BACKGROUND:

On March 14, 2017, Mr. Gunn Kim, Consul General of the Consulate General of the Republic of Korea in Vancouver, will meet with Deputy Minister Dave Byng to discuss international education collaboration. Mr. Kim's Curriculum Vitae is attached (Appendix 1).

As British Columbia's fourth-ranked trading partner, the Province enjoys strong trading relations with the Republic of Korea (ROK).

International Education and ROK

- ROK is a long-standing, priority country for British Columbia's international education sector, with Korean international students forming the second largest population (China is the largest) with 4,900 students enrolled in B.C. K-12 schools (2015 Government of Canada data).
- The Ministry of Education certifies five British Columbia Offshore Schools in the Republic of Korea, which educates 750 students and employ 80 British Columbia teachers and administrators (2016/17 Ministry of Education data).
- Since 2015/16, the Ministry of Education provides scholarships of \$1,250 to 40 ROK students entering B.C. high school programs or graduating from a B.C. K-12 school and entering a B.C. post-secondary institution.

Appendix 2 provides data on B.C. international education in the ROK. Appendix 3 is the Global Affairs Canada Education 2015 profile for the ROK.

The Ministry of International Trade maintains a B.C. Trade and Investment Representative Office in Seoul, South Korea. That office employs a half-time, Education Marketing Manager, who works with the Ministry of Education, school districts and independent schools to promote B.C.'s international education sector.

The B.C. Council for International Education is active in ROK, for example supporting Premier Christy Clark's trade mission to Seoul in May 2016.

DISCUSSION:

Onshore International Education

The Ministry of Education (EDUC) continues to work to maintain and expand B.C.'s K-12 international education market share in Korea. To this end, the Ministry is developing an expert-authored market share analysis and a strategic growth plan for ROK. EDUC is also developing marketing videos promoting both the onshore and offshore programs that will be available in English and in Korean voice over.

These projects will augment pre-existing work efforts, including the English and Korean language international education promotion and student orientation website (2016) and the International Education scholarships for which Korean students are eligible (2015).

Over the past five years, Korean international student enrolment in K-12 schools in B.C. has remained mostly flat (growing 6% from 4,250 students in 2011 to 4,500 students in 2015). Internationally, Korea has declined as a sender of international students to all destinations. Korean international student enrolment in Australia is down 41% from 2012 and New Zealand is down 34%. The reasons for this are economic and demographic pressures, (e.g. the recession and a declining population) and government encouragement for students to remain in Korea. A decline in Korean international students has been experienced in all major receiving countries.

Government of Canada study permit data for the first three quarters of 2016, however, shows a 5% increase in the number of study permits issued (Canada-wide) to Korean international students over the same period in 2015. B.C. will be well positioned to capture market share among this uptake in Korean students. BCCIE and MIT are exploring BC's presence in Korea at an important education fair in the fall of 2017.

MIT's marketing efforts in Korea, also indicates that B.C. remains a K-12 destination of choice for Korean K-12 students. School districts that the EMM has assisted in Korea over the past quarter include Abbotsford, Delta, Richmond and Victoria.

B.C. Offshore School Program

B.C. certifies five offshore schools in Korea, three in Seoul and one in each of the provinces of Gyeonggi and Gangwon. All five of the schools commenced operation between 2010 and 2013.

Opportunities / Next Steps

The Consul General may be able to help the Ministry of Education identify strong potential ownership groups for offshore school expansion in one of the Korean Free Economic Zones.

CONCLUSION:

The Republic of Korea is a long-standing priority international education market for both the K-12 onshore and offshore sectors. EDUC is conducting a range of initiatives to increase market share in Korea and to expand the B.C. Offshore School Program in Korea.

Canada as a Study and Research Destination

Education is highly valued in South Korea. This hunger for education has been a key factor that resulted in the transition of South Korea from one of the world's poorest countries in the 1960's to the world's 13th largest economy in 2014. International education is viewed as providing a high quality education leading to better job prospects and greater success. However, there is also a growing perception that foreign degrees are not providing as much return on investment as previously had been anticipated. In this context, Koreans prefer to study abroad for a short term period of time at a younger age, go to local top-ranking universities in order to get a decent job here in Korea.

Korea has long been one of the top student sourcing countries to US, China, Japan, Australia and it remains the 3rd largest student sourcing country to Canada as of 2013 with 19,123 student number following China and India. The United States has dominated the international education market for a long time, and China is now the 2nd largest destination for Korean students because of the increasing significance of economic ties between Korea and China.

Demographically, South Korea is a rapidly aging society with a growing concern about the birth rate of 1.9, the lowest among 34 OECD member countries, and Korea's student population is forecast to shrink in the coming decade. There are increasing alternatives available for Koreans to receive an international education while staying in Korea at all levels of study.

Historically, Canada has held a strong position in the now shrinking K-12 and ESL markets, but has not been less successful in attracting Korean interest in post-secondary institutions due in a large part to weak brand recognition in the competitive Korean market. There is growth potential for Canadian post-secondary institutions to recruit good quality students directly by enhancing awareness of their branding and establishing partnership with local institutions. Canadian colleges have gained popularity over the past years primarily due to work, study and immigration opportunities after completion of study.

Like other Asian countries, Korea is a highly competitive agent-driven market. Education agents still play a critical role in determining the choice of destination for students, especially for K-12 and ESL segments. Identifying qualified agents is a key to success in student recruitment and word of mouth is also an important and effective channel.

Key Opportunities for Institutional Partnerships

Globalization is a major objective of Korean universities which have established partnership agreements with foreign (including Canadian) universities as a way of strengthening their competitiveness. Partnership includes reciprocal student mobility, credit transfer and dual degree programs. Aiming to attract 200,000 foreign students by 2020, the Korean government has encouraged Korean universities to go global and the degree of internationalization is a major factor in Korean university rankings. Korean universities are keen to enter into partnerships with foreign universities, increase the quantity and quality of classes taught in English, and strengthen foreign student services to recruit more foreign students. Currently, there are 84,891 foreign students studying both degree and non- degree programs as of 2014.

Korean universities are eager to diversify their foreign student population as there is an 'over-dependence' on Chinese students who make up over 70% of all foreign students in Korea. Universities are primarily interested in real exchanges which would also see Canadian students coming to South Korea to study. Canadian institutions are interested in receiving South Korean students and in many cases, find it challenging to send a reciprocal number of Canadian students to South Korea, which deter both Korean and Canadian institutions from entering into an agreement. So while Korean universities would welcome more Canadian students, interest in studying in Korea among Canadians seems low. Despite these challenges, institutional partnerships are becoming more important. Korean universities and colleges used to send Korean students to private or non-partnering institutions for short-term ESL programs, but recently, a growing number of universities prefer to send their Korean students to partnering institutions that allow them to stay a semester or a year.

The Korean government aims to position Korea as the best global education hub in Northeast Asia by attracting local universities and research centers and high profile foreign universities to the Songdo Global Campus in Incheon. The State University of New York Korea became the first university to open up in March 2012 followed by openings of George Mason University, Ghent University Global Campus and Utah University Asia Campus in 2014. These institutes provide Korean students the opportunity to receive an international education and obtain globally-recognized credentials without having to relocate overseas.

Political Overview

In 2013, the Ministry of Education, Science & Technology (MEST) was divided into the Ministry of Education (MOE) and the Ministry of Science, ICT and Future Planning (MISP). The MOE is the central government body in charge of education and oversees sixteen elected metropolitan and Provincial Offices of Education which in turn, oversee 180 Regional Offices of Education. The MOE provides general policy direction but leaves the majority of budget planning and administrative decisions to the municipal and provincial education offices. Both private and public schools receive government funding and are subject to the same laws and restrictions on curriculum, schooling hours, etc. In 2014, the Education budget was \$53.2 billion and it is expected to increase 4.3% in 2015. The MOE indicates there is a \$4 billion deficit due to students choosing to study abroad which has contributed to the 47.4% shortfall in South Korea's service industry. Consequently, the Korean government is currently taking active measures to reduce the number of outbound students. Popular university programs that follow a 1+3 model, where students did a year at a Korean institution to learn English followed by three years abroad studying their major, were declared illegal. In a move to attract more international students to South Korea, the government has proposed easing education regulations to allow foreign academic bodies to jointly establish schools in Korea with institutes here. The next presidential election is scheduled for December 2017 with the new

President taking office in 2018. The next National Assembly election occurs in April 2016 with the new Assembly members taking office in May 2016.

Sectors of interest with relevance to International Education:

According to the Global Market Actions Plan, South Korea has been identified as an established market for Education. The TCS has identified the following sectors – K-12, college and vocational training, universities and English language study as presenting potential for Canadian education institutions and companies. The recently conclusion of negotiations of the Canada-Korea Science, Technology & Innovation Agreement provides an opportunity to brand the excellence of Canadian research institutes and the opportunity for joint science and technology partnerships.

Education System Overview

The South Korean school year operates on a two semester system. The first semester runs from March to August and the second semester from September to February. The Korean education system consists of six years of elementary school, three years of middle school and three years of high school.

There are nine types of high schools including general, vocational (general / specialized), science, foreign language, arts/sports, and alternative education.

Unlike elementary and middle school educations, high school education is not compulsory and students attending both public and private general high schools must pay for their own tuition. The average tuition for general high school ranges between KRW 1.5 million to 2 million (approx. CAD 1,600 - 2,200, 1 CAD = KRW 900). Korean students pay over KRW 10 million (approx. CAD 11,000) to attend autonomous and foreign lanuguage high schools which reserve the right to select students and prepare them intensively to enter Korea's elite universities.

Korean society places great emphasis on the value of education and parents often send their children to after-hours cram schools called "hagwons" where they learn the same subjects taught in schools. Many parents invest heavily to send their children to hagwons believing that public school education is not enough for their children to be accepted by the best institutions. English language education accounts for about 33% of this after-school private education market. Upon graduation, 80% of Korean high school students continue on to advanced education regardless of which type of high school they attended. Korean university entrance is highly competitive through a national exam and there is a strong preference to send children to elite universities. This preference for the university's high ranking or brand also applies to sending students to study overseas. University training is seen as vital for allowing student to foster the contacts and connections that will allow them to succeed when they enter the workforce. Tuition at universities has been rising faster than the average cost of goods and public pressure was put on the government in 2011 to curtail the rise of tuition costs. The current government vowed in 2013 to cut current rates in half but this has not yet materialized. The average tuition to attend a Korean university is reported KRW 6,660,000 (= Approx. CAD7,400 exchange rate: 1CAD = KRW900)

Korea has traditionally had a small number of foreign, international schools established to educate the children of expats. Many Korean parents have wanted to enroll their children in these schools as they provide education in English and are believed to provide

better access to Ivy League schools in the US. Recently the Korean government has encouraged the creation of more foreign schools to create a domestic alternative to overseas K-12 education at a more economical cost (30-50% of the cost of studying abroad). Other factors have been to capture demand for international education from neighboring countries, especially China, and to reduce social problems associated with broken families where the mother and children live abroad and the father stays to work in Korea.

In 2009, two new laws were introduced to create "International Schools" which were licensed to operate in Free Economic Zones (FEZ) and Jeju Island. Two schools in FEZ are allowed to enroll Korean students up to 30% of the student body while three international schools in Jeju allowed Koreans to enroll 100% of the student body.

Local Market Overview

Korea is a highly urbanized, tech-savvy, modern, sophisticated country with an affluent population (per capita GDP over \$28,000). Korean is the official language and the population is ethnically homogenous although foreign residents now equal 4% of the population. Seoul, the capital, has a population of 10 million, but once combined with the surrounding area of Gyeonggi-do and Incheon, it accounts for half of South Korea's population and approximately 60% of the country's wealth. Busan is the second largest city with a population of 3.4 million.

South Korea faces the problem of a rapidly aging population. According to the United Nations defines an "aging society" as one in which the elderly make up at least 7 percent of the population and an "aged society" as one in which they make up at least 14 percent. Korea passed the first threshold in 2000 and is due to pass the second in 2018—just 18 years later. In fact, the speed of aging in Korea is unprecedented in human history, taking 18 years to move from an aging to an aged society - faster even than Japan which took 24 years for this transition. With one of the lowest birth rates in the world, Korea has just 4 births per 1000 women. Some reports indicate that South Korea's population may stabilize (ie: cease to grow) as soon as 2023. The decline in birth rate

which started in the 1970's has reduced the number of school age children and the demand for education.

Student Mobility Indicators

The trend of sending K-12 students overseas to study appears to have peaked with the number of students studying abroad decreasing from 30,000 students four years ago to 22, 910 in 2014. One reason for this decline is that one third of students are taking advantage of the new international schools available to Koreans principally in Jeju. The school age population in Korea is also decreasing which has reduced the potential pool of students and social and economic strains experienced by separated families have reduced the appeal of overseas education. Students are less likely to be accompanied by their mothers than compared to ten years ago. The United States attracted over one third of all K-12 students with Canada attracting 10.6%. While scholarships for K-12 students are rare, Korean taxpayers can receive deductions for all legal educational expenditures including overseas study.

According to the Ministry of Education statistics, the number of students going abroad for post-secondary education peaked in 2011 with 262, 465 and has decreased to 219,543 in 2014. This is slightly more than the 2008 level of students. As many highly educated university graduates are unable to find work in their area of study, the ability to find a job after graduation has resulted in an increased interest for college and vocational training overseas.

Scholarship Considerations

Since 1977, the Korean government has operated a scholarship program for Korean students enrolled in Master's and Doctoral programs overseas through the National Institute for International Education. The programs are designed to diversify the subjects of study and to foster world-class human resources in fields that require strategic development such as fundamental research to help promote balanced scholastic development by extending support for study in less popular fields. Each year, approximately 70 individuals are fully funded (tuition, room & board) for 2 and 3 year programs.

Many companies support advanced degrees for their employees including overseas study. While focused on graduate education, a few firms provide opportunities for undergraduate education as well. Some local companies or foundations provide scholarships as an element of CSR activities including the following:

- Mirae Asset Park Hyeon Joo Foundation supports tuition, airfare and living expenses for 100 to 300 students studying abroad on exchange programs.
- The Kwanjeong Educational Foundation of Korea annually supports 100 Korean students who have gained or are seeking admission to well recognized universities outside of Korea. They provide up to 50,000 USD per year for students to study abroad depending on the country and course of study.
- Samsung Scholarship covers tuition and living expenses up to 50,000 USD per year from bachelor's through doctoral degrees for students majoring in science and engineering as well as liberal arts and social science.
- The Korea Foundation for Advanced Studies (KFAS) supports fellowships for graduate studies abroad. The value of the fellowship varies based on grants or financial assistance received from the university they will be attending.

Student and Canadian Visa Considerations

Canada has introduced the Electronic Travel Authorization (eTA) which will be a mandatory requirement for visa-exempt travellers such as Korean nationals who are flying to Canada as of March 15, 2016. From August 1, 2015, travellers will be able to apply for their eTA on CIC's website. For more information, please consult the CIC website at http://www.cic.gc.ca/english/visit/eta.asp.

In 2014, the study permit approval rate for all applications processed by the Visa Office in Manila, which is responsible for permanent/temporary resident applications from South Korea, among other countries, was 62% and on average, about 80% of applications were processed within 67 days. ³

Canadians do not require a visa to visit South Korea.

Other Considerations

Connections between South Korea and Canada are reasonable with daily flights offered by major airlines between Seoul and Vancouver and frequent direct flights offered between Seoul and Toronto.

According to Akamai's Q2 2014 The State of the Internet report, South Korea has an average Internet connection speed of 24.6Mbps, placing it well ahead of No. 2 Hong Kong with 15.7 Mbps. The U.S. ranked No. 14 with an average Internet connection speed of 11.4Mbps. Plans are in place for South Korea to introduce a 10GBPS broadband which will further increase the speed of internet connection. Approximately 84% of the population has regular internet access with 70.5% of the population accessing the internet from their mobile phone.

Recommendations on Market Entry Strategies

There are no formal restrictions on the promotion of overseas education. However, under Korean law, Korean passport holders are not permitted to leave the Korean K-12 education system for long term education. Nevertheless, there is no checking of whether Koreans attend school or not, until they try to enter or re-enter the school exam system at which time their record must be produced.

According to the Role of Education Agents in Canadian Education Systems by CMEC in 2013, Korea ranks with China as the top country in which agents are used by Canadians to recruit students. Agencies, called "Yuhakwon", are rarely exclusive, and come in a bewildering variety of competence. In many cases, Yuhakwon make their primary income from commissions from the educational institutes they represent and rarely charge parents or students any service fees.

Yuhakwon specializing in K-12 are suffering from a downturn in business, and there is fierce competition for personal introductions and recommendations from their clients. Those specializing in higher education are also suffering from slowing numbers and competition from foreign schools, foreign language high schools, alumni associations, and online searches. Agents provide an advisory service to parents who feel more comfortable sending their child to an institution recommended by the agent. Good agent relationships are key to success in this market.

Koreans interested in studying abroad will start with an Internet search. According to AC Nielsen's audit in June 2014, Google has only a 2.06% share of searches in South Korea while Naver has 76% and Daum just under 20%. If a Canadian institution does not show up in a Naver search, it does not exist! Even if potential students can read English fluently, parents will want a comprehensive Korean language guide. Discussion groups (known as cafes) on specific themes abound on Naver. Recruiters from Canadian institutions need to intervene in such cafes frequently or get Korean students attending their universities to do so. Blogs are also published by individuals and agencies specializing in overseas education. Entries typically gave advice on how to acclimatize, what to expect and how much it may cost. Personal entries took on more of a diary format.

Facebook is not as popular in South Korea compared with Line and Kakao Talk - the major social networking modes within Korean society. Kakao plus friend system is most recommended for reaching a South Korean audience.

School visits to international schools and some private schools are often welcome. South Korean public schools are not generally welcoming of efforts to recruit students at their facility.

Alumni networks are hugely important in Korean society and these connections can play an important role in future career development.

Key Education Events

The Korea Study Abroad Fair is the biggest student recruitment fair in Korea, taking place twice a year in late March and early October. Heavily dominated by major local agencies, the fair showcases about 400 education agencies, institutions and study a broad service organizations from 23 countries. The majority of visitors are unlikely to decide a destination of study on site, and two major levels of study they are interested are K-12 and language training. The event takes place at COEX, Seoul and the Embassy of Canada runs an info booth during the fair. 

SUBJECT: Deputy Minister meeting with Consul General of the Republic of Korea

BACKGROUND:

On March 14, 2017 Mr. Gunn Kim, Consul General of the Consulate General of the Republic of Korea in Vancouver, will meet with Deputy Minister Dave Byng to discuss international education collaboration. Mr. Kim's Curriculum Vitae is attached (Appendix 1).

As British Columbia's fourth-ranked trading partner, the Province enjoys strong trading relations with the Republic of Korea (ROK).

International Education and ROK

- ROK is a long-standing, priority country for British Columbia's international education sector, with Korean international students forming the second largest population (China is the largest) with 4,900 students enrolled in B.C. K-12 schools (2015 Government of Canada data).
- The Ministry of Education certifies five British Columbia Offshore Schools in the Republic of Korea, which educate 750 students and employ 80 British Columbia teachers and administrators (2016/17 Ministry of Education data).
- Since 2015/16, the Ministry of Education annually offers forty \$1,250 tuition scholarships for ROK students entering B.C. high school programs or graduating from a B.C. K-12 school and entering a B.C. post-secondary institution.

Appendix 2 provides data on B.C. international education in ROK. Appendix 3 is the Global Affairs Canada Education 2015 profile for ROK.

The Ministry of International Trade maintains a B.C. Trade and Investment Representative Office in Seoul, South Korea. That office employs a half-time, Education Marketing Manager, who works with the Ministry of Education, school districts and independent schools to promote B.C.'s international education sector.

The B.C. Council for International Education is active in ROK, for example supporting Premier Christy Clark's trade mission to Seoul in May 2016.

DISCUSSION:

Onshore International Education

The Ministry of Education (EDUC) continues to work to maintain and expand B.C.'s K-12 international education market share in Korea. To this end, the Ministry is developing an expert-authored market share analysis and a strategic growth plan for ROK. EDUC is also developing marketing videos promoting both the onshore and offshore programs that will be available in English and in Korean voice over.

These projects will augment, pre-existing work efforts, including the English- and Korean language international education promotion and student orientation website (2016) and the International Education scholarships that Korean students are eligible for (2015).

Over the past five years, Korean international student enrolment in K-12 schools in B.C. has remained mostly flat (growing 6% from 4,250 students in 2011 to 4,500 students in 2015). Internationally, Korea has declined as a sender of international students to all destinations. Korean international student enrolment in Australia is down 41% from 2012 and New Zealand is down 34%. The reasons for this are economic and demographic pressures, (e.g. the recession and a declining population) and government encouragement for students to remain in Korea. A decline in Korean international students has been experienced in all major receiving countries.

Government of Canada study permit data for the first three quarters of 2016, however, shows a 5% increase in the number of study permits issued (Canada-wide) to Korean international students over the same period in 2015.

BCCIE and MIT's EMM in ROK indicate that B.C. will be well positioned to capture market share among this uptick in Korean students. BCCIE and MIT are exploring BCCIE's presence in Korea at an important education fair in the fall of 2017. MIT's EMM will also be present.

MIT"s EMM also reports that B.C. remains a K-12 destination of choice for Korean K-12 students. School districts that the EMM has assisted in Korea over the past quarter include Abbotsford, Delta, Richmond and Victoria.

Korean Ministry of Education Key Areas of Focus

In March 2016, the Korean National Ministry of Education announced plans to increased teacher exchange programs internationally. The Korean Ministry of Education has subsequently entered into Memorandums of Understanding (MOU) with Denmark, Kuwait and Iran. B.C. does not have an active education-related MOU with any level of Korean government. The ROK

Education Ministry also recently announced a plan to support students with a multicultural background and improving the understanding of multiculturalism for all students.

B.C. Offshore School Program

B.C. certifies five offshore schools in Korea, three in Seoul and one of each of the Province's of Gyeonggi and Gangwon. All five of the school commenced operation between 2010 and 2013.

CONCLUSION:

The Republic of Korea is a long-standing priority international education market for both the K-12 onshore and offshore sectors. EDUC is conducting a range of initiatives to increase market share in Korea. Entering into an MOU with the National Korean Ministry of Education or with a prominent provincial or municipal government could assist EDUC's expansion activities.

 - Private providers may offer Korean language classes after school or on weekends for international students from Korea who wish to maintain their first language while studying abroad

Appendix - Summary Korean Government Programs in Ontario

The information below summarizes and provides context relating to information provided by the Korean Consulate in Vancouver to B.C.'s Ministry of Education on the topic of Korean government initiatives to increase Korean language study in Ontario.

Background: Ontario Context

- The Korean Government offers three initiatives that leverage robust, Province-wide infrastructure for additional language study.
- In Ontario, after school / weekend Korean language programs are part of a larger mandate to promote/support international languages.
- Many districts administer International Languages through their Continuing Education Program.
- Out of school language programs are available for elementary and secondary age students who are heritage language speakers or new speakers to the language
- Province of Ontario has developed *International Languages Elementary (ILE) Program* resource packs (2012) that help districts set up programs.
- Korean is offered in many larger Ontario school districts, including Ottawa-Carleton District School Board, Toronto Catholic School Board, Peel District School Board, York Region District School Board, among others
- International languages offered in addition to Korean include Mandarin, Japanese, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese, Hindi, Tamil, and Vietnamese, among others

Korean Government's 3 Ontario-based Korean Language Initiatives

- a) Korean as a subject in secondary schools after school / weekends
 - School districts offer Korean after school or on weekends
 - Courses are year-long and worth 1 credit
 - Require 25 or more students enrolled to open a class
 - Current enrollment = 300 students (90% non-native speakers)
- b) Korean language classes in elementary schools after school / weekends
 - School districts offer Korean after school or on weekends
 - 2 hours/class (no information on credit value)
 - Requires 25 or more student enrolled to open a class
 - Current enrollment = 2000 students (no data on non-native speaker %)
- c) 'Explore Korea' student exchange program
 - Travelling course offered during Spring Break or in summer
 - Worth 1 credit for successful completion
 - 4500 secondary students participate in Explore program
 - o Korea is 1 eligible destination
 - No data on how many Ontario students visit Korea

- 1 Korean as a subject in secondary schools
- : Since Korean has already been selected as an international language in BC, encourage School Districts to open Korean as part of credit earning class.
- 1. Example of other languages in BC
 - BC offers Spanish, Japanese and Mandarin.

2. Example of Ontario

- School Districts in Ontario offer Korean as a subject of regular curriculum during weekdays after-school or on Saturdays.
- Korean subject lasts for one school year and it comprises 110 hours with earning 1 credit.
- Available to open Korean subject if there are **more than 25 students** who want to enroll.
- Korean teachers are accredited by Ministry of Education of Ontario and their wage is CAD 50/hour.
- 6 School Districts, 7 secondary schools in Ontario offer Korean subject and 300 students are taking Korean.
 - * 90% of 300 students are non-Korean native speakers.

- Pay 50% of teachers' wage
- Provide scholarships for excellent students, support class materials, and hold cultural events regularly. Run visiting Korea program for excellent students with no cost.
- Invite 1 or 2 Korean teachers and educators per school district to Korea with no cost.
- Korean consulate will cooperate with school districts to advertise and promote Korean subject to the local students

2 After-school Korean Class

- : Offer Korean as an after-school Class in elementary schools

South Korea - Education Sector Profile

Overview

International students from Korea account for the second largest market for British Columbian Institutions with 17,500. The number of students from Korea studying at BC institutions has dropped in all jurisdictions globally and in BC at a rate of 2.2% from 2009/2010. According to Citizen and Immigration Canada statistics, the number of students from Korea to Canada has dropped 11.4% from 2010 and shifted ranking from 2nd to 3rd.

BC Post-Secondary institutions have continued to establish strategic student and faculty exchange programs in order to reverse this trend. The Province has established an Education Marketing Manager in Korea to facilitate these partnerships and promote the province as a destination to study. In 2015-16, over 24 BC Institutions attended the annual Korean Student Fair demonstrating continued interest in this market.

Sector Opportunities in BC

K-12

The main driver for Korean parents in sending children abroad for K-12 is to obtain reliable English language capability. While short-term summer English language programs continue to offer strength and importance for Korean parents, BC Offshore delivery of the K-12 curriculum has been another opportunity to expose Korean students to the BC Education in the market. Currently 5 BC Offshore schools are operating in South Korea; BIS Canada, BC Collegiate Canada, CBIS Canada, SIS Canada and Westminster Canadian Academy, with approximately 744 students, studying at these BC offshore programs in Korea.

Post-secondary sector

A unique feature of the BC Post-Secondary system is the BC Transfer System where students are able to pathway from English language to post-secondary institutions while maintaining their credits towards diploma or degree completion. As Korean students often transition from intense English language training to the college and then the University system, this feature has drawn many Korean students to BC.
