BACKGROUND / STATUS:

- The House of Commons will expand by 30 seats under legislation passed in December 2011, adding MPs for British Columbia, Alberta, Ontario and Quebec. The anticipated breakdown is: 3 seats for Quebec, 15 for Ontario, and 6 each for Alberta and British Columbia.
- The federal government estimates the cost of the additional MPs will be \$14.8 million annually.
- The federal government has introduced the Senate Reform Act. It is currently at second reading in the House of Commons. The Act has two elements: (1) it proposes a framework for consulting voters on the selection of Senate nominees from the provinces; (2) and introduces non-renewable nine year term limits.
- Quebec has launched a reference case to the Ouebec Court of Appeal on the constitutionality of the Senate Reform Act.

- The framework would require the Prime Minister to consider the recommended names from a list of elected Senate nominees but would <u>not</u> be binding on the Prime Minister or the Governor General when making appointments to the Senate.
- BC Senator Gerry St. Germain is required to retire from the Senate in November 2012. The
 proposed term limits would mean that BC Senators Martin, Neufeld and Greene Raine would
 serve a further 9 years after the term limits came into force. Senators Jaffer and Campbell
 would not be affected by the new term limits.

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Senate Reform

- The Province supports abolition of the Senate on the basis that it has outlived its purpose. BC is also not fairly represented in the Senate with only 6 seats (compared to 24 in both Ontario and Quebec; 10 in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia; 6 in Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Newfoundland and Labrador).
- Abolition of the Senate or changing the representation in the Senate requires a constitutional amendment supported by 7 of the Provinces representing at least 50% of the population of all provinces.
- If the Senate is to remain and the federal act passed, British Columbians ought to have their say on their senate nominees.
- MLA John Les's Private Member's Bill, "Senate Election Act" would provide a legal framework for electing Senatorial nominees to represent BC in the Senate.
- The proposed Senate Election Act sunsets eight years after proclamation unless the distribution of seats in the Senate is amended to provide British Columbia with a more balanced and equitable proportion.


