changes based on what we've heard from extensive consultation with thousands of people, organizations and businesses.

#### Dear Mr. Fleming,

I have read a number of the media articles about the proposed new fee for FOI requests and just now I found your iPolitics article. Then I found this one, published in 2011.

I can certainly appreciate why journalists are concerned about a new fee, on top of all the other problems with the FOI regime.

I'm not a journalist, so a \$25 fee doesn't bother me. In fact I'd gladly have paid more than that if it would have assured that the OIPC would have dealt competently and in good faith with my FOI complaint that resulted in this order, signed by Michael McEvoy.

Yes, I am saying that the current OIPC commissioner was acting in bad faith in his conduct of that inquiry. Why? Well here is a summary.

In 1997 an exercise conducted on the entire B.C. statute book was concluded. The process was what is called "statute revision". The clear understanding is that any changes to language must be strictly cosmetic. Substantive changes are amendments and require the full engagement of the legislature. But there was at least one substantive change made in the course of that statute revision - to section 13 of the Labour Relations Code. Section 13 had been very vigorously debated on November 26, 1992 (see the attached extract of the Hansard that I created). By then the statute revision exercise had already commenced. I don't have an exact date, but it may have been as early as sometime in 1990. I know it was officially completed in March 1997. Less than a year later there was a clumsy attempt at a cover up in this report, which included a recommendation to more extensively amend section 13. The government ignored that recommendation, so the illegally amended version is still in place and regularly relied upon by the BCLRB. One of the four people who signed that 1998 report has been sitting on the BCSC bench since 2005.

That was issued before I tried asking the Attorney General for access to the archive of the documents created during the course of the statute revision exercise. I wanted to find out who had prevailed upon the Legislative Counsel Office team to effect that illegal amendment. I didn't tell the OIPC what I was looking for, but I came to suspect that McEvoy knew. One reason for that suspicion is that he had previously worked as a staff lawyer at the BCLRB. I had learned as well that the BC branch of the CBA had privileged and confidential access to the LCO, so I suspected that that was how the labour law community was able to convey what it wanted to the LCO.

Brian Greer was Chief Legislative Counsel while all this was happening. Two weeks to the day after I shared what I had found with Ujjal Dosanjh (who was then an MP and I think a federal cabinet minister) Greer's decision to "step down" was announced in the House by Michael de Jong. That is recorded <a href="here">here</a>. There is much more to what I have uncovered. I have no doubt about what would happen if I could put all that evidence to a jury. But you can't get a jury when the government is a defendant.

As for McEvoy, I wrote him off when he issued that order. He's part of the problem, not part of any solution. Regards, s.22

Thank you for the reply, however, I wish to express my significant objection to these trite justifications and talking points. The NDP believes in open access, working for the average person, and then ensuring that records are available on a without cost basis. None of what you are saying meets within these goals of a party that purports to reflects the values of working people should be, and I am very surprised that the people advising you and the party, are engendering an era that eliminates one of the best FOI laws in Canada.

First, I was extremely disheartened that this bill was referred to committee stage before 3rd reading. I am saddened that you are or you staff felt this type of response is somehow "sufficient" when it is clearly note.

Second, response to the points raised, I provide my comments as clearly the talking points are designed to put the wool over the eyes of the public, who are not actually as gullible as your politically-appointed media staff, who seem to think that we do not have any intelligence to see why the changes are regressive.

- data residency issues, I do not agree that privacy controls in foreign jurisdictions would maintain

  not mentioning this is a travesty of justice.

B.C.'s Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy legislation is outdated, last updated a decade ago, and is not working for people. The COVID-19 pandemic changed the way we live, work, connect with loved ones and access the services we need.

Our proposed changes will help B.C. keep pace with new technology, ensure timely access to information, strengthen privacy protections and improve services for people in B.C.

By updating data-residency provisions, public bodies will be able to use modern tools to provide services while continuing to protect the personal information people entrust to us. Data residency doesn't protect information – effective privacy controls do, and with these proposed amendments, we are making sure those are in place.

## Dear Premier & Minister Responsible for FOI:

I am writing to object to, and express significant outrage about the regressive changes being pushed through against our BC freedom of information laws. With respect, I ask the government to rescind these regressive changes and instead of preventing access, it should expand access for all citizens and maintain our social contract: meaning, the government provides access as part of our taxes and does not hinder access.

First, s.22 where I have given a lifetime of service to the cause of human rights and uplifting the status of the average working person. s.22 s.22

I care deeply about people - but I am very worried that our premier does not seem to as these changes thwart our democracy rights. What I am not includes not being associated with "captains of industry" "business elites" or "high priced corporate types"; my people are those that work minimum wage, disabled people on monthly support, racialized people working several jobs, who are all ordinary citizens. This is the BC NDP party that I believe exists - one that fights for ordinary citizens: so why is the party going against its own principles to thwart our FOI rights? Please Mr Premier I do not like what is happening here, and I am writing as \$5.22 to voice my objections and ask that you do not take such regressive action.

Second, the initial FOI legislation was put in place by a BC NDP government that wanted to increase transparency and in so doing, make our laws the most accessible in Canada. The idea was to make the government more accountable, more accessible, but most importantly allow ordinary people the ability to get records on themselves easily, for free, and make corrections. Why is this mandate being changed now? Again, the BC NDP bills itself as the part of working people, and brands itself as "working for you" the ordinary working person. Yet, against media questions, our "people's premier" is deflecting, distracting, and mischaracterizing the issue. Please Mr Premier, we are the only province with an NDP government so please do not use examples of other provinces as a weak excuse for change; keep our values intact and ensure free access, and no sneaky regulations, and keep the office the premier within the ambit of FOI laws.

Therefore, I provide my comments below, which I have taken from the FOI Commissioner's letter.

1. The concern that OIPC is being changed by changing it from substantive legislation which has the oversight of parliament, to "framework legislation" whereby the minister can put through changes without input of our elected reps. This is an affront to our democracy as you are essentially removing public debate and criticism by this regressive approach to government. I ask

that the status quo be kept where our province should be leader in public laws, not become "Stephen-Haper-esque" in the approach to government where that government worked against Canadians; we are the NDP and support human rights and open access.

- 2. Changing the data residency rules to remove the protection of our information and using other provisions such as in-Canada residence of the data as an effective surrogate. We have seen the issues with the breach of privacy by Life Labs, and then other security breaches that we all hear back in other countries. Please maintain such protection.
- 3. The deeply troubling "trick" to remove the "office of the premier" as a body covered under the FOI laws, and using weak excuses, justifications when questioned. We all know what happened with the City of Vancouver, when the now ex-"Vision Vancouver" municipal party used similar tricks to thwart access to FOI records where the FOI commissioner rebuked them.. It seems the same approach and personnel are using the same slippery tactics and this is wrong. Mr. Premier, if you are to be a beacon of hope, please don't use these "Jason Kenney" style tactics to thwart our democracy. The BC NDP is better than that.
- 4. I also that you please include within the provisions of FOI, non-profit organizations that receive principal funding from the government, similar to the federal contractors program, so that these organizations, while private, are covered by access laws. This should be an expansion of our rights that is reasonably expected.
- 5. The imposition of a request fee, which has been touted as \$25 per request, is an affront to our democracy. In the media, it has been noted that the government is doing this to avoid pesky journalists or the opposition, who I note are in fact doing the job of holding politicians to account. The very same approach that the NDP took when in opposition. Mr. Premier, I am deeply troubled that you are taking this regressive approach denying the very democratic access to rights that we all enjoy, thwarting a citizen's right to information which is a part of government operations and should never be on a fee for access basis (social contract). I ask that you remove this Stalinist provision from our law, never to see the light of day again. 

I am writing as a concerned citizen and voter.

Please do <u>not vote in favour of Bill 22</u> and its repealing of 30.1 of the FOIPPA Act which currently protects BC residents by requiring storage of their personal information to be only in Canada, accessed only by Canadians.

Why repealing section 30.1 of the FOIPPA act puts BC residents and their Personal Information at risk along with the BC Economy Sector:

- 1. Personal information (PI) stored on foreign servers is accessible and managed by foreign server admins, without knowledge or control from the BC Public Body.
- 2. Foreign servers distribute Personal Information to cloud servers worldwide without knowledge given to Public Bodies as to whom specifically has access or where specifically it is stored.
- 3. Personal Information stored on foreign internet cloud servers drastically increases the risk of cyber-attacks to steal PI. The July 2021 cyber-attack on the UVM Medical center in Vermont was preventable if the data had been stored and properly secured on local internal network servers by local technicians.
- 4. Once Personal Information (PI) is distributed to foreign cloud servers, there often can be no recourse to have data permanently removed, secured or access traced for FOI requests.
- 5. If Public Bodies are allowed to store PI on foreign servers and hire foreign workers to administer it, BC public sector jobs that do not have an on-site requirement have a high risk of being eliminated.
- 6. The NDP Government should be doing more to secure PI to remain in Canada and to ensure BC public sector jobs are protected, not opening the door to expose PI to foreign access, cyber-attacks and eliminating BC jobs by hiring foreign workers.

Why we need to keep section 30.1 of the FOIPPA Act

- 1. BC computer technicians working for public bodies are legally required to sign agreements and uphold the FOIPPA act and must participate in mandatory annual privacy and security training.
- Access to Personal Information is currently managed directly by the Public Bodies. Domains like healthbc.org, idir.bcgov, and phsabc.ehcnet.ca allocate what PI BC employees or Canadian contractors have access to.
- 3. Personal Information is stored locally in BC on domain servers on internal networks with firewalls managed by BC Public Bodies employees and protected at multiple physical levels.
- 4. Microsoft has Canadian server data centers where public bodies can access Microsoft 365 services while still keeping PI within Canadian borders, accessed and managed by Canadians.

- 5. Google, Service Now, Airwatch and other services also have Canadian server data centers where public bodies like schools, hospitals and government can access online services while still keeping PI within Canadian borders accessed and managed by Canadians.
- 6. Other online services that wish to sell to BC Public Bodies have motivation to create data centers within Canada, creating jobs for Canadians and keeping the BC IT sector strong while securing PI away from foreign access and cyber-attacks.

- 3. Personal Information stored on foreign internet cloud servers drastically increases the risk of cyber-attacks to steal PI. The July 2021 cyber-attack on the UVM Medical center in Vermont was preventable if the data had been stored and properly secured on local internal network servers by local technicians.
- 4. Once Personal Information (PI) is distributed to foreign cloud servers, there often can be no recourse to have data permanently removed, secured or access traced for FOI requests.
- 5. If Public Bodies are allowed to store PI on foreign servers and hire foreign workers to administer it, BC public sector jobs that do not have an on-site requirement have a high risk of being eliminated.
- 6. The NDP Government should be doing more to secure PI to remain in Canada and to ensure BC public sector jobs are protected, not opening the door to expose PI to foreign access, cyber-attacks and eliminating BC jobs by hiring foreign workers.

Why we need to keep section 30.1 of the FOIPPA Act

- 1. BC computer technicians working for public bodies are legally required to sign agreements and uphold the FOIPPA act and must participate in mandatory annual privacy and security training.
- Access to Personal Information is currently managed directly by the Public Bodies. Domains like <u>healthbc.org</u>, idir.bcgov, and <u>phsabc.ehcnet.ca</u> allocate what PI BC employees or Canadian contractors have access to.
- 3. Personal Information is stored locally in BC on domain servers on internal networks with firewalls managed by BC Public Bodies employees and protected at multiple physical levels.
- 4. Microsoft has Canadian server data centers where public bodies can access Microsoft 365 services while still keeping PI within Canadian borders, accessed and managed by Canadians.
- 5. Google, Service Now, Airwatch and other services also have Canadian server data centers where public bodies like schools, hospitals and government can access online services while still keeping PI within Canadian borders accessed and managed by Canadians.
- 6. Other online services that wish to sell to BC Public Bodies have motivation to create data centers within Canada, creating jobs for Canadians and keeping the BC IT sector strong while securing PI away from foreign access and cyber-attacks.

#### Minister Beare,

As a parent and postsecondary educator in BC, I am deeply concerned about the provisions in Bill 22 that would permit public bodies such as schools and universities to continue using Internet services that are hosted outside Canada (such as Zoom) post-COVID, without the Ministerial orders that have permitted them to do so during the pandemic. I am in agreement with the privacy commissioner that this change would be in opposition to the spirit of FIPPA.

I am a parent of two children who currently attend university in BC. s.22 s.22

This technical background has enabled me to closely follow the steadily-increasing threats to personal privacy online, and to inform my students about them. I always tell my students and my children that they are fortunate to live in a province that has some of the strongest privacy legislation in North America. In my view, we should be strengthening FIPPA so that it provides British Columbians with protections on par with those in the European Union, not weakening it. During the pandemic I played a significant role in helping my fellow teacher educators \$.22 courses for remote delivery using technologies such as Zoom. I was not happy about \$.22 use of Zoom, knowing that its creators' privacy and security practices had been criticized by others in the computing industry; but we were in a crisis, and we needed to continue to serve our students. There was no time to investigate and implement an alternative.

However, we no longer need to operate in crisis mode. There exist free and open-source competitors to Zoom, which could be hosted locally in BC or elsewhere in Canada. One such option is Jitsi Meet (https://meet.jit.si/). If hosted in Canada, this free Zoom alternative would be fully compliant with FIPPA as it stands. What is more, Canadian IT professionals would be able to inspect the software code themselves to ensure that user privacy is in fact protected -- which one cannot do with a closed-source solution such as Zoom. Of course, this would require some public expenditure for servers and IT professionals to maintain them.

I understand that educators and students in this province want to continue some of the remote teaching practices that they became comfortable with during the early months of the pandemic. Implemented wisely, these practices can sometimes produce better learning outcomes and increase equity of access to learning as well. However, there is no need to hollow out British Columbians' data residency rights to make this possible. From where I stand, it appears that your government intends to undermine a key provision in FIPPA for no better reason than to save universities and school boards some money. This is shameful. I hope that your government will do the right thing and withdraw Bill 22, for the sake of my my children and all British Columbians.

As a parent and postsecondary educator in BC, I am deeply concerned about the provisions in Bill 22 that would permit public bodies such as schools and universities to continue using Internet services that are hosted outside Canada (such as Zoom) post-COVID, without the Ministerial orders that have permitted them to do so during the pandemic. I am in agreement with the privacy commissioner that this change would be in opposition to the spirit of FIPPA. I am a parent of two children who currently attend university in BC. s.22

s.22

This technical background has enabled me to closely follow the steadily-increasing threats to personal privacy online, and to inform my students about them. I always tell my students and my children that they are fortunate to live in a province that has some of the strongest privacy legislation in North America. In my view, we should be strengthening FIPPA so that it provides British Columbians with protections on par with those in the European Union, not weakening it. During the pandemic I played a significant role in helping my fellow teacher educators s.22 to adapt their courses for remote delivery using technologies such as Zoom. I was not happy about<sup>s.22</sup> use of Zoom, knowing that its creators' privacy and security practices had been criticized by others in the computing industry; but we were in a crisis, and we needed to continue to serve our students. There was no time to investigate and implement an alternative.

However, we no longer need to operate in crisis mode. There exist free and open-source competitors to Zoom, which could be hosted locally in BC or elsewhere in Canada. One such option is Jitsi Meet (https://meet.jit.si/). If hosted in Canada, this free Zoom alternative would be fully compliant with FIPPA as it stands. What is more, Canadian IT professionals would be able to inspect the software code themselves to ensure that user privacy is in fact protected -which one cannot do with a closed-source solution such as Zoom. Of course, this would require some public expenditure for servers and IT professionals to maintain them.

I understand that educators and students in this province want to continue some of the remote teaching practices that they became comfortable with during the early months of the pandemic. Implemented wisely, these practices can sometimes produce better learning outcomes and increase equity of access to learning as well. However, there is no need to hollow out British Columbians' data residency rights to make this possible. From where I stand, it appears that your government intends to undermine a key provision in FIPPA for no better reason than to save universities and school boards some money. This is shameful.

I hope that your government will do the right thing and withdraw Bill 22, for the sake of my my children and all British Columbians.

I am contacting you as a constituent of Oak Bay-Gordon Head with comments and questions on Bill 22, the proposed amendments to FIPPA.

I am quite concerned about the process to date, and I am also concerned about some of the proposed amendments.

On process, I would like you to tell me why the FIPPA amendments in Bill 22 are being proposed in advance of any periodic review by the all-party special committee, a function designated by the Act?

Also, on process, are you able to assure me that the proposed amendments will not be passed until supporting draft regulations have been made public for discussion and consultation?

On the proposed amendments, I am particularly concerned about giving more opportunity for public bodies to disregard access requests, e.g. if the request is "excessively broad" or doesn't "relate to the business of the public body". This is troubling; perhaps draft regulations may help to define these and other terms further?

I am also troubled by the proposal to exclude the Office of the Premier as a public body under the Act. Could you please explain the reason for this exclusion? From what I understand, removing the Office creates doubt, public confusion, and potential legal issues. If the activities and records of the Office are still accessible via the Act after the removal of the Office as a public body, please explain how this is so?

I am appalled at the proposed amendment to introduce a fee for the initial information request under the Act. This is shameful from a government and a party that fundamentally believes in equity among all citizens. As your government well knows, poverty, inequality, and the high cost of living in BC are of substantial concern. Making it more difficult to obtain information from public bodies – the very bodies that are supported and funded by BC residents – does little to respect the citizen as your ultimate employer.

My concerns are genuine and substantial. I trust I will hear from you soon in response to my letter and my questions.

On behalf of the 47,000 members of the British Columbia Teachers' Federation (BCTF), I am writing to express our strong opposition to Bill 22 and the proposed changes to the Freedom of Information and Privacy Protection Act (FIPPA).

As stated by the Freedom of Information and Privacy Association (FIPA), who conducted a thorough review of the bill, "this Bill will undermine access to information and make public bodies less transparent. It is a step backwards for openness and accountability, and a missed opportunity to improve the information rights of British Columbians."

These concerns are echoed by BC's Information and Privacy Commissioner, who wrote Minister Lisa Beare to express concern that several of the proposed amendments to FIPPA are of "deep concern."<sup>2</sup>

Likewise, an analysis by the Center for Law and Democracy, using the global Right to Information (RTI) rating,<sup>3</sup> found that these amendments "would significantly undermine the right of individuals to access information held by public authorities." Bill 22 is a step backward for our province and any aspiration to be a leader in privacy legislation.

We are particularly concerned about the proposed removal for data residency within Canada. As digital technologies are increasingly used within public education, substantial amounts of personal data are being collected. Parents, students, and teachers trust our public bodies to keep this information safe. However, as highlighted in a comprehensive report on on privacy concerns in K-12 education,<sup>5</sup> there has been a proliferation of cloud-based education services in BC, such as those provided by Google with servers based in the United States.

Data stored in a foreign jurisdiction is subject to the laws of that country. This poses significant privacy risks, and risks will be amplified as some jurisdictions lobby to get rid of the end-to-end encryption of

data. The end of data residency requirements also increases the ability of private technology companies to access and monetize educational data, extending the privatisation of public education.

The BCTF believes that privacy must be prioritized as a cornerstone of our public education system. Bill 22 will undermine the privacy rights of all British Columbians, as well as trust in the government to protect these rights.

We join the Freedom of Information and Privacy Association, and a growing number of unions, academics, and other civil society partners, 6 in calling on your government to:

We have shared democratic values and I would like to think that we both believe in the fundamental need to increase the transparency of public bodies by reducing barriers and improving access to information. You said you were going to make improvements as recently as 2017. Your proposed amendments in Bill 22 fail to meet those commitments or make things better.

I find it hard to believe that you are improving accountability or improving my access to information - especially when you see it more important to shield the Premier's office from scrutiny and put in place a transparency tax.

Colin Gabelmann, the original drafter of the Freedom of Information and Privacy Protection Act, an MLA like yourself, sees this as a step backwards. The independent commissioner has serious concerns. A review by the Centre for Law and Democracy indicates the changes mean you are lowering the bar across Canada and moving BC toward mediocrity. A broad swath of civil society is united in opposition to these changes. I'm starting to doubt whether you are putting people first and question whether I can trust you and your mandate letters. Don't you think that you are on the wrong side of this one?

I'm asking you to reconsider these actions:

- Withdraw this Bill
- Recognize the role of all-party special committee and allow it to complete its work, including an open consultation process
- Commit, on record, to introduce comprehensive amendments to FIPPA that reflect the recommendations of past and current special committees.

Please help me regain trust in public bodies by being more transparent instead of taking a step backwards.

Thank you for taking the time to respond, I do appreciate it. In the spirit of transparency and creating space for dialogue, I have copied the Information and Privacy Commissioner for British Columbia, which I should have done initially, my apologies.

I just wanted to point out that you did not address my concern in your response.

The NDP, in my opinion, are NOT being transparent with data related to the pandemic and with the proposed Bill 22 changes access to data/information will only become more problematic - less transparency, more redacted docs, less access to data, less accessible to the public. I'm sure you are fully aware of the dialogue around this; the BC NDP are willfully ignoring these requests for data/discourse in any public forum - BC has been singled out for this by well respected Canadian and international researchers, physicians, epidemiologists, etc. The health of BC is suffering as a result of withholding data and also the timely access to data.

I respectfully disagree that FIOPPA is not working for people, it's actually the way BC NDP are handling data that is not working. Bringing in a fee, is going to prevent release of data in addition to delaying any requests for data that may be granted. What is not currently working is the withholding of critical data that would allow citizens to be informed and facilitate appropriate and safe decision making. As it stands now, the public been promised transparent access to data related to the ongoing pandemic yet it has not been provided. My personal favourite is around covid data and schools - parents have a right to know where risks exists, and how much risk there is, so we can make the determination of safety. The fact that this decision making resides with the government because we don't have transparent sharing of data (schools, hospitals, community spread, etc.) is appalling.

People are waiting too long under the 'old system' in place now because the current BC NDP government is NOT making information public that should be in a democratic society. There is no need to respond. I would hope the MLAs, the premier, the PHO, etc. are keenly aware of the issue around the provision of data in this province and I would hope that this is rectified immediately, as was promised to the public of BC when Penny Daflos brought this issue somewhat mainstream.

Bill 22 should NOT pass as is - it is NOT in the best interests of British Columbians, as outlined in OIPC Commissioner Michael McEvoy's letter, Oct 20, 2021 (<a href="https://www.oipc.bc.ca/public-comments/3592">https://www.oipc.bc.ca/public-comments/3592</a>), and I strongly agree that:

"We are living in a time when people are seeking more answers, and greater accountability, from public bodies and their governments, amplifying the
significant role that freedom of information plays in allowing people to get information about what their governments are doing, and the decisions
that affect them. To add another barrier of access at a time when transparency is critical is deeply troubling.
 Further, I am troubled that there would be no ability for my office to waive an application fee if it is in the public interest. "

I hope this note finds you well. Thank you for your message regarding the government's recently announced Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Amendment Act. Your message was redirected to our constituency office as you a in Vancouver Fairview.

B.C.'s Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FOIPPA) is outdated, last updated a decade ago, and is not working for people. The COVID-19 pandemic changed the way we live, work, connect with loved ones and access the services we need. Government's proposed changes will help B.C. keep pace with new technology, ensure timely access to information, strengthen privacy protections and improve services for people in B.C.

We are committed to open and transparent access to information. In fact, this government was the one who saw the need for greater transparency and accountability for British Columbians when we enacted the FOIPPA legislation nearly three decades ago to hold current, and future, governments accountable to the people who trust them to make decisions on their behalf and to act with integrity. And today, we continue this

tradition in culture and in practice in many ways including the addition of 40%more proactive disclosures of information that the public can access for free. We added five more proactive disclosure directives last year alone and earlier this month we released each Minister's estimates binder which are arguably the most crucial document to government's priorities and decision-making.

The proposed updates to FOIPPA will continue this commitment to transparency through changes such as:

- Adding ministerial power to add subsidiary entities as new public bodies;
- Requiring mandatory breach reporting to the potentially harmed individual and the Privacy Commissioner;
- Adding requirements for privacy management programs; and
- Adding a new offence for wilfully evading FOI.

In addition to the improvements we are making by amending FOIPPA, we have committed \$5.3M to modernize and improve the process to manage the over 13,000 FOI requests the Province receives each year.

We have shared democratic values and I would like to think that we both believe in the fundamental need to increase the transparency of public bodies by reducing barriers and improving access to information. You said you were going to make improvements as recently as 2017. Your proposed amendments in Bill 22 fail to meet those commitments or make things better.

I find it hard to believe that you are improving accountability or improving my access to information - especially when you see it more important to shield the Premier's office from scrutiny and put in place a transparency tax.

Colin Gabelmann, the original drafter of the Freedom of Information and Privacy Protection Act, an MLA like yourself, sees this as a step backwards. The independent commissioner has serious concerns. A review by the Centre for Law and Democracy indicates the changes mean you are lowering the bar across Canada and moving BC toward mediocrity. A broad swath of civil society is united in opposition to these changes. I'm starting to doubt whether you are putting people first and question whether I can trust you and your mandate letters. Don't you think that you are on the wrong side of this one?

I'm asking you to reconsider these actions:

- Withdraw this Bill
- Recognize the role of all-party special committee and allow it to complete its work, including an open consultation process
- Commit, on record, to introduce comprehensive amendments to FIPPA that reflect the recommendations of past and current special committees.

Please help me regain trust in public bodies by being more transparent instead of taking a step backwards.

We have shared democratic values and I would like to think that we both believe in the fundamental need to increase the transparency of public bodies by reducing barriers and improving access to information. You said you were going to make improvements as recently as 2017. Your proposed amendments in Bill 22 fail to meet those commitments or make things better.

I find it hard to believe that you are improving accountability or improving my access to information - especially when you see it more important to shield the Premier's office from scrutiny and put in place a transparency tax.

Colin Gabelmann, the original drafter of the Freedom of Information and Privacy Protection Act, an MLA like yourself, sees this as a step backwards. The independent commissioner has serious concerns. A review by the Centre for Law and Democracy indicates the changes mean you are lowering the bar across Canada and moving BC toward mediocrity. A broad swath of civil society is united in opposition to these changes. I'm starting to doubt whether you are putting people first and question whether I can trust you and your mandate letters. Don't you think that you are on the wrong side of this one?

I'm asking you to reconsider these actions:

- Withdraw this Bill
- Recognize the role of all-party special committee and allow it to complete its work, including an open consultation process
- Commit, on record, to introduce comprehensive amendments to FIPPA that reflect the recommendations of past and current special committees.

Dear Minister Beare:

I have been very proud to say so recently, in light of the current government's performance both in minority and majority, especially with respect to BC's response to COVID-19.

Proud that is until now. The Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Amendment Act, 2021, is, on balance, retrograde legislation. It should be withdrawn and re-written.

I have read the Privacy Commissioner's letter of October 20, 2021 and generally agree with his comments. Some of Bill 22's provisions are welcome but overall the bill is not a worthy effort.

I know how challenging the Act can be for government. I provided legal advice to the City of Vancouver on access and privacy issues while employed there. However, weakening public access to information is ultimately corrosive to democracy and should be resisted.

Fees for access are misguided. They will penalize the wrong people. To the media, they will merely be a business expense, perhaps even tax deductible. To ordinary citizens looking for government (i.e. our) information, they will be one more reason to just not bother. At first blush, that may seem like a benefit but is "trust us to govern well" really your motto? What about when its the other guys turn again?

The discretion left to future regulations is also troubling. Consider what that might lead to in the wrong hands.

I am also concerned about the data residency provisions; the Canadian public is not well informed about the sweeping powers the US government has over data stored in that country.

s.22 I have occasionally abstained from voting in general elections, notably when the government seemed bedeviled by hubris. Glen Clark comes to mind.

I urge you to withdraw the bill.

#### Request

Looking at the additional section 18.1 (screenshot below), it reads to me like it will be the head of a public body who determines what kinds of disclosures could "reasonably be expected" to be harmful "with respect to Indigenous people" - rather than, say, the Indigenous people themselves. Am I interpreting that correctly?

- Disclosing information that could be considered harmful under the new proposed clause 18.1 will be modelled on existing sections 21 and 22, which, similarly, have the following requirements.
  - The public body will be required to provide an Indigenous third party written notice if there is intention to give access to a record that contains potentially harmful information under clause 18.1.

 Additionally, there will be a requirement to provide the third party with the opportunity to provide feedback on whether the disclosure of the record would be indeed be harmful and the significance of the harm.

What will the process be for Indigenous peoples seeking information that public bodies determine would be harmful to disclose if the Indigenous peoples disagree with that conclusion? Will it be a more expedited or direct process than the current complaint model? Will there be fees attached, either to any complaint process or to information requests from Indigenous peoples generally?

- The process will flow through the existing requirements found in section 23 and 24 in the Act.
- The current and proposed amended fees structure does not include fees associated with consultation or complaints.
- Should these amendments receive Royal Assent, more information on processes and procedures related to these new provisions will be available in the period following.
- All applicants have the right to submit a complaint or request a review to the OIPC should they disagree with a public body's determination.

Also, are you able to provide more detailed information on which First Nations and Indigenous organizations participated in consultation on this bill? There doesn't seem to be any information in the consultation report. How many organizations and what kind of consultation was undertaken (meetings with ministry officials, online survey, written submissions, etc.).

- The Ministry of Citizens' Services has had meaningful discussions with the Union of BC Indian Chiefs, First Nations Summit, First Nations Leadership Council, the BC Assembly of First Nations.
- The Ministry also engaged with Treaty First Nations including meetings with representatives from the five Maa-nulth nations, Tsawwassen First Nation and the Nisga'a Lisims Government.
- To gain the perspective of Indigenous Peoples on access to information and privacy, we have twice invited leaders of over 200 B.C. First Nations to provide input, most recently, through an online questionnaire.
  - In response to this invitation, representatives from the Stk'emlupsemc Te
     Secwepemc Nation requested a meeting with Ministry staff, which was held in early September 2021.
- In alignment with B.C.'s Declaration Act, we will continue to work in consultation and co-operation with Indigenous Peoples as we move forward with this work.

And did the Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation play any role in the consultation or provide advice to the ministry on aspects of the bill relating to disclosure of information to First Nations?

 The Ministry of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation provided a great deal of advice and guidance around consultation and on the provisions relating to disclosure of information to First Nations.

I recognize this request is fairly detailed but I'd appreciate as much of a response as possible by 4PM Friday. Any information you're able to provide today before 4PM would also be appreciated.

- The bill is now before members of the legislature and we will await the outcome of their debate and vote.
- Q. Still interested in the fee structure and especially what, if any, consideration of other jurisdictions went into the decision to likely implement one
- B.C.'s fee is not yet set. A fee that aligns with other jurisdictions will be determined through regulation soon. Other jurisdictions:
- o Alberta: \$25 for first request \$50 per continuing request
- o Saskatchewan: \$20 per requests to local governments
- o Ontario: \$5 per request o Nova Scotia: \$5 per request
- o Prince Edward Island: \$5 per request
- o Nunavut: \$25 per request o Canada: \$5 per request.
- o Manitoba, Quebec, New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Labrador, Yukon and Northwest Territories have no fees.
- Q. Also curious about the info-sharing with First Nations
- Information sharing with First Nations was something we heard a lot about through our government's extensive consultation.
- Through the legislation, we are:
- o Removing outdated language in reference to Indigenous partners.
- o Creating new powers that increase public bodies' ability to share information with Indigenous governments and governing entities.
- o Adding new protections to Indigenous peoples' sensitive cultural information by requiring public bodies to seek consent from Indigenous governing entities before disclosing information through FOI.
- o And removing the 15-year limit on the existing protections where information may harm an Indigenous government, so that we can protect that information indefinitely.
- We must work together to remove barriers and we will continue to work in consultation and co-operation with Indigenous Peoples as we move forward with this work.

#### Request

I would like to speak with Minister Beare regarding the proposed amendments to access to information legislation in Bill 22 for a story I'm working on for this weekend. Can you please let me know a time that would be convenient for the Minister today? I wouldn't imagine needing more than 15-20 min.

I've listed questions below so the Minister can prepare as needed, please let me know if anything needs clarification.

Thanks very much, Nathan

- The access to information legislation is currently under review by a committee, why couldn't the introduction of amendments have waited until the committee had finished it's review? What is the rush?
- The proposed \$25 fee for filing an access to information request jumps B.C. from the cheapest province to file an FOI to the most expensive. Concerns have been raised that this fee introduces inequity into British Columbian's right to access information lower income individuals and non-profits or other groups with limited budgets will face a significantly higher barrier to entry than more well-funded individuals or groups
- o What is the justification for introducing this kind of inequity into the legislation? o How will the government plan to address or mitigate this new inequality in the public's access to information?
- What is the justification for the removal of the Office of the Premier from Schedule 2? Is this connected in any way to the increase in FOIs filed to the Premier's office by political parties since the NDP came into power?

Recommendation: provide on background

Hello Nathan and thank you for your request. Given the legislation is currently before the House and in debate, we are unable to answer aspects of your questions at this time until the fee is set in regulation. I will point out that the recommended fee was not \$25 -this # was used by media given it is in the \$5-\$50 range of other jurisdictions.

During consultation we heard from thousands of people, Indigenous communities, businesses, organizations, subject-matter experts across government, the privacy commissioner and past Special Committees of the Legislative Assembly through extensive consultation over several years. The last two Special Committees made several recommendations that were not enacted by the previous government. In fact, the Act has not been substantially updated since 2011.

The tabled legislation includes many of the recommendations of the past two Special Committees, such as:

- o Making the destruction of documents to evade access an offense; and
- o Making it mandatory to notify individuals and the commissioner of privacy breaches.
- o We've also already acted on other key recommendations to create a duty to document and expand proactive disclosures.

The mandated role of the Special Committee is to review existing legislation. We anticipate that the new Special Committee would, if we waited to amend the Act, repeat many of these previous recommendations.

To answer your questions related to section 5 regarding the Premier's Office, this is a clarification of legal language. The Premier's Office was under the list of public bodies that are not ministries and therefore officially subject to different rules under the legislation. However, they've always been treated as a ministry, and this change reinforces that. We have also tabled amending language on this point. We added the Premiers office to the definition of ministry to remove any doubt.

For further background:

- The Premier is considered the First Minister, and the Office of the Premier the ministry of the first minister.
- It is treated as such under BC's Constitution Act and elsewhere.
- Removing the Office of the Premier from Schedule 2 will clarify that they are subject to requirements under the Act that reference "ministries" and not those that reference "a public body that is not a ministry" the former being the higher standard (e.g. for doing privacy impact assessments under 69(5) AND FOR PROACTIVE DISCLOSURE DIRECTIVES)
- The Office of the Premier has always been treated as a ministry.
- Applicants may direct access requests to the Office of the Premier, and using the online form will still be able to select "Office of the Premier".

The bill is before members of the legislature and we will await the outcome of their debate and vote.
