OVERVIEW

Atmospheric River Events- Multiple Regions

This weekend's atmospheric river caused heavy rain and localized flooding. Multiple rain-induced incidents occurred in the SWE and CTL regions last night. Princeton, District of Kent, City of Merritt and Fraser Valley Regional District each declared a SOLE due to flooding or mudslide. As well, several Evacuation Alerts/Orders were issued in Merritt, Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen and City of Abbotsford.

Activations

- SWE PREOC is activated.
- Chilliwack, Hope, Pitt Meadows, City of Langley, Fraser Valley Regional District, District of Kent, Fernie and Abbotsford activated their EOCs in the SWE region.
- Abbotsford activated a Reception Centre.
- Regional District of Okanagan-Similkameen, Tulameen and Princeton activated their EOCs in the CTL region.

Evacuations

- 200 residents tactically evacuated by Popkum Fire Department in Bridal Falls area due to flooding.
- 24 properties evacuated in Tulameen due to flooding.
- One family evacuated in Langley due to a mudslide.
- 12 homes in Abbotsford evacuated due to flooding.
- City of Merritt evacuated 800 to 900 residences.

Highway Closures

- Highway 1 (Agassiz Spences Bridge).
- Highway 3 (Sunshine Valley).

Emergency Management BC has funded the following projects through the Province of B.C.'s Community Emergency Preparedness Fund:

City of Merritt:

- Detailed Flood Hazard Mapping (complete)
 - Provincial contributions: \$150,000.00 Project total: \$150,000.00
 - Detailed flood hazard assessment and flood mapping of Coldwater and Nicola rivers at the city of Merritt. Merritt is primarily located on floodplains at the confluence of Coldwater and Nicola River, The objective of this project was to provide detailed flood hazard maps required to make informed decisions about public safety, development, bylaw implementation, and mitigation planning. Project built on regional flood frequency analysis and hydraulic modelling already completed at a lower level of detail and will incorporate (where relevant) the results of previous site-specific hydrotechnical assessments. The scope included field survey of channel bathymetry and hydraulic structures, refinement of detailed hydraulic models, and the preparation of detailed floodplain maps.
- Voght Street Structural Flood Mitigation Project (complete)
 - Provincial contributions: \$750,000.00 Project total: \$1,967,973.00
 - The project raised a section of Voght Street north from the Voght Street bridge to Blackwell Ave. The road was raised to meet calculated elevations determined and supported by river modelling data to protect an arterial roadway and critical sanitary sewer infrastructure from frequent and imminent flooding events. The project provided riverbank erosion/scour works incorporated into the road design to reduce the risk of damage or loss to the roadway and utilities such and hydro poles, gas, sanitary infrastructure, watermains and storm outfalls. The project area occupies a 480 meter length of Voght Street from the bridge over Nicola River north to Blackwell Ave. The project area is surrounded primarily by public parks (Lions and Rotary Parks) but also residences and businesses are located in the project vicinity and have been impacted by the repetitive flood events. The designed and associated works were to achieve the following outcomes, namely: Stabilize and reinforce the road structural integrity via the proposed designed Improve and increase the life of the road using environmentally engineered and pre-designed rip-rap to mitigate against the risk from erosion and scouring Realign the road with increments in elevation to overcome the 200-year scour depths and a flood approximately equal to the 2018 flood Help avoid significant transfer of flood risk to third parties

City of Kamloops:

- Downtown Peterson Creek Study (in progress)
 - Provincial contributions: \$150,000.00 Project total: \$150,000.00
 - The City completed the Peterson Creek Watershed Master Plan in 2017. The creek channel through the downtown was identified as an area at risk of flooding during major events. This study provided knowledge of the flood hazards to develop effective strategies to mitigate and prepare for risks identified. The project

included a risk assessment that identified the social, economic and environmental impacts of a 1:100 year flood event and identify compounding hazards, community and infrastructure vulnerabilities and risk tolerance for the event. The detailed assessment determined the channel's flood potential. It included surveying the channel, flow monitoring, hydraulic modeling, floodplain mapping, public consultation, and a flood risk assessment (RAIT). Following the assessment, various solution methods were investigated and compared based on cost, social and development impacts, risks and challenges.

- Dike Flood Risk Mitigation Planning (in progress)
 - Provincial contributions: \$150,000.00 Project total: \$150,000.00
 - The City of Kamloops is located at the confluence of the North and South Thompson Rivers. A significant amount of dike infrastructure is in place along these rivers to protect various areas of the community from flooding. The City is the Diking Authority for approximately 21 km of dikes within Kamloops, (15 designated structures within the provincial database), and completes ongoing inspections and maintenance as part of this responsibility. Through these inspections, the City has prioritized 4 critical sections for immediate assessment based on the current condition, and potential risk to nearby properties and infrastructure, which include the City's water treatment facility and water and sewer infrastructure, as well as parks, schools, and homes. For the project, the City proposes to assess the flood risk at each location, assess the dike condition, and prepare a future plan by completing analysis and mitigation planning work for a total of approximately 1.9 km of dike.
- Sewage Treatment Centre Dike Repair (completed)
 - Provincial contributions: \$154,270.00 Project total: \$154,270.00
 - The chosen strategy was to fill the bypass pipe and associated chambers will cementitious material or an approved alternate. This would require a Dike Maintenance Act approval and associated design. The project would then be competitively bid in accordance with the City's purchasing policies and applicable legislation.
- Riverside Park Erosion Protection (in progress)
 - Provincial contributions: \$750,000.00 Project total: \$1,500,000.00
 - Riverside Park, located along the South Thompson River, has a history of freshet flooding that results in significant bank erosion and threatens critical sanitary infrastructure. To protect infastructure, the City installs temporary flood mitigation measures supplied by EMBC that come at a substantial cost and impact to the Park. 2020 Structural Flood Mitigation Application Form- Updated Sept 17, 2020 2 Completing erosion protection and raising the elevation of the Rivers Trail through the Park is the City's highest priority flood mitigation project. Raising the finished grade of the Rivers Trail will reduce the risk of flooding during high river levels, improve safety, and reduce costs. The project includes erosion protection for the base of the pier plaza structure and the bank to the east, including riprap bank protection and riparian area restoration

PROVINCIAL SITUATION

The EMBC Provincial Emergency Coordination Centre (PECC) is activated in support of three Provincial Regional Emergency Operations Centres (PREOCs) and a widespread atmospheric river storm event that has resulted in multiple flooding, landslide, mudslide, power outage and other incidents and human consequence impacts across the BC southern coastal and interior regions.

The storm has damaged, blocked, and impacted multiple roadways, causing widespread road closures and stranding hundreds of motorists overnight on Nov. 14, 2021. Rescue efforts have continued throughout Nov. 15, 2021, and reports indicated all stranded motorists have now been able to seek shelter and appropriate supports in nearby communities.

First Nations and Local Authority communities have seen widespread flooding and power outages which have led to roadway closures, infrastructure impacts, evacuation orders and evacuation alerts. The situation is dynamic and full, accurate situational awareness remains challenging, but current estimates suggest that provincially there are over 524 properties on Evacuation Order, 315 properties on Evacuation Alert and then an additional 7,800 people on Evacuation Order in the Town of Merritt because of the storm.

As a result of the severe weather events this week, EMBC has approved Disaster Financial Assistance (DFA) for flooding in the Vancouver Island & Central Coast, Southwest, and Central regions of the province, including all First Nations communities, electoral areas, and municipalities within these areas.

WEATHER OUTLOOK AND ALERTS

A significant atmospheric river has made landfall across southern coastal regions of British Columbia. Observed rainfall amounts since yesterday have been in the 50-185 mm range across the Coquihalla, upper Coldwater and Tulameen River watersheds. Temperatures have been rising, with temperatures in the 5-7°C range being observed at automated snow weather stations across the region. Snowmelt is being observed at mid-elevations and is adding additional runoff to rivers. Rivers have risen rapidly, with

further rain in the forecast through today, Monday, November 15th (turning to snow at higher elevations).

While the weather picture calmed somewhat over the day, weather warnings continue for much of the southeastern part of the province tonight, including both rainfall and snow warnings. More information available on current warnings available from <u>Environment Canada</u>.

OVERVIEW

Atmospheric River Events- Multiple Regions

This weekend's atmospheric river caused heavy rain and localized flooding. Multiple rain-induced incidents occurred across Vancouver Island and the Southern half of the province in the past 24hrs. Several States of Local Emergency and Evacuation Alerts and Orders have been declared. EMBC has approved Disaster Financial Assistance for flooding in the Vancouver Island & Central Coast, Southwest, and Central regions of the province, including all First Nations communities, electoral areas, and municipalities within these areas.

Provincial Overview

- The Provincial Emergency Coordination Center will be stood up again today to support response.
- The storm blocked, damaged, and impacted multiple roadways, causing widespread road closures, and stranding multiple motorists yesterday.
 - Search and Rescue, Canada Task Force 1, 442 Squadron, and local first responders have reportedly rescued all stranded motorists and brought them to shelter and appropriate supports in nearby communities.
- BC Hydro reported widespread outages yesterday, and crews worked through the night to restore power.
- The situation is dynamic and full, accurate situational awareness remains challenging, but current estimates suggest that provincially there are over 524 properties on Evacuation Order, 315 properties on Evacuation Alert and then an additional 7,800 people on Evacuation Order in the City of Merritt because of the storm.
 - The City of Merritt has been evacuated in its entirety due to flooding and ensuing unsafe drinking water from the failure of their water treatment plant.
- Emergency Support Services volunteers are responding in affected areas to provide supports to evacuees.
 - Approximately 20 locations are activated as Reception Centers.
- Multiple highways remain closed throughout BC causing disruptions to travel.


Aircraft Crash - SWE

- An aircraft of unknown size and type was reported to have crashed near Needle Peak, outside of Hope.
- Details continue to be limited due to the location of the crash and the ongoing weather event.
- The Joint Rescue Coordination Center leads the response efforts and are expected to access the crash site at first light.
- Avalanche and other safety concerns are present at the site.





While it is not urgent, I thought the attached document might be useful at this point if you are thinking about the role of the CWG and other parties in light of this weekend's flooding.

I recognize that right now, the immediate flood response work is cutting across a number of sectors. The attached is our initial proposal of an organizational structure for recovery once the immediate response phase is over.

In a nutshell, we propose that EMBC continues to lead a cross-government Community Recovery structure covering both wildfire and flooding, which is primarily organized by community or geographic area. At the same time, just as FLNR has lead the Wildfire Land-based Recovery as a separate stream, we are suggested there be a separate stream lead by MOTI on the Highways and other Infrastructure Recovery, and potentially a separate stream lead by MAFF to address the significant agriculture issues that will arise out of Sumas Prairie flooding.

With your support, I would like to discuss this with ADMs in the ADMC – Recovery meeting this Thursday afternoon. It would also lead to a discussion around the role of the existing CWG Wildfire Recovery and whether it should be expanded to include these other aspects.

Of note, if this structure is supported, we then need to work on a companion piece which looks more closely at the Community Recovery structure within EMBC; we are proposing to add some more Band 3s, AO 24s and AO 18s, but will also need to look at capacity above those levels. That will be a separate discussion.



- Good afternoon, everyone.
- I'm honoured to be here on the traditional territory of the Lekwungen speaking people, and the Songhees and Esquimalt Nations.
- Joining me today is Minister Rob Fleming, Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure along with representatives from:
 - Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure
 - The River Forecast Centre,
 - The RCMP, and
 - Environment and Climate Change Canada.

PAUSE

- Today we're providing an update on our response to the significant flooding and mudslides we're seeing across the Southern half of the province.
- This has been an extreme weather event.

- And, while the River Forecast Centre has issued 16
 advisories since Saturday, and travel warnings were
 continually issued by DriveBC, weather specialists
 have noted that the impacts have been much
 greater than expected.
- The Provincial Emergency Coordination Center is supporting local governments as we work together to get through this unprecedented rainfall.
- There are over 20 reception centres open around
 B.C. and several States of Local Emergency and
 Evacuation Alerts and Orders have been declared.
- While there were three landslide incidents cutting off traffic on our highways, ALL of those stranded motorists have now been rescued and taken to shelter and appropriate supports in nearby communities.
- Search and rescue teams and the RCMP have been sweeping impacted areas to make sure that no one has been left behind.

- People from Merritt have been evacuated to either Kamloops or Kelowna.
- We are seeing significant efforts to move health care patients and long-term care and assisted living residents out of flood areas, safely.
- Hope is supporting about 1,100 evacuees with meals and about 900 people have been sleeping at the church and high school.
- While facilities are limited in Hope, we are working with BC Wildfire Services to get food, water, cots, and blankets to people with their aircraft.
- Also in Hope, there's an access road being worked on right now that will soon reconnect Hope to the Lower Mainland.
- One of our priorities is on making sure there's a flow of supplies so that people can buy food and essential goods in areas with flooded or damaged roads or railways.

PAUSE

- I would like to thank all the first responders, local governments and volunteers who have been working around the clock responding to the flooding and helping people in need.
- What we are seeing is a natural disaster.
- Our Province continues to prepare our infrastructures and communities for future events ... including our work to overhaul the Emergency Program Act.

PAUSE

- Multiple highways remain closed throughout B.C. causing disruptions to travel ... and I encourage everyone to be flexible with their travel plans.
- And to remember, whenever going on long trip, it is important to pack an emergency kit in your car.



Province of BC's Disaster Financial Assistance Program - Key Information

What is DFA?

- Disaster Financial Assistance is a provincial program to help individuals and local governments recover from uninsurable disasters. DFA is administered by Emergency Management BC, part of the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General.
- The purpose of DFA is to provide assistance to individuals for their principal residence and to help small business/farm owners when their livelihood is at risk. The DFA program operates under the *Emergency Program Act* and the ensuing Compensation and Disaster Financial Assistance Regulation. The DFA program is obliged to provide compensation in compliance with this legislation.
- DFA eligibility criteria, as defined in the Act and the Regulation, have been applied consistently and fairly throughout the province since 1995.

When is DFA available?

- DFA is available in the event of a disaster in respect of which the minister, or designate, has determined that disaster financial assistance may be provided.
- When this determination is made, EMBC defines the eligible dates and geographic locations, notifies affected local governments, posts this information on its website, publishes information in local papers, and if requested attends community meetings.

Who is eligible for DFA?

Local Governments and individuals in the private sector in the following categories are eligible:

Homeowner

Must be for the residence that is occupied by the individual as their home, where the majority
of their personal effects are located, and the residence for which they received the provincial
Home Owner Grant or were entitled to receive this grant.

Residential Tenant

Must be the residence that is occupied by the individual as their home and where the majority
of their personal effects are located.

Small Business Owner

Must be the owner of a business that is managed by the applicant on a day to day basis, is the
owner's major source of income, has gross sales of less than \$1 million per year, and
employs less than 50 people at any one time.

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Farmer

• Must be the owner of a farm operation that is identified by the BC Assessment Authority as an agricultural operation, is owned and operated by a person whose full time employment is as a farmer, and is the means by which the applicant derives the majority of their income.

Charitable Organization

 Must be a not-for-profit charitable organization that provides a benefit or service to the community at large, has been in existence for at least 12 months, and is registered under the Society Act.

What is eligible for DFA?

- DFA can compensate individuals for 80% of eligible claims, after the first \$1,000 to a maximum claim of \$300,000.
- DFA is only for uninsurable losses and for losses where there is no other program offered by local, provincial, federal or international governments or agencies.
- DFA is available for essential items only. It provides or reinstates the necessities of life, including help to repair and restore damaged homes and to re-establish or maintain the viability of small businesses and working farms. Loss of land or damage to land (except for some farm land) is not eligible for DFA.



PROVINCIAL SITUATION

The EMBC Provincial Emergency Coordination Centre (PECC) activated today in support of three Provincial Regional Emergency Operations Centres (PREOCs) and the impacts of the atmospheric river storm event that resulted in multiple flooding, landslide, mudslide, power outage and other incidents and human consequence impacts across the BC southern coastal and interior regions.

The storm damaged, blocked, and impacted multiple roadways, causing widespread road closures and stranding hundreds of motorists overnight on Nov. 14, 2021. Rescue efforts have continued throughout Nov. 16, 2021, and many stranded motorists have now been able to seek shelter and appropriate supports in nearby communities. However, several communities and First Nations remain isolated, and efforts are ongoing to provide accommodation and support. MOTI anticipates Highways 1,3, and 7 may be restored this week.

Travelers have also found themselves stranded in many areas of the province and the Province is following up to support them. Currently, in Hope 1,100 stranded travelers are receiving local support, with 900 of those in group lodgings. BCWS is working to move resources by air to support the relief efforts

Many First Nations and Local Authority communities have seen widespread flooding and power outages which have led to roadway closures, infrastructure impacts, evacuation orders and evacuation alerts. Current estimates suggest that there are approximately 17,775 people evacuated due to impacts from this storm event in BC, with 5,918 properties on Evacuation Order, and 3,632 properties on Evacuation Alert.

As a result of the severe weather events this week, EMBC has approved Disaster Financial Assistance (DFA) for flooding in the Vancouver Island & Central Coast, Southwest, and Central regions of the province, including all First Nations communities, electoral areas, and municipalities within these areas.





The storm damaged, blocked, and impacted multiple roadways, causing widespread road closures and stranding hundreds of motorists overnight on Nov. 14, 2021. Rescue efforts have continued throughout Nov. 16, 2021, and many stranded motorists have now been able to seek shelter and appropriate supports in nearby communities. However, several communities and First Nations remain isolated, and efforts are ongoing to provide accommodation and support. MOTI anticipates Highways 1,3, and 7 may be restored this week.

Travelers have also found themselves stranded in many areas of the province and the Province is following up to support them. Currently, in Hope 1,100 stranded travelers are receiving local support, with 900 of those in group lodgings. BCWS is working to move resources by air to support the relief efforts

PROVINCIAL SITUATION

The EMBC Provincial Emergency Coordination Centre (PECC) activated today in support of three Provincial Regional Emergency Operations Centres (PREOCs) and the impacts of the atmospheric river storm event that resulted in multiple flooding, landslide, mudslide, power outage and other incidents and human consequence impacts across the BC southern coastal and interior regions.

The storm damaged, blocked, and impacted multiple roadways, causing widespread road closures and stranding hundreds of motorists overnight on Nov. 14, 2021. Rescue efforts have continued throughout Nov. 16, 2021, and many stranded motorists have now been able to seek shelter and appropriate supports in nearby communities. However, several communities and First Nations remain isolated, and efforts are ongoing to provide accommodation and support. MOTI anticipates Highways 1,3, and 7 may be restored this week.

Travelers have also found themselves stranded in many areas of the province and the Province is following up to support them. Currently, in Hope 1,100 stranded travelers are receiving local support, with 900 of those in group lodgings. BCWS is working to move resources by air to support the relief efforts

Many First Nations and Local Authority communities have seen widespread flooding and power outages which have led to roadway closures, infrastructure impacts, evacuation orders and evacuation alerts. Current estimates suggest that there are approximately 17,775 people evacuated due to impacts from this storm event in BC, with 5,918 properties on Evacuation Order, and 3,632 properties on Evacuation Alert.

As a result of the severe weather events this week, EMBC has approved Disaster Financial Assistance (DFA) for flooding in the Vancouver Island & Central Coast, Southwest, and Central regions of the province, including all First Nations communities, electoral areas, and municipalities within these areas.

WEATHER OUTLOOK AND ALERTS

This morning was largely dry, with a ridge of high pressure over the interior, bringing largely cold and dry conditions. This afternoon, mainly dry conditions were also expected, with only the Northwest mountain range seeing increasing cloud and precipitation ahead of an advancing warm front.

On Wednesday, it will remain dry provincially as the core of the high-pressure retreats into Alberta, but a secondary ridge still extends into the Columbias, maintaining clear conditions with gradually moderating temperatures.

Many of the weather watches and warnings in effect yesterday have now been rescinded by Environment Canada, with snowfall warnings and winter storm warnings remaining only for northern coastal BC.

I acknowledge the request for Federal Assistance (RFA) from the Province of British Columbia to assist in its response to the significant weather event.

While the Province is leading efforts in responding to the impacts of the event, there remains a need for additional support. In light of this, I am pleased to confirm that the CAF will support the requested for the period of 17 November until 17 December, 2021, with a possible 2 week extension. Specific supports to be provided are:

- Provision of air support to facilitate the evacuation of persons affected by flooding, including evacuation of vulnerable population to designated evacuation points;
- Provision of assistance to vulnerable, stranded or in-distress persons affected by floods;
- Provision of air support to support BC critical supply lane routes that have been affected by the floods;
- Reconnaissance and investigation of flooding impacts in support of BC relief effort planning.; and
- Provision of personnel to perform tasks to mitigate the effects of floods, including the protection of critical infrastructure, access roads, and properties as designated by local authorities.

Issues surrounding law enforcement have been carefully considered and at no time during the execution of support to BC will CAF members be employed in a Security or Enforcement role, they will not conduct any assistance to law enforcement tasks, nor will they provide medical care.

Dear Ministers:

The Province of British Columbia has been severely affected by catastrophic flooding in the Southwest and Central areas resulting in significant impacts on individuals, communities and critical infrastructure. While the Province has yet to fully assess all of the damage, it is becoming increasingly clear that this evolving situation will require resources beyond those currently available in British Columbia. At this time, with all major road and rail routes temporarily severed to the Lower Mainland, establishing supply chain supports to isolated individuals and communities is the priority.

We are requesting federal assistance to obtain the following capabilities:

- Heavy and medium air assets to re-establish the flow of critical medical food, fuel and water supplies to communities;
- Support to evacuate and resupply individuals and communities;
- Reconnaissance to impacted areas to assess the extent of the damage;
- Flood mitigation; and
- General duty and logistics support to the response effort.

Therefore, I, Mike Farnworth, British Columbia Minister of Public Safety and Solicitor General, request provision of federal resources to meet the desired effects in support of the current response to this disaster. These resources will be released at the earliest opportunity when they are no longer required for life-safety or life-sustaining measures.

OVERVIEW

Atmospheric River Events- Multiple Regions

This weekend's atmospheric river caused heavy rain and localized flooding. Multiple rain-induced incidents occurred across Vancouver Island and the Southern half of the province in the past 48hrs. Several States of Local Emergency and Evacuation Alerts and Orders have been declared. Rescue efforts have continued throughout Nov. 16, 2021, and many stranded motorists have now been able to seek shelter and appropriate supports in nearby communities. However, several communities and First Nations remain isolated, and efforts are ongoing to provide accommodation and support. MOTI anticipates Highways 1,3, and 7 may be restored this week.

Provincial Overview

- The Provincial Emergency Coordination Center will be stood up again today to support response.
- The storm blocked, damaged, and impacted multiple roadways, causing widespread road closures, and stranding multiple motorists.
 - Travelers have found themselves stranded in many areas of the province and the Province is following up to support them. Currently, in Hope 1,100 stranded travelers are receiving local support, with 900 of those in group lodgings. BC Wildfire Service is working to move resources by air to support the relief efforts.
- The situation is dynamic and full, accurate situational awareness remains challenging, but current estimates suggest that there are approximately 17,775 people evacuated due to impacts from this storm event in BC, with 5,918 properties on Evacuation Order, and 3,632 properties on Evacuation Alert.
- Emergency Support Services volunteers are responding in affected areas to provide supports to evacuees.
 - Approximately 20 locations are activated as Reception Centers.
- Multiple highways remain closed throughout BC causing disruptions to travel.
 - Highway 1 (Malahat) Will be closed overnight from 7pm until 6am for the next six days.
 - Highway 1 (East of Golden)
 - Highway 1 (Agassiz Spences Bridge)
 - Highway 3 (Sunshine Valley)
 - Highway 5 (Hope Merritt)
 - Highway 7 (Maple Ridge Hope)
 - Highway 8 (Merritt Spences Bridge)
 - Highway 11 (US border Vye Road, Abbotsford)
 - Highway 99 (Pemberton to Lillooet)

Sumas Prairie - Abbotsford

- The City of Abbotsford has issued an urgent notice for all residents remaining in the Sumas Prairie area to evacuate the area immediately.
- The Barrowtown pump station is in danger of succumbing to flood waters, and if it does the areas that have not yet been flooded will be inundated.
- Regional SAR teams are staging personnel and equipment to respond by ground, boat, and air as required to evacuate residents from the area this morning.


Aircraft Crash - SWE

- JRCC recovered two bodies from the crash site yesterday.
- The incident has been handed to the RCMP and the Transportation Safety Board.

DGIR Code 2/Overboard Shipping Containers - VIC

- The situation on board the M/V Zim Kingston remains stable, the final destination and available moorage is still being determined.
- Shoreline clean-up efforts continue as weather and tides allow. Crews are working on removing debris from the sites when conditions are favourable.

PROVINCIAL WEATHER



This morning, a frontal system moving over central and northern BC will bring flurries to the Northwest Coastal and Inland mountain ranges. Expect up to 5cm for snow accumulations over northern B.C. A ridge over southern B.C. will maintain clear skies for this morning but cloud cover is expected to increase throughout the day as an advancing system along the coast sweeps southeast.

This afternoon, flurries continue over the central and northern parts of B.C. with an additional 2 to 4 cm of accumulations over the northwest ranges before tomorrow morning. Rain will sweep down over the Haida Gwaii and central coast area. The Lower Mainland will see mainly cloudy skies overnight. increasing cloudiness is in store for tonight over the southern interior and the mountain ranges over the Columbias and the Kootenay.





We at the Vancouver Sun have been made aware of migrant workers who are currently stuck at adjacent farms in Sumas Prairie in Abbotsford because their employer has decided not to evacuate, against all public warnings. At this late stage in the evacuation alert, roads are closed, and the women who live and work on Jamalee Farms will need to be rescued by crews.

Our question: What is the province doing to address the vulnerability facing contracted migrant workers (not just farmers) in Sumas Prairie right now?

Those without permanent residency are at the whim of their employer's mercy. If farmers are not evacuating, this puts migrant workers at serious risk of harm.

Recommendation

- Our priority is ensuring that everyone in these affected areas are safe, as we continue seeing the devastating impacts of flooding and mudslides in B.C.
- We're using all available resources to get people to safety, including seeking federal assistance on this incident.
- This includes Canadian Armed Forces ground and air support.

As you are aware, the B.C. government has <u>declared a provincial state of emergency</u> to mitigate impacts on transportation networks and movement of essential goods and supplies, and to support the provincewide response and recovery from the widespread damage caused by severe flooding and landslides in British Columbia.

I would like to extend my deep appreciation for your tremendous work supporting response and recovery efforts in managing the impact of this catastrophic event. There is significant activity occurring in the province and I recognize that many of you may have also been personally affected. Thank you for your extraordinary efforts during this challenging time. My thoughts are with all of the communities and people impacted across the province.

Our PECC and PREOCs are activated, and work is underway to provide EMBC surge capacity to support affected communities. I appreciate our staff's willingness to deploy to the PECC/PREOCs and encourage supervisors to support such requests, balanced against operational needs.

PROVINCIAL SITUATION

The EMBC Provincial Emergency Coordination Centre (PECC) is activated today in support of three Provincial Regional Emergency Operations Centres (PREOCs) and the impacts of the atmospheric river storm event that resulted in multiple flooding, landslide, mudslide, power outages and other human consequence impacts along the BC southern coastal and interior regions.

This afternoon, a Provincial State of Emergency was declared to mitigate impacts on transportation networks, facilitate movement of essential goods and supplies, and to support the provincewide response and recovery from the widespread damage caused by severe flooding and landslides in BC.

The state of emergency, initially in effect for 14 days, ensures federal, provincial, and local resources can be delivered in a coordinated response to protect the public, which remains the provincial government's top priority.

The focus is on clearing, repairing and reopening roads to connect the Interior and the North to the Lower Mainland and Vancouver Island so that supply chains begin moving and stranded travelers return home. The federal government has responded to and accepted British Columbia's requests for assistance. In the coming days additional federal resources and personnel will be arriving in BC to assist.

Disaster Financial Assistance (DFA) has been approved for flooding in the Vancouver Island & Central Coast, Southwest, and Central regions of the Province, including all First Nations communities, electoral areas, and municipalities within these Regions.

WEATHER OUTLOOK AND ALERTS

Flood Safety, Water Management Branch Weather Outlook

 Generally, drier conditions are expected in the short term, and river levels are expected to continue to recede throughout the week

- Light precipitation is expected for some areas later in the week; however, no significant flow rises are currently projected
- Systems with lake or reservoir-fed watersheds are receding more slowly
- Areas close to the Sumas River continue to experience high water conditions
- · Many river systems remain sensitive due to high flows, and will be closely monitored

EMERGENCY SUPPORT SERVICES (ESS)

- The Provincial ESS Call Centre is receiving a consistently high call volume and has extended its hours of operation.
- Buses are moving evacuees from Kamloops to Kelowna if they need accommodation support.
- ESS HQ Staff are supporting the City of Abbotsford by supplying personnel to their Reception and Group Lodging sites (which also being supported by the Samaritan's Purse organization).
- Billeting has been approved for host families taking care of stranded travellers.
- Road closures has complicated the deployment of volunteers/mutual aid.
- Food referrals are no longer being provided out of the Kelowna Reception Centre as there are food supply challenges for grocery and restaurant providers
- Stranded travellers are asked to attend Reception/Warming Centres for Group Lodging support, food and water while waiting for roads to re-open

 Mental Health Supports have been requested at Reception Centres and will be supported by Disaster Psycho-Social staff.

Reception Centre locations are posted publicly on Emergency Info BC.

FLOOD IMPACTS

INFRASTRUCTURE & TRANSPORTATION

HIGHWAYS

- Highway Closures:
 - Highway 1 (Hope to Spences Bridge). DriveBC shows closed with no estimated time of re-opening available.
 - Highway 3 (Sunshine Valley) Drive BC shows UFN closure Between Sunshine Valley and Allison Pass.
 - Highway 5 (Hope Merritt) Closed and severely impacted.
 - Highway 7 (Maple Ridge Hope) Drive BC reporting single lane alternating.
 - o Highway 8 (Merritt to Spences Bridge) Drive BC reporting UFN closure in both directions.

Impacts on the Transportation Sector

Canadian Pacific Railway (CPR)

- No estimate provided at this time for track re-opening. 47 trains are currently staged.
- Road access for movement of equipment & resources remains a challenge. All employees & contractors have been provided letters indicating they are critical service providers to hasten their movement through highway check points.

Canadian National (CN)

- Still on target for re-opening the Yale sub (Boston Bar Vancouver) for rail traffic later today (after 1600 PST) once track patrols are completed.
- Ashcroft sub (Kamloops Boston Bar) remains closed to rail traffic. Restoration work continues with no update to estimated time of re-opening.

Transport Canada Actions:

Civil Aviation

• NOTAMS were issued by airport operators to restrict operations to emergency support aircraft only for Langley Airport, Chilliwack Airport, and Hope Airport.

Marine Safety

• Is working on the details of an Interim Order to restrict the recreational use of pleasure craft in flooded areas.

UTILITIES/ TELECOMMUNICATIONS

- BC Hydro
 - BC Hydro is reporting less than 3,000 customers affected with outages.
- International/Interprovincial Powerlines (IPLs):
 - At present, there are no known or reported impacts to CER-regulated IPLs in BC.
- Fortis BC:
 - o There are no reported Station Control or supply issues.
 - No impact to assets; standing water around the station is receding, and there remains no impact/damage to piping.

- There are no supply concerns at this time; however, with the Enbridge 30"-line shut-in,
 Fortis has reduced flow by 25% and is looking at ways to increase system capacity in the event there is a disruption to the 36" line.
- o The company is contingency planning for different potential supply scenarios.
- Fortis, Enbridge, and NW Pipe are coordinating gas control to gas control to align operational plans. Princeton - Due to flood conditions, it has been challenging to assess the damage but FortisBC has a restoration plan in place that they are ready to execute starting Wednesday morning.

• Telecommunications:

- Telus has an active outage in Spences Bridge area due to cable damage from landslide.
 Due to safety reasons, service technicians are standing down, and will continue to work with local authorities to ensure safe access to the site as quickly as possible. Estimated time of repair is early morning Nov. 18.
- Shaw has outages in the CTL Region. Technicians are on site working to restore service
 as quickly as possible. No ETA at this time but will continue to monitor the situation and
 provide updates when available.

O ISED reports:

- Telecom carriers are reporting recovery to several cell sites in the affected areas and gradual stabilization of networks.
- After a helicopter flyover, a carrier has identified a location for the installation of a fiber optic bypass. Work began early today with an aggressive target of being installed within a day or two. This will add a third route in addition to the path along HWY 99 as a contingency back-up route.
- Some carriers reported continuing wireless congestion in the areas where evacuees are congregating.

AGRICULTURE

Report on Dairy

- 62 dairies under Evac Order. This represents about 11,000 milk cows and another 11,000+ replacement dairy stock.
- Reports from BC Dairy indicate that some dairies & animals have been evacuated, but no confirmation on exact numbers.
- Animal Nutrition Association of Canada (ANAC), BC Division issued a Notice to Producers today (Nov 17, 2021) explaining that feed grains & protein supplements would no longer be delivered to dairies, instead redirected to poultry & pork sectors.
- Feeding only forages to a dairy animal not only impacts production, but predisposes animals to health problems (I.e., ketosis; milk fever).
- Biggest issue with trapped dairy herds now is 'water'. Without water, milk cows will soon become severely dehydrated thus compromising health & life. High # milk cows now without water for 17-18 hours. This is now CRITICAL o survivability.
- Approximately 80% of BC milk supply is inaccessible.
- Industrial plants are being shorted of milk & reports of potential shutdowns. BCMMB does not generate its daily report until 4:30 pm. Fluid milk plants are a priority to get milk to first, but even those are being shorted milk.
- BC Dairy has 6 staff attempting to call all 62 dairies under Evac Order.
- Severe infrastructure damage to barn and equipment. Will be high demand to get contractors in and building supplies and time to repair and get many dairies operational again.
- Many reports of manure pits that are full and overflowing, and milk is being dumped into pits and part of overflow. No where else to dispose of the milk.

PROVINCIAL REGIONAL UPDATES

PROVINCIAL SITUATION

The EMBC Provincial Emergency Coordination Centre (PECC) is activated today in support of three Provincial Regional Emergency Operations Centres (PREOCs) and the impacts of the atmospheric river storm event that resulted in multiple flooding, landslide, mudslide, power outages and other human consequence impacts along the BC southern coastal and interior regions.

This afternoon, a Provincial State of Emergency was declared to mitigate impacts on transportation networks, facilitate movement of essential goods and supplies, and to support the provincewide response and recovery from the widespread damage caused by severe flooding and landslides in BC.

The state of emergency, initially in effect for 14 days, ensures federal, provincial, and local resources can be delivered in a coordinated response to protect the public, which remains the provincial government's top priority.

The focus is on clearing, repairing and reopening roads to connect the Interior and the North to the Lower Mainland and Vancouver Island so that supply chains begin moving and stranded travelers return home. The federal government has responded to and accepted British Columbia's requests for assistance. In the coming days additional federal resources and personnel will be arriving in BC to assist.

Disaster Financial Assistance (DFA) has been approved for flooding in the Vancouver Island & Central Coast, Southwest, and Central regions of the Province, including all First Nations communities, electoral areas, and municipalities within these Regions.

WEATHER OUTLOOK AND ALERTS

Flood Safety, Water Management Branch Weather Outlook

 Generally, drier conditions are expected in the short term, and river levels are expected to continue to recede throughout the week

- Light precipitation is expected for some areas later in the week; however, no significant flow rises are currently projected
- Systems with lake or reservoir-fed watersheds are receding more slowly
- Areas close to the Sumas River continue to experience high water conditions
- · Many river systems remain sensitive due to high flows, and will be closely monitored

EMERGENCY SUPPORT SERVICES (ESS)

- The Provincial ESS Call Centre is receiving a consistently high call volume and has extended its hours of operation.
- Buses are moving evacuees from Kamloops to Kelowna if they need accommodation support.
- ESS HQ Staff are supporting the City of Abbotsford by supplying personnel to their Reception and Group Lodging sites (which also being supported by the Samaritan's Purse organization).
- Billeting has been approved for host families taking care of stranded travellers.
- Road closures has complicated the deployment of volunteers/mutual aid.
- Food referrals are no longer being provided out of the Kelowna Reception Centre as there are food supply challenges for grocery and restaurant providers
- Stranded travellers are asked to attend Reception/Warming Centres for Group Lodging support, food and water while waiting for roads to re-open

 Mental Health Supports have been requested at Reception Centres and will be supported by Disaster Psycho-Social staff.

Reception Centre locations are posted publicly on Emergency Info BC.

FLOOD IMPACTS

INFRASTRUCTURE & TRANSPORTATION

HIGHWAYS

- Highway Closures:
 - Highway 1 (Hope to Spences Bridge). DriveBC shows closed with no estimated time of re-opening available.
 - Highway 3 (Sunshine Valley) Drive BC shows UFN closure Between Sunshine Valley and Allison Pass.
 - Highway 5 (Hope Merritt) Closed and severely impacted.
 - o Highway 7 (Maple Ridge Hope) Drive BC reporting single lane alternating.

Canadian Pacific Railway (CPR)

- No estimate provided at this time for track re-opening. 47 trains are currently staged.
- Road access for movement of equipment & resources remains a challenge. All employees & contractors have been provided letters indicating they are critical service providers to hasten their movement through highway check points.

Canadian National (CN)

- Still on target for re-opening the Yale sub (Boston Bar Vancouver) for rail traffic later today (after 1600 PST) once track patrols are completed.
- Ashcroft sub (Kamloops Boston Bar) remains closed to rail traffic. Restoration work continues with no update to estimated time of re-opening.

Transport Canada Actions:

Civil Aviation

• NOTAMS were issued by airport operators to restrict operations to emergency support aircraft only for Langley Airport, Chilliwack Airport, and Hope Airport.

Marine Safety

• Is working on the details of an Interim Order to restrict the recreational use of pleasure craft in flooded areas.

UTILITIES/ TELECOMMUNICATIONS

- BC Hydro
 - BC Hydro is reporting less than 3,000 customers affected with outages.
- International/Interprovincial Powerlines (IPLs):
 - At present, there are no known or reported impacts to CER-regulated IPLs in BC.
- Fortis BC:
 - o There are no reported Station Control or supply issues.
 - No impact to assets; standing water around the station is receding, and there remains no impact/damage to piping.

- There are no supply concerns at this time; however, with the Enbridge 30"-line shut-in,
 Fortis has reduced flow by 25% and is looking at ways to increase system capacity in the event there is a disruption to the 36" line.
- o The company is contingency planning for different potential supply scenarios.
- Fortis, Enbridge, and NW Pipe are coordinating gas control to gas control to align operational plans. Princeton - Due to flood conditions, it has been challenging to assess the damage but FortisBC has a restoration plan in place that they are ready to execute starting Wednesday morning.

• Telecommunications:

- Telus has an active outage in Spences Bridge area due to cable damage from landslide.
 Due to safety reasons, service technicians are standing down, and will continue to work with local authorities to ensure safe access to the site as quickly as possible. Estimated time of repair is early morning Nov. 18.
- Shaw has outages in the CTL Region. Technicians are on site working to restore service
 as quickly as possible. No ETA at this time but will continue to monitor the situation and
 provide updates when available.

O ISED reports:

- Telecom carriers are reporting recovery to several cell sites in the affected areas and gradual stabilization of networks.
- After a helicopter flyover, a carrier has identified a location for the installation of a fiber optic bypass. Work began early today with an aggressive target of being installed within a day or two. This will add a third route in addition to the path along HWY 99 as a contingency back-up route.
- Some carriers reported continuing wireless congestion in the areas where evacuees are congregating.

AGRICULTURE

Report on Dairy

- 62 dairies under Evac Order. This represents about 11,000 milk cows and another 11,000+ replacement dairy stock.
- Reports from BC Dairy indicate that some dairies & animals have been evacuated, but no confirmation on exact numbers.
- Animal Nutrition Association of Canada (ANAC), BC Division issued a Notice to Producers today (Nov 17, 2021) explaining that feed grains & protein supplements would no longer be delivered to dairies, instead redirected to poultry & pork sectors.
- Feeding only forages to a dairy animal not only impacts production, but predisposes animals to health problems (I.e., ketosis; milk fever).
- Biggest issue with trapped dairy herds now is 'water'. Without water, milk cows will soon become severely dehydrated thus compromising health & life. High # milk cows now without water for 17-18 hours. This is now CRITICAL o survivability.
- Approximately 80% of BC milk supply is inaccessible.
- Industrial plants are being shorted of milk & reports of potential shutdowns. BCMMB does not generate its daily report until 4:30 pm. Fluid milk plants are a priority to get milk to first, but even those are being shorted milk.
- BC Dairy has 6 staff attempting to call all 62 dairies under Evac Order.
- Severe infrastructure damage to barn and equipment. Will be high demand to get contractors in and building supplies and time to repair and get many dairies operational again.
- Many reports of manure pits that are full and overflowing, and milk is being dumped into pits and part of overflow. No where else to dispose of the milk.

PROVINCIAL REGIONAL UPDATES


