Rosebery to Summit Lake Trail

Route description

This section of trail extends from the end of the Galena Trail in Rosebery to Summit Lake Class A provincial park. The entire length of the trail lies on the former CPR rail right-of-way from which track and ties were removed approximately 10 years ago. The trail runs right along the shoreline of Slocan Lake from Rosebery to Hills, and it closely follows Bonanza Creek from Hills to Summit Lake.

Legal status

It is our understanding that the former CPR right-of-way is now under the jurisdiction of the BC government. There are apparently a few property owners who have claims to the former right-of-way, but the vast majority of the length if undisputed.

Physical description and trail condition

The distinguishing feature of this trail section is its proximity to Slocan Lake and Bonanza Creek.

The Rosebery-Hills section is generally within 5 metres of the lake for its entire length. Water seepage and erosion is evident in several places along the steep cutbank and treed slope that separates the trail from Highway 6 which lies 30 to 50m above the trail.

As the trail passes the Bonanza Marsh at Hills, it climbs up from the lake elevation and passes alongside private property for about 1 km as it crosses Bonanza Road and skirts a Ministry of Highways gravel pit. A CPR culvert removal project just beyond the gravel pit has left a 10m deep by 10m wide cut in the trail that is difficult to negotiate except on foot.

From the gravel pit to Summit Lake, the trail closely follows Bonanza Creck, lying within 10m of the creek and within the creek's riparian zone for almost all of its length. The CPR has removed most of its culverts, but a number of small tributaries cross the trail through remaining culverts and small washouts before emptying into Bonanza Creek. One small bridge has recently been rebuilt over a plugged-culvert wash-out. Much of the area along this stretch of trail is wetland that is constantly in flux due to extensive beaver activity. Indeed, the trail itself is in danger of being undermined and washed out in many places, and it would require sensitive trail work to maintain its usefulness and to protect wildlife values.

Ecological Considerations

The overriding ecological consideration for this section of trail is its proximity to Slocan Lake and Bonanza Marsh and Creek. As described above, the trail is within the riparian zone of the lake and creek and generally within 5 metres of the water's edge for nearly its entire length.

Bonanza Marsh and Creek have both been recognized for their special status. Bonanza Marsh is one of few remaining natural wetlands in the West Kootenays; it is a nesting area for many native and migratory bird species, and contains some rare plants. Bonanza Creek was recognized in the 1980 Slocan Valley Development Guidelines as the most important Kokanee spawning creek in the Slocan Lake drainage. For the past two years, local residents have worked with Fisheries Renewal BC to assess the quality of kokanee habitat and the health of the Bonanza Creek population.

The creek and the wetlands along its length also provide habitat for many mammals and birds. Large mammals include elk and moose, grizzly and black bears, cougar and lynx, mule and white-tailed deer, and beavers. Birds include a wide range of woodland and wetland species as well as bald eagles, great blue herons, great-horned owls, pileated woodpeckers, and dippers within the creek itself.

New logging activity by Slocan Forest Products on the west side of Bonanza Creek has increased potential for negative impacts on the creek and marsh. A logging road has been built along the west side of Bonanza Creek, and several cutblocks have already been logged with many more scheduled for the next decade.

Historic and Present Uses

Prior to the removal of the CPR tracks, the train ran once or twice a week in its final decades along this route, mostly transporting poles and cedar shakes from Nakusp south to the main rail line. Remnants of this historic use remain, including a small station house north of Hunter Siding, and assorted spikes, washers and iron tie plates scattered along the trail.

For the past 25 years, the Hills Recreation Society has promoted appreciation of the special natural qualities of the trail, and its members have maintained it for use of residents and visitors. Regular uses include:

- access to the lake and creek for swimming and fishing
- mountain biking
- walking and jogging
- nature outings (individual, school groups, and clubs)
- horseback riding
- · cross-country skiing

The cross-country ski trails are maintained mainly along the Bonanza Creek section. Snowfall is generally insufficient for skiing along Slocan Lake, but the ski trail is extended along the lake in good snowfall years. Because of these snow conditions, there has been no snowmobile use of the Slocan lakeshore section, although there is occasional use of the Bonanza section by local residents.

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Non-motorized recreational use of the Rosebery-Summit Lake railbed was well-established long before removal of the railroad tracks allowed for motorized recreational use. For decades prior to the track removal, the railbed was used for hiking, nature walks and beach access during the summer and for cross-country skiing during the winter. Since the track removal, there has been occasional use by motorcyclists, ATVers, and snowmobilers (Bonanza section only), and a few campers and woodcutters also use the right-of-way along the lakeshore Even so, our estimates are that non-motorized user days outnumber motorized user days by about 100 to 1. (Estimate based upon 5-25 non-motorized users per day, year-round and only occasional motorized use.)

Recommendations

It is fair to say that most residents are content with the present use pattern of the Rosebery-Summit Lake trail. However, even the present, occasional motorized recreational use has met with some complaints from the larger group of non-motorized users, and a few property owners have objected to even non-motorized use of the trail past their properties.

Many users and nearby property owners are concerned over possible *increased* motorized activity. This is seen to be an unacceptable intrusion into sensitive wildlife habitat and a disruption to the generally quiet and slow-moving activities of non-motorized users. These people believe that motorized group or club activities would be incompatible with wildlife values and with non-motorized human uses on this trail section.

There is an existing, alternative off-highway route from Rosebery to Nakusp for motorized recreational use. This route, which is included in the BC Forest Service Recreation Site maps, uses the Wilson Creek and Fitzstubbs Creek logging road network. It leaves highway 6 at Rosebery, passes several BC Forest Service recreation sites at Beaver, Little Wilson and Wilson Lakes, and rejoins Highway 6 at the north end of Box Lake.


If motorized use was deemed appropriate on the Summit Lake to Nakusp section of the former CPR right-of-way, this could provide an off-highway link from Box Lake to Nakusp and to Summit Lake with possible connection to the extensive Slewiskin (McDonald) Creek logging road network. (See map on Page 4.) It is, however, outside our area of interest to comment on appropriate uses in this area,

We support the present non-motorized uses of the Rosebery-Summit Lake Trail with a recognition that protection of wildlife, water and other ecological values takes priority over human use.

We recommend strict limits on motorized activity along the Rosebery-Summit Lake trail.


We support an alternative off-highway route from Rosebery to Nakusp for motorized recreational use using the Wilson Creek and Fitzstubbs Creek logging road network.

Given the very high fish and wildlife values along the Bonanza Creek and Marsh section and the extreme proximity of the trail to Slocan Lake and BonanzaCreek, we believe a detailed impact study is a necessary part of any proposed trail development or major increase in use in this section.

ROSEBERY TO SUMMIT LAKE REGIONAL TRAIL DEVELOPMENT PLAN

BACKGROUND

In 1992 a Study was commissioned by the Ministry of Environment, Land and Parks and the Slocan Valley Economic Development Commission on a land use study on the abandoned railway between Rosebery and Three Forks.

This study was originally based on the Railway corridor from Nakusp to Rosebery and from Rosebery to Three Forks. Since the acquisition of Railway corridor from Nakusp to Rosebery was still being reviewed by the Province, the original corridor study was deferred and Rosebery to Three Forks was only included in the study.

In 1993 a License of Occupation was granted to the Regional District for the Rosebery to Three Forks Regional Trail (File #4401707 – License #342006).

The Regional District has been requested by the Hills Recreation Society to obtain tenure on the Railway Corridor from Rosebery to Summit Lake as a logical extention to the existing trail.

A submission prepared by the Hills Recreation Society and the Hills Nordic Ski Club dated December 1, 2000 is attached for your reference.

PROPOSED USE

The Regional District of Central Kootenay proposes to develop the Rosebery to Summit Lake Railway corridor as a Regional Trail, which will be a logical enhancement to the existing Rosebery to Three Forks Regional Trail.

As the site has been used for a number of unmanaged recreational activities it is in the best interests of the Community to have the Railway corridor managed effectively for the benefit of all residents.

To accomplish this objective the Regional District is interested in this property to include it into the Regional Parks plan, which will effectively ensure exclusive use of the property as a Regional Trail.



"Rosebery to Summit Lake - Non Multi-Use Again?"

Dear Sir and or Madam:

It has come to my attention that there is a tenure application for the section of old CPR rail grade from Rosebery to Summit lake, for the purpose of a regional park trail. As I do not have a copy of the application, I can not ascertain whether there are to be certain exclusions to the use of this corridor. If there is to be any exclusions of use by any group and/or individual, I have some points I would like to convey.

It was late 1999 into 2000 s.22 dealing with the logistics of a fully-working, multi-use corridor. s.22 s.22

The process started November 15, 2000 at the school in New Denver with a large group of residents concerned about the future of this section of railway grade. This project was funded by the Ministry of Community Development, and headed by Hanne Smith Heintz. From this group there was a small "steering group" formed to come up with a workable solution to the problems associated with a Multi-Use trail. The group was headed by a paid individual, hired by the Ministry of Community Development, to collect meeting minutes, data gathered by group members, and to try keep the group moving in a realistic and positive direction. For the most part, the group functioned well, keeping in mind that there were some very strong view points from both sides of the fence.

To begin with, we needed to know, without a question, what condition the grade was in.

opportunity to understand that there were some problem areas that would need more attention than others in order to have the trail be safe for any and all forms of recreation users, and more specifically, how it could be used harmoniously. Once again this led to some vigorous and sometimes loud debate on how this could be achieved. In the end, all information gathered ended up with Ms. Heintz, with nothing changing. Fast forward...ten years have passed and the ground in question was used by all forms of recreation users.

My question has to be why would you give consideration to this application? Pressure? If so, from where? It has always been my opinion that as residents and tax payers of the area, we all should have the opportunity to share our rural back yard. Also, I have always said that the form of recreation you choose is no more or less important than somone else's.

Some other questions to consider:

- Since this grade travels through the ALR and borders many private properties, will there be a system to limit the spreading of seeds from noxious weeds? I know it happens now, but if tenure is granted, who is accepting the liability and maintenance of the trail?
- I know the Hills Nordic Club uses a snowmobile to pull a cross-country ski groomer. If this trail is to be non-motorized, are they still able to do what they need to, in order to keep their club moving forward?
- In the Jan. 13, 2010 issue of the Valley Voice, there was an article stating that a survey from the Hills Recreation Society concluded that the majority of residents were for joint use. If this is the case, why would you choose to change the rail grade's use?
- The community of Hills is the most affected. Will there be provisions for garbage handling, out-houses, fire control, and minimizing intrusions on bordering private property?
- Who will pay for ongoing trail maintenance? As a rule, ATV and snowmobile riders take on some of the burden of upkeep as a fun day or weekend for continued safe use of the area in question.

In closing I would like to see the rail grade stay as multi-use. Furthermore, it would be great if it could link up with the "old wagon road-CPR grade" from Kaslo. The Kaslo ATV club has done a great job on the trail from Kaslo to Fish Lake on Hwy 31A. We should also remember that this is a corridor that may in the future, be a way of moving resources, as it did in the past. IE:, natural gas, water, etc.



I am writing in reply to the application for the disposition of crown land. The application is being made by the Regional District of Central Kooteay on behalf of the ILMB (Kooentay region) for a nominal rent tenure for the purpose of a regional trail park between Summit Lake and Roseberry B.C. Application number 4404926

I am writing in opposition to this application for several reasons as outlines below:

- 1. The current rail bed from Summit Lake to Roseberry is currently being used as a multi use trail and I feel is successful at this. I have used the trail for Hiking, biking, horseback riding, ATVing and Snowmobiling and I feel that all users have been very curteous and use the trail very well together.
- 2. I am worried that an application to turn it into a park is from a very vocal but small group that want to restrict its use to non motorized only.
- 3. The notion that the current trail is being used more by non motorized users more than motorized or mounted users I don't feel is a correct summary of the situation. As a user it has been my experience that it is used more by ATV's, Snowmobiles and Horses. Has anyone ever done a true study where users are counted? Most of this trail is quite isolated and not near any large town, it actually takes some fiteness level and considerable amount of time to get to most of this trail from either Nakusp or New Denver. How many people truly spend a whole day walking or using a bicycle. Also most bicycles use the highway system as the rail bed is a bit rocky and difficult for bicycles
- 4. Making this strip of rail bed into a park will not make the maintenance of the trail better! With the downsizing of the park service, current parks are right now not being maintained as well as they should. Why do we want to add another park we cant afford to maintain. Currently the rall bed is being maintained by ATV ers who keep the trail clear and safe. They do this without asking for any money and they do this on their own time. As an example of decreased funding for current parks one only has to look at the walking trail on the far side of Slocan Lake. There have been recent blow downs with no maintenance and clean up done. The trail is now quite dangerous to use
- 5. Without the use of the Old rail bed the current horseback riders would need to use the current higway system to access back country trails in the area. This would make a very dangerous situation for these riders. It is illegal for ATV's using the highway.
- 6. I really fear we will loose the multi use ability for this corridor and I dont believe it makes it safer. In fact right now it is the current non motorized users that cause me the most problem as a horseback rider. Motorized users for a large majority of the time are extremely careful and mindful of other users

In Short I am worried that this application is a thinly veiled attempt by a small vocal group to decrese access to the old rail bed to motoroized and horseback use. There has already been a precedent set on the "three forks" portion of the old rail bed and the slocan Valley portion which are limited to non motorized use already. I do not feel however that this would be desireable for the summit lake to Roseberry portion and I speak against this application.

It features a well maintained surface with Slocan River views and a resident population of Trumpeter and Tundra Swans at the Walter Clough Wildlife Sanctuary.

On January 30, 2010, we skied from Hills to Summit Lake and found this section of rail bed equally appealing. It features isolation from Hwy 6 and parallels Bonanza Creek with many beaver dams, moose and large cat prints. I have copies of the 2004 and 2007 revised editions. The bulk of the submission is false and misleading without sufficient facts to support its claims. This application is the work of a minority, special interest group with strong political alias and a self serving agenda. Past RDCK director, Don Munroe, told the APC there was no official action being taken on the old CPR Rail Grade and would let us know if something came up. Obviously he did not want the public aware of this application at present; the Hills Recreation Society has less than 20 members in good standing. Hills has already received a non-motorized government funded trail as has New Denver and Roseberry.

During the OCP for Slocan Lake North, it was quite clear from the surveys and community meetings there is a strong desire to keep access for motorized recreation open on all present trails and any future trails must include motorized usage. In April 2005, the RDCK Chair and members of the board were presented with a petition containing 251 signatures stating "We the undersigned do not accept that any portion of the old CPR rail Bed from Nakusp to Roseberry be closed to motorized use. If this is your only option, then we demand that section (Nakusp to Roseberry) be removed from your overall plane and be left as it."

In October 2007, the residents of Summit Lake were surveyed door to door and 100% of responding residents signed a petition stating, "We the residents of Summit Lake, want to

see all recreational use of public lands to be fully multi-use." This petition was presented to RDCK director Don Munroe for the board at an October 25, 2007 OCP meeting. Public meetings held in Nakusp about developing this section of the old CPR grade, showed over 90% opposed to closing any portion to motorized usage.

An article by s.22 shows not only that the motorized information submitted by Richard Allen, Hills Recreation Society (HRS) is false but that motorized use is responsible for keeping the former CPR rail grade open for all to enjoy. In the 7 years Richard Allen (HRS) has been submitting his minority agenda submissions, he reveals in his own words that motorized traffic has not caused any substantial harm: from 07 editions, "It is fair to say that most residents are content with the present use pattern of the Roseberry-Summit Lake Trail."

In a recent survey by the HRS with an 82% return rate, "The majority supports the continuation of a many-use/multi-use rail trail on the old CPR right of way in Hills." I also know this proposed trail will have to cross private land in more than one place for which no deal has been established to grant access. The RDCK and the various trail groups have been aware of this for years and keep trying to skirt the issue of private property rights.







"GARBAGE, PARKING, EXCESSIVE DEVELOPMENT, STRANGE PEOPLE ON TRACKS, WASHROOMS. WEED CONTROL – OF ALL NOXIOUS WEEDS" Adjacent property owner, 20 year resident

"I don't want to see the seclusion this Trail offers me currently ruined by Signage, other than a few directional signs on the Trail itself. I would like to see priority multi-use for locals - there is no need to attract people from elsewhere to use it (especially in groups)." Adjacent property owner, 2 year resident

"We inhabit a unique riparian zone. Our further meddling and intrusion on the zone is unnecessary and selfish and only serves to eliminate that on which we and the ecology depend." Property owner, 40 year resident

Responses from those favouring No Development (cont'd):

"Yes, I like it the way it is. I do not like grooming on the ski trail in the winter." Property owner, 38 year resident

"No comment as I prefer to ski ungroomed portions of the Trail. As for Noise — I can hear highway noise way in the bush berry-picking. And, I can hear logging noise from home." Property owner, 6 year resident

"All of the above! Unlike some people I didn't move to Hills to change things for my own personal gain. I moved here because I like it the way it is; open to all people who come here! It's clear that some one or group of people have gone above the heads of the residents of Hills! They have convinced the RDCK to apply to take control of the Rail Line. This person or group may be falsely claiming to represent the majority of Hills residents. Hills Rec. Society should not support any commercial or private development or Closing of any part of Rail Line to anyone, motorized or NOT! P.S. What happened to fire hall and fire truck?" *Property owner, 15 year resident*

Responses from those favouring Minimal Development:

"problems of garbage, noise, privacy, parking problems. We feel the current use is OK. But expansion of use or changes would impact very much on us. NO SIGNAGE. "Adjacent property owner, 30 year resident

"all of it" Adjacent property owner, 30 year resident

"This is a wildlife corridor. I do not want further disruption and displacement of wildlife which is inevitable with increased recreational and motorized use of Trail. It is obvious that overuse and misuse will diminish/destroy the irreplaceable values we currently enjoy. However, I think this is a waste of time! This is a futile process. It is always business as usual and this will become another playground for motorized vehicles, parking lots, signs etc. to accommodate them. The rejuvenating tranquil experiences of Nature are a thing of the past." Adjacent property owner, 24 year resident,

"No more traffic wanted. Property trespass has been an issue already. We don't want or need this Trail ruined by over-use by out-of-town people. This is a corridor which links several developed motorized riding zones. Again, there is <u>NO</u> motorized rec. trail respected or supported by the heavily biased Hills Rec." *Property owner*, 50 year resident

"Privacy loss and over use a major concern! How do you limit human presence which displaces wildlife? Protecting historical uses by long time Hills residents will be lost. Any management of the corridor should be with Hills Rec only. Keeping accountability and responsibility local. This trail should be cared for by locals not Galena Trail group." *Property owner, 35 year resident*

Responses from those favouring Minimal Development (cont'd):

"All of the above IF they become problems but most people have these same concerns and want to preserve and enjoy these trails." Property owner, 9 year resident

"There's already traffic issues as described above. We are currently experiencing noise and litter issues. ATV's (children and adults) are using it as a race course. Trucks and cars are travelling down the corridor and setting up camp. There are signs of increased littering along the roadway and beach access, due to vehicle/camper access. A non-motorized trail, and minimum development would accentuate pedestrian traffic and prevent some of the negative effects that we are currently experiencing." *Property owner*, 39 year resident

"I am concerned about all of the above. Definitely NO SIGNAGE." Property owner, 29 year resident

"Don't want more people. Don't want it more accessible." Renter, 4 year resident

"Maintain Trail for current use." Property owner, 10 year resident

"All of the above. No access for disabled (motorized). No access for emergency personnel (in case of medical emergency). More people for profit = more shitting/pissing in the bush, and less privacy for Locals. I do not want anyone telling me when or how to conduct my personal recreation for fee or otherwise. Definitely NO SIGNAGE!!!" Property owner, 50 year resident,

"The only change I would support is a bridge over the "big ditch" where the large culvert was removed." *Property owner, 41 year resident*

"Living at the end of the old Scinitar Sawmill site, many a time individuals; mostly motorized have ended up in the mill yard coming up from the Rail Trail and trespassing through the site with no regards that they are trespassing, even though the Site has been posted. This pisses me off, and being pissed-off is not good for my well-being." *Renter*, 25 year + resident

Responses from those favouring Moderate Development:

"My main concern is wildlife protection and avoidance of interference during their breeding scasons. I have found there is most wildlife habitat to the North of us. I have seen grizzly bears in May at Jane Clark's place, blue herons (endangered) mid-way to Summit Lake, moose etc. I think there should be a Spring ban on the use of the Rail Trail (April-June – ask Wayne McCrory?), as there is flooding as well. Signs could get people to exit to the highway at Bonanza Road and reenter at the north end of Summit Lake. If the motorized issue cannot be resolved, I think "local permits" from Nakusp to N. Summit Lake would be the compromise. Speed limits should be imposed with the awareness that "citizen reports" (as it would be hard to enforce/police) are valid. After 2 speeding infractions permits are revoked for life! Also, proper signage at the gravel pit would avoid lots of lost cyclists. Way to go HRS Board for putting out an updated HRS questionnaire and following up on it!" Adjacent landowner, 30 year resident

"We do not support just a Recreation Trail. Clean-up, tics, garbage from people, noise from groups of people walking ATV's, motorbikes, vehicles, campers, bicycle groups, people trespassing on private property, vandalism to private landowners land and equipment, outhouses, garbage in fire pits" (we already maintain from Girl Guides to Hunter Siding area with crawler equipment, excavator, crawler cat)." Adjacent property, 50 year resident

"We hope this section of Trail will be designated non-motorized. Such a designation would remedy our top concerns of: <u>Fish and Wildlife:</u> there's much scientific evidence showing motorized vehicles harass and displace wildlife. Bears, moose, and wolves, dippers and the Great Blue Heron - wary wildlife that typically feel threatened and avoid human-habited places. *Property owner, 4 year resident*

"Noise: an increased use of motorized vehicles on the trail would impact the quiet of the rail corridor for humans seeking to recreate in solitude and may harass and scare away wildlife." Property owner, 4 year resident

"Noise. Garbage." Property owner, 3 year resident,

"The people who use the trail need to behave responsibly and be considerately. More rules will not replace each user being responsible it's a wonderful trail for all recreational sports" *Property owner, 38 year resident*

"Privacy loss and over use a major concern! How do you limit human presence which displaces wildlife? Protecting historical uses by long time Hills residents will be lost. I think over development would incur too much use by non resident/area traffic. The corridor should be maintained and supported for community use in order to enable the broadest range of community use. Certainly **Do Not** want to see over use by bicycle groups/ski groups. Would like to see a motor-only section." *Property owner*, 15 year resident

"No! I love the trail for all our activities" Property owner 25 + year resident

"I don't want the trail being used for bike tours, there are too many already, but would love to be able to push a stroller on it. Really nice to take the kids out on sled rides in the winter." Renter, 4 year resident

"There would be many problems if developed for motorized recreation ie noise, safety, (motorized and non-motorized do not mix) wildlife movement would be affected, impacts on landscape from over use, privacy on the beach. South Valley has non-motorized rail trail-So should we. One of the few quiet places left in the area where there is a trail. Many places where motorized vehicles can go other than a quiet remote trail!" *Property owner*, 30 year resident

"Bonanza Creek and Marsh are extremely important wildlife areas. Wildlife should have first priority. Any development /maintenance must accommodate wildlife." *Property owner, 40 year resident*

"I want motorized vehicles to be careful and respectful of non-motorized vehicles, I would like to be able travel from Rosebery and Summit Lake without running into mud puddles or washed out areas, I would also like to be able cross country ski all the way to Summit Lake Also the chasm just north of the gravel pit is difficult to ski. Is there any way to put in a culvert and fill it in or a bridge? Biking is also very difficult." *Property owner, 28 year resident*

"My main concern/observation centers around the quality of the discourse around this issue. Ideally Hills residents and especially Hills Rec board members would foster respectful communication and tolerance for differing points of views, vision, and values." *Property owner, 17 year resident*

"Yes all the issues above are valid and seemingly problematic." Property owner, 30+ year resident

"#1 Safety Speed postings, driving on right hand side of the road. Signage." Renter, 2 year resident

"Motorized use needs to be prohibited. Hills Rec Society needs to acquire Girl Guide camp as part of the package. Proposed regional park surrounding rails corridor needs to be designed to protect viewscapes, lakeshore etc. Grizzly hazard in the spring and sensitive to human impact. Need to acquire Bonanza Marsh for protection and nature appreciation, not development. Needs to be managed to minimize disturbances to wintering ungulates. The most ecologically important and most fragile piece of land in Hills is Bonanza Marsh/Creek. This should be protected status of some sort." *Property owner, 25 year resident*

"All of the above. Proper management is a must with regular monitoring and upkeep." *Property owner, 5 year resident*

"Noise and privacy – should be relatively low impact." Property owner, 33 year resident

"Yes. Overuse. Garbage. Fish and wildlife; especially with peoples' dogs. Dogs on leash. As is – concerns re. dogs on the loose not properly controlled. Dogs loose where people are camping along the Trail – coming out as walking by." *Property owner, 11 year resident*

Responses from those favouring Moderate Development Comments (cont'd):

"Most people that use this form of recreation are responsible people. You cannot close the Corridor for a few irresponsible people. That is like closing the highway because of a few Speeders. Keep things simple." *Property owner, 35 year resident*

"The trail is great fun to use but it is rapidly being overgrown. This makes the Trail use undesirable when conditions are wet because one becomes soaked. The railroad grade is a wonderful asset that NO ONE would recreate simply for recreational use. We definitely should restore its potential while it is retrievable." *Property owner, 35 year resident*

Concerning motorized use; I know no one who would choose to hike, bike, jog or ski among noisy, dust-raising, exhaust-generating motorized vehicles even though the motorized users seem to have little trouble with the more quiet types. Clearly, the aesthetics of these two general types of users are different and generally incompatible." *Property owner, 35 year resident*

"all of the above are definite concerns. Please help keep it quiet, clean and safe from human disturbances other than simple maintenance. We really all have enough options elsewhere. This Trail does not need major exposure." *Property owner, 28 year resident*

"I would be concerned about overuse and the impact it would have on the environment." Renter, 2 year resident

"Non-motorized and motorized use do NOT work together." Property owner, 18 year resident

"Concern for garbage, parking, noise. It is a great and beautiful Corridor and we should encourage it's use for non-invasive recreation. It would encourage Tourists. Business needs these tourists." Property owner, 10 year resident

"Noise. Garbage." Property owner, 17 year resident

"Depends on the type of recreational activity. Do not want to see x-country ski trail developed and become a popular tourist attraction in the Winter. Outside of maintaining creek crossing and brush, I do not want to see any development or commercial use. I prefer, the Ski Trail not be groomed" *Property owner*, 18 year resident

Responses from those favouring High Development:

"No concerns, I favour development of the rail trail for non-motorized recreation." Property owner, 30 year resident

"Noise and safety on Trail to nearby landowners. We live off HWY 6 and Reiben Rd. and hear motor use on Trail. Fish and wildlife as it is — is a sensitive area. Grizzlies are commonly sighted in the wet area above Hunter Siding in the Spring (April/May)." *Property owner*, 10 year resident

This old rail bed has been an issue for at least 10 years now and the local people will not accept this tenure application, as there are too many different ideas about what should be done with the rail bed. The application is very unspecific about what will happen, other than it would become a park, which means no motorized use of the trail, which us unacceptable to us. This would exclude older, disabled and even paralyzed people who can ride an ATV, but are unable to walk or hike longer distances. As well, we are having more and more of our back roads taken away from us. like Enterprise Creek where the creek has actually been diverted down the main road for 100 feet and the road is now closed. I hear that in the summer of 2010, the bridge up Silverton creek will be removed as well. This is unfortunately another act by a small group to control more land locally. As discussed in our-phone conversation this afternoon, following is the resolution regarding the former CPR corridor between Rosebery and Summit Lake that was passed unanimously by the directors of the Hills Recreation Society and endorsed the by membership at our recent AGM:

"Given

- the nearly 10 years of community discussions and agreement that the Rosebery to Summit Lake section of the former CPR rail corridor should be maintained as a public recreational trail,
- the increasing risk of fragmentation of the corridor due to use by private landowners and pressures for further land development, and
- · the continuing deterioration of the rail-trail,

the Hills Recreation Society requests that the RDCK assume jurisdiction of the corridor immediately (as per Resolution 344/01 of the RDCK board). The HRS also requests that (as per RDCK Resolutions 345/01 and 346/01) the RDCK continue to work closely with stakeholders to finalize the details of a management plan for the rail-trail and to complete a biological feasibility study to assess the impacts of recreational use and make recommendations on how to limit damage from such use."

As I mentioned on the phone, Don, the committee of stakeholders that has been working on a management plan for the trail has been inactive since last fall but has come a long way toward agreeing on the details of a plan for the rail trail. A team of biologists, endorsed by the committee, has begun an impact assessment on a volunteer basis, but this has yet to be completed. As expressed in the resolution above, we feel some urgency that the corridor be secured as a public recreational trail as soon as possible while it is still intact and available. We are confident that following this, the management details can be readily worked out.

I am writing to express our **enthusiastic support** for the above-noted application. We have long hoped for the Regional District to take over this section of trail and manage it as a park.

I live in the community of Hills and regularly use what we call the "rail-trail" or "tracks" along Slocan Lake and in the direction of Summit Lake, for walking, bicycling, nature appreciation, bird-watching and, in winter, cross-country skiing. The trail is a real treasure for all of us in this community; it is very well used and loved. We welcome others to use it as well, so long as they do so respectfully.

The Regional District taking over this trail and managing it as a Regional Park Trail is a very appropriate development and one we wholeheartedly support. With that in mind, we would like to put on the record that we wish to see the trail designated for **non-motorized use** only.

Motorized vehicles such as ATVs, dirt bikes, motorcycles, and in winter, snowmobiles, create an unacceptable disturbance to people and wildlife along this sensitive and narrow corridor.

In spring, grizzly bears and other wildlife highly sensifive to human disturbance frequent this corridor. Year-round, the rail-trail is a corridor for elk, moose, bears, deer, and large cats such as cougar and bobcat. When the trail becomes a Regional Park, it will be important that we

humans <u>share</u> this trail with our animal relations, not drive them from it with noisy, frightening, polluting machines.

For human users of the trail, the oily fumes from a snowmobile linger long after the vehicle has passed, leaving those of us trying to recreate in a healthy manner gagging. In summer, our peaceful picnics and swims are often shattered by the piercing whine of dirt bikes racing along the lakeshore section of this trail.

It is unacceptable that the shallow pleasure of a few (those on motorized vehicles) be allowed to ruin the natural experience of the many (the people who are peacefully enjoying the area and coexisting with its natural values).

There have been heated letters to the local newspapers on this matter and we are sure you are being bombarded with letters. Frankly, some of those published letters have been misleading regarding the Official Community Plan our area completed and about the results of a survey conducted by the Hills Recreation Society. We urge you to check the facts directly and not be influenced by those misleading representations.

Whether the trail is rated for motorized or non-motorized use should not be decided by a straw pole of residents or because of the pressure tactics of the ATV/snowmobile lobby. The decision should be made based on sound principles of good management. I would like to voice my support for the application of the Regional District of Central Kootenay to secure the historic CPR corridor between Rosebery and Summit Lake as a regional park trail. This application follows two lengthy rounds of public consultation during the past 10 years, and, I believe, has broad public support.

The railbed was built from Nakusp to Sandon in the 1890s with the last tracks pulled up in the 1980s when rail traffic dwindled. The RDCK already holds a license of occupation for the Sandon to Rosebery section and has been successfully managing it for many years now as the Galena Trail, a regional park trail for self-propelled recreation. This new section would connect directly to the Galena Trail in Rosebery. I believe the RDCK has the experience, assets, and local orientation needed to manage the Rosebery to Summit Lake section as well.

The rail corridor hugs the Slocan Lake shoreline from Rosebery to Hills, passes above Bonanza Marsh and wetlands, and then follows Bonanza Creek to Summit Lake. The lake section passes by several small, seeluded beaches and the Bonanza Marsh with great views of the Valhallas along the way. The creek section runs along the most important Kokance spawning habitat in the Slocan Lake system, is strewn with historic railway artefacts, and features terrific mountain and creek scenery. It also provides habitat for many mammals and birds including elk and moose, grizzly and black bears, cougar and lynx, mule and white-tailed deer, beavers, bald eagles, great blue herons, great-horned owls, pileated woodpeckers, and dippers within the creek itself.

The RDCK board passed two resolutions in 2001 (RDCK Resolutions #346/01 and 345/01) following the first round of public consultations that should contribute to good management decisions and that should be acted upon if their application is successful. The first calls for an impact assessment of human recreational usage on plants, fish, and other animals, with recommendations on how to limit damage. The second calls for working closely with stakeholders on issues associated with multi-use. I personally favour management of the trail for protection of wild-life and other natural values and for self-propelled, non-motorized recreation.

The Rosebery-Summit Lake rail trail is already widely used by locals with the vast majority of this use being self-propelled recreation. Experience with other trails shows they can become very popular once established and publicized. Consequently, it's critically important that management options consider the inevitable added impacts of increased use in order to protect the extra-ordinary natural habitat and the peace, quiet and seclusion highly valued by present users of the rail corridor, RDCK Area H director Walter Popoff has committed to seeking community input regarding these decisions.

The first step, though, is securing the rail corridor as a public asset. Currently it is deteriorating rapidly with beaver and other natural activity, and it is at risk of becoming fragmented under pressure for land development and use by current adjacent property owners. Therefore, I add my support to the application noted above.

During the OCP for Siocan Lake North, it was quite clear from the surveys and community meetings there is a strong desire to keep access for motorized recreation open on all present trails and any future trails must include motorized usage. In April 2005, the RDCK Chair and members of the board were presented with a petition containing 251 signatures stating "We the undersigned do not accept that any portion of the old CPR rail Bed from Nakusp to Roseberry be closed to motorized use. If this is your only option, then we demand that section (Nakusp to Roseberry) be removed from your overall plan and be left as it."

In October 2007, the residents of Summit Lake were surveyed door to door and 100% of responding residents signed a petition stating, "We the residents of Summit Lake, want to see all recreational use of public lands to be fully multi-use." This petition was presented to RDCK director Don Munroe for the board at an October 25, 2007 OCP meeting.

Public meetings held in Nakusp about developing this section of the old CPR grade, showed over 90% opposed to closing any portion to motorized usage.







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Hills Recreation Society Community Recreation Survey Results 2009

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Introduction

The purpose of the Hills Community Recreation Survey, conducted in September/October, 2009, was to provide the Hills Recreation Society (HRS) with current information.

The Survey was composed of four sections:

- 1. Demographic information (Who are we as a community?)
- 2. Our Recreation (What does it look like?)
- 3. Future recreation programming (Ideas/suggestions for future initiatives)
- 4. Rail Trail (Current uses and feedback regarding future development of the abandoned CPR rail line between Rosebery and Summit Lake).

Ninety-five surveys were issued to the residents of Hills. Using the telephone book, Canada Post, door-to-door visitation, and referrals - a dedicated effort was made by members of the HRS board of directors to secure feedback from all Hills residents. Landowners, renters, part-time residents: all were polled. One survey per household was allowed. Surveys were not numbered in an effort to assure anonymity for respondents. In fact, many residents gave their comments with signatures. Seventy-eight surveys were returned for a response rate of 82%.

Tabulations of some of the Rail Trail results were separated into "Adjacent Landowners" and "All Other Households" with the intention of respecting the exposure that adjacent landowners experience to Rail Trail use.

A copy of the results of this Survey will be posted on the Community Bulletin Board and copies made available to all residents of Hills upon request. The Regional District of Central Kootenay, other interested parties, and the general public will be notified of results. Completed questionnaires will be sealed as one document with the Secretary of the HRS.

The following pages present the questions as listed in the survey and indicate responses, comments, and suggestions as given. Landowner/renter status and years of residency have been included with comments as the HRS board feels this information may be pertinent to the interpretation of the results. Where practical, results have been converted to percentages.

The Community Recreation Survey was conducted by and this report was prepared by the Hills Recreation Society board of directors.

Summary

- 1. 95 surveys were distributed to residents of Hills including landowners, renters, and part-time residents, one survey per household. 78 surveys were returned for a response rate of 82%.
- 2. Based on responding households, 51% have lived in Hills over 20 years, 51% are two-person households, and 47% of residents are over 55 years of age.
- 3. Hills residents are an active bunch. Recreational participation reflects an active year-round lifestyle. Top 10 activities are: gardening (64 responses), hiking (58), walking/jogging (57), wildlife viewing (55), swimming (53), cross-country skiing (49), canoeing/kayaking (49), camping (46), photography (45) and bicycling (42).
- 4. There appears to be sufficient interest to develop a variety of recreational programs. Most popular responses were: organized hikes (25), tennis lessons (19), summer programs for children (16), cross-country ski lessons (14) and swimming lessons (10).
- 5. Over 90% of responding households currently use the Rail Trail in spring/summer/fall, and over 70% use it in winter. Summer activities include: walking (36 responses), cycling (38), ATV'ing (20), hiking (12), motor/dirt-biking (10), jogging/running (10), trail access corridor (6). Winter activities include: cross-country/trail skiing (40), sledding/snowmobiling (15), snowshoeing (9), walking (4), photography (2), ATV'ing (2) and wildlife viewing (1).
- 6. 13 respondents indicated that they live adjacent to the Rail Trail while 65 respondents do not live adjacent to the Rail Trail.
- 7. The Survey indicated that of the 78 respondents, 23% support the use of the Rail Trail for motorized recreation, 35% support the use of the Rail Trail for motorized recreation With Conditions, and 41% do not support the use of the Rail Trail for motorized recreation.
- 8. 74% of respondents do not support commercial use of the Rail Trail.
- 9. 52% of respondents favour moderate development of the Rail Trail (improve trail surfaces and creek crossings, clear brush, post signs), 31% favour minimal development (maintain trail pretty much as it is), 10% favour no further development of the trail, and 4% favour high development (picnic and rest areas, interpretative sites, garbage cans, access gates).
- 10. Over 60% of respondents indicate that at least some of the potential issues/problems listed in Rail Trail Question #6 are of concern to them if the former rail corridor is developed as a recreation trail. These include: safety, signage, parking, garbage and litter, noise and privacy, fish and wildlife issues, types of use, and overuse. Many offer suggestions. Residents living adjacent to the rail corridor appear to have similar concerns as other residents.







Responses from those favouring No Development:

"GARBAGE, PARKING, EXCESSIVE DEVELOPMENT, STRANGE PEOPLE ON TRACKS, WASHROOMS. WEED CONTROL – OF ALL NOXIOUS WEEDS" Adjacent property owner, 20 year resident

"I don't want to see the seclusion this Trail offers me currently ruined by Signage, other than a few directional signs on the Trail itself. I would like to see priority multi-use for locals - there is no need to attract people from elsewhere to use it (especially in groups)." Adjacent property owner, 2 year resident

"We inhabit a unique riparian zone. Our further meddling and intrusion on the zone is unnecessary and selfish and only serves to eliminate that on which we and the ecology depend." Property owner, 40 year resident

Responses from those favouring No Development (cont'd):

"Yes, I like it the way it is. I do not like grooming on the ski trail in the winter." Property owner, 38 year resident

"No comment as I prefer to ski ungroomed portions of the Trail. As for Noise = I can hear highway noise way in the bush berry-picking. And, I can hear logging noise from home." Property owner, 6 year resident

"All of the above! Unlike some people I didn't move to Hills to change things for my own personal gain. I moved here because I like it the way it is; open to all people who come here! It's clear that some one or group of people have gone above the heads of the residents of Hills! They have convinced the RDCK to apply to take control of the Rail Line. This person or group may be falsely claiming to represent the majority of Hills residents. Hills Rec. Society should not support any commercial or private development or Closing of any part of Rail Line to anyone, motorized or NOT! P.S. What happened to fire hall and fire truck?" *Property owner, 15 year resident*

Responses from those favouring Minimal Development:

"problems of garbage, noise, privacy, parking problems. We feel the current use is OK. But expansion of use or changes would impact very much on us. NO SIGNAGE. "Adjacent property owner, 30 year resident

"all of it" Adjacent property owner, 30 year resident

"This is a wildlife corridor. I do not want further disruption and displacement of wildlife which is inevitable with increased recreational and motorized use of Trail. It is obvious that overuse and misuse will diminish/destroy the irreplaceable values we currently enjoy. However, I think this is a waste of time! This is a futile process. It is always business as usual and this will become another playground for motorized vehicles, parking lots, signs etc. to accommodate them. The rejuvenating tranquil experiences of Nature are a thing of the past." Adjacent property owner, 24 year resident,

"No more traffic wanted. Property trespass has been an issue already. We don't want or need this Trail ruined by over-use by out-of-town people. This is a corridor which links several developed motorized riding zones. Again, there is <u>NO</u> motorized rec. trail respected or supported by the heavily biased Hills Rec." *Property owner*, 50 year resident

"Privacy loss and over use a major concern! How do you limit human presence which displaces wildlife? Protecting historical uses by long time Hills residents will be lost. Any management of the corridor should be with Hills Rec only. Keeping accountability and responsibility local. This trail should be cared for by locals not Galena Trail group." *Property owner, 35 year resident*

Responses from those favouring Minimal Development (cont'd):

"All of the above IF they become problems but most people have these same concerns and want to preserve and enjoy these trails." *Property owner, 9 year resident*

"There's already traffic issues as described above. We are currently experiencing noise and litter issues. ATV's-(children and-adults) are using it as a race course. Trucks and cars are travelling down the corridor and setting up camp. There are signs of increased littering along the roadway and beach access, due to vehicle/camper access. A non-motorized trail, and minimum development would accentuate pedestrian traffic and prevent some of the negative effects that we are currently experiencing." *Property owner*, 39 year resident

"I am concerned about all of the above. Definitely NO SIGNAGE." Property owner, 29 year resident

"Don't want more people. Don't want it more accessible." Renter, 4 year resident

"Maintain Trail for current use." Property owner, 10 year resident

"All of the above. No access for disabled (motorized). No access for emergency personnel (in case of medical emergency). More people for profit = more shitting/pissing in the bush, and less privacy for Locals. I do not want anyone telling me when or how to conduct my personal recreation for fee or otherwise. Definitely NO SIGNAGE!!!" Property owner, 50 year resident,

"The only change I would support is a bridge over the "big ditch" where the large culvert was removed." *Property owner, 41 year resident*

"Living at the end of the old Scinitar Sawmill site, many a time individuals; mostly motorized have ended up in the mill yard coming up from the Rail Trail and trespassing through the site with no regards that they are trespassing, even though the Site has been posted. This pisses me off, and being pissed-off is not good for my well-being." *Renter*, 25 year + resident

Responses from those favouring Moderate Development:

"My main concern is wildlife protection and avoidance of interference during their breeding seasons. I have found there is most wildlife habitat to the North of us. I have seen grizzly bears in May at Jane Clark's place, blue herons (endangered) mid-way to Summit Lake, moose etc. I think there should be a Spring ban on the use of the Rail Trail (April-June – ask Wayne McCrory?), as there is flooding as well. Signs could get people to exit to the highway at Bonanza Road and reenter at the north end-of-Summit Lake. If the motorized issue cannot be resolved, I think "local permits" from Nakusp to N. Summit Lake would be the compromise. Speed limits should be imposed with the awareness that "citizen reports" (as it would be hard to enforce/police) are valid. After 2 speeding infractions permits are revoked for life! Also, proper signage at the gravel pit would avoid lots of lost cyclists. Way to go HRS Board for putting out an updated HRS questionnaire and following up on it!" Adjacent landowner, 30 year resident

"We do not support just a Recreation Trail. Clean-up, ties, garbage from people, noise from groups of people walking ATV's, motorbikes, vehicles, campers, bicycle groups, people trespassing on private property, vandalism to private landowners land and equipment, outhouses, garbage in fire pits" (we already maintain from Girl Guides to Hunter Siding area with crawler equipment, excavator, crawler cat)." Adjacent property, 50 year resident

"We hope this section of Trail will be designated non-motorized. Such a designation would remedy our top concerns of: <u>Fish and Wildlife:</u> there's much scientific evidence showing motorized vehicles harass and displace wildlife. Bears, moose, and wolves, dippers and the Great Blue Heron - wary wildlife that typically feel threatened and avoid human-habited places. *Property owner, 4 year resident*

"Noise: an increased use of motorized vehicles on the trail would impact the quiet of the rail corridor for humans seeking to recreate in solitude and may harass and scare away wildlife." Property owner, 4 year resident

"Noise. Garbage." Property owner, 3 year resident,

"The people who use the trail need to behave responsibly and be considerately. More rules will not replace each user being responsible it's a wonderful trail for all recreational sports". *Property owner, 38 year resident*

"Privacy loss and over use a major concern! How do you limit human presence which displaces wildlife? Protecting historical uses by long time Hills residents will be lost. I think over development would incur too much use by non resident/area traffic. The corridor should be maintained and supported for community use in order to enable the broadest range of community use. Certainly **Do Not** want to see over use by bicycle groups/ski groups. Would like to see a motor-only section." *Property owner, 15 year resident*

"No! I love the trail for all our activities" Property owner 25 + year resident

"I don't want the trail being used for bike tours, there are too many already, but would love to be able to push a stroller on it. Really nice to take the kids out on sled rides in the winter." Renter,

4 year resident

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Responses from those favouring Moderate Development Comments (cont'd)

"There would be many problems if developed for motorized recreation ie noise, safety, (motorized and non-motorized do not mix) wildlife movement would be affected, impacts on landscape from over use, privacy on the beach. South Valley has non-motorized rail trail-So should we. One of the few quiet places left in the area where there is a trail. Many places where motorized vehicles can go other than a quiet remote trail!" *Property owner*, 30 year resident

"Bonanza Creek and Marsh are extremely important wildlife areas. Wildlife should have first priority. Any development /maintenance must accommodate wildlife." *Property owner, 40 year resident*

"I want motorized vehicles to be careful and respectful of non-motorized vehicles. I would like to be able travel from Rosebery and Summit Lake without running into mud puddles or washed out areas. I would also like to be able cross country ski all the way to Summit Lake Also the chasm just north of the gravel pit is difficult to ski. Is there any way to put in a culvert and fill it in or a bridge? Biking is also very difficult." *Property owner, 28 year resident*

"My main concern/observation centers around the quality of the discourse around this issue. Ideally Hills residents and especially Hills Rec board members would foster respectful communication and tolerance for differing points of views, vision, and values." *Property owner, 17 year resident*

"Yes all the issues above are valid and seemingly problematic." Property owner, 30+ year resident

"#1 Safety Speed postings, driving on right hand side of the road. Signage." Renter, 2 year resident

"Motorized use needs to be prohibited. Hills Rec Society needs to acquire Girl Guide camp as part of the package. Proposed regional park surrounding rails corridor needs to be designed to protect viewscapes, lakeshore etc. Grizzly hazard in the spring and sensitive to human impact. Need to acquire Bonanza Marsh for protection and nature appreciation, not development. Needs to be managed to minimize disturbances to wintering ungulates. The most ecologically important and most fragile piece of land in Hills is Bonanza Marsh/Creek. This should be protected status of some sort." *Property owner, 25 year resident*

"All of the above. Proper management is a must with regular monitoring and upkeep." *Property owner, 5 year resident*

"Noise and privacy - should be relatively low impact." Property owner, 33 year resident

"Yes. Overuse. Garbage. Fish and wildlife; especially with peoples' dogs. Dogs on leash. As is — concerns re. dogs on the loose not properly controlled. Dogs loose where people are camping along the Trail — coming out as walking by." *Property owner, 11 year resident*

Responses from those favouring Moderate Development Comments (cont'd):

"Most people that use this form of recreation are responsible people. You cannot close the Corridor for a few irresponsible people. That is like closing the highway because of a few Speeders. Keep things simple." *Property owner, 35 year resident*

"The trail is great fun to use but it is rapidly being overgrown. This makes the Trail use undesirable when conditions are wet because one becomes soaked. The railroad grade is a wonderful asset that NO ONE would recreate simply for recreational use. We definitely should restore its potential while it is retrievable." *Property owner, 35 year resident*

Concerning motorized use; I know no one who would choose to hike, bike, jog or ski among noisy, dust-raising, exhaust-generating motorized vehicles even though the motorized users seem to have little trouble with the more quiet types. Clearly, the aesthetics of these two general types of users are different and generally incompatible." *Property owner, 35 year resident*

"all of the above are definite concerns. Please help keep it quiet, clean and safe from human disturbances other than simple maintenance. We really all have enough options elsewhere. This Trail does not need major exposure." *Property owner, 28 year resident*

"I would be concerned about overuse and the impact it would have on the environment." Renter, 2 year resident

"Non-motorized and motorized use do NOT work together." Property owner, 18 year resident

"Concern for garbage, parking, noise. It is a great and beautiful Corridor and we should encourage it's use for non-invasive recreation. It would encourage Tourists. Business needs these tourists." Property owner, 10 year resident

"Noise. Garbage." Property owner, 17 year resident

"Depends on the type of recreational activity. Do not want to see x-country ski trail developed and become a popular tourist attraction in the Winter. Outside of maintaining creek crossing and brush, I do not want to see any development or commercial use. I prefer, the Ski Trail not be groomed" *Property owner*, 18 year resident

Responses from those favouring High Development:

"No concerns, I favour development of the rail trail for non-motorized recreation." *Property* owner, 30 year resident

"Noise and safety on Trail to nearby landowners. We live off HWY 6 and Reiben Rd. and hear motor use on Trail. Fish and wildlife as it is – is a sensitive area. Grizzlies are commonly sighted in the wet area above Hunter Siding in the Spring (April/May)." *Property owner, 10 year resident*

BACKGROUND

In 1992 a Study was commissioned by the Ministry of Environment, Land and Parks and the Slocan Valley Economic Development Commission on a land use study on the abandoned railway between Rosebery and Three Forks.

This study was originally based on the Railway corridor from Nakusp to Rosebery and from Rosebery to Three Forks. Since the acquisition of Railway corridor from Nakusp to Rosebery was still being reviewed by the Province, the original corridor study was deferred and Rosebery to Three Forks was only included in the study.

In 1993 a License of Occupation was granted to the Regional District for the Rosebery to Three Forks Regional Trail (File #4401707 - License #342006).

The Regional District has been requested by the Hills Recreation Society to obtain tenure on the Railway Corridor from Rosebery to Summit Lake as a logical extention to the existing trail.

A submission prepared by the Hills Recreation Society and the Hills Nordic Ski Club dated December 1, 2000 is attached for your reference.

Hats off to Gianni Depretto in his comprehensive presentation of the information provided by the Hills Recreation Society Community Survey, last issue. Bd. member Depretto presents facts clearly and accurately. His intention is to present results of this Survey; the thoughts, preferences and voices of our community in Hills.

On the other hand, other submissions over the past two weeks scramble numbers, use creative journalism and misquote the Survey (the actual wording and intents); masking the results of the Survey response. I would know this since I was hands-on in gathering and compiling the hard data.

In the last two issues of the Valley Voice, two letters state "a vast majority" of Hills residents support non-motorized use of this Trail. This conclusion is erroneous. Nor is the majority "vast". In fact - 59% of Hills residents indicated support for multi/many use of the Rail Trail (YES). 41% stated they want it to be non-motorized (NO).

On the questionnaire Hills residents were asked to offer comments/suggestions to their Yes, Yes with Conditions, or No response in an effort to solicit community input as to the future use of the Rail Trail. With a sleight of hand, the two previous letters present the total Yes response down to 23%. This was accomplished by subtracting those who offered suggestions/conditions to their "YES" (35%). I was one of those respondents who answered YES with Conditions. It astounds me that because I offered some suggestions, my "YES, with Conditions" vote is lost. When in fact, I had thought a YES vote offering my ideas was a stronger YES vote. Throughout the questionnaire respondents were asked for their Comments on almost every question. Why would a person think this tone would be any different on the Rail Trail motorized use issue?

As to the claim "only a very few of the 78 households in the Hills survey voiced opposition to the Regional District's application to make the Rail Trail into a Regional Park" This question is not even on the Survey. — is an alternate agenda not again clearly flouted?

The Hills Recreation Society's membership represents only 21% of people who live here. Compare this to the 82% response rate to this questionnaire - clearly the Survey RESULTS carry our community's Truth. In conducting a Community Survey, the Hills Recreation Society did good work in re-visiting who we are as a community. All Board members share a serious responsibility to accept and communicate what the results reveal accurately whether we personally agree with them or not.

I have recently resigned my position as Vice-President on the Hills Recreation Society Board since my good health is not conducive to the nonsense as outlined above. 

We write to express our disappointment in the response sent by Regional District of North Okanagan on August 3, 2011 to invoice #2 for referral processing. The indication is that payment will not be received and we must therefore put you on notice that we do not consent, agree or otherwise approve of the activity / development referred to by you in your letter to us dated Thursday, June 30, 2011.

Our People have un-extinguished aboriginal title to the land and resources within our traditional territory. The above-noted activity / development is within our traditional territory and as such, is subject to our title, jurisdiction, rights and interests.

In 1997, the Supreme Court of Canada in the <u>Delgamuukw</u> case clarified the law respecting the rights of aboriginal people in British Columbia, which includes our People. The Supreme Court ruling included the following legal principles:

- Aboriginal title is not extinguished and the Province cannot and never could extinguish aboriginal title or rights.
- Aboriginal title is protected by section 35 of the Constitution Act, 1982.
- Aboriginal title is a property interest.
- Governments must justify any infringements of aboriginal title.
- Lands held pursuant to aboriginal title have an inescapable economic component.

Other recent court cases involving the Taku River Tlingit First Nation and the Haida Nation have heightened the accountability of British Columbia to consult with First Nations with respect to third party development activities on alleged Crown lands. The Court found that the Province of B.C. has a legal fiduciary obligation to deal with First Nations' concerns about their traditional lands and resources and that it is not necessary for B.C. First Nations to first prove the existence of our rights,

We believe that the provincial government's consultation framework, land use referral policy and administrative system are inadequate to deal with our interests in the land and resources within our traditional territory or to meet the fiduciary obligations of British Columbia.

At this time there has been no reconciliation of our interests with those of the Province of British Columbia or Canada and no process in place to adequately recognize and negotiate co-existence or accommodation of these interests. Until such a process is in place we cannot agree with your contemplated development / activity.

We acknowledge receipt of correspondence dated Wednesday, December 16, 2009 with respect to the above noted application. The lands or resources described in the letter fall within the territory of the Okanagan Peoples of which Westbank First Nation ("Westbank") is a part. Westbank has aboriginal title and rights throughout this territory. Westbank as the successor of the original Okanagan Peoples in the area identified in the map attached to this letter as such is the proper holder of title in that area. Grants of rights over lands and resources within the identified territory or renewals of existing usages have significant impact on the aboriginal rights including aboriginal title of Westbank and Westbank Members. The Supreme Court of Canada has affirmed the existence of aboriginal title in British Columbia which encompasses the right to exclusive use and occupation of the land and the right to determine the use to which the land is put.

The Supreme Court of Canada has also confirmed that the Crown has a duty to consult with First Nations and accommodate their interests when considering proposed alienations or use of lands that are subject to aboriginal rights including title even before those rights have been proven in court. This duty is part of the process of fair dealing and reconciliation between aboriginal peoples and the Crown identified by the highest court. The BC Supreme Court in the Tsilhqot'in case decision confirms both the strength and significance of aboriginal title and the duty to consult and accommodate with respect to aboriginal rights.

Westbank has always maintained and asserted to the Crown and third parties its aboriginal rights including aboriginal title over our lands. Filing of the Statement of Intent in 1993 with the BC Treaty Commission, participating in treaty negotiations, filing a Writ of Summons in the BC Supreme Court seeking a declaration of aboriginal title over these lands and other actions by Westbank reflect the continuing exercise and assertion of our aboriginal rights including aboriginal title. Through these actions, the Crown

and third parties have notice of a strong prima facle case of our aboriginal title. It is not acceptable, either morally or legally, to ignore our rights including aboriginal title. There must be meaningful consultation with Westbank and accommodation of Westbank's interests before the Crown deals with application for allenation or use of these lands.

In exercise of its rights and responsibilities in the area where your project is proposed Westbank First Nation has completed a review of the information provided to us. Based on this information we have no objection to the proposed project. I want to stress that we have reached this conclusion based on the information we have received and if that information is inaccurate or incomplete our consent to the project proceeding is void and a full review would have to be undertaken again based on accurate information. I also want to make it clear that our consent is limited to the project described both as to scope, time and other matters and Westbank First Nation retains the right and responsibility to be consulted and accommodated on any other activity or project that could impact our aboriginal rights and title.

This is a serious issue. Any person or body that acts without due regard for the aboriginal rights including aboriginal title of Westbank does so at their own risk and may be subject to legal challenges.

We trust you will take appropriate action to respect our rights, however, in absence of that we will pursue whatever means are necessary to protect our interests, rights, and title. I enthusiastically support the Regional District of the Central Kootenay taking responsibility and tenure of the former CPR railway easement from Rosebery to Summit Lake for the purpose of a linear park. As it is used and misused currently, some group or entity like the RDCK coming forward to set types and standards of use shall hopefully act to stabilize the future of the area adjacent the corridor which is also my home. A variety of local and tourist recreational uses are currently carried out on the corridor. Those involving wheeled vehicle traffic and wet conditions have degraded some sections along Slocan lake and also up along Bonanza creek to the point that they are impassable without wading. Beavers have also had their turn at reclaiming the corridor perhaps as they should, but they have not been responsible for the rutting and mud holes. Some of the alterations in the hydrologic cycle along the marshy areas caused by the railway might be mitigated with more culverts or by shallow fords being created. This could be a condition for tenure.

The other concern that should be a condition of tenure is for the RDCK to work with the local wildlife advocacy groups, timber tenure holders and BC Timber Sales to ensure the permeability and security of this corridor for transiting and resident bear, moose, elk, deer, wolverine, hopefully recovering mountain caribou, wolf, mountain lion and the numerous kokanee salmon that spawn in Bonanza creek. The flycatcher and the warbler are quite rare anywhere in southern BC. I was able to confirm breeding of the warbler this past spring. This is the most southerly breeding population of Magnolia Warbler in BC. The only other southern BC breeding sites are near Golden and in the Wells Grey Park region. Alder Flycatcher is normally found east of the Rockies and in the northern half of the province. Although I have not located a nest for this species, its annual presence in the area suggests that breeding is probable. The grosbeak and the oriole can be found in other parts of southern BC, but not in the immediate area.

For these reasons, I have some concern about motorized use, particularly between mid-May and mid-July. The area definitely supports some birds uncommon to the region, and I think some consideration should be given to ensuring that they are not in any way adversely affected by such development.

I am writing to you about the application -- #4404926 -- of the Hill Recreation Society, and its desire to close the old CPR rail bed from Rosebery to Nakusp to multi-use. I want to add my voice to the majority of people that want to continue all-access to this trail.

Residents of Slocan Valley North have been clear on this: we want multi-use access to this rail-bed - no one should be excluded, and no small (all of 20 members!) special-interest group should be allowed to dictate to the majority what it is allowed to do on a trail that has traditionally been open to all. Indeed, it is motorized use that has kept it clear and available this past decade.

A majority of Hills residents support multi-use, as shown in a recent survey by the Hills Recreation Society itself: "The majority supports the continuation of a many-use/multi-use rail trail on the old CPR right of way in Hills." Nakusp held its own public meetings about the development of the rail grade, and over 90% were to opposed to closing it to motorized use. 100% of Summit Lake residents want multi-use, and stated so in a survey of October 2007. Even the Official Community Plan of Area H North clearly states that rail development must include motorized use.

I would like to address issues surrounding the recent application ILMB file # 4404926 from RDCK to have the crown land rail trail corridor from Rosebery to Summit Lake turned into a park in conjunction with Hills Recreation Society recommendation and supporting documents sent to RDCK.

. It would appear from references by Richard Allin and Gary Wright that after two rounds of lengthy public process dating from 2000 to present, RDCK has taken the responses and concerns of multiple interest groups into consideration. In fact the public meetings resulted in an inability to move forward due to opposition within the community.

In response to the letter written by Richard Allin in the Jan 27 2010 issue of Valley Voice, I would like to clarify some of the facts pertaining to the recent Hills Rec Community Survey. It would appear that the majority of residents are opposed to a motorized / multi-use trail when in fact, of the 78 responding households (82% response to questionnaire) 45 are in favor of multi-use (58%), 32 are opposed (41%). In the survey the activities listed to choose from, 10 are non-motorized while there were 4 motorized activities, therefore the fact that residents partake in several activities listed in the survey, manipulates the perception of usage vs. users. Furthermore he indicates that there is only 23% supporting motorized use, and 35 % that support motorized use with conditions which adds up to 58% majority in favor of motorized access.

In regards to developing the trail corridor into a Regional Park that offers peace and seclusion, most of us have achieved that by residing in rural environments such as Hills, Summit Lake and Rosebery. There has already been an increase by non-resident users in the last few years, the idea that further development will help protect the wild life corridor, solitude and privacy of residents is rather ridiculous.

A reference was made to the current usage figures from the recently completed survey, also concluded in the survey is the information that 96% favors no development to moderate development of the trail le. trail surface maintenance/creek crossing and little signage. Only 4% of respondents favor the high level of development a park status would entail le picnic, rest areas interpretive sites, garbage cans and access gate, and a severe increase in traffic. Being as that the rail grade passes through agricultural land reserve and that many of the original homesteads exist and still have farms, livestock and gardens. Historically and presently we use sections of the rail grade to transfer livestock, move farm equipment and gather firewood. This does not fall into park usage. I am sure that many residents who completed a community survey issued by a recreation society would not have imagined their responses would have been used to favor park status of our corridor.

Richard appeals to emotional sentiment around environmental values and protection of privacy and solitude while seemingly promoting development and publicization of our rural corridor. In his letter he indicates that RDCK has the support of the community while in actuality there is little support for this type of development, how ever with out public input at this crucial time this park proposal will move forward.

We do not support this application of tenure for park status as there has clearly not been a public plan or proper input established by RDCK and we are not interested in a park and the issues it will bring

Alder Flycatcher is normally found east of the Rockies and in the northern half of the province. Although I have not located a nest for this species, its annual presence in the area suggests that breeding is probable. The grosbeak and the oriole can be found in other parts of southern BC, but not in the immediate area.

For these reasons, I have some concern about motorized use, particularly between mid-May and mid-July. The area definitely supports some birds uncommon to the region, and I think some consideration should be given to ensuring that they are not in any way adversely affected by such development.

This e-mail is to support the establishment of a Linear Park from Summit Lake to Rosebery, along the old CPR railway bed area. This is a fantastic riparian area, providing excellent habitat for animals, birds, waterfowl, insects, butterflies and aquatic life. The many common and unusual types of vegetation are lush and rich throughout this area.

I'm not sure if this application is limited to the area specifically from Highway 6 at Bonanza Creek, to Rosebery. If so, I think it would be great if the section from Highway 6 behind Summit Lake to Bonanza Creek could also be included. This is a continuation of the richly diverse habitat, along the once CPR railway bed.

People bike, hike, snow-shoe and cross-country ski through this area year round, all along Summit Lake, through to Hills, and on to Rosebery. Bird-watchers, photographers, wildlife lovers, and other naturalists have walked the trail along Bonanza Creek for many years. The peacefulness and quiet sanctity, enlivened by the sounds of nature, make this an exhilarating experience. There has been slight disruption to the flora and fauna of the area.

There has been limited motorized traffic, in terms of ATV's, snowmobiles and motorcycles. The current brush overgrowth along the trail may have served to limit accessibility, and keep motorized traffic to an infrequent and low level.

When this trail becomes maintained for use under park status, it will be difficult, if not impossible, to restrict motorized use to this level only. I expect that motorized use will grow to the extent serious harm will be done to this area, and to the trail.

I support the creation of a Park to protect this very important ecological area, from an environmental and recreational point of view.

If it were possible to ensure motorized use would be low, at slow speeds, sensitive to maintaining trail-bed quality, and low-noise to lessen impact on wildlife and non-motorized recreationists, I could support some motorized use. However, I can't see how this could be ensured unless single use, park trail motorized permits are issued. And if they were, permit issuing would be cumbersome, and enforcement would be very difficult. Without a system limiting number of motorized permits, with restrictions, I support non-motorized use only of this trail.

There are numerous reasons for securing this CPR corridor as a public asset. It not only has historic significance but it is also an important wildlife corridor providing habitat for both mammals and birds. It passes above Bonanza Marsh and wetlands which encompass an ecological treasure of plant and animal species. This is a marvelous, gently graded, very scenic trail which has been enjoyed for years by locals, mostly non-motorized.

Without regional park trail status, the area will be open to unwanted, uncontrolled development which will destroy the ecologically sensitive areas, displace wildlife and ruin the recreational opportunities which the public currently enjoys.

I am writing to give my full support for the RDCK's application for the historic old Rosebery to Nakusp railway bed to be used as a trail. Furthermore I urge that this trail be preserved for Non- Motorized use only. Motorized use is NOT compatible with hiking, cross-country skiing or horseback riding.

s.22 we have experienced the proliferation of motorized recreational use and the impact it has had on the lives of residents, wildlife, spawning streams and the landscape.

Logging, mining roads, or any other pubic access off of Highway 6, are highly used by groups with ATVs, and motorbikes. This use includes valley bottom hiking trails and beach areas that were once quiet walking and fishing areas for residents and tourists. An example is the beach area around the mouth of Bonanza Creek at the North end of Slocan Lake. As you may know, Bonanza Creek is a very important spawning creek for Kokanee Salmon, Rainbow Trout, Dolly Varden, White fish, and the endangered Bull Trout. It is very common now to witness ATVs or find their tracks crisscrossing repeatedly through the creek, across the beach and as far up into the marsh-wetlands as they can go.

The railway bed which runs just above this area and all along the East side of Slocan Lake starting in Rosebery, would greatly increase the access and use of ATVs if this corridor was opened to motorized use.

Wildlife including elk, moose, deer, and both black and grizzly bear use this old railway bed as a travel corridor which people who walk and ski along enjoy sighting.

Motorized recreation has already become a serious problem in the noise created by these machines, as well as the damage to the fragile landscape from the valley bottom to the Alpine meadows in the high country. ATVs, are rarely used as a form of transportation, but rather as powerful machines with which to speed up and down the steepest ridges or to cross the most challengingly difficult terrain for the thrill of the adrenalin hit. When winter snows come, the same becomes true with the snowmobiles.

The Slocan Lake, which once provided quiet beaches, with relatively few speedboats, is now being invaded with jet skis whose operators typically swarm the beaches where they have a captured audience for their show-off antics.

The result, is that we have very few places where residents can walk, hike or cpos 2012-00108 country ski in peace and quiet in the valley bottom close to our homes, or for the

populated areas. Those persons who want motorized access have many kilometers of backcountry roads they can and do use. People who want to walk, or cross-country ski in peace, quiet and safety from the invasion and noise of ATVs, snowmobiles and the like, do not.



We object to the application by the RDCK on behalf of the Hills Rec Society to establish a Regional Trail on the old railbed from Rosebery to Summit Lake.

In 2004 we applied for a commercial recreation tenure over this same railbed to conduct ATV tours. We voluntarily withdrew this section of trail from our application in order to allow public process to take place once we became aware from the RDCK that there were differing positions on use. We were asked to join a committee - The Nakusp to Kaslo Trail Committee (NKT) - to represent commercial interests. This committee met from 2005 to 2007 and altempted to reach consensus on trail usage. The committee had representation from various groups, including proponents of multi-use trails and those who represented non-motorized interests. The NKT eventually stalled because the non-motorized interests would not compromise on usage.

Our correspondence with the RDCK regarding our position and our interest in the trail is attached. The then Regional Director promised that our registered interest and commercial interests in general would be considered in any decision on future use on the trail from Rosebery to Nakusp. They have not lived up to their promises and are now representing only one group's interests in this application.

We are writing to register our interest in the development of the Rosebery to Nakusp railbed trail. We understand that the RDCK is considering input from a variety of sources regarding recreational uses for this trail.

In March 2004, we submitted an application to Lands & Water BC for a Commercial Recreation Tenure for ATV touring which included this trail. The RDCK was included in the Referral Response stage and Don Munro submitted a comment regarding potential future development of the trail (copy attached). In light of the RDCK's comment and not wishing to hold up our application, we withdrew this section of trail to allow public process to take place (see our attached letter to Don Munro). It is fully our intention to re-apply to include this trail in our commercial recreation tenure once the public process is concluded or if the process stalls.

One of the main reasons that public funding is invested by Tourism BC in trail development is to promote tourism in the areas affected. ATV tourists are a fast growing sector in the market today, partly due to an aging population which can no longer hike or bike long distances into the backcountry but still wishes to recreate in the backcountry. Utilizing ATVs as a mode of transportation is becoming very popular with this demographic group.

We understand that commercial interests will be represented in any decision regarding types of use on the old Rosebery to Nakusp railbed. As a stakeholder in the development of the trail, we would recommend the complete trail be designated multi-use and that no portion thereof be designated non-motorized.

Comments: The Regional District of Central Kootenay Electoral Area H Director Munro has expressed some concern about granting a 10 year license of occupation for that portion of the proposal involving ATV Tolus between Rosepery and Nakusp on the CPR Reliberatival. The concern is that the potential development of this portion of the CPR as a trail, portions of which may or may not be motorized. The motorized and non-motorized components are likely to result in some on-trait conflict. Assuming these lesues are adequately addressed, the RDCK has no objection to the application subject to complance with Rural Land Use Byahr 1248 where applicable.

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

We have seen an abundance of wildlife (deer, elk, moose, both black and grizzly bear, coyotes, otters and beavers). We regularly see eagles, blue heroin, ducks, geese as well as many varieties birds. In and around the logs and reeds are homes to spawning rainbow trout. As well as the fauna population the creek has an abundance of flora which includes yellow and pink lily pads, bull-rushes, reeds and grasses – necessary to a healthy marshland.

Over the years we have seen vehicles (ATV's, snowmobiles, motorbikes and even trucks with campers) driving the 'rails'. We have seen tents pitched on the old rail bed complete with campfires — even when the two local campsites have vacancies. About twelve years ago we witnessed a fire at the East end of Summit Lake which was caused by a young motorbike rider — the Forest Fire Hazard was Extreme.
