SEA TO SKY – Four schools in the Sea to Sky corridor will be able to proceed with routine capital projects thanks to <u>nearly</u> \$847,9001.1 million in provincial funding to provide healthy, safe and modern learning environments.

Caulfield_Caulfield_Elementary in West Vancouver will receive \$261,900 \$131,000 to purchase a new HVAC unit to improve ventilation throughout the school. CHILLIWACK – Three schools in School District 33 will be able to proceed with routine capital projects, thanks to \$1,340,000 in provincial funding. These improvements will help provide healthy, safe and modern learning environments.

- Tyson Elementary School: Mechanical upgrades. Cost: \$186,000. New air handling units for the gymnasium and select classrooms with improved controls and sensors will replace those that have reached the end of their serviceable life.
- AD Rundle Middle School: Mechanical and heating system upgrades. Cost: \$710,000. Upgrades
 include a new roof mounted HVAC unit, dust collection system, ventilation units for the
