TOPIC

Capital Plans for Tofino General Hospital (TGH) and the heliport

KEY FACTS

Issue

• The Regional District of Alberni-Clayoquot (the Regional District) wishes to discuss capital plans for the TGH and the helipad.

Status

- The TGH heliport is located west of TGH and straddles both the hospital site and TGH Foundation (the Foundation) property.
- The TGH helipad was closed by Transport Canada in 2011 due to flight path concerns.
- The Vancouver Island Health Authority (VIHA) currently transfers patients to a higher level of care via BC Ambulance through the Tofino airport which is located 15 kilometers away.
- The airport is considered an interim measure due to:
 - o the time it takes to prepare and transport the patient to the airport;
 - o the requirement that staff and/or physician travel with the patient to the airport; and
 - o rapid weather pattern changes that may occur in that time period.
- VIHA hired a consultant to identify potential helipad sites taking into consideration heliport dimensions, aviation criteria, medical considerations and maintenance considerations.
- The preferred helipad site was identified as the existing helipad location due proximity to the hospital, and the cost and complexity of alternatives locations. This is strongly supported by VIIIA and the TGH Local Medical Advisory Committee.
- The Foundation has indicated their intention to develop a residential care facility on the adjacent property. A restricted covenant was placed on the Foundation property to ensure the proposed facility would not impact the flight path of the helipad.
- VIIIA is reviewing the feasibility of constructing a new ground level helipad on the
 exiting helipad location given the proposed residential care facility adjacent to the
 property may not proceed in the short term.

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• VIHA has identified the existing TGH for a future redevelopment project however would require future planning to define the scope and cost of the future project. The proposed project has not been identified as a high priority at this time.

Next Steps

- VIHA is working with the District of Tofino to determine the willingness of neighbors to remove or top their trees which is required in order to proceed with redeveloping the helipad at its existing location.
- VIHA is also engaging the West Coast Health Committee and Foundation along with a
 consultant to develop the proposed scope and cost of the heliport project and impact on
 neighboring properties.
- Once the consultant's report is completed, the project will be prioritized alongside other capital projects as part of VIHA's 2016/17 capital prioritization process.
- The helipad project will most likely be classified as a Routine Capital Investment type project and would be subject to VIHA's internal prioritization process and availability of capital funding.
- Any redevelopment project would most likely be classified as a Priority Investment type project and would be subject to VIHA's and the Ministry's prioritization process and availability of capital funding.
- The Ministry has not identified a TGH redevelopment project as a high priority for capital funding and there is no funding allocation included within the Ministry's 10 year capital plan.

Background

- The TGH operates 10 medical inpatient beds, and offers a 24/7 emergency department, outpatient ambulatory care, medical imaging, laboratory and rehabilitation services.
- Originally built in 1954 with an addition constructed in 1966 and 1977, the two storey TGH footprint is approximately 1,700 square metres.
- Since 2001, VIHA has invested approximately \$1.8 million in TGH.

TOPIC

Transportation Assistance

KEY FACTS

Tofino General Hospital (TGH) Helipad / Bamfield Health Centre Helipad

- In 2009/10, Transport Canada ordered several health authorities to improve safety measures at several helipads in BC, including the helipad at TGH.
- The helipad at TGH was unable to meet the new minimum technical specifications to comply with Transport Canada's standard for heliports, and was subsequently closed.
- Transport Canada asked Vancouver Island Health Authority (VIHA) to expand the site to
 accommodate the new regulations, but expansion would have caused problems with the
 construction of Rainbow Gardens, a new 15-bed residential care facility to be constructed
 adjacent to TGH.
- Alternative sites were explored by VIHA, including a municipal site and a site on TGH Foundation property, but new sites could not meet new standards without impacting private property.
- VIHA and the BC Ambulance Service have made a temporary arrangement for helicopter landings at the Tofino Airport, but the airport is one hour away from the hospital which is not ideal.
- In 2014, VIHA attempted to use the Tofino Life Boat station located within a few minutes of the hospital as a medium-term option, but they were unable to secure stretcher access to the helipad through a neighbouring property.
- VIHA conducted a feasibility study to explore whether an elevated helipad could be constructed, but the operation would be very complex and costly.
- Currently, VIHA is reviewing the feasibility of constructing a new ground level helipad at the
 existing location. However, the key issues/requirements of this ground-level option are:
 removal/topping of adjacent property trees and land lease arrangement with the TGH
 Foundation.
- VIHA continues to work with local stakeholder to develop helipad options. Any selection option
 will require further planning before any project costs or timelines can be determined.

Rural Policy Paper & Transportation/Health Services Access in Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District

- The District is a geographically diverse region coving 6,904 square kilometres on the West Coast of Vancouver Island. The region has a population of roughly 31,500 people¹, and includes the communities of Port Alberni, Tofino, and Ucluelet.
- The regional communities are served by TGH, Bamfield Health Centre, and West Coast General Hospital. Patients requiring a higher level of care are typically transferred or diverted to Nanaimo Regional General Hospital, or to Victoria General Hospital.
- The Ministry of Health recognizes that individuals who reside in rural and remote areas of the
 province tend to have comparatively poorer health outcomes and socioeconomic status
 compared to their urban counterparts and work is continuing with health authorities and other

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stakeholders in developing short and long term strategies that result in measurable improvements in rural health outcomes.

- The Ministry acknowledges that access to transportation systems can impact peoples' physical and psychological well-being, and that the District has unique transportation needs and issues that will require clear pathways and realistic, integrated, and flexible local solutions for patients to access health services.
- The Ministry is developing a rural health strategy to ensure it is providing effective community
 services for patients in rural and remote communities, including First Nations communities, and
 timely access to high quality perinatal care and specialized geriatric services; home and
 community care residential services; and emergency services. Efficient patient-centred pathways
 to medical and surgical services for rural populations are also a key part of this strategy.
- The strategy will also look at the important role that local governments, residents, health authorities, including the First Nations Health Authority, and the Ministry play in helping recruit and retain doctors, pharmacists, midwives, and other health professionals in rural and remote communities.
- A part of the work to improve transportation issues is education around services that residents
 can access closer to home and from the community and how to reach these services, as opposed
 to accessing via a hospital visit; for example, home and community care programs, public health
 programs, Telehealth, and mental health programs.
- The District has a diverse mix of urban, rural, and remote communities, which results in a complex and challenging transportation system that impacts the health and economic development of individuals and communities. As such, the District is in need of a diverse mix of transportation solutions from multiple stakeholders.
- The Alberni-Clayoquot Health Network (ACHN) was established in April 2012 through a protocol
 agreement and a one-time \$500,000 grant from VIHA to the Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District
 (ACRD) to improve the health status of the Alberni-Clayoquot communities population, and to
 support local governments in community planning as it relates to the determinants of health.
- ACHN consists of a 17 member planning committee that acts as a mechanism for citizens that
 work and live in the area to speak as a collective voice on health issues and to share ideas and
 resources to build healthy and sustainable communities.
- One of ACHN's main priorities is affordable and accessible regional transportation.
- In 2013, ACHN reviewed a proposal from Pacific Western Transport to undertake a study to look at the issues involved with a regional transportation system, and make recommendations that will identify current and future transportation needs for the District.
- After the lead consultant left Pacific Western Transport, ACHN entered into a new contract with the Sociable Scientists to complete the baseline study regarding the current transportation realities throughout the ACRD. The consultation completed in April 2014.
- · According to the study, four overarching themes emerged:
 - 1. There is a lack of a coordinated approach in transportation networks, schedules, and options.
 - 2. Transportation is tied to mental and physical health and regional prosperity.
 - 3. Time is as much a factor as money when it comes to affordability. Many people in the region cannot travel to and from an appointment in one day.
 - 4. Stakeholders and community members are eager for solutions.
- The 11 recommendations that were brought forward in the report can be grouped into four main themes: encourage greater public engagement; improve coordination of services, investigate medical travel options, enhance transportation corridors.
- After reviewing the report, ACRD began to take action on the recommendations in the study by holding a Dialogue to Action workshop on June 11, 2015, with facilitation and support through

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Plan H, BC Healthy Communities. The workshop aimed to develop a strategy to move forward on the recommendations by working with elected officials, health authority representatives, and participants from First Nations communities and the transportation sector.

- Insights from the workshop have not yet been finalized, but will appear on the ARCD website when complete.
- VIHA is aware of these issues and has been in attendance at many of the ACHN meetings to offer insight and assist with recommendations as they come forward.
- In response to a suggestion from the mayor and councillors of the District of Ucluelet in 2014 to
 create a health network subset at the convention of the Union of BC Municipalities, the Minister
 encouraged the west coast communities of Ucluelet and Tofino to make a request to VIHA to
 enter into discussions regarding the development of a network. His letter to Mayor Bill Irving
 directs him to reach out to VIHA for assistance with the creation of a health network subset, as
 well as the TGH helipad issue.

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Tofino Tragedy

Date: Monday, October 26, 2015. Updated Oct. 27

Media Event: Five dead, one missing, after whaling boat capsizes off the shores of Tofino.

Confidential Background:

- MV Leviathan II, Jamie's Whaling Station and Adventure in Tofino, sends out mayday at 4 p.m. on Sunday, October 25.
- When the call came into TGH, there was one doctor, two nurses and an LPN on duty.
- Seven doctors and six nurses responded to the site immediately.
- Counselling services were also brought in.
- In total, 18 people were treated and released at Tofino General Hospital.
- As of Tuesday morning, Oct. 27:
 - One is in stable condition at Tofino General Hospital
 - o Two are in stable condition at Royal Jubilee Hospital
 - o One is in stable condition at Vancouver General Hospital
- Despite overwhelming response from the community in terms of rescue efforts, five people are confirmed dead, one missing.
- All five deceased are from the UK.

Key Messages:

- The thoughts and prayers of all Island Health staff and physicians are with the victims and their loved ones during this tragedy.
- Island Health would like to acknowledge the professionalism of staff at Tofino General Hospital – the doctors, nurses, clinical and support staff, and site leaders – who responded immediately.
- We would also like to recognize everyone else who responded to the emergency, including: the Ahousaht First Nation and residents of neighbouring communities, residents of Tofino, RCMP and victim services, Tofino Volunteer Fire Department, BC Ambulance Service, and the Joint Rescue Coordination Centre, who were all tremendous in their response.
- Tofino General Hospital (TGH) is highly prepared to respond to disasters and emergencies – in part due to the hospital's location in a relatively rural and remote location in an area that is at higher risk for natural disasters.
- TGH's mass casualty response plan was implemented and executed with compassion and efficiency on Sunday.
- Currently there are four patients in hospital:

One is in stable condition at Tofino General Hospital Two are in stable condition at Royal Jubilee Hospital

One is in stable condition at Vancouver General Hospital

Specific evening of event:

- There were seven physicians and nine nurses at Tofino General Hospital to deal with this situation.
- The physician on the dock prioritized with paramedics the arrival of survivors at TGF to ensure the most acute arrived first.
- . This is a planned approach within a disaster plan of any acute care site.
- The actions of emergency social services and paramedics were completely appropriate – they were taken to a warm home neighbouring the hospital where they were warmed up, provided hot showers and dry clothing.
- All 18 survivors were seen by clinicians at Tofino General Hospital on Sunday evening (October 25)
- Taking survivors to a non-acute site, such as a community hall or church basement, is not unusual in a mass casualty event in any community.

Hi Minister,

Just wanted to flag for you this story on CBC in which the mayor made a comment that could be interpreted as the hospital being overwhelmed. This was an offhanded comment and she in fact has been very complimentary of how the situation was handled by the local health care team at Island Health and Tofino General. I have not seen any other media carrying negative comments from the mayor. Nevertheless, I thought I would just give you the background on the situation.

Island Health had many staff come in in response to the situation – so many they had to turn some away. They had seven doctors and nine nurses on site, which was enough staff to attend to the 18 people. They did an excellent job and everyone really went above and beyond.

The paramedic who lives next to the hospital opened up his home initially because some of the people just had minor cuts and were cold. It was agreed that warming of patients could be undertaken with a paramedics' supervision. They then went to hospital to be checked out just to be on the safe side, once the more acute had been tended to.

This was planned and done at the direction of the physician on the dock receiving patients, as the most acute should of course go to the hospital first. That is a common planned approach for a mass casualty situation. The most acute would be taken to hospital first, and other patients staged in another location and receiving minor care.

In Tofino on Sunday, other homes and a lodge were also used for the people who did not require medical attention but who wanted a shower and some even had their clothes laundered by the home owners.

Yes we do have a more recent UBCM fact sheet (attached) that provides additional information than the one from GCPE. The attached UBCM fact sheet was for a meeting with the Regional District of Alberni-Clayoquot specific to the heliport issue and future capital plans for the hospital.

A summary of the issue:

- TGH Helipad was closed in 2011 by Transport Canada due to flight path issues;
- VIHA currently transports patients via the Tofino Airport 15 KM away however this is a temporary solution until
 a permanent heliport solution could be found;
- The preferred heliport site is the current location next to the hospital;
- The Foundation was looking to construct a new residential care facility on property adjacent to the identified helipad site however a restrictive covenant was placed on the property to address any potential flight path issues;
- VIHA is working with the District of Tofino to determine the willingness of neighbours to remove trees near the heliport to address the current flight path issues;
- VIHA has also engaged a consultant to assess the scope and cost of remediating the heliport;
- Once the flight path issues have been addressed and the consultant's report is completed, VIHA will prioritize the capital project within its 16/17 internal capital prioritization process;
- The project will most likely be an Routine Capital Investment type project and VIHA will be expected to managing this project within its current RCI allocation;

A preliminary estimate of the overall heliport project is \$700,000 and may be cost shared with the Alberni-Clayoquot RHD (this was not included in the note and is recent information)

Issue: Tofino helipad

Confidential Background:

- In 2011, Transport Canada (TC) issued an order requiring improvements be made to the heliport located at Tofino General Hospital (TGH).
- The helipad closed on December 5, 2011, and has not reopened. Since that time airevac landings have taken place at the Tofino Airport, located about 20-minutes by land ambulance from TGH (approximately 15 kilometres from TGH).
- The TGH helipad was located partly on Island Health property and partly on TGH Foundation property.
- The airport is considered a stop-gap measure due to the time it takes to travel from the hospital
 and rapid weather pattern changes that may occur in that time period.
- BC Emergency Health Services is responsible for any patient movement outside of the facility, however, a physician or nurse is often required to accompany the patient to the airport. Given the number of staff at the facility, this may require calling staff in to provide coverage.
- Rural Programs and the TGH Local Medical Advisory Committee (LMAC) strongly support development of a helipad at the hospital given the close proximity.
- The current TGH heliport is built partially on land adjacent to the hospital and is owned by the Tofino Hospital Foundation. The land is leased to a seniors housing group that intends to build a housing development on the property in the future. The flight path for the heliport would be directly over the area of the property where the development will be situated, thus the reasoning for the foundation and seniors' group not wanting the helipad located at its current site.
- The foundation sent a letter to Island Health stating their official position in the matter.
- As the Foundation property is unavailable for a helipad, a consultant was hired to identify
 potential helipad sites taking into consideration various criteria including heliport dimensions,
 aviation criteria, medical considerations and maintenance considerations. A number of
 locations were reviewed by the consultant including:
- Use of the nearby Coast Guard heliport; and
- Construction of an elevated helipad at the hospital using a steel structure and expanding the elevator shaft to the roof.
- The other locations identified had a number of disadvantages including distance from the hospital or price.
- Due to the cost of the elevated steel structure, the Coast Guard option was pursued. However, after a thorough review, this option is not available as there is no method for stretchers to access the dock. TGH is the only Island Health hospital without an operational on-site helipad.
- BC Ambulance Service reports that from 2008/09 to 2011/12, there were about 17 airevacs per year from the TGH helipad and one per year from the airport.



Island Health will be issuing an REP shortly for a helipad consulting firm. The successful firm will be
preparing a feasibility study which will identify helipad options, along with the cost and feasibility of those
options, for both Bamfield and Tofino.

Key Messages:

- The helipad at Tofino General Hospital (TGH) was closed in December 2011 following an order for upgrades that was issued by Transport Canada (TC).
- The helipad at TGH is partially located on property owned by the Tofino Hospital Foundation.
 Prior to undertaking the TC-required upgrades, Island Health met with the Foundation regarding its plans for future use of the property.
- As the Foundation lands are being planned to house a seniors facility, as well as the
 constraints imposed due to the height of trees on neighbouring properties, the Foundation
 property is unsuitable for a helipad.
- Since then, Island Health has been reviewing alternative options for a helipad to service TGH.
- A short-term option to use the Tofino Coast Guard station's helipad for airevac landings was considered. However, this option is not viable because there is no route for BC Ambulance Service to access the dock.
- A second option is to build an elevated helipad at TGH. Approval to proceed with this option is subject to feasibility and funding approval.
- In the interim, Island Health and BCAS have made alternate arrangements for helicopter landings at an alternative site Tofino Airport as deemed necessary by Transport Canada and air ambulance operators.
- · Patients are transferred to and from the Tofino Airport by land ambulance.
- Island Health has used alternative sites for medevac/airevac landings in recent years during
 helipad upgrades. Currently in Campbell River, the Campbell River Airport, located about 20
 minutes away from the hospital by land ambulance is being used due to construction of a new
 acute care facility at the existing hospital site. In Nanaimo, a helipad at the Nanaimo Port
 Authority was used located about 10 minutes by land ambulance from the hospital for about
 two years during construction of the new emergency department.
- Island Health will be issuing an RFP shortly for a helipad consulting firm. The successful firm will be preparing a feasibility study which will identify helipad options, along with the cost and feasibility of those options, for both Bamfield and Tofino.

KEY FACTS

Tofino General Hospital (TGH) Helipad / Bamfield Health Centre Helipad

- In 2009/2010, Transport Canada ordered several health authorities to improve safety measures at many of the 31 helipads in BC, including six sites on the Island, one of which being TGH.
- The helipad at TGH was unable to meet the new minimum technical specifications to comply with Transport Canada's standard for heliports, and was subsequently closed.
- Transport Canada asked VIHA to expand the site to accommodate the new regulations, but expansion would have caused problems with the construction of Rainbow Gardens, a new 15-bed residential care facility to be constructed adjacent to TGH.
- Alternative sites were explored by VIHA, including a municipal site and a site on TGH
 Foundation property, but new sites could not meet new standards without impacting
 private property.
- VIHA and the BC Ambulance Service (BCAS) have made a temporary arrangement for helicopter landings at the Tofino Airport, but the airport is one hour away from the hospital which is not ideal.
- In 2014, VIHA attempted to use the Tofino Life Boat station located within a few minutes
 of the hospital as a medium-term option, but they were unable to secure stretcher access
 to the helipad through a neighbouring property.
- VIHA conducted a feasibility study to explore whether an elevated helipad could be constructed, but the operation would be very complex and costly.
- Currently, VIHA is reviewing the feasibility of constructing a new ground level helipad at
 the existing helipad location. However, the key issues/requirements of this ground-level
 option are: removal/topping of adjacent property trees; land lease arrangement with the
 TGH Foundation; VIHA Executive funding approval of the project cost estimated at
 \$655,000.
- VIHA will be arranging a meeting in Tofino with all of the interested parties to explore this
 ground-level option as well as other options.
- In August 2015, an issue with the helipad in Bamfield was reported. The Alberni-Clayoquot Regional Hospital District Board of Directors instructed staff to investigate options to restore use of the helipad at the Bamfield Health Centre.

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UBCM 2015 - FACT SHEET

Rural Policy Paper and Transportation/Health Services Access in Alberni-Clayoquot Regional District (the District)

- The District is a geographically diverse region coving 6,904 square kilometres on the West Coast of Vancouver Island. The region has a population of roughly 31,500 people¹, and includes the communities of Port Alberni, Tofino, and Ucluelet.
- The regional communities are served by TGH, Bamfield Health Centre, and West Coast General Hospital. Patients requiring a higher level of care are typically transferred or diverted to Nanaimo Regional General Hospital, or to Victoria General Hospital.
- The Ministry of Health (the Ministry) recognizes that individuals who reside in rural and remote areas of the province tend to have comparatively poorer health outcomes and socioeconomic status compared to their urban counterparts and work is continuing with health authorities and other stakeholders in developing short and long term strategies that result in measurable improvements in rural health outcomes.
- The Ministry acknowledges that access to transportation systems can impact peoples'
 physical and psychological well-being, and that the District has unique transportation
 needs and issues that will require clear pathways and realistic, integrated, and flexible
 local solutions for patients to access health services.
- The Ministry is developing a rural health strategy to ensure we are providing effective
 community services for patients in rural and remote communities, including First Nations
 communities, and timely access to high quality perinatal care and specialized geriatric
 services; home and community care residential services; and emergency services. Efficient
 patient-centred pathways to medical and surgical services for rural populations are also a
 key part of this strategy.
- The strategy will also look at the important role that local governments, residents, health authorities, including the First Nations Health Authority, and the Ministry play in helping recruit and retain doctors, pharmacists, midwives, and other health professionals in rural and remote communities.
- A part of the work to improve transportation issues is education around services that
 residents can access closer to home and from the community and how to reach these
 services as opposed to accessing via a hospital visit for example, home and community
 care programs, public health programs, TeleHealth, and mental health programs.

The District has a diverse mix of urban, rural, and remote communities, which results in a complex and challenging transportation system that impacts the health and economic development of individuals and communities. As such, the district is in need of a diverse mix of transportation solutions from multiple stakeholders.

- In April 2012, the Alberni-Clayoquot Health Network (ACHN) was created through a Protocol Agreement between the District and VIHA, and \$500,000 in grant funding.
- The ACHN consists of a 17 member planning committee that acts as a mechanism for citizens that work and live in the area to speak as a collective voice on health issues and to share ideas and resources to build healthy and sustainable communities.
- One of the ACHN main priorities is affordable and accessible regional transportation.
- In 2013, the ACHN reviewed a proposal from Pacific Western Transport to undertake a study to look at the issues involved with a regional transportation system, and make

recommendations that will identify current and future transportation needs for the District.

- After the lead consultant left Pacific Western Transport, the ACHN entered into a new contract with the Sociable Scientists to complete the baseline study regarding the current transportation realities throughout the ACRD. The consultation completed in April 2014.
- According to the study, four overarching themes emerged:
 - 1. There is a lack of a coordinated approach in transportation networks, schedules, and options.
 - 2. Transportation is tied to mental and physical health and regional prosperity.
 - 3. Time is as much a factor as money when it comes to affordability. Many people in the region cannot travel to and from an appointment in one day.
 - 4. Stakeholders and community members are eager for solutions.
- The 11 recommendations that were brought forward in the report can be grouped into four main themes: encourage greater public engagement; improve coordination of services, investigate medical travel options, enhance transportation corridors.
- After reviewing the report, the ACRD began to take action on the recommendations in the study by holding a Dialogue to Action workshop on June 11th, 2015, with facilitation and support through Plan H, BC Healthy Communities. The workshop aimed to develop a strategy to move forward on the recommendations by working with elected officials, health authority representatives, and participants from First Nations communities and the transportation sector.
- Insights from the workshop have not yet been finalized, but will appear on the ARCD website when complete.
- VIHA is aware of these issues and has been in attendance at many of the ACHN meetings to offer insight and assist with recommendations as they come forward.
- In response to a suggestion from the mayor and councillors of the District of Ucluelet in 2014 to create a health network subset at the convention of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities, the Minister encouraged the west coast communities of Ucluelet and Tofino to make a request to VIHA to enter into discussions regarding the development of a network. His letter to Mayor Bill Irving directs him to reach out to VIHA for assistance with the creation of a health network subset, as well as the TGH helipad issue.

Just FYI on this - I've added my summary of the incident here as well, for your info:

High level details here are that a couple of experienced helijet pilots flew in to Tofino at 1am on Nov 15 to transfer out a stroke patient, with two paramedics on board.

For whatever reason, the pilots did not develop a flight plan for the trip, and so when they went to land they were not in the appropriate spot, but over the water. They started to go down and the engine stalled out, however, the aircraft got up to around 10 feet (while over logs – and maybe trees?), before eventually landing relatively safely.

However, the helicopter was too damaged to fly out again, and the paramedics were traumatized. s.22

The patient eventually was transferred out the next day, via a fixed wing aircraft.

As you know, the Premier has promised a helipad for Tofino – our last intel on this is that Island Health's RFP for planners has recently closed.

Dear Premier Christy Clark,

At the November 16 Bamfield Community Affairs Society meeting considerable concern was expressed over the lack of means to quickly evacuate compromised citizens in need of health support services beyond those available at the Bamfield Health Clinic.

Bamfielders are susceptible to health consequences that put them in greater jeopardy than the large British Columbia population. According to the 2011 census 43% of Bamfielders are over 60, whereas only 16% of all British Columbians are over 60. As a popular care-giver has stated, "most Bamfielders are beyond their best before date." Our older, lopsided population experiences more strokes and heart attacks per capita that require immediate attention beyond that available in Bamfield. Delays in evacuation result in death or prolonged suffering.

s.22	Parallel to this is the looming possibility of a marine
disaster. Bamfield is positioned in the middle	of the Pacific Rim Park. Thousands of visitors transit the
West Coast trail, kayak in local waters and p	articipate in sports fishing, charter fishing and storm
watching. Bamfield would be a major evacua	ition point for accident victims among our visitors. Thus, our
responsibility extends far beyond that of cari	ng for our small, aged population.

Bamfield needs an acceptable helipad. This should be adjacent to the Bamfield Health Clinic. The existing pad should be expanded or located elsewhere on the property or foreshore. The expense of making this adjustment may prove less than locating further away when one considers the necessity of suitable land transport linking the clinic with the helipad and the associated qualified personnel. Further, in dire emergencies, a quicker response is needed.

Bamfielders consider this issue as critical. Lives may be lost or impaired if delays in establishing a workable helipad continue.

Issue: Tofino helipad

Confidential Background:

- In 2011, Transport Canada (TC) issued an order requiring improvements be made to the heliport located at Tofino General Hospital (TGH).
- The helipad closed on December 5, 2011, and has not reopened. Since that time airevac landings
 have taken place at the Tofino Airport, located about 20-minutes by land ambulance from TGH
 (approximately 15 kilometres from TGH).
- The TGH helipad was located partly on Island Health property and partly on TGH Foundation property.
- The airport is considered a stop-gap measure due to the time it takes to travel from the hospital and rapid weather pattern changes that may occur in that time period.
- BC Emergency Health Services is responsible for any patient movement outside of the facility, however, a physician or nurse is often required to accompany the patient to the airport. Given the number of staff at the facility, this may require calling staff in to provide coverage.
- Rural Programs and the TGH Local Medical Advisory Committee (LMAC) strongly support development of a helipad at the hospital given the close proximity.
- The current TGH heliport is built partially on land adjacent to the hospital and is owned by the Tofino Hospital Foundation. The land is leased to a seniors housing group that intends to build a housing development on the property in the future. The flight path for the heliport would be directly over the area of the property where the development will be situated, thus the reasoning for the foundation and seniors' group not wanting the helipad located at its current site.
- The foundation sent a letter to Island Health stating their official position in the matter.
- As the Foundation property is unavailable for a helipad, a consultant was hired to identify
 potential helipad sites taking into consideration various criteria including heliport dimensions,
 aviation criteria, medical considerations and maintenance considerations. A number of
 locations were reviewed by the consultant including:
- Use of the nearby Coast Guard heliport; and
- Construction of an elevated helipad at the hospital using a steel structure and expanding the elevator shaft to the roof.
- The other locations identified had a number of disadvantages including distance from the hospital or price.
- Due to the cost of the elevated steel structure, the Coast Guard option was pursued. However, after a thorough review, this option is not available as there is no method for stretchers to access the dock. TGH is the only Island Health hospital without an operational on-site helipad.
- BC Ambulance Service reports that from 2008/09 to 2011/12, there were about 17 airevacs per year from the TGH helipad and one per year from the airport.

Island Health will be issuing an RFP shortly for a helipad consulting firm. The successful firm will be preparing a feasibility study which will identify helipad options, along with the cost and feasibility of those options, for both Bamfield and Tofino.

Key Messages:

- The helipad at Tofino General Hospital (TGH) was closed in December 2011 following an order for upgrades that was issued by Transport Canada (TC).
- The helipad at TGH is partially located on property owned by the Tofino Hospital Foundation. Prior to undertaking the TC-required upgrades, Island Health met with the Foundation regarding its plans for future use of the property.
- As the Foundation lands are being planned to house a seniors facility, as well as the constraints imposed due to the height of trees on neighbouring properties, the Foundation property is unsuitable for a helipad.
- Since then, Island Health has been reviewing alternative options for a helipad to service TGH.
- A short-term option to use the Tofino Coast Guard station's helipad for airevac landings was considered. However, this option is not viable because there is no route for BC Ambulance Service to access the dock.
- A second option is to build an elevated helipad at TGH. Approval to proceed with this option is subject to feasibility and funding approval.
- In the interim, Island Health and BCAS have made alternate arrangements for helicopter landings at an alternative site - Tofino Airport - as deemed necessary by Transport Canada and air ambulance operators.
- Patients are transferred to and from the Tofino Airport by land ambulance.
- Island Health has used alternative sites for medevac/airevac landings in recent years during helipad upgrades. Currently in Campbell River, the Campbell River Airport, located about 20 minutes away from the hospital by land ambulance is being used due to construction of a new acute care facility at the existing hospital site. In Nanaimo, a helipad at the Nanaimo Port Authority was used - located about 10 minutes by land ambulance from the hospital for about two years during construction of the new emergency department.
- Following an RFQ process held recently, Island Health has contracted with a helipad consulting firm that will be conducting a feasibility study that will identify helipad options, along with the cost and feasibility of those options, for a helipad.

The Bamfield Community Affairs Society has recently sent a letter to me expressing the community's concern around the lack of efficient emergency evacuation transport for critical ill patients.

The community of Bamfield and the surrounding area including the Huu-ay-aht First Nation are only accessible by boat or logging road some 90 km from the Alberni Valley. With a large portion of the population over 60 years of age, regular school group visits to the Marine Science Centre, many tourists — hikers of the Westcoast Trail, kayakers, sport fishers and storm watchers — that frequent the area, not to mention the marine traffic just beyond Barkley Sound travelling through the "Graveyard of the Pacific", a helipad located adjacent to the Bamfield Health Clinic would provide a crucial lifeline for those who would need to be evacuated in a timely manner.

I encourage the ministry to consider placing a helipad close to the Bamfield Health Clinic as an added level of emergency evacuation for this very remote rural community.

Issue: Tofino helipad

Confidential Background:

- In 2011, Transport Canada (TC) issued an order requiring improvements be made to the heliport located at Tofino General Hospital (TGH).
- The helipad closed on December 5, 2011, and has not reopened. Since that time airevac landings have taken place at the Tofino Airport, located about 20-minutes by land ambulance from TGH (approximately 15 kilometres from TGH).
- The TGH helipad was located partly on Island Health property and partly on TGH Foundation property.
- The airport is considered a stop-gap measure due to the time it takes to travel from the hospital and rapid weather pattern changes that may occur in that time period.
- BC Emergency Health Services is responsible for any patient movement outside of the facility, however, a physician or nurse is often required to accompany the patient to the airport. Given the number of staff at the facility, this may require calling staff in to provide coverage.
- Rural Programs and the TGH Local Medical Advisory Committee (LMAC) strongly support development of a helipad at the hospital given the close proximity.
- The current TGH heliport is built partially on land adjacent to the hospital and is owned by the Tofino Hospital Foundation. The land is leased to a seniors housing group that intends to build a housing development on the property in the future. The flight path for the heliport would be directly over the area of the property where the development will be situated, thus the reasoning for the foundation and seniors' group not wanting the helipad located at its current site.
- The foundation sent a letter to Island Health stating their official position in the matter.
- As the Foundation property is unavailable for a helipad, a consultant was hired to identify potential helipad sites taking into consideration various criteria including heliport dimensions, aviation criteria, medical considerations and maintenance considerations. A number of locations were reviewed by the consultant including:
- Use of the nearby Coast Guard heliport; and
- Construction of an elevated helipad at the hospital using a steel structure and expanding the elevator shaft to the roof.
- The other locations identified had a number of disadvantages including distance from the hospital or price.
- Due to the cost of the elevated steel structure, the Coast Guard option was pursued. However, after a thorough review, this option is not available as there is no method for stretchers to access the dock. TGH is the only Island Health hospital without an operational on-site helipad.
- BC Ambulance Service reports that from 2008/09 to 2011/12, there were about 17 airevacs per year from the TGH helipad and one per year from the airport.

Island Health will be issuing an RFP shortly for a helipad consulting firm. The successful firm will be preparing a feasibility study which will identify helipad options, along with the cost and feasibility of those options, for both Bamfield and Tofino.

Key Messages:

- The helipad at Tofino General Hospital (TGH) was closed in December 2011 following an order for upgrades that was issued by Transport Canada (TC).
- The helipad at TGH is partially located on property owned by the Tofino Hospital Foundation. Prior to undertaking the TC-required upgrades, Island Health met with the Foundation regarding its plans for future use of the property.
- As the Foundation lands are being planned to house a seniors facility, as well as the constraints imposed due to the height of trees on neighbouring properties, the Foundation property is unsuitable for a helipad.
- Since then, Island Health has been reviewing alternative options for a helipad to service TGH.
- A short-term option to use the Tofino Coast Guard station's helipad for airevac landings was considered. However, this option is not viable because there is no route for BC Ambulance Service to access the dock.
- A second option is to build an elevated helipad at TGH. Approval to proceed with this option is subject to feasibility and funding approval.
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- Patients are transferred to and from the Tofino Airport by land ambulance.
- Island Health has used alternative sites for medevac/airevac landings in recent years during helipad upgrades. Currently in Campbell River, the Campbell River Airport, located about 20 minutes away from the hospital by land ambulance is being used due to construction of a new acute care facility at the existing hospital site. In Nanaimo, a helipad at the Nanaimo Port Authority was used - located about 10 minutes by land ambulance from the hospital for about two years during construction of the new emergency department.
- Following an RFQ process held recently, Island Health has contracted with a helipad consulting firm that will be conducting a feasibility study that will identify helipad options, along with the cost and feasibility of those options, for a helipad.
