Good morning Tracy

Section 1.02 basically grants the AAC to the TFL holder exclusively. However, if the harvested volume is less than the available AAC for the cut control period the difference is available for disposition. In accordance with Section 75.8 of the Forest Act the undercut volume can be awarded to a FLTC, NRFL, or TSL. This does not reduce the AAC of the TFL or the AAC available to the TFL holder. The undercut volume is determined at the end of the 5 year cut control period. Section 2.04 would apply to undercut volume, but you would still want the consent of the holder to ensure there truly is an undercut.

Regional staff can assist you with the actual process they follow, as I am not sure if they can or do direct the FLTC, NRFL or TSL to specific areas or species.

In addition, volume taken by FRA and still available in the TFL as defined in Part 2.00 of the agreement can be awarded to a NRFL or FLTC. There is still 13,578 m3 in TFL 46, but this may already be in a NRFL or FLTC.

Hi Barry,

Here is a spreadsheet showing the two parcels of THLB that fall within the area shown on the Western Wilderness Committee map. The first tab of the spreadsheet contains a map showing the THLB factor in shades of brown. The vintage of this mapping is still uncertain but I have updated it to align with the current TFL boundary and removed new OGMAs.

The first tabs of the spreadsheet are the resultant data for these parcels (res1 and res2). I also included a tab showing the underlying VRI data for the area. Since I had no spatial data to define the area of interest I simply selected all the VRI polygons above the creek. The VRI area sums to 404 ha which is slightly less than the gross area of 485 ha you mentioned.

The last three tabs are pivot tables that summarize each of the resultant and VRI tabs. Right now they show total area, THLB area, total volume and THLB volume by leading species.

Sorry that I have not included more documentation but I consider this a first approximation. I will add improved documentation as I answer any follow-up requests.

I'm pretty sure the customary warning applies here: please do not distribute outside our organization without first confirming there is a data sharing agreement for the TFL THLB data.

Hi Rhonda,

It turns out we have both VRI and THLB mapping for that area. I will have to investigate to figure out the vintage of the THLB data (and the status around sharing this information) but I can see that the VRI is from 2006.

It appears that proposed blocks 4401, 4403, 4405, and 4409 are in the 'bite' and I will summarize the blob of THLB in that area. Proposed blocks 4410, 4411, 4412 and 4424 are in another blob of THLB above the 'bite' that I will also

summarize. The total volume of the area will be tricky to summarize without a defined boundary. I can estimate a boundary using the creek and the end of the THLB blob if you like.

You can get a rough idea by comparing the screen capture below with the map link that you provided. THLB mapping is in shades of brown. VRI leading species in shades of green. Existing cutblocks bordered in red.

- 6. In 1992, Instrument No. 15 removed an area of land capable of sustaining an SBFEP AAC of 50 140 m³ (corresponding to the 5% increase in AAC due to 1988 change of control). Schedule B prorate changed as a result.
- 7. In a ltr dated Nov. 27/96, the CF reduced AAC from 558,860 to 535,000. The decrease accounted for stand-level biodiversity and riparian areas under the Code and for new protected areas such as Carmanah-Walbran Park. The prorated AAC for 1996 was 556,862 m3 (Sch A = 92,427; Licencee Sch B = 464,444 m3).
- 8. Change in control of Timber West Forest Limited (TWF) by TAL and its subsequent amalgamation of TAL with TWF to form a new TWF effective Jun. 23,/97. Five (5) % of AAC (20 196 m³) available to SBFEP. The prorated AAC for 1997 was 535,000 (Sch A = 131,075; SBFEP Sch B = 10,624; Licencee Sch B = 393,301)
- 9. The Minister, in a letter dated Jan. 13/99, agreed that effective Jan. 1, 1999, TW would give certain properties to govt and in partial payment, would allow the removal of 61,000 ha of private land from TFL 46 which contributed 52 260 m³ to the Sched. A AAC. The Sched. A AAC was therefore reduced by that amount.
- 10. Effective Jun 25/03, Inst. 24 deleted an area capable of sustaining the SBFEP portion of the AAC which was 20,196 m3.
- 11. Effective Sept. 1, 2003, the Dep. Chief Forester determined the AAC to be 510, 000 m3. Effective the same date, the DCF announced an 11,000 m3 reduction from the 510,000 m3 AAC (bringing it to 499,000 m3) due to the Hill 60 Desginated Area. A prorate of .826 was applied to the AAC, then the Part 13 of 11,000 was reduced from Sched. B.
- 12. Effective Jul. 1, 2004, the DCF replaced the Hill 60 Designated Area order the temporary AAC reduction changes from 11,000 to 9,600. The AAC as a result of the last determination is 510,000 but it is temporarily reduced by 9,600 to 500,400.
- 13. Effective July 19, 2004, all remaining private lands (2,602 ha) were deleted from the TFL. The DCF adjusted the AAC effective the same date. The total AAC is now 498,000 but the termporary AAC reduction of 9,600 is still in effect therefore the current AAC is 488,400 m3. As all private land was deleted, the Sched. B prorate increased to .853 resulting in a higher Sched. B AAC.
- 14. Effective Dec 31, 2004, FRA reduced the licensee's portion of the AAC by 118 107 m3. The FRA apportionment stays within the TFL. Also effective Jan. 1, 2005, in accordance with the "Timber Reallocation Transition Agreement, dated April 1, 2005, the Hill 60 Part 13 area became part of the BCTS operating area. This volume was added back to the licence holder's apportionment (297,087 + 9,600 = 306,687) & the FRA apportionment was reduced accordingly (118,107 9,600 = 108,507). The AAC without the Part 13 reduction is 498,000.
- 15. FRA reduced the licensee's portion of the AAC by 12 530 m3. This volume was added to the existing FRA apportionment.
- 16. Effective Feb. 12, 2008, FRA orders 3(4) 21-1 & 3(4) 21-2 deleted Crown land contributing 1,500 & 1,281 m3 respectively for a total of 2,781 m3 for the purposes of a woodlot licence for the T'Souke FN.. There will be no change to the AAC apportionment including the FRA disposition until the next AAC determination given that this transaction preceded the AAC Regulation and the AAC therefore cannot be reduced.
- 17. Effective Mar. 31, 2008, FRA order 3(4) 21-3 deleted Crown land contributing 6,584 m3. There will be no change to the AAC apportionment including the FRA disposition until the next AAC determination this is the same situation as 16 above.
- 18. The Hill 60 Designated Area expired on Jun. 30, 2009, in accordance with OIC 179 dated Mar. 29, 2007. Hill 60 Designated Area No. 2 was created on Aug. 20, 2009 in accordance with OIC 412, however, no orders have yet been issued.
- 19. Effective Jul. 15, 2009, 3 instruments (No.'s 28, 29 & 30) & the AAC Regulation have reduced the AAC of TFL 46 by 13,523 & 67,593 & 4,587 m3 respectively for a total reduction to the FRA apportionment & total AAC of 85,703 m3.
- 20. Effective May 24, 2011, Chief Forester AAC Determination set the new AAC at 403,000 m³/year. As a result of this determination the FRA AAC reservation established under Order 3(2)21-1, 3(2)21-2 and 3(2)21-3 which had areas removed in February 12, 2008 and March 31, 2008 under approved FRA Orders 3(4)21-1, 3(4)21-2 and 3(4)21-3 and volumes were not adjusted until a new determination have now reduced the FRA AAC Reservation by 9,365 m³/year.
- 21. Effective May 15, 2012 FRA Order 3(4)(b) 21/23-1 deleted 3,500.5 ha (21,991 m3/year AAC) for the Pacific TSA

TFL No. 22 Maquinna Tree Farm Licence

May 18, 1955 Forest Management Licence Issued

Forest Management Licence issued to British Columbia Forest Products Limited.

July 1, 1981 TFL Replacement

<u>British Columbia Forest Products Ltd.</u> was awarded Tree Farm Licence 22 for a 25 year period.

Logging commenced in the Port Renfrew area approximately 70 years ago, when a shingle mill was established in this location, and selective logging was carried out on the large Cedar trees close to the beach.

A railroad operation, starting about 1925 on the north side of the San Juan River, was operated by several companies before British Columbia Forest Products Limited (BCFP) acquired the existing operation from the Hemmingsen-Cameron Company in 1946. The Malahat Logging Company logged on the south side of the San Juan River from 1937 to 1946 before it too was acquired by BCFP. The two railway operations were consolidated to form the Renfrew Logging Division.

Logging commenced in the Cowichan Valley area around 1900 and has carried on continuously in this area for the past 70 years.

Logging in the Tofino area commenced on a large scale around 1940. However, up until the mid 1960's, Blocks 4 and 5 of the Tree Farm Licence were relatively undisturbed by logging. These blocks now form part of TFL 54

July 1, 1983 Amalgamation

British Columbia Forest Products Ltd. amalgamated TFLs 22 and 27 under Tree Farm Licence 46. TFL 46 was awarded to that company for a term of 20 years and 6 months.

March 17, 1987 Land Exchange

British Columbia Forest Products Ltd. exchanged land for the establishment of Pacific Rim National Park.

September 2, 1988 Change of Name

A share transfer occurred effective September 2, 1988 and as a result TFL 46 changed ownership from <u>British Columbia Forest Products Ltd.</u> to <u>Fletcher Challenge Canada Ltd.</u>

December 16, 1993 Assignment

<u>Fletcher Challenge Canada Limited</u> assigned TFL 46 to <u>TimberWest Limited</u>. The assignment also included the Elk Falls Lumbermill, Cowichan Lumbermill, the William Lake complex and all associated timberlands. <u>Fletcher Challenge Canada Limited</u> retained a 51% shareholding.

TFL No. 27 Nitinat Tree Farm Licence

October 20, 1958 Forest Management Licence Issued

Forest Management Licence issued to <u>Moore-Whittington Lumber Company</u> Limited.

Prior to this date, very little logging had been conducted in this area. There is some evidence of early logging prior to 1920 scattered along the westerly shores of Nitinat Lake near it's mouth and along the east side of the Nitinat River. These areas are now located outside of the Tree Farm Licence.

More recent logging is evidenced along the westerly shores of Nitinat Lake. These areas were logged mainly by "A" frame methods by the former Sorenson Logging Company, about 1939 and 1940, and consequently, no road development was present on these operations.

November 29, 1963 Assignment

Moore-Whittington Lumber Co. Ltd. assigned FML 27 and all its interest therein to British Columbia Forest Products Ltd.

October 20, 1979 TFL Replacement

A 25 year Tree Farm Licence 27 was awarded to B.C. Forest Products Ltd.

July 1, 1983 Amalgamation

<u>B.C. Forest Products Ltd.</u> effectively amalgamated TFLs 22 and 27 under Tree Farm Licence 46. TFL 46 was awarded to that company for a term of 20 years and 6 months.

History of Present AAC (for the AAC Rationale)

- On May 18, 1955, British Columbia Forest Products Ltd.(BCFP) was granted Forest Management Licence (FML) 22 which became TFL 22 on July 1, 1981.
- On October 20, 1958, the Moore-Whittington Lumber Company Ltd. was awarded FML 27 which they assigned to BCFP on November 29, 1963. This licence was replaced as TFL 27 on October 20, 1979.
- On July 1, 1983, BCFP amalgamated TFLs 22 and 27 to form TFL 46.
- The original AAC for TFL 46 was set at 1 178 000 cubic metres.
- In 1988, the AAC was reduced by 76 020 cubic metres which was transferred to the Small Business Forest Enterprise Program (SBFEP); 50 680 cubic metres were due to an assignment and subsequent 5% AAC under Bill 50 and the remaining 25 340 cubic metres were removed under Bill 28.
- In 1989, an additional 25 340 cubic metres, for a total of 101 360 cubic metres, was allocated to the SBFEP.
- On December 19, 1991, TFL 46 was subdivided into TFLs 46 and 54. The intent was to split the SBFEP volume of 101 360 cubic metres equally between the TFLs. However, the negotiations relative to TFL 54 resulted in a logical area being apportioned to the SBFEP that had an AAC of 51 220 cubic metres, slightly more than the fifty percent figure of 50 140 cubic metres. Therefore, the remaining volume available for the SBFEP on TFL 46 was 101 360 cubic metres, minus 51 220 m3, which equalled 50 140 cubic metres.
- On December 9, 1992, the Minister signed Instrument Number 15 which removed land capable of sustaining an AAC of 50 140 cubic metres. This was the volume apportioned to the SBFEP within TFL 46.

- On July 15, 2009 the Minister approved Instruments 28, 29, and 30 which removed areas from the TFL under *Forest Revitalization Act* but could not adjust the AAC until the next determination
- On May 24, 2011 the Chief Forester determined a new AAC for TFL 46 at 403,000 m³/year. This AAC accounted for the volume reduction estimates established under Instruments 28, 29, and 30 while maintaining a *Forest Revitalization Act* reservation of 35,569 m³/year for the future deletions of Hill 60 (13,578m³/year) and Ditidaht Firat Nation Woodlot (21,991 m³/year).

Hi Barry,

Here is a spreadsheet showing the two parcels of THLB that fall within the area shown on the Western Wilderness Committee map. The first tab of the spreadsheet contains a map showing the THLB factor in shades of brown. The vintage of this mapping is still uncertain but I have updated it to align with the current TFL boundary and removed new OGMAs.

The first tabs of the spreadsheet are the resultant data for these parcels (res1 and res2). I also included a tab showing the underlying VRI data for the area. Since I had no spatial data to define the area of interest I simply selected all the VRI polygons above the creek. The VRI area sums to 404 ha which is slightly less than the gross area of 485 ha you mentioned.

The last three tabs are pivot tables that summarize each of the resultant and VRI tabs. Right now they show total area, THLB area, total volume and THLB volume by leading species.

Sorry that I have not included more documentation but I consider this a first approximation. I will add improved documentation as I answer any follow-up requests.

I'm pretty sure the customary warning applies here: please do not distribute outside our organization without first confirming there is a data sharing agreement for the TFL THLB data.



Hi Rhonda,

It turns out we have both VRI and THLB mapping for that area. I will have to investigate to figure out the vintage of the THLB data (and the status around sharing this information) but I can see that the VRI is from 2006.

It appears that proposed blocks 4401, 4403, 4405, and 4409 are in the 'bite' and I will summarize the blob of THLB in that area. Proposed blocks 4410, 4411, 4412 and 4424 are in another blob of THLB above the 'bite' that I will also summarize. The total volume of the area will be tricky to summarize without a defined boundary. 



The Province of British Columbia manages natural forest resources in a sustainable manner that allows British Columbians to enjoy the economic and social benefits that flow from continued employment of the nearly 56,000 people who work directly in the forest industry and about as many more who provide goods and services to those in the industry. The social well-being of dozens of smaller communities throughout British Columbia is critically dependent on continuing to harvest existing forests. Log exports play a relatively small but important role in this. Logs harvested from Crown land are generally allowed to be exported only if they are surplus to the needs of domestic manufacturers. A careful review of export applications is used to determine if there is a domestic buyer interested in buying the logs. In addition, to ensure that the public, as the owner of Crown land, gets fair value for the logs, a "fee in lieu of manufacture in the province" is collected on exported logs. The federal government oversees the export of surplus logs from private land (about half of all log exports) with a similar process for reviewing export applications, but does not charge a fee in lieu of manufacture. Allowing some log exports provides more jobs in the logging, transportation and manufacturing sectors than would be possible without log exports.

Although British Columbia's log exports have increased, over 90 percent of the timber harvested remains in the province for manufacturing, and manufactured products continue to make up most of the value of exported forest products.

Forest management and logging practices in British Columbia are controlled in part by the *Forest and Range Practices Act* (FRPA). Combined with compliance and enforcement, the Act and its regulations contribute to high quality forest management, sustaining environmental values while providing economic opportunities for future generations. The FRPA creates legal objectives for the conservation and protection of wildlife, fish, biodiversity, soils, water, forage, visual quality and cultural heritage resources. In addition, thousands of old growth management areas have been

established since 1999. In areas where old growth management areas do not exist, the FRPA includes objectives for the proportion of old forest required to be maintained for biodiversity values. Forest licensees must ensure that their plans are consistent with these objectives.

Regarding a conservation plan for Vancouver Island's rainforest, the Vancouver Island Land Use Plan includes the designation of special management zones. Special management zones are established for maintaining environmental, recreational and cultural heritage values while the principles of sustainable forest and ecosystem management are implemented.

In the Walbran Valley on Vancouver Island, the lower Walbran watershed is fully protected as it is included in the 16,450 hectares of the Carmanah/Walbran Park and the 25,640 hectares of the West Coast Trail Unit of the Pacific Rim National Park. Although the upper Walbran watershed is outside of these protected areas, it has been designated as Special Management Zone 21 (SMZ-21) under the Vancouver Island Land Use Plan and is being managed to sustain and conserve the unique ecological values of the area. In the upper Walbran area the primary resource values that have been identified are fish habitat, old growth biodiversity and recreation opportunities. The Vancouver Island Land Use Plan is available online at: www.for.gov.bc.ca/tasb/slrp/plan90.html.

A more recent example of maintaining large tracts of intact temperate rainforest in British Columbia is the establishment of the 6.4 million hectare Great Bear Rainforest, covering an area larger than Switzerland. Declared "a gift to the world" by Greenpeace Canada, 85 percent of this area will be reserved from harvesting and more than 2.3 million hectares will be fully excluded from timber harvesting.

Within British Columbia, forests play an important role. Forests act as both carbon sources and carbon sinks. For the past quarter century, British Columbia's managed forests have been a significant carbon sink, steadily adding carbon to

that already stored. More recently, however, the situation has started to reverse. As a result of increasing wildfires and pests such as the mountain pine beetle, British Columbia's forests are also carbon sources.

While we have a number of specific activities underway, as outlined in the previously mentioned Climate Change Strategy, we have also collaborated with the federal government to achieve changes in the way forest and forest product accounting occur internationally to not only reflect carbon sequestration in growing forests, but also to accommodate the effects of natural events that may release forest carbon and recognize the significant amount of carbon that remains stored in long-lived wood products.

ISSUE: Direction required for addressing old growth forest issues on Vancouver Island

BACKGROUND:

Old growth forest¹ management is an important and increasingly sensitive issue on Vancouver Island. Old growth forests are valued for their ecological importance, their social, spiritual and cultural significance, and are an important source of high quality timber.

Recently, environmental groups have organized a campaign to protect old growth forests in the Walbran Valley adjacent to the Carmanah-Walbran Park and have launched a "stop old growth logging on Vancouver Island" campaign. East Creek, on the northwest side of Vancouver Island near Brooks Peninsula, is another area of increasing conflict between industry and Environmental Non-Government Organizations (ENGOs). A current publication from the Sierra Club and the Wilderness Committee ("Vancouver Island's Last Stand") highlights 16 areas that they suggest should be considered for "protection and restoration" (see Appendix 1).

ENGOs are concerned that old growth protection is inadequate and that the transition to second growth logging is too slow. The rise of "big tree" tourism is seen as an economic opportunity for communities. The public in general enjoy being around "big trees" regardless of age and this has generated some tourism interest particularly in the area of Port Renfrew where Avatar Grove was protected a few years ago in an Old Growth Management Area (OGMA). Some communities have requested that the province protect areas with big trees.

Vancouver Island has an area of approximately 3.3 million hectares; of which 2.4 million hectares is Crown land. The forested Crown land area is 1.9 million hectares, of which 40 percent is old growth forest. More than one third of these old growth forests are protected or reserved although it is not evenly distributed across the island or across ecosystems. The majority of old growth forest is found in the western and northern parts of Vancouver Island, across a range of productivity classes. The least old growth forest is found on the highly productive east side of Vancouver Island, most of which is private land in close proximity to the island's main urban centres. The Crown areas of east Vancouver Island were logged first and are now largely second growth.

Current old growth forest management on Vancouver Island reflects an early harvest history and implementation of the Vancouver Island Land Use Plan (VILUP). The Vancouver Island Land Use Decision was made in 1994 and the objectives were made legal through the Vancouver Island Higher Level Order in 2000. During VILUP discussions, limited consultation with First Nations occurred, stakeholder consensus was limited and protection was capped at 13 percent.

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¹ The definition of "old growth forest" is a topic of debate. For this initiative, it means a forest stand with a measured inventory age greater than 250 years.

Today, old growth forest management mechanisms used on Vancouver Island include: VILUP, the provincial Non-Spatial Old Growth Order, spatially designated OGMAs in some areas, the Clayoquot Sound Land Use Objectives Order with associated watershed plans and the Coastal Douglas Fir Land Use Order. Old growth forest is also reserved or protected in wildlife habitat areas, ungulate winter ranges, parks, ecological reserves, and wildlife management areas. Old growth forest planning under these mechanisms is largely complete however there are some areas where additional spatialization of OGMAs is possible. In addition, there is ongoing work to develop an implementation plan to address the critical habitat needs for Northern Goshawk (NOGO) and Marbled Murrelet (MAMU), which will involve the establishment of additional wildlife habitat areas.

The province faces several challenges in managing old growth forests on Vancouver Island. Competing interests for a limited resource results in conflict between industry and ENGOs. First Nations also have strong interests in land and resource on Vancouver Island. Given the increased focus by ENGOs on Vancouver Island, as well as questions being raised by communities and First Nations, it is important that the province develop and communicate a strategy regarding old growth forests. The purpose of this briefing note is to seek the minister's direction on the scope of the strategy and request a briefing meeting to discuss the options with the minister.
