Background

- Creation and Membership:
 - In 2013, BC, Ontario, and Canada agreed to establish a national securities regulator or "co-operative capital markets regulatory system). Since then, New Brunswick, Saskatchewan, PEI, and Yukon have joined.
 - Head offices will be located in Toronto with a nationally integrated management team.

Quebec Court Challenge

 In May, the Quebec Court of Appeal found the national securities regulator to be unconstitutional

Background:

- BC is consistently ranked among one of the least affordable markets in Canada for housing affordability.
- Point2Homes, an online real estate market, has released a report comparing median home price in various markets to the median family income. Vancouver was ranked the least affordable city in North America, with median home price of over \$1.1 million, and a median family income of \$63,944.
- Demographia uses a median comparison to rank housing affordability worldwide. Their 2017 survey ranked Vancouver as the third least affordable city.
- Victoria, Fraser Valley, and Kelowna were all ranked on Demographia's survey as "severely unaffordable", with median ratios of 8.1, 7.1, and 6.4, respectively.

Actions to make housing more affordable:

- Legislation to amend the fixed-term lease loophole, tabled Oct. 26, will
 retrospectively close this loophole so tenants currently in fixed term leases will
 not be forcibly evicted at the end of their lease term.
- Funding for 1,700 affordable housing units (\$208 million) and 2,000 modular units (\$291 million) was announced in Budget Update 2017.
- This funding was new spending that was not included in Budget 2017, tabled by the previous government.
- New funding for the Residential Tenancy Branch was also introduced in Budget Update 2017.

Supporting Renters

Highlights:

- The Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing is working with partners, including the Ministry of Finance, to develop a comprehensive strategy to address affordability in the housing market.
- Legislation to amend the fixed-term lease loophole, which can be used to increase rent more than the annual limit, was introduced in the House on Oct. 26.
- Media reports on census data shows that there has been an increase in nonpermanent residents in Metro-Vancouver, which some housing experts say contributes to the overheated rental market.

Background:

- A survey from Rentseekers (an online rental listing site)
- Local governments are responsible for ensuring a suitable supply of housing, in a range of types and locations, to meet community needs now and in the future.
- Communities accomplish this goal through land use planning, ensuring an adequate supply of suitably zoned land, regulating development and providing services.
- Key concepts considered include zoning, development approvals and community amenity contributions.
- Legislation to amend the fixed-term lease loophole, tabled on Oct. 26, will
 retrospectively close this loophole so tenants currently in fixed term leases will
 not be forcibly evicted at the end of their lease term.

Previous government record on fixed term lease loophole:

- In Fall 2016, then Housing Minister Rich Coleman (current Leader of the Official Opposition), stated that he would close the fixed term lease loophole by the spring session.
- In March 2017, however, Coleman backed away from the commitment, stating that it was too complicated as leases fell under contract law (see quotes above.)

MSP Elimination Task Force

Highlights:

• The opposition has claimed the elimination of MSP will mean tax hikes on the middle class.

Background:

- In 2000, the MSP premium for a single individual was \$36/month but by 2016 that amount had risen to \$75/month – more than double.
- Under the previous government, MSP revenues were almost as much as corporate income tax revenues.

- Budget update 2017 announced a 50% cut to MSP premiums effective Jan 1,
 2018. This will save individuals up to \$450 a year and families up to \$900 a year.
- The budget update also raised the income threshold below which households are exempt from MSP so that a senior couple with income up to \$35,000, or a single parent with two children making up to \$32,000 will pay no premiums.

- The task force is chaired by Lindsay Tedds, associate professor in the school of public administration at the University of Victoria and a research fellow in the school of public policy at the University of Calgary.
- Other panel members include David Duff, professor of law and director of the tax LLM program at the Peter A. Allard School of Law at UBC, and Paul Ramsey, an academic and former MLA who was a visiting professor in political science at the University of Northern British Columbia.
- In a Nov 3rd interview with CBC Almanac, Task Force chair Lindsay Tedds suggested the panel could discus recommending a move towards an HST. s.13
- In the Oct 15th BC Liberal leadership debate, Sam Sullivan said "I have some ideas on taxation. It's an idea that has been rehearsed here and it is considered a toxic issue for many people, but it's the HST...I've developed the concept of the MST – the modified sales tax – which is basically HST minus haircuts and Chinese food."
