SUBJECT: Minister of Education's Trade Mission to China, South Korea

and Japan

BACKGROUND:

Trade and investment are key drivers of job growth in British Columbia. International trade and investment has enabled a high level of economic growth in British Columbia; one in five jobs is directly linked to exports; inbound investment drives job creation and increases productivity and research and development; strategic investments make British Columbia's key sectors globally competitive, grow clusters and drive exports.

The *BC Jobs Plan* identifies International Education as one of eight jobs plan sectors. International education is now British Columbia's fourth largest export industry.

The Throne Speech 2015 specifically referenced the value of international education to British Columbia's economy in terms of spending and job creation and acknowledged the importance of international relationships and overseas partnerships. The Throne Speech 2015 also referenced the British Columbia Offshore School Program, indicating government's commitment to this important component of international education.

British Columbia's international education strategy (launched in 2012) identifies China, South Korea, and Japan as among the top 10 priority countries.

Ben Stewart, British Columbia's Special Representative in Asia is responsible for leading the development of agreements with other governments and maximizing strategic opportunities resulting from trade and investment missions. Mr. Stewart is keenly aware of the British Columbia Offshore School Program and was supportive of the Offshore School application for the new Offshore School opening in Japan in September. Through his overseas connections, he has indicated that there is high interest in Asia for the British Columbia Offshore School Program.

The students of these three nations make up 65 percent of K-12 international students studying in British Columbia and 85 percent of British Columbia's Offshore School Students.

The British Columbia K-12 International Education Strategic Action Plan identifies four key pillars to further international education in British Columbia. Critical to program success is the ongoing establishment and cultivation of strong global relationships. In support of the *BC Jobs Plan* and the BC International Education Strategy, Minister Fassbender is planning a nine day mission to China, South Korea, and Japan in late May/early June 2015.

DISCUSSION:

The purpose of the Mission is to promote trade relationships between British Columbia and key trading partners by developing relationships and signing partnership agreements regarding international education.

It is important for British Columbia to maintain and expand the education relationship with China, Korea and Japan. As the first mission for Minister Fassbender as Minister of Education, it will also signal his recognition and ongoing commitment of the long standing relations with our Asian priority counties in promoting mutual interests in the education sector. This mission is supported by the consulate generals from China, Japan and Korea.

The Ministries of International Trade and Advanced Education, and the British Columbia Council for International Education have been engaged to provide expertise and planning support.

Mission Dates (proposed): May 30 to June 6, 2015

Rationale for change of dates:

- Dates originally proposed (June 13 to 21, 2015) limit in-country support for mission. Specifically:
 - the Ministry of International Trade has advised that the in-market Education Marketing Managers are unavailable during these dates as they will be in British Columbia;
 - support from British Columbia Council for International Education is unavailable as the organization hosts British Columbia's flagship international education event, which takes place June 21 to 24, 2015. This conference brings together over 300 participants from British Columbia, Canada and internationally,

including foreign consul generals, trade commissioners and other high profile delegates. The Ministers of Education and Advanced Education were both speakers at the 2014 event.

An alternate June 13 to 21, 2015 agenda has been included as an attachment.

Objectives/Activities/Outcomes

Minister Fassbender's mission to Asia is an important opportunity to enhance awareness of British Columbia's world-class education system through supporting British Columbia Offshore School programs, highlight and strengthen British Columbia's relations with China, South Korea and Japan, and to develop new education collaborations with potential partners.

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Key Objectives (proposed):

- To strengthen existing government relations;
- To establish new government to government relationships in key second-tier cities;
- To highlight education pathways for students (British Columbia offshore schools to British Columbia K-12 sector, post-secondary, and within post-secondary from colleges to universities):

- To highlight the 20th anniversary of the British Columbia Guangdong sister province relationship and showcase the robust education ties between government and institutions in the two provinces;

 - Promote British Columbia as a high quality education destination;
 - o Promote the two-way global flow of students and ideas between countries; and

• To provide cross-sector support for additional trade and investment engagement.

Key Activities (proposed):

- Signing of pathways partnership agreements between British Columbia post-secondary institutions and Chinese institutions/offshore schools;
- Renewing certification agreements between British Columbia and British Columbia Offshore Schools;
- Meeting with senior education officials from the Ministry of Education, Provincial Departments of Education, and Municipal Education Commissions;
- Meeting with senior officials from the Canadian Embassy and Canadian Consulate General Offices;
- Meeting with Offshore school owners;
- Visiting offshore schools, including a visit to Dalian Maple Leaf to acknowledge its 20th anniversary;
- Briefing with British Columbia Trade and Investment Representative Offices;
- Participating in Friends of British Columbia receptions;
- Participating in educational site visits and cultural events; and
- Supporting other key British Columbia trade and investment sectors.

Outcomes (proposed):

- Demonstrated commitment to maintenance of strong relationship with established priority markets;
- New and renewed government to government Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) frameworks for further collaboration between British Columbia and China, Korea and Japan including:
 - Commitment to renew the 2008 MOU between the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Advanced Education, and the Gyeonggi Provincial Office of Education of Gyeonggi Province through a signed Letter of Intent (LOI);
 - Renewal of the 2008 MOU between the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Advanced Education, and the Seoul Metropolitan Office of Education;
 - Renewal of the 2004 MOU between the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Education for Beijing;
 - Signing of a dual ministry LOI with the Ministry of Advanced Education and the provincial Department of Education in Harbin regarding mutual education cooperation; and
 - Signing of an MOU with the Tokyo Metropolitan Government Office Education;

- Promotion of British Columbia as a high-quality education destination through governmental meetings, Friends of British Columbia receptions and networking opportunities;
- Acquisition of significant market intelligence about China's, Japan's and South Korea's education system and policy goals;
- Increased opportunities for further education collaboration and partnerships in a range of areas, including student, faculty and staff exchange;
- Offshore school partnership agreements with educational institutions;
- Letter of Congratulations to Sherman Jen in acknowledgement of Maple Leaf Education Systems 20th anniversary; and
- Fulfilment of International Education Strategy commitments.

DISCUSSION PAPER

I. Background

Trade and investment are key drivers of job growth in British Columbia. International trade and investment has enabled a high level of economic growth in British Columbia; one in five jobs is directly linked to exports; inbound investment drives job creation and increases productivity and research and development; strategic investments make British Columbia's key sectors globally competitive, grow clusters and drive exports.

The *BC Jobs Plan* identifies International Education as one of eight jobs plan sectors. International education is now British Columbia's fourth largest export industry. British Columbia's international education strategy (launched in 2012) identifies China, South Korea, and Japan as among the top 10 priority countries.

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The Throne Speech 2015 specifically referenced the value of international education to BC's economy in terms of spending and job creation and acknowledged the importance of international relationships and overseas partnerships. The Throne Speech 2015 also referenced the BC Offshore School Program, indicating government's commitment to this important component of international education.

Ben Stewart, BC's Special Representative in Asia is responsible for leading the development of agreements with other governments and maximizing strategic opportunities resulting from trade and investment missions. Mr. Stewart is keenly aware of the BC Offshore School Program and was supportive of the Offshore School application for the new Offshore School opening in Japan in September. Through his overseas connections, he has indicated that there is high interest in Asia for the BC Offshore School Program.

In the 2012/13 academic year, international students in BC spent \$2.3 billion on tuition, accommodation, food and discretionary items. This sum is equivalent to a direct contribution of \$1.63 billion in provincial GDP, it creates close to 25,500 jobs and provides almost \$80 million in direct government revenue generated.

The students of these three nations make up almost 50 percent of all international students studying in British Columbia, 65 percent of K-12 international students studying in British Columbia and 85 percent of British Columbia's Offshore School Students.

Critical to international education program success is the ongoing establishment and cultivation of strong global relationships. It is important for British Columbia to maintain and expand the education relationship with China, South Korea and Japan, which is the impetus for the planned trade mission to Asia Asia. As the first mission for Minister Fassbender as the Minister of Education, it will also signal his recognition and ongoing commitment of the long standing relationship with Asia Asian countries in promoting and furthering further mutual education interests.

China

China is British Columbia's second-largest trading partner, and accounts for 18.1 per cent of British Columbia's commodity exports - a total value of more than \$5.7 billion. China is the world's second largest economy, the most populous country, and home to the largest education system in the world. The largest human migration in world history is also taking place in the country with approximately 300 million people moving from rural areas to urban centers in search of better economic opportunities and education.

Although the admission rate into universities in China has increased over the last two decades, the demand for post-secondary education is immense and the country cannot keep pace with this compelling need. As a result, an increasing number of Chinese students choose to study abroad every year, which is encouraged by the Chinese Government. Information provided by the Chinese Ministry of Education shows that in 2012, 399,600 Chinese students went to study abroad, an increase of 17.7 percent from 2011. Many Chinese parents choose to send their children abroad at the K-12 level in order to advantage them for entry into post-secondary.

The implementation of China's National Plan for Medium and Long-term Education Reform and Development (2010-2020) also presents opportunities to partner with China to expand and improve specific aspects of the Chinese education system such as vocational training. This has

long been an objective for China. Improving access to skills training is a priority for the Government of British Columbia.

In 2012/13, British Columbia hosted 25,800 students from China including 13,300 in public post-secondary institutions, 5,800 in private post-secondary institutions, 2,400 in private language schools and 4,300 in the K-12 system. This ranked China as the number one source country for international students in the province. It is also identified as a key partner under British Columbia's International Education Strategy.

China is also home to 31 British Columbia Certified Offshore schools with an enrollment of over 8,500 students. The Offshore School Program has resulted in the development of strong collaborative relationships with Chinese owners and has positively influenced BC's reputation in China. Three new offshore schools will begin operation in China in the fall.

Education cooperation and exchanges between British Columbia and China's first-tier cities have been flourishing during the last few years. Many of China's second-tier cities are expanding rapidly with enormous investment in housing, commercial real estate, transport and power infrastructure. These cities present new opportunities for expanded engagement with this partner.

South Korea

South Korea is the world's 13th largest economy and eighth largest trading nation. As British Columbia's fourth-ranked trading partner, South Korea enjoys good relations with British Columbia.

South Korea's population is well educated, well-travelled and has a strong global orientation. There is good potential to increase the number of South Korean students in British Columbia and to expand the availability of the British Columbia education curriculum at schools operating in South Korea.

In 2012/13, British Columbia hosted 14,000 students from South Korea including 1,800 in public post-secondary institutions, 500 in private post-secondary institutions, 8,500 in private language schools and 3,200 in the K-12 system. This ranked Korea as the number two source country (after China) for international students in the province. It is also identified as a key partner under British Columbia's International Education Strategy.

Similar to BC, at the Korean national level, the Minister of Education in 2014/15 has been focussed on curricular innovation, emphasizing creativity, and an increased role for trades and vocational training. There is the potential for mutually beneficial conversations in this area.

South Korea has 5 British Columbia Certified Offshore schools with an enrollment of over close to 800 students.

Japan

Japan and British Columbia have a long and significant history of cultural and economic links. Japan is the world's third-largest economy, a leading importer of energy resources and a steady customer for wood products. It is also a world-leading market for clean technologies, digital media and international education.

BC is the largest exporter to Japan amongst the provinces, representing a 38.5% of the Canadian total. Japanese imports to BC comprised 6.1% of British Columbia's total imports. Current education reforms in Japan focus on diversifying education, promoting information technologies, and encouraging internationalisation. In recent years there is an increased focus on English education and study abroad.

In 2012/13, British Columbia hosted 12,900 students from Japan including 1,600 in public post-secondary institutions, 700 in private post-secondary institutions, 9,900 in private language schools and 700 in the K-12 system. This ranked Japan as the number three source country for international students in the province. It is also identified as a key partner under British Columbia's International Education Strategy.

British Columbia has approved its first offshore school in Japan, the Bunka Gakuen University Suginami Junior and Senior High School in Tokyo. The school is expected to start offering BC curriculum programs in April 2015.

- Demonstrated commitment to maintenance of strong relationship with established priority markets;
- New and renewed government to government MOU frameworks for further collaboration between British Columbia and China, Korea and Japan including:
 - Commitment to renew the 2008 MOU between the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Advanced Education and the Gyeonggi Provincial Office of Education of Gyeonggi Province through a signed Letter of Intent (LOI);
 - Renewal of the 2008 MOU between the Ministry of Education, The Ministry of

- Advanced Education and the Seoul Metropolitan Office of Education;
- Renewal of the 2004 MOU between the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Education for Beijing;
- Signing of a dual ministry LOI with the Ministry of Advanced Education and the provincial Department of Education in Harbin regarding mutual education cooperation; and
- Signing of an MOU with the Tokyo Metropolitan Government Office Education;
- Promotion of British Columbia as a high-quality education destination through governmental meetings, Friends of British Columbia receptions and networking opportunities;
- Acquisition of significant market intelligence about China's, Japan's and South Korea's education system and policy goals;
- Increased opportunities for further education collaboration and partnerships in a range of areas, including student, faculty and staff exchange;
- Offshore school partnership agreements with educational institutions;
- Letter of Congratulations to Sherman Jen in acknowledgement of Maple Leaf Education Systems 20th anniversary;
- Fulfilment of International Education Strategy commitments.

III. Mission Outline (Proposed)

China

The mission will begin in Beijing, where meetings will center on renewal and maintenance of existing relationships with the Ministry of Education and the Beijing Municipal Education Commission, as well as consultation with Canadian Embassy and British Columbia Trade and Investment Office representatives. A Friends of B.C. event will demonstrate the ongoing commitment and recognition of British Columbia institution alumni and key stakeholders as ambassadors for the province in China.

Following this, the program will go to Harbin, a second-tier city in Northern China. Education outreach will include meetings with British Columbia-China institutional partners and with the Provincial Department of Education to advance a government level relationship. This is an opportunity to advance school district and institutional equity in BC by promoting northern school districts and post-secondary institutions as desirable British Columbia destinations for study. There is also opportunity to sign a dual ministry LOI on behalf of the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Advanced Education regarding mutual education cooperation.

After Harbin, the delegation will travel to Dalian to strengthen and renew relationships with Maple Leaf Education Systems (MLES). MLES started the first BC offshore school and is celebrating its 20—year anniversary. The mission will visit BC's flagship offshore school, Maple Leaf International School - Dalian. The mission will also meet with the MLES founder, Dr. Sherman Jen, to sign school certification agreements for all MLES BC offshore schools.

The delegation will then travel to Guangzhou, Guangdong Province in the southern part of China to highlight the sister-province relations and pave the way for the Premier's mission to Guangdong in the fall to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the Sister-Province relationship. The overall focus in Guangzhou will be on partnership recognition and marking the 20th anniversary of the sister-province relationship with a Friends of B.C. event.

South Korea

In Seoul, meetings with the BC Trade and Investment Representatives office (BCTIR) and the Canadian Embassy will strengthen working relationships with partners in key markets. Meetings with the Municipal Education authority in Seoul will strengthen working relationships with Korean education partners. This is an opportunity to renew the 2008 MOU between the Ministry of Education, The Ministry of Advanced Education and the Seoul Metropolitan Office of Education.

In Gyeonggi, meeting with provincial and municipal education authorities will strengthen British Columbia-Gyeonggi sister-province relations and further develop opportunities on education collaboration. A school visit to BIS Canada, a BC Offshore school, will show support for BC's offshore school program as well as raise awareness of BC quality education and welcome international students to study in BC. This is an opportunity to renew the 2008 MOU between the BC Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Advanced Education and the Gyeonggi Provincial Office of Education of Gyeonggi Province.

Japan

In Tokyo, the mission will meet with the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology; there may be an opportunity to sign an MOU. The Mission will also meet with the Tokyo Metropolitan Government's Education Office, where there could be another opportunity to sign a new MOU. The mission will also be meeting with Canadian Embassy staff, BC's Trade Commissioner and the BCTIR office. Finally, the mission will visit BC's first certified offshore school in Japan, Bunka Gakuen University Suginami Junior and Senior High School. The BC program is commencing operations in April and the mission's visit will assist the school to recruit students and rapidly to grow to a sustainable enrolment level.

From Tokyo, the mission will make a quick trip to Yokohama city, acknowledging BC's relationship to this city, which is a sister city to Vancouver. The mission will return to Tokyo to fly back to Vancouver.

Beijing, China

Beijing is one of the four municipalities in China with a direct reporting relationship to the central government.¹

¹ Direct controlled municipalities include: Beijing, Chongqing Shanghai and Tianjin

Population: 19.6 million

Beijing is the capital of the People's Republic of China and one of the most populous cities in the world. It is the nation's cultural, educational and political center. It is home to the national government and the headquarters of most of China's largest state-owned companies. Beijing is the base of some of the largest government and non-government education organizations in China, including top ranked universities. It includes a significant portion of education agent companies in China. Beijing is the location of a BCTIR office. British Columbia's Special Representative in Asia, Mr. Ben Stewart, and Education Marketing Manager, Ms. Vicky Song, are also located in this office.

These universities mainly focus on the science and technology service of the national military and aerospace industry.

in Chinese

BACKGROUND:

Through the winter and spring of 2015, the Ministry of Education and the Chinese Consulate in Vancouver have had preliminary discussions regarding the development of a jointly-funded award for British Columbia students in recognition of excellence at the K-12 level in the study of Mandarin.

In 2013, the province of Alberta and the Chinese Consulate in Vancouver developed and implemented a similar award, the China-Alberta Award for Excellence in Chinese. In 2014. there was one recipient of the award. The 2015 awards will be disbursed in June.

Alberta's award is valued at \$500, funded in equal parts by the Albertan and Chinese governments.

To be eligible for the Alberta-China award, students and their parents must be Canadian citizens or residents of Alberta. Students must also:

- have completed Chinese 10 and 11 with a minimum course grade of 90 percent or higher;
- be enrolled in or have completed Chinese 12;
- have an overall GPA of 80 percent (all courses); and
- be currently enrolled in Grade 12.

To apply, students must:

- complete an application form by April 30;
- write a two-paragraph essay describing how Chinese language study applies to their future goals; and
- provide a transcript and a letter of reference.

Alberta Education selects applicants. Applicants are notified of decisions by the end of June.

DISCUSSION:

British Columbia's proposed award will be modelled on the existing Alberta-China award. Ministry staff will work with Chinese consular staff in Vancouver to agree upon major details. High level details should be decided by the middle of May 2015, which will enable the award to

be announced during the Minister's 2015 trade mission to China. A proposal of high-level details is attached.

Specific details of the proposed award should be agreed upon as part of the follow-up work associated with the to-be-signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Ministry of Education and the Chinese National Ministry of Education. This MOU is tentatively scheduled to be signed by Minister Fassbender on June 1, 2015 in Beijing. A work plan of cooperative education activities will be agreed upon by both parties within six months of the date of signing, i.e. December 1, 2015.

Funding for the award will be drawn from cost-recoveries drawn from the *BC Global Education Offshore School Program* (OSP). In 2012, when the Treasury Board approved the current OSP fee structure, it approved the use of cost recoveries in support of British Columbia's international education sector.

An important area for discussion with the Chinese consulate will be each government's maximum total financial contribution. It is suggested that the British Columbia Government cap its maximum contribution at \$15,000 annually. At \$250 per scholarship, this would allow British Columbia to provide of up to 50 awards per year. It is likely the award would be undersubscribed, at least in the initial years after implementation, and that the full budget would not be required.

Draft Proposal: British Columbia-China Award for Excellence in Chinese

Overview

A collaborative scholarship program rewarding excellence in the study of Chinese language at the K-12 level in British Columbia supported by the British Columbia Ministry of Education and the Education Office in the Consulate-General of The People's Republic of China in Vancouver.

Funding Arrangement

The British Columbia Ministry of Education and the Chinese Consulate in Vancouver (the Participants) will provide matching award funding. The British Columbia Ministry of Education will cover the cost of award administration, i.e. evaluation and distribution of awards.

Scholarship Value (per Scholarship)

\$500 (i.e. \$250 contribution from each Participant)

Annual Maximum Number of Scholarships

Fifty (50)

Annual Maximum Award Budget

\$12,500 per Participant for the funding of awards (i.e. \$250 X 50 students). British Columbia may incur additional costs associated with award administration.

Terms of Participation

Propose that the terms of participation between the Participants be specified in the follow-up work plan to the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the British Columbia Ministry of Education and the Chinese National Ministry of Education, scheduled to be signed in June 2015.

Announcement

High-level details of the award will be jointly announced in June 2015 in Beijing during a meeting between British Columbia's Minister of Education and representatives of the Chinese National Ministry of Education.

Implementation

The first awards will be disbursed in June 2016.

Student Eligibility

- Students and parents must be Canadian citizens (or permanent residents) and residents of British Columbia.
- Students will:
 - have completed Mandarin 10 and 11 with a minimum course grade of 90 percent or higher;

 - o be currently enrolled in Grade 12.

Student Application for Award

- Eligible students will submit an application by April 30 each year.

SUBJECT:

Proposal: British Columbia International Education Scholarships

BACKGROUND:

Currently, there is no provincial-level K-12 scholarship for international students studying in British Columbia. Some provincial and federal-level funding exists for post-secondary level scholarships; these are described in Appendix A. There are no known school district scholarships for international students.

The BC Jobs Plan, British Columbia's International Education Strategy and the 2015 Throne Speech set Provincial direction to support international education and assist the sector to increase enrolment by 50 percent by 2015/16.

China, Japan and South Korea are priority international education markets. These markets account for 85 percent of all Offshore School students and 66 percent of all K-12 and post-secondary international students in British Columbia.

International Education is the province's fourth largest export industry. Annually, it generates \$2.3 billion in international student spending and creates 25,500 jobs. This is equivalent to \$1.63 billion in provincial GDP and provides almost \$80 million in direct government revenue.

In 2014/15, there are 17,000 international students in British Columbia K-12. Each student that remains to complete post-secondary represents between \$150,000 - \$200,000 in tuition and living expenses. Over seven years (grades 10 to 12 and a four-year degree) these students spend up to \$1.15 billion on tuition and living costs.

DISCUSSION:

It is proposed that the Ministry of Education create a scholarship program for international students from China, Korea and Japan studying at the K-12 and post-secondary level.

Under this proposal \$50,000 scholarship envelopes would be allocated for each of the three countries, with the total scholarship envelope totaling \$150,000 annually. Scholarship funding would come from the British Columbia Global Education Offshore Schools Program recoveries and would not require a supplemental budget request.

The purpose of the scholarships would be twofold.

First, from an international relations and trade point of view, the scholarships will augment British Columbia's relationships with these three important trading partners. The Chinese and Japanese scholarships would be announced during the Minister's upcoming Mission to China and Japan in May and June 2015. Scholarship development would be written into the Memorandums of Understanding which are currently being developed for the missions. The Korean scholarships could be announced in a Minister's event with the Korean Consulate General in Vancouver upon the Minister's return from the Mission.

Involving our foreign government partners in the scholarship announcement and discussion of award criteria, will amplify the marketing efforts around the scholarship program and will contribute to the scholarships second purpose – which is international student recruitment.

From a strategic international student enrollment perspective, and in support of British Columbia's *International Education Strategy* to increase international student enrolment by 50 percent by 2015/16, the scholarships will be designed to attract new Chinese, Korean and Japanese international students to British Columbia at the K-12 level, and retain top-level K-12 international students who have already chosen a British Columbia K-12 education, but who might not have otherwise chosen a British Columbia post-secondary education.

It is proposed that individual scholarship values be \$1,250, which would enable 40 scholarships per country (120 scholarships in total). Of this number, 20 scholarship per market (total of 60 scholarships) be devoted to attracting new students into British Columbia K-12 education and that the same number be devoted to graduating British Columbia international high school students (including British Columbia offshore school students) to improve the transition rate for entry into British Columbia post-secondary education.

In terms of the value of the scholarships, multiple international education sector experts, including a contracted consultant, international student recruiters, and offshore school representatives, have advised the Ministry that relatively low-dollar value awards – roughly equivalent to the cost of airfare – hold high-prestige value for international families and are sufficient to convert some international students who were considering British Columbia as a study destination, but who would ultimately have picked an alternate destination.

This scholarship program is also an opportunity to incent or leverage harder-to-market areas of British Columbia's international education sector, for example, rural K-12 school districts and colleges through application of specific award and administrative criteria.

The introduction of an international scholarship program would require careful management of the optics around the program. The provision of scholarships for international students may face resistance from some internal British Columbia stakeholders, as funding allocated to international students may be incorrectly perceived to displace support for domestic students' access to education opportunities.

However, British Columbia K-12 international education stakeholders, including school district international education program managers and the International Public School Education Association, which represents most British Columbia public school district international education programs, have communicated to the Ministry of Education that the provision of scholarships would assist in marketing British Columbia to international students.

MINISTER OF EDUCATION MISSION TO CHINA, SOUTH KOREA, AND JAPAN (MAY 29 – JUNE 4, 2015)

1. Introduction

Between May 29 – June 4, 2015, it is proposed that the Minister of Education conduct a 7 day trade mission in support of international education to China and Japan.

In each country the Minister will sign national and provincial education agreements to facilitate expansion of the BC Offshore School Program, increase the number of international students studying in BC, and increase the two-way flow of students to and from BC on exchange. In addition, the Minister will anchor meetings with key international education partners, including with Maple Leaf Educational Systems, the largest offshore school partner (representing 40 percent of BC offshore students) and with international student agents, who assist students to choose study destinations. The estimated cost of the mission will be \$80,000 which includes travel for four (Minister, Chief of Staff, Deputy Minister, and Assistant Deputy Minister) to two cities. \$.17

3. ADVANCEMENT OF BC INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION STRATEGY

The *BC Jobs Plan*, *British Columbia's International Education Strategy* and the **2015 Throne Speech** set Provincial direction to support international education and assist the sector to increase enrolment by **50 percent** by 2015/16. The Minister's mission ties in with these strategic priorities. China and Japan are priority international education markets. **These markets account for 79 percent of all Offshore School students and 34 percent of all K-12 and post-secondary international students in British Columbia.**

The Minister's mission will launch the Ministry of Education's strategy to increase offshore school graduates' transition rates into British Columbia post-secondary education by 15 percent over four years. This target will add \$36.3 million annually in international student spending in British Columbia. The Minister will advance work on several initiatives, including partnerships between offshore schools and British Columbia post-secondary institutions and a scholarship program for offshore school students to study in British Columbia.

The Minister's mission will demonstrate support for **Maple Leaf Educational Systems** in China. Maple Leaf plans to double enrolment within five years, which, if achieved, will annually **add 1,200 graduates and create an added \$88 million** in spending in British Columbia.

International Education is the province's fourth largest export industry. Annually, it generates \$2.3 billion in international student spending and creates 25,500 jobs. This is equivalent to \$1.63 billion in provincial GDP and provides almost \$80 million in direct government revenue.²

In 2014/15, there are 17,000 international students in British Columbia K-12. Each student that remains to complete post-secondary represents between \$150,000 - \$200,000 in tuition and living expenses. Over seven years (grades 10 - 12 and a 4 year degree) these students spend up to \$1.15 billion on tuition and living costs.

DISCUSSION PAPER

I. Background

Trade and investment are key drivers of job growth in British Columbia (BC). International trade and investment enables a high level of economic growth in BC; one in five jobs is directly linked to exports; inbound investment drives job creation and increases productivity and research and development; and, strategic investments make BC's key sectors globally competitive, grow clusters and drive exports.

The *BC Jobs Plan* identifies International Education as one of eight jobs plan sectors. International education is now BC's fourth largest export industry. BC's international education strategy identifies China, South Korea, and Japan as among the top 10 priority countries.

The Throne Speech 2015 specifically referenced the value of international education to BC's economy in terms of spending and job creation and acknowledged the importance of international relationships and overseas partnerships. The Throne Speech 2015 also referenced the BC Offshore School Program, indicating government's commitment.

Ben Stewart, BC's Special Representative in Asia, is responsible for leading the development of agreements with other governments and maximizing opportunities resulting from trade missions. Mr. Stewart is keenly aware of the BC Offshore School Program and was supportive of the Offshore School application for the new Offshore School opening in Japan in September. He has indicated that there is high interest in Asia for the BC Offshore School Program.

In the 2012/13 academic year, international students in BC spent \$2.3 billion on tuition, accommodation, food and discretionary items. This sum is equivalent to a direct contribution of \$1.63 billion in provincial GDP, it creates close to 25,500 jobs and provides almost \$80 million in direct government revenue generated.

The students of these three nations make up almost 50 percent of all international students studying in BC, 65 percent of K-12 international students studying in BC and 85 percent of BC's Offshore School Students.

Critical to international education program success is the ongoing establishment and cultivation of strong global relationships. It is important for BC to maintain and expand the education relationship with China, South Korea and Japan, which is the impetus for the planned trade mission to Asia. As the first mission for Minister Fassbender as the Minister of Education, it will also signal his recognition and ongoing commitment of the long standing relationship with Asia countries in promoting and furthering mutual education interests.

China

- China is BC's second-largest trading partner, and accounts for 18.1 percent of BC's commodity exports - a total value of more than \$5.7 billion.
- Demand for post-secondary education is immense and the country cannot keep pace with this compelling need.
- Increasing numbers of Chinese students choose to study abroad every year, which is encouraged by the Chinese Government.
- In 2012, 399,600 Chinese students went to study abroad, an increase of 17.7 percent from 2011.
- Many Chinese parents send their children abroad for K-12 to help gain entry to post-secondary.
- China's National Plan for Medium and Long-term Education Reform and Development (2010-2020) presents opportunities to partner with China to expand and improve aspects of China's education system, e.g. vocational training. This has long been an objective for China. Improving access to skills training is a priority for the Government of BC.
- China is the number one source country for international students in the province. It is identified as a key partner under BC's International Education Strategy.
- In 2012/13, BC hosted 25,800 Chinese students including 13,300 in public post-secondary institutions, 5,800 in private post-secondary institutions, 2,400 in private language schools and 4,300 in the K-12 system.
- China is home to 31 BC Certified Offshore schools with over 8,500 students.
- Three new offshore schools will begin operation in China in the fall.
- Many of China's second-tier cities are expanding rapidly and present new opportunities for expanded engagement.

South Korea

- South Korean is BC's fourth-ranked trading partner.
- Korea is the number two source country for international students in the province. It is identified as a key partner under BC's International Education Strategy.
- In 2012/13, BC hosted 14,000 students from South Korea including 1,800 in public post-secondary institutions, 500 in private post-secondary institutions, 8,500 in private language schools and 3,200 in the K-12 system.
- South Korea has five BC Certified Offshore schools with an enrolment of close to 800 students.
- South Korea's population has a strong global orientation. There is good potential to increase the number of South Korean students in BC and to expand the availability of the BC education curriculum at schools operating in South Korea.
- At the Korean national level, the Minister of Education in 2014/15 has been focussed on curricular innovation, emphasizing creativity, and an increased role for trades and vocational training. There is the potential for mutually beneficial conversations in this area.

Japan

- BC is the largest exporter to Japan amongst the provinces, representing a 38.5 percent of the Canadian total. Japanese imports to BC comprised 6.1 percent of BC's total imports.
- Japan is the number three source country for international students in the province. It is identified as a key partner under BC's International Education Strategy.
- In 2012/13, BC hosted 12,900 students from Japan including 1,600 in public post-secondary institutions, 700 in private post-secondary institutions, 9,900 in private language schools and 700 in the K-12 system.
- BC has approved its first offshore school in Japan to start in April the Bunka Gakuen University Suginami Junior and Senior High School in Tokyo.
- Education reforms in Japan focus on diversifying education, promoting information technologies, and encouraging internationalisation, including study abroad.

II: Missions Objectives, Activities, Outcomes

Minister Fassbender's mission to Asia is an important opportunity to enhance awareness of BC's world-class education system through supporting BC Offshore School programs, highlighting and strengthening BC's relations with China, South Korea and Japan, and to develop new education collaborations with potential partners.

Key Objectives (proposed):

 - Promote the two-way global flow of students and ideas between countries

- Signing of pathways partnership agreements between BC Post-Secondary Institutions and Chinese institutions/Offshore schools;

- Meeting with senior education officials from the Ministry of Education, Provincial Departments of Education, and Municipal Education Commissions;
- Meeting with Canadian Embassy and Canadian Consulate General officials;
- Meeting with Offshore school owners;
- Visiting offshore schools, including Dalian Maple Leaf to acknowledge its 20th anniversary;
- Briefing with BC Trade and Investment Representative Offices;
- Participating in Friends of BC receptions;
- Participating in educational site visits and cultural events; and
- Supporting other key BC trade and investment sectors.

Possible Outcomes:

- Demonstrated commitment to strong relationships with established priority markets;
- New and renewed government to government MOU frameworks for further collaboration between BC and China, Korea and Japan including:

- Commitment to renew the 2008 MOU between the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Advanced Education and the Gyeonggi Provincial Office of Education of Gyeonggi Province through a signed Letter of Intent (LOI);
- Renewal of the 2008 MOU between the Ministry of Education, The Ministry of Advanced Education and the Seoul Metropolitan Office of Education;
- Renewal of the 2004 MOU between the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Education for Beijing;
- Signing of an MOU with the Tokyo Metropolitan Government Office Education;
- Promotion of BC as a high-quality education destination through governmental meetings,
 Friends of BC receptions and networking;
- Acquisition of significant market intelligence about China's, Japan's and South Korea's education system and policy goals;
- Increased opportunities for further education collaboration and partnerships in a range of areas, including student, faculty and staff exchange;
- Offshore school partnership agreements with educational institutions;
- Letter of Congratulations to Sherman Jen in acknowledgement of Maple Leaf Educational Systems (MLES) 20th anniversary;
- · Fulfilment of International Education Strategy commitments; and
- Support for key education accounts in these markets, is in alignment with the International trade strategy.

III. Mission Outline (Proposed)

China

The mission will begin in Beijing. Meetings will center on renewal and maintenance of existing relationships with the Ministry of Education and the Beijing Municipal Education Commission, as well as consultation with Canadian Embassy and BC Trade and Investment Office representatives.

Following this, the program will go to Dalian to strengthen and renew relationships with MLES. MLES started the first BC offshore school and is celebrating its 20-year anniversary. The mission will visit BC's flagship offshore school, Maple Leaf International School - Dalian. The mission will also meet with the MLES founder, Dr. Sherman Jen, to sign school certification agreements for all MLES BC offshore schools.

South Korea

In Seoul, meetings with the BC Trade and Investment Representatives office (BCTIR) and the Canadian Embassy will strengthen relationships with partners in key markets. Meetings with the Municipal Education authority in Seoul will strengthen relationships with Korean education partners. This is an opportunity to renew the 2008 MOU between the Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Advanced Education and the Seoul Metropolitan Office of Education.

In Gyeonggi, meeting with provincial and municipal education authorities will strengthen BC-Gyeonggi sister-province relations and further develop opportunities on education collaboration. A BC Offshore School visit (BIS Canada) will show support for BC's offshore school program and welcome international students to study in BC. This is an opportunity to renew the 2008 MOU between the BC Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Advanced Education and the Gyeonggi Provincial Office of Education of Gyeonggi Province.

Japan

In Tokyo, the mission will meet with the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology; there may be an opportunity to sign an MOU. The Mission will meet with the Tokyo Metropolitan Government's Education Office, where there could be another opportunity to sign a new MOU. The mission will meet with Canadian Embassy staff, BC's Trade Commissioner and the BCTIR office. The mission will visit BC's first Japanese certified offshore school, Bunka Gakuen University Suginami Junior and Senior High School, which will start in April. The visit will assist the school to recruit students and rapidly reach sustainable enrolment.

From Tokyo, the mission will make a quick trip to Yokohama city, acknowledging BC's relationship as a sister city to Vancouver. The mission will return to Tokyo and Vancouver.

Beijing is the capital of the People's Republic of China (PRC). It is home to the national government and the headquarters of most of China's largest state-owned companies. BC's Special Representative in Asia, Mr. Ben Stewart, and Education Marketing Manager, Ms. Vicky Song, are also located in this office.

Mr. Stewart's responsibilities include leading the development of agreements with other governments, maximizing strategic opportunities resulting from trade and investment missions, and building strategic relationships with companies interested in developing, investing in or exporting BC's natural gas opportunities.

Mr. Stewart previously served as the Minister of Citizens' Services and Open Government, Minister of Agriculture, Minister of Community and Rural Development, Minister of Citizens' Services, and Minister Responsible for Multiculturalism and the Public Affairs Bureau, and as MLA for Westside-Kelowna from 2009 until 2013.

As an entrepreneur, in 1989 Mr. Stewart founded and built Quails' Gate into one of Canada's leading estate wineries. Mr. Stewart has been instrumental in developing international trade for the Canadian Wine Industry, entering the UK and Asian markets in the early 1990's. He was also chair of VQA Canada, where they successfully resolved a number of significant international issues such as trademark protection and international mutual recognition agreements including national wine and health standards. He participated in a trade mission to South America in 2001 where significant progress on international wine agreements was reached.

- The EQA designation eliminates the need for students, parents and agents to understand the different provincial quality assurance processes that govern each type of British Columbia post-secondary institution.



National Children's Day in China

- International Children's Day celebrates children and draws attention to children's issues. It is celebrated by many countries around the world, although the date varies by country.
- The concept of a Children's Day was first introduced in 1925 at the `World Conference for the Well Being of Children' in Geneva, Switzerland.
- In 1949, at the Women's International Democratic Federation congress in Moscow, it was decided that June 1 is International Children's Day.
- In 1954, the United Nations General Assembly recommended that all countries institute a
 Universal Children's Day, to be observed as a day of worldwide fraternity and understanding
 between children. On November 20, 1959, the United Nations adopted the *Declaration of the*Rights of the Child and designated November 20 as a Universal Children's Day, and
 recommended that each nation celebrate on an "appropriate" day.
- The People's Republic of China celebrates "The June 1 International Children's Day" on June 1.
- China first established "The June 1 International Children's Day" in 1949 (the same year the People's Republic of China was officially established). In 1950, China celebrated its first "The June 1 International Children's Day". It was originally a half-day holiday for all primary schools, and became full-day in 1956.
- Celebrations for Children's Day may include events with activities for children and free (or discounted) admission for entertainment and museums. As well, schools may hold children's performances, camping trips, or other events, and children may receive money and treats from family members and family friends.
- In National Annual Leaves and Memorial Days announced by State Council, it states that Children's Day is a one day holiday for children under 14 years old.

BACKGROUND:

China's Education System:

- China's education system is the largest in the world with almost 9.5 million students.
- Investment in education accounts for over 4 percent of total GDP.
- Education in China is compulsory up to grade 10. Approximately 99.7 percent of the population of the country has achieved universal nine-year basic education.
- In 2014, China announced it would turn at least half of its public general universities (600) into institutions of applied learning or polytechnics to produce more technically trained graduates.
- The new applied institutions would focus on training engineers, senior technicians and other highly skilled workers rather than pursuing academic and highly theoretical studies.
- China plans to increase the total number of students at vocational education institutions to 38.3 million by 2020.

International Education in China:

- China hosts one of the largest populations of foreign students. In 2014, 203 countries sent almost 400,000 students to China, an increase of 5.8 percent from 2013.
- China has announced a target to host over 500,000 foreign students by 2020.
- China's top source countries are South Korea, United States, Thailand, Russia and Japan.

- China is also the largest source country of international students in the world. Over 450,000 Chinese students went abroad for study in 2014, an increase of 11.1 percent from the 2013.
- From 1978 to 2014, a total of over 3.51 million Chinese have studied abroad. Top destinations are the United States, United Kingdom, Australia and Canada.

British Columbia Offshore Schools in China

- There are 31 offshore schools in China; 3 more offshore schools will open in September 2015.
- There is one British Columbia Certified Offshore school in Beijing: Sino Bright School No. 8.
- Maple Leaf Dalian School was the first British Columbia Offshore School, founded in 1998.

British Columbia - China Award for Excellence in Chinese

- The British Columbia-China Award for Excellence in Chinese is a collaborative scholarship program rewarding excellence in the study of Chinese language at the K-12 level in British Columbia.
- The British Columbia Ministry of Education and the Chinese Consulate in Vancouver will provide matching award funding.
- The value of each award is \$500 (i.e. \$250 contribution from each Participant); the annual maximum number of scholarships is fifty (50) for a contribution of \$12,500 per participant for the funding of awards (i.e. \$250 X 50 students).
- The terms of participation between the Participants will be specified in the follow-up work plan to the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the British Columbia Ministry of Education and the Chinese National Ministry of Education, June 2015.
- High-level details of the award will be jointly announced in June 2015 in Beijing during this meeting between British Columbia's Minister of Education and representatives of the Chinese National Ministry of Education.
- The first awards will be disbursed in June 2016.
- Eligibility: Students and parents must be Canadian citizens (or permanent residents) and residents of British Columbia.
- Students will:
 - have completed Mandarin 10 and 11 with a minimum course grade of 90 percent or higher;
 - be enrolled in or have completed Chinese 12;
 - have an overall GPA of 80 percent (all courses); and
 - be currently enrolled in Grade 12.

June 29 Scholarship Alumni Event (Vancouver)

 The Consulate General of the People's Republic of China, supported by the BC Ministry of Education and Ministry of Advanced Education, will host an event for past alumni and current recipients of a Chinese Government Scholarship.

- Since 2006, the Chinese Government has made approximately 100 full or partial scholarships available to B.C. students to pursue language and/or post-secondary studies in China.

- Scholarship development will be written into the work plans being developed as part of B.C.'s
 Memorandums of Understanding with Chinese governments.
- 20 scholarships will be available to Chinese international K-12 students to study in B.C.
- An additional 20 scholarships will be available for current Chinese K-12 international students already studying in a B.C. K-12 school for tuition fees at a B.C. post-secondary school.
- Individual scholarship values will be \$1,250.
- A committee including British Columbia K-12 and post-secondary level representatives will help the Ministry of Education to design scholarship criteria.

International education is a priority for The People's Republic of China and the Province of British Columbia.

China announced its National Plan for Medium and Long-term Education Reform in 2010, which encourages schools to reach out to resources outside of China to strengthen English-language education programs.

And our Province launched the International Education Strategy in 2012.

Working together, we can achieve our shared goals to benefit all our students.

B.C.'s offshore schools help students in British Columbia and China become more outward facing – to learn more about the global world and to better understand other culture's perspectives and approaches to education and education innovation.

Giving young people the opportunity to learn about the world, to study new languages and cultures is vital to building peaceful, successful societies.

It is for this reason that British Columbia encourages our students and teachers to study, travel and work abroad.

It is also why we invite students and teachers from around the world to study and teach in British Columbia's elementary, secondary, post-secondary and language schools.

To promote the cultural and social exchanges between B.C. and China, we have partnered with your Consulate-General in Vancouver to create the British-Columbia-China Award for Excellence in Chinese.

My ministry and the Consulate-General will provide a total of \$12,500 to encourage 50 students in B.C. in their study of Chinese.

We are very proud of the 31 B.C. certified offshore schools in China. These schools do a fantastic job sharing British Columbia's culture and education techniques with the world.

Sino Bright School No. 8 was first certified as a B.C. offshore school in 2007. The school resulted from the extraordinary vision of Mr. Quan Ouyang (ow-yung) and has thrived under Mr. Ouyang's and Ms. Yufang Sun's guidance and leadership.

It gives me great pleasure to visit this school today, to see first-hand what a successful school it has become and to learn of the accomplishments of students here.

Confucius Institutes

BACKGROUND:

- Confucius Institutes are non-profit institutes aligned with the Government of the People's Republic
 of China that promote the Chinese language and culture and support local Chinese
 teaching internationally.
- Confucius Institute headquarters are located in Beijing, and the program is overseen by the Office of the Chinese Language Council International (Hanban), a non-profit organization affiliated with the Ministry of Education of the PRC.
- The majority of Confucius Institutes operate in cooperation with local post-secondary institutes around the world.
- There are 11 Confucius Institutes in Canada and more than 250 around the world.
- In July 2005, the British Columbia Institute of Technology (BCIT) was awarded the first Confucius
 Institute in Canada by the Hanban. The Institute operates on a cost recovery basis with funding
 assistance from China.
- The BCIT Confucius Institute is mandated to promote cultural exchange, economic and business
 development, international trade, Chinese language, and commercial cooperation between Canada
 and China through programs for Canadians intending to do business with China.
- To further strengthen education and cultural ties between the Province of British Columbia and the People's Republic of China, an agreement was signed with Hanban in May 2008. It provided funding to the BCIT Confucius Institute to work with the Ministry of Education to develop on-line Chinese language and Culture courses for grades 10, 11 and 12 to meet provincial learning outcomes.
- The participants also agreed to enter into discussion concerning the development of other ministry approved Mandarin language courses and teaching and learning resources, including the establishment of Confucius Classrooms in the Province.
- A Confucius Classroom provides an opportunity for students to learn the Mandarin language and aspects of Chinese culture and is designed for students from four years to adult.
- School District No. 43 (Coquitlam) in partnership with South China Normal University, applied for and received a grant to operate a Confucius Classroom in April 2008. Enrollment has grown from 10 students to 1000 students – adults and children taking mandarin in the district.
- In December 2011, the Board of Education of School District No. 43 (Coquitlam) was successful in its application to the Hanban to re-classify from a Confucius Classroom to a Confucius Institute Status.
- In October 2013, School District No. 36 (Surrey) opened two Confucius Classrooms affiliated with the BCIT Confucius Institute: one in North Surrey Secondary School and the other in Earl Marriott Secondary School. The Chinese partner schools are No. 171 High School and No. 80 High School in Beijing respectively.

Chinese Service Center for Scholarly Exchange (CSCSE)

June 1 Beijing Stakeholder Dinner Guest: Che Weimin, Deputy Director General, Chinese Service Center for Scholarly Exchange

BACKGROUND:

- The Chinese Service Centre for Scholarly Exchange was founded in 1989.
- CSCSE is a public organization under the Ministry of Education (MOE), People's Republic of China.
- The CSCSE:
 - Promotes education opportunities for Chinese students and scholars going abroad, returning from abroad and students and scholars from other countries coming to study in China
 - Fosters dialogue between education organizations in international exchange and cooperation.
 - Assists MOE to construct and manage the recommendation list of quality overseas higher education institutions for prospective Chinese students and Scholars. All British Columbia public post-secondary institutions as well as Trinity Western University are included on the list.
 - Provides overseas qualification accreditation services for returning Chinese students according to the recommendation list.
- More than 10,000 students participate in the CSCSE program each year.
- CSCSE has a head office in Beijing and branch offices in over 30 cities.
- CSCSE hosts China's largest international student recruitment fair, China International Education Exhibition Tour (CIEET), which is approved by MOE. The fair has hosted more than 2,000 overseas schools and institutions from 55 countries and regions since 1999. In 2014, over 50,000 visitors from across China attended it.
- In 2008, BCCIE and CSCSE signed an MOU that facilitates the exchange of teachers between Chinese and British Columbia universities, student exchange and support the discussion of mutual recognition of credits. It also works to strengthen the international understanding and promotion of cross-cultural communication, and enhances awareness and understanding of different cultures for student learning.
- The CSCSE SQA Higher National Diploma (HND) was introduced into China by CSCSE in 2003.
 - Designed for high school graduates to study three years at Chinese universities then advance into universities in other countries for top-up degrees. 25 Chinese universities operate this program.

- By the end of 2013, more than 18,000 Chinese students completed their study in China and continued undergraduate study overseas.
- More than 11,000 Chinese students are currently participating in the program in China. Royal Roads University, University of the Fraser Valley and Trinity Western University signed agreements and are operating the SQA HND Program, which allows graduates 3rd year entry to applicable Degree disciplines.

- CEAIE is based in Beijing and has provincial branches locating in 31 provinces, autonomous regions and municipalities as well as local chapters in 16 major cities in China.
- Its members include institutions from entire education sector in China, including both K-12 and PSE.
- CEAIE has established partnership and working relationship with over 170 educational organizations from more than 50 countries.
- CEAIE and BCCIE signed an Education MOU in 2011 (witnessed by the Deputy Director of Education for China) to develop activities in institutional exchange, education exchange, teacher and administrator training, and marketing and promotion.

- The British Columbia-China Award for Excellence in Chinese is a collaborative scholarship program rewarding excellence in the study of Chinese language at the K-12 level in British Columbia.

- The value of each award is \$500 (i.e. \$250 contribution from each Participant); the annual maximum number of scholarships is fifty (50) for a contribution of \$12,500 per participant for the funding of awards (i.e. \$250 X 50 students).
- The terms of participation between the Participants will be specified in the follow-up work plan to the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the British Columbia Ministry of Education and the Chinese National Ministry of Education, June 2015.

Scholarship for Chinese students studying in British Columbia

- British Columbia's Ministry of Education will create a scholarship for international students from China studying at the K-12 and post-secondary level.

Overview

A collaborative scholarship program rewarding excellence in the study of Chinese language at the K-12 level in British Columbia supported by the British Columbia Ministry of Education and the Education Office in the Consulate-General of The People's Republic of China in Vancouver.

Funding Arrangement

The British Columbia Ministry of Education and the Chinese Consulate in Vancouver (the Participants) will provide matching award funding. The British Columbia Ministry of Education will cover the cost of award administration, i.e. evaluation and distribution of awards.

Scholarship Value (per Scholarship)

\$500 (i.e. \$250 contribution from each Participant)

Annual Maximum Number of Scholarships

Fifty (50)

Annual Maximum Award Budget

\$12,500 per Participant for the funding of awards (i.e. \$250 X 50 students). British Columbia may incur additional costs associated with award administration.

Propose that the terms of participation between the Participants be specified in the follow-up work plan to the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the British Columbia Ministry of Education and the Chinese National Ministry of Education, scheduled to be signed in June 2015.

Announcement

High-level details of the award will be jointly announced in June 2015 in Beijing during a meeting between British Columbia's Minister of Education and representatives of the Chinese National Ministry of Education.

Implementation

The first awards will be disbursed in June 2016.

Student Eligibility

- Students and parents must be Canadian citizens (or permanent residents) and residents of British Columbia.
- Students will:
 - have completed Mandarin 10 and 11 with a minimum course grade of 90 percent or higher;
 - be enrolled in or have completed Chinese 12;
 - o have an overall GPA of 80 percent (all courses); and
 - o be currently enrolled in Grade 12.

Award Context

- Recipients would be encouraged to apply the award toward further study of the Chinese language at a post-secondary institution in British Columbia or China.
- It is intended that this award be used to promote new language learners of Chinese.

Student Application for Award

- Eligible students will submit an application by April 30 each year.
- Requirements will also include:
 - an essay written by the student;
 - o a reference letter from the student's school; and
 - a copy of the student's transcript.

Award Administration

- British Columbia's Ministry of Education or its designate will evaluate and select award recipients.
- Decisions on award recipients and notification will be made by June 30 each year.

Overview: British Columbia International Education Scholarships

- The Ministry of Education is creating a scholarship program for international students from China, Korea and Japan studying at the K-12 and post-secondary level.
- \$50,000 scholarship envelopes would be allocated for each of the three countries, China, Korea, and Japan, with the total scholarship envelope totaling \$150,000 annually.
- Scholarship funding will come entirely from the British Columbia Global Education Offshore Schools Program recoveries.
- In recognition of the important role that international students play by adding global perspectives to British Columbia schools, institutions, students and communities, the purpose of the scholarship is
 - to encourage top-level international students living abroad to choose to study in British Columbia at the K-12 level; and
 - to encourage top-level international students already studying in a British Columbia K-12 school to choose to study at a British Columbia post-secondary institution.
- The Chinese and Japanese scholarships will be announced during the Minister's upcoming Mission to China and Japan in May and June 2015.
 - Scholarship development will be written into the Memorandums of Understanding which are currently being developed for the missions.
- The Korean scholarships could be announced in a Minister's event with the Korean Consulate General in Vancouver upon the Minister's return from the Mission.
- Individual scholarship values be \$1,250, which would enable 40 scholarships per country (120 scholarships in total).
 - 20 scholarships per country (total of 60 scholarships) will be devoted to attracting top-level new students into British Columbia K-12 education
 - 20 scholarships per country (total of 60 scholarships) will be devoted to attracting top-level graduating British Columbia international high school students (including British Columbia offshore school students) into British Columbia post-secondary education.
- Details of the scholarships will be worked out with international governments and with internal British Columbia stakeholders and will be announced in the winter of 2016.
- The first awards will be issued in the spring of 2016 for study in British Columbia commencing in September 2016.



BACKGROUND:

- Heilongjiang is a province of the People's Republic of China located in the northeastern part of the country.
- Harbin is the capital city and a key second tier city in the province of Heilongjiang in northern China. Heilongjiang has a population of over 38 million (about 3% of China's population)
- Harbin is an important educational centre, especially in engineering and applied science. The Harbin Institute of Technology was founded in 1920 to train technical personnel for the Chinese Eastern Railway. It offers specialized programs in departments of engineering and technology as well as a grad
 - in departments of engineering and technology as well as a graduate school.



- Almost all school-age children are enrolled in schools, and the province's literacy rate is substantially above the national norm.
- There is a natural affinity between Harbin and British Columbia given Harbin's northern location and winter climates. Harbin is one of three cities to host China's only official professional hockey team called the "China Dragon".
- Heilongjiang and Harbin align with the provincial strategy to identify and partner with 2nd and 3rd tier markets in China.
- Alberta and Heilongjiang are Sister Provinces (35 year relationship in 2016).

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANING:

• The MOU presents an opportunity for partnership-building, market familiarization, student recruitment, student and teacher exchanges and language and cultural learning.



 The MOU helps fulfill British Columbia's "Canada Starts Here: BC Jobs Plan" which asks for an increased focus on foreign language instruction, especially Mandarin instruction, in British Columbia's K-12 curriculum.

B.C. ENGAGEMENT:

- In 2012 and 2014 BCCIE in collaboration with Hanban coordinated K-12 superintendent missions to Harbin, Heilongjiang Province, to strengthen engagement with educational leaders and government.
- The mission provided key opportunities for public and private institutions from across
 British Columbia to make advances towards partnership-building, market familiarization, student
 recruitment, student and teacher exchanges and development of Chinese language and
 cultural learning.
- These close partnerships not only promote student mobility, but also lead to new ideas and curricular change -- one outcome of which may be additional Confucius Classrooms across British Columbia.
- Heilongjiang Education Center for International Exchange is a key partner. HECIE is under the
 provincial education department and is responsible for operating programs such as Heilongjiang
 English Teacher Training Program.

BACKGROUND:

Japan's Education System

- There are almost 20 million students enrolled in Japan's education system (from Kindergarten to University). Investment in education accounts for over 5.1 percent of total GDP.
- The school system in Japan consists of three years of optional Kindergarten, six years of elementary school, three years of junior high school, and three years of optional high school.
- The nine years of elementary and junior high school are mandatory.
- Approximately 95 percent of Japanese students choose to continue to the optional senior high schools, and the graduation rate from these upper secondary schools is 95 percent.

International Education in Japan

- In 2012, there were over 60,000 Japanese students studying overseas, with the largest number of student attending school in the People's Republic of China, the United States, and the United Kingdom.
- Japan is host to almost 200,000 international students, the majority of which come from the People's Republic of China, Vietnam, and the Republic of Korea.
- In 2008, the Government of Japan announced the "300,000 Foreign Students Plan," which calls to increase the number of foreign students in Japan from the 140,000 to 300,000 students by 2020.

British Columbia's Relationship with Japan in International Education

- British Columbia's International Education Strategy categorizes Japan as a priority country.
- British Columbia and Japan have long had a strong relationship through international education.
- For years, British Columbia graduates have taught in Japan through Japan Exchange and Teaching (JET) program.
- For years, Japanese international students in BC have made important contributions to elementary, secondary, and post-secondary schools.
- Currently, Japan sends the third highest number of international students to British Columbia.
- In 2012/13, there were close to 13,000 Japanese students studying in BC with 700 studying at the elementary and secondary level.
- British Columbia is currently collecting information on the number of British Columbia students who study and travel in Japan. Data will be available in the fall of 2015.

Scholarship for Japanese Students Studying In British Columbia

- B.C.'s Ministry of Education will create a scholarship for international students from Japan studying at the K-12 and post-secondary level.
- A \$50,000 envelope will be allocated to the scholarship.
- Scholarship funding will come from B.C. Offshore School Program recoveries.
- Scholarship development will either be written into Memorandums of Understanding with Japanese governments or with the Japanese Consulate General in Vancouver.
- 20 scholarships will be available to Japanese international K-12 students to study in B.C.
- An additional 20 scholarships will be available for current Japanese K-12 international students already studying in a B.C. K-12 school for tuition fees at a B.C. post-secondary school.
- Individual scholarship values will be \$1,250.
- A committee including British Columbia K-12 and post-secondary level representatives will help the Ministry of Education to design scholarship criteria.

British Columbia Offshore Schools in Japan

- Bunka Suginami Canadian International School is the first British Columbia Offshore School in Japan.
- BSCIS began operation in April 2015 and is now a fully certified school offering the BC Graduation Program.

Key Messages – British Columbia Offshore Schools

- British Columbia's Offshore School Program has authorized schools outside Canada since 1997 to
 offer the British Columbia graduation program. Students are awarded Dogwood diplomas upon
 successful program completion.
- In addition to the provision of high-quality education to international students, the Offshore School Program provides educational, social and economic benefits to British Columbia students, teachers, schools and communities, and increases the number of international students choosing to study in British Columbia.
- The British Columbia Offshore School Program also promotes the two-way flow of students and ideas as British Columbia teachers work and engage with local teachers and programs. Students from British Columbia benefit from the cultural and educational exchanges as British Columbia schools welcome offshore students for short-term educational programs in British Columbia.
- To ensure students in offshore schools receive a high standard of education, the British Columbia Ministry of Education sets rigorous standards for schools, teachers and administrators. These standards apply to all British Columbia teachers, whether they are working in a school in British Columbia or in a British Columbia Certified Offshore School.
- Teachers and principals in British Columbia Certified Offshore Schools are required to have a
 teaching certificate issued by British Columbia's Ministry of Education Teacher Regulation Branch.
 To be certified, British Columbia teachers must meet all of the British Columbia Teacher Regulation
 Branch's criteria for certification under the British Columbia Teacher's Act.
- British Columbia Certified Offshore Schools are inspected annually by British Columbia education
 experts to ensure that British Columbia Offshore Schools provide quality education programming

 Prefecture is the 12th most populated prefecture in Japan, and the largest (in terms of population
 and economy) prefecture in Japan's Chugoku and Shikoku Regions (consisting of nine prefectures
 in total).
- Population: 2.83 million (City of Hiroshima: 1.19 million / City of Fukuyama: 0.47 million)
- Number of High School Students (Grades 10-12): 78,739
- Number of High Schools (for Grades 10-12): 134 (of which 2 are national, 92 are public, 40 are private)
- Hiroshima Prefectural BoE has set a goal of rapidly increasing the number of high school students
 who study abroad in the coming year: about 1,000 students per year, including short-term programs.
 The BoE has launched various initiatives, including provision of study-abroad scholarships and
 student loans, and organization of an annual "high school study abroad" fair for local students,

STATEMENT OF INTENT ON EDUCATION COOPERATION BETWEEN

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA COUNCIL FOR INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION (BCCIE) BRITISH COLUMBIA, CANADA

AND

THE HIROSHIMA PREFECTURAL BOARD OF EDUCATION JAPAN

1. Purpose

- 1.1 The British Columbia Council for International Education (BCCIE), British Columbia, Canada and the Hiroshima Prefectural Board of Education, Japan (the Parties) acknowledge the many cultural and educational bilateral benefits that may be gained through the formation of sister-school relationships, study tours, teacher exchange and other relevant activities.
- 1.2 This Statement of Intent sets forth these understandings and signifies the reciprocal intentions of the Parties to investigate possible collaboration in the area of international education according to the principals of equality and mutual benefit.

2. Guiding principals

- 2.1 The Parties agree to work cooperatively to the fullest possible extent, and to investigate the potential for developing key alliances based on reciprocal advantage and cordiality and in compliance with the laws prevailing in the respective countries.
- 2.2 This Statement of Intent is not legally binding and merely constitutes a statement of the mutual intentions of the Parties with respect to the document's contents.

3. Areas of Possible Cooperation

- 3.1 Collaborative opportunities to be explored under the Statement of Intent are:
 - capitalizing on the benefits gained from Short Term Study Tours and Study Abroad by introducing participating schools from the Hiroshima Prefecture to suitable British Columbia's public schools looking to form linkages to Japan.
 - establishing avenues for communication with the intent of exploring the development of sister-school relationships, teacher training and exchange, and other relevant activities.
- 3.2 If a sister-school relationship or an agreement on teacher training and exchange is eventually formed, the Parties agree that these will be governed by separate documentation (and not this State of Intent).

4. Term

4.1 Subject to item 4.2 below, this Statement of Intent will commence on the date the last party signs this document and be in effect for three (3) years.

4.2 This Statement of Intent may be terminated by either Party at any time by notice in writing to the other Party specifying an effective date of termination. The Parties request that a Party wishing to exit this Statement of Intent give the other Party three months' notice if possible. However, unless either Party refers to the cancellation of this Statement of Intent, the contract period will be extended for another three (3) years.

5. Variation

5.1 This Statement of Intent may be modified, amended or extended by agreement in writing by the Parties, and that modification, amendment or extension will come into effect on the date of mutual agreement.

6. Effect of Document

This State of Intent:

- does not create a legally binding relationship between the Parties of impose legal obligations on either Party;
- does not constitute or create and promise, representation, right or obligation biding on or in favor of either Party;
- contains no commitment or obligation on either Party to proceed with negotiations for or to enter into any agreement or other relationship; and
- does not preclude the Parties from signing other collaborative agreements.

Nothing in this Statement of Intent will be taken to constitute any relationship between the Parties of principal and contractor, principal and agent, partnership, or any joint venture between the Parties, and the Parties must not represent their relationship as such.

This document is potentially subject to disclosure under the laws prevailing in the respective countries.

This document is written in English and in Japanese. Both versions have equal validity.

1 目 的

- 1.1日本国広島県教育委員会とカナダ ブリティッシュ・コロンビア州国際教育委員会 (BCCIE) (以下「両者」という。)は、姉妹校、スタディ・ツアー、教員交流などの関係 作りを通じて得られる数多くの文化的及び教育的な相互の利益を確認するものとする。

MEETING PURPOSE:

British Columbia's Minister of Education would like to meet with Tokyo Metropolitan Government Board of Education representatives in order to:

- strengthen the existing government-level relationship;
- discuss British Columbia's work with Japanese partners to promote international education, for example:
 - collaborative activity with the Japanese Consulate General in Vancouver to promote Shugaku Ryoko study-tours in British Columbia; and
 - the opening of Bunka Suginami Canadian International School British Columbia's first
 Offshore School in Japan and the school's innovative double Japan British Columbia diploma program.
- discuss the possibility of:
 - entering into discussions to develop a collaborative Memorandum of Understanding to promote and establish details for further international education collaboration.

 British Columbia's Minister of Education is working with British Columbia's Minister for Advanced Education on this initiative as British Columbia sees opportunities for collaboration for all ages of British Columbian and Japanese students.

BACKGROUND

- Tokyo, in the Kanto region on the south-eastern side of the main island Honshu, is the capital of Japan and is officially known as "Tokyo Metropolis".
- Tokyo prefecture is governed by a popularly elected governor and assembly.
- Tokyo is home to the Japanese Government, the Imperial Palace, and the Japanese Imperial Family.
- The city is a major international finance center and houses the headquarters of several of the world's largest investment banks and insurance companies.
- Tokyo is the center for Japan's transportation, publishing, and broadcasting industries.
- Tokyo is home to 47 of Japan's 57 Global 500 companies (eg. Honda, Hitachi, Sony, Toshiba, Mitsubishi, Fujitsu, Canon, etc).
- Tokyo sits near the boundary of three tectonic plates, and was hit by powerful earthquakes in 1703, 1782, 1812, 1855, and 1923. Tokyo was affected by the 2011 Tohoku earthquake; transportation systems shut down and power outages occurred.
- Yoichi Masuzoe was elected as Tokyo's Governor in February 2014. He previously served as federal health minister.

Japan's Education System

- There are almost 20 million students enrolled in Japan's education system (from Kindergarten to University). Investment in education accounts for over 5.1 percent of total GDP.
- The school system in Japan consists of three years of optional Kindergarten, six years of elementary school, three years of junior high school, and three years of optional high school.
- The nine years of elementary and junior high school are mandatory.
- Approximately 95 percent of Japanese students choose to continue to the optional senior high schools, and the graduation rate from these upper secondary schools is 95 percent.

International Education in Japan

- In 2012, there were over 60,000 Japanese students studying overseas, with the largest number of student attending school in the People's Republic of China, the United States, and the United Kingdom.
- Japan is host to almost 200,000 international students, the majority of which come from the People's Republic of China, Vietnam, and the Republic of Korea.
- In 2008, the Government of Japan announced the "300,000 Foreign Students Plan," which calls to increase the number of foreign students in Japan from the 140,000 to 300,000 students by 2020.

British Columbia's Relationship with Japan in International Education

- British Columbia's International Education Strategy categorizes Japan as a priority country.
- British Columbia and Japan have long had a strong relationship through international education.
- For years, British Columbia graduates have taught in Japan through Japan Exchange and Teaching (JET) program.
- For years, Japanese international students in British Columbia have made important contributions to elementary, secondary, and post-secondary schools.
- Currently, Japan sends the third highest number of international students to British Columbia.
- In 2012/13, there were close to 13,000 Japanese students studying in British Columbia with 700 studying at the elementary and secondary level.
- British Columbia is currently collecting information on the number of British Columbia students who study and travel in Japan. Data will be available in the fall of 2015.


British Columbia Offshore Schools in Japan

- Bunka Suginami Canadian International School is the first British Columbia Offshore School in Japan.
- BSCIS began operation in April 2015 and is now a fully certified school offering the British Columbia Graduation Program.

Key Messages – British Columbia Offshore Schools

- British Columbia's Offshore School Program has authorized schools outside Canada since 1997 to offer the British Columbia graduation program. Students are awarded Dogwood diplomas upon successful program completion.
- In addition to the provision of high-quality education to international students, the Offshore School Program provides educational, social and economic benefits to British Columbia students, teachers, schools and communities, and increases the number of international students choosing to study in British Columbia.

- The British Columbia Offshore School Program also promotes the two-way flow of students and ideas as British Columbia teachers work and engage with local teachers and programs. Students from British Columbia benefit from the cultural and educational exchanges as British Columbia schools welcome offshore students for short-term educational programs in British Columbia.
- To ensure students in offshore schools receive a high standard of education, the
 British Columbia Ministry of Education sets rigorous standards for schools, teachers and
 administrators. These standards apply to all British Columbia teachers, whether they are
 working in a school in British Columbia or in a British Columbia Certified Offshore School.
- Teachers and principals in British Columbia Certified Offshore Schools are required to have a
 teaching certificate issued by British Columbia's Ministry of Education Teacher Regulation
 Branch. To be certified, British Columbia teachers must meet all of the British Columbia
 Teacher Regulation Branch's criteria for certification under the British Columbia
 Teacher's Act.
- British Columbia Certified Offshore Schools are inspected annually by British Columbia education experts to ensure that British Columbia Offshore Schools provide quality education programming in an educationally supportive environment.

China's Key Priorities

- ▶ Maintaining economic growth, improving people's livelihoods, safeguarding social justice, and tackling corruption.
- ▶ Increase national food security and safety.
- Improve industry structures, develop new growth drivers, and cut excess capacity.
- ▶ Control and tackle local government debt risks.
- ▶ Promote balanced growth in different regions.
- ▶ Improve social welfare with focus on providing jobs to college graduates and workers laid off in industries with excess capacity and increasing supply of social housing.
- Raising the level of openness by speeding up talks on free trade zones and investment treaties.

Government

- Under China's governing system, the Communist Party of China determines the policy direction and personnel changes, while the Central People's Government is responsible for party policy implementation and day-to-day governance.
- There is overlap between the two sides allowing the Party to exert influence at every level.
- The Party is led by the 7 members of the Standing Committee of the Politburo (with Xi Jinping as the head of the Party).
- ▶ The government is led by President Xi Jinping who also holds the positions of General Secretary of the Communist Party of China and Chairman of the Central Military Commission.



British Columbia — China Relations

China is a significant source of investment, immigrants, tourists and students for British Columbia.

Twinning

- ▶ Since 1995, BC has had an active sister province relationship with China's Guangdong Province. Guangdong Province is one of BC's two sister provinces.
- ▶ 19 BC municipalities have 32 friendship, sister city, or other MOUs with communities in China.

Community

- ▶ According to the 2011 census, 464,805 British Columbians (11% of BC's population) identify themselves as being of Chinese ethnic origin. Over 64,000 report Chinese citizenship, and more than 343,000 (8% of BC's population) speak a Chinese language dialect as their mother tongue.
- China was the top source country for immigrants settling in British Columbia in 2013, with 8,598 immigrants.

Education

- ▶ China is the primary market for K-12 international students in British Columbia.
- ▶ China supplies the greatest number of international students to BC schools (approximately 5000 students per 2012 data).
- ▶ The Ministry of Education certifies 31 BC Offshore Schools in China. These schools deliver educational programs taught by BC certified teachers and offer grades K-12, serving approximately 8500 students.

Diplomatic Relations

- ▶ Consul General of the People's Republic of China in Vancouver: LIU Fei (Rank of Ambassador).
- ▶ Ambassador of the People's Republic of China to Canada: LUO Zhaohui.
- ▶ Ambassador of Canada to the People's Republic of China to Canada: Guy St. Jacques.

Trade Relations

- ▶ Mainland China ranked #2 as a destination for BC origin exports in 2014 with 17.7% of BC's commodity exports shipped there.
- ▶ BC leads Canadian provinces in trade with China (\$6.3 billion of Canada's \$18.8 billion in exports to China in 2014).
- ▶ China was BC's second largest international market in terms of direct customs entries in 2013; up two spots from 2012.
- ▶ Visitor volume from China has increased steadily (53,000 in 2001 to 130,000 in 2011 to 203,100 in 2013).
- ▶ British Columbia's total goods exports to China (2014): \$6.3 billion.
 - Top exports:
 - Chemical woodpulp (\$1.5 billion)
 - Lumber (\$1.4 billion)
 - Coal and fuels from coal (\$845.2 million)
 - Copper ores (\$712.1 million)
- ▶ In 2013, China brought online a number of regasification terminals, increasing its LNG import capacity significantly.
- ▶ Since BC released its LNG strategy in February 2012, China's major energy companies, PetroChina, Sinopec and CNOOC, have all made major investments in BC's natural gas sector.
- ▶ The Canada-China Foreign Investment Promotion and Protection Agreement (FIPA) was ratified on Sept.12, 2014 and went into effect on Oct. 1, 2014
- ▶ In November, China announced Canada's designation as an RMB trading hub. A Canadian hub will help expand the range of financial products and services denominated in the Chinese currency, helping B.C. firms do business in China.

Background

- ▶ Beijing, translated literally as "northern capital", is China's third-largest city (by population) and the centre of government. While Shanghai and Hong Kong dominate China's economic and commercial sphere, Beijing is China's political, cultural, and educational centre.
- ▶ Beijing is situated at the northern tip of the triangular North China Plain, surrounded by mountains and the Great Wall of China to the north and northwest.
- ▶ Beijing is classified as a municipality with provincial-level status. The municipality is 16,808 km² in area, and is home to 8 districts.
- Beijing is the seat of China's Central Government and home to the Great Hall of the People, where China's National People's Congress sits. Although membership in the National People's Congress is largely determined by Communist Party committees, it is the highest state body in China and is the country's equivalent to a parliament.
- The Beijing Subway consists of 18 lines and is the second longest subway system in the world after the Shanghai Metro.
- Beijing is the northern point of the Grand Canal of China, the longest manmade waterway in the world (1,794 km) which stretches from Hangzhou to Beijing.



Economy

- ▶ Beijing is home to 52 Fortune Global 500 companies, the most in the world, and over 100 of the largest companies in China.
- ▶ Beijing's nominal GDP in 2014 was 2.1 trillion RMB (\$US 343 billion)
- Beijing's GDP per capita in 2013 was 99,995 RMB (\$US \$15,967).
- Beijing is among the most developed cities in China; tertiary industry (services) generated 76.9% of output.
- ► Financial services, whole-sale trade and retail trade, information technology services were the three biggest sectors, composing 14.5%, 12.2%, and 9% of the GDP respectively.





2011-2015 Beijing 5 Year Plan

- ▶ <u>Economy:</u> Promote steady and rapid development of economy, boost domestic demand, focus on increasing the consumption capacity of urban/rural residents, and keep investment growth levels at an appropriate pace. Accelerate economic transformation.
- <u>Development:</u> increase urban, rural, and regional development, emphasis on strengthening agriculture, resolving conflicts in development, rural reform, and a balanced development of regions.
- Social: Greater emphasis on maintaining/improving the quality of people's lives: stabilize/increase employment, acceleration of the creation of a unified social safety net, promotion of equal education opportunities, raise public health administration services and health awareness, "healthy Beijingers".
- ▶ <u>Environmental:</u> Tackle pollution, reduce, recycle and harmlessly dispose of household waste, and improve oversight of workplaces that use/produce hazardous waste.
- Energy: Secure adequate supplies of natural and energy sources. Maintain strict system for managing water resources and study how to build a water-efficient city.
- Housing: Beijing plans to build 35 million square meters of green buildings and plans to have green buildings account for 10% of the total number of buildings in Beijing by 2015.

Culture

- ▶ Beijing is the home of Chinese cultural activities such as Beijing Opera (*jingju*) and Chinese acrobatics. Beijing Opera, performed through a combination of song, spoken dialogue, and codified action sequences, is seen as one of the highest achievements of Chinese culture.
- Beijing is home to several of China's top colleges and universities, including Beijing (Peking) University and Tsinghua University. The city is also home to 26 libraries and over 100 museums.
- Architecture in Beijing features three prominent styles: traditional imperial (Forbidden City, Temple of Heaven), Sino-Soviet (1950s-1970s Russian influenced), and modern.

British Columbia -Beijing Relations

- ▶ B.C. maintains several education-related agreements with Beijing and its institutions, including a sub-national level memorandum of understanding on educational cooperation, and agreements on student mobility between the University of British Columbia and Beijing University.
- ▶ Several B.C. companies, including Aslchem International, Ritchie Brothers, Westport Innovations, Advanced Cultural Technologies, VendTek, Wex Pharmaceuticals, Vancouver Port Authority, and Drucker have offices in Beijing.
- ▶ BC opened a Trade and Investment Representative office in Beijing in 2009.


China's Education System

China's education system is the largest in the world. In June 2014 there were 9.39 million students taking the National Higher Education Entrance Examination (Gao Kao). Investment in education accounts for over 4% of total GDP.

In 1986, the Chinese government passed a compulsory education law, making nine years of education mandatory for all Chinese children. Today, the Ministry of Education estimates that 99.7% of the population of the country has achieved universal nine-year basic education.

In China, the education is divided into three categories: basic education, higher education, and adult education. The structure of China's education system is shown in the chart below.

Structure of the education system



Basic Education

Basic education in China includes pre-school education, primary education and regular secondary education.

Preschool, or kindergarten, can last up to three years, with children entering as early as age three, until age six, when they typically enter elementary school. Secondary education is divided into academic secondary education and specialized/vocational/technical secondary education.

Lower middle school graduates wishing to continue their education take a locally administered entrance exam, after which they will have the option either of continuing in an academic upper middle school or entering a vocational secondary school.

Vocational schools offer programs ranging from two to four years and train medium-level skilled workers, farmers, and managerial and technical personnel. Technical schools typically offer four-year programs to train intermediate technical personnel. "Schools for Skilled Workers" train junior middle school graduates for positions requiring production and operation skills. The length of training is usually three years.

Higher Education

Higher education at the undergraduate level includes two-and three-year junior colleges (sometimes called short-cycle colleges), four-year colleges, and universities offering programs in both academic and vocational subjects. Many colleges and universities also offer graduate programs leading to Master's and Ph.D. degrees.

Chinese higher education at the undergraduate level is divided into three-year and four-year programs. Three-year programs are offered at both short-cycle colleges and at four-year colleges and universities. Four-year programs are offered at four-year colleges and universities but do not always lead to a bachelor's degree.

Reform for Vocational Education

In February 2014, to reduce the huge number of university graduates with similar academic degrees competing with each other for the same jobs, China announced it would turn at least half of its public general universities (600) into institutions of applied learning or polytechnics to produce more technically trained graduates. The new applied institutions would focus on training engineers, senior technicians and other highly skilled workers rather than pursuing academic and highly theoretical studies.

The government called for more attention, investment and policy support to push the development of modern vocational education and boost employment. It also advocated curricula reforms to make sure students are obtaining the necessary skills to "open more career opportunities." The plan is to increase the total number of students at vocational education institutions to 38.3 million by 2020.

International Students from/to China

China has been the largest source country of international students in the world. According to newly released statistics by the Ministry of Education of PRC, 459,800 Chinese students went abroad for study in 2014. Of these students, 21,300 were sponsored with public funds, 15,500 received funding from their employers, and the other 423,000 (92%) studied at their own expense.

From 1978 to 2014, a total of over 3.51 million Chinese went abroad for study; by the end of 2014, almost 1.7 million Chinese students were studying abroad. Top destinations are the United States, United Kingdom, Australia and Canada.

China also hosts one of the largest populations of foreign students. In 2014, 203 countries sent 377,054 students to China, an increase of 5.8% from 2013. China has announced a target to host over 500,000 foreign students by 2020. The top source countries are South Korea, United States, Thailand, Russia and Japan.

In 2014, 43.6% of these students were studying towards degree programs (an 11.2% increase from 2013). Medicine, business, economics and management programs are popular areas of study. 9.8% of these international students received funding support from the Chinese Government while 90.2% were fee-paying.

Education-Related Issues for Beijing and China

Issues Overview

There are two education-related sensitive issues:

Relevant Offshore School Program Context

- In 2015/16 there will be 31 certified and three pre-certified British Columbia offshore schools in China.
- There is only one British Columbia certified offshore school in Beijing
- British Columbia offshore schools in China serve 8600 students and employ approximately 500 teachers.

1. Chinese Government Experience Requirements for Foreign Teachers

Issue

- In September 2014 Beijing introduced legislation requiring foreign teachers to have at least five-years teaching experience.
- At the national level, China has long had a requirement that foreign teachers have two-years of teaching experience to be eligible to teach in China.
- Offshore school owners are concerned Beijing's five-year experience requirement may be followed by other Chinese provinces.
- Recruiting enough qualified teachers can be an issue for British Columbia offshore schools.
- Most British Columbia certified teachers working at British Columbia offshore schools are either newly certified teachers with little teaching experience or retired.

Response

- British Columbia supports the Chinese governments' efforts to ensure international teachers residing and working in China are fully qualified, skilled education practitioners.
- British Columbia offshore school owners would like to see an exemption for British Columbia offshore schools to Beijing's five-year requirement.
- They feel that British Columbia's stringent quality assurance processes ensure quality teaching and are concerned that the five-year requirement impedes the recruitment of British Columbia teachers.
- British Columbia Offshore School Program Quality Assurance Standards:
 - British Columbia's Ministry of Education sets rigorous standards for teachers, administrators, and schools; standards apply to all British Columbia teachers i.e. schools in British Columbia and British Columbia offshore schools.
 - British Columbia offshore schools must employ British Columbia-certified teachers and principals.

- British Columbia Government requirements to become a certified teacher:
 - o a four-year university bachelor's degree;
 - a teacher training program;
 - o regular criminal record checks;
 - confidential character references; and
 - notarized personal identification documents.
- British Columbia Government requirements for British Columbia Offshore Schools:
 - o must employ an experienced British Columbia-certified Principal;
 - o must annually demonstrate that all British Columbia-teacher certifications are valid;
 - o must annually ensure the principal evaluates all teachers;
 - o must annually provide professional development for teachers; and
 - ensure all courses meet British Columbia's curriculum standards for content, planning, student assessment and desired learning outcomes.
- British Columbia's Ministry of Education annually inspects British Columbia certified offshore schools:
 - Most inspectors are retired school administrators, including former Superintendents of some of British Columbia's largest school districts.

A Blueprint for Educational Modernization

In July 2010, China announced its Outline of China's National Plan for Medium and Long-term Education Reform and Development (2010-2020) (hereinafter referred to as the Plan, presenting a blueprint for achieving the modernization of education in the next ten years in accordance with China's overall strategy of reform and opening up and socialist modernization. For more than six decades, and especially in the last three decades of reform and opening up, China has scored remarkable achievements from various aspects—establishing the world's largest education system to ensure the people's right to education, universalizing free compulsory education in urban and rural areas, promoting the rapid development of vocational education, popularizing higher education, achieving equal access to education and improving educational quality.

China increases subsidy to support compulsory education

China requires children to receive nine-year compulsory education with the age range normally from 6 to 15. A subsidy of 130.58 billion yuan (\$21.35 billion) has been given to support compulsory education mostly in rural areas. The volume marked a rise of 6.6 percent, or 8.09 billion yuan, from last year. The subsidy was allocated from the central government's budget. A large part of the subsidy will go to schools in the central and western regions in renovating school buildings and dormitories and raising teachers' salaries.

Gaokao reform significant for enhancing social equity

China's fresh plans to overhaul the National Higher Education Entrance Examination (commonly known as Gaokao) system, which is seen by many students as a fair path forward in society, are a key part of its efforts to safeguard social fairness. The

measures rolled out include discarding "extra" scores awarded for sporting or artistic achievement, such as playing a musical instrument, from 2015. The moves are responses to society's concerns. Problems with "extra" scores are often at the center of recruitment scandals. Due to lack of supervision, the policy turned out to be tradable privileges for those who could afford them and led to corrupt admission procedures in many places, generating public outcry. Scrapping extra scores will help stem scandals during enrolment, providing examinees, especially the underprivileged, a more fair environment.

The new rules, which will be the biggest change to the national college entrance exam since it was reintroduced in 1977, following the Cultural Revolution, will tip the scale more toward the underprivileged groups by expanding enrolment quotas for students from the less developed central, western parts of China. A special arrangement requiring the nations' universities in the more developed east part to recruit certain number of examinees from the less developed regions benefited 200,000 people in 2014, compared with the 25,000 people in 2008 when it was initiated.

The plan says the policy should be continued and the government will also help students from poorer provinces get into top universities. This year, enrolment at top universities by students from rural areas grew by 11.4 percent, with roughly 50,000 students from 832 impoverished counties in 22 provinces gaining entrance to top universities. The document, issued by the State Council, also required educational authorities to provide assistance for physically disadvantaged examinees when they are attending the examination usually held in early June.

But gaokao reform will carry far more significance than promoting fairness in education, since it is linked to other aspects of society. The reform is closely related to reforms on hukou, or household registration system, which could finally put an end to a system that has divided the nation into rural and urban populations since the 1950s. Currently, the children of some 200 million migrant workers have to attend gaokao in their parents' hometowns because of hukou restrictions.

Gaokao reform is also affected by an ongoing income distribution reform which seeks to close the gap between urban and rural residents, because there will never be a level playing field between urban and rural student due to income gap of their parents.

Revolutionary Reform in China's Higher Education

Premier Li Keqiang said in his Government Work Report in March that the country will encourage local colleges to become "applied colleges". "We will work comprehensively to promote the development of a modern vocational education system. We will guide a number of local undergraduate institutions to transform themselves into applied colleges," he said. Figures from the Ministry of Education last year showed that the country has 2,542 higher education institutions and more

than 1,300 higher vocational colleges, with 1,200 of them offering bachelor's degrees, and 600 of them administered by local governments. During a forum in May, Lu Xin, vice-minister of education, said that more than 600 local undergraduate institutions will gradually transform into "applied colleges". Lu called the move "revolutionary reform in China's higher education".

15 billion yuan annually spent on vocational education

The Chinese government has spent an annual average of 15 billion yuan (\$2.4 billion) on vocational education since 2011. The money has gone on improving basic schooling conditions, teacher training and financial aid for students. Vocational schools have become the main suppliers of skilled labor. Around 80 million students have graduated from vocational schools since 2006, 60 percent of new entrants into labor force. The number of students at vocational institutions will be over 38 million by 2020, according to a guideline issued by the State Council on Sunday. Currently 29.3 million study at 13,600 vocational schools and colleges.

China attracts more foreign students in 2014

According to the Ministry of Education, more than 377,000 foreign students arrived in China for studies last year, a 6% increase over 2013. China's economic development and financial support from governments and universities were key factors in attracting the overseas students. The number of students from Oceania and Africa increased dramatically year-over-year, while the number of students from the Americas dropped by 2 percent versus a year earlier. A total of 6,000 students came from Oceania, up 32 percent from 2013, while the number from Africa increased 25 percent to 42,000.

Accelerated growth in Chinese students studying abroad

The latest data released by the National Bureau of Statistics of China reported that 460,000 Chinese students studied abroad in 2014. This represented an increase of 12 percent year-over-year, which was triple the 4 percent annual growth witnessed in 2013. As for returnees, overseas students returning to China numbered 365,000 in 2014, up 3percent from 2013.

Chinese students going abroad at earlier ages

The China Study Abroad Development Report (2014) was released by the Center for China and Globalizationon. As for level of study, the statistics revealed a continuing shift toward undergraduate study, as students pursuing Bachelor's degrees now account for 40 percent of Chinese students in the United States vs. 42 percent in 2012-2013, while those studying in graduate programs decreased to 42 percent vs. 44 percent the prior year. Further, the number of high school students studying abroad is rising rapidly, with Canada being the most popular destination for this demographic (31 percent share), followed by the United States, Australia and the United Kingdom.

China to sponsor more students studying abroad

The government-sponsored China Scholarship Council (CSC) announced that it will sponsor 25,000 students to study abroad in 2015, 17 percent more than in 2014. An official with the CSC said the expanded number will include up to 8,000 graduate and doctorate students. The organization sent 20,400 students abroad in 2014, resulting in a total of 46,000 students in 85 countries being supported by the CSC.

International Education Strategy – Activities in China

- International education is a key priority for the Government of British Columbia.
- In 2012, the Ministry of Advanced Education launched British Columbia's International Education Strategy, which promotes the two-way global flow of students, educators and ideas between countries.
- China is identified as a key partner under the Strategy.

Our Vision: A high quality international education system in British Columbia that fosters social benefits and economic prosperity for all citizens.

Our Goals

- 1. Create a globally oriented education system in British Columbia.
- 2. Ensure that all students receive quality learning and life experiences.

Status Update

BC Global Education Program – Offshore Schools

- There are 46 offshore schools in 9 countries enrolling over 11,000 students and employing over 600 British Columbia certified educational professionals.
- There are now 31 fully certified British Columbia offshore schools in China. Three new pre-certified British Columbia offshore schools will open for the 2015/16 school year.

Scholarships

Post-Secondary Level

- Since 2012, Government has provided \$11 million in funding to Mitacs Globalink and Accelerate Programs (\$9M), and Irving K. Barber British Columbia Scholarship Society (\$2M) (One World Scholarship Program) - to give more British Columbian students the chance to study abroad and to bring more international students to British Columbia.
 - To date over 825 students have benefited from this funding.

K-12 Level

- On the mission, the Ministry of Education will announce two new K-12 level scholarships with China:
 - The British Columbia-China Award for Excellence in Chinese
 - A collaborative scholarship program rewarding excellence in the study of Chinese language at the K-12 level in British Columbia supported by the British Columbia Ministry of Education and the Education Office in the Consulate-General of The People's Republic of China in Vancouver.

- Awards will be valued at \$500, with \$250 being paid by each government.
- There will be a total of up to 50 awards offered per year.
- British Columbia International Education Scholarships
 - Scholarships will available for top-level K-12 Chinese international students to come to British Columbia for study at the K-12 level and for Chinese students currently studying at a BC K-12 school who will attend a British Columbia post-secondary institution.
 - Individual scholarship will valued at \$1,250.
 - There will be a total of 40 scholarships, with 20 dedicated for Chinese international students currently attending a British Columbia K-12 school and 20 dedicated to Chinese international students for entry to a British Columbia K-12 school.

Education Marketing Managers

- Eight dedicated Education Marketing Managers (EMMs) were hired in British Columbia's overseas trade and investment offices in China (Shanghai, Beijing, Guangzhou), Korea (Seoul), Japan (Tokyo), the UK (London) and India (Bangalore, Mumbai).
- The EMMs are actively advancing British Columbia's international education interests by providing support for incoming and outgoing delegations, partnership formation and participating in education fairs.

Marketing Strategy Initiatives

- In 2012, marketing initiatives were implemented in a number of British Columbia's key markets, including China, to promote British Columbia as a world class education destination. Activities included:
 - Domestic media print campaigns
 - Outreach to global media outlets, including China to promote the EQA brand;
 - Online Search Engine Marketing campaigns;
 - British Columbia's refreshed LearnLiveBC international education website; and
 - Marketing materials were produced and are distributed by the EMMs in China.

Japan's Key Priorities

- In September, 2014, the Abe cabinet was reshuffled and given the priority task of pulling the country out of chronic deflation. Other priorities:
 - ▶ Speed up the recovery in Tohoku.
 - ▶ Reinvigorate regional economies.
- "A society in which women shine" is a central part of Abe's economic recovery plan.

Government

- National Diet of Japan has two houses: House of Representatives (480 members) and House of Councillors (242 members). The House of Representatives is the lower house and is more powerful.
- House of Representatives is dominated by the Liberal Democratic Party (294 members) and its coalition partner New Komei Party (31 members).
- Japan's general election held in December 2012 resulted in the election victory of Japan's main conservative party, the Liberal Democratic Party (LDP).

- ▶ BC and Japan's Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry signed a Memorandum on Energy Cooperation and Development in 2013.

LNG

- ▶ Japan has the largest demand for LNG in the world, importing 87.3 million tonnes in 2012.
- ▶ The power sector now represents 64% of demand following the Fukushima disaster.
- ▶ Japan leads the way for on-stream regasification terminals with 28. They also have three under construction and two others in the planning phase
- ▶ To secure additional LNG, Japanese buyers have been actively signing contracts
- ▶ Mitsubishi has a 20% stake in the proposed Shell-led LNG Canada project in Kitimat.
- ► In March 2013, JAPEX acquired a 10% stake in PETRONAS' Pacific NorthWest LNG.

Background

- ➤ Tokyo, in the Kanto region on the south-eastern side of the main island Honshu, is the capital of Japan and is officially known as "Tokyo Metropolis".
- On July 1, 1943, Tokyo City was merged with Tokyo Prefecture forming the current "metropolitan prefecture."
- Tokyo prefecture is governed by a popularly elected governor and assembly. The wards and other subsidiary units of the city have their own assemblies.
- ➤ Tokyo is home to the Japanese Government, the Imperial Palace, and the Japanese Imperial Family.
- The city is a major international finance center and houses the headquarters of several of the world's largest investment banks and insurance companies.
- Tokyo is the center for Japan's transportation, publishing, and broadcasting industries.
- Home to 47 of Japan's 57 Global 500 companies (eg. Honda, Hitachi, Sony, Toshiba, Mitsubishi, Fujitsu, Canon, etc).
- ➤ Tokyo sits near the boundary of three tectonic plates, and was hit by powerful earthquakes in 1703, 1782, 1812, 1855, and 1923. Tokyo was affected by the 2011 Tohoku earthquake; transportation systems shut down and power outages occurred.
- Yoichi Masuzoe was elected as Tokyo's Governor in February 2014. He previously served as federal health minister.


Japan's Education System

In 2012, there were almost 20 million students enrolled in Japan's education system (from Kindergarten to University). Investment in education accounts for over 5.1% of total GDP.

The school system in Japan consists of three years of optional Kindergarten, six years of elementary school, three years of junior high school, and three years of optional high school. The nine years of elementary and junior high school are mandatory.

Approximately 95% of Japanese students choose to continue to the optional senior high schools, and the graduation rate from these upper secondary schools is 95%. The structure of the primary and secondary education system in Japan is shown below.

Structure of the primary and secondary education system



Higher Education

There are four types of higher education options in Japan: junior colleges, special training colleges, colleges of technology, and universities.

Junior colleges are two or three year programs depending on the department. The majority of departments are related to home economics, humanities, education and sociology. Special training colleges offer vocational and technical education in a variety of degree programs, typically through the bachelor's or master's level.

Colleges of technology (Kosen colleges) generally offer five-year programs in different occupational areas. Students who complete five years of training are considered an 'associate' in their field.

Universities in Japan consist of national, public and private institutions. The length of study in an undergraduate university is four years with the exception of medicine, dentistry and veterinary science department, which require six years of study.

Master's programs are two years of study, while Doctor's programs are five years.

Lifelong Learning

The Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science, and Technology wants to improve opportunities for lifelong learning, access to diverse types of learning, such as school education, social education, and home education.

They are working to enhance the functions of facilities at the Open University of Japan, through which people can receive university education at home. They also promote specialized training colleges that provide practical vocational education, and are enhancing libraries, museums, and community learning centres as sites for learning.

In addition, the Ministry holds the national lifelong learning festival in order to encourage individual interest in lifelong learning.

International Students from/to Japan

In 2012, were over 60,000 Japanese students studying overseas, with the largest number of student attending school the People's Republic of China, the United States, and the United Kingdom.

As of May 1, 2014, there were 184,155 international students in Japan, with the largest number of students coming from the People's Republic of China, Vietnam, and the Republic of Korea.

In 2008, the Government of Japan announced the "300,000 Foreign Students Plan," which calls to increase the number of foreign students in Japan from the 140,000 to 300,000 students by 2020.

MEXT (Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology)

- MEXT plays the largest role in overseeing education in Japan and in promoting internationalization within Japan's education system.
- MEXT launched a project last October called "Tobitake! Ryugaku Japan", which
 promotes study-abroad programs to cultivate global human resources. This
 project is supported by the Government as well as private companies. The
 target number for study-abroad is 120,000 university students (currently 60,000)
 and 60,000 High School students (currently 30,000) by the year of 2020.
- In 2008, the Government of Japan announced the "300,000 Foreign Students Plan", which calls for an increase in the number of foreign students coming to Japan from 140,000 to 300,000 by 2010.

Tokyo Metropolitan Government Board of Education (TMG)

- According to statistics in 2014, there are 431 full-time High Schools (G10-12) 194
 publics and 237 private and 817 Junior High schools (G7-9) 629 publics and 188
 private in Tokyo.
- TMG offers teachers study-abroad training programs. Until two years ago, they
 sent four teachers to the University of Northern British Columbia for a year. Last
 year, they sent 70 teachers each to Australia and the United States, and they
 added New Zealand for this year. (This information was provided by TIR contact
 at TMG)

 TMG selected ten Tokyo Metropolitan schools (Junior High School and High School) as "Tokyo Global 10," which is a group of leading schools to cultivate global human resources. The designated schools carry out an action plan to improve foreign language classes and to promote international exchange activities. (Tokyo Global 10 project will continue until 2018)

Hiroshima Prefectural Board of Education

- BCCIE visited Hiroshima in November 2014 and signed an education cooperation MOU with Hiroshima Prefectural BoE. Areas for collaboration includes sister schools, study tours and teacher exchange.
- Hiroshima Prefectural BoE has set a goal of rapidly increasing the number of high school students who study abroad in the coming year: about 1,000 students per year, including short-term programs. The BoE has launched various initiatives, including provision of study-abroad scholarships and student loans, and organization of an annual "high school study abroad" fair for local students, parents and teachers.
- Sister schools: Abbotsford, Langley and Aldergrove
 - Aldergrove and one of the high schools in Hiroshima (Saijo Shisui High School) made a sister-school contract in March 2015.
- In summer 2014, Hiroshima prefectural Government's BoE launched a short-term study program for 20 selected public school students to go to one of its approved destinations. British Columbia is identified as one of its destinations for government-approved overseas study programs.
- Hiroshima Prefecture BoE visited Vancouver in October 2014.

Yokohama

- Yokohama started a study-abroad support project for high school students in 2014.
- Yokohama offers subsidies to high schools, associations (who arrange study-abroad programs) and individual high school students to promote sister school activities, study abroad programs as a group and individual in 2015.
 - For Schools and associations, Yokohama will support JPY200,000 per student for short-term programs and JPY400,000 per student for long-term programs.
 - 2 For Individual high school student, Yokohama will support JPY400,000 per student for five applicants who wants to join a year program.

International Education Strategy – Activities in Japan

- International education is a key priority for the Government of British Columbia.
- In 2012, the Ministry of Advanced Education launched British Columbia's International Education Strategy, which promotes the two-way global flow of students, educators and ideas between countries.
- Japan is identified as a key partner under the Strategy.

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Status Update

BC Global Education Program – Offshore Schools

- There are 46 offshore schools in nine countries enrolling over 11,000 students and employing over 600 British Columbia certified educational professionals.
- As of April 2015, there is now one (1) British Columbia offshore school in Japan.

Scholarships

Post-Secondary Level

 Since 2012, Government has provided \$2 million in funding to the Irving K. Barber British Columbia Scholarship Society (One World Scholarship Program) - to give more British Columbian students the chance to study abroad, including Japan.

K-12 Level

- On the mission, the Ministry of Education will announce a new K-12 level scholarships with Japan:
 - British Columbia International Education Scholarships
 - Scholarships will available for top-level K-12 Japanese international students to come to British Columbia for study at the K-12 level and for Japanese students currently studying at a British Columbia K-12 school (including BC certified offshore schools) who will attend a British Columbia post-secondary institution.
 - Individual scholarship will valued at \$1,250.
 - There will be a total of 40 scholarships, with 20 dedicated for Japanese international students currently attending a British Columbia K-12 school and

20 dedicated to Japanese international students for entry to a British Columbia K-12 school.

Education Marketing Managers

- Eight dedicated Education Marketing Managers (EMMs) were hired in British Columbia's overseas trade and investment offices in China (Shanghai, Beijing, Guangzhou), Korea (Seoul), Japan (Tokyo), the UK (London) and India (Bangalore, Mumbai).
- The EMMs are actively advancing British Columbia's international education interests by providing support for incoming and outgoing delegations, partnership formation and participating in education fairs.

Marketing Strategy Initiatives

- In 2012, marketing initiatives were implemented in a number of British Columbia's key markets, including Japan, to promote British Columbia as a world class education destination. Activities included:
 - Domestic media print campaigns Outreach to global media outlets, including China to promote the EQA brand;
 - Online Search Engine Marketing campaigns;
 - o British Columbia's refreshed LearnLiveBC international education website; and
 - Marketing materials were produced and are distributed by the EMM in Japan.

MISSION TO CHINA & JAPAN MAY 29 – JUNE 4, 2015

British Columbia Offshore School Program - Ministry of Education

- British Columbia's Offshore School Program has authorized schools outside Canada since 1997 to offer the British Columbia graduation program. Students are awarded Dogwood diplomas upon successful program completion.
- Over 11,000 students are enrolled in the British Columbia education program across the 46 schools with over 600 British Columbia educational professionals employed at these schools.
- There are 41 fully certified British Columbia Offshore schools in China (31), Thailand (1), South Korea (5), Qatar (1), Egypt (1), Colombia (1) and Japan (1). There are two pre-certified British Columbia Offshore Schools in India and France, and three in China.
- In addition to the provision of high-quality education to international students, the Offshore School Program provides educational, social and economic benefits to British Columbia students, teachers, schools and communities, and increases the number of international students choosing to study in British Columbia.
- The British Columbia Offshore School Program also promotes the two-way flow of students and ideas as British Columbia teachers work and engage with local teachers and programs. Students from British Columbia benefit from the cultural and educational exchanges as British Columbia schools welcome offshore students for short-term educational programs in British Columbia.
- Students attending British Columbia offshore schools have the opportunity to graduate with a
 British Columbia Dogwood Diploma without leaving their home country. Offshore school graduates
 often come to British Columbia for post-secondary education, but have also been accepted into many
 prestigious universities world-wide.
- To ensure students in offshore schools receive a high standard of education, the British Columbia Ministry of Education sets rigorous standards for schools, teachers and administrators. These standards apply to all British Columbia teachers, whether they are working in a school in British Columbia or in a British Columbia Certified Offshore School.
- Teachers and principals in British Columbia Certified Offshore Schools are required to have a teaching certificate issued by British Columbia's Ministry of Education Teacher Regulation Branch. To be certified, British Columbia teachers must meet all of the British Columbia Teacher Regulation Branch's criteria for certification under the British Columbia Teacher's Act.
- British Columbia Certified Offshore Schools are inspected annually by British Columbia education
 experts to ensure that British Columbia Offshore Schools provide quality education programming in an
 educationally supportive environment.

International Student Program – Education Quality Assurance

- On June 1, 2014, federal regulation changes affecting Citizenship and Immigration Canada's International Student Program (ISP) came into force. The ISP encompasses the issuance of study and work permits to international students including off-campus and co-op work.
- The federal changes address concerns where international students have been misled, charged excessive fees, and received a poor quality education. Changes to federal regulations will assist in better monitoring students on study permits in Canada.
- The new federal requirements support Government's commitment under the BC Jobs Plan and International Education Strategy to expand and strengthen British Columbia's quality assurance.
- The key change was a requirement for provinces and territories to provide CIC with a list of
 post-secondary institutions eligible to accept international students on study permits.
 Study permits are required for international students in programs longer than six months.
- In response to the federal regulation changes, British Columbia determined that
 - All post-secondary institutions and language schools that accept international students on study permits are required to have British Columbia's Education Quality Assurance (EQA) designation in order to be on the province's ISP Designated List.
 - All British Columbia K-12 schools that accept international students on study permits are <u>not</u> required to have EQA designation as these schools already meet rigorous British Columbia Government standards for operation.
- Post-secondary institutions and language schools have until December 31, 2015 to take the
 necessary steps to achieve EQA designation. British Columbia's ISP Designated List,
 available on the CIC website, lists 280+ post-secondary institutions, of which 164 have
 attained EQA designation for 2014-15, and the rest are working towards achieving the
 designation by December 2015.

Education Quality Assurance (EQA)

- The EQA designation is Canada's first provincial brand of quality for post-secondary education. The EQA seal allows students to easily identify provincial institutions the Government of British Columbia recognizes as having met quality assurance standards and that offer consumer protection to learners. EQA provides a standard provincial seal recognized globally as a symbol of quality.
- EQA requires all public and private institutions to meet standards in educational quality, institutional financial viability and student protection.

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CANADA-CHINA BILATERAL RELATIONS

Canada and China have had diplomatic relations since 1970. The sale of Canadian wheat to China during the 1960s laid the foundation for official ties between the two countries. Today, Canada maintains an embassy in Beijing, four consulates-general (Shanghai, Guangzhou, Hong Kong and Chongqing) and ten trade offices (Chengdu, Nanjing, Qingdao, Shenyang, Shenzhen and Wuhan, as well as the newly announced offices in Hangzhou, Xi'an, Xiamen and Tianjin), bringing Canada's network to a total of 15 locations across the country.

This long-standing and comprehensive relationship operates at many levels and includes political, commercial, scientific, cultural and academic ties. Bilateral cooperation is dynamic, with many Canadian government departments having productive cooperation programs and memoranda of understanding with their Chinese counterparts, and regular exchanges at various levels. Both countries enjoy an active working relationship in international fora, such as the G-20, the United Nations, the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation forum, and the World Trade Organization.

TRADE AND INVESTMENT

From 2000 to 2013, the International Monetary Fund (IMF) estimates that China more than tripled its share of the global economy from 3.6% to almost 12.7%. In 2013, the Chinese economy was larger than the other three BRIC economies (Brazil, Russia and India) combined (most recent data). China is now a key link in global value chains across many sectors.

China has become Canada's second-largest single nation trading partner, as well as the second-largest source of merchandise imports and destination for merchandise exports. In 2014, two-way merchandise trade amounted to \$77.9 billion, accounting for 7.5% of Canada's total merchandise trade, and representing almost 6.4% increase over 2013. Imports were valued at over \$58.6 billion, an increase of approximately 11.0% over 2013, and exports fell to almost \$19.3 billion, a 6.0% decrease over 2013.

Canada's two-way foreign direct investment (FDI) relationship with China is also deepening, having tripled from \$7.0 billion in 2007 to almost \$21.6 billion in 2013. At the end of 2013, the stock of Canadian FDI in China stood at \$4.9 billion, while the stock of Chinese FDI in Canada stood at \$16.7 billion. The rise in Chinese investment is due in large part to major acquisitions in Canada's energy and mining sectors. In 2012, the Government of Canada approved the sale of Nexen to the China National Offshore Oil Corporation – China's largest ever overseas acquisition. The Canada-China Foreign Investment Promotion and Protection Agreement came into force in October 2014.

PEOPLE-TO-PEOPLE TIES

Strong people-to-people ties exist between the two countries. There are about 1.5 million Canadian residents of Chinese descent, accounting for approximately 4.5% of Canada's total

population. Chinese (including Cantonese and other dialects) is Canada's third most spoken language after English and French. Immigrants born in China also form one of the largest groups within Canada's immigrant population. Data from the Department of Citizenship and Immigration Canada (CIC) indicate that China, which was always among the top three sources countries for permanent residents to Canada between 2004 and 2012, ranked first in 2013.

China is a priority country in Canada's International Education Strategy. Furthermore, the Canada-China Joint List of Outcomes of 2012, announced by Prime Minister Harper and former Chinese Premier Wen Jiabao, set an objective of 100,000 students studying in each other's countries by 2017. By end of 2013, Canada hosted 95,731 students with Chinese citizenship, accounting for over 30% of our international student population. In addition, over 16,500 students attend the nearly 60 elementary/secondary schools in China licensed to teach a Canadian curriculum. Almost 4,000 Canadian students studied in China in 2013.

In 2013, China was Canada's fourth largest source foreign visitors. In 2009, China granted Canada Approved Destination Status, a designation that makes it easier for Chinese nationals to visit Canada. According to CIC, Canada issued a record 235,000 visitor visas to Chinese applicants, an increase of 158% compared to 2004. The Canadian Tourism Commission estimates that the average Chinese visitor to Canada spent \$1,805 per trip (the second highest among all nationalities), which translated into a \$603 million injection into the Canadian economy in 2013. The increase in the number of Chinese outbound tourists is expected to continue. By 2020, outbound Chinese tourists will reach 200 million, and tourist spending will triple.

RECENT VISITS AND KEY OUTCOMES

Since 2006, there have been some 70 visits to China by Canadian ministers, while former President HU Jintao conducted a state visit to Canada in June 2010.

The Prime Minister's third visit to China, in November 2014, reiterated that Canada and China have a shared objective in developing a comprehensive and mutually beneficial partnership. The Prime Minister met with President XI Jinping and discussed the broad direction of the bilateral relationship and international issues of mutual interest. The Prime Minister and China's Premier LI Keqiang agreed to a series of initiatives under the Canada-China Joint List of Outcomes 2014, including: plans to implement two new ministerial dialogue mechanisms (Foreign Affairs Ministers Dialogue and an Economic and Financial Strategic Dialogue), a currency swap agreement and renminbi clearing arrangement, as well as commitments on further cooperation on market access for Canadian goods, nuclear energy, air transport, health, and cultural exchanges. It was also announced that 2015 to 2016 will be the Year of People-to-People and Cultural Exchanges between Canada and China (partly in recognition of the 45th anniversary of diplomatic relations).

Recent ministerial-level visits to China include former Foreign Affairs Minister Baird, Minister Fast (International Trade), Minister Alexander (Citizenship and Immigration), Minister Ambrose

(Health), Minister Leitch (Labour), Minister Moore (Industry), Minister Rickford (Natural Resources), Minister Ritz (Agriculture and Agri-food), Minister Shea (Fisheries and Oceans), Minister of State Yelich (Foreign Affairs and Consular), Minister of State Wong (Seniors) and His Excellency Governor General David Johnston.

In addition to visits by high-level elected officials, both governments continue to promote trade and investment through regular working-level dialogue. The Canada-China Joint Economic and Trade Commission (JETC) met in Beijing on February 9, 2015. It met previously in Ottawa in February 2014. The JETC was established in 1973 and is chaired annually by Canada's Deputy Minister of International Trade and the Chinese Vice-Minister of Commerce. Created in 2005, the Canada-China Strategic Working Group (SWG) is chaired by the Canadian Deputy Ministers of Foreign Affairs, International Trade, and Natural Resources, and their Chinese counterparts. The fourth meeting of the SWG took place in Beijing, China, on September 10, 2014.

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GOVERNANCE

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Canada and China hold regular dialogues and exchanges in the field of governance, including legal, judicial and law enforcement cooperation. In 2013, Canada and China concluded negotiations on the Agreement on the Sharing of Forfeited Assets and the Return of Property that will allow Canada and China to share the proceeds of crime seized from criminals in investigations involving Canadian and Chinese investigators. The two countries participate in

the Canada-China Law Enforcement and Judicial Cooperation Consultations, an expert legal forum established in 2008 and led by both countries' foreign ministries to encourage exchange on legal cooperation matters. In addition, law enforcement officials continue to co-chair the Canada-China Working Group on Law Enforcement and Judicial Cooperation to strengthen cooperation. Canada will continue to work in concert with Chinese civil society and government organizations to strengthen the rule of law in China, advance labor rights and occupational health and safety for migrant workers, support legal-aid capacity building, and promote the rights of marginalized groups in China.

HEALTH

Canada and China have had a long-standing cooperative relationship in the field of health since the days of Canadian medical missionaries over 100 years ago. Dr. Norman Bethune, a Canadian doctor, is well known and respected by the Chinese for his medical services during China's struggle against Japan in the 1930s. Canada and China signed a Memorandum of Understanding in 1995 for cooperation in the field of health, which has since been reinforced by five Plans of Action (2001-2004, 2005-2008, 2009-2011, 2011-2014 and 2014-2016) signed by health ministers. A Canada-China Joint Committee on Health was established in 2007 to establish collaborative work plans and to monitor progress. The numerous collaborative projects and activities conducted over the years under the action plans include cooperation during the 2009 H1N1 pandemic; regular communication on infectious diseases; a project on health policy evaluation; seminars/workshops on emerging infectious disease and chronic disease prevention and control; joint health research funding, projects and scholarships; and professional exchanges and visits related to health and hospital systems, health professional training, food fortification, food inspection and safety, and consumer product safety.

ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENT

Canada and China's interests in the energy sector are complementary, not only in relation to primary sources of energy, but also with respect to energy efficiency and renewable energy technology, including solar, wind, geothermal, hydro-electric and biomass-related technology. With growing oil and natural gas output, Canada is considering creating export capacity for these commodities to Asian markets. As a large consumer of primary energy and an emerging leader in technology for traditional and clean energy, China represents a promising partner for long-term collaboration. Formal Canada-China energy relations have taken a number of forms, including the Canada-China Joint Working Group on Energy Cooperation, which was established by a 2001 Memorandum of Understanding and was renewed in 2006. This Working Group is cochaired by Canada's Department of Natural Resources and China's National Energy Administration, which operates under the National Development and Reform Commission, a "super-ministry" of the Chinese government and a comprehensive policy making agency that is responsible for strategic overview of the national social and (macro) economic development. This Working Group last met in Ottawa in July 2012.

Canada and China have a long-standing history of cooperation on environmental matters, including ongoing programs of technological cooperation and knowledge exchange on issues such as climate change and clean energy, science and technology, chemicals, as well as air and water quality. Cooperation occurs through various bilateral and multilateral cooperative mechanisms. Most important among these is the China Council for International Cooperation on Environment and Development (CCICED), a high-level advisory body that provides the Chinese government with research-based policy recommendations on environment and development issues and to which Canada is a leading contributor. The CCICED is chaired by ZHANG Gaoli, Vice Premier of the State Council. Canada is represented as International Executive Vice Co-Chair along with ZHOU Shengxian, Minister for the Ministry of Environmental Protection. Other mechanisms include the Canada-China Joint Committee on Environmental Cooperation and the Canada-China Climate Change Working Group. Through these mechanisms, Canada has been working with China to encourage the development and use of environmentally-friendly technologies and the transfer of best Canadian practices in environmental management.

PROVINCIAL REPRESENTATION IN CHINA

Several Canadian provinces maintain representation in China. Ontario has international marketing centres in Beijing, Shanghai and Chongqing. Quebec has representation in Beijing, Hong Kong (immigration) and Shanghai. British Columbia has trade and investment representatives in Beijing, Shanghai and Guangzhou (services are provided by a consultancy). Alberta has representatives in Beijing, Hong Kong and Shanghai, and soon in Guangzhou. Finally, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia have opened a joint trade and investment office in Shanghai under the New West Partnership.

The October 2014 visit of the Premiers of Ontario, Quebec and Prince Edward Island under the auspices of the Council of the Federation resulted in the signing of multiple agreements between Canadian and Chinese businesses.

CANADA-CHINA COMMERCIAL RELATIONS

SUMMARY

China is the world's second largest economy and Canada's second largest trading partner. Two-way merchandise trade amounted to \$77.9 billion in 2014, accounting for 7.5% of Canada's total. This represented a 6.4% increase over 2013 and a 53.3% increase over 2009. China is the second largest source of merchandise imports to Canada, valued at \$58.6 billion in 2014, up 11.1% over 2013. Top imports from China are electrical and electronic machinery and equipment (phones, televisions, etc.), machinery, furniture and bedding, toys and sports equipment, woven or knitted apparel, and iron or steel products.

At the same time, Canada's merchandise exports to China was \$19.3 billion in 2014, making China our second largest merchandise export trading partner. Top Canadian merchandise exports in 2014 were mineral ores, wood pulp, oilseeds, wood products, mineral fuels and oils.

Canada's two-way foreign direct investment (FDI) relationship with China is also deepening. Statistics Canada data show that the stock of Chinese FDI in Canada stood at \$16.7 billion at the end of 2013, a four-fold increase since 2007. s.16,s.17 s.16,s.17

s.16,s.17 The Heritage Foundation, an American think-tank, estimates that Canada ranked as the third largest destination for Chinese outbound capital flows between 2005 and 2012. Within the last decade, Chinese firms have increased their interests throughout the Canadian economy, largely concentrated in the natural resources sectors, highlighted by China National Offshore Oil Corporation's (CNOOC) \$15.1 billion acquisition of Canadian firm Nexen Inc. at the end of 2012. This deal exemplifies China's need for a secure supply of resources to meet its rising demand.

The stock of Canadian direct investment abroad in China stood at \$4.9 billion at the end of 2013, an increase of 79.1% over 2007. Canadian investment in China is challenged by investment restrictions in areas of Canadian strength such as mining. s.16,s.17 s.16,s.17

China is a priority market under the Global Markets Action Plan and we are seeking to increase opportunities in the key sectors of aerospace, agriculture and processed food, automotive, education, infrastructure, information and communications technologies, life sciences, ocean industries, oil and gas, sustainable technologies, and transportation. There are over 400 Canadian firms active in China, including large multinationals (e.g. Bombardier, Manulife, Power Corp.) and small- and medium-sized enterprises. Canadian companies operate in diverse sectors, including life sciences, automobiles, aerospace, transportation, financial services, information and communication technologies, and clean technology. Like most foreign operations in China, Canadian investments are primarily focused in Beijing, the Yangtze River Delta (Shanghai) and the Pearl River Delta (Guangzhou and Shenzhen).

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS

Increased high-level visits in both directions since 2009 have elevated the bilateral trade and investment relationship. Most notable were visits to China by Prime Minister Harper in December 2009, February 2012 and November 2014, a visit to Canada by former President HU Jintao in June 2010, and visits to China by the Governor General in 2010 (Michaël Jean) and 2013 (David Johnston). Deliverables from the Prime Minister's November 2014 visit are summarized in the 2014 Canada-China Joint List of Outcomes. These include:

- Agreement to establish a Foreign Affairs Ministers Dialogue and an Economic and Financial Strategic Dialogue.
- Signing of a MOU to establish renminbi clearing arrangements in Canada which will promote development of a Canadian renminbi market.
- Signing of an expanded Memorandum of Understanding on Nuclear Cooperation.
- Signing of an amended Canada-China Air Transport Agreement, allowing airlines from both countries to offer more travel options.
- Commitment to establish new direct air links between Calgary and Montreal to Beijing.
- Agreement to enhance track two (i.e., academic) dialogue to explore deepened bilateral trade and economic relations.

During his November 2014 visit, Prime Minister Harper also announced the expansion of Canada's network of trade offices in China with the opening of new offices in the cities of Hangzhou, Tianjin, Xiamen and Xi'an. Canada's network of diplomatic missions and trade offices in China now totals 15 locations. A variety of other memoranda of understanding and

commercial signings, and a new wave of science and technology cooperation projects, also resulted from this visit.

A robust program of ministerial visits to China has helped sustain momentum in the bilateral relationship. In 2014, Ministers Fast, Baird, Ritz, Alexander, Ambrose, Rickford, Shea and Oliver, as well as Ministers of State Yelich and Wong, all paid one or more visits to China.

In addition to visits by high-level elected officials, both governments continue to promote trade and investment through regular working-level dialogue. The Canada-China Joint Economic and Trade Commission (JETC) met in Beijing on February 9, 2015. It met previously in Ottawa in February 2014. 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CHINA POLITICAL AND ECONOMIC OVERVIEW

KEY POINTS

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 To bolster his authority and implement this agenda, President Xi Jinping has consolidated his power base through personnel appointments, bureaucratic changes and a vigourous anti-corruption campaign.

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• The Party held its fourth plenary session of the current (18th) central committee from October 20 to 23, 2014, where it focused on reinforcing the rule of law and making changes to China's legal system, likely in support of the anti-corruption campaign and creating a more stable and predictable environment for business. State media report this was the first time a Party plenary session addressed rule of law issues, underscoring the importance Xi and the Party place on the corruption challenge.

BACKGROUND

More than thirty-five years after the introduction of Deng Xiaoping's "Reform and Opening Up" policy in 1978, China's rapid economic development has had a profound impact on the country's economic and social landscape. Data from the International Monetary Fund (IMF) indicate that China's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) grew between 1983 and 2013 at an average annual rate of 10.1%, and nominal GDP per capita grew 66.2% as millions emerged from

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poverty. Global Insight estimates that China's economy could overtake that of the United States
in size by the beginning of the next decade, and its influence reaches every continent as never
before.

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In short, China's reform and opening to the world delivered rapid economic growth, but also created many of the imbalances with which its leaders now struggle, all while subjecting the country to external influences Beijing cannot easily regulate. Within China and abroad, the country's future trajectory is the subject of intense speculation but little certainty.

RECENT DEVELOPMENTS

Anti-Corruption Campaign: Xi Jinping's anti-corruption campaign has been the most important recent political development in China. Billed as a matter of survival for the Party and state, with a promise to take down "tigers" (senior officials) as well as "flies" (junior civil servants), it aims to transform China's bureaucracy and clear the decks for economic reform. The most senior "tiger" affected thus far is Zhou Yongkang, the former domestic security chief and thus far the only former member of the Politburo Standing Committee ever to face corruption charges. Other senior officials detained include General Xu Caihou, formerly the second-highest ranking officer in the Chinese military; Jiang Jiemin, head of the State-Owned Assets and Supervision and Administration Commission; and Su Rong, former vice chair of the Chinese People's Political Consultative Committee, a quasi-upper legislative chamber. Tens of thousands of junior civil servants have been penalized for such offences as embezzlement, bribery and personal extravagance with public funds. Given the absence of an independent judiciary, free media and other bottom-up checks on power, many analysts believe that the disciplinary pressure on Party members will have to extend for several years if it is to have the desired transformative effect. At the same time, it will have to be carefully calibrated so as not to produce excessive fear or resentment among Party officials.

Economic Growth: China's GDP growth slowed to 7.4% in 2014 according to the IMF, continuing a pattern of decline from a recent high of 10.1% in 2010. The IMF forecasts a growth rate of 7.1% for 2015 and, assuming no change in exchange rate and a continuation of current policy plans, further decline for the next five years, possibly reaching as low as 3.5% by 2020. Weakness in China's major export markets following the 2008 crisis drove industrial production down, and while this may be returning slowly, private consumption continues to be constrained by slowing real income growth. Slowing growth is also related to government restrictions on the purchase of investment properties, which have led to a large drop in home purchases and a fall in construction activity. Given the massive growth in size of the overall Chinese economy over the past 30 years, however, the Chinese government will likely be comfortable with slower growth as long as the labour market remains healthy. In fact, de-emphasizing growth could give China the opportunity to address other pressing issues, such as a rapidly growing debt bubble (particularly among local governments) and the contracting real-estate market.

Environmental Protection: Recognizing the mixed results achieved under its 12th Five-Year Plan (2011-2015) and in response to mounting public pressure, the current government has raised the profile of environmental issues on its agenda. Declaring a "war on pollution," Premier Li Keqiang announced in a March 2014 session of the National People's Congress that environmental protection would be a main goal in his annual work plan — a status it has never held under previous Premiers. The government has amended the Environmental Protection Law (for the first time in 25 years) to strengthen enforcement and expand the role of civil society and the judiciary, adopted (in September 2013) a national air pollution control plan with an estimated budget of \$275 billion, begun release of soil pollution data previously considered a state secret, and launched carbon emission trading schemes in Beijing, Shanghai, Guangdong, Shenzhen, Tianjin, Chongqing and Hubei (making China the second-largest carbon market in the world behind the EU). Given the conflict facing local officials between environmental protection

mandates and incentives (including illicit) for furthering economic growth, the political will to meet environmental targets will be a deciding factor in their success.

Judicial Reform: In June 2014, state media announced government plans to launch pilot judicial reform programs in six provinces, experimenting with changes that will centralize control of the judiciary at the provincial level. According to the Central Judicial Reform Leading Small Group Office, these reforms will separate the judiciary from administrative authorities, improve judicial accountability, protect the job security of judicial officers and improve the management of sub-provincial court finances. This includes the removal of two key levers of power over the courts – personnel decisions and budgeting – from local control, and is intended to prevent interference in the judicial process by local officials. The program will be tested in Shanghai, Guangdong, Jilin, Hubei, Hainan and Qinghai. The court system in China remains answerable to political authorities, but the changes are important as part of the broader campaign to impose discipline and reduce corruption within the Party. The changes will significantly enhance the power of provincial leaders, in particular to address issues such as local governments ignoring pollution laws or failing to compensate property owners after demolitions. They are likely also intended to foster a judiciary loyal to provincial and central leadership.

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Military Modernization: China's military modernization program continues apace and from 2004 to 2013, China's officially disclosed military budget grew at an annual average of 9.4% with 2013 spending estimated at above \$145 billion. At the March 2014 gathering of the National People's Congress, the Party announced a 12.2% increase in military spending. s.16

Thus, in concert with its expanding global interests, China has placed a greater focus on build-up of naval and air assets for missions related to sea lane security and counter-piracy. China also continues to participate in UN peacekeeping and maintains approximately 1,900 military observers and troops in 10 operations, mostly in sub-Saharan Africa and the Middle East. This level of support has been consistent since 2008 and is the highest among the permanent members of the Security Council.






BC Origin Exports to China & Hong Kong




Year-Over-Year % Growth in GDP of China & Hong Kong





Travellers from China & Hong Kong Entering Canada Through BC






BC Origin Exports to Japan




Year-Over-Year % Growth in GDP of Japan





PISA (Programme for International Student Assessment)

- The Programme for International Student Assessment measures the skills and knowledge of 15year-old students in the key areas of mathematics, reading, and science.
- PISA is a collaborative effort among member countries of the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) and takes place every three years.
- In the most recent administration of PISA, in 2012, approximately 510,000 students from 65 international jurisdictions participated.

China

Japan

 - Math 5 international jurisdictions above Japan

PIRLS (Progress in International Student Assessment)

- The Progress in International Reading Literacy Study (PIRLS) is an international assessment that measures trends in the reading achievement of Grade 4 students.
- Grade 4 is an important point when students are making the transition from learning to read to reading to learn (i.e. they need to be able to read well to understand materials in other subject area.)
- PIRLS is administered every five years and is carried out by the International Association for the Evaluation of Educational Achievement (IEA).
- In the most recent administration, in 2011, approximately 325,000 students from 45 international jurisdictions participated in PIRLS.
- British Columbia students performed very well on PIRLS 2011:
 - Reading only 4 international jurisdictions above BC
- China did not participate in PIRLS 2011.
- Japan did not participate in PIRLS 2011.

Education mission to bolster ties with China and Japan

VANCOUVER – Education Minister Peter Fassbender is taking B.C.'s world-class education system on the road as he embarks on a five-day mission to Asia until June 4.

With stops in Beijing and Tokyo, Fassbender will be promoting British Columbia's education programs and services, reinforcing the Province's commitment to international education and strengthening the relationships with governments and education partners in both countries.

The mission supports the BC Jobs Plan's International Education Strategy, which looks to increase the two-way flow of students and the social, cultural and economic opportunities that emerge from international education.

In Beijing, Fassbender will meet with Maple Leaf Education Systems to celebrate a strong, 20-year partnership with the B.C. offshore school provider. He will also renew a 2003 memorandum of understanding with the National Ministry of Education, which will identify priority areas for co-operation, including scholarships and student/teacher exchanges.

In Tokyo, Fassbender will officially open Bunka Suginami Canadian International School, the first B.C. offshore school in Japan. The school has a strong focus on English immersion to support student entrance at English-speaking universities around the globe. It also offers educational and cultural opportunities for both B.C. and Japanese students through exchanges and by twinning with schools in Qualicum during the summer.

The mission follows a similar trip to Asia by Advanced Education Minister Andrew Wilkinson. That delegation, which included representatives from a number of local post-secondary institutions, explored research and commercial prospects, promoted exchange opportunities and announced nearly \$1.4 million in scholarships for students in B.C. and China.

The estimated travel and accommodation cost for the minister and his chief of staff is approximately \$11,500. Detailed information on final amounts will be made available.

New scholarships help Chinese and B.C. students expand their education

BEIJING – British Columbia's Education Minister Peter Fassbender and British Columbia Special Representative in Asia Ben Stewart announced two new scholarships today that will benefit Chinese international students and students in B.C.

Education Minister Peter Fassbender, along with the Ministry of Education and British Columbia Council for International Education executives are currently in China to meet with representatives from the Beijing Municipal Commission, China's National Ministry of Education, the Heilongjiang Provincial Department of Education and other educational partners.

The goals of Minister Fassbender's visit are to strengthen and expand B.C.'s international education partnerships with national, provincial and local governments in China.

Stronger collaboration paves the way for greater exchange of ideas and opportunities that will benefit students in British Columbia and China. Giving youth the chance to gain educational, social and cultural experience in other countries is a key goal of China's National Plan for Medium and Long-term Education Reform and Development as well as B.C.'s International Education strategy.

On this trade mission, Minister Fassbender and executives celebrated the 20th anniversary of the partnership between British Columbia and Maple Leaf Educational Systems. The Minister also toured a B.C. offshore school Sino Bright School No. 8 in Beijing and met with students and staff at the school.

British Columbia International Education Scholarships:

- The Ministry of Education has created a new annual scholarship program to provide a total of \$150,000 that will benefit 120 students from China, Japan and South Korea.
- Each country will receive awards totalling \$50,000: forty students from each country will receive \$1,250 to study in British Columbia.
- This includes 20 students who will attend kindergarten to grade 12 schools and 20 grade 12 students who will attend post-secondary institutions in B.C.
- The ministry will work with government partners with China, Japan and South Korea, as well as B.C. K-12 and post-secondary sector representatives on the scholarship program.
- Details of the scholarship including eligibility criteria will be announced next winter.
- The goal is to issue the first awards in spring for eligible students to commence their studies in B.C. in fall 2016.

British Columbia-China Award for Excellence in Chinese scholarship:

- This is a joint-scholarship program between the British Columbia Ministry of Education and the education office in the Consulate-General of The People's Republic of China in Vancouver.
- This annual scholarship awards B.C. students (Canadian citizens or permanent residents) in Grade 12 for their excellence in the study of Chinese language.
- A total of 50 students will receive \$500 each by June 30 each year. The ministry will
 evaluate and select the award recipients based on the eligibility criteria.
- The ministry and the Chinese Consulate in Vancouver will each contribute \$12,500, for a combined total of \$25,000 per year to the scholarship.

Benefits of the B.C. offshore school program to China:

- Providing youth with the opportunity to gain valuable educational, social and cultural experiences abroad is a mutual goal for the Province of British Columbia and China.
- In 2010, China launched its National Plan for Medium and Long-term Education Reform and Development (2010-2020) to modernize its education for the next 10 years.
- An important objective of the plan is to open up Chinese education to the outside world through student exchanges and collaboration. Schools are encouraged to reach out to resources outside of the country to strengthen English-language education programs.
- British Columbia's offshore school program helps meet these objectives: B.C.-certified
 offshore schools in China provide a valuable opportunity for Chinese students to gain
 English language skills and study B.C.'s quality curriculum in their local environment.
- They also facilitate social and cultural exchange opportunities for students through study abroad terms and twinning relationships (schools partnering with each other).
- Students who graduate from a B.C. offshore school receive a B.C. Dogwood Diploma, making it easier to enter B.C.'s post-secondary system.

B.C. offshore schools in China:

- The first B.C. offshore school was opened by Maple Leaf Educational Systems and Schools in Dalian, 1998.
- There are currently 31 B.C. offshore schools in China that offer B.C. education program and graduation credential.
- Three more schools have been approved to open in September 2015:
 - Canada Yantai Secondary School in Yantai, Shandong Province;
 - Maple Leaf International School in Yiwu, Zhejiang Province; and
 - Maple Leaf Foreign Nationals School in Yiwu, Zhejiang Province.

- Each country will receive awards totalling \$50,000: forty students from each country will receive \$1,250 to study in British Columbia.
- This includes 20 Japanese students who will attend kindergarten to grade 12 schools and 20 grade 12 Japanese students who will attend post-secondary institutions in B.C.
- The ministry will work with government partners in China, Japan and South Korea, as well as B.C. K-12 and post-secondary sector representatives, on the scholarship program.
- Details of the scholarship including eligibility criteria will be announced next winter.
- The goal is to issue the first awards in spring for eligible students to commence their studies in B.C. in fall 2016.

Bunka Suginami Canadian International School:

- First B.C. offshore school to open in Japan.
- The B.C. program operates out of a larger school that has been in operation since 1974.
- Total number of students at the school is 1,109 (Grades 7-12) with 15 students enrolled in the B.C. program in April 2015. Forty-three (43) students are pre-registered in the program for 2015-16.
- Strong focus on English immersion to support student entrance at international Englishspeaking universities.
- Offers delivery of Honours English Development Program for Grades 8 and 9.
- School delivers innovative timetabling and a co-teaching model for math and science some blocks are taught by both Japanese and B.C. teachers to ensure English language readiness for B.C. provincial exams.
- School programming blends both cultures and systems to fully meet the requirements of both Japanese and B.C. curriculum.
- School provides educational and cultural opportunities for B.C. schools and communities through exchanges and other collaborative ventures, including homestays and twinning in Qualicum Beach, B.C. for social studies credits during the summer.

Benefits of the B.C. offshore school program to Japan:

- Like Japan, British Columbia believes strongly in international education.
- Education reforms in Japan focus on diversifying education and encouraging internationalisation, including study abroad. The B.C. offshore school program helps meet these objectives by promoting B.C.'s quality education program and encouraging social and cultural exchange through study abroad and twinning relationships (schools partnering with each other).
- In addition to a high school diploma from their home jurisdiction, students who graduate from a B.C. offshore school receive a B.C. Dogwood Diploma, making it easier to enter B.C.'s post-secondary system.

B.C.-Japan relations:

- Collaboration between B.C. and Japan began nearly 100 years ago.
- According to Canada's 2011 census, nearly 46,000 British Columbians identify themselves as being of Japanese descent.
- Thirty-seven (37) communities in B.C. have sister city and friendship agreements with Japanese communities, including Yokohama City and Vancouver that have been sister cities since 1965.
- In 2013, more than 224,000 Japanese visitors travelled to Canada, 48% entering directly through B.C.
- As B.C.'s third largest export market, Japan continues to be one of the most important export destinations for British Columbia. In 2014, 10.3% of B.C.'s goods exports shipped to Japan.
- A dedicated Trade and Investment Office in Tokyo supports Japanese companies wishing to explore business opportunities in our province and B.C. businesses looking to export to Japan.
- B.C. is the largest exporter to Japan amongst Canadian provinces, representing 38.5% of the total. Japanese imports to B.C. comprised 6.1% of B.C.'s total imports.
- In 2012-13, B.C. hosted 12,900 students from Japan, including 700 in the K-12 system.
- Japan is the number three source country for international students in B.C., after China and South Korea.
