Program Information:

B.C. Freedom of Information and Privacy Association Community Education Program

1. Describe the Activities and Delivery of the Program:

FIPA is a non-partisan, non-profit society that was established in 1991 to promote and defend freedom of information and privacy rights in Canada. Our goal is to empower citizens by increasing their access to information and their control over their own personal information. Our Community Education Program provides educational and advisory services to community groups and the general public on questions of privacy, protection of personal information, and access to information at the municipal, provincial, and federal levels.

A) Educational Events:

As part of the Community Education Program, FIPA offers a wide variety of conferences, workshops, and seminars to the public. We work hard to make these events as accessible and affordable as possible so as to engage a number of diverse communities in privacy and access to information issues.

Examples of our regular programming include our non-profit and small organization-focused Privacy Skills Networking Breakfast which runs in the spring, and our annual Freedom of Information Workshop during Right to Know Week in September. We provide these workshops free of charge to the public. We also host our Information Summit biennially, which welcomes approximately 140 of the province's leading information rights researchers and experts. We also provide speakers for other events upon request.

In the next year, we plan to expand our educational events to include a number of introductory sessions targeted at startup organizations in the social mission sector, as well as advanced workshops for journalists and other research professionals.

B) Educational Publications:

FIPA publishes books, reports, newsletters, and studies focused on a variety of information rights issues, often in collaboration with other organizations. This year we received funding from the Privacy Commissioner of Canada for our *Connected Car* report, which examines the effect of electronic monitoring systems in our vehicles on our privacy rights and consumer choice. The report launch will be held early next year in conjunction with the Vancouver International Auto Show, and then promoted to a wider audience over the following months.

We will continue to look for opportunities to meet emerging needs through special projects like our 2013 Access in the Academy eBook and accompanying FOI workshop, which provide the public with access to guided self-help materials. Access in the Academy has been requested and sent to libraries across the province and the country, and has been accessed over 10,000 times since its launch last year. Similarly, our 2010 report Culture of Care or Culture of Surveillance? has been widely distributed and is a cornerstone in the debate around B.C.'s controversial Integrated Case Management system.

C) Website and Library:

Our website is the main source of information for people both in and outside the Vancouver Mainland. While we provide advice free of charge during regular business hours via our telephone and email helplines, the website is available 24/7 without the restriction of long-distance charges. As such it is usually our primary point of contact for individuals and organizations across British Columbia (and indeed across Canada).

Earlier this year, in order to meet the needs of increased public demand for information to be readily available online, FIPA completed a website redevelopment initiative. The redesign is organized around a more effective, accessible information architecture that makes it easier for members of the public to access our help topics, research, and reports. Since the launch of the new site, we have seen a 15% increase in unique visits compared to the same period last year. Our social media presence also continues to grow; we now reach over 1,200 people directly on Twitter. We continue to maintain our "Your Health Privacy Rights" website and continue to respond to information requests received through the site.

In addition, our old website contained a wealth of information accumulated over two decades, but it did not have a search function and so was difficult to navigate. We now host this information in a user-friendly, searchable online library. Many of our educational resources are also available through affiliated platforms such as ClickLaw. FIPA also maintains a physical library of print materials, video resources, and audiotapes in our offices. This collection is available to the public by appointment, free of charge, for research purposes.

D) Telephone and Internet Helplines:

FIPA also offers educational and advisory services through our telephone and Internet helplines. Students, academics, journalists, professionals, and community members make regular use of these services to resolve both simple and complex access and privacy issues. Our staff members are available, free of charge, during regular business hours year round to respond to such inquiries. On average, FIPA currently receives and answers about 100-150 direct requests for assistance per year.

We have noted a gradual reduction in these requests as the way in which people access information changes; increasingly individuals are seeking information online. To meet this need, we maintain an extensive set of online help pages that offer information on a wide range of access and privacy issues, including everything from regulations around video surveillance in the private sector, to what government agencies can and cannot do with citizen data. We have seen a dramatic increase in traffic to our website; in 2011 our help topics received more than 20,000 hits from website visitors, and we more than doubled that figure in 2013, at almost 49,000 hits.

We plan to continue improving the accessibility of our resources as part of a broader effort at knowledge translation, with the aim of making help topics more easily repurposed for workshops and educational programming. These help pages also link to a variety of external resources published by organizations like the BC Civil Liberties Association and the Office of the Information and Privacy Commissioner. Selections from these help topics are also posted on the ClickLaw Public Legal Education portal, maintained by the Courthouse Libraries of BC.

E) Legal Assistance:

FIPA operates a modest legal assistance program as part of our education work. This year so far we have offered summary advice to over 100 individuals. For people with serious access and privacy problems which require escalation we arrange for advice and occasionally representation through arrangements with the following organizations:

F) Speaking Engagements and Media Appearances:

Our representatives speak frequently at public and private meetings and events, including classroom talks at universities; panels and conference sessions like the Open Data Summit; and major public festivals like Media Democracy Days Vancouver. We also hold one-on-one and group consultations with policy makers and government officials.

FIPA regularly appears in news and media reports throughout British Columbia and Canada. We distribute media alerts and releases, and are often contacted for comment by media organizations, whose coverage increases awareness of our existence and services. As the country's only organization that is devoted solely to information rights and advocacy, we are well positioned to intervene in policy and legal debates in the media. We also self-publish through our website and other web outlets such as the *Huffington Post*.

G) Coalitions and Partnerships

Much of our work is collaborative, allowing us to more effectively address access to information and privacy issues by coordinating our efforts with other like-minded organizations. This year FIPA has been active in two major coalitions: the nation-wide Protect Our Privacy Coalition (which advocates for privacy-enabling law in Canada), and the international Fair Deal Coalition (advocating for information rights in international trade agreements). We also maintain the National Privacy Coalition listsery (our network of privacy professionals and advocates) which has a membership of over 160, and we maintain a presence at community events and gatherings to reach out to new populations (for example Car Free Day, Media Democracy Days Vancouver, and similar conferences and events).

2. Who benefits from this program and how?

FIPA's services are available to all, but are primarily oriented toward users who...

- Are seeking general knowledge about freedom of information and privacy legislation, how to exercise their legal rights, and how to solve personal problems;
- Come from historically marginalized or otherwise disenfranchised backgrounds and require assistance in navigating difficult legal issues;
- Have struggled with privacy-related issues, such as identity theft, or incorrect/disputed government records;
- Encounter difficulties in accessing their personal information from government or private sector bodies;
- Require assistance in gaining access to general (that is, non-personal) government records necessary for making informed decisions and monitoring government activities;
- Work with small businesses, labour unions, or non-profit organizations and require training to implement privacy protection procedures within their organizations;
- Are in academic programs and require assistance on how to access public documents for research purposes

Through our phone and Internet helplines, we provide direct assistance to approximately 150 community members every year, primarily (though not exclusively) in B.C.'s Lower Mainland. We also respond to inquiries from journalists, and our responses are often quoted in articles and news items that appear in major media outlets. This year so far we published 37 media releases and blog posts, and conducted more than 100 media interviews. This significantly amplifies the reach and impact of our work.

Traffic to our online help topics is even stronger, and has grown significantly since their 2009 introduction. They now receive on average 5,000 visits per month; a number we expect to see grow significantly with following the launch of our new website. Our new constituent management system has allowed us to clean up our news subscriber list, which currently sits at almost 400 individuals. Finally, due to recent staff-time investments in social media networking our publications, legal submissions, and updates are reaching more people than ever before; we have more than 1,200 Twitter followers, a 25% increase on last year.

FIPA has directly reached approximately 430 people so far this year through our public events. We plan to increase this figure over the next twelve months by introducing new educational programming and aggressively pursuing outreach opportunities, such as exhibiting at large public events and developing new co-promotional partnerships.

3. Demonstrated response to a strong community interest or proven community priority:

Our work has far-reaching implications and engages every corner of our social and political lives. Freedom of information and privacy rights are vital to the preservation and advancement of democratic process and individual rights, international relations, trade, and commerce.

Access to Information

Access to government information is a fundamental tool for monitoring government performance, policy formation, and ethics and fairness in decision-making. The right of access to government information is used extensively by lawyers, historians, academics, journalists, advocacy groups, as well as all manner of citizens and activists for a variety of purposes.

As communication between governments and the public becomes increasingly reorganized along the lines of Public Relations—a practice that tends to privilege message discipline and uniformity above depth and transparency—obtaining meaningful, unadulterated information from public bodies becomes more difficult for everyone. Numerous articles published by veteran journalists in recent months, both in British Columbia and across Canada, make it clear that the time of simply phoning a public servant and gaining access to relevant departmental information is long over.

This year has seen the steady increase of public body opacity and attempts to avoid releasing information to the public. This is an issue that FIPA first raised in 2012, in response to what appeared to be a dramatic increase in the number of FOI requests that came back without any responsive records. Our complaint to the Information and Privacy Commissioner resulted in a damning OIPC report

highlighting the widespread and growing culture of 'oral government' at even the highest levels of the provincial government. In January of this year, the results our complaint to the OIPC regarding the missing Burnaby Hospital Consultative Committee e mail draw attention to another method through which government has avoided documentation: by marking a wide range of records as 'transitory' and deleting them.

In the face of this accelerating trend toward public body opacity, there are relatively few resources available to the public that offer guidance in how to use the ATI/FOI system to obtain information. FIPA's legal education programming therefore provides an essential resource for individuals to exercise their rights.

Privacy rights

As more and more of our personal information flows through devices and networks over which we might not necessarily have control, the likelihood of that information being improperly (even illegally) collected, used, and disclosed grows markedly. This is why privacy protection is more important than ever before. Over the past two decades, governments across Canada have recognized this fact and enacted legislation to protect the privacy rights of citizens in both the public and private sectors. But with the technological landscape constantly changing, watchdog organizations like FIPA, committed to tracking and responding to such changes, are an essential tool for keeping policy makers and community members informed, educated, and alert to the issues.

Further, the rising costs--economic, personal, political and otherwise--of privacy-related crimes such as identity theft make it clear that FIPA's work isn't restricted to complicated legal challenges. Rather, our efforts are also deeply connected to people's everyday lives. Privacy crimes, breaches, and leaks can seriously harm people's livelihood and wellbeing. Vigilant advocacy in defense of privacy tools and policies, then, is necessary to reduce the risks of these dangers. By coupling this commitment to citizen privacy with ongoing efforts to empower communities with the knowledge of their freedom of information and access rights, FIPA works to establish a democratic balance of power between the individuals and the institutions that make up our society--a necessary prerequisite for sensible policy formation and government accountability.

Privacy rights are fundamental to the preservation of individual freedom and even to the maintenance of mental health. They underpin other constitutionally protected rights such as freedom of expression and assembly. Privacy laws guarantee individuals the right of access to their own personal information in the custody or control of government and private enterprises, as well as to the correction of this information when it can be demonstrated to be incorrect. They also allow individuals to seek a remedy when they have suffered abuse at the

hands of organizations due to the presence of incorrect information about them or the improper collection, use or disclosure of their information. Given the public awareness of government surveillance raised by former NSA analyst Edward Snowden, there has been a growing and pronounced interest in personal privacy rights more broadly; what they are, how to exercise them, and when they might be abused.

4. Accessibility and Inclusiveness:

FIPA provides information, advice, assistance and educational services free of charge to a broad range of the individuals and groups. These services are used most often by individuals who are struggling for fair or equal treatment because they are disadvantaged; belong to minority groups; or for other reasons find themselves stigmatized or subject to unfair treatment and unwanted scrutiny.

It is the minority, disadvantaged, and out-of-favour groups in our society that most often need to use freedom of information laws to obtain government information — whether about broader government policies and actions or about themselves — in order to illuminate government actions affecting themselves. It is also these individuals and groups that find their privacy rights most threatened by government or other authorities. They may be subjected to unwarranted or illegal surveillance at work or at home, and their entitlement to benefits or access to government or government funded programs may be made contingent on revealing large amounts of personal information, sometimes unreasonably or illegally.

We work alongside a diverse collection of allies to ensure that our educational programming is available to as many people as possible, irrespective or cultural or economic constraints. In addition, we carried out our website redesign with a view to improve access to our resources and educational materials for a more diverse public. Our help topics have been improved in clarity and accessibility for those who have no experience of dealing with the law; we have made the website fully searchable so that individuals are able to more quickly locate the information that they need; and we now have the capacity on the website to provide translations of these resources for non-English speaking members of the public, which we will be exploring in the future.

5. Sustainability, Viability and Lasting Impact:

FIPA staff, in collaboration with Board of Directors, carries out significant strategic planning to ensure that the resources necessary to continue our public education services are always in place. These planning mechanisms have allowed us to successfully run this program through good and bad economic times.

To further increase the resilience of this program, we have embarked on several organizational development initiatives. In recent years FIPA has made a concerted effort to diversify our sources of funding- developing member relations, seeking more corporate memberships, doubling the rate for corporate membership, and using a donation page to prompt users to consider donating when they download one of our free publications. We are also investigating tangible benefits which could be offered to potential new organizational members (for example customized FOI and privacy workshops for the organizations' employees) and for individual members (for example membership cards, access to member-only areas of the website, and discounts for events).

In the coming year we seek to amplify the success of these efforts through improvements to our website. The website is our public face and the first landing point for the majority of potential funders who are interested in learning more about us. The new design communicates a clear and consistent articulation of our mandate, presents a professional appearance, and effectively showcases our work. This improved online presence also offers us access to new interest communities, and more opportunities for collaboration.

As outlined above, privacy and information issues are becoming more relevant than ever as we transition into a truly networked society. For FIPA, this escalating interest opens up a whole range of new educational opportunities, such as providing privacy coaching to those who work in bring-your-own-device environments, and developing up-to-date resources on best practices for user privacy on social networking platforms. Similarly as government information is increasingly mediated through public relations representatives, it is important that members of the public are aware of their information rights and how to exercise them. As such, FIPA's community education

programming will be an essential resource to a growing audience. Development in these directions, supported by Gaming funds, will ensure that FIPA's work remains relevant and creates lasting impacts in our communities.

6. Community Support

FIPA currently has approximately 168 organizational and individual members, including 25 organizational delegates. The National Privacy Coalition listserv that we administrate also connects more than 160 privacy and information professionals across Canada; our FIPA news service (anchored on our website) reaches almost 400 people; and we have approximately 1,220 individuals and organizations following us on Twitter.

We are regularly contacted by other advocacy groups for collaborations, and we are members of two broad-based coalitions that include organizations and individuals from a wide range of political perspectives, including citizen-based groups, civil liberties groups, right-leaning organizations, First Nations groups, labour groups, small businesses and academic experts.

How the Gaming Funds will be Spent

Gaming Funds will be used to cover a portion of each of our Community Education Program expenses. These expenses are as follows:

Accounting
Advertising & promotion
Administration
Bank charges & interest
Communications
(Website, Internet, postage, printing, writing & editing services)
Conference and seminar expenses
Consultant fees
Information resources (library)
Office expenses
Office rent
Research and report writing
Salaries and benefits
Telephone
Travel & transportation

The portion of each expense that will be covered by Gaming Funds will be the same as in previous years and Gaming Funds are used for this program exclusively. This is indicated in the Summary Report filed each year with Gaming Branch. We have also attached an updated Revenues and Expenditures statement to show how we have spent Gaming Funds in 2013. A statement for 2012 was attached to the Summary report sent earlier this year.

For 2015 we are requesting an additional \$10,000 in order to keep pace with the increasing cost of these expenses. We made our last request for a funding increase in 2008 for 2009. In 2009 we received an additional \$10,000, bringing our annual Gaming funding to \$50,000.

We have been operating at this funding level for the last five years, but the costs associated with our programing have continued to increase. By raising our funding request to \$60,000, we will be able to meet the increased expenses we have been contending with over the past few years, and new additional costs associated with providing improved service to the people of British Columbia in the years to come.

Some examples of these cost increases are set out below.

Our funding request for 2009 was filed in 2008, and was based on actual expenses from 2007 and 2008 up to the date of filing the request. It was also based on estimated increases for 2009.

As it turns out, our actual expenses for 2009 and later years were considerably higher than those for 2008.

Our rent increased in 2009, and the rent we currently pay is almost 50% more than what we paid in 2008 and will increase further in 2015. The increases are not out of line with the market for similar accommodation, so moving is not a realistic option. The dollar amount of the rent increase since 2008 is \$4281.

The cost of accounting has more than tripled since 2008, due to new requirements for additional reports including a review engagement. There is no way to reduce these costs. The dollar amount of the increase is \$3733.

The cost of accounting software has also increased, and it appears likely that our ability to obtain this software (Sage) at a substantial discount may be coming to an end. Techsoup, which provides donated software at a discount to nonprofits, has indicated that they do not know if they will be able to get Sage beyond 2015. We obtained one of the few 2015 editions made available this fall for \$50, but will likely face steeply rising costs in future. The commercial price of the basic software is \$500 and another \$850 for the payroll package. Both of these are essential for our operation.

Other software and computer costs have also increased significantly since 2008. We have upgraded our equipment through funds obtained elsewhere, and the website has also been completely overhauled as part of the same grant. The new system will improve our effectiveness as an outreach and educational organization, but these upgrades also come with additional associated maintenance and security costs.

Some of these annual costs include increased costs for security and maintenance (\$315) CRM software and offsite data storage (in Canada) (\$2040) and ancillary items like a SSL certificate (\$30). Total additional annual cost is \$2385.

Below is a breakdown of the increase in these costs between 2008 and 2013, the last year for which we have actual figures.

4. ANNUAL REPORT

President's Report:

FIPA President Richard Rosenberg began the directors' reports by outlining the Agenda and welcoming guest speaker Sylvie Therrien, who recently received the 2014 National Golden Whistle Award from POGG Canada and Canadians for Accountability.

Richard then thanked FIPA's hard-working and much appreciated Program Director at the Law Foundation, Veenu Saini, but who was unfortunately unable to attend. He also acknowledged FIPA's founder Darrell Evans, and researcher Stanley Tromp who were in attendance.

Richard highlighted some of the major accomplishments and projects in our busy 2013, referring members to the Annual Report for complete details. Highlights included:

- Being in the forefront of the battle over government surveillance in a number of areas from data linkage to surveillance by police and security agencies.
- Making progress in our battle with the B.C. Government over its ID Card program which
 it rolled out last February. We were able to expand the scope of the belated
 consultations, and we played an active role in presenting to the User Panel and the
 Expert Conference last November. The User Panel's report shows they took our
 concerns seriously because they are the same as the concerns of many British
 Columbians;
- Releasing our major new publication, Access in the Academy, which is an excellent primer on FOI for all kinds of people, not just students and academics. Kudos to Mike Larsen and Tyler Morgenstern for putting it together, and thanks to the Law Foundation for making it happen. More than 7,500 copies have been downloaded since last summer, which puts it into the best-seller category!
- Our continuing fight against the unconstitutional third-party advertising provisions
 contained in B.C.'s Election Act. We were pushed to take the government to BC Supreme
 Court, and now it looks like the battle will continue after the unfortunate court decision
 last week;
- Commissioner Denham found that our complaint about the rise in 'no responsive records' responses in fact understated the extent of the problem of oral government, with almost a quarter of all FOI requests coming back with no records. We will continue to push for a legal duty to document and other measures to combat oral government;
- We have also held several successful public education events and training sessions with representatives from a number of interest communities,
- We have welcomed new staff and board members in 2013, and we have also seen a number of new members and allies join the Association over the past twelve months.

Richard noted the continuing challenge of low interest rates and general economic uncertainty, however our finances have been stable and we even managed a modest end-of-year surplus.

Executive Director's Report:

Executive Director Vincent Gogolek outlined what was in store for 2014. He began by mentioning a new development with *Access in the Academy*; that very day the BCCLA had

launched a new tool for ATI requests, largely based on our ebook, and for which they gave us credit.

Other upcoming highlights include:

- The launch of our new website next month- thanks to the Law Foundation for providing funding for the redesign and the upgrade of our office equipment
- There will be an announcement next week by the federal Privacy Commissioner's office
 about an exciting new project that we will be coordinating, relating to our vehicles and
 privacy, and it will get a major discussion going about how technology affects our privacy
 when we get in our vehicles.
- Due to the decision in the BC Supreme Court last week in our *Election Act* constitutional
 challenge, we will have more work to do on that front, possibly involving a trip to the BC
 Court of Appeal. If we do appeal, the papers will be filed next month.
- On the FOI front, we will be continuing to press for government to implement a number
 of changes to the law, including a duty to document, covering the subsidiaries of
 educational bodies, whistleblower protection, and improving the public interest
 disclosure provisions. We are not the only ones pushing for greater transparency, and
 hopefully we can get some action on at least some of the most egregious items.
- There is also a lot of work to do on the privacy front. From actual massive surveillance by police and security agencies to accumulation of personal information by the private sector, issues arise as quickly as technology advances.
- Here in BC a Legislative Committee will be reviewing PIPA, the private sector privacy law, and we will be putting in an extensive submission outlining our concerns and recommendations. This will be a major task, consuming a lot of staff time to prepare and present.
- We will be continuing our work with a number of allies regarding government data linkage schemes and systems, with particular emphasis on the continuing roll out of the BC Services Card. This is part of the introduction of a national ID card by stealth, and we need to make people aware of the dangers. Vincent gave a shoutout to Kate Milberry, who was in the audience and was the lead researcher on BCCLA's ground-breaking research on the ID Card. He also noted that while the government is claiming that over a million cards have been issued since the launch, only 360,000 of these are actually the combined cards, meaning that two thirds of the people are still saying 'no' even when facing pressure to take the combined card.
- On a similar note, there's a new student database being developed to replace the
 disastrous BCeSiS. The new system was supposed to be compatible with the BC ID Card,
 but the BC Teachers' Federation passed a resolution at their meeting opposing this
 move, and the government has pulled back. So by working with them we've managed to
 ensure we're not going down that road.

5. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Treasurer Tom Crean was not able to attend due to work requirements, so Vincent gave the report.

He summarized that the Association's financial situation for 2013 as good: we managed to accumulate a surplus of \$5,580, which is larger than the 2012 surplus. Our cash reserves at the end of 2013 were \$37,496 up from \$30,967 at the end of 2012, so we are better prepared for any downturn that may come. And revenue from membership dues is up to over \$6000, a considerable jump from the \$3,445 at the end of 2012.

He also noted that we are hoping to continue along this path in 2014. We have received an important grant from the Law Foundation to update our website and electronic equipment, and we will also be receiving a major grant from the Privacy Commissioner of Canada to conduct a study of automotive telemetry systems and their effect on privacy. The OPC grant will largely pass through to the researchers and others working on the project.

He reiterated Richard's comment that low interest rates and general economic uncertainty have put a strain on organizations across the non-profit sector, and FIPA is no exception. The Law Foundation was forced to reduce its annual grant budget by 20%, however we continue to receive funding at the same level, which is an indication of how they regard the work that we do.

I am writing this letter on behalf of the Freedom of Information and Privacy Association ("FIPA"), in connection with FIPA's application for funding.

I practice in the area of access to information and privacy law, and I have had many opportunities to observe FIPA's work. These opportunities have arisen from FIPA's participation in the Canadian Bar Association (B.C. Branch) Freedom of Information and Privacy Law Section, and in stakeholder consultations undertaken by the Ministry of Citizen's Services when considering amendments to the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act ("FOIPPA") and the Personal Information Protection Act ("PIPA"). I am also aware of FIPA's work through my work with the Law Foundation of British Columbia; although I am writing this letter in my personal capacity as a lawyer, not in my capacity as the Law Foundation Chair.

FIPA operates on a very small budget, relatively speaking. They run a lean operation from an administrative standpoint, and yet they are able to provide a very significant amount of service to the public on that minimal budget.

I have found FIPA to be very proactive and strategic in its endeavours - they do not sit around waiting for someone to contact them with a problem. They are proactive and continuously strive to improve the public's access to government information and the public's understanding of individual privacy rights. In particular, FIPA's community education programming provides British Columbians and Canadians with easy access to quality legal information and help; their workshops, online help tools, and publications are invaluable resources that show individuals and community organizations how to understand and use their rights.

FIPA has engaged in some very interesting and important test litigation, and they are usually able to attract pro bono legal services to assist with that litigation; which says a great deal about the high regard in which FIPA is held by the Bar in British Columbia.

I have also found FIPA to be quite balanced and reasonable in its views and positions on matters of public policy. While I do not always agree with their stance on any given particular issue. Lalways respect it because I know they put a great deal of thought and care into their work, and I know they always have the public interest foremost in their minds.





There were also several motions dealt with pertaining to Bowl Canada and our programs. Some of these were motions that had already been reviewed by the Provincial Associations. After receiving the input of the members in attendance at the AGM the Bowl Canada Board of Directors met and held their vote on each motion. The motions that passed are in effect for next season. There are also several new motions that will now be reviewed by the provinces for possible adoption at the next Board of Directors meeting. We will discuss these motions under new business today.

We also spent considerable time discussing the new federal Not For Profit Corporations Act. This affects Bowl Canada and will result in significant changes to how the association operates. The Bowl Canada Board of Directors will no longer be representatives sent by the provinces. For example, currently, our Bowl BC President and Vice-President automatically represent our province on the Bowl Canada Board of Directors. As of June 2014 this will no longer be the case. Starting at the June 2014 Bowl Canada Annual General Meeting the members in attendance will elect the Board of Directors. The Board will be comprised of 7 members (down from the current 20), with not more than two members from a province. Six of the members will be elected for two year terms, three each year. The 7th will be appointed. There will always be at least one tenpin and one fivepin representative on the board. After the election at the AGM the new board will meet and have their own vote to determine the President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary. Under the new act, the Past-President's position will be eliminated from the Bowl Canada Board of Directors. To be eligible for the office of President requires a prerequisite of 2 consecutive years of service on the Board and the Office of President may be held by a member for a maximum of 4 consecutive years. Nominations for the Board of Directors are to be submitted in advance of the Annual General Meeting and will only be accepted from the floor if no nominations were received prior to the deadline.



TREASURER'S REPORT - Tammy Marino

Our April 30th balance sheet has shown that we are inline with our budgeted figures. We will discuss the May financials in Las Vegas which will give us a more complete view of accounts as our tournaments are completed, outstanding bills are received and proceeds earned from the YBC 4 Steps National souvenirs are calculated.

This year's budget shows a surplus of \$14,008.00. However, we were working with some unknown factors, namely the removal of the Combo Team event from the 4 Steps as well as proposed changes to the National Classified. For now the budget is done without changes. We will reconsider these factors once we have results from the vote at the National Conference in NFL.

TREASURER'S REPORT - contid

In the meantime the most notable change in our budget comes from a reduction of salaries and benefits due to the Executive Director retiring.

Other changes include:

- An increase in travel subsidies for coaches of the 4 Steps Provincial Teams. It was felt that these volunteers require hotel stays and time off work to attend the Provincials and should be compensated in a more substantial way than the bowlers.
- An increase to office maintenance & equipment for a long overdue upgrade in our accounting software.
- An increase to the luncheon portion of the Youth Doubles. It is felt that with the impending removal of the Combo Team event we should do our best to upgrade & promote the Youth Doubles Provincials.

All in all, our proposed budget is promising for the upcoming season, however we must tread lightly. The income over expense is due to a significant reduction in expenses not a significant increase in income. Without an increase in members, sponsorships and/or government funding it is likely that in the future travel subsidies will need to be replaced with travel assessments.



YOUTH BOWLING CANADA - BC REPORT - Ray Brittain

This marks the end of a very eventful YBC season in British Columbia. This has been a season that culminated in YBC's biggest party right here in BC - the 4 Steps to Stardom National Championships. This was also the year in which we gave some amazing prizes to top Nationals Fund Chocolate sellers. In addition, we had the requisite house, zone and provincial tournaments that everybody looks forward to. At the time of writing, we had 39 bowling centres in BC with a YBC program. Of these, 13 had the same or higher registrations compared to the end of last season. The registration summary paints a somewhat bleak picture overall however, a decrease of 278 youth bowlers (-264 five pin, -14 ten pin). Total registrations for five pin were 1603, and 111 for ten pin. The Bantam/Junior/Senior breakdowns are: Five Pin 736/526/341; Ten Pin 44/23/44.



- 2. All centres should have an internet Social Media presence. It is possible that the Association could pay each centre up to \$300.00 towards advertising and/or promoting their centres business & bowling programs on Facebook or Google.


RISK MANAGEMENT/INSURANCE REPORT - Lee-Anne Wilson



PRESIDENT'S REPORT - Ken Clarke

Welcome to Coquitlam and the Bowl BC Annual General Meeting.

Thank you for taking time away from your business during this busy time of the season to attend today's meeting. We are fortunate to have a very dedicated group of people willing and able to serve on our Board of Directors.

i would like to welcome the Commodore Lanes in Vancouver to our association. Their decision to join meant I was then able to appoint Ken Hayden to our Board and to the position he cares so much about: Chair of Variety – the Children's Charity. As part of Ken's report just before lunch today we will be addressed by representatives of Variety.

After lunch we will have a presentation from Laddie Mackinnon. Laddie is well known in the bowling community as a competitor and coach. In his professional life Laddie is an Occupational Safety Officer with WorkSafe BC. Laddie will explain new regulations that came into effect in our Province at November 1^{6t} dealing with workplace bullying and harassment. WorkSafeBC requires employers to have policies in place to deal with this. I have asked Laddie to speak to us today to bring us up to speed on what this is all about and what is expected of us.



PRESIDENT'S REPORT - cont'd

The Bowl Canada Board of Directors Mid-Winter meetings were held just over a week ago in Las Vegas. Our Bowl BC Vice-President and YBC Chair, Ray Brittain, and myself attended these meetings. In his YBC report today Ray will update us on the various motions pertaining to youth bowling. Also, we will hear about the motions regarding tournaments in Gord Wiffen's report; there are some World Cup motions to be covered in the Tenpin Report.

The following are some general motions that were passed by the Bowl Canada Board of Directors:

- That Bowl Canada subsidize BPA-America membership fees for its members to the amount of \$100 US annually. Bowl Canada's contribution to be taken from the Marketing Fund. Subsidization in effect as of January 1st, 2014.
- That investments purchased by Bowl Canada be restricted to GICs.
- That up to \$10,000 be earmarked for engagement of a consultant to assist with determining Bowl Canada's Board Governance Model.
- That Bowl Canada adopt the requirements of the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants' ASNFPO (Accounting Standards for Not For Profit Organizations) effective August 1st, 2012.

The following motions are administrative:

- That "Disclosure of Conflict of Interest" be added to the agenda of all Bowl Canada Board of Directors Meetings.
- That a review of all association entry/participation fees be added to the agenda of all Bowl Canada Board of Directors Meetings.

Before moving into the rest of our schedule, I would like to give recognition to a few people who have greatly contributed to the success of this season. The first is Mickie Keepper who has done a great job this year in her newly appointed position as Administrator of our Bowl BC office following the retirement of Sheilagh Meyers this past bowling season. Mickie has taken naturally to the position and has further proven to be a great asset. The next is Ray Brittain who has continued to do superb work in his position as YBC chair. His keen interest in youth bowling hasn't gone unnoticed by his fellow board members, youth bowlers and other participants alike. Finally, I would like to give thanks to Tammy Marino who has dedicated much of her time to the position of Treasurer. This position requires much extra time and effort, and is not something easily maintained to the degree that Tammy has done thus far.

We have a busy day ahead of us. We will now hear the various committee reports.

TREASURER'S REPORT - Tammy Marino

A look at our current balance sheet shows us inline with our budgeted figures or at least on pace with the previous season. In most cases as we are just beginning tournaments so we do not yet have accurate numbers.

Of course there are some notable exceptions:

Under income - Retail Operations is showing an expense of \$283.85, this is due to the purchase of tattoos, now available for purchase by members.

Under Government Funding we have received the budgeted amount \$16,400.00, this money will be dealt with in my block funding report. Please be aware that \$24900, of the \$44000.00 we receive from Via Sport came directly from our participation numbers. At this time there are still 17 centres that have not registered their bowlers. Once again I'll remind members to get your numbers in to the office!!!

If you DO NOT see your centre on the list, we DO NOT have your numbers! The website glitches have been corrected & is very easy to use. If you feel this will take too much time you may also fax your information to the office. I can not stress enough how important it is to do this.

Membership Services shows an increase in spending on shipping & postage. Also we had budgeted \$1000 for a computer software upgrade. Mickie was able to obtain the software for only \$47.00. Some education on the new program is recommended with an estimated cost of \$250.

Conferences & Meetings so far shows a significant savings under BPAC Winter Meeting there are some bills still to be paid here however with the meeting being held in Las Vegas this year we will come in under budget.

To date the only Adult Tournament completed is the 400 Club which came in \$324.07 under budget. There is a slight error on our budget regarding the Hawaiian Pick a Partner, our income line shows the tournament fee including GST, in the future we need to remove the GST as we don't show the GST in the tournament expenses. For this season the difference in income is not a significant amount, \$178.00.

Under YBC there is as expected continued decline in membership and chocolate sales, however the big issue here is falls under sponsorships as we did not receive any gaming money leaving the YBC short \$15000.00. Add to this travel to Northern Ontario for YBC Nationals we are left with some tough decisions regarding the budget for 2014/2015. Although we will make application again next season we cannot count on this money therefore need to come up with some alternatives.

Some suggestions for discussion include:

Outside Sponsorship. (Even in the form of food for YBC Banquet or perhaps beer for the National Classified)
Removal of the YBC Banquet
Removal of Travel Subsidies
Increased Lane Bed Dues
Provincial Promotion - Provincial 50/50 lottery or Provincial Strike it Rich Pool

Of course any ideas members have would be greatly appreciated.

In the meantime once again I stress to you all to get your participation numbers in, Via Sport is the only avenue we have right now for increased income.

Hello! I hope you have a good day!

As we look forward to promoting the sport of bowling it makes us wonder what's happening outside our front doors. When we look around and see that our numbers are declining with league bowlers, but our centers are still busy we have to figure out our marketing target. Just putting a coupon on the side of a cereal box is not the answer, it might have been 5 years ago but it defiantly is not now. I have read back through many reports and it all states the same thing we really do not have enough funds to make a Huge impact on any market.

So my thought is to start using the things we all have in front of us global technology. There are lots of things that we have been given such as the In School Bowling Lane Kit that we all had shipped to us free of charge from Bowl Canada. We also have a national calendar of events with promotions that we all get exposure from such as Knockdown Cancer for the month of January, the strikeout hunger for the month of December the bowling buddies for the beginning of the season. We can use and build a data base from the frequent bowler cards and those can be used to send out weekly or monthly reminders to all who are participating in this program. The more people see something with a small reminder the more people are thinking of us which in favour will bring them into our centers. At the National level they have formed a committee of 5 that are working on more things and hopefully they will be able to find some new and exciting for us.

The exposure that we in BC get from The Variety Show of Hearts is major they are advertising us on TV, in the TV weekly, in The Province news paper and this is all free of charge to us. If we had to pay for this we could not afford it so please show your support by making an effort.

Kids Bowl Free program is a major supporter of our sport and it helps us build a usable data base that we can access at anytime to fill our centers.

Peter Pin has been out lots but still spends time in the office locked in a bag. He attended his first Variety Christmas party and was real big hit. We now have Peter Pin tattoos for sale at the office, they spread the word quickly.

YOUTH BOWLING CANADA - BC REPORT - Ray Brittain

This YBC season in BC has been like most in the recent past - some centres have more members, some have the same, and some have less. Some declines are due to centre closures, and some are due to membership non-renewals. On the whole, we have seen a decrease of 203 kids in fivepin YBC, which equates to a 12.6% decrease. Tenpin YBC has increased by 23 kids - a 20.7% increase. This tenpin increase is the first increase in many years, and it is a refreshing change.

Travel arrangements are being made for the 50th YBC National Championships, which will be held in Winnipeg.

There has been some concern with youth bowling funding in BC. The Gaming Funding was an issue, as not all funds came through as planned and we are short in our current budget by \$15,000.

Certification of new coaches has been a struggle - many of the coaching courses have been cancelled due to poor registrations. No doubt this has long-term negative implications for YBC numbers. We feel the need to offer a supplemental course that would enable people to learn how to instruct the fundamental skills of bowling. The Community Coaching Course should be taken by all new coaches; however, many feel that these courses do not have a sufficient focus on how to teach bowling - the focus is on making ethical decisions.

Some centres will be trying some of the new youth bowling concepts such as 8 for 8, and 1 am eager to see how this plays out. We surveyed our members as to how many offer coaching/practice sessions for YBC bowlers and found that many offer discounted rates, but very few have dedicated free practice times with coaching. As we continue to adapt to the principles of LTAD, this is one simple area that we can offer a minor change that could have a big impact on our sport.

YBC - BC has decided not to include the Combo Team event in the calendar, as there are already a number of YBC pins over average tournaments in place.

We have some new items that came from the Bowl Canada Semi-Annual meeting held January 15-17:

National Fund Selection - Approved

That Bowl Canada accept World's Finest Chocolate proposal (c) as the fundraising product for the next 2 seasons of the YBC National Fund Campaign. Product offering selected is an all-almonds pack (30 count) with similar prizing to current season. Additional/optional offering of nut-free product by way of either Caramel Whirl cases or Mint Meltaway cases. Each Centre can choose which add-on product they like (mints or caramel) and can order up to 1 for every 5 cases of almonds ordered.

YBC Calendar - Approved

That we explore the possibility of adjusting the Calendar of Events to move YBC 4 Steps to Stardom dates to later in the season with a target of having Provincial Finals taking place in May and National Finals conducted in September. Further discussion to take place at the next Board of Directors Meeting with possible recommendations for consideration.

Bowling Canada ~ Pending Items

4 Steps Composite Teams

That the wording of the YBC 5-pin 4 Steps to Stardom rule (Step 1 - G - G) be corrected to state that "Provincial YBC associations may, at their discretion, elect to allow the purchase of composite teams in their province where there are YBC leagues who do not purchase their own "House" teams in a division.

10 Pin YBC / CTF

A formal proposal has been made by Bowl Canada to unite the 10 pin YBC and CTF-youth programs.

Provincial Youth Doubles - Pending

The tournament committee discussed this event at length. The amount of work involved in running the event is quite significant. Discussion took place with regards to only running it for four (4) weeks instead of the six (6) weeks it currently runs, as well as starting the event February 1st after 4 Steps to Stardom qualifying has been completed.

Brian Madaski, Port Coquitlam Bowl discussed the Kids Bowl Free at his centre and said that when the kids come on their first visit they give them all a Let's Go Bowling Booklet and a scorecard so that they can keep track of their games. In August they run a 4 week mini league where they provided coaches to help out.

MEMBERSHIP REPORT - Gord Buresh

Presently we have 46 member centres an increase of one centre since our Board of Directors meeting in October. There are 39 – 5 pin centres, 4- 10 pin centres and 3 split centres. There are 519 fivepin lane beds and 138 tenpin lane beds for a total of 657.

We would like to welcome the new owner Honekeun Choung and his partners of Commodore Lanes to the Association and welcome back Ken Hayden, Manager of Commodore to the Board of Directors.



We had 4 more centers involved in the 5 Pin division of Bowl B.C.'s Team Challenge Tournament this year. Entries increased by 17 to 36 teams. Our winners this year were: 1st - A Rose Between the Thorns - Smithers Bowl, Smithers - \$900.00 2nd - Just a Little Bit - Kobau Bowling Center, Osoyoos - \$400.00 3rd - Ray and the Racettes - Beaver Valley Lanes, Fruitvale - \$200.00 Tied for 4th - Blue Birds - Nechako Lanes, Prince George & Full House - Smithers Bowl - \$112.50 6th - Bowlertime #1 - Bowlertime 5 Pin Center, Kamloops - \$75.00

RISK MANAGEMENT/INSURANCE REPORT - Lee-Anne Wilson

At this time I would like to introduce Melanie Stefiuk our insurance broker from Hub International who will give you a status of our program.

Melanie Stefiuk - Hub International

Thank you to the Bowling Proprietors for continuing to provide support to the HUB International Bowling Insurance Program.

In the general scheme of things, we're starting to see some volatility in rates industry wide; small to mid size increases have been occurring to the majority of our clients. The bowling program so far has managed to avoid these increases and rates are remaining the same. This may change as the year continues since the program itself is due for renewal in May with the three insurance companies currently on the policy. Any changes will be reported to the BPA as they occur.

RISK MANAGEMENT/INSURANCE REPORT - cont'd

The only two changes we've seen thus far is an amendment to two deductibles. The flood deductible is changing from \$10,000 to \$25,000. This is an industry standard and we're not particularly concerned as most of the centres are not near any bodies of water and won't be affected by this change. The second change is the Sewer Back Up / Water Damage deductible is being amended from \$1,000 to \$2,500. Again, this is an industry standard which has been avoided by the Bowling program for several years. The insurance companies were no longer willing to keep the \$1,000 Water / Sewer Back Up deductible.

With respect to claims, we had one property damage claim in December of 2013. We also have 4 other open claims which are in process.

A question was brought forward with regards to bleachers being installed for events and how a liability policy would respond. Liability (property damage or bodily injury to a third party, so guests entering your premises as an example) covers the entity, which means that any events you have in your premises or business operations you have would be covered by your Liability. Whether owned bleachers or leased, your liability would extend to these structures while they're set up in your premises. If you are leasing bleachers, it's a good idea to have them installed by a qualified technician and acquiring a certificate of insurance from them to prove they carry their own liability insurance. In the event of a loss, your policy would respond and the insurance company would go back after the responsible party if it was deemed that someone else was at fault for the loss. An example would be a third party installing the bleachers and a collapse occurring because the bleachers weren't assembled properly.

Something new to the Bowling Program this year is an option for Legal Expense coverage. This is new to the Canadian marketplace and HUB International is one of few brokers who have access to such a coverage. The coverage is intended to be used for legal matters pertaining to your business; contract disputes, dept recovery, tax issues, etc. There is no restriction to the number of calls you can place to the policy and the only time a claim triggers is if a law firm has to represent your business in court or provide a service outside of a phone call (example: collections letters for debt recovery). The coverage is \$200,000 per occurrence, deals with two law firms in downtown Vancouver and is exceptionally cost effective.

Finally, I've been approached by our Residential Strata Department to be an Account Manager. As such, Lisa Reddekopp will be taking over the Bowling Program effective immediately. Lisa has many years of experience in Commercial Insurance and I'm sure she will continue to provide excellent service going forward. BOWLING FEDERATION REPORT TO BOWL BC - Bob Randall

The Bowling Federation of Canada consists of representatives from Bowl Canada, C5 and Canadian Tenpin Federation. Our objective is to provide a liaison between our partners and to work with the Federal Government in supporting in our mission to foster the development of bowling in Canada.

We have received considerable Heritage money in past years to implement our Goal to Bowl and Goal to Train projects (Learn to Bowl, in school bowling kits, etc.). Funds in the past year have been used to provide Community Coach supplies and to subsidize the cost of the Community Coaching clinic fees. The Heritage monies also funded the bowling lane kits which have gone out to centres that had ordered them. The federation has retained Tom Paterson to write a Teachers Manual that has now been completed and printed and will be sent out to be used with the kits. Heritage funding, as a special category that 5 Pin enjoyed, does not exist any longer in Sport Canada's eyes.

Long Term Athlete Development is essential to our sport and to Sport Canada funding. We had a Competition Review committee meeting on October 24th and 25th, 2013. A writing team was put in place with the purpose of forming a draft document on LTAD, competition review. Ray Brittain attended this meeting along with representatives from our other partners, the CTF and C5. It was felt that a few more meetings would be in order to finalize the documents but we have no approved funding for further face to face work on the Competition Review this fiscal year. Sport Canada rejected our application to fund a February 2014 meeting due to Federal budget restrictions. This project will be included in our 2014-2015 funding application. Until then, we will continue with the writing portion of the LTAD Competition Review and use online resources for communication with the involved parties.

Canada will host the 2015 Pan American games in Toronto. The Games host 6000 athletes and 42 nations participating in 36 sports. Bowling has been a part of these games since 1991 and Sport Canada has provided us with additional funds for our participating bowlers. The host committee in Toronto is looking for 20,000 volunteers to assist in running the games. This is much appreciated exposure for our sport and the BFC will be involved.

In Googling bowling, Pan Am games, a colourful full page dedicated to bowling in the Pan Am games presents itself, with the following definition.....

"In this sport, athletes roll a bowling ball down a wooden lane with the goal of knocking over as many of the 10 pins positioned at the far end of the lane as possible. - See more at: http://www.toronto2015.org/bowling#sthash.y32xfoNe.dpuf"we have a lot of work to do.

This year, the future of the BFC has been forefront by much discussion and concern regarding our High Performance sector. The BFC has not qualified for HP funding as it has not met the High Performance requirements stipulated by Sport Canada. Based on the Sport Funding Accountability Standards finding this past summer, we were deficient in several areas. The funds not available for this past season amounted to about \$57,000 and this understandably has had a big impact on programs and development in that sector. But, more seriously, is the reality that all of the BFC's government funding is at stake and will be cut off in March of 2015 if HP requirements are not met. As the lead in HP, the CTF is working toward completion with full support of the partners.

The CTF's Cathy Innes and Sandy Lowe are now doing yearly training plans based on their High Performance Operations Manual and the CTF has purchased the software to track the training of bowlers and to develop the reports needed as part of our task to become compliant and to assist the athletes and coaches.

We have had the BFC's Bylaws reviewed and revised by the Sport Law and Strategy Group. The bylaws were adopted at our AGM in October. We must be fully compliant under the new Not for Profit Act by October 17th, 2014.

The BFC has proven, over the past 13 years, to be eligible and accountable for millions of dollars of support from Sport Canada. The YBC 5 and 10 pin 4 steps events, Bowling World Cup, C5 Youth Challenge, C5 Inter Provincials, and CTF Nationals, Mixed Championship and Youth National events received over \$230,000 in Sport Canada's monies last season alone, events that fully supported themselves 14 years ago. Our athletes, programs and partner associations have become dependent on this high level of involvement.

The BC 5 Pin Bowlers' Association was discussed at great length with regards to the administration duties of our office and Bowl BC Administrator with regards to running the BC 5 Pin events. The President will forward a letter to the President of the BC 5 Pin Bowlers' Association.

The nominations for Bowl Canada Board of Directors was discussed with regards to who might put their names forward from BC. The President and YBC chairperson will not be automatically part of Bowl Canada board in the future. Further discussion on this topic will take place at Bowl BC board of directors meeting in May.
