Flooding

Highlights:

- Over the weekend, BC experienced very heavy rain, localized flooding, and landslides in the Southwest and Central regions of the province.
- As of this morning, five highways were closed (#s 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11) and Princeton and Merritt have declared local states of emergency with evacuation orders in place.

Main message:

- Our province has been hit hard over the last few months – wildfires, heat, and now flooding.
- I am thinking about all of the people who have been impacted by this severe weather – we are working with all of our partners to open up roads and get people to safety.
- I want to acknowledge and thank all the people in search and rescue, the police and firefighters, and local governments who have been working throughout the weekend to respond to this storm.
- To those in Merritt and Princeton, we are working with local governments in Kelowna and Kamloops to set up supports as needed.
- Our government is here to support the people of British Columbia and we will continue to support local governments in responding.

How about people who are trapped in their cars?

EMBC November 15, 2021

- Being stuck on a highway in your car is a very scary thing.
- I want to assure people that search and rescue experts are on location and assessing the need and ability to get to folks who need help.
- The teams are looking at the possibility of air rescue, while also factoring in the challenge of high winds.
- The conditions are dynamic and our officials will continue to work to keep people safe.

Officials in the US were told to sandbag on Saturday. Why no warnings in the Fraser Valley?

- This situation was an unpredictable one and officials were working with local government to make decisions in real time.
- Rainfall and high stream warning were issued by Environment Canada to alert the public and first nation and local governments to take the appropriate actions
- EMBC hosted coordination calls over the weekend to support first nation and local government actions
- EMCB social media provide preparedness information or flooding

Should highways have been closed earlier?

- This situation was an unpredictable one and officials were working with local government to make decisions in real time.
- The River Forecast Centre was issuing warnings to local governments throughout the day yesterday

- DO WE HAVE MORE DETAILS?

Why doesn't BC have a proper public alerting system?

- We are prioritizing the expansion of the Alert Ready system in BC as communities across the province face more extreme weather events.
- We are committed to finding the right solution to expand our provincial alerting program.
- First Nations and local authorities provide emergency notifications to their residents for all hazards and the Province amplifies these Orders and Alerts.
- We currently use Alert Ready's broadcast alerts for tsunami warnings, Amber Alerts and civil emergency events and EMBC has begun work to implement a pilot for the 2022 wildfire season.

Hoping to speak with someone from Emergency Management BC about the current flooding and mudslides. Ideally we'd book a live interview with our host, Stephen Quinn, tomorrow at 7:10 a.m. It would be seven min over the phone.

Also have two questions:

Was BC's emergency alert system employed anywhere in the province ahead of this weather system? If not, why?

Recommendation

- No, the Alert Ready system hasn't been used during the current event.
- The public alerting system is currently only used in B.C. for tsunami notifications, AMBER Alerts, and policing incident alerts.

- We're looking at how alerting for other hazards might be integrated.
- Given the increasing threats our communities are facing due primarily to climate change, it's clear the Province needs to expand the Broadcast Intrusive Alerts through the Alert Ready system in B.C.

I'm following up from a line of question we began this summer. Would it be possible to interview officials at EMBC such as Pader Branch today? Or could you respond to the following questions by end of day?

Q1. In 2016 submissions to a federal regulator (below) EMBC expicilty said it needed "Alert Ready" access to warn BC residents about flooding events. Yet statistics show that BC continues to have never used the system for any kind of warning. Why is this?

Q2. In July, EMBC officials said in the aftermath of devastating heat and fires they wanted to look at using the Alert Ready system more widely. Yet the alert count remains zero and there is no discernible progress from a public standpoint. Given this can you say whether any progress has been made at all on the promised capabilities? Overnight Updates

Sumas Prairie - Abbotsford

- The City of Abbotsford has issued an urgent notice for all residents remaining in the Sumas Prairie area to evacuate the area immediately.
- The Barrowtown pump station is in danger of succumbing to flood waters, and if it does the areas that have not yet been flooded will be inundated.
- Regional SAR teams are staging personnel and equipment to respond by ground, boat, and air as required to evacuate residents from the area the morning of Nov 17.

Situation Overview

- The storm blocked, damaged, and impacted multiple roadways, causing widespread road closures, and stranding multiple motorists.
- Travelers have found themselves stranded in many areas of the province and the Province is following up to support them. Currently, in Hope 1,100 stranded travelers are receiving local support, with 900 of those in group lodgings. BC Wildfire Service is working to move resources by air to support the relief efforts.
- EMBC has approved Disaster Financial Assistance (DFA) for flooding in the Vancouver Island & Central Coast, Southwest, and Central regions of the province, including all First Nations communities, electoral areas, and municipalities within these areas.

Weather Outlook

Wednesday: Will remain dry provincially

Warnings and Advisories

<u>Winter Storm Warning</u>: Haines Road – Haines Junction to Pleasant Camp, and South Klondike Highway - Carcross to White Pass.

Snowfall Warning: North Coast – inland sections.

<u>Flood warning:</u> Lower Nicola River from Merritt to Spences Bridge, Sumas River and areas around the US Border, and Coldwater River.

- Reception Centres active: approximately 20 (including: Abbotsford, Agassiz, Chilliwack, Cowichan Valley Regional District, Hope, Kelowna, Kamloops, Regional District Okanagan Similkameen/Penticton, Salmon Arm)
 - o Many communities are providing mutual aid as host communities.
