Today, I am grateful and humbled... to receive this honorary doctorate from this university.

Last week you celebrated your 110th anniversary.

Think of that history, and the 100,000 women who graduated from Sookmyung Women's University...

The future they helped build despite their tragic times:

From the first students at the school for girls, started by the last Queen of Korea...

To the young women who sacrificed everything to fight for Korea's independence in the Samil movement ...

To the alumni who helped build Korea's incredible postwar success.

You walk with them, on the verge of changing the future-just as they did.

And now I can say, I walk with you...proud to be a part of this sisterhood.

Receiving this honorary doctorate is another sign of what's happening between Sookmyung and British Columbia ... We're growing closer together.

Already, three different universities in B.C. are working to establish links with SWU... Including Royal Roads University. Dr. Allan Cahoon is

here from Royal Roads.

Your two universities signed a Memorandum of Understanding, the last time I was in Korea.

This visit, I'm pleased to announce the Government of BC is offering a new opportunity for a Sookmyung student, for an internship at our trade office in Seoul.

WOMEN IN PUBLIC LIFE

I got my start in politics, basically as an intern about 25 years ago.

Just over 5 years ago, I became Premier. 5 years makes me the longest-serving female Premier or Prime Minister in Canadian history.

It is surprising to me that no other woman has made it this far.

And I am often asked why that is. In a country like Canada, one of the world's most progressive and equitable societies...

Women are still under-represented in leadership roles.

We have come a long way in a long time – but we can do better.

Here's how I believe we can do that:

First, help people change attitudes.

Second, support and encourage more women to pursue leadership roles.

Third, accept that women will approach things differently.

Let me speak about these three things in order. The first is changing attitudes.

BC has the strongest economy in Canada. Yet sometimes when I meet people in my office, they look to my male staff as if they are somehow in charge.

It's funny that still happens. It's also an opportunity. People realize soon enough who is in charge. And as

they do, I think their view of what a leader looks like ...evolves.

That's important, because I know female leaders still face more comments about looks appearances, their hair, their clothes, their body,

Change will come with more women in leadership roles. Here's what I've tried to do about it.

About 40 per cent of my Cabinet are women.

Over 40 per cent of our 2,000 board appointments are women. So are 48 per cent of my senior public servants.

And I established the Premier's Women's Economic Council – a group of women leaders in business, to discuss ways to grow the economy.

We've achieved all this without quotas. Every one of them is there because they're the best person for the job.

Beyond government, we need to help and encourage women to pursue non-traditional careers.

Let me give you two examples:

In the next 8 years, we're expecting a million job openings in BC. A substantial portion of those will be in the skilled trades – areas traditionally dominated by men.

So we started the Women in Trades Training Program to help with financial assistance and support. Since 2008, over 3,000 women have gotten their start in a new career through this program.

Here's another example, we wondered why more single mothers weren't finding jobs and moving off social assistance.

We realized that to get off welfare and go to school, you had to pay for tuition and transportation, find child care –

and your governments cheques stop when you start school.

So we started the Single Parent Employment Initiative. We pay for tuition, transportation and child care during training.

In just 8 months, we've helped over 2,600 single parents – over 90 per cent of them are women.

Finally, we need to accept women will do things differently. And that's a good thing.

Let me first tell you what that doesn't mean. I don't believe we help female politicians by insisting they focus on "women's issues."

Because what are women's issues? I believe women and men care about the same things:

☐ A healthy, growing economy

☐ Creating jobs that pay enough to support families
☐ Taking care of those in society who need it.

But women will have different priorities.

One of the issues I am most passionate about is bullying. For generations in Canada, it was seen as a rite of passage – something all kids had to go through.

It should not have been surprising to see the same behaviour we tolerated in school stay in the workplace.

It leaves lasting psychological scars - it has to stop.

So we are working with students, sports teams, and everyone to put an end to it, through events like Pink Shirt Day.

CONCLUSION

Canadians and Koreans are fortunate. We are lucky to live in these times...lucky to be able to contemplate doing things that our mothers may have never considered.

When my son was born I was a Cabinet Minister. I arranged a nursery in my office in the legislature so I could keep working. Some people said, 'that's never been done before.'

Each of you, in your chosen fields, have an opportunity to succeed at what you do...as women.

And when you do, it will change the conversation of what's expected of us.

And that will be good for all of us...women and men. When not 50, not 60, not 70 per cent of us can contribute to economic productivity and the health of our two countries...but 100 per cent.

As you've been showing at Sookmyung Women's University...

When you unlock the potential in women, you can change the world. Thank you.
