Dear Mr. Minister and Members of the Legislature,

I am writing to ensure you and your colleagues are aware of the planned closing of the RapAttack Base Camp effective next spring.

Being involved in politics for many years, I understand the political arm of government isn't always aware of the daily

decisions within the bureaucratic and administrative arm of government.

The deputy director of B C Wildfire, Mr. Murray Henry and the Kamloops Fire Centre Manager, Mr. Cliff Chapman, recently

visited the Rap Attack Base camp in Salmon Arm and notified team members that the lodging and cookhouse on the government owned property will be closed for the use of the fire crew staff next year in order to standardize or ensure

CONSISTENCY for all B C Wildfire Services bases and crews in the Province.

The camp in Salmon Arm has 20 cabins and a cook/eating house built at a cost to taxpayers of at least \$500,000.00. It has provided accommodations to at least 40 Rapattack fire fighters who do pay/reimburse the Province for the room and board costs. I understand rental accommodations in Salmon Arm simply aren't available especially during the busy fire fighting season when tourists take up most spots. A check on Further, when these RapAttack team members return from various dangerous spots, they are tired and appreciate the instant availability of wholesome food stocked at the camp.

Question: In the name of 'standardization or consistency', why ever would the Province close a facility that is providing room and board to staff in a small town where it is difficult to obtain or unavailable? It is common place for the private sector to provide specific board and lodging camps to its employees where needed. What is the justification for such a decision? The base also provides food and accomodation to the pilots and engineers for three of the provincially contracted 'medium' helicopters, as per the government contract. If the aircrew are also moved off base, then lodged and fed by government per diems, it would cost the government \$1200 per day for the six aircrew. Further, the base cabins and food services are currently used to lodge ministry staff from around the province, when the base often plays host to multiple training course for staff high in the BC Wildfire ranks.

I appreciate some camps in B C don't have these facilities. However, must we REDUCE an excellent functioning camp to the LOWEST common denominator in the Province? Or, is the government going to offer other board and room options to employees AT A GREATER COST to taxpayers? Where was this decision initiated? Is this an example of senior bureaucrats in Victoria who are NOT IN THE FIELD and who haven't thought through the repercussions of a decision to close this camp issuing directives to their staff further down the line?

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Is that what our government is going to do with its SURPLUS funds? This may seem like 'small potatoes' but it is JUST these kinds of SILLY decisions that drive supporters and voters in general crazy!

ISSUE: ELIMINATION OF ACCOMMODATION AND MEAL PROVISION TO BRITISH COLUMBIA WILDFIRE SERVICE STAFF AT THE RAPPEL BASE IN SALMON ARM

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's, the Rappel Program within the Province's BC Wildfire Service (BCWS) moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent was to create a firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of rappelling into incidents via helicopters. Part of this program included full catering of meals and provision of accommodation on the base for the Rappel Program staff. When the program was first moved to Salmon Arm in 1970, the city itself was not set up to provide meals and accommodations, but has since developed into a relatively large urban centre.

Historically, accommodations have been provided as an incentive to recruit and retain staff in remote locations. As such BCWS currently provides subsidized housing in Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Dease Lake and Princeton. In accordance with Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) rules these accommodations have been provided at less than market rate. The city of Salmon Arm falls outside of the CRA prescribed areas for Housing Benefits Paid (CRA Form 4054). BCWS does not provide catering services to any other bases.

In short, the Salmon Arm Rappel Base is the only BCWS base that provides full catering of meals and accommodation to staff. The City of Salmon Arm has a higher rental apartment and townhouse vacancy rate than many other locations that house crews. A similar standalone program, Parattack, does not supply full catering of meals or accommodations to its staff in Fort St. John. Cost aside, the decision was made September 7, 2016 to eliminate accommodation and meal provision at this base to align the Rappel base and staff with the majority of other BCWS base locations across British Columbia (BC). This decision will come into effect January 1st, 2017.

DISCUSSION:

Providing full catering of meals and provision of accommodations to staff in a community where these services are available is an unnecessary expense and is not consistent government standards of fiscal restraint. Elimination of full catering and accommodation for the crews in Salmon Arm will reduce costs and contribute to a culture of consistent treatment of all staff. Even though staff do pay for their board and lodging, it is still an annual net cost to government of \$119,000. When crews (both firefighting and air crews) are working in other locations, they are provided with per diems as per the contract.

There are 4 locations provincially within BCWS that provide rental incentives for housing – Alexis Creek, Fort Nelson, Dease Lake and Princeton. These locations are unique because they are either difficult to recruit locations and/or rental availability is challenging due to remoteness or industrial activity. None of these four locations have the option for government provided catering.

There are no other locations which have BCWS crews located in them similar in size and demographic to Salmon Arm that allow live on accommodations (e.g. Williams Lake, Vernon, Penticton, Parksville, Fort St. John). Salmon Arm is considered an urban centre as defined as having a population of 10,000 people or more by the Canadian Housing and Mortgage Corporation (CMHC). In a review of vacancy rates across BC in communities of similar size to Salmon Arm that also house BCWF staff Salmon Arm has median vacancy rates. Government does not provide accommodation in communities of Salmon Arm's Size, even in areas with low summer vacancy.

RESPONSE POINTS:

- The Provincial Government's Wildfire Service has recently made the decision to eliminate the provision of accommodation and meals to the staff at the Rappel base in Salmon Arm.
- The Rappel base is the only location in the province that currently provides a catering option for staff.
- Making this change will bring Salmon Arm into line with other BCWS centres of the same size and population.
- Making this change in Salmon Arm will bring Provincial consistency where staff are responsible for finding their own accommodation.
- Government must be responsive to tax payer funds. There is a net cost to the tax payer of approximately \$119,000 annually to provide live on accommodation and catering to the Rappel program.
- This decision will also eliminate perceived preferred treatment and allow the Rappel program to operate as most other locations in the province.
- The infrastructure will be repurposed by BCWS to meet operational needs.

BACKGROUND:

The initial attack crews in the Salmon Arm office of the BC Wildfire Service (BCWS) have been provided accommodations and meals since the late 1970's. BCWS has been engaged in a process to eliminate the provision of these services to staff in all bases across the Province, except for remote areas without available services (Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Dease Lake and Princeton). Salmon Arm is the last BCWS base in this process. The provision of accommodation and meals has an annual cost to government of \$119,000 after staff contributions. During the 2015 fire season, a review of the catering of meals for staff in the Salmon Arm office was conducted and staff within the office were involved. The results of the review were considered in making the decision to eliminate provision of accommodation and catering for staff in the Salmon Arm office. s.13

On September 7th, 2016, the Deputy Director of BCWS attended a staff meeting at the Salmon Arm office to deliver the decision to eliminate accommodation and catering services staff, effective January 1st, 2017. ISSUE: Catering service and living accommodations for staff at the FLNRO Salmon Arm Rappel

Base.

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's, the Rappel Program moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent was to create an elite firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of rappelling into incidents via helicopters. Part of this program included full catering of meals and provision of accommodation on the base for the Rappel Program staff. The annual net costs to Government (after staff contributions) to supply these services exceeds \$119,000.00 annually.

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The Salmon Arm Rappel Base is the only BCWS base that provides full catering of meals and accommodations to staff in a community that has sufficient private resources to fulfil the need. A similar standalone program Parattack does not supply full catering of meals or accommodations to its staff in Fort St John BC which has a more challenging private accommodation market.

DISCUSSION:

Providing full catering of meals and provision of accommodations to staff in a community where these services are readily available is an unnecessary expense and has led to a general feeling of special treatment amongst BCWS staff, creating a barrier between Rappel and other firefighting crews around the Province. Elimination of full catering and accommodation for the Rappel crews will reduce costs and contribute to a culture of consistent treatment of all staff regardless of position or title..

- The ministry is not closing the rap-attackRapattackthe Salmon Arm Bbase; , the
 decision was made to phase-out catering services and accommodation services for
 the crews stationed there.
- As part of a comprehensive review to ensure best use of taxpayers' dollars, and due to Salmon Arm no longer being <u>classified as</u> a remote location, the decision was made to phase out catering services (January 2017) and accommodation services (January 2018) at Salmon Arm.
- The decision to phase out catering and accommodation will not affect fire response capability. We remain committed to keeping the base open, and to continue operating the rapattack program with the same number of staff as last year.

KEY FACTS REGARDING THE ISSUE:

In Fall 2016, the BC Wildfire Service communicated its decision to discontinue catering services at the Salmon Arm base effective Jan. 1, 2017 and to discontinue accommodation services at the base effective Jan. 1, 2018. These decisions resulted in speculation in the community that there were plans to close the base altogether.

In 2016, there were 35 personnel stationed at the Salmon Arm base. There are firefighters stationed at the base, and it is the provincial rapattack training centre. Although the rapattack program is based in Salmon Arm, it_i's considered a provincial resource and its crews can be deployed anywhere they_a're needed in B.C.

Background: Ceatering and accommodations services

Basic accommodations and meals had been provided to Salmon Arm initial attack crews since the late 1970s. At that time, Salmon Arm was considered to be a "remote" location, but that <u>i</u>'s no longer the case. The region has developed significantly over the past four decades and suitable rental units and

food options are available in Salmon Arm and surrounding areas.

The BC Wildfire Service does not provide full catering at any of its other locations and only provides subsidized accommodations in remote areas or where there are staff recruiting challenges (currently in Alexis Creek, Fort Nelson, Dease Lake and Princeton). Based on Canada Revenue Agency rulings regarding non-taxable benefits for subsidized accommodations in remote or isolated areas, Salmon Arm is not considered a remote location.

Therefore, to ensure <u>fair and equitable treatment of all staff and to prudent fiscal management.</u> the best use of taxpayers' dollars, the decision was made to discontinue catering and accommodations at the base.

These decisions were the result of a comprehensive review and will save the government about \$119,000 per year. There will also be significant savings in utility and maintenance costs.

Background: Rrapattack program

Rapattack ("rappel attack") firefighters are deployed by helicopter to fight wildfires in remote or inaccessible areas of the province, rappelling down to the ground while the helicopter hovers above them.

These highly trained and versatile crews provide a vital service that helps the BC Wildfire Service protect communities, resources and infrastructure. On larger wildfires, they <u>may'll</u> also build helicopter landing pads so additional crews and equipment can be strategically positioned around the <u>perimeter of a fire's perimeter</u>. Rapattack firefighters can remain on a fire site for up to 24 hours without being resupplied.

British Columbia's rapattack program was established in 1977. Initial attack crews are based at 33 different locations throughout B.C., but Salmon Arm is home to the province's only dedicated rapattack base in the province.

The BC Wildfire Service mobilizes its firefighting resources to respond to anticipated wildfire activity.

This summer, the Salmon Arm Fire Zone and the Vernon Fire Zone have been merged into one operational area. While the outlying borders of the zones have remained unchanged, the border that formerly separated the two zones has been removed. This change was made in order to ensure that the British Columbia Wildfire Service is using the most effective resources available and responding as efficiently as possible to wildfires in each area of the Kamloops Fire Centre. Over the last 10 years, over 80 per cent of the hectares burnt between the Salmon Arm and Vernon Fire Zones fell within the old Vernon Fire Zone boundary. In order to streamline how quickly resources can be launched to an incident, both areas are now being managed out of the Vernon fire base where majority of firefighting personnel are located.

One 20 person Unit Crew and three Initial Attack Crews remain based out of the Vernon fire base and the Salmon Arm base will continue to host the Provincial Rappel Attack Crews. There will be no changes to the number and location of firefighters within these Zones and response will not be reduced in any capacity. The amalgamated Zone will soon receive a new name that reflects both operational areas.

It is our belief that this change will not negatively affect any of the BC Wildfire Service's stakeholders and partners but will instead enhance our protection and prevention capabilities. Please contact Glen Burgess at 250 554-3401 if you have any questions or concerns regarding this merger.

Thank you for your email of September 16, 2016, regarding accommodation and catering at the BC Wildfire Service base in Salmon Arm. As this falls under the purview of the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations, I have been asked to provide a response.

The value that a wildfire base in Salmon Arm brings with respect to the economic and social benefits of there being long term and seasonal employees in the community is recognized. The Ministry also recognizes the value to the province, including the City of Salmon Arm, of there being having bases located in many communities across the province is also recognised as it allows the efficient and effective deployment of staff for wildfire response and the protection of public safety - which is the primary objective in the effective operation of the BC Wildfire Service.

Historically, the Province of British Columbia has provided accommodations as an incentive to recruit and retain BC Wildfire Service staff in remote and/or hard to recruit to locations. However, the BC Wildfire Service does not provide catering services at these or any other bases, including for the similar standalone program, Parattack, located in Fort St. John.

When the Rappel Program was first moved to Salmon Arm in the 1970s, the city itself was not set up to provide meals and accommodation. However, it has since developed into a relatively large urban centre with a wide range of amenities. Moreover, while staff pay for their board and lodging at the Salmon Arm base, there remains an annual net cost to government of \$119,000.

The decision to end accommodation and meal provision at the Salmon Arm location will align the Salmon Arm base and staff with the majority of other BC Wildfire Service base locations across British Columbia. This change will be phased in over two seasons, first with elimination of meal provision at the start of this year and then ceasing on-site accommodation in 2018. The BC Wildfire Service will continue to operate a base at the Salmon Arm location.

As part of the ongoing communication between the Honourable Steve Thomson, Minister of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations and the City of Salmon Arm, we will be in communication with Mayor Cooper to ensure local area accommodation is available for staff as the plans to phase out on-site accommodation in January 2018 proceed.

It is common place for the private sector to provide specific board and lodging camps to its employees where needed. What is the justification for such a decision? The base also provides food and accomodation to the pilots and engineers for three of the provincially contracted 'medium' helicopters, as per the government contract. If the aircrew are also moved off base, then lodged and fed by government per diems, it would cost the government \$1200 per day for the six aircrew. Further, the base cabins and food services are currently used to lodge ministry staff from around the province, when the base often plays host to multiple training course for staff high in the BC Wildfire ranks.

I appreciate some camps in B C don't have these facilities. However, must we REDUCE an excellent functioning camp to the LOWEST common denominator in the Province? Or, is the government going to offer other board and room options to employees AT A GREATER COST to taxpayers? Where was this decision initiated? Is this an example of senior bureaucrats in Victoria who are NOT IN THE FIELD and who haven't thought through the repercussions of a decision to close this camp issuing directives to their staff further down the line?

The investment has already been made and the costs of providing the lodging and food is recovered from the workers. Please check into the closing of this camp as well as the **consistency** plan. There has been a very negative ripple effect among the Ministry's fire fighters and their families and friends with respect to how taxpayers' monies are spent/invested. It makes one wonder if the new 'standardization/consistency' of uniforms, badges, and now bases, as well as the new changes to the payroll system, limiting the number of hours that can be worked in each pay period, and the **revamping of Branch patches, vehicle decals, logos, and letterheads is another 'make work' project of the Ministry staff in Victoria and Kamloops.**

Is that what our government is going to do with its SURPLUS funds? This may seem like 'small potatoes' but it is JUST these kinds of SILLY decisions that drive supporters and voters in general crazy!

The investment has already been made and the costs of providing the lodging and food is recovered from the workers. Please check into the closing of this camp as well as the **consistency** plan. There has been a very negative ripple effect among the Ministry's fire fighters and their families and friends with respect to how taxpayers' monies are spent/invested. It makes one wonder if the new 'standardization/consistency' of uniforms, badges, and now bases, as well as the new changes to the payroll system, limiting the number of hours that can be worked in each pay period, and the revamping of Branch patches, vehicle decals, logos, and letterheads is another 'make work' project of the Ministry staff in Victoria and Kamloops. Is that what our government is going to do with its SURPLUS funds? This may seem like 'small potatoes' but it is JUST these kinds of SILLY decisions that drive supporters and voters in general crazy! I trust you accept the spirit of goodwill in which I bring this to your attention. I also hope you consider a second look at this decision. I look forward to hearing from you.

ISSUE:

On September 7th, 2016 BCWS delivered the decision to the Rappel base in Salmon arm that accommodations and meals will no longer be available to staff.

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's, the Rappel Program moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent was to create an elite firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of rappelling into incidents via helicopters. Part of this program included full catering of meals and provision of accommodation on the base for the Rappel Program staff. When the program was first moved to Salmon Arm in 1970, the city itself was not set up to provide meals and accommodations, but has since developed into a relatively large urban centre.

BCWS currently provides accommodation on a subsidised basis due to lack of available housing in Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Dease Lake and Princeton. The cost of providing accommodation is balanced against the need to locate staff close to the base to ensure rapid deployment. BCWS does not provide catering services to any other bases.

The Salmon Arm Rappel Base is the only BCWS base that provides full catering of meals and accommodations to staff. The city of Salmon Arm has a higher Rental Apartment and Townhouse Vacancy Rate than many other locations that house crews. A similar standalone program Parattack does not supply full catering of meals or accommodations to its staff in Fort St John BC. Cost aside, this decision was made in an attempt to align the Rappel base and staff with the majority of other BCWS base locations across British Columbia.

DISCUSSION:

Providing full catering of meals and provision of accommodations to staff in a community where these services are available is an unnecessary expense and has led to a general feeling of Rappel staff receiving preferred treatment amongst BCWS staff, creating a barrier between Rappel and other firefighting crews around the Province. Elimination of full catering and accommodation for the crews in Salmon Arm will reduce costs and contribute to a culture of consistent treatment of all staff regardless of position or title and ultimately lead to a stronger rappel program where they will be on the same playing field as the majority of other firefighting/staff resources provincially.

SPEAKING / RESPONSE POINTS:

The Rappel base is the only location in the province that provides a catering option for staff, making it inconsistent and leaving the program vulnerable to perceptions of special treatment.

There are only 4 locations provincially within BCWS that provide subsidized live on base accommodations – Alexis Creek, Fort Nelson, Dease Lake and Princeton. These locations are unique because they are either difficult to recruit locations and/or renatl availability is non-existent because of remoteness or industry activity. None of these four locations have the option for government provided catering. There is no formal report on vacancy and availability rates for locations with 10,000 people or less.

There are no other locations which have BCWS crews located in them similar in size and demographic to Salmon Arm that allow live on accommodations (E.g Williams Lake, Vernon, Penticton, Parksville, Fort St John). Salmon arm is considered an Urban Centre as defined as having a population of 10,000 people or more by the Canadian Housing and Mortgage Corporation (CMHC).

CMHC publishes an annual report on the rental market in British Columbia, but only examines locations with a population of 10,000 people or more. See Excel attachment to view how Salmon Arm compares in vacancy and availability rates to other locations defined as Urban Centres that house BCWS crews. (Similar or less availability rates in Terrace, Vernon, Penticton, Cranbrook, and Nelson. Cranbrook and Nelson have lower availability rates and need to house between 17-20 more BCWS crew staff then Salmon Arm- 35)

One argument is that making this change in one year will create an influx of staff seeking accommodation all at once unlike locations where live on accommodation has not been an option. However, a large number of our crew staff in all locations do not hold onto their accommodation through the off season and seek new accommodation on their recall to work each spring. (e.g. Williams Lake, Terrace, etc.)

It is important to note that there are many locations with low vacancy rates that have BCWS offices and staff at these locations have always found appropriate accommodation annually- even with most individuals being seasonal workers.

There is a net cost to the tax payer of approximately \$119,000 annually to provide live on accommodation and catering to the Rappel program. This is the cost assumed by the government after collecting the subsidy paid by rappel staff.

More importantly this perceived preferred treatment will disappear with the decision to move forward with no meals and accommodations on base and allow the Rappel program to operate as most other locations in the province.

ISSUE: ELIMINATION OF ACCOMMODATION AND MEAL PROVISION TO BRITISH COLUMBIA WILDFIRE SERVICE STAFF AT THE RAPPEL BASE IN SALMON ARM

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's, the Rappel Program within the Province's BC Wildfire Service (BCWS) moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent was to create an elite firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of rappelling into incidents via helicopters. Part of this program included full catering of meals and provision of accommodation on the base for the Rappel Program staff. When the program was first moved to Salmon Arm in 1970, the city itself was not set up to provide meals and accommodations, but has since developed into a relatively large urban centre.

Historically, accommodations have been provided as an incentive to recruit and retain staff in remote locations. As such BCWS currently provides subsidized housing in Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Dease Lake and Princeton. In accordance with Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) rules these accommodations have been provided at less than market rate. The city of Salmon Arm falls outside of the CRA prescribed areas for Housing Benefits Paid (CRA Form 4054). BCWS does not provide catering services to any other bases.

In short, the Salmon Arm Rappel Base is the only BCWS base that provides full catering of meals and accommodation to staff. The City of Salmon Arm has a higher rental apartment and townhouse vacancy rate than many other locations that house crews. A similar standalone program, Parattack, does not supply full catering of meals or accommodations to its staff in Fort St. John. Cost aside, the decision was made September 7, 2016 to eliminate accommodation and meal provision at this base to align the Rappel base and staff with the majority of other BCWS base locations across British Columbia (BC). This decision will come into effect January 1st, 2017.

DISCUSSION:

Providing full catering of meals and provision of accommodations to staff in a community where these services are available is an unnecessary expense and is not consistent government standards of fiscal restraint. Elimination of full catering and accommodation for the crews in Salmon Arm will reduce costs and contribute to a culture of consistent treatment of all staff.

There are 4 locations provincially within BCWS that provide rental incentives for housing – Alexis Creek, Fort Nelson, Dease Lake and Princeton. These locations are unique because they are either difficult to recruit locations and/or rental availability is challenging due to remoteness or industrial activity. None of these four locations have the option for government provided catering.

There are no other locations which have BCWS crews located in them similar in size and demographic to Salmon Arm that allow live on accommodations (e.g. Williams Lake, Vernon, Penticton, Parksville, Fort St. John). Salmon Arm is considered an urban centre as defined as having a population of 10,000

people or more by the Canadian Housing and Mortgage Corporation (CMHC). In a review of vacancy rates across BC in communities of similar size to Salmon Arm that also house BCWF staff Salmon Arm has median vacancy rates. Government does not provide accommodation in communities of Salmon Arm's Size, even in areas with low summer vacancy.

RESPONSE POINTS:

- The Provincial Government's Wildfire Service has recently made the decision to eliminate the provision of accommodation and meals to the staff at the Rappel base in Salmon Arm.
- The Rappel base is the only location in the province that currently provides a catering option for staff.
- Making this change will bring Salmon Arm into line with other BCWS centres of the same size and population.
- Making this change in Salmon Arm will bring Provincial consistency where staff are responsible for finding their own accommodation.
- Government must be responsive to tax payer funds. There is a net cost to the tax payer of approximately \$119,000 annually to provide live on accommodation and catering to the Rappel program.
- This decision will also eliminate perceived preferred treatment and allow the Rappel program to operate as most other locations in the province.

ISSUE: Catering service and living accommodations for staff at the FLNRO Salmon Arm Rappel Base.

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's the Rappel Program moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent of the day was to create an elite firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of Rappelling into incidents via helicopters.

Part of this program included full catering of meals and living accommodations for staff on base. Today this is the only base in BCWS that supplies food and accommodations to staff in a community that has sufficient private resources to fulfil the need. The annual net costs to Government (after staff contributions) to supply these services exceeds \$119,000.00 annually.

BCWS continues to make significant efforts to eliminate inconsistencies in all aspects of staff's working environment.

Staff within BCWS Salmon Arm Base have exhibited a history of bypassing supervisors when they disagreed with decisions, this type of response it anticipated on this issue.

DISCUSSION:

Elitism and special treatments have combined to create a barrier between Rappel crews and other firefighting crews and staff around the Province.

Breaking down this barrier by treating Salmon Arm staff in the same way as the rest of the Province will contribute to the larger FLNRO team culture.

NEXT STEPS:

Dear Mr. Minister and Members of the Legislature,

I am writing to ensure you and your colleagues are aware of the planned closing of the RapAttack Base Camp effective next spring.

Being involved in politics for many years, I understand the political arm of

government isn't always aware of the daily

decisions within the bureaucratic and administrative arm of government. The deputy director of B C Wildfire, Mr. Murray Henry and the Kamloops Fire Centre Manager, Mr. Cliff Chapman, recently

visited the Rap Attack Base camp in Salmon Arm and notified team members that the lodging and cookhouse on the

government owned property will be closed for the use of the fire crew staff next year in order to standardize or ensure

CONSISTENCY for all B C Wildfire Services bases and crews in the Province. The camp in Salmon Arm has 20 cabins and a cook/eating house built at a cost to taxpayers of at least \$500,000.00. It has provided accommodations to at least 40 Rapattack fire fighters who do pay/reimburse the Province for the room and board costs. I understand rental accommodations in Salmon Arm simply aren't available especially during the busy fire fighting season when tourists take up most spots. A check on Further, when these RapAttack team members return from various dangerous spots, they are tired and appreciate the instant availability of wholesome food stocked at the camp.

Question: In the name of 'standardization or consistency', why ever would the Province close a facility that is providing room and board to staff in a small town where it is difficult to obtain or unavailable? It is common place for the private sector to provide specific board and lodging camps to its employees where needed. What is the justification for such a decision? The base also provides food and accomodation to the pilots and engineers for three of the provincially contracted 'medium' helicopters, as per the government contract. If the aircrew are also moved off base, then lodged and fed by government per diems, it would cost the government \$1200 per day for the six aircrew. Further, the base cabins and food services are currently used to lodge ministry staff from around the province, when the base often plays host to multiple training course for staff high in the BC Wildfire ranks.

I appreciate some camps in B C don't have these facilities. However, must we REDUCE an excellent functioning camp to the LOWEST common denominator in the Province? Or, is the government going to offer other board and room options to employees AT A GREATER COST to taxpayers? Where was this decision initiated? Is this an example of senior bureaucrats in Victoria who are NOT IN THE FIELD and who haven't thought through the repercussions of a decision to close this camp issuing directives to their staff further down the line?

The investment has already been made and the costs of providing the lodging and food is recovered from the workers. Please check into the closing of this camp as well as the **consistency** plan. There has been a very negative ripple effect among the Ministry's fire fighters and their families and friends with respect to how taxpayers' monies are spent/invested. It makes one wonder if the new

'standardization/consistency' of uniforms, badges, and now bases, as well as the new changes to the payroll system, limiting the number of hours that can be worked in each pay period, and the revamping of Branch patches, vehicle decals, logos, and letterheads is another 'make work' project of the Ministry staff in Victoria and Kamloops.

Is that what our government is going to do with its SURPLUS funds? This may seem like 'small potatoes' but it is JUST these kinds of SILLY decisions that drive supporters and voters in general crazy! I trust you accept the spirit of goodwill in which I bring this to your attention. I also hope you consider a second look at this decision. I look forward to hearing from you. the base in Salmon Arm for 30 years, and as with all fire crews in their respective cities, are very active and engaged with the community. The RapAttack crews routinely build and maintain mountain bike, hiking, and cross country ski trails around the area; take part in the Salmon Arm air show and local job fairs; and train and work with two high school students every year as part of a junior fire crew program. No consultation or conversation was initiated with the base supervisor or crew prior to the decision made. Not only do the crews in Salmon Arm take pride in their base, work hard, and pay room and board, but for many of the crew there, their cabins are their primary residence and contain all of their possessions for the majority of the year.

SALMON ARM RAPPEL BASE CATERING SERVICES CONTRACT REVIEW

Prepared by Harry Spahan

EXISTING CATERING SERVICE

The Salmon Arm Rappel Base, which has on-site accommodation, has catering services provided by contract on a three year term. This is the only base in the province, including the Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Cariboo and Chetwynd bases, where catering services are provided and firefighting crews can have access to the kitchen. At these other bases crews cook their own meals. At the Puntzi Forward Attack Base, British Columbia Wildfire Service (BCWS) staff reside off site and IA crews are based there on a "as-needed' basis. Puntzi Base hires an auxiliary cook as needed and BCWS purchases groceries directly from the local suppliers. All BCWS staff are charged by BCWS for food when they are living on-site at these bases (it comes off their pay checks).

At the Salmon Arm Rappel Base BCWS staff are charged rent, whereas all other bases, where there is on-site accommodation, BCWS staff are housed free. Rent includes electricity, water, heating and waste disposal. There are currently 6 Aircrew staff and 36 Rappel staff housed on-site during the 2015 fire season. In addition, 6 Rappel staff pay for lunch only and 2 Junior Fire Crew pay for meals but live off base.

TAX CONSIDERATIONS

According to a BCWS Deputy Fire Centre Manager, Canadian Revenue Agency (CRA) indicates that if food services are provided to staff then the service cost is a taxable benefit to staff. The same may be true for accommodation costs. This is an area that is being looked into by staff to ensure that BCWS are abiding by CRA rules and BCWS policy.

LOCATION AND GEOGRAPHY

The Salmon Arm Rapattack Residential Fire Base was originally built in Salmon Arm in 1979 at the Shuswap Regional Airport. It was logical to establish a permanent base location, close to an interior airport, where historical fire data had indicated high occurrence of lightning strikes that resulted in inaccessible forest fires (inaccessible from ground crews). As a result, rappel transportation proved effective and ensured/provided a strategic long-term fire response management tool. Recent statistical fire analysis continues to demonstrate cost savings, due to quick response times, for on-site rappel staffing at the base location.

RAPPEL BASE FACILITIES

There are approximately 30 buildings on-site, including cabins. The Rappel Base facilities include:

- Permanent building that includes a full commercial kitchen with a cafeteria, small classroom and wash rooms,
- Permanent building that includes rappel equipment locker rooms, fire crew equipment storage, first aid room, workshop for base maintenance, laundry, washroom,
- One triple wide trailer used as a classroom and meeting room for staff, Provincial meetings and training throughout the year,

- Another triple wide trailer for the combined Rapattack and Zone office to accommodate 2 regular Rapattack/Zone Officers and rappel staff,
- Additional small warehouse buildings and storage areas for fire equipment,
- 70' foot tall rappel and hoist training tower,
- 3 concrete helipads with electrical and water service suitable for medium helicopters,
- A small double wide trailer with seven rooms for aircrew members, that include laundry and washrooms amenities,
- 20 staff cabins that sleep two rappel staff per cabin, and these buildings all have electric power, but no running water and no washrooms
- One single wide trailer for two FLNRO full time C&E officers, and
- Single-wide trailer adjacent to the C&E trailer (joined by a covered walk-way) that is used as additional office space and storage.

CATERING SERVICES ANALYSIS

BENEFITS

Overall, the feedback from BCWS staff at the Salmon Arm Rappel Base indicates that the catering services provided have been a benefit to the rappel program for the following reasons:

- It provides program stability and supports BCWS's centralization concept that ensures strict adherence to standard operating procedures,
- Contractors are familiar with provincial regulations regarding food quality and security, food preparation and other applicable standards that BCWS staff are not required to know,
- Catering services have the expertise and ability to prepare and serve food to large groups,
- It works well with the training and proficiency required each season for staff,
- On-site meals preparation by contractors allows for improved team cohesion between fire crews and with the development of relationships and rapport with aircrew members,
- Having the pilots and Aircraft Maintenance Engineers (AMEs) on-site and interacting with rappel staff during meals encourages discussion and increases the knowledge transfer to staff around safety while working with helicopters,
- There is a greater presence of Pilots and AMEs (Aircraft Maintenance Engineers) that increases safety inspections
- Having everyone on base allows for quick response due to access to staff, even with after hours and unforeseen incidents,
- There is a full kitchen facility available for BC Government staff use,
- There is historical use of the facility as initial incident command post during large local fires, and
- There is temporary use for receiving, housing and feeding out-of-province crews.

In addition, there are other factors that have been considered in the catering service analysis:

- · Cost of food purchases, (which are increasing), and
- Kitchen equipment purchases, maintenance and care.

Accommodation factors and costs are also important in this analysis and include:

Annual savings on reduced call-outs,

- Annual savings on base care and maintenance by crew even after regular hours,
- Limited vacancies and high real estate prices in Salmon Arm would make it very difficult for this
 number of crew to find their own accommodation in town (there may be a risk of losing a high
 number of trained staff),
- Cost recovery from rent charged (\$280/bi-weekly) = average recovery of \$114,000/yr. The rent charged to staff has been increasing over time, as deemed necessary, to adequately recover costs, and
- Annual savings to BC Government when training courses and meetings are held here (Approx. \$10,000/week based on an average of 25 students per course). Historically 5 provincial training courses are held here in the spring (S434, S411, L380, L381 and Weather Tower Safety) plus at least one multi-day meeting (BCTS, C&E and AAO). Other courses held here include Safety Officer, HLCO, CRM, Helipad, and Chainsaw. In the fall, the AAO group returns for their after season debrief and the Koreans have been here numerous times for a two week Fire Investigation Training course. Total savings on accommodation costs are approx. \$60,000/yr.

COSTS

The cost for catering services, food, and associated equipment purchases and maintenance are:

- Food (Average \$100,000/yr). The contract specifies basic healthy food and is managed to reduce transportation costs where ever possible,
- Catering (Average \$122,000/yr). This cost has been relatively stable over many years. Yearly
 preplanning options have been discussed and new models have been successfully initiated to
 reduce costs (ie community gardens),
- Administration related to food and catering (not currently tracked),
- New commercial grade food/catering equipment (Average \$4,420/yr based on life expectancy of 10 yrs):

Stove/stockpot	\$10,000
Cold table	\$7000
Steam table	\$7000
Upright freezer	\$7000
Walk-in cooler	\$5000

TOTAL	\$44,200

 Savings of Aircrew daily per diems when on base (average savings \$100,000/yr) based on number of days aircrew is on base (linked to why base location is Salmon Arm due to proximity to historical and current number of rappel fires). Daily Per Diem for Pilot and AME is \$364 (Hotel \$100 x 2, meals \$49.50 x 2, truck \$65).

The costs for on-site accommodation are:

The base evolved from a tent camp to the original 13 cabins in 1992 that cost approximately \$20,000 each. These cabins have required very little maintenance due to their simplicity and are

otherwise kept clean and maintained by the crew that live in them. Historical costs have not been included since they have been amortized over past years.

The more recent 7 cabins built in 2013 cost approximately \$47,000 each and should easily last 50 years or more with their more durable metal roof. This is a yearly amortization cost of \$6,580.

DISCUSSION

Briefly, the Salmon Arm Rappel Base operates as a small city during the fire season, and this dynamic creates strong teamwork and pride on the base. On-site catering services ensure food safety and security measures are regulated effectively and efficiently by supporting provincial departments. The cost analysis completed above demonstrates that the Base does have a net positive benefit from this service.

ISSUE: ELIMINATION OF ACCOMMODATION AND MEAL PROVISION TO BRITISH COLUMBIA WILDFIRE SERVICE STAFF AT THE RAPPEL BASE IN SALMON ARM

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's, the Rappel Program within the Province's BC Wildfire Service (BCWS) moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent was to create an elitea firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of rappelling into incidents via helicopters. Part of this program included full catering of meals and provision of accommodation on the base for the Rappel Program staff. When the program was first moved to Salmon Arm in 1970, the city itself was not set up to provide meals and accommodations, but has since developed into a relatively large urban centre.

Historically, accommodations have been provided as an incentive to recruit and retain staff in remote locations. As such BCWS currently provides subsidized housing in Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Dease Lake and Princeton. In accordance with Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) rules these accommodations have been provided at less than market rate. The city of Salmon Arm falls outside of the CRA prescribed areas for Housing Benefits Paid (CRA Form 4054). BCWS does not provide catering services to any other bases.

In short, the Salmon Arm Rappel Base is the only BCWS base that provides full catering of meals and accommodation to staff. The City of Salmon Arm has a higher rental apartment and townhouse vacancy rate than many other locations that house crews. A similar standalone program, Parattack, does not supply full catering of meals or accommodations to its staff in Fort St. John. Cost aside, the decision was made September 7, 2016 to eliminate accommodation and meal provision at this base to align the Rappel base and staff with the majority of other BCWS base locations across British Columbia (BC). This decision will come into effect January 1st, 2017.

DISCUSSION:

Providing full catering of meals and provision of accommodations to staff in a community where these services are available is an unnecessary expense and is not consistent government standards of fiscal restraint. Elimination of full catering and accommodation for the crews in Salmon Arm will reduce costs and contribute to a culture of consistent treatment of all staff.

Although staff currently pay some of the costs Even though staff do pay for their board and lodging, it is still an additional annual net cost to government of \$119,000. The Salmon Arm crew will only be provided per diems when they are working in locations other than their home location like all other BCWS crews. When crews (both firefighting and air crews) are working in other locations, they are provided with per diems as per the contract.

There are 4 locations provincially within BCWS that provide rental incentives for housing – Alexis Creek, Fort Nelson, Dease Lake and Princeton. These locations are unique because they are either

difficult to recruit locations and/or rental availability is challenging due to remoteness or industrial activity. None of these four locations have the option for government provided catering.

There are no other locations which have BCWS crews located in them similar in size and demographic to Salmon Arm that allow live on accommodations (e.g. Williams Lake, Vernon, Penticton, Parksville, Fort St. John). Salmon Arm is considered an urban centre as defined as having a population of 10,000 people or more by the Canadian Housing and Mortgage Corporation (CMHC). In a review of vacancy rates across BC in communities of similar size to Salmon Arm that also house BCWF staff Salmon Arm has median vacancy rates. Government does not provide accommodation in communities of Salmon Arm's Size, even in areas with low summer vacancy.

RESPONSE POINTS:

- The Provincial Government's Wildfire Service has recently made the decision to eliminate the provision of accommodation and meals to the staff at the Rappel base in Salmon Arm.
- The Rappel base is the only location in the province that currently provides a catering option for staff.
- Making this change will bring Salmon Arm into line with other BCWS centres of the same size and population.
- Making this change in Salmon Arm will bring Provincial consistency where staff are responsible for finding their own accommodation.
- Government must be responsive to tax payer funds. There is a net cost to the tax payer of approximately \$119,000 annually to provide live on accommodation and catering to the Rappel program.
- This decision will also eliminate perceived preferred treatment and allow the Rappel program to operate as most other locations in the province.
- The infrastructure will be repurposed by BCWS to meet operational needs.

Dear Mr. Minister and Members of the Legislature,

I am writing to ensure you and your colleagues are aware of the planned closing of the RapAttack Base Camp effective next spring. Being involved in politics for many years, I understand the political arm of government isn't always aware of the daily decisions within the bureaucratic and administrative arm of government.

The deputy director of B C Wildfire, Mr. Murray Henry and the Kamloops Fire Centre Manager, Mr. Cliff Chapman, recently visited the Rap Attack Base camp in Salmon Arm and notified team members that the lodging and cookhouse on the government owned property will be closed for the use of the fire crew staff next year in order to standardize or ensure CONSISTENCY for all B C Wildfire Services bases and crews in the Province.

The camp in Salmon Arm has 20 cabins and a cook/eating house built at a cost to taxpayers of at least \$500,000.00. It has provided accommodations to at least 40 Rapattack fire fighters who do pay/reimburse the Province for the room and board costs. I understand rental accommodations in Salmon Arm simply aren't available especially during the busy fire fighting season when tourists take up most spots. A check on Further, when these RapAttack team members return from various dangerous spots, they are tired and appreciate the instant availability of wholesome food stocked at the camp.

Question: In the name of 'standardization or consistency', why ever would the Province close a facility that is providing room and board to staff in a small town where it is difficult to obtain or unavailable? It is common place for the private sector to provide specific board and lodging camps to its employees where needed. What is the justification for such a decision? The base also provides food and accomodation to the pilots and engineers for three of the provincially contracted 'medium' helicopters, as per the government contract. If the aircrew are also moved off base, then lodged and fed by government per diems, it would cost the government \$1200 per day for the six aircrew. Further, the base cabins and food services are currently used to lodge ministry staff from around the province, when the base often plays host to multiple training course for staff high in the BC Wildfire ranks.

I appreciate some camps in B C don't have these facilities. However, must we REDUCE an excellent functioning camp to the LOWEST common denominator in the Province? Or, is the government going to offer other board and room options to employees AT A GREATER COST to taxpayers? Where was this decision initiated? Is this an example of senior bureaucrats in Victoria who are NOT IN THE FIELD and who haven't thought through the repercussions of a decision to close this camp issuing directives to their staff further down the line?

The investment has already been made and the costs of providing the lodging and food is recovered from the workers. Please check into the closing of this camp as well as the **consistency** plan. There has been a very negative ripple effect among the Ministry's fire fighters and their families and friends with respect to how taxpayers' monies are spent/invested. It makes one wonder if the new 'standardization/consistency' of uniforms, badges, and now bases, as well as the new changes to the payroll system, limiting the number of hours that can be worked in each pay period, and the **revamping of Branch patches, vehicle decals, logos, and letterheads is another 'make work' project of the Ministry staff in Victoria and Kamloops.**

Is that what our government is going to do with its SURPLUS funds? This may seem like 'small potatoes' but it is JUST these kinds of SILLY decisions that drive supporters and voters in general crazy!

I trust you accept the spirit of goodwill in which I bring this to your attention. I also hope you consider a second look at this decision. I look forward to hearing from you.

ISSUE: Decision to eliminate accommodations and meal provision to the British Columbia Wildfire Service Seasonal Staff at the Salmon Arm office

BACKGROUND:

The initial attack crews in the Salmon Arm office of the British Columbia Wildfire Service have been provided accommodations and meals since the late 1970's. BCWS has been engaged in a process to eliminate the provision of these services to staff in all bases across the Province, except for remote areas without available services (Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Dease Lake and Princeton). Salmon Arm is the last BCWS base in this process. The provision of accommodation and meals has an annual cost to government, of \$119,000, after staff contributions. During the 2015 fire season a review of the catering of meals for staff in the Salmon Arm office was conducted and .-Sstaff within the Salmon Arm office were involved in this review. The results of the review were considered in making the decision to eliminate provision of accommodation and catering for staff in the Salmon Arm office. The existing infrastructure (bunkhouse cabins) will be relocated to the BCWS training facility in Merritt and the kitchen/cafeteria will be re-purposed into office space.

On September 7th, 2017, the Deputy Director of BCWS attended a staff meeting at the Salmon Arm office to deliver the decision to eliminate accommodation and catering services staff as of January 1st, 2017. This decision was delivered 7 months prior to staff being affected. Staff were instructed to keep this decision confidential until all absent staff could be informed. Elimination of full catering and accommodation for the crews in Salmon Arm will reduce costs and contribute to a culture of consistent treatment of all staff regardless of position or title and ultimately lead to a stronger rappel program where they will be on the same playing field as the majority of other firefighting/staff resources provincially.

SPEAKING / RESPONSE POINTS:

The Rappel base is the only location in the province that provides a catering option for staff, making it inconsistent and leaving the program vulnerable to perceptions of special treatment.

There are only 4 locations provincially within BCWS that provide subsidized live on base accommodations – Alexis Creek, Fort Nelson, Dease Lake and Princeton. These locations are unique because they are either difficult to recruit locations and/or renatl availability is non-existent because of remoteness or industry activity. None of these four locations have the option for government provided catering. There is no formal report on vacancy and availability rates for locations with 10,000 people or less.

There are no other locations which have BCWS crews located in them similar in size and demographic to Salmon Arm that allow live on accommodations (E.g Williams Lake, Vernon, Penticton, Parksville, Fort St John). Salmon arm is considered an Urban Centre as defined as having a population of 10,000 people or more by the Canadian Housing and Mortgage Corporation (CMHC).

CMHC publishes an annual report on the rental market in British Columbia, but only examines locations with a population of 10,000 people or more. See Excel attachment to view how Salmon Arm compares in vacancy and availability rates to other locations defined as Urban Centres that house BCWS crews. (Similar or less availability rates in Terrace, Vernon, Penticton, Cranbrook, and Nelson. Cranbrook and Nelson have lower availability rates and need to house between 17-20 more BCWS crew staff then Salmon Arm- 35)

One argument is that making this change in one year will create an influx of staff seeking accommodation all at once unlike locations where live on accommodation has not been an option. However, a large number of our crew staff in all locations do not hold onto their accommodation through the off season and seek new accommodation on their recall to work each spring. (e.g. Williams Lake, Terrace, etc.)

It is important to note that there are many locations with low vacancy rates that have BCWS offices and staff at these locations have always found appropriate accommodation annually- even with most individuals being seasonal workers.

There is a net cost to the tax payer of approximately \$119,000 annually to provide live on accommodation and catering to the Rappel program. This is the cost assumed by the government after collecting the subsidy paid by rappel staff.

More importantly this perceived preferred treatment will disappear with the decision to move forward with no meals and accommodations on base and allow the Rappel program to operate as most other locations in the province.

ISSUE:

On September 7th, 2016 British Columbia Wildfire Service (BCWS) delivered the decision to the Rappel base in Salmon Arm that accomodations and meals will no longer be available to staff, effective January 1st, 2017

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's, the Rappel Program moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent was to create a firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of rappelling into incidents via helicopters. Part of this program included full catering of meals and provision of accommodation on the base for the Rappel Program staff. When the program was first moved to Salmon Arm in 1970, the city itself was not set up to provide meals and accommodations, but has since developed into a relatively large urban centre.

Historically, accommodations have been provided as an incentive to recruit and retain staff in remote locations. As such BCWS currently provides subsidized housing in Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Dease Lake and Princeton. In accordance with Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) rules these accommodations have been provided at less than market rate. The city of Salmon Arm falls outside of the CRA prescribed areas for Housing Benefits Paid (CRA Form 4054).

The Salmon Arm Rappel Base is the only BCWS base that provides full catering of meals and accommodations to staff. The city of Salmon Arm has a higher Rental Apartment and Townhouse Vacancy Rate than many other locations in which crews are based. A similar standalone program, Parattack, does not supply full catering of meals or accommodations to its staff in Fort St John, B.C. Cost aside, the decision to phase out the Salmon Arm catering and on-base accommodations was made in an attempt to align the Rappel base and staff with all other BCWS base locations across British Columbia.

DISCUSSION:

Providing full catering of meals and accommodations to staff in a community where these services are available is an unnecessary expense. Elimination of full catering and accommodation for the crews in Salmon Arm will reduce costs and contribute to a culture of consistent treatment of all staff.

SPEAKING / RESPONSE POINTS:

One of the goals of Government is the fair and equitable treatment of all staff. The Rappel base is the only location in the province that provides a catering option for BCWS staff, making it inconsistent and leaving the program vulnerable to perceptions of special treatment. The decision to move forward with no meals and accommodations on-base will enable the Rappel program to operate in the same manner as all other BCWS locations in the province.

There is a net cost to the tax payer of approximately \$119,000 annually to provide on-base accommodation and catering to the Rappel program. This is the cost assumed by the government after collecting the subsidy paid by Rappel staff.

There are 4 locations provincially within BCWS that provide rental incentives for housing – Alexis Creek, Fort Nelson, Dease Lake and Princeton. These locations are unique because they are either difficult to recruit locations and/or rental availability is challenging due to remoteness or industrial activity. None of these four locations have the option for government provided catering.

CMHC publishes an annual report on the rental market in British Columbia for locations with a population of 10,000 people or more; defined as Urban Centres. As such Salmon Arm, with a population of over 17,000 is considered an Urban Centre There are no other fire crew bases, in locations of similar size to Salmon Arm that provide live on accommodations and catering (e.g. Williams Lake, Vernon, Penticton, Parksville, Fort St John). There is no formal report on vacancy and availability rates for locations with 10,000 people or less.

Similar or lower vacancy and availability rates to Salmon Arm exist in Terrace, Vernon, Penticton, Cranbrook, and Nelson. Moreover, Cranbrook and Nelson have lower rates with a need to house up to 20 more BCWS staff than Salmon Arm (see attached spreadsheet for how Salmon Arm compares in vacancy and availability rates to other locations defined as Urban Centres that house BCWS crews).

It is important to note that there are many locations with low vacancy rates that have BCWS offices where seasonal, non-local staff have always found accommodations.

ISSUE: Decision to eliminate accommodations and meal provision to the British Columbia Wildfire Service Seasonal Staff at the Salmon Arm office

BACKGROUND:

The initial attack crews in the Salmon Arm office of the British Columbia Wildfire Service have been provided accommodations and meals since the late 1970's. There is no other Office in the BCWS that receives this level of treatment. The provision of accommodation and meals has an annual cost, after staff contributions, of \$119,000. During the 2015 fire season a review of the catering of meals for staff in the Salmon Arm office was conducted. Staff within the Salmon Arm office were involved in this review. The results of the review were considered in making the decision to eliminate provision of accommodation and catering for staff in the Salmon Arm office. s.13 s.13

On September 7th, 2017, the Deputy Director of BCWS attended a staff meeting at the Salmon Arm office to deliver the decision to eliminate accommodation and catering services staff as of January 1st, 2017. This decision was delivered 7 months prior to staff being affected. Staff were instructed to keep this decision confidential until all absent staff could be informed.

On September 16th, 2016 an email drafted by s.22 , a member of the B C Liberal Party, was sent to several MLA's including Minister Steve Thomson complaining about the decision presented to staff by the Deputy Director on September 7th. This email contained several pieces of Information shared at the September 7th, 2016 staff meeting.

DISCUSSION:

The Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations is committed to fair and equitable treatment of all staff and to prudent fiscal management. BACKGROUND:

The initial attack crews in the Salmon Arm office of the British Columbia Wildfire Service have been provided accommodations and meals since the late 1970's. BCWS has been engaged in a process to eliminate the provision of these services to staff in all bases across the Province, except for remote areas without available services. Salmon Arm is the last BCWS base in this process. The provision of accommodation and meals has an annual cost, of \$119,000, after staff contributions. During the 2015 fire season a review of the catering of meals for staff in the Salmon Arm office was conducted. Staff within the Salmon Arm office were involved in this review. ISSUE:

On September 7th, 2016 BCWS delivered the decision to the Rappel base in Salmon arm that accommodations and meals will no longer be available to staff.

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's, the Rappel Program moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent was to create an elite firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of rappelling into incidents via helicopters. Part of this program included full catering of meals and provision of accommodation on the base for the Rappel Program staff. When the program was first moved to Salmon Arm in 1970, the city itself was not set up to provide meals and accommodations, but has since developed into a relatively large urban centre.

BCWS currently provides accommodation on a subsidised basis due to lack of available housing in Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Dease Lake and Princeton. The cost of providing accommodation is balanced against the need to locate staff close to the base to ensure rapid deployment. BCWS does not provide catering services to any other bases.

The Salmon Arm Rappel Base is the only BCWS base that provides full catering of meals and accommodations to staff. The city of Salmon Arm has a higher Rental Apartment and Townhouse Vacancy Rate than many other locations that house crews. A similar standalone program Parattack does not supply full catering of meals or accommodations to its staff in Fort St John BC. Cost aside, this decision was made in an attempt to align the Rappel base and staff with the majority of other BCWS base locations across British Columbia.

DISCUSSION:

Providing full catering of meals and provision of accommodations to staff in a community where these services are available is an unnecessary expense and has led to a general feeling of Rappel staff receiving preferred treatment amongst BCWS staff, creating a barrier between Rappel and other firefighting crews around the Province. Elimination of full catering and accommodation for the crews in Salmon Arm will reduce costs and contribute to a culture of consistent treatment of all staff regardless of position or title and ultimately lead to a stronger rappel program where they will be on the same playing field as the majority of other firefighting/staff resources provincially.

SPEAKING / RESPONSE POINTS:

The Rappel base is the only location in the province that provides a catering option for staff, making it inconsistent and leaving the program vulnerable to perceptions of special treatment.

There are only 4 locations provincially within BCWS that provide subsidized live on base accommodations – Alexis Creek, Fort Nelson, Dease Lake and Princeton. These locations are unique because they are either difficult to recruit locations and/or renatl availability is non-existent because of remoteness or industry activity. None of these four locations have the option for government provided catering. There is no formal report on vacancy and availability rates for locations with 10,000 people or less.

There are no other locations which have BCWS crews located in them similar in size and demographic to Salmon Arm that allow live on accommodations (E.g Williams Lake, Vernon, Penticton, Parksville, Fort St John). Salmon arm is considered an Urban Centre as defined as having a population of 10,000 people or more by the Canadian Housing and Mortgage Corporation (CMHC).

CMHC publishes an annual report on the rental market in British Columbia, but only examines locations with a population of 10,000 people or more. See Excel attachment to view how Salmon Arm compares in vacancy and availability rates to other locations defined as Urban Centres that house BCWS crews. (Similar or less availability rates in Terrace, Vernon, Penticton, Cranbrook, and Nelson. Cranbrook and Nelson have lower availability rates and need to house between 17-20 more BCWS crew staff then Salmon Arm- 35)

One argument is that making this change in one year will create an influx of staff seeking accommodation all at once unlike locations where live on accommodation has not been an option. However, a large number of our crew staff in all locations do not hold onto their accommodation through the off season and seek new accommodation on their recall to work each spring. (e.g. Williams Lake, Terrace, etc.)

It is important to note that there are many locations with low vacancy rates that have BCWS offices and staff at these locations have always found appropriate accommodation annually- even with most individuals being seasonal workers.

There is a net cost to the tax payer of approximately \$119,000 annually to provide live on accommodation and catering to the Rappel program. This is the cost assumed by the government after collecting the subsidy paid by rappel staff.

More importantly this perceived preferred treatment will disappear with the decision to move forward with no meals and accommodations on base and allow the Rappel program to operate as most other locations in the province.

ISSUE: ELIMINATION OF ACCOMMODATION AND MEAL PROVISION TO BRITISH COLUMBIA WILDFIRE SERVICE STAFF AT THE RAPPEL BASE IN SALMON ARM

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's, the Rappel Program within the Province's BC Wildfire Service (BCWS) moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent was to create a firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of rappelling into incidents via helicopters. Part of this program included full catering of meals and provision of accommodation on the base for the Rappel Program staff. When the program was first moved to Salmon Arm in 1970, the city itself was not set up to provide meals and accommodations, but has since developed into a relatively large urban centre.

Historically, accommodations have been provided as an incentive to recruit and retain staff in remote locations. As such BCWS currently provides subsidized housing in Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Dease Lake and Princeton. In accordance with Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) rules these accommodations have been provided at less than market rate. The city of Salmon Arm falls outside of the CRA prescribed areas for Housing Benefits Paid (CRA Form 4054). BCWS does not provide catering services to any other bases.

In short, the Salmon Arm Rappel Base is the only BCWS base that provides full catering of meals and accommodation to staff. The City of Salmon Arm has a higher rental apartment and townhouse vacancy rate than many other locations that house crews. A similar standalone program, Parattack, does not supply full catering of meals or accommodations to its staff in Fort St. John. Cost aside, the decision was made September 7, 2016 to eliminate accommodation and meal provision at this base to align the Rappel base and staff with the majority of other BCWS base locations across British Columbia (BC). This decision will come into effect January 1st, 2017.

DISCUSSION:

Providing full catering of meals and provision of accommodations to staff in a community where these services are available is an unnecessary expense and is not consistent government standards of fiscal restraint. Elimination of full catering and accommodation for the crews in Salmon Arm will reduce costs and contribute to a culture of consistent treatment of all staff.

Although staff currently pay some of the costs for their board and lodging, it is still an additional annual net cost to government of \$119,000 The Salmon Arm crew will only be provided per diems when they are working in locations other than their home location like all other BCWS crews.

There are 4 locations provincially within BCWS that provide rental incentives for housing – Alexis Creek, Fort Nelson, Dease Lake and Princeton. These locations are unique because they are either difficult to recruit locations and/or rental availability is challenging due to remoteness or industrial activity. None of these four locations have the option for government provided catering.

There are no other locations which have BCWS crews located in them similar in size and demographic to Salmon Arm that allow live on accommodations (e.g. Williams Lake, Vernon, Penticton, Parksville, Fort St. John). Salmon Arm is considered an urban centre as defined as having a population of 10,000 people or more by the Canadian Housing and Mortgage Corporation (CMHC). In a review of vacancy rates across BC in communities of similar size to Salmon Arm that also house BCWF staff Salmon Arm has median vacancy rates. Government does not provide accommodation in communities of Salmon Arm's Size, even in areas with low summer vacancy.

RESPONSE POINTS:

- The Provincial Government's Wildfire Service has recently made the decision to eliminate the provision of accommodation and meals to the staff at the Rappel base in Salmon Arm.
- The Rappel base is the only location in the province that currently provides a catering option for staff.
- Making this change will bring Salmon Arm into line with other BCWS centres of the same size and population.
- Making this change in Salmon Arm will bring Provincial consistency where staff are responsible for finding their own accommodation.
- Government must be responsive to tax payer funds. There is a net cost to the tax payer of approximately \$119,000 annually to provide live on accommodation and catering to the Rappel program.
- This decision will also eliminate perceived preferred treatment and allow the Rappel program to operate as most other locations in the province.
- The infrastructure will be repurposed by BCWS to meet operational needs.

BACKGROUND:

The initial attack crews in the Salmon Arm office of the British Columbia Wildfire Service have been provided accommodations and meals since the late 1970's. There is no other Office in the BCWS that receives this level of treatment. This treatment has created a stigma of special treatment for Salmon Arm staff across the BCWS. Operational fire fighting decisions have been altered due to this stigma. During the 2015 fire season a review of the catering of meals for staff in the Salmon Arm office was conducted. Staff within the Salmon Arm office were involved in this review. The BCWS began an 3.13

On September 7th the Deputy Director of BCWS attended the Salmon Arm office to deliver a decision to staff. This decision was that accommodations and catering of meals for seasonal staff at the Salmon Arm office would end on January 1st 2017. This decision was delivered 7 months prior to staff being affected. The reason for this decision was to treat all BCWS staff in a fair and equitable manner. Staff were instructed to keep this decision confidential until all absent staff could be informed.

On September 16th, 2016 an email drafted by ^{s.22}, a member of the B C Liberal Party, was sent to several MLA's including Minister Steve Thomson complaining about the decision presented to staff by the Deputy Director on September 7th. This email contained several pieces of Ministry knowledge.

II ISSUE:

Recent notice to cancel the room and board option at the Rapattack Base in Salmon Arm and the potential negative ramifications on the future of the Rapattack program

III BACKGROUND:

- On Wednesday, September 7th the Acting Deputy Director (Murray Henry) came to the Rapattack Base to meet with staff.
- Murray presented his position:
 - o Provincial consistency is an important goal for the BCWS, and him personally
 - o All BCWS crews should be treated the same
 - o Rapattack is a great program with a good base model
 - o However, since the Province could not provide the same room and board option to all BCWS crews, he has made the decision to cancel the option at Rapattack.
 - O His decision was not about cost (Rapattack staff pay rent for the room and board option) or the continuation of the Rapattack Operations
 - o He has looked into the rental availability situation in Salmon Arm through the CMHC website and found it to be similar to other towns with fire crews in BC.
 - He believes it should not be a problem to find accommodation for the 35 to 41 auxiliary Rapattack staff in Salmon Arm (10 to 12 three person crews)
 - The base and accommodation could continue to be used for training courses in the spring and fall
 - o Further discussion would be needed to determine if the helicopter aircrew would continue to live on base or not (3 Pilots and 3 Aircraft Maintenance Engineers)
- There was no previous discussion with Rapattack Staff prior to this decision and we are unaware of any review, business case or other factors leading up to it.
- Annual review of room and board costs and recoveries have been completed even though
 it was stated cost was not a factor in this decision.
- Rapattack's primary mandate is to provide rapid initial attack rappel response to difficult
 or inaccessible fires provincially in an effort to keep them from growing into large fires
 that cost taxpayers millions of dollars.
- In order to be safe, cost effective and efficient, limited Rapattack resources are centrally based, and managed (strategically moved and located around the province) by the Rapattack Coordination Officer (RAPCO) on behalf of the Provincial Wildfire Coordination Officer (PWCO) in consultation with the various Regional Wildfire Coordination Officers (RWCOs) to ensure provincial priorities are maintained.
- The Rapattack Base was developed as a residential base in Salmon Arm for the following reasons:
 - Historical fire data supported the location as the closest airport to the statistical centre of the majority of most lightning caused fires in inaccessible terrain

- o There is an important safety component to the program by having all the Rapattack fire staff and Aircrew living, training and working together to develop a strong bond of trust and mutual respect (safety culture).
- o Increased ability to maintain the Standard Operating Procedures critical to safety.
- The residential base allows for increased efficiency during long periods of air operations and fire training and recertification annually (similar to the New Recruit Boot Camps held by the BCWS annually).
- o Reduction in costs during Provincial Training Courses held on base.
- Reduction in the daily costs of Aircrew room and board compared with hotels and restaurants.
- o Reduction in fire crew meal costs compared with per diems.
- o Quicker response times even outside regular hours and weekends.
- Reduced base operations costs with staff filling the role of security and general maintenance.
- o Improved communications in all areas.
- o Increased flexibility in staffing availability and options.
- The original Priorities of the Rapattack Program were: Safety, Fire Control, Innovation, Community Involvement and Meaningful Employment
- The Rapattack Program has been operating safely since 1977 (Salmon Arm since 1979)

IV DISCUSSION:

Discussion points from the review:

- Rapattack staff have been researching the rental accommodation availability in Salmon
 Arm and so far the information suggests that there is very little available accommodation
 within 30 minutes travel time of base (BCWS Standby requirement).
- The little accommodation that exists is either too expensive or not available for staff looking to rent for 4 to 6 months each year.
- Staff continue to look for accommodation options and solutions to other issues that this decision has created.
- Issues and questions that this decision has created are:
 - o If this is all about consistency then why are there other bases that provide accommodation options paid for by the Ministry?
 - o What is the plan if existing staff cannot find accommodations?
 - Is the Ministry prepared to risk losing the majority of current trained and experienced staff?
 - What about the increased time, costs and risks associated with training a new generation?
 - Should we not be fully exploring other viable options to the existing Rapattack Operations before making this kind of decision that could impact the Ministry's ability to respond?
- Are we not expected to follow evidence based decision making based on factual data that supports any adjustments and involve the staff who have the appropriate background and experience to ensure the correct information is used?

ISSUE: ELIMINATION OF ACCOMMODATION AND MEAL PROVISION TO BRITISH COLUMBIA WILDFIRE SERVICE STAFF AT THE RAPPEL BASE IN SALMON ARM

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's, the Rappel Program within the Province's BC Wildfire Service (BCWS) moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent was to create an elite firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of rappelling into incidents via helicopters. Part of this program included full catering of meals and provision of accommodation on the base for the Rappel Program staff. When the program was first moved to Salmon Arm in 1970, the city itself was not set up to provide meals and accommodations, but has since developed into a relatively large urban centre.

Historically, accommodations have been provided as an incentive to recruit and retain staff in remote locations. As such BCWS currently provides subsidized housing in Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Dease Lake and Princeton. In accordance with Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) rules these accommodations have been provided at less than market rate. The city of Salmon Arm falls outside of the CRA prescribed areas for Housing Benefits Paid (CRA Form 4054). BCWS does not provide catering services to any other bases.

In short, the Salmon Arm Rappel Base is the only BCWS base that provides full catering of meals and accommodation to staff. The City of Salmon Arm has a higher rental apartment and townhouse vacancy rate than many other locations that house crews. A similar standalone program, Parattack, does not supply full catering of meals or accommodations to its staff in Fort St. John. Cost aside, the decision was made September 7, 2016 to eliminate accommodation and meal provision at this base to align the Rappel base and staff with the majority of other BCWS base locations across British Columbia (BC). This decision will come into effect January 1st, 2017.

DISCUSSION:

Providing full catering of meals and provision of accommodations to staff in a community where these services are available is an unnecessary expense and is not consistent government standards of fiscal restraint. Elimination of full catering and accommodation for the crews in Salmon Arm will reduce costs and contribute to a culture of consistent treatment of all staff.

There are 4 locations provincially within BCWS that provide rental incentives for housing – Alexis Creek, Fort Nelson, Dease Lake and Princeton. These locations are unique because they are either difficult to recruit locations and/or rental availability is challenging due to remoteness or industrial activity. None of these four locations have the option for government provided catering.

There are no other locations which have BCWS crews located in them similar in size and demographic to Salmon Arm that allow live on accommodations (e.g. Williams Lake, Vernon, Penticton, Parksville, Fort St. John). Salmon Arm is considered an urban centre as defined as having a population of 10,000

people or more by the Canadian Housing and Mortgage Corporation (CMHC). In a review of vacancy rates across BC in communities of similar size to Salmon Arm that also house BCWF staff Salmon Arm has median vacancy rates. Government does not provide accommodation in communities of Salmon Arm's Size, even in areas with low summer vacancy.

RESPONSE POINTS:

- The Provincial Government's Wildfire Service has recently made the decision to eliminate the provision of accommodation and meals to the staff at the Rappel base in Salmon Arm.
- The Rappel base is the only location in the province that currently provides a catering option for staff.
- Making this change will bring Salmon Arm into line with other BCWS centres of the same size and population.
- Making this change in Salmon Arm will bring Provincial consistency where staff are responsible for finding their own accommodation.
- Government must be responsive to tax payer funds. There is a net cost to the tax payer of approximately \$119,000 annually to provide live on accommodation and catering to the Rappel program.
- This decision will also eliminate perceived preferred treatment and allow the Rappel program to operate as most other locations in the province.

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's the Rappel Program moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent of the day was to create an elite firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of Rappelling into incidents via helicopters.

Part of this program included full catering of meals and living accommodations for staff on base. Today this is the only base in BCWS that supplies food and accommodations to staff in a community that has sufficient private resources to fulfil the need. The annual net costs to Government (after staff contributions) to supply these services exceeds \$119,000.00 annually.

BCWS continues to make significant efforts to eliminate inconsistencies in all aspects of staff's working environment.

Staff within BCWS Salmon Arm Base have exhibited a history of bypassing supervisors when they disagreed with decisions, this type of response it anticipated on this issue.

DISCUSSION:

Elitism and special treatments have combined to create a barrier between Rappel crews and other firefighting crews and staff around the Province.

Breaking down this barrier by treating Salmon Arm staff in the same way as the rest of the Province will contribute to the larger FLNRO team culture.

ISSUE: Catering service and living accommodations for staff at the FLNRO Salmon Arm Rappel

Base.

BACKGROUND:

In the late 1970's, the Rappel Program moved to the current location in Salmon Arm. The intent was to create an elite firefighting unit comprised of several Initial Attack crews with the capability of rappelling into incidents via helicopters. Part of this program included full catering of meals and provision of accommodation on the base for the Rappel Program staff. The annual net costs to Government (after staff contributions) to supply these services exceeds an average of \$119,000.00.

BCWS currently provides accommodation on a subsidised basis due to lack of available housing in Fort Nelson, Alexis Creek, Dease Lake and Princeton. The cost of providing accommodation is balanced against the need to locate staff close to the base to ensure rapid deployment. BCWS does not provide catering services to any other bases.

The Salmon Arm Rappel Base is the only BCWS base that provides full catering of meals and accommodations to staff. The city of Salmon Arm has a higher Rental Apartment Vacancy Rate than Kamloops, Vernon or Penticton all of which have BCWS crew bases, but do not offer accommodations. A similar standalone program Parattack does not supply full catering of meals or accommodations to its staff in Fort St John BC.

DISCUSSION:

Providing full catering of meals and provision of accommodations to staff in a community where these services are readily available is an unnecessary expense and has led to a general feeling of special treatment amongst BCWS staff, creating a barrier between Rappel and other firefighting crews around the Province. Elimination of full catering and accommodation for the crews in Salmon Arm will reduce costs and contribute to a culture of consistent treatment of all staff regardless of position or title.

NEXT STEPS:

- 1. Discontinue full catering of meals and accommodation for staff at the Salmon Arm Rappel base effective the end of 2016 fire season,
- 2. Inform staff at the Rappel base of this decision prior to the end of 2016 fire season

This letter is to advise that the British Columbia Wildfire Service will no longer be offering accommodation and meals at the Rappel Base in Salmon Arm in the 2017 fire season. Further to our discussion on September 6, 2016, this change is consistent with our current practice in urban areas of the Province. We are providing notice of the change to allow employees sufficient time to make alternate arrangements for accommodation and meals prior to recall in 2017.

For clarity, accommodations and meals will not be available at the Rappel Base effective April 1st, 2017. The Kamloops Fire Centre strongly encourages you to collaborate with your colleagues ahead of your recall date to locate appropriate accommodation in Salmon Arm or the surrounding area.
