Canada Committee 100 Society (CCS100) is a community-based research organization promoting inclusion and equality. It is registered as a non-partisan and not-for-profit organization in BC. Since its founding in 2018, CCS100 has received several project grants from the province of BC, ranging from community engagement and outreach to quantitative and qualitative research. All projects were completed on time and final reports were all submitted in due course.

One such project was a grant of \$20,000 in 2022 for participating in the project to help the BC Government facilitate engagement meetings to collect race-based data to tackle systemic racism in public sector policies, programs, and services. Stop Anti-Asian Hate Crimes Advocacy Group Association of Canada (SAAHCAG) is a community organization to promote social harmony, fight racism, and build connections in Canada. It is incorporated in B.C., as a not-for-profit and non-partisan association of Canadians with Asian heritages. As a newly established community organization emerging in response to the rising of anti-Asian discrimination and racism during the COVID pandemic. It had started operating and organizing activities in line with its mandate, despite the formal incorporation being completed in Dec. 2021.

Since its founding, the SAAHCAG has been active in engaging the Asian communities and delivering events in line with the mandate and objectives of the organization, for example:

- We have successfully hosted, 60 online public lectures, 16 community events, and 8 in-person youth civic engagement programs. One of the community events was a one-day summer "Concert in the Park", with over 1,300 attendees.

It had started operating and organizing activities in line with its mandate, despite the formal incorporation being completed in Dec. 2021. Since its founding, the SAAHCAG has been active in engaging the Asian communities and delivering events in line with the mandate and objectives of the organization, for example: à CWe have successfully hosted, 60 online public lectures, 16 community events, and 8 in-person youth civic engagement programs. One of the community events was a one-day summer "Concert in the Park", with over 1,300 attendees. à CWe have successfully raised over \$60,000 from community donations; à CWe have 20-plus regular active volunteers supporting various activities of the organization; à CWe have a focus on the Chinese community and an extensive connection with Asian communities at large; and a significant community contributor in BC, including a nominee for the Breaking Barriers Award of BC Multiculturalism and Anti-Racism Award 2022 and 2023 from the BC Government. This year, we won the BC Multiculturalism and Anti-Racism Grant of \$5000 to run a project to showcase the community's efforts in promoting inclusion and equality and fighting anti-Asian racism. The project is currently being implemented as originally planned and is expected to complete as scheduled.					•

What is the purpose of the BC Demographic Survey?

This survey will inform our efforts to identify systemic racism in government programs and services and make B.C. a more equitable province.

We have heard from many Indigenous and other racialized people that they are being left behind because government services weren't designed with them in mind. The information that we collect through the BC Demographic Survey will help identify gaps in our services so that we can then make them more accessible and inclusive.

Why is BC Stats collecting this information?

During the development of the Anti-Racism Data Act, Indigenous, Black and other racialized communities called on us to take a coordinated approach to collecting information so that individuals are not asked to provide the same information multiple times.

Communities also told us that we need a single organization to lead the collection, use and disclosure of personal information to help identify systemic racism. We also need to provide clear direction on how to collect this information in a culturally safe way.

Doesn't government already collect this information?

While the Government of Canada already collects some of this information on the Canadian Census of Population, the information is kept confidential by Statistics Canada. This means that we're not able to use it to identify gaps in provincial services.

While we do collect some personal information to deliver services in B.C., in general, we do not ask for or collect information on race, ethnicity, faith or similar identity factors. This means that we don't have data on where specifically people face barriers when using government services.

The information that we collect through the BC Demographic Survey will help identify gaps in our services so that we can make them more accessible and inclusive.

Will I be asked about my experience of racism as part of this survey? No.

The questions in this survey are focused on topics such as ethnicity, gender, education, as well as other aspects of identity to help us understand where systemic racism is impacting our services.

These questions were chosen based on what we heard from Indigenous, Black and other racialized communities during <u>engagement</u> on the Anti-Racism Data Act. Findings from the BC Human Rights Commissioner's report, <u>The Grandmother Perspective</u> were also used to shape the questions and the focus on institutional or systemic racism.

Taking the Survey

How long will the survey take to complete?

The survey will take approximately 15 minutes to complete per household member.

There are multiple people in my household. Do we each need to complete the survey?

Yes.

Each household member will need to complete a separate survey if they wish to participate. You may fill out the survey on behalf of another person in your household. If a child under the age of 13 wishes to participate, a parent or legal guardian will need to complete a survey on their behalf.

What do I need to fill out the survey?

We suggest that you have your combined BC Driver's Licence or BC Services Card with your Personal Health Number available. You will be asked to enter some identifying information to confirm you are a resident of B.C. and to enable linking with existing administrative information.

Do I have to provide my Personal Health Number for this survey?

You are not required to provide your Personal Health Number. However, we encourage you to provide it if you feel comfortable.

Will you use my name? Will my name be put on a mailing list? No.

Do I need to answer every question?

How is my information protected?

BC Stats has more than 100 years of experience safely collecting information and using data to help improve services for residents of B.C. All responses to this survey will be kept confidential and stored securely with access restricted to only select BC Stats employees.

BC Stats employees take an oath under the <u>Statistics Act</u>. Under Section 9 of the Statistics Act, BC Stats cannot disclose information that could be used to identify an individual return to any person, institution or government agency. The Statistics Act stipulates strict financial penalties, and any employee who contravene the secrecy provisions would be fined and fired.



2023 BC Demographic Survey Community Grants GUIDELINES

1. Introduction

The *Anti-Racism Data Act* (ARDA, the Act) became law on June 2, 2022 and outlines a framework for the safe collection and use of personal information to identify and dismantle systemic racism in government programs and services. To support this, the Province is launching the BC Demographic Survey which will inform efforts to identify systemic racism and improve public services for everyone.

Survey participation is essential to the research needed to change systemic barriers. To encourage everyone to take part, the Government of B.C. has created a grant for community engagement in completing and disseminating the BC Demographic Survey (See attached Survey FAQ).

1.1 Program Objectives:

The 2023/2023 BC Demographic Survey Community Grant is for community organizations or Indigenous (First Nations, Métis or Inuit) governments, tribal councils, band councils, or organizations to raise awareness of the BC Demographic Survey with their communities through outreach activities and to offer community members support to complete the survey.

This approach aims to foster trust and participation for the BC Demographic Survey among communities across the province.

2. Who Can Apply

2.1 Eligible Applicants:

- Organizations must be registered non-profits, incorporated, and in good standing under the Societies Act [SBC2015], or a British Columbia-based, federally registered charity, also in good standing.
- Indigenous (First Nations, Métis or Inuit) governments, tribal councils, band councils, or organizations.
- Applicants should be in good standing with the Government of B.C. with respect to submission history for previous grant final reports.
- Eligible organizations may submit only one application for a 2023 BC Demographic Survey Community Grant intake.

2.1 Ineligible Applicants:

Organizations that do not meet the eligibility criteria outlined above but wish to undertake a project that meets the 2023 BC Demographic Survey Community Grant objectives are encouraged to partner with an organization that meets the above criteria. The organization that meets the criteria will then act as the fiscal agent for the grant.

3. Grant Application Process

3.1 Funding:

The total funding available for the 2023 BC Demographic Survey Community Grant is \$312,500.

The maximum grant funding per organization is \$2,500. Therefore, applications for funding must not exceed \$2,500. Any project applications that seek funding more than \$2,500 will not be considered for a grant.

3.2 Eligibility:

All funds are to be used for outreach activities designed to engage people in B.C. for the purposes of raising awareness of the BC Demographic Survey and providing encouragement and support to complete the survey. Proposed outreach activities can include, but are not limited to:

- Community organizations, Indigenous organizations and Indigenous
 Governing Entities to conduct community outreach to promote the survey
 and disseminate information about the benefits to responding and
 partaking in the survey.
- Organizations can assist by building trust and marketing the survey to increase participation.
- Organizations can provide tools for respondents to self-complete the survey such as an Internet-enabled tablet, laptop or desktop computer at a community or other similar event, in an office, or out in the community.
- Adaptation (including translation, for example, into Indigenous or other languages) of promotional materials, social media posts, or presentations for the purpose of broader knowledge mobilization to different audiences.
- Virtual networking.
- Media events such as television or radio presentations.
- Speaker events or series.
- Newsletter and/or email blasts about the survey
- Development/use of interactive technologies, audiovisual products, educational aids, instruments, or equipment to facilitate completion of the survey.
- Face-to-face outreach on the survey to create awareness with hard-to-reach communities.
- Use of BC Demographic Survey shareable content/amplification kits.

Eligible applications must:

- Involve activities occurring between July 3, 2023, and September 29, 2023. Activities occurring before or after this date range are **not eligible**.
- Provide financial information including total revenues, expenditures, assets, and liabilities for the organization's most recent fiscal year.
- Provide project budget information, including all cost and expenditures, actual and forecasted, associated with the proposed outreach activities.

• Ensure that wherever possible, events and projects are accessible both financially and physically, and that they are inclusive of multiple groups.

3.3 Eligible Expenses:

Eligible expenses are the actual and direct costs related to the applicant's outreach activities. Selected applicants must spend funding in one or more of the categories listed below:

- **Equipment rental or purchase** (e.g., purchase of an Internet-enabled tablet, etc.)
- **Event or workshop materials** (e.g., pens, paper, other tools, food, refreshments, etc.)
- **Fees** (e.g., project coordinator's fees, workshop fees, training/educational fees, etc.)
- Honorariums, fees and contract agreements (e.g., Indigenous or other cultural elders, facilitators, coaches and cultural workers, technicians etc.)
 * Note conflicts of interest need to be identified in advance.
- Marketing and communications (e.g., newspaper ads, social media, graphic design fees, etc.)
- **Transportation** (e.g., transportation costs where transportation is a barrier to participation, travel costs for outreach work, etc.)
- Venue rental (e.g., any identified programming space, etc.)
- Volunteer expenses
- Other

3.4 Key Dates:

Grant Opens: May 29, 2023

Grant Closes: June 23, 2023

Grant Notification: by July 7

Project Dates: July 7, 2023 - September 29, 2023

3.5 Preparation of Grant Application:

All applications must include the following components:

- 1. Completed **application form**, which includes:
 - a. Registered society or charity number
 - b. Outreach activity information
 - c. Outreach activity budget
 - d. Organizational information
 - e. Organizational financial information

3.7 Application Submission and Deadline

The Ministry of Citizens' Services ("the Ministry") will only accept one (1) application from each applicant organization.

Completed applications will only be accepted online through application form at the <u>BC Demographic Survey Community Engagement Grant website</u>. Applications submitted by mail, courier, fax, or email **will not** be accepted. If you require accommodations in completing the application, please reach out to: ARDA.engagement@gov.bc.ca.
