Kitimat Airshed Assessment

Ministry of Environment July 18 2014

1. What was the focus of the Kitimat airshed assessment?

- The Kitimat Airshed Assessment modelled nitrogen dioxide and sulphur dioxide emissions, and addresses concerns about cumulative effects in the airshed by taking into account both existing and proposed emissions.
- The facilities examined as part of the study were: the existing aluminum smelter, four proposed LNG terminals, a proposed oil refinery, and gas turbine powered electrical generation facilities (BC Hydro), as well as related marine transportation including predicted increases to marine shipping along Douglas Channel.
- The study has helped government determine what management strategies might be required to protect human health and the environment, including the use of technology to further lower emissions if needed.

2. Why did you wait until now to release the study results?

• We wanted to ensure the report went through a complete peer review and agencies across government were briefed on the study before release.

3. How many LNG facilities can safely fit within the airshed?

 There are currently four proposed LNG export facilities proposed for the Kitimat area which were included in the study. Based off of the study these can safely fit in the airshed. Further study is needed to determine how many other facilities could also be safely located in the airshed.

4. What are the four facilities?

- Kitimat LNG-Chevron
- LNG Canada-Shell
- Douglas Channel LNG
- Triton LNG

5. Was there any First Nations engagement with this study?

 Yes, Gitga'at and Haisla representatives were involved in study design and technical review of the report.

6. Are First Nations supportive of this study?

 We will be continuing to engage with First Nations, as well as other stakeholders such as local governments, over the coming weeks and months to ensure we are moving forward with everyone's input.

7. Who else was involved in the technical review?

 The technical review included the Ministry of Environment, Northern Health Authority, Ministry of Natural Gas Development, Health Canada, and Environment Canada. There were also specialist reviewers from the Province of Quebec, University of Helsinki, UBC, and a private consultant.

8. The lowest emissions scenario in the study uses electric drive power – is that being pursued?

- Proponents are not in a position to put all electric drive proposals forward. A key reason for this was related to the need for secure energy supply.
- LNG facilities can achieve emission levels that are close to those of electric drive.

9. What do you mean by a protective approach was used in the modeling?

- In scientific and impact modeling a conservative approach is one that uses worst case scenarios for the area of focus.
- For the Kitimat Airshed Study this meant using some of the worst weather conditions in terms of pollution forecasting (still days) and predicting maximum emissions and maximum health risks.

10. The study shows hourly sulphur dioxide emissions are predicted to exceed the air quality guidelines for all scenarios – why is this and can it be improved?

- This is partly related to Rio Tinto Alcan's smelter modernization project which will include a gradual increase in SO2 emissions from increased aluminum production beginning in 2016.
- While the increased production will result in higher sulphur dioxide emissions, overall, total emissions will be reduced by nearly 50 per cent. This includes significant reductions in fluoride, polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons, particulate matter, and greenhouse gases.
- Rio Tinto has also submitted an Environmental Effects Monitoring program plan for ministry review which includes how they will monitor human health, vegetation, and terrestrial and aquatic environments as well as criteria that would trigger emission reduction and/or other mitigation.
- In addition, the study used worst-case emission scenarios and exposure estimates which are unlikely to occur and SO2 ambient levels will be monitored in Kitimat.
- These peak hourly events are expected to be infrequent, and when a risk
 assessment was conducted on the 3 locations with the highest predicted hourly
 concentrations, the frequency of respiratory events for the most sensitive part of

the population was predicted to increase by less than 2% in the Service Centre location and by Less than 0.5% in the Kitimat and Kitimaat Village locations.

11. Will government undertake a similar study in Prince Rupert?

• The Province is analyzing the situation in Prince Rupert to determine whether a similar study is necessary.

12. Will PM 2.5 be an issue in Kitimat? Did the study look at PM 2.5?

PM2.5 was not a focus of the study. Given the historical decreases in emissions
with the closure of the pulp mill and the projected decreases with the KMP, the
slight increase from the LNG facilities will not cause PM2.5 to become an area of
concern in the future.

13. Was there an analysis of interactions between pollutants and their impacts?

- Interactions between SO2 and NO2 were considered when analyzing the potential impacts on lakes and soils.
- The impact of the individual compounds on vegetation was low enough that compounding analysis was not conducted
- When analysing potential impacts on human health, individual thresholds are developed for each pollutant source by organizations such as WHO and US EPA. These thresholds were used for the analysis. This is consistent with conventions elsewhere; jurisdictions look at and control individual components and thereby avoid or minimize interaction risk.

14. How do the assessment results for human health compare to other areas of BC?

- The highest predicted SO2 concentrations for all scenarios occurred in the Kitimat Industrial Service Centre and the town of Kitimat. Average concentrations in these two locations were less than those observed near industrial sources in Trail, Port Alice and Chetwynd across all scenarios, but above levels observed in most other communities of the province.
- For other locations in the study, predicted SO2 concentrations were lower than observed in the Industrial Service Centre and Kitimat.
- Predicted NO2 concentrations for all ten locations were below those levels observed in the most urbanized parts of Metro Vancouver, but above those levels observed in most other parts of BC. This is most likely due to the worst-case estimates of background NO2 levels used in the study.

15. What is the Province doing in terms of GHG policy?

 The Province is still developing their policy on GHG limits and will be releasing this information later this year.

16. How can NO2 and SO2 emissions affect human health and the environment?

- At elevated levels, NO2 can impact human health in the form of short term breathing impairment and other health effects.
- The evidence on SO2 effects is not as clear over longer averaging periods, but short term peaks can lead to a small increase in respiratory problems for those with existing conditions.
- Both SO2 and NO2 can directly affect vegetation and indirectly affect the environment through acidification of lakes and soils.

17. What are the current NO2 and SO2 air quality levels in Kitimat?

- Kitimat air quality is generally considered to be good, with short, infrequent periods of elevated SO2.
- In 2013, average SO2 concentrations ranged from 0.2 ppb in Haisla Village to 0.4 ppb near the city centre. (Note: This is equivalent to about 0.5-1.1 micrograms per cubic metre, the units used in the Kitimat Airshed Study)
- This compares with an annual average of 2.4 ppb in Prince George and 2.2 ppb in downtown Vancouver.
- NO2 is not currently monitored in Kitimat. The average concentration from a short-term monitoring study in Kitimat in September 2010 to November 2011 was 2.3 ppb. This compares with annual average NO2 concentrations of 10 ppb for Prince George and 18 ppb for downtown Vancouver in 2013
