ISSUE

Cost of replacing the RCMP with our own BC Provincial Police Force

BACKGROUND

 If the Province replaced the RCMP with a BC Provincial Police Force – similar to the OPP in Ontario and SQ in Quebec –

 Under the terms of the Provincial Police Services Agreement (PPSA), the costs are shared between the province and Canada. The province pays 70% of the cost base described in the PPSA and Canada pays the remaining 30%. In 2008/09 the budget for the RCMP Provincial Force was approximately \$428 million, of which the Province paid \$299.5 million and Canada paid the remaining \$128.5 million.

Contract Costs –

Under the Provincial Police Service Agreement (PPSA), the province pays 70% of the RCMP Provincial Force cost base, and Canada pays the remaining 30%. In 2008/09 the Provincial Force cost base was approximately \$428 million. The Province paid approximately \$299.5 million, and Canada paid \$128.5 million to this cost.

Federal Specialized Units –

In addition to the cost base, there are costs associated with BC's RCMP Provincial Force which are borne 100% by Canada. In 2007/08 it is anticipated that Canada will pay about \$3 million for items associated with the Provincial Force such as civil actions, compensation and ex-gratia payments, building security provided by Corps Commissionaires, etc. Canada also pays 100% of the cost of several specialized units that provide services to the province, such as Special "I" and Special "O".



Dear Premier Clark:

I saw the story on CBC Vancouver's News last night that said the Province was in negoitations with the RCMP for a 20 year contract with the Audit that was supposed to be finished last year still hasn't been released. It's very upsetting to see that your cabinet and Treasury Board hasn't seen the report yet and is in negoitations for a 20 year contract. (see; http://www.cbc.ca/news/canada/british-columbia/story/2011/08/25/bc-rcmp-audit.html)

I would recommend that the Province ask for a 1 year extension of the current contract to allow for the report to be released and digested. There are other options than renewing the RCMP contract - a Provincial Police Service answering to Victoria may be a better answer but it would be difficult to judge without looking at the report and weighing it against the pros and cons of having our own in BC. Also, in negotiations, if the RCMP feel there is a viable alternative (i.e: a Provincial Police Service), they might be more willing to sharpen their pencils when it comes to their new contracts.

Bottom line: Don't let this become a dividing issue, delay at least a year until the report can be made public and discussions should be had about the costs/benefits of a provincial police service vs. costs/benefits of the RCMP contract.







Ms. Bond and Ms. Watts,

May I suggest to you that the RCMP have finally shot themselves in the foot. The failure of their senior officers to effectively deal with problems created by their errant members has disgraced the force in the eyes of the general public, if not the world. It must be soul destroying for the many honest, dedicated members of the force to see this happening but it is.

Of course the RCMP brass believe that we have no choice and that they can continue in whatever manner they see fit and be above public scrutiny while doing so. An elitist stance if ever there was one. This is bolstered by the belief that we have no options.

Hi Shirley

I have a suggestion that I would like to run past you.



Suggested strategy for implementing a Provincial Police Force in British Columbia at lowest visible cost to the taxpayer.

- 1. Bring all Municipal and City police forces in BC under the same type of uniform (same cut and colour). They would all retain their municipal and city badges and patches, but conspicuous "British Columbia" shoulder flashes would be added. This would NOT be an amalgamation, but it would facilitate and streamline police collaboration and sharing of resources. A police officer (and patrol car) would look the same whether you are in Victoria, or New Westminister, but the cities would still be in control of their own policing mandates.
- 2. Create a central purchasing authority for all independent police forces in BC and direct them to use it. This would result in cost savings for the taxpayer through negotiated purchases, bulk buys and fleet purchases. This would also preempt the need to do this when starting a new force.
- 3. Create the British Columbia Highway Patrol using the same uniforms as indicated above with their own badge and patches. The cost of this would be within the means of the BC taxpayer. This, and the common uniforms in other communities, would create the "Brand Image" of a BC Provincial Police Force. This force would serve as a nucleus for a Provincial Police Force. They would amalgamate with the BC Sheriffs to realize further taxpayer savings.
- 4. Incentivise communities that currently contract to the RCMP to change when they can and contract to the BC Highway Patrol. When enough communities are contracted to, rebrand the Highway Patrol to BC Provincial Police.
- 5. The Provincial Police then take over the provincial investigative and police services.

Clearly, as a phased process this would be a decade long (or longer) process. The organizational handovers would be slow and careful, and the cost to the taxpayer would be spread out and low-profile.

I believe that 1, 2 and 3 could be underway in the 2014 time frame, and could result in a savings to the taxpayer in the short term. This would also grow the perception for the public that a provincial force already exists.

As BC is clearly seeing, the RCMP is NOT OUR provincial police force but answers to Ottawa. Its time BC grew up, stopped relying on the cheaper RCMP prices and took control of our own policing like Ontario and Quebec. Instead, BC has gotten lazy and allowed the RCMP to police our largest cities and towns, a condition which does not exist in other provinces. Alberta, Saskatchewan etc all have thie own major cities policed by municipal police forces thus the citizens of this province control those officers and they accountable to our police act, not Ottawa's.

BC needs to say no to the new deal and force the RCMP to accept our terms. 1st, BC needs to mandate that all cities in BC over 100,000 need to be policed by our own municipal/regional police forces. 2nd, BC needs to empower our Sheriffs department to patrol major provincial assets like highways, the legislature and the ferry system like the Washington State Patrol. The RCMP still do those duties in Ontario and Quebec even though they have their own provincial police forces.

DO NOT accept the current deal the RCMP are forcing down our throats in BC. Lets grow up, accept that policing costs are not cheap and take control of our law enforcement options instead of cheaping out with the RCMP. If Ontario and Quebec can manage their own provincial police forces so can we in BC. Enough of police which are accountable to Ottawa and have been doing nothing but grab the headlines with outrageous behaviour in this province. We can do better than the RCMP. They are a far from perfect force and there are better options out there.







Dear Ms. Bond:



I wish to comment on the recent announcement regarding the threat by the Federal government to remove the RCMP from the Province unless a new contract is signed by November 30th. Firstly, I am appalled by the position taken by the Federal Government; it is impossible to bargain in good faith under a not so veiled threat of police service withdrawal. This speaks volumes about the attitude of the Federal government towards this Province and their 'one size fits all' model of police service delivery.

While the issue that appears most prominent is costs and funding, relatively little attention has been paid to the issue of accountability. It is clear to many that even with the Province and municipalities funding a significant portion of policing costs, there is little RCMP accountability to the Province. Division and detachment commanders respond principally to RCMP HQ's in Ottawa.

In my view, there is however a silver lining in this situation — the potential for development of a provincial police force directly accountable to the provincial government. As a long-term resident of the Province of BC, I have lost faith in the RCMP's ability to provide adequate and accountable police services at the municipal and provincial level.

As stated in the press release of Wednesday, your Ministry is looking at a backup plan in case of withdrawal of RCMP services. While this is commendable and prudent on your part as the Minister, I encourage you to move beyond this with instruction to your officials to conduct a cost benefit analysis of both police service models, RCMP versus Provincial Police. Citizens have a right to know that policy development and decision making for a future police service model is based on a thoughtful, objective and independent process.

In my opinion, there are two significant factors to be considered in such an endeavor. Firstly, an important consideration is the number of members within the RCMP potentially available to a newly formed Provincial police force. Secondly, institution of a provincial police force may lay the groundwork for a consolidation of independent police forces in the lower Mainland and Capital Region, a recommendation of numerous studies.

Thank you for the opportunity to present my views on this critical issue.


Good day Ms. Bond,

Dear Solictor General Bond:

Please forgive my presumption in writing this letter to you. A friend in British Columbia sent me a link to an article in the *National Post* with a Victoria dateline and a citation to the Victoria, BC *Times Colonist*. That article concerned a speech you gave in Vancouver referencing the difficulties your government was recently experiencing in its endeavor to negotiate a new contract with the Royal Canadian Mounted Police ("RCMP") to provide public safety services in the province. I was compelled to write because I was a party to several conversations on this very subject—the last taking place some fourteen years ago—with the then 5.22

Of course s.22 precludes resort to his considerable experience and wisdom in the area of providing police services to British Columbians. However, I hope you might find that a few of the most salient points he made during those conversations might assist you in the formidable task of dealing with the RCMP's unreasonable demand that you capitulate or lose police service. I recognize that your position in all of this is extremely complex and cannot be resolved by a few words of wisdom from someone who uttered them many years ago, but some of his remarks seemed sufficiently well honed to give, perhaps, some perspective on how he might recommend the British Columbia government deal with the present situation, were it possible to ask him.

By way of very brief introduction. I was a lifelong acquaintance of s.22 Over the years, particularly after s.22 and during s.22 and I would occasionally have in-depth philosophical and practical discussions about policing and law enforcement. We seemed to enjoy the exercise and often compared and contrasted our respective public safety systems. I was always impressed by his practical knowledge and demonstrated facility with providing public safety. I often

lament that he did not see fit to publish treatises on the subject. When I would so lament in his presence, however, his most frequent response would be: "Why? You can tell them for me, if need be." I suppose, under these circumstances, that the need he was referring to has come to be. While I do not consider myself a particular fitting repository of his wisdom, I seem to be left with it and, for his sake, take up pen to share it now.

One area s.22 and I dealt with during several conversations was his steadfast conviction that the RCMP's interest in continuing to serve as the British Columbia Provincial Police Force was diminishing in inverse proportion to the high cost of providing those services under contracts it negotiated with the province. In other words, he said, the federal government felt like its most recent RCMP contract was "subsidizing" police service in British Columbia. Shortly after the most recent contract negotiations concluded, we had a discussion where s.22 offered his view as to why and how this might well be the last contract between the province and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

In itself, his conviction may not be so remarkable: I am—as he was—sure that many shared this viewpoint for almost as many different reasons. It is only in light of the recent developments that I felt it incumbent upon me to accuaint vou with some of the other points he made during those conversations.

5.22
accurately predicted that the RCMP would not come to the bargaining table with any accommodations whatsoever next time. He said that they would initially manifest good faith and offer to consider seriously any position taken by the British Columbia government, but towards the end would become intransigent and, ultimately, refuse to bargain at all, presenting British Columbia's government with a last minute "take it or leave it proposition." He was certain they would not offer to amend their position and would threaten to pull out of British Columbia policing forthwith if their demands were not met.

I was taken aback with what I perceived to be an uncharacteristically cynical prediction on his part and so inquired further. Among other things, I happened to ask him what he would do if he were faced with the negotiations between the RCMP and British Columbia on the next provincial policing contract. His response to that question is what I would now like to offer to your studied consideration, as best as my memory of the discussion will allow.

First of all, s.22 said that he would not recommend acceptance of any last minute "drop dead" demands. Instead, he would remind the RCMP that they could not simply "pull out" of British Columbia policing at the end of their

contract. He said that he was convinced, having studied the issue somewhat, that British Columbia could successfully litigate that attempt as contrary to the national mission and purpose of the RCMP and he was quite sure the courts would enjoin such a rapid pull out. He said his research convinced him that the federal government has a duty to provide police services in any area of Canada where none exists otherwise. Of course, they could present a bill to the province for providing these services and, he would expect that the bill would be at the "non contract" rate—which could be exorbitant—but which would also be subject to administrative control by the Federal Court of Canada. He said that he was sure this would at least provide BC with uninterrupted policing, while it dealt with the crisis caused by the expiring contract with the RCMP.

In the meantime, he would recommend that the province set about creating its own police department immediately as a contingency. I suggested in response that this would be practically impossible given the close time limits involved, together with the increased police budget required to pay the RCMP for non-contract transitional police services over what would be at least, several years.

s.22 disagreed.

He offered his belief that—with a rapid buildup in peace officer personnel, (many possibly being recruited from the ranks of Royal Canadian Mounted Police officers who wanted to stay in British Columbia)--the Provincial Sheriff as constituted could become the backbone of the new policing organization. He anticipated that the Sheriff would be assisted in that regard-at least transitionally-with help from other provincial departments that already employ peace officers in specialty roles; for example fish and game officers would police provincial parks, commercial vehicle enforcement officers would provide general highway patrol in unorganized areas, motor vehicle branch inspectors would provide vehicle crimes investigations, social services investigators would provide child protective services and investigations, and so on. He said that all of these would require some expenditure for recruiting and training additional personnel, but that this would allow some diffusion because the training would, at first, be departmentally specific and would be considerably less for experienced peace officers in those departments who already have been trained in some or all of the functions their department would take. Integration of officers from these specialty services into the new police organization could be done at a slower pace, allowing the officers to be trained in general police work sequentially as they discharge their duties in their speciality organizations. He also said that the RCMP's ad hoc police service-and the expense to the province of providing that service-could be correspondingly reduced as more officers were trained and deployed under the

auspices of the new provincial policing agency.

expressed his firm belief that if British Columbia took this approach to the negotiations, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police would either come back to the bargaining table if they were serious about wanting to provide contract police services or they would remain intransigent if they were not. In either case, British Columbia's government would at least maintain control over the scope and cost of providing provincial police services, rather than being held economically hostage to RCMP demands merely because BC's government and not the RCMP is mandated to finance and control the provision of public safety in the province.

That is the summary of the general parameters of my conversations in this regard with s.22 I hope it can be of some use to you, if for no other reason than the memory of s.22 who, as a British Columbian his entire life and as a of his life, evidently devoted considerable thought to the task of providing public safety to his fellow citizens in the province.

Recognizing that your task is daunting and the peril of error palpable, I wish you well in the pursuit of your negotiations with the RCMP. I am confident in any event that you will devote your best efforts to achieve an outcome that is favorable to the best interests of British Columbia's public. In the meantime, should you—or any of your deputies—require further elucidation on any of the foregoing, please feel free to contact me at your convenience.

Dear Minister Bond,

Observing media reports and comments made in-camera by yourself regarding the difficulty the Province is encountering extending the contractual arrangement with the RCMP to continue its policing services within British Columbia poses the question whether it is time to return to a B.C. Provincial Police Force for that purpose? Particularly upon revisiting the many incidents within British Columbia where questionable practices by RCMP members have been evident within recent years. Perhaps resulting from the publicized hierarchy deficiencies within the RCMP upper echelon or inadequate training among the ranks.

Minister Bond, I thoroughly support yours and the views of many municipal figures who want to see more direct accountability by RCMP detachments located within their respective jurisdictions. And suggest this is more likely to be achieved by members of the respective police detachments having closer ties to the communities in which they actually police.

It is becoming increasingly evident there have been more disciplinary problems among all police forces since their individual members have become more detached from the actual jurisdictions they police. A situation resulting from where, like all residing within larger metropolitan areas, members of police departments can afford to reside and raise their families. And further compounded by today's social issues and relationship breakdowns.

Minister Bond, perhaps it's time for all police governing bodies to look into the ongoing paramilitary infrastructure by which police departments everywhere operate. An infrastructure that has virtually remained unaltered since the formation of formal policing units a century or more ago. And increasingly implying a them and us mentality by too many police members regarding the public they serve. To be replaced by a more business-like infrastructure that dispenses with the current ranking system.

While it may be a socially unpopular statement to make, however, I personally find it offensive that when a police officer is killed in the line of duty that other members of police departments who neither knew the individual nor family show up in such force for a funeral or memorial service. It further confirms the them and us mentality and affront towards a society where about 98% are totally law abiding citizens.

Although the loss of life is tragic under any circumstances, and particularly a premature violent one, death is the one assured inevitability in life. And those who knowingly engage in vocations where there are risks greater than other vocations have to accept same. Particularly in which some make the conscience choice to carry fire arms and/or other weaponry.



Christy Clark say's having own police "cheaper"?

Christy Clark stated on CTV news and in the Province that having its own police force would be cheaper for BC than the RCMP!

There she goes again shooting from the lip before having all the facts.

Let's do a comparison and use Vancouver City Police VS Surrey RCMP.

Vancouver has a smaller Geographical area to Police than Surrey, yet the population is just about equal, with Surrey's growing every day and will soon surpass that of Vancouver's.

Vancouver has approximately 1400 officers, while Surrey has approximately 650 officers.

This is because Vancouver is a unionized force which follows a different set of rules when it comes to policing and hiring per capita, such as two man cars after certain hours, while the RCMP are not unionized and therefore can operate with less police per capita.

Should Christy Clark get rid of the RCMP, Surrey police would then fall under BC policing guide lines becoming unionized. This would mean that they would have to increase their force by approximately 750 police officers just to match Vancouver and that is not counting replacing the

RCMP members that wish to remain with the RCMP, leave Surrey and the Province which could mean (if half of the 650 stayed) 1000 to 1100 new police for Surrey.

Now expand these calculations to include Burnaby, North Vancouver, Coquitlam, Langley and White Rock Detachments. There are 6000 RCMP members policing BC. Even is half of these members stay it still leaves Christy Clark in the position of hiring approximately 9000 police to not only replace but comply with BC union hiring rules.

Add onto this the cost of training, equipment, uniforms, salaries, benefits, services and lets not forget the 10% loss of funding, now provided by the Federal Government towards policing in BCI

So once again please tell the people of BC how it would be cheaper to replace the RCMP?

"O" yes I forgot. This is the government that was 500 million over budget on the Convention Center, 300 million over on the roof for BC Place and said the HST was revenue neutral!

Yes the RCMP has not had a stellar record as of late but neither has the Vancouver Police. Remember the "Mr. Paul" incident, the shooting of a mentally ill male seven times, one member jailed for 3 years for selling drugs on the down town east side and two members beating up a innocent Asian male when getting the wrong address and one could go on but you get the picture.

This has nothing to do with cost but one of Power! Nothing would change except the uniform, location of Power and cost. It is not as simple as changing the uniform and name but Christy Clark thinks so!




As a resident of BC I feel it is time we take back the role of policing with a made-in-BC police force. The RCMP has lost touch with the Province and with the citizens. It lacks accountability and respect. I really do hope that the government is seriously considering establishing a provincial police force similar to Ontario and Quebec and not using the threat as a bargaining tool. I believe the opportunities are enormous for leading edge policing techniques, and to foster better community bonds and may even open up opportunities to cooperate with aboriginal communities and their policing services, etc.

Furthermore, it is my understanding that a lot of the equipment of the RCMP in BC is actually owned by the province or the local municipality in which they serve, if this is correct, presumably there would be little investment required in equipment and infrastructure for a new provincial police.

Anyway, I hope that the idea is being seriously considered to re-establish the BCPP and it is given due consideration. The RCMP should be responsible for federal policing duties, anything under provincial jurisdiction should be dealt with at the provincial level, the subsidiarity principle should be used by the provincial government as often as possible. This is an excellent opportunity to bring important decisions back to the people of BC and make the police responsible to the elected government and it will likely not present itself for another 20 years (if an RCMP contract is signed again).


As a voter, I would like to have a vote in BC's direction in provincial law enforcement. I'd like to see this choice made a election issue.

Dear Premier Clark

It has been apparent to us since we moved to BC several years ago that there is an ongoing debate about the future of BC's relationship with its largest police force, the RCMP. Much has been made of the recent "take it, or leave it" offer attached to the 20 year policing contract suggested by the Government of Canada.

My views of the debate are informed primarily, but not exclusively, by observations as a BC voter, my life experience in Ontario where we were served by the OPP, and my time spent in labour relations bargaining.

Truth be told, I could live comfortably with a force staffed by either a provincial police service under the direction of the British Columbia Government, or a federal force of RCMP under contract to BC, Determining what is the better "deal" for British Columbians will take a lot of effort and yet is fairly easy for me to describe both as a taxpayer and as a consumer of government services including policing, I expect three important characteristics in a police force:

- 1) A professional, well resourced, effective police service capable of responding to public safety and law enforcement requirements in a prompt, balanced and competent manner: there when one needs them, and a friendly background presence when one does not need them.
- 2) Accountable to the public they serve through balanced and prompt independent oversight mechanisms that forever remove the affront to impartiality of police investigating themselves when charged with misconduct.
- Prudent use of public funds to deliver the best value commensurate with an effective police service.

If one had lived in Ontario or Quebec one would understand in a practical and comfortable way that a provincial force under the direction of the province is eminently workable. Sometimes

when I read BC media commentary I get an inkling there is a fear factor creeping into the debate when the idea of removal of the federal force is offered as a possibility. It is as if there is a dog whistle frequency undertone which goes something like this: 'Oh my goodness! What if the RCMP get mad at us and just leave! We'll be defenseless. It will be like Port au Prince or Baghdad with shootings, fires and crazed mobs running riot. Well, actually, no it won't. Any transition if it occurs will be orderly and managed. It is in the best interest of both governments that it be so. Let's all remember to breathe.

Funnily enough one might think from news reports that the federal government is holding all the cards and BC is the weaker party in the negotiation. Nothing could be farther from the truth.

BC has two options: keep the RCMP or introduce a provincial force. Ottawa has only one option, and a rather uncomfortable one at that: win the highly desirable contract for policing in BC or deal with the fallout of having over 6,000 surplus officers and a sizeable civilian staff and no place to put them. If the RCMP labour relations contract mandates displacement (sometimes called "bumping") when faced with surplus officers, the spectre of 6,000 plus surplus RCMP officers in BC is a doomsday scenario the Government of Canada could ill afford. I cannot imagine Minister Toewes relishes the possibility of BC saying "No thank-you".

It also mystifies me that a Staff Sergeant in the RCMP Labour Relations function in Vancouver would be sufficiently out of touch to warn no further cost efficiencies can be found. That is simply not true...of any organization. Nor is it true accountability could not be improved. Nor indeed for that matter that service levels could not be improved. What I am unsure of is whether there is a federal party across the table from the BC government willing to negotiate and introduce changes.

If it turns out Ottawa is intractable then the hard work should commence without delay to create a provincial force, A letter of intent stating BC's desire for a provincial force, addressed to Minister Toewes may however prompt a significant change of heart. If not, along with the hard work to create such a provincial force, BC will have the opportunity to interview and select those serving members of the RCMP who would wish to remain in BC but change employers, while saying a polite "No thank-you" to the candidates judged not to meet BC's hiring objectives.

While the establishment of a provincial police force in BC is a huge task I pray it will not be one BC shrinks from if it turns out to be a superior policing option for the voters of the province.





The rcmp have made some demands about pay increase. The fact is the rcmp have a large percentage of their members in BC, the amount is around 40%. The threat of pulling out of BC is a bluff in my opinion. First off were are they going to put the members? this would cause large scale lay offs and hiring freezes, they are using strong arm tactics to try and force your hand.

The provincial police force is a very viable idea. The cost factor will be high at first but over time this will level out and become cheaper, the average rcmp member cost is around 75, 000 per member. 



It is clear more than ever with the recent RCMP "demand" that we sign a 20 year contract that its time to move on from the RCMP for the major policing in BC. Every major criminologist in BC has been saying this for years but the BC government, so addicted to the cheap policing the RCMP offer, were too blind to the realities of contracting with a federal force. Its time BC buck up, acknowledge that yes municipal/regional policing is more costly BUT the province has 100% control of these officers. Alberta has CLEARLY shown you do not need a police officer to patrol highways, protect their premier and conduct basic surveillance. Here is a backgrounder on 1984's Bill C-9, CSIS Act:

"The principal recommendation of the Macdonald Commission report was that a civilian security agency be formed. Immediately after the August 1981 release of the McDonald Commission Report, the government indicated its acceptance of the most fundamental recommendation - the creation of a civilian security service. In May 1983, during the first session of the 32nd Parliament, Bill C-157 was introduced in the House of Commons. That bill would have established the Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS), based on the framework suggested by the McDonald Commission. Following the report, Bill C-157 was allowed to die on the order paper. In the second session of the 32nd Parliament a new Bill, C-9, was introduced which incorporated virtually all the recommendations of the Senate Committee. Given first reading in January 1984, Bill C-9 was referred to the Justice Committee of the House of Commons in March, passed third reading in June, and was proclaimed in force in July and August 1984. The legislation, as passed, is virtually identical to the bill that was introduced in January."

I request that your Chief of Staff present this letter to you. Let's just look a little at this situation and find out what it is about. I suggest we look at the police forces of three countries:

- 1. USA: The FBI is the national /federal police force. It does not act as the police force in any State; there are State Police and Municipal Police. While it does have a presence in each State, it does not police any of them.
- 2. UK: New Scotland Yard is the national police force. It does not police the Country. That function is the responsibility of municipal police.
- 3. France: The national police is responsible for law and order on a national level, similar to the FBI and New Scotland Yard; again, general policing is a municipal responsibility. These countries obviously believe the national police force should be restricted to only national matters.
- 4. Canada: Is the ONLY country mentioned where the national police is also the local police. The RCMP is responsible and accountable only to its headquarters in Ottawa, and ultimately to the PM. It is not responsible and accountable to the Provincial Government where it is the police force. Why, then, should the RCMP police provinces and municipalities? When it does so, what is the provincial government's role?

Your predecessor's deputy minister stated that talks were going well to finalise a contract. That was true only while the government of BC was in agreement with the RCMP. When responsibility and accountability to the provincial government were mentioned, talks with the RCMP stalled.

Ouestions to consider:

- 1. Why should the BC Government agree to a twenty year contract or any contract at all? There would be no guarantee that costs would not escalate.
- 2. Why should the BC Government agree that the RCMP is answerable only to their HQ, the federal minister and the PM? The BC Government would have no say at all in the conduct of the RCMP in the Province
- 3. Why should the BC Government agree that any misdemeanour on the part of the RCMP be investigated by the RCMP itself?

I Recommended that a BC Provincial Police similar to the OPP and QPP be established:

1. Yes, initially there would be a cost to implement the BCPP, but the long-term benefits would far outweigh introductory costs.

2. The BCPP would be made up of members living in the communities, probably on a long-term basis, unlike members of the RCMP who are transferred at the will of their HQ, i.e., there is no sense of belonging, of permanence.

3. It is said that the RCMP is dysfunctional. It does not enjoy a good reputation in the province. An investment in the future where the BC Government is not tied to a con-

tract and where it has control of the police force makes common sense.

4. I have not the least doubt that a decision to establish a BCPP would be very popular with the public, and would certainly positively influence voters in the provincial elections in 2012.

Finally, Minister, some words of encouragement: Do not take the easy way out. Do not sign a contract. You will lose self-respect, the respect of the people of BC, and more. Be courageous, step out into the unknown with the knowledge that we support you, we are with you, you have done the right thing, and in the coming election you will know how we value you and your Party. We are rooting for you. So go on, don't look back!



Dear Sir:

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Attached find a recent survey conducted by the Vancouver Sun confirming that a vast majority of Vancouver citizens support creation of a regional police force to tackle organized crime violence, which continues to spiral throughout the city.

I would like to add my voice and support to this proposal,

Gang and organized crime violence has continued unabated for more than 10 years throughout Metro Vancouver and the Fraser Valley. The RCMP is responsible for policing most of Metro Vancouver including: Richmond, Burnaby, Surrey, Langley, North Vancouver, Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam, Pitt Meadows, Maple Ridge, Abbotsford, Chilliwack and Hope. Out of the approximately 150 murders related to gang and organized crime, the RCMP have solved---NONE---as I understand it. It's not a very impressive record and I don't believe it's unfair to blame the RCMP for the problem--they're wearing the goat horns and they know it.

Further, the RCMP have displayed a complete disregard for accountability in the communities they serve throughout the Province. The number of questionable incidents is stagering. The tasering of Robert Dziekanski by 4 hulking RCMP officers has disgraced the City of Richmond and tarnished Canada's image abroad. And you will notice that in the Dziekanski case, the officers have not been identified and their whereabouts are not known. You would think that at the very least, these officers would want to apologize for their **gross insensitivity** toward Mr. Dziekanski. As a nation we have to get beyond our fascination with the "redcoats," because this Canadian institution and cultural icon is--obviously broken.

As I understand it, the argument for the presence of the RCMP in British Columbia is cost. Yet, I notice on my latest property tax statement that policing

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in Richmond accounts for 21% of the City's annual budget, far greater than any other cost to property owners. It's probably the same in every other jurisdiction. So I ask, how much more could it possibly cost for a Regional Police Force, given that there are considerable economies of scale within a single bureaucracy?

I would suggest to you that it's time for British Columbia to follow the lead of Quebec and Ontario and create of Provincial police force. At the very least, we need a Metro force in Vancouver.

In closing, I would add that I am amazed the NDP has not seized upon this issue, as it would play very well in Vancouver and the election is just around the corner.

I am responding to your May 31, 2008 facsimile regarding a regional police force for Metro Vancouver and your concerns about the tragic incident that took place at Vancouver International Airport. I apologize for the delay in my reply.

I agree that law enforcement agencies are facing unprecedented challenges as criminals continue to find new ways to exploit technological advances and increased globalization. However, we need to ensure that we avoid intemperate reactions to that problem and remain measured in our responses to deal with the changing face of crime in our communities.

As you may be aware, the Vancouver Police Regionalization Forum was held on February 6, 2008 and was sponsored by Simon Fraser University and the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General. The purpose of the Forum was to have a dialogue on the creation of a regional police service for Metro Vancouver to ensure a full and open discussion on this important issue. There were 170 people in attendance, including local politicians, police board members, police, and other interested parties. Speakers included local Mayors, chiefs of police, and academics. Many of the speakers focused their presentations on the benefits of the Province's current integrated model for policing, while others emphasized the issues facing Vancouver's downtown core.

I am open to further discussions on regionalization; however, this needs to start with the local governments in the lower mainland who pay for these police services. While there was no consensus on how to proceed at our most recent forum, there was a clear understanding that we

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must continue to support what is working and seek ways to further those gains. Police integration is paying dividends and enhancements to that existing model may prove more effective and less costly than full scale police department amalgamation, as well as staying true to community policing.

At the same time it is important to highlight government's existing commitment to law and order:

- There are 900 more police officers on the street than five years ago.
- Since 2001, the Province has lifted the base budget for policing by \$125 million.
- \$140 million in traffic fine revenue has been returned to communities across the province since 2004.
- PRIME, the \$40 million integrated data management system, is now fully functional, allowing all the police agencies in British Columbia to share real time information and intelligence.
- Specialized integrated teams such as the Gang Task Force, the Integrated Homicide Squad
 and the Combined Forces Special Enforcement Unit have been developed. These teams
 provide specialized policing services to all member municipalities avoiding duplication and
 optimizing efficiency. The Province supports these units with an annual investment of \$66
 million.
- A relatively new initiative is already paying significant dividends in terms of crime fighting; the development of our Crime Reduction Strategy. The concept is simple, if 50 per cent of a community's crime is connected to ten per cent of offenders, concentrate on that ten per cent. Communities that have embraced these programs have already seen a dramatic reduction in the crime rate especially in property category.

With regard to your concerns about the incident at Vancouver International Airport, as you may know, an independent Commission of Inquiry headed by Appeal Court Justice Thomas R. Braidwood, Q.C. is under way. The inquiry will be conducted into two distinct phases: Phase one will examine and report on the use of CEWs by law enforcement in British Columbia; and phase two will inquire into the death of Mr. Dziekanski. Phase one is a "study" commission into the use, effectiveness and safety of conducted energy weapons in British Columbia by law enforcement agencies other than the RCMP. The study commission held several public forums and received more than 40 submissions. The report for phase one is scheduled to be released November 30, 2008. Phase two is a hearing and study commission and hearings will begin on November 12, 2008. More information about the independent Commission of Inquiry is available on the Commission's website at: http://www.braidwoodinguiry.ca/.

In addition, the Chief Coroner for British Columbia has ordered a Coroner's Inquest, as required by law, which will allow for the public presentation of all evidence relating to Mr. Dziekanski's death. The presiding coroner and a five-person jury will hear evidence from subpoenaed

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witnesses in order to determine the facts surrounding the death. The jury will have the opportunity to make recommendations aimed at preventing deaths under similar circumstances in the future as well as other relevant recommendations. The date for this inquest is to be confirmed in the near future.

The Provincial Integrated Homicide Investigation Team (IHIT), which includes members of both the RCMP and Independent Municipal Police Departments, has investigated the incident at the airport to determine if criminal actions occurred. This process is being overseen by an Independent Civilian Observer, appointed by the Commission for Public Complaints Against the RCMP (CPC). More information about the CPC's Independent Observer Pilot Project is available at: http://www.cpc-cpp.gc.ca/DefaultSite/Whatsnew/index_e.aspx?Article1D=1716.

Moreover, the RCMP has requested the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP), to review the IHIT investigation to ensure it is thorough and complete. The OPP will be given full access to all evidence and file information, and will have authority to interview witnesses. The OPP will follow up and complete any parts of the investigation, should they determine the issues have not been addressed appropriately.

As well, Mr. Paul Kennedy, Chair of the CPC, has initiated a review into the conduct of the RCMP members present, or engaged in, the arrest of Mr. Dziekanski at the Vancouver International Airport, and the adequacy of the subsequent criminal investigation. In examining the conduct of the RCMP members, the investigation will include whether the RCMP officers involved complied with all appropriate policies, procedures, guidelines and statutory requirements for the arrest and treatment of persons taken into custody. This includes any RCMP directives or guidance related to the handling of persons who cannot communicate in either of Canada's official languages, and whether such policies, procedures and guidelines are adequate.

I am confident that the number and scope of the processes that are currently under way will result in recommendations and actions that will ensure the issues are dealt with appropriately and that similar situations will not occur in the future.


Dear Premier Campbell:

I am responding to your February 16, 2009 e-mail addressed to the Honourable Gordon Campbell, Premier, regarding your suggestions to establish a provincial police force. I apologize for the delay in my reply.

Law enforcement agencies are facing unprecedented challenges as criminals continue to find new ways to exploit technological advances and increased globalization. We need to remain flexible in our responses to dealing with the changing face of crime in our communities.

Since 2003, the Province of British Columbia has pursued an integrated service delivery model under which specialized policing teams are created, offering services to all member municipalities. Examples of these units include the Integrated Homicide Investigation Team, the Combined Forces Special Enforcement Unit, and the Integrated Road Safety Units. These integrated units minimize duplication and are proven to be a more efficient and cost-effective method of delivering police services across multiple jurisdictions. Another benefit of the model is to facilitate municipalities in maintaining acceptable levels of community policing.

The Province is currently supporting these initiatives with an annual investment of \$66 million and continues to seek ways to provide enhancements to the current structure.

With regard to your suggestion for replacing the RCMP provincial police force with a 'made in British Columbia' model, there are at least three factors that need to be considered:

- British Columbia would lose the 30 per cent contribution that the federal government pays toward the overall cost of the existing provincial police force;
- The current provincial police force is fundamental to the success of the Province's integrated policing strategy. It provides an essential bridge to the national police force, ensuring a vital link necessary for the success of British Columbia's integrated policing teams; and,

 A provincial police force that is operated in British Columbia would still have to coordinate and integrate with not only the local independent police forces, but also with the national police force.

The Province takes the allegations of police officers facing criminal charges very seriously and this is reflected in legislation. Under the *Police Act*, the police board may, at any time, discontinue the pay and allowances of a municipal constable, chief constable or deputy chief constable who is under suspension for allegations that, if proven, would constitute a criminal offence. The police officer is entitled to receive his or her full pay and allowances for any unpaid period of the suspension if he or she is acquitted of all charges before a criminal court or if the charges are withdrawn, stayed or otherwise not proceeded with.

You may be aware that the federal Commission for Public Complaints Against the RCMP (CPC) and the provincial Office of the Police Complaint Commissioner (OPCC) (which handles complaints against members of the independent municipal police departments) provide formal complaint processes that are external to police agencies. These are independent agencies established to ensure that public complaints against police are handled fairly and impartially. The following website URL outlines more information about the CPC: www.cpc-cpp.gc.ca. You may view the OPCC website at: www.opcc.bc.ca.

It may interest you to know that the Province has been working with the federal government on harmonizing police complaint procedures and strengthening the complaints process through legislative change. I have been in contact with the Honourable Stockwell Day, the former Minister of Public Safety, and will be in touch with the Honourable Peter Van Loan, Minister of Public Safety. I believe the federal government recognizes the need for change. I am also working with the RCMP Commissioner, Mr. William Elliott, on these important issues.

Thank you for taking the time to write. I appreciate receiving your support and ideas to enhance public safety in British Columbia.



The Honourable Gordon Campbell, Premier, has forwarded to me for response your May 8, 2009 e-mail regarding the tragic death of Mr. Robert Dziekanski and your suggestion of a provincial police force.

The events leading to Mr. Dziekanski's unfortunate death have caused many to question police conduct and police response to persons in crisis. I would like to advise you of some of the processes that took place before, and have occurred since, Mr. Dziekanski's death.

As you may know, the independent Commission of Inquiry headed by Appeal Court Justice Thomas R. Braidwood, Q.C. will examine and report on the use, effectiveness and safety of CEWs in British Columbia, and inquire into and provide a public record of the events leading to the death of Mr. Dziekanski. A report on the portion of the inquiry that addresses the use, effectiveness and safety of CEWs is expected by June 30, 2009. More information about the independent Commission of Inquiry is available on the Commission's website at: www.braidwoodinquiry.ca.

In addition, the Chief Coroner for British Columbia has ordered a Coroner's Inquest, as required by law, which will allow for the public presentation of all evidence relating to Mr. Dziekanski's death. The presiding coroner and a five-person jury will hear evidence from subpoenaed witnesses in order to determine the facts surrounding the death. The jury will have the opportunity to make recommendations aimed at preventing deaths under similar circumstances, as well as other relevant recommendations. The date for this inquest is to be confirmed in the near future and will be available on the BC Coroners Service website at: www.pssg.gov.bc.ca/coroners/schedule/index.htm.

The Provincial Integrated Homicide Investigation Team (IHIT), which includes members of both the RCMP and Independent Municipal Police Departments, investigated the incident at the airport to determine if criminal actions occurred. Also, the Ontario Provincial Police reviewed the IHIT investigation at the RCMP's request to ensure its thoroughness and completeness. Moreover, the investigation was overseen by an Independent Civilian Observer, appointed by the Commission for Public Complaints Against the RCMP (CPC) who, upon completion of its assessment, concluded that there were no identified issues related to the impartiality of the investigation. More information about the CPC's Independent Observer Pilot Project is available at: www.cpc-cpp.gc.ca/prr/rep/opp/fsp-rsf/fVancouberlA-eng.aspx.

Finally, the Criminal Justice Branch of the Ministry of Attorney General did not proceed with criminal charges against the officers involved in this incident.

In 2007, Mr. Paul Kennedy, Chair of the CPC, initiated a public complaint into the conduct of the RCMP members present at, or engaged in, the arrest of Mr. Dziekanski at the airport. The CPC will assess conduct of the RCMP members involved in the incident and that of the RCMP officers involved in the criminal investigation of the members involved in the events leading to the death of Mr. Dziekanski. The CPC will also examine the adequacy of the RCMP's policies, procedures and guidelines for the conduct of such an investigation. I am confident that the number and scope of the processes that are currently under way will result in recommendations and actions that will ensure the issues are dealt with appropriately and that similar situations will not occur in the future.

The RCMP has been serving as the Provincial Police Force in British Columbia since 1950. There are over 6,500 RCMP members, as well as over 2,500 police officers in independent police departments, who do an exceptional job every day.

I wish to convey to you that I have confidence in the police and strongly support and recognize their commitment to protecting British Columbians. Police agencies work hard to meet the expectations and service requirements of the communities in which they serve. Police must be responsive to community needs and the large majority of communities speak highly of their police.

I also recognize that policing is complex and officers are often involved in difficult situations where quick decisions must be made, including confrontational situations in which use of force is required. In these situations, errors can occur and police officers must be held accountable for their actions.

There are a number of ways that ensures this accountability. Police officers, like all individuals, are subject to the rule of law and must act within the provisions of the *Constitution Act*, the *Criminal Code of Canada*, and other laws. Police agencies have internal review processes and policies in place to ensure that complaints are recorded and investigated as required. The federal Commission for Public Complaints Against the RCMP and the provincial Office of the Police Complaint Commissioner provide formal complaint processes that are external to police agencies. These are independent agencies established to ensure that public complaints against police are handled fairly and impartially.

The federal government appointed the Brown Task Force to examine governance and cultural change in the RCMP. That report was made public on December 14, 2007 and provided 49 recommendations for renewal. They call for far-reaching changes to the governance, culture and accountability mechanisms of the RCMP. These changes are welcome and necessary, as creating a more responsive and well managed force and will benefit every jurisdiction that receives services from the RCMP.

In addition, the Province has been working with the federal government on harmonizing police complaint procedures and strengthening the complaints process through legislative change. The Solicitor General has been in contact with the Honourable Stockwell Day, the former Minister of Public Safety Canada, and will be in touch with the new Minister, the Honourable Peter Van Loan. I believe the federal government recognizes the need for change. Mr. William Elliott, RCMP Commissioner, is also working with this ministry on these important issues.

Given the different policing models across Canada, it is also important to recognize that each province will strive to establish oversight mechanisms that effectively meet the needs of that individual province. I want to ensure that we have the most appropriate model that meets the needs of all British Columbians.

I appreciate your concerns regarding public safety and thank you for taking the time to write.

I am writing to express my profound disappointment with the recent performance of the RCMP.



The Honourable Rich Coleman, MLA for Fort Langley-Aldergrove, has forwarded for response your May 10, 2009 e-mail regarding police oversight in British Columbia.

I believe that it is important for citizens to have confidence in the police, their investigative abilities, and commitment to protecting British Columbians. There are a number of ways that police officers are held accountable for their actions. I would like to assure you that police officers are not above the law, and can be charged with a criminal offence. Police officers, like all individuals, are subject to the rule of law and must act within the provisions of the *Constitution Act*, the *Criminal Code of Canada*, and other laws.

In order to ensure that police officers are held to account for their actions, police agencies have high standards regarding code of conduct and ethics, and internal review processes and policies are in place to ensure that complaints are recorded and investigated as required. In fact, you may be aware that issues regarding the current process were raised in the Brown Task Force report, "Rebuilding the Trust: Task Force on Governance and Cultural Change in the RCMP," which was released on December 14, 2007. Recommendations in the report included improving the timeliness of the disciplinary and grievance system, and creating one Independent Commission for Complaints and Oversight of the RCMP. You may view the report by visiting the following website address: www.ps-sp.gc.ca/rcmp-grc/report-rapport-eng.aspx.

Moreover, the federal Commission for Public Complaints Against the RCMP and the provincial Office of the Police Complaint Commissioner (which handles complaints against members of the independent municipal police departments) provide formal complaint processes that are external to police agencies. These are independent agencies established to ensure that public complaints against police are handled fairly and impartially.

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It may interest you to know that an amendment was introduced by government on March 4, 2009, in Bill 6 – Police (Misconduct, Complaints, Investigations, Discipline and Proceedings) Amendment Act, 2009.

Government agrees that discipline authorities have a key responsibility in handling complaints under the *Police Act*. Under Bill 6, if a complaint is made directly to the Police Complaint Commissioner, the Commissioner must immediately notify the discipline authority. This will ensure complaints are not incorrectly characterized as internal complaints, and will remove a perception of bias on the part of discipline authorities from the process. It will also help to ensure timelier and appropriate investigations.

With regard to your suggestion for replacing the RCMP provincial police force with a 'made in British Columbia' model, there are at least three factors that need to be considered:

- British Columbia would lose the 30 per cent contribution that the federal government pays toward the overall cost of the existing provincial police force;
- The current provincial police force is fundamental to the success of the Province's integrated policing strategy. It provides an essential bridge to the national police force, ensuring a vital link necessary for the success of British Columbia's integrated policing teams; and,
- A provincial police force that is operated in British Columbia would still have to coordinate and integrate with not only the local independent police forces, but also with the national police force.



There are a number of ways that police officers are held accountable for their actions. Police officers are not above the law, and can be charged with a criminal offence. Police officers, like all individuals, are subject to the rule of law and must act within the provisions of the Constitution Act, the Criminal Code of Canada, and other laws. In order to ensure that police officers are held to account for their actions, police agencies have instituted high standards regarding code of conduct and ethics, as well as internal review processes and policies. These policies and procedures are in place to ensure that complaints are recorded and investigated as required.

To enhance the police complaint process in British Columbia, on September 17, 2009, legislative changes to the *Police Amendment Act* were introduced that will make it easier for the public to file complaints against municipal police officers. This legislation paves the way for broad, independent oversight by British Columbia's Police Complaint Commissioner, which means he will oversee complaint handling from the time it is submitted and provide advice and direction throughout to ensure the public interest is protected. The proposed changes strengthen accountability and transparency by:

- Strengthening the oversight powers of the Office of the Police Complaint Commissioner (OPCC) to ensure serious complaints are properly investigated and resolved by enabling the OPCC to oversee complaints as municipal police investigate them, rather than afterwards;
- Ordering municipal police officers under investigation to provide statements and submit to interviews by investigating officers within five days of a request. Those who refuse risk being charged under the Act or found guilty of further misconduct, such as neglect of duty;
- Increasing maximum suspension without pay for misconduct to 30 days from five; and,
- Compelling the OPCC to arrange a public hearing or review of the record in certain circumstances for example, if the commissioner believes a police chief has erred in findings or applying discipline.

Other updates to the Act include a provision to enhance the Commissioner's ability to work on the harmonization of the provincial and federal process when complaints cross jurisdictions.

With respect to improving the complaint process against members of the RCMP, the federally appointed Brown Task Force report issued, "Rebuilding the Trust: Task Force on Governance and Cultural Change in the RCMP," on December 14, 2007. Recommendations in the report included improving the timeliness of the disciplinary and grievance system, and creating one Independent Commission for Complaints and Oversight of the RCMP. In August 2009, Mr. Paul Kennedy, Chair of the Commission for Public Complaints Against the RCMP, issued a public report "Police Investigating Police: A Chair-initiated complaint and public interest investigation into public concerns about the impartiality of RCMP members conducting criminal investigations into other RCMP members in cases involving serious injury or death." Mr. Kennedy made a series of findings and recommendations intended to enhance the accountability of the RCMP. The Province welcomed Mr. Kennedy's report as a further step towards bolstering police accountability. This report was particularly relevant for British Columbia as over 70 per cent of the province is policed by the RCMP.

It should be noted that the federal Commission for Public Complaints Against the RCMP and the provincial Office of the Police Complaint Commissioner (which handles complaints against members of the independent municipal police departments) provide formal complaint processes that are external to police agencies. These are independent agencies established to ensure that public complaints against police are handled fairly and impartially. I feel the RCMP is a major i-con in this Province as well as Canada.



Thankyou, Sir, for your reply. I would like to make two main points arising out of your comments

- (1) My paper was in regard to municipal policing as opposed to provincial policing but many of the same arguments apply. I have compiled a sustantial list of reasons supporting an argument for a provincial police force but I have not yet reduced it to narrative form. I would be pleased to discuss this with your officials,
- (2) Furge you and your other provincial counterparts to not rely too heavily on federal promises of greater RCMP accountability or any proposed provincial policy which strives for such. I was in the system during past negotiations and while lip service and promises are made. I see the same problems of the past still exist. You might wish to consider that when BC was leading the other western provinces towards reducing/eliminating RCMP contracts, the Commissioner of the RCMP convinced the D/AG that understanding and co-operation would improve if there was an exchange programme of senior managers. Our D/AG argreed. He created the Police Services Branch and a senior federal ADM (who had managed the Security and Inntelligence "desk" of the RCMP) was seconded to BC to manage policing. Not surprisingly, there was no further leadership from BC on the matter of abolishing the RCMP. I wonder if that Deputy ever awoke to the fact that the RCMP had neatly slipped a double agent into his ministry. Of interest, at the time of my retirement many years later, there were no further such exchange secondments.

As I write this on 26 DEC 09 I am aware that a Mr TATCHELL of your Ministry has left a "voice mail" for me during my recent absence. He invites me to call him to "discuss my concerns." Without wishing to play on words, my objective here is simply to offer what expertise I might have gained in some 38 years in various forms of law enforcement which incuded Simply stated, I wish to help, not be part of the problem. I will call Mr

TATCHELL, after the holidays and perhaps your staff would be kind enough to supply him with the previous correspondience.

I am responding to your October 1, 2009 email in which you expressed your support for the creation of a provincial police force. Thank you for taking the time to write with your thoughts and ideas. I apologize for the delay in responding.

The current provincial and municipal RCMP contracts expire in March 2012. The parties aim to have a draft Agreement in Principle by June 2010, allowing nearly two years for final negotiation, ratification and implementation. As you may be aware, the federal government and the contracting provinces and territories are currently engaged in a collaborative, interest-based process to achieve a new policing contract. This

process consists of two phases: an information sharing and research phase, and a negotiation phase. There are three contracts in British Columbia:

- 1) the Provincial Police Services Agreement (PPSA) is the agreement for provincial police services between the federal and provincial governments;
- 2) the Municipal Police Agreement is the agreement for municipal police services between the federal and provincial governments (only British Columbia has this arrangement other Provinces allow the federal government to contract directly with their municipalities); and,
- 3) the Municipal Police Unit Agreements are individual police unit agreements between the provincial government and municipalities over 5,000 population that elect to be policed by the RCMP.

British Columbia cochairs the Contract Advisory Committee with Public Safety Canada, whereby every Province and Territory with an RCMP Contract has a seat on the committee. The key themes of the negotiation from the Provinces' and Territories' perspective are:

- Changing the relationship between the contracting partners from elientbased to partnership (this will be reflected in the new Preamble to the agreement);
- Expanding on the operational and financial accountability mechanisms in the agreement; and,
- Cost containment.

Attaining agreement on contract language that supports these three key themes is critical to British Columbia. The Province has also expressed a strong desire for a new RCMP complaints process to be in place prior to the new Contract being signed. Public Safety Canada has engaged in fairly extensive policy development consultations with Provinces and Territories. A local government representative, Mr. Murray Dinwoodie, has been selected by the Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) to keep municipalities apprised of the contract renewal process. Mr. Dinwoodie attends the Contract Advisory Committee meetings as an observer and provides the British Columbia Negotiating Team with municipal input gathered through a working group established by the UBCM.

Given the different policing models across Canada, it is also important to recognize that each province will strive to establish oversight mechanisms that effectively meet the needs of that individual province. I want to ensure that we have the most appropriate model that meets the needs of all British Columbians.



I am responding to your February 10, 2010 letter regarding police accountability. Thank you for taking the time to share your views and for enclosing the newspaper articles. There are a number of ways that police officers are held accountable for their actions. Police officers are not above the law, and can be charged with a criminal offence. Police officers, like all individuals, are subject to the rule of law and must act within the provisions of the *Constitution Act*, the *Criminal Code of Canada*, and other laws. A transparent and accountable police complaints process is integral to ensuring public confidence in police.

While our *Police Act* Amendment is new, the scrutiny it reflects and responds to is not. Police accountability was the theme of Judge Joe Wood's review of British Columbia's complaint process, and it is also reflected in the recent Braidwood commission report on TASER use. The changes will increase independent civilian oversight of the police complaint process and British Columbia's municipal forces.

British Columbia's police complaint commissioner will now oversee complaint-handling from the time a complaint is submitted – and provide advice and direction throughout, to protect the public interest. The expanded complaint process will also make it easier for the public to file complaints. Notably, this legislation affects all of our municipal police. We expect equity and consistency in investigating all police complaints in British Columbia.

We anticipate that Ottawa will be moving forward with legislation for the RCMP that allows for delegation of the RCMP complaint process to the Province. In the interim, the RCMP is putting in place policy that allows for delegation to the provinces. We have advised the federal government that we want the new legislation in place regarding RCMP complaints before we sign the new contract.

I am pleased that the BC Association of Chiefs of Police brought forward a proposal to form a civilian-led integrated unit of both RCMP and municipal officers to investigate the criminal aspects of police involved incidents leading to serious injury or death. We are examining the feasibility of their proposal and the many issues surrounding it, including funding and resources and how we work with municipal and federal governments who have a role to play as well. However, we also want to make sure that we have the best model for British Columbia, and that we are able to consider all of the most relevant information – so it is important that we allow Commissioner Braidwood to finish the second part of his public inquiry and so that we will have the benefit of his recommendations.

I am responding to your March 22, 2011 e-mails regarding your concerns about police accountability and your support for a provincial police force.

I am confident the vast majority of RCMP officers in this province perform their job with a high degree of integrity and respect for British Columbians. I am also aware of the concerns related to the accountability and oversight of the RCMP when it comes to the conduct of officers in serious incidents. The provincial government is working to address these concerns.

In June 2010, Justice Thomas R. Braidwood, QC, released a report from the commission of inquiry into the death of Mr. Robert Dziekanski at the Vancouver International Airport. Justice Braidwood recommended that the Province create a civilian-led Independent Investigations Office (IIO) to investigate all municipal police and RCMP related deaths and serious incidents across British Columbia. The Province supported this recommendation and is working towards creating the new IIO based on the principles recommended by the Braidwood Commission.

As you are aware, the RCMP contract will expire in 2012. The Province is currently discussing renewal of the contract with Public Safety Canada. A draft agreement is being developed concurrently with the negotiations that support the three themes of the negotiation: changing the relationship from client-based to a full partnership; expanding on the operational and financial accountability mechanisms in the agreement; and cost containment. In the new agreement the Province will retain its current authority to determine the size of the provincial force and its goals, objectives and priorities. The key issue that British Columbia has identified is the need for greater transparency and accountability. We are pleased with the progress the negotiating teams are making.

There is mutual benefit to contract policing as an effective national policing model to address the cross jurisdictional (i.e., municipal, provincial, territorial, national and international) and evolving nature of crime. Some of the other benefits include:

- Facilitating the flow of intelligence between all levels of policing;
- Having a direct connection, through the RCMP, between local, national and international policing that is important to modern policing and security of infrastructure and communities;
- Having RCMP members available for redeployment; and
- Sharing the costs and use of common police and administrative services.

The Province is committed to ensuring that the public have confidence in policing and we will continue our efforts to ensure that we have effective and accountable police services in British Columbia.

As a retired police officer it is clear, no matter how much the government of BC and its cities are addicted to the cheap contract policing it gets from the RCMP, that major changes are needed in BC's law enforcement community. Thank you for your e-mail regarding your concerns with law enforcement in British Columbia. I apologize for the delay in responding.

With regard to your concerns about the renewal of the RCMP contract which will expire in 2012. The government of British Columbia and local governments across the province share your concerns about the terms in the final contract. We want the federal government and the RCMP to work as co-operative and consultative partners.

The provinces and territories, and their municipalities, believe that as true partners, we can help to curb escalating costs and ensure effective, efficient and accountable policing. Together, we remain committed to resolving our differences with Public Safety Canada and to establishing a mutually beneficial agreement. The representative of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities on our provincial negotiating team continues to participate in all negotiation meetings and to help shape our negotiating strategy. At their recent annual convention, the municipalities made it clear that their preference is to continue negotiations to retain the RCMP.

There is mutual benefit to contract policing as an effective national policing model to address the cross jurisdictional (i.e., municipal, provincial, territorial, national and international) and evolving nature of crime. Some of the other benefits include:

- Facilitating the flow of intelligence between all levels of policing;
- Having a direct connection, through the RCMP, between local, national and international policing that is important to modern policing and security of infrastructure and communities;
- Having a large group of RCMP members available for redeployment in the event of emergencies or large events; and,
- Sharing the costs and use of common police and administrative services.

We remain optimistic that a mutually beneficial RCMP agreement will be negotiated with Public Safety Canada.

Your e-mail raises concerns with the British Columbia Shcriff Services, in particular, shcriffs providing highway patrol, Shcriffs Services not assisting the police during the riot in Vancouver at the Stanley Cup final hockey game and staffing levels.

The Vancouver City police had primary jurisdiction of the policing of the riots and did not request the assistance of BC Sheriff Services. However, if requested, we would have provided assistance. The Province of British Columbia is not in a position to compel Sheriff Services to assist in situations that are not within our jurisdiction.

The former Attorney General directed the Ministry of Attorney General to restore the hours for auxiliary and part-time deputy sheriffs to former levels. As well, we are in the process of training 36 new deputy sheriffs for the province, including three in Prince George, two in Fort St. John and one in Smithers. An additional intake of new recruits will be considered in the new year.

With regard to your concerns about judges, in the past two years, the government has appointed 14 new judges in communities across the province including five new Provincial Court judge appointments for the Lower Mainland, Okanagan and Northern British Columbia. Information about these five appointments can be found in the following News Release: www2.news.gov.bc.ca/news_releases_2009-2013/2011AG0019-000922.pdf.

These five appointments are in addition to the nine appointments made last year in response to the Provincial Court of British Columbia's request for additional judges. These appointments will help reduce the time it takes court cases to go to trial so they can be heard in a timely way. Further, judges are also being rotated into communities where needed to ensure court hearings proceed.

Decisions regarding Provincial Court sitting time and additional scheduled Provincial Court days are the responsibility of the Office of the Chief Judge of the Provincial Court of British Columbia. Court Services Branch staff does their best with the judicial schedules provided to them to have matters heard in a timely fashion.

The present economic situation makes it challenging to expand judicial resources. To help reduce the pressure on the courts, we are streamlining court procedures and using digital technology to improve access, increase efficiency and enhance justice system integration.



Good afternoon Mr. Bloy,

riding. I wanted to take this opportunity to discuss a few issues that have been concerning me.

I read in the news about the resigning of David Hahn, CEO of BC Ferries.

I hope the provincial government uses this as an opportunity to get BC Ferries under control. I would use this service more often, but the prohibitive cost (especially for taking my car across) means that I am simply unable to visit Vancouver Island as often as I would otherwise like. Regaining a focus of the underlying purpose of the BC ferry system (providing an affordable means to link otherwise inaccessible parts of this province) is paramount. The talk in the news about providing a luxury product for tourism purposes is completely off the mark for what the crown ferry company needs to be providing.

I have also heard the news from BC's Solicitor General Shirley Bond that the federal government has been threatening to withdraw RCMP services if a deal cannot be reached. I sincerely hope that the government is using this opportunity to reconsider the creation of a provincial police force (much like the OPP in Ontario or the SQ in Québec). With the problems that we have had in BC with the RCMP, as well as their complete disdain for provincial oversight (which the Robert Dziekański incident succinctly demonstrates), I think we would be better served with a police force that answers to the people of British Columbia. The counter-example is the Vancouver Police Department, which has made public steps to be accountable to the people they serve, and I have been very impressed at the progress they have made.

Finally, I hope that the BC Liberal government doesn't use the recent HST referendum results to react spitefully towards the people of British Columbia. Please understand that my peers who voted against it did so because they did not appreciate the deceptive and adversarial method in which it was introduced, and the arrogance of the provincial government in the face of public criticism. The government was not willing to compromise until it was facing a referendum, at which time trust was lost and it was too late. I think it is obvious to most people that the current provincial tax scheme needs to be updated, but future efforts need to be done in a transparent manner with public consultations and done such that the resulting taxation scheme is fair (and isn't regressive, as the current HST system is to a certain extent). I have no problem paying taxes, as I appreciate getting services from the government, but shouldering \$350/yr (per family, on average [1]) more tax burden on the citizens of British Columbia when wages are not keeping up with the increasing cost of living isn't fair.

I hope you had a good summer, and I wish you all the best in the fall session of the legislature. I had the pleasure of touring the British Columbia Parliament buildings over the summer, and it was quite enjoyable. I look forward to meeting you in person sometime in the near future.



Good morning Premier Clark,

I am live in your riding of Vancouver-Point Grey and am writing you because I am particularly concerned about the state of the RCMP in the Province of British Columbia.

As you know, the BC Government is currently negotiating a new long-term contract for police services in BC with the RCMP. These negations have recently been in the news [1], with the Solicitor General Shirley Bond reporting that the federal government is using strong-arm negotiation tactics and threats of withdrawing services if a contract isn't negotiated soon. I am writing to implore the BC Government to begin planning to replace the RCMP with a provincial police force, much like the OPP in Ontario or the SQ in Québec, rather

than renewing their contract with the RCMP. I believe that a provincial police force would better serve the people of British Columbia, in part being more accountable to the citizenry than the RCMP is.

The most glaring example of the lack of accountability with the BC RCMP has been, of course, been the case of Robert Dziekański. In that case, the RCMP officers colluded to both use both excessive force on Mr. Dziekański, and after killing him, colluded about what happened during subsequent investigations and inquiries and have thus far skirted any responsibility in the name of federal jurisdiction. We have just passed 4 years since the event and nobody has been disciplined, much less charged. There has been two recently stories in the news [2][3] showing disgraceful and borderline criminal behavior by the RCMP in British Columbia. In both cases, rather than having their negligent behavior addressed by proper discipline, they have been handed a slap on the wrist.

An editorial this past weekend in the Globe & Mail [4] succinctly summarizes the situation - "Despite repeated assurances that it had learned from the many controversies and embarrassments that have torn at its integrity in the past few years, it would appear the RCMP was taught very little."

I believe that the former Solicitor General, Kash Heed, was on the right track for "want[ing] all police agencies in British Columbia, including the Mounties, governed by the same accountability rules of the B.C. Police Act" [5]. The residents of British Columbia deserve a police force that is working for them and is accountable to them, not to a minister in Ottawa.

The counter example of the RCMP abuses has been the work of the Vancouver Police Department under Chief Jim Chu and mayor Gregor Robertson to do better for the people of Vancouver. I appreciate the VDP's "meet and greet" approach that has been in place since the Olympics. Police presence in the Vancouver entertainment district on the weekend is friendly rather than provocative, and it is very effective at stopping problems early. I was impressed at the recent firing and prosecution of a corrupt VPD police officer, particularly because the VPD publicly apologized to the public and denounced his behavior [6]. This is the kind of accountability we need in British Columbia

This is not to say that there hasn't been cases recently of bad cops being ineffectively disciplined for gross misconduct within municipal police forces within Metro Vancouver [7][8]. However, I believe that the first step to ensuring that abuses by the police forces within British Columbia is addressed is to first establish a culture of accountability, which cannot exist with the current RCMP being above provincial jurisdiction.

In summation, I believe that the evidence speaks for itself about how the RCMP is simply not good for the people of British Columbia. The citizens of this province deserve a police force that works for and is accountable to them. The ending of the present contracts with the RCMP makes this an ideal opportunity for British Columbia to transition to a provincial police force, which the government should begin work on immediately.



Public safety and other justice sector agencies regularly interact and collaborate in managing matters of common interest. Due to the complex nature of the business of the various law enforcement agencies, it would prove very challenging to train all employees to meet the legislative requirements and varied demands of these different fields of enforcement. Correctional officers, for example, receive comprehensive months-long training upon hire and are expected to regularly upgrade their training in order to acquire and maintain the skills and expertise to meet the ever-changing demands of the job. There are similar expectations of employees with the other enforcement agencies. Expecting an individual to acquire comprehensive knowledge of training associated with all law enforcement agencies would be onerous. A failure to achieve this end could compromise public safety.



Dear Premier,

Hello.



This is in regard to the current discussions about British Columbia having it's own provincial police service. I would just like to share my view on the matter. I will try to keep this really short as I know your time is much in demand.

I believe having a provincial police service is the way forward for British Columbia. Here's why I think so (in a very very short email):

Operationally

I don't even know where to start in this area.

There is much to be said about how police services work here in BC. A single police service would greatly speed up the service that they would provide to the general public. The time it takes for police to react to a given situation, especially if it crosses jurisdiction, just takes forever. Not only does it waste so much resources (calling out multiple units that could have been done when one police service could have done the job) the "bad guy" could be gone by the time the call is relayed to the next jurisdiction. This is common in the current police setup.

With one police service, the call for service would be instant as there is only one "source" for the call for service. There is no lag time and all the red tape that comes with it. I think the general public would be happier if the police can act in a quick manner instead of waiting for ages.

The distribution of resources can also mean better service. More officers can be assigned in areas that need more attention.

I wish I can write more in this area but I think I'd be writing a whole book.

Administration

Consolidation of administrative duties can also be an area of great cost reduction. Admittedly, it may be at the cost of some jobs however that is part re-engineering and achieving the service with less resources. Some areas that may scale down are human resources, clerical work, court liason positions, property management, information technology, command center,...etc.

Set Up Costs

Initial setup cost may look gigantic from a certain point of view. However if the savings in other areas can be highlighted then a better picture can be seen. It would be critical that the way it is introduced to the public is proper. Like any change if it is presented properly I believe the change can be accepted with less resistance. I know I have presented it in an over simplified manner but if there is one question that the general public will ask is - how much is it going to cost?. If it can be shown as "how much are going to save and what do we get in return" then the idea should grow and in the end hopefully accepted.

Transition

I believe that a phased transition would be best instead of a "big bang" transition. Maybe smaller departments can be transitioned in initially then move slowly into the bigger departments. Structurally, at the lower levels at least, they would be working the same and would be business as usual. The extent of the changes on top management would remain to be seen. Top jobs may be redundant so although this will have to dealt with it is still part of streamlining the whole thing. Each "city" would probably be treated as a district and would have its own detachment. So as I see it some things would still be around however this would be a chance to remove anything that would not be needed (which would still be part of the streamlining process). As it exists now most municipal services mirror each other in structure so I don't really see any "big" change. Costs saving would generally come into the removal of redundant services - admin, ident, major crimes.... etc. Its hard to put this down into one paragraph but its really a chance to "clean up" the structure which I believe will bring costs down.

Paying Up

A lot of discussion has to be done as to the distribution of costs or how each area is going to pay for the services rendered. It would depend on how the government decides! guess. Maybe a cost center model? Or based on population? Or on calls for service? I'm not sure on the right formula but I do know that it can still be sorted if the will is there to do this.

I know this is an over simplified version of what has to be done but the meat of the matter is here. I can discuss this for days as I am passionate about the topic. However I'd like to stress that I believe this change can be done in a short time frame. The units are out there working already it's a matter of aligning management, reengineering those changes and trimming the fat. I think everyone wants an effective and efficient police service. At this time where people are scraping the bottom of the barrel, I believe its time that a streamlined BC police service be created without sacrificing the quality of service that is being provided by the current municipal police services.

Good luck Madam Premier. I have confidence that your administration will come to what is best for British Columbia.

However, no matter If it is decided that we will retain RCMP or convert to Provincial Police, I believe it will be for the best. If ONE police force is chosen for BC.







Negotiations have been underway, with the Federal Government, in regard to a renewed contract for policing by the RCMP for almost two years now. The recent stand, proposed by the Federal Government of, take it or leave it is unacceptable to the citizens of B.C.. It certainly is time to start implementation toward a Provincial Police force that is accountable to the citizens and government of B.C.. The RCMP, in B.C., seem to have taken a turn for the worse recently and are accountable to no one. The recent string of questionable conduct and deaths of perpetrators in custody is a sign that all is not well within the organization.

The establishment of a Provincial Police force is most likely a monumental task. It could be undertaken in increments however. For instance why do we require the RCMP to carry out traffic enforcement and highway patrol. My observations show me that the RCMP are currently only doing an adequate job in most areas in this field. For example, I travel a lot through several communities here on Vancouver Island daily, particularly Chemainus and Ladysmith. The highway speed limit through these communities is 80 and 70 kms per hour respectively. There is very little to no police presence and traffic moves through these communities at dangerous speeds exceeding 100 kms per hour all day long. Surely a provincial traffic force could do a better job and at a more reasonable cost.

Alternatively let communities police their own speed limits through changes in the law that would allow them to do so through bylaw enforcement officers or a sheriff type structure. Communities could pay for this alternative through the monies collected from violators. The province could also pay for traffic enforcement strictly through the monies collected in fines. The Province made a big mistake when it dropped the photo radar program for political expediency. Radar is simply another tool to allow monitoring of a greater number of vehicles then an officer can cover with a car. The problem that occurred was that the RCMP tried to monitor all traffic with photo radar versus adding to the arsenal of tools available. Police presence on the roads is and will always be required.

I believe the above concepts are worth consideration at this point in time and could reduce the cost of having the RCMP in the Province. By removing traffic, it would allow the RCMP to concentrate on the bigger crimes they don't seem to have enough time or officers for. I realize that a complete replacement of the RCMP is to large an undertaking to be achieved in a short period of time but we must start somewhere. Traffic enforcement seems to be a natural place to start.

Dear Ms. Minister,

The time has come for British Columbia to accept the fact we can't afford the R.C.M.P. anymore because the Federal Government has again decreased their yearly grants and the provinces have to make up the tab. The Mountie's unique quality uniforms and upkeep, costs considerably more to maintain than a provincial police. Ontario, Quebec and Newfound Land and Labrador realized that situation many years ago and formed their own provincial forces to better meet the costs and needs of their province. I wonder if Ottawa is trying to tell us to do the same?

The cost of the colourful world famous Mountie's uniform is only one reason for changing to a local provincial force. This 4,000 mile wide country needs special and different services of our diversity. Since the federal government assists financially they also have a say in administration and law enforcements which is really best taken care by a local forces. Having our own force would avoid the constant assistance, approval and orders from Ottawa. I am responding to your e-mail regarding renewal of the RCMP contract which will expire in 2012. The government of British Columbia and local governments across the province share your concerns about the terms in the final contract. We want the federal government and the RCMP to work as co-operative and consultative partners.

The provinces and territorics, and their municipalities, believe that as true partners, we can help to curb escalating costs and ensure effective, efficient and accountable policing. Together, we remain committed to resolving our differences with Public Safety Canada and to establishing a mutually beneficial agreement. The representative of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities on our provincial negotiating team continues to participate in all negotiation meetings and to help shape our negotiating strategy. At their recent annual convention, the municipalities made it clear that their preference is to continue negotiations to retain the RCMP.

There is mutual benefit to contract policing as an effective national policing model to address the cross jurisdictional (i.e., municipal, provincial, territorial, national and international) and evolving nature of crime. Some of the other benefits include:

- Facilitating the flow of intelligence between all levels of policing;
- Having a direct connection, through the RCMP, between local, national and international policing that is important to modern policing and security of infrastructure and communities;

- Having a large group of RCMP members available for redeployment in the event of emergencies or large events; and
- Sharing the costs and use of common police and administrative services.
