Thank-you again for taking the time to meet with Annette and I yesterday to discuss the Leech Water Supply Area mineral and placer tenures. One of the documents you took with you included the 'notice of motion' that was presented to the Regional Water Supply Commission by Commissioner Isitt. Just to be clear, the motion that was passed by the Commission was slightly different than the motion first presented. The motion that was passed reads as follows:

That the Regional Water Supply Commission direct staff to engage the Province of British Columbia, specifically the Ministry of Energy, Mines and Petroleum Resources and the Ministry of Environment, requesting that the existing legislative restriction on mining activities in the Sooke Lake watershed be extended to catchment lands in the Leech River watershed, to safeguard water quality in the long term.

Hi Chris,

We have spoken on the phone a couple of times in the last two years, related to mining tenures in the Leech watershed.

You may know that this past summer we applied on a NRR for our Leech Water Supply Area and the reserve was established by OIC in October.

In presenting the information of the reserve establishment to our Regional Water Supply Commission, the Directors asked for information/clarification on some items, that I am to report back to them on. Could we have a phone meeting to discuss these items in the next couple of weeks?

Info Requested:

1. If a mineral tenure is for the purpose of exploration for possible development of a mine, given the reserve, is development of a mine in the reserve area still possible, and if not, why should these tenures be allowed to continue? The short answer is yes. The no registration reserve only prohibits the registration of new mineral titles in the reserve area. The no registration reserve does not impact the rights of existing recorded holders of claims. They can still apply for a permit under section 10 of the Mines Act to conduct mechanized mining activity. They do not require a permit to conduct non mechanized mining activity, in accordance with the placer hand mining guidelines. See attached, and also see Seciton 14 of

the Mineral Tenure Act, with respect tto the rights of recorded holders of claims. http://www2.gov.bc.ca/assets/gov/farming-natural-resources-and-industry/mineral-exploration-mining/documents/mineral-titles/notices-mineral-placer-titles/information-updates/infoundate38.pdf

- 2. Could the CRD purchase tenures from miners and then let them forfeit as a way of reducing the total number of mining tenures in the reserve area? The short answer is yes. The CRD would have to apply for a free miner certificate, and the purchase of a claim must be registered in Mineral Titles Online in order for the CRD to become a recorded holder of a claim. If the CRD were to be the recorded holder of a claim, it could register an abandonment of the claim.
- 3. Exploration for minerals is understood to include excavation, drilling etc...., what types of activities are allowed on placer tenures beyond panning? Directors brought up using sluice boxes and water jetting as activities they understood were allowed. See guidelines in response to your question 1 above. In general terms, no mechanized miing activity may be conducted on a claim, unless the recorded holder has a valid permit issued under Section 10 of the Mines Act. In the absence of a permit, the right of a recorded holder to conduct mining activity is only "hand work" or hand prospecting. There is no right to occupy a claim for any other purpose than to explore for minerals or placer minerals.

Hi Mark,

Thanks for your note, When I received the out of office, I went thead and forwarded my question to Chris Kositsin. Below is further detail he gave.

What I was really trying to get a handle on was whether the Sooke Water Supply Area (WSA), which doesn't show as a reserve in MTO, is reserved from mining in the area of these two claims. I'll attach the map that shows the Sooke WSA in relation to these claims. What I understand from Chris is that the entire Sooke WSA is reserved, and that the miner has no authority to enter and mine in the Sooke WSA portion of his claims. Chris' words were not that strong however, so let me know if I've misunderstood. Based on this, I will recommend to our Commission that they not approve access to the miner to these two claims through the Water Supply Area (there is Timber/West access on the west side).

Annette:

I just realized that I didn't answer all your questions.

The no registration reserve, site number 334063, pre-dates the two newly acquired claims and therefore takes priority. The claims get no placer rights over the reserved area.

As the WSA was created through an act of legislation, it does not have a shape or polygon to spatially represent the area in the mapping world. Even without a spatially representation of the WSA, valid parts of the legislation still in effect would still potentially have effect on the dains depending on its wording. My assumption is that the legislation is older than the newly acquired claims and that any area covered by the WSA would probably have priority over the claims.


Our policy is that as long as our Mineral Titles Online (MTO) application can calculate more than 1 hectare of available area within a cell then the cell is made available for a free miner to be able to acquire.

It is the free miner's responsibility to research the area to determine when mineral rights they may or may not be acquiring. It is also up to the free miner to determine if the available area for acquisition is valuable enough for them to acquire the claim. The free miner is required to pay for the whole cell and to maintain the full cell even though they are currently only acquiring rights to a reduced area.

Title 1053942 - Only the green/blue shaded area in the south west corner of the title is where the claim acquired placer rights. The remainder of the claim is covered by a no registration reserve or is not open for placer acquisition



Title 1037248 - Only the green/blue shaded area in the north west corner of the title is where the claim acquired placer rights. The remainder of the claim is covered by a no registration reserve and an existing legacy placer claim 338475.

A recent claim acquisition overlapping our Sooke Water Supply Area (WSA) has raised the question of whether this implies rights to mine in the water supply area.

Our staff person, Nathan Boyne, raised this with Bev Quist, and we now understand that claims can overlap reserve areas without giving rights to mine in the reserve.

The question remaining for me, is how and exactly what are the boundaries of the reserve on Sooke WSA, since it does not show as reserved in the MTO mapping database. Specifically, is the sliver of the Sooke WSA within the new placer claim #1053942 reserved from mining?


