Our office has had an inquiry from one of our constituents, John Templeton, from the Stoney Creek Streamkeepers. Do you have any information we can share with this group?

Q1: John mentioned that when he tried to contact the Ministry to report this spill incident in Burnaby (https://www.burnabynow.com/news/toxic-runoff-from-murder-victim-s-torched-jeep-killed-dozens-of-young-fish-1.23408133), he learned that there's only two staff available at the emergency centre he called to report spills - and the person he talked to was based in Kamloops.

He'd like to obtain more information on how the Ministry works to deal with emergency situations like this.

Q2: John also states that, when there's work needed to be done for waterways, the local city normally needs to apply for permit approval from the Ministry, but the time and process can take months. It sometimes results in significant delays which may affect the fish habitat in more urgent situations. He provided an example: in February 2018, City of Burnaby applied for a permit from the Ministry to get a waterway redone for the salmon stream to go through in Ash Grove (Forest Grove) area, but it took months for the process and it was already too late for this year's salmon stream by the time the City got the permit.

The constituent has contacted both the Land Title Office and a lawyer but neither provided clarify on what is required to declare an old easement obsolete other than to say – that's legal, you'll need to argue it in court.

For aging easements and variables across the province there must be a more fulsome process that allows for aging infrastructure and site specifics.

MLA Sturdy would like that process clarified in writing please versus just saying to the constituent "consult a lawyer". We've been asked for guidance and we'd like to provide as much as we can.

It is known that the pipe is thought to be about 25 years past its original projected lifespan and is known over the years to have been inadvertently dug up and broken in at least 5 places. I'd like to clarify from staff what would be required to remove the easement altogether as we've already discussed, AND outline what would be required for the owner to survey a revised more suitable path across the lot and lay a new pipe that would provide for any future use while solving the immediate problem.

- The Province encourages applicants to reach out and proactively engage First Nations on Crown land proposals.
- Building relationships and garnering the support of First Nations will often help to expedite the application review and the result can be favourable for the applicant.
- If discussions between **s**.22 and the OW led to an accommodation agreement between the parties and OW support for the submission and Provincial approval of an application to purchase the lease, the Province would accept an application for review and take that support into consideration.
- The Province cannot relinquish the duty to consult and the final land use decision rests with the Province.
- The Province recognizes the outstanding commitment to negotiate an Economic and Community Development Agreement (ECDA) with the OW and will be reaching out to re-engage the OW on this matter.

I understand that you are concerned about the future security of your lease, so I hope that the following information helps to ease some of your worry.

As you are aware, the cabin colony at Hudson Bay Mountain Resort (HBMR) has been in place for a long time. Many of the cabins were built in an unplanned manner without authorization from the Province. In order to legalize the improvements, the lots were surveyed and leases were offered to the cabin owners. The cabin colony is recognized in the HBMR Master Plan (https://www2.gov.bc.ca/gov/content/industry/natural-resource-use/resort-development/proposed-approved-resort-master-plans/list-of-approved-plans/hudson-bay-mountain) and Master Development Agreement (MDA, this is the contract between the resort and the Province), and HBMR is cognizant of the history and the importance of the cabin colony on the mountain.

Prior to the Province approving the Master Plan and the MDA, extensive consultation was completed with stakeholders, agencies, First Nations and the public. The Province engaged in deep consultation with the Office of the Wet'suwet'en (OW) and through that process, the OW did not express any concern regarding the cabin colony. In addition, to date, the OW has not expressed concern regarding the replacement of leases in the cabin colony.

If an existing tenure is in good standing and the leasee is in compliance with the conditions of the tenure, it is unlikely that a decision would be made to cancel a lease or allow it to expire; however, the Province has an obligation to review each replacement application as it comes in and consider all information that is available at that time, including the interests and concerns of First Nations.

Although there has been a history of the Province selling leases within the cabin colony, we have now heard from OW that they are opposed to the sale of land at HBMR and the Province has an obligation to address their concerns. It is important to understand that a fee simple disposition (sale of Crown land) is a substantial decision that has a high potential to impact the rights and title of First Nations. As mentioned below, the Province has an outstanding commitment to work with the OW to come to an agreement with regard to the future disposition of land at HBMR and this obligation needs to be satisfied to ensure that our decisions are durable and defensible.

As for the number of leases, there are approximately 15 in the cabin colony. Not all of the lots within the cabin colony have been leased; some have been retained by the Province for ski hill purposes. New leases for Residential Recreational purposes on Crown land at HBMR are not being offered, and only those existing leases in good standing are offered for replacement.

Below is the email that I tried to send earlier today to the wrong email address. It contains some background information explaining why we are currently unable to sell the leases at Hudson Bay Mountain.

As requested, I looked at the *Residential Land Use Operational Policy* and it states that lessees may apply for tenure replacement after the midpoint of the term. In the case of seasonal occupancy, the maximum term is 15 years. You are eligible to apply for replacement as of April 1, 2019 (7.5 years from the commencement of the term).

I have attached the form that you will need to complete and send back to us for the replacement of your lease. The fee for the replacement of an existing tenure is \$210 (including GST); cheques are to be addressed to the Minister of Finance. Along with your application I will need some additional information about the property and the improvements on it, specifically:

- Any available details about the cabin itself (age, approximate size, construction materials, etc.)

I received a message from our Client Services Branch, indicating that you were interested in purchasing your lease on files. 22 located at Hudson Bay Mountain Resort.

At this time, the Province is unable to offer residential/recreational leaseholders with the option to purchase their leases. Early in 2017 the Office of the Wet'suwet'en contacted our office and expressed their opposition to the sale of lands in dispute, which includes those at Hudson Bay Mountain, without benefit or accommodation for the loss of occupation and use of their traditional territories. Work has been underway since circa 2008 to come to an agreement between the Province and the Wet'suwet'en regarding the lands on which Hudson Bay Mountain is located; however, an agreement has not yet been reached and there is no clear timeline for a resolution. Please be assured that the Province is not unfamiliar with scenarios such as this and has a skilled team of professionals that will lead the discussions when the parties reengage in negotiations. Once an agreement is reached with the Wet'suwet'en the option to purchase may still be available, in which case you will be notified.

Although the sale of leases is not currently an option, the Province can still offer the replacement of expiring leases for the standard term of 15 years. According to your file, the commencement date for your current lease was October 1, 2011. Prior to the expiry of your lease on October 1, 2026, you will be contacted by the Province and informed of your options. I understand that this may not be the information that you were hoping to receive. Please feel free to give me a call at 250-371-3930 if you would like to discuss this further.

update. I filled him in on your notes below. He was surprised because he has no record of being told in April that the society could proceed with their paddling operation at the site for the 2018 season. They have been using a different, temporary site. Mr Hammer had actually asked on a few occasions if they in fact could use the site and never received an answer. If there is record (an email/letter etc) of the society being told they could use the site is it possible to receive a copy?

Part of the issue is that they need to build a dock and boat storage on the water – they cannot build on land because city by-law does not allow for them to build a permanent structure.

The last information we received would indicate that the application should be complete by end of August or October at the latest. - December 2016, a new application was submitted by the Pitt Meadows Dike Usage Enhancement Society (Society) to use the foreshore of a property to host a paddling club.
- FLNRORD received complaints about the condition of the foreshore area from the upland owner of the property.
- In August 2017, FLNRORD Lands representative and C&E staff person were conducting a site inspection and found that the site under application was being used to store boats, canoes, buoys and other material. Our constituent, Rick Hammer, visited the office again yesterday at the end of the day to get an update. I filled him in on your notes below. He was surprised because he has no record of being told

in April that the society could proceed with their paddling operation at the site for the 2018 season. They have been using a different, temporary site. Mr Hammer had actually asked on a few occasions if they in fact could use the site and never received an answer. If there is record (an email/letter etc) of the society being told they could use the site is it possible to receive a copy?

Part of the issue is that they need to build a dock and boat storage on the water – they cannot build on land because city by-law does not allow for them to build a permanent structure.

The last information we received would indicate that the application should be complete by end of August or October at the latest. According to the bullets below, the last bullet indicates another 2-4 months, but it isn't clear whether that is from August (meaning completion October-December) or the previous 2-4 months given (meaning completion end of August-October).

You can see the confusion and frustration

- December 2016, a new application was submitted by the Pitt Meadows Dike Usage Enhancement Society (Society) to use the foreshore of a property to host a paddling club.
- FLNRORD received complaints about the condition of the foreshore area from the upland owner of the property.
- In August 2017, FLNRORD Lands representative and C&E staff person were conducting a site inspection and found that the site under application was being used to store boats, canoes, buoys and other material. The site was not in a safe, clean and sanitary condition. The Society was notified to clean up the site before their new application could be processed.
- In October 2017, MLA Lisa Beare contacted FLNRORD Authorizations staff to discuss the situation. She was informed that we required the applicant to clean up the site and when he had completed the actions and notified us, his application would be processed. She was out of her office until December 2017 and staff spoke to her about how the site was to be cleaned up and the applicant was to notify us that the work was done.
- In March 2018, FLNRORD representative confirmed, with evidence provided by the applicant,

- that the site had been cleaned up and the application would be processed.
- In April 2018, FLNRORD representative told Mr. Hammer (the applicant) that as the

When the Minister of FLNRO, oh and I forgot Rural Development is also part of the same ministry has s.22 as 2cnd in command, it leaves little hope for sustainability of all our fish. Points to consider. 1. Why do we allow open net fish farm to keep polluting, spreading deadly diseases to all wild salmon, especially when these farms are directly on migratory routes for wild salmon. 2. When SE Alaska shut down all fishing in 2018, we ended up with more salmon and steelhead than was predicted. So wow, let's not take advantage of this and let these extra fish spawn. Proposals were put forth by some of the best fish biologists in North America to minimize angler impact on the few returning fish (one biologist has 30 years experience in Skeena Region), and once again these were ignored. 5. Why do we're allow angling for steelhead on their spawning beds??6. Why are "sports fishermen"still allowed to fish bait, especially on catch and release fisheries. 7. Everyone has identified that our Chinook are in dire straits, and if you have a salt water, fresh water angling license you can kill 40 a year, are you kidding me. That's 800lbs of 1 species of salmon per person if they average 20 lbs. 8. If these fish have any chance of survival, governments need to quit maximizing utilization and harvest, instead of waiting till they're all gone and the close it all! East coast cod was managed into extinction by bureaucrats, and it looks as though our bureaucracy is on the same path. I truly believe there's a conspiracy to get rid of all wild fish, then implement hatcheries everywhere!! We know how that's worked out in the lower 49th! Non resident anglers are beating up on our fish with every type of very effective gear for \$20 per day on classified waters. Even in eastern Canada, it's \$500 per day, and up to \$2,000 per day on rivers around the

When was the diversion to Dairy Lake decommissioned and under what circumstances (i.e. nature)?

- This diversion (point of diversion 45884) has had years of repeated spring freshet complications. CN Railway is the holder of both licenses (C106482 and C129600) on this diversion.
- Staff believe that in 2012 the diversion structure was destroyed during a high water event.
- CN rebuilt the structure, which was then completely destroyed again during freshet in 2017.
- To add complications, the creek channel moved during 2017 freshet, and then the diversion ditch that is used to carry water from the diversion to the lake was damaged during fire guard installation during the Ashcroft fire in the summer of 2017.

Will the diversion be reinstated, and if so when?

- Yes the diversion will be reinstated as it is part of the condition of the water licence.
- CN Railway and the rancher that leases the appurtenant land to the water licence (lease holder) are aware of the issues, and will be coming up with a plan.
- FLNRORD hasn't had an update on progress from the license holder since last fall.

Who manages the weir on Dairy Lake, and what criteria is used for managing the flows out of the lake?

- The lease holder manages the dam on Dairy Lake on behalf of CN.
- The release is based on schedules set out in the water licences and needs for irrigation.
- The diversion of water to storage in Dairy Lake is licenced from November 1st to June 15th each year.
- Irrigation season is from April 1st to September 30th each year.
- Water can be released for irrigation as needed during the irrigation season.

Regarding the diversion referred to that is closer to Hwy 1 for irrigation purposes:

- There are three diversions lower on Cache Creek which have numerous licences on them. Attached is a spreadsheet that lists the volumes and timing windows for release.
- Staff note that all of these diversions have suffered the same fate as the Dairy Lake diversion. The licence holders have consistently been trying to fix the diversions since 2012 but every spring for the last two years they have been severely damaged. FLNRORD staff have been in contact with all of the licensees repeatedly for the last 3 years.

When was the diversion to Dairy Lake decommissioned and under what circumstances (i.e. nature)?

- This diversion (point of diversion 45884) has had years of repeated spring freshet complications. CN Railway is the holder of both licenses (C106482 and C129600) on this diversion.
- Staff believe that in 2012 the diversion structure was destroyed during a high water event.
- CN rebuilt the structure, which was then completely destroyed again during freshet in 2017.
- To add complications, the creek channel moved during 2017 freshet, and then the diversion ditch that is used to carry water from the diversion to the lake was damaged during fire guard installation during the Ashcroft fire in the summer of 2017.

Will the diversion be reinstated, and if so when?

- Yes the diversion will be reinstated as it is part of the condition of the water licence.
- CN Railway and the rancher that leases the appurtenant land to the water licence (lease holder) are aware of the issues, and will be coming up with a plan.
- FLNRORD hasn't had an update on progress from the license holder since last fall.

Who manages the weir on Dairy Lake, and what criteria is used for managing the flows out of the lake?

- The lease holder manages the dam on Dairy Lake on behalf of CN.
- The release is based on schedules set out in the water licences and needs for irrigation.
- The diversion of water to storage in Dairy Lake is licenced from November 1st to June 15th each year.
- Irrigation season is from April 1st to September 30th each year.
- Water can be released for irrigation as needed during the irrigation season.

Regarding the diversion referred to that is closer to Hwy 1 for irrigation purposes:

- There are three diversions lower on Cache Creek which have numerous licences on them. Attached is a spreadsheet that lists the volumes and timing windows for release.
- Staff note that all of these diversions have suffered the same fate as the Dairy Lake diversion. The licence holders have consistently been trying to fix the diversions since 2012 but every spring for the last two years they have been severely damaged. FLNRORD staff have been in contact with all of the licensees repeatedly for the last 3 years.

Dear Minister Donaldson,

I just read a recent Notice to BC Resident Hunters authored by Yvonne Foxall, Deputy Director of the Wildlife and Habitat Branch. The notice states that BC Resident Hunters are now required to prove their residency and register with a "credential" to be maintained within their individual electronic file in the hunter registry system. This credential is to be renewed every three years, and a hunter must determine when their existing credential expires to know when they must update it, which can be done up to six months in advance of whenever it expires. Now for many this may seem an

insignificant detail, a minor additional hoop to jump through to obtain a hunting license. However, let me assure you, this is going to piss-off many a hunter when they go to purchase a hunting license at a vendor only to be told, no, they first have to go online or into Service BC to update this credential before they can obtain their license. For them, it will confirm the messaging coming from the right that suggests that the NDP is good at creating inept bureaucracy and not at governing where it counts. To be clear I support the current government, but am concerned when I see policy like this which appears to have limited value except to make life more complicated for hunters. In doing so, it also disproportionally affects rural people. The thing is, hunters are already required to prove their residency every year when they buy their hunting license by providing their BC identification. Therefore, perhaps a more effective measure would be to enter into agreements with the rest of Confederation to enable the BC Conservation Officer service to easily enquire if individual hunters have received Provincial identification in any other province or territory within a year in question. Not only would this provide more effective information to Conservation Officers, but would save BC hunters grief and from one more reason to dislike the government. Alternately, should this prove impossible, why not have the credential updated every year when hunters obtain their licenses, by whatever means including vendors? Surely it makes little difference in the registry system as to by whom or how the credential is updated? Many rural hunters already feel that their access to wild game is under threat and the licensing, regulations, and fees required for such access are cumbersome and onerous. Adding any unnecessary burden in this regard only adds to such sentiment.

Thought I would drop you a quick note and let you know what is going on with us. We continue to grow support, with well over 65,000 signatures on our Change.Org petition, https://www.change.org/p/government-of-british-columbia-stop-spraying-bc-forests-with-herbicide-to-kill-trees-like-poplar-that-wildlife-need, and well over 1,000 followers on our FB page.

Evidently there has been some great concern expressed by Prince George residents, as we were asked to give a private presentation to the local Liberal MLA's Shirley Bond and Mike Morris last summer. Recently Mike Morris announced on our FB page that he pledges to do everything he can to Stop Glyphosate spraying, and had previously announced that he plans to run on that platform in the next election.

You may have heard about the recent court case in California, where an applicator was awarded \$89 million in damages for cancer that a jury determined was caused by Roundup. There are another 8,000 similar cases now awaiting trial in the U.S.

Here is a link to a study done at UNBC that suggests that spraying is in fact not necessary at all, given certain parameters.

fbclid=IwAR3EBwmaJW1TjaWYxmAQ-fJ4fGSY4s-5NDoWE8tj6c1ZV8MpBACuuvPfL0A Following that logic, then we suggest that anyone spraying be assessed the provincial carbon tax of \$40/ton, for all the broadleaf biomass that is killed off. Roughly that would work out to about

\$ 800/hectare, making spraying uneconomical.

We have tried contacting the local DM about our concerns, but have been told that Glyphosate spraying is allowed, since Health Canada has approved its use. This is clearly an unacceptably simple response to the many concerns we have.

Therefore we would still like to meet with Minister Donaldson at his convenience. We would hope he has the same level of interest that has been shown by both the Liberal MLA's from PG, and Andrew Weaver (through his questions in the Assembly).

RE: Comments regarding the Options for made in BC Wild Salmon Strategy paper.

As the president of a non-profit society that has engaged in clean ups of local waterways to support wildlife I am disappointed that I learned of this strategy so late in the process, I suppose it really does speak to the need of Goal 2, "Support and encourage greater community engagement with wild salmon".

Located in the BC Lower Mainland I am obviously very concerned over the sustainability of the Fraser River and the estuary. Conservationists in the area have had to, and continue to, go to enormous lengths to provide opposition to Port developments that will negatively impact the sustainability of the lower Fraser River ecosystem. As economic development/sustainability continues to trump environmental sustainability along with weakened environmental protections and questionable practices, such as increasing the power of Port authorities, there is little hope for positive changes in our local environment. I did make an appeal to be heard by the Federal Liberal's Pacific Caucus in 2017 but it was not entertained and we were not able to pull together an opportunity for Federal MPs to meet conservationists, with extensive knowledge to protect the lower Fraser River, and discuss or possibly reach some solutions. Why should this be so difficult? It seems apparent that government representatives, in this case Federal, are not eager to meet with even well informed constituents to achieve solutions...consequently it leaves some skepticism regarding future plans and whether volunteer efforts are truly appreciated. This speaks to difficulties that might arise in engaging more of the community.

The Fraser River has had the reputation as one of the greatest sources of wild salmon in the world but I don't see any reference to the Fraser River in this paper. Given its location and the urban development surrounding it, this river has the need for some very special attention. The multi-government cooperation that is eluded to in this strategy should include municipal

governments as local governments i.e. municipal governments have responsibilities for rezoning land uses, including industrial lands that can have immense impacts on the local environment including our waterways. Considering municipalities and waterways, it seems there is a lot of representation on the panel from Vancouver Island, so I would expect that they would be aware of Victoria's sewage polluting our marine environment and again include some accountability from our municipal governments in the strategy. I didn't see any reference to this, but I may have missed it given the short time I've had with the strategy document. Please inform me if I've missed it.

I also noticed a lack of any reference to certain commercial enterprises i.e. fish farms that are currently affecting the health of our marine ecosystems...where are they referenced? To ignore them is to ignore the possibility of addressing the negative impacts they are having on our wild salmon populations. You might say they are addressed in statements like this "Protect critical salmonid habitats from loss or degradation" calling for improvements to the health of ecological systems but they why are other commercial salmon enterprises named such as recreational fishing? I did note however under Strategy 1.3, Increase the production of juvenile salmon under controlled conditions" that under opportunities there is a bullet for "sea pen releases of enhanced salmon". I must confess that I find such a statement deeply troubling...perhaps I'm not really clear on what is meant. I would therefore appreciate a reply that provides a clear definition of what this statement implies.

Two other statements I found in this strategy that cause some concern are:

- 1. "the carrying capacity of the ocean" in reference to release of juvenile salmon. I understand this to mean some recognition that marine life may not find the food that they need in our oceans and when it comes to salmon I am aware of the habitat loss for forage fish, a source of food for larger fish, such as salmon and other marine life. Is support for this important resource, that would support salmon stocks, found in this document? If so I would appreciate knowing where it is found or implied.
- 2. "Establish a set of principles against which each option will be evaluated that reflects the vision and intention of the Province's Wild Salmon Strategy" is problematic to me in that this paper seems to emphasize economic and social priorities from harvesting wild salmon. Therefore the principles would reflect this emphasis and unfortunately, fit a trend that I mentioned earlier regarding sustainability, where economic sustainability trumps environmental sustainability. This paper needs to clearly and unequivocally express an intent to address the health of our extensive watersheds, rivers, estuaries and marine environment that support wild salmon. Strong action must be taken to implement BC's Water Sustainability Act that would include protecting stream flows for salmon and allowing for more local control of watershed planning.

I look forward to more opportunities for engagement in this important endeavor and appreciate the efforts that have been made.

More info below from staff, but long story short, this was a change that came in to effect in 2016 that hunters would have to prove their residency every 3 years to help curb non-resident hunters who are former B.C. residents from returning to the province to enjoy resident hunting privileges. Because we're at the 3 year mark, folks are now being required to prove residency when applying for this year's hunting license.

Notices were distributed via the hunter sample surveys, letting hunters know they needed to confirm residency and why. Communication attached.

People can prove their residency online or in person at FrontCounter or Service BC. Noting that hunting licenses must be acquired every year, this is just an extra part of that process every three years.

Both the BCWF and GOABC were extensively consulted on this initiative – they had requested that the application be filled every 3 years (staff suggested every 5 years).

Staff have received inquiries and have been taking calls to provide further explanations to hunters. If you wish, any calls you receive can be passed on to us and we can have staff reach out.

Dear Minister Donaldson,

I just read a recent Notice to BC Resident Hunters authored by Yvonne Foxall, Deputy Director of the Wildlife and Habitat Branch. The notice states that BC Resident Hunters are now required to prove their residency and register with a "credential" to be maintained within their individual electronic file in the hunter registry system. This credential is to be renewed every three years, and a hunter must determine when their existing credential expires to know when they must update it, which can be done up to six months in advance of whenever it expires. Now for many this may seem an insignificant detail, a minor additional hoop to jump through to obtain a hunting license. However, let me assure you, this is going to piss-off many a hunter when they go to purchase a hunting license at a vendor only to be told, no, they first have to go online or into Service BC to update this credential before they can obtain their license. For them, it will confirm the messaging coming from the right that suggests that the NDP is good at creating inept bureaucracy and not at governing where it counts. To be clear I support the current government, but am concerned when I see policy like this which appears to have limited value except to make life more complicated for hunters. In doing so, it also disproportionally affects rural people. The thing is, hunters are already required to prove their residency every year when they buy their hunting license by providing their BC identification. Therefore, perhaps a more effective measure would be to enter into agreements with the rest of Confederation to enable the BC Conservation Officer service to easily enquire if individual hunters have received Provincial identification in any other province or territory within a year in question. Not only would this provide more effective information to Conservation Officers, but would save BC hunters grief and from one more reason to dislike the government. Alternately, should this prove impossible, why not have the credential updated every year when hunters obtain their licenses, by whatever means including vendors? Surely it makes little difference in the registry system as to by whom or how the credential is updated? Many rural hunters already feel that their access to wild game is under threat and the licensing, regulations, and fees required for such access are cumbersome and onerous. Adding any unnecessary burden in this regard only adds to such sentiment.

RE: Comments regarding the Options for made in BC Wild Salmon Strategy paper.

As the president of a non-profit society that has engaged in clean ups of local waterways to support wildlife I am disappointed that I learned of this strategy so late in the process, I suppose it really does speak to the need of Goal 2, "Support and encourage greater community engagement with wild salmon".

Located in the BC Lower Mainland I am obviously very concerned over the sustainability of the Fraser River and the estuary. Conservationists in the area have had to, and continue to, go to enormous lengths to provide opposition to Port developments that will negatively impact the sustainability of the lower Fraser River ecosystem. As economic development/sustainability continues to trump environmental sustainability along with weakened environmental protections and questionable practices, such as increasing the power of Port authorities, there is little hope for positive changes in our local environment. I did make an appeal to be heard by the Federal Liberal's Pacific Caucus in 2017 but it was not entertained and we were not able to pull together an opportunity for Federal MPs to meet conservationists, with extensive knowledge to protect the lower Fraser River, and discuss or possibly reach some solutions. Why should this be so difficult? It seems apparent that government representatives, in this case Federal, are not eager to meet with even well informed constituents to achieve solutions...consequently it leaves some skepticism regarding future plans and whether volunteer efforts are truly appreciated. This speaks to difficulties that might arise in engaging more of the community.

The Fraser River has had the reputation as one of the greatest sources of wild salmon in the world but I don't see any reference to the Fraser River in this paper. Given its location and the urban development surrounding it, this river has the need for some very special attention. The multi-government cooperation that is eluded to in this strategy should include municipal governments as local governments i.e. municipal governments have responsibilities for rezoning land uses, including industrial lands that can have immense impacts on the local

environment including our waterways. Considering municipalities and waterways, it seems there is a lot of representation on the panel from Vancouver Island, so I would expect that they would be aware of Victoria's sewage polluting our marine environment and again include some accountability from our municipal governments in the strategy. I didn't see any reference to this, but I may have missed it given the short time I've had with the strategy document. <u>Please inform</u> me if I've missed it.

I also noticed a lack of any reference to certain commercial enterprises i.e. fish farms that are currently affecting the health of our marine ecosystems...where are they referenced? To ignore them is to ignore the possibility of addressing the negative impacts they are having on our wild salmon populations. You might say they are addressed in statements like this "Protect critical salmonid habitats from loss or degradation" calling for improvements to the health of ecological systems but they why are other commercial salmon enterprises named such as recreational fishing? I did note however under Strategy 1.3, Increase the production of juvenile salmon under controlled conditions" that under opportunities there is a bullet for "sea pen releases of enhanced salmon". I must confess that I find such a statement deeply troubling...perhaps I'm not really clear on what is meant. Lwould therefore appreciate a reply that provides a clear definition of what this statement implies.

Two other statements I found in this strategy that cause some concern are:

- 1. "the carrying capacity of the ocean" in reference to release of juvenile salmon. I understand this to mean some recognition that marine life may not find the food that they need in our oceans and when it comes to salmon I am aware of the habitat loss for forage fish, a source of food for larger fish, such as salmon and other marine life. Is support for this important resource, that would support salmon stocks, found in this document? If so I would appreciate knowing where it is found or implied.
- 2. "Establish a set of principles against which each option will be evaluated that reflects the vision and intention of the Province's Wild Salmon Strategy" is problematic to me in that this paper seems to emphasize economic and social priorities from harvesting wild salmon. Therefore the principles would reflect this emphasis and unfortunately, fit a trend that I mentioned earlier regarding sustainability, where economic sustainability trumps environmental sustainability. This paper needs to clearly and unequivocally express an intent to address the health of our extensive watersheds, rivers, estuaries and marine environment that support wild salmon. Strong action must be taken to implement BC's Water Sustainability Act that would include protecting stream flows for salmon and allowing for more local control of watershed planning.

I look forward to more opportunities for engagement in this important endeavor and appreciate the efforts that have been made.

Hey Rob,

So this came in just after our conversation. Looks like the land is still with FLNRO and that is the hold

up. You'll have to reach out to Tristan on this one to see if she can provide more details about the land transfer.

- The Society owns two parcels of land and provides cottage style affordable housing to 8 seniors. There is a lot in the middle of their two lots that is vacant and is owned by FLNRO. For many years, The society has requested the transfer of the land to their society for the purposes of increasing their affordable housing supply.
- The lot is sterile without development potential. To that end, the Society has created a plan for 24 units of seniors and family units on the three full sites, hosted a public information meeting, provided their plans to FLNRO, has the support of the municipality for the building form and density, received PDF from BC Housing to move their proposal forward and submitted under the CHF RFP. They received a B letter given the site wasn't secured, despite years of discussion with FLNRO. It appears that they have provided everything FLNRO needs but still do not have a determination.

Sorry to bother you with this as I know you have more important issues on your plate, however this is very important as it deals with the necessities of life itself for me.

I was instrumental in initiating and shaping the new Waste Management Control Regulations as per Ministry emails below. However two ministries, MoE and FLNR are at cross purposes with me caught in the middle, leaving me with no water as a hostile water allocation officer won't exercise any discretion nor understand my water drinking water pond is and has since 1947 been an integral part of my License, otherwise I cannot access my 1000 gal/day of domestic water, in effect cutting off my winter drinking water by having no fresh pond water to draw from for 3 months of stream freeze at the intake culvert 1 kilometer upstream. To replace this licensed surface flow of fresh water to the clay lined pond for winter, I rightfully tapped into an existing underground 3" penstock, also licensed from 1947 (see license). Both the 1947 and 2010 water licenses are ambiguous, devoid and inaccurate in description and diagram in that the 1947 license describes the 3" underground penstock as the creek itself (the straight line is the clean out) and the 2010 license states "in substitution of" instead of "in substitution of surface flow of the 1947 license". They are not reliable.

I'm hoping you can converse with Minister Heyman to get this resolved.

ALL I SEEK is a determination that the Pond was, is, and will continue to be an integral part of the Domestic Water License as to storage so I can continue to receive my first rights water year round as has always been the case. I do not want to lose my 1947 first rights priority date either.

I have prepared a draft letter for Mr. Michael Epp (see below DRAFT) but I'm afraid it will fall on deaf ears "again" and further he has threatened me in writing if I continue to pursue my rights he will pull out additional SANCTIONS AGAINST ME but wouldn't elaborate (attached), that he's been lenient up to now. At this point I've got nothing more to lose based on Michael Epp's uninformed position as to how it is and has worked since 1947.

My 2010 licensed diversion point for surface water has been dammed (unauthorized) by the Polluter Seeland Dairies in 2013 as part of an abatement order. That is fine, I can live with that abatement order remedy the polluter has chosen, but that water to the Pond needs to be replaced with something AND IT'S MY RIGHT TO DO WHAT IS NECESSARY. That something will be the 3" penstock water dating back to 1947 from above the polluted farm, into a longstanding freshwater holding pond near my house where I drew my winter water from, albeit I expanded its size somewhat in 2005. Other than my 1000 gal/day of consumptive use, all unused water flows into the Shuswap River as it has always done. Although I'm first rights user from 1947, I'm downstream of the other two licensed users so there is no effect on them nor the environment.

By taking Mr. Epps position he empowers the rich polluting dairy farmer for the water who is in breach of the Water

Sustainability Act using 20 times his licensed allowance of 500 gallons per day for stock watering supporting an ever increasing herd of 200 large dairy cows (their numbers). Each animal drinks on an average of 40 gallons per day (yearly average, more in summer) plus 10 gallons per day for barn clean out. Doing the math that's 10,000 gallons per day against a 500 gallon per day stock watering allowance. I may make a formal request for investigation in due course and that is not my concern right now.

The pond has yet to be decontaminated and remediated since 2009 and again in 2012 because the polluter refuses to accept any financial responsibility leaving me with a ceese pool and I can't even sell the property in its current state, however this request for clarification and interpretation/discretion has nothing to do with litigation whatsoever but instead the Necessity of Life itself.

Splatsin First Nations have offered to get involved if required but I'm hoping that you can assist me instead, caught in the middle staring in the mirror.

My name is **s**.22 from **s**.22

I've communicated with Minister Lake in 2012 to

assist in bringing forth the new about to be approved Agriculture Waste Control Regulation (see emails below and S.22 Pollution Contamination... attachment). I'm glad to have been of assistance and to see every one of my recommendations have been included. Congratulations to us all on this epic achievement for our children and future generations.

However at that time in 2012 an Abatement Order was issued to my polluting neighbor SeeLand Dairies, and in the process as a remedy to the Abatement Order, it somehow allowed the polluter to cut off (dam) my licensed surface water flow to my pond dating back to 1947. This flow fed a pond which is also used for fire protection as I'm outside of a fire protection zone, and most importantly for fresh domestic drinking water in the Winter when the intake culvert 1 kilometer upstream above the polluter's farm completely freezes over for two to three months per year (see frozen intake culvert.... attachment). This water was cut off because of See Land Dairies pollution so I've been victimized again and left starring in the mirror.

To replace this licensed surface flow of fresh water to the clay lined pond, I rightfully tapped into an existing underground 3" penstock, also licensed from 1947. Both the 1947 and 2010 water licenses are somewhat ambiguous in description and diagram in that the 1947 license inaccurately describes the 3" underground penstock as the creek itself (the straight line is the clean out) and the 2010 license states "in substitution of" instead of "in substitution of surface flow of 1947 license". The unused water flows in and flows out of the pond to the Shuswap River as it's done since day one and I'm the last user of the water yet have first rights thereto so it does not affect the other two licensees nor the environment nor has it. I had trout in the pond pursuant to long standing trout rearing provincial permits, which all died in 2012 as a result of the Eutrophication and resultant fish kill (Anoxia).

Recently when I approached a somewhat hostile water allocation officer for FLNR for clarification, I was suddenly advised I'm not entitled to have a pond at all and to stop any water from filling or refreshing the Pond, thereby also cutting off my winter drinking water of 1000 gal/day, let alone the fire protection aspect. That's not right! The pond was and is an integral part of the 1947 and 2010 licenses because without, how am I going to access my fresh winter drinking water?

I therefore seek interpretation/clarification that my first rights Domestic water license of 1000 gal/day did, is and will continue to allow mandatory storage in the form of an earthen pond in this unique situation that seems to now require some discretionary power.

The pond has yet to be decontaminated and remediated since 2009 and again in 2012 because the polluter refuses to accept any financial responsibility however this request for clarification and interpretation/discretion has nothing to do with litigation whatsoever but instead the Necessity of Life itself.

I'm hoping that given this problem originated with the MoE Abatement Order, that you will communicate with Minister Donaldson to come up with a solution. I am available for a telephone conference at your convenience \$.22

Dear Sir/Madame,

Please see the attached .pdf brief outlining my pollution dilemma. I bring this matter to your attention for possible amendments to the Statutes regarding pollution from Dairy Farmers emptying their liquid manure pits at the most inappropriate times causing wide spread unwanted pollution on neighboring lands. Mostly, the amount of Land they the Producers own will not absorb the volume of liquid wastes generated from their herd.

There are alternatives to saturating/polluting one's *limited* land at the worst times of the year (and consequently polluting neighboring lands and watercourses) to empty manure pits before Winter sets in and upon the Spring rains. I make reference to one such alternative..." Insist they put it, for pay or free of charge, on someone else's field(s) who actually want it and who doesn't have a Dairy Farm manure pit, but don't allow them to dump it for the sake of dumping it because they got no where else to put it!"

Today, on a wide spread basis, this is unfortunately the case, and pertains to the pollution of my property as well. Yes, they the producers will have to be far more *proactive* in their local contact network of local land owners and perhaps drive another few kilometers with their large manure tanks behind their tractors; maybe even 15 kilometers if need be, to the many other hay field owners that aren't subject to impending pollution, that may benefit from it.

Producers must be made to keep records of the waste generated by their herd, available for inspection, and a maximum allowable dosage rate per acre should be specified depending on the soil type (ie: clay based), the crop (ie: non-growing), maximum number of applications per year, minimum temperatures and the time of year. The Manure Spreading Advisory bulletins are *not* heeded by the majority of Producers. They are spreading liquid waste at their convenience just before major forecasted rain storms, on non-growing crops with temperatures below 35 degrees F, on frozen and snow covered ground, on sloping lands to neighboring properties, all of which leaches into watercourses then into the Rivers polluting our environment.

I believe existing laws need to be more defined and additional laws need to be enacted and look forward to your comments and support.

On behalf of the Honourable Terry Lake, Minister of Environment, thank you for your email of November 5, 2012, regarding pollution from dairy farms. I am pleased to have this opportunity to respond.

The Agricultural Waste Control Regulation is currently undergoing a comprehensive review. Your email and concerns have been forwarded to ministry staff responsible for the review for their consideration. There is no fixed timeline for this review; however, it is not anticipated that regulatory changes will occur before spring 2014.

Regional staff have advised me that your email and attachment pose two serious concerns to the ministry. The first is that environmental protection staff in the Penticton office are already actively investigating your concerns regarding possible violations of the *Environmental Management Act* and the Agricultural Waste Control Regulation, and that other agencies are monitoring the situation as well. Second, the submitted material also implies that civil court action

is being considered. Accordingly, it is inappropriate for the Minister to involve himself or additional staff in these matters at this time. Any comment or further action could be seen to be inappropriately influencing the outcome of these matters.

Thank you for your reply. Please also refer *this* email to your ministry staff responsible for the Agricultural Waste Control Regulation review for their consideration.

Just as the former "burning advisories" are no longer simple advisories, but now **mandates**, I believe the same policy revision should happen to "manure spreading advisories"...making them manure spreading **mandates** instead. My opinion is widely shared including that of field officers dealing with this problem Province wide.

As detailed in my letter to the Minister, there are many manure spreading alternatives for the producers to prevent pollution, and it will require them to become more proactive and creative. They have the smarts and they have the money to accomplish this quickly.

I won't identify anyone specific, but the Shuswap River is polluted according to local officials, requiring substantially elevated intake treatment procedures for Enderby's drinking water, to name but one town.

They attribute this pollution in most part to wide spread manure run-off from the dairy farmer's less-than-best practices who own large tracks of land adjacent to the water courses and River.

Maybe the Minister will listen to reason and show some discretion. Let's get that letter in final form because continuing to work with Michael Epp is fruitless and dangerous.

Hello Michael Epp,

I'd like to start with your last point of your October 19 2018 response and as per Numbers 1., 2., 3., 4., 5., 9., . Finally, the long standing pond is a integral part of the domestic water licenses cause of Winter Freeze drinking water requirements. See section 29 complaint (attached). The Provincial Trout Permits using Smidsk Creek water are also long standing even well before I bought the property 15 years ago.

Your response...."Please see my previous responses. I've seen many domestic water systems, and yours is the first I've witnessed where the land owner constructed a large pond to combat freezing. Typically, burying the pipes 4 feet or more is sufficient to prevent a freeze."



The attached pdf was created Feb 2, 2014. The Penstock is in fact buried 4' underground for one kilometer down to the house and winter drinking pond. It's the "water intake culvert" above the polluted farm a kilometer South which totally freezes up and that's the problem. Without the winter drinking pond, how am I going to get my 1000/gallons per day of domestic water in January and February as has been done since day one?

We would then drill a hole in the pond ice and with a short 3/4" insulated line, pump the water directly into the house during those times. At least that is what we did prior to the main pollution events of 2009 then again 2012. The excess water (not the 1000 gal/day domestic) that enters the pond from the 3" penstock to keep it fresh for winter domestic use is unused water which immediately exits the pond via a 6" penstock into a wooded area some distance away *then* empties into the Shuswap River. The pond is not connected to a waterway at either the pond

intake or outflow and can be turned on or off.

The local Federal Fisheries Officer John Ball inspected the pond with trout prior to the 2009 pollution event and told me he has no concerns whatsoever as to fish escapement and no further discussion was required.

The long standing pond is a integral part of the domestic water license cause of Winter Freeze drinking water requirements. The license does not state anywhere that unused water *cannot* empty into a pond then into the Shuswap River. A few trout in it pursuant to long standing provincial trout permits is not a deal breaker. This will be a lot better than that water that is going through the polluted farm (see MOE Order and Testing Results)

- Your position is.... the Pond and/or expansion was never allowed. The Trout Permits were falsely filled out by all three permit holders including \$.22 the polluter's brother, over a 15 year period with three different property owners. Had you have known from Wildlife that permit applications were falsely filled out you would have Ordered that pond flow be shut off in 2013. Now your ordering it today now that you've looked into it last month simply because I requested further information of you.
- My response.... "Pond has always been an integral part license for Winter Drinking Water." Combined with historical Trout Permits and a few trout as allowed as inspected by Federal Fisheries Officer, John Ball prior to pollution.
- Where does it say in the Water Licenses that "unused water" cannot go into a Pond first, then into the River? The old farmers adage, you got to keep the tap flowing in the Winter.
- The 1947 License clearly shows underground penstock with cleanout (straight line) and surface flow to the Pond along the West side of the forest on my property. This original diversion point for surface flow was substituted to the 2010 license position by the polluter for his farming convenience.
- When my 2010 Licensed surface water was without authority cut off by the Polluter, I tapped into the 3" underground penstock to replace the cut off surface flow as altered by the polluter from 1947 to the Pond that you refused to enforce and be reinstated because of the MOE abatement proposals in play and conflict.
- Expansion of the Pond size is irrelevant. It's clay, holds water, takes a couple of days to fill and then all unused water flows to the River.
- Just because you failed to enforce my 2010 License and allowed my water to be cut off by the Polluter doesn't mean I can't do "anything" to replenish it for Winter Drinking Water. \$.22

- Had you have done your due diligence in 2013 and inquired as to Trout Permits, Water Licenses and the like, and ordered me in 2013 like you are doing now, I would have simply drilled a well back then and applied for the commercial drilled well water license. But why would I have? It is polluted by the polluter Seeland Dairies and it's their financial responsibility. You closed a blind eye at the time. Was your allowing the water to flow since then as you confirm you observed, your hope it would flush the pollution from the Pond or something? You witnessed a high capacity flow of water coming into the Pond in 2013 and the same flow exiting the Pond and let it continue for 5 years, but now you're saying I can't have water flowing into the Pond? Please explain.
- My lawyer has recently put Seeland Dairies on notice of their over usage of water pursuant to their License allowing only 500 gal/day for stock watering. I want to be kept apprised of any water applications and given my 180 days notice to oppose in favor of my first rights License and eventual aquaculture operation once the Pond has been decontaminated and remediated to its former state at the Polluter's expense. The polluter has refused to compensate me even one red cent at all even in light of the MOE Order and Findings of 2012 (see attached).
- -You have suggested I apply for a new aquaculture license at this time in lieu of my domestic license. However I'm informed that such a license requires a satisfactory water sample to be approved knowing my site has been polluted. Where will this get me? Another denial?
- -You advise me you have never heard the term Y branch off a stream, and never used it, yet the 2010 license clearly shows a Y branch (see attached).
- -Do you also not remember the term you used in 2013 that it, the Y branch was "plugged with a recent excavation"? Your own recent photos confirm it.
- -Your lack of discretion to include the winter drinking water pond as an integral component of the water license since 1947 as first rights holder favors a rich dairy farmer with last rights upstream of me who is using 20X their consumptive license rights for a huge expanding herd who is a proven polluter. And I'm downstream of him! In fact you're not exercising any discretion at all, instead you are merely following a predetermined interpretation and policy.

- -We'll see what the two Ministry's Ministers have to say about this, if required.
- -l'm willing to see the existing license redefined, split 500 gallons/day domestic and 500 gallons/day pond provided my first priority rights from 1947 are maintained and that unused water flow be confirmed to continue in and out of the winter drinking water pond. Remember, although I hold first rights, I'm downstream of the two other license holders so there is no effect on them nor the environment.
- -Finally, I don't appreciate your threats, that you have been lenient, that if I continue exercise my rights to this water, that you have other enforcement options that have not been used, which remain available to you. Sincerely,

Number 1.

I'm first priority Rights user from 1947. 71 Years ago.

Yes, I agree. You have a domestic water right for 1000 gallons per day for domestic purpose.

SeeLand Dairies is last rights user from 1988, 41 years earlier.

Yes, I agree. They hold two rights. One for domestic, 500 gallons per day, and one for stockwatering at 500 gallons per day.

Number 3.

They are using 20X plus their allowance of 500 gal/day. A current violation of the Act as you say.

I haven't verified this information. If you wish for this claim to be investigation you need to submit a report of a natural resource violation. I provided you with a link to the NRO tips line in a previous email. Here it is again:

Number 4.

SeeLand dairies are a proven Polluter as per MOE Order. Attached.

Pollution is outside of my responsibility and scope of practice. I encourage you to continue working with the correct authority in this regard.

Number 5.

I am downstream of his pollution and now live in a cease pool without any compensation from the Polluter.

Number 6.

Seeland Dairies has illegally cut off my water to the North East end of the trout Pond pursuant to my licenses of 1947 and 2010. There is a conflict of interests between your Ministry and MOE. I was not given any notice of this illegal cut off pursuant to the Act as per emails to you in 2013, unanswered.

- You hold one licence on Smidsk Creek, which is Conditional Licence \$.22 . This licence was issued in substitution of \$.22
- Your licence does not grant you authority to fill the pond with water from Smidsk Creek. It is not referenced in any way in your water licence. Your licence authorizes a "diversion structure, pipe, pump and tank" and is for domestic purpose only. Because the pond is not authorized with a water licence, there is no protection afforded to it under the *Water Sustainability Act*.
- I have not seen a conflict of interest. Can you clarify what you mean? Different branches of government have different authorities and responsibilities and we work together when issues are multijurisdictional. Your file was originally brought to my attention by MOE staff.

Number 7.

You are now denying me any information to this file. Why?

I provided you with 42 photos, a link to the water application web page, a link to the Natural Resource Violation web page, and a link to the Freed of Information (FOI) Request webpage. I was made aware this week that you have submitted an FOI request, which is great. The FOI request is the correct process for you to obtain government information.

Number 8.

You have sent me photos of your overdue 2013 unaltered report, without the report itself. Why? I'm afraid you may be misunderstanding my role in this. In 2013 I inspected your property at your request. I made some contemporaneous notes when I returned to my desk. These notes are the property of the province, and may be provided through the FOI process. I do not owe you a report and I did not indicate I would provide one. If you need professional services conducted on your land I would be happy to provide you a list of qualified environmental professionals (QEPs).

Number 9.

I have been screwed from a worthy aquaculture operation without cause, that is supported otherwise and suitable to the area for a U-Catch Ecotourism operation.

I need to be very clear with you on this point, because I am afraid my efforts so far have not been successful.

- 1. It is unlawful for you to fill your constructed pond with water from Smidsk Creek for the reasons described in Number 6.
- 2. Your expired permit under the *Wildlife Act* which was active between 2012 and 2017 did not authorize construction of the pond or diversion of water. The <u>only</u> way you can be granted permission to divert and use water in the province of BC is to have a water licence, issued by my department.
- 3. I have provided you with instructions on how you can apply for a water licence and hopefully get into compliance with the *Water Sustainability Act*. So far, I have been lenient on this point. I have other enforcement options that have not been used, which remain available to me.

I have attached the Rainbow Trout Pond Permit Application you submitted on August 5, 2012. On it, you stated that Water Licence **\$.22** allowed fish rearing. This is false for the reasons I have described above. When asked "is the pond connected to a natural watercourse" you stated "no". This is also false based on my site observations where I saw outflow from the pond entering Shuswap River.

The permit that was issued to you (also attached) expired on September 27, 2017. I have made inquiries with the Fish and Wildlife section, who have advised you have not applied for a new permit. When the permit was current, Condition 2 expressly stated that "the pond must not be used for commercial aquaculture". Condition 3 stated that "the pond must be a CLOSED SYSTEM that is NOT connected to a natural watercourse in any way".

Number 10.

You have failed to admit your own words that the water to my property \underline{was} a part of the natural watercourse, A \underline{Y} branch of Smidsk Creek, with proven flow of at least 4 years of based on gravel deposits at test site #2 from the Conservation Officers Report.

I am not going to permit you to put words in my mouth. A "Y branch" is not a term I am familiar with. I do not know how someone could definitely state that they were looking at 4 years' worth of gravel accumulation. A brief site visit could not have yielded such a conclusion and I did not make that claim.

Finally, the long standing pond is a integral part of the domestic water licenses cause of Winter Freeze drinking water

Rights acquired under authorizations

- 7 (1) A licence entitles its holder to do the following in a manner provided in the licence
- (a) divert and beneficially use the quantity of water specified in the licence;
- (b) construct, maintain and operate the works authorized by the licence and related works necessarily required for the proper diversion or use of the water or the power produced from the water;
- (c) make changes in and about a stream necessary for the construction, maintenance or operation of the works referred to in paragraph (b) or to otherwise facilitate the authorized diversion;
- (d) construct fences, screens and fish or game guards across streams for the purpose of conserving fish or wildlife.
- (2) A use approval entitles its holder to do *anything* described in subsection (1) for the period or at the times

Section 7 (1) is applicable here, but not Section 7 (2), since you hold a water licence and not a use approval. I've added my own highlights in red to help clarify what this section of the WSA means. What this section of the Act means is a licensee is entitled to make beneficial use of the water licence, in the manner that is written in their licence, and by following all of the terms and conditions of the licence (as well as any other enactments). Your licence simply does not make reference to a fish pond or a commercial aquaculture venture. I have provided you with instructions on how you can apply for the correct licence and bring yourself into compliance. I hope you follow this advice.

Sorry to bother you with this as I know you have more important issues on your plate, however this is very important as it deals with the necessities of life itself for me.

I was instrumental in initiating and shaping the new Waste Management Control Regulations as per Ministry emails below. However two ministries, MoE and FLNR are at cross purposes with me caught in the middle, leaving me with no water as a hostile water allocation officer won't exercise any discretion nor understand my water drinking water pond is and has since 1947 been an integral part of my License, otherwise I cannot access my 1000 gal/day of domestic water, in effect cutting off my winter drinking water by having no fresh pond water to draw from for 3 months of stream freeze at the intake culvert 1 kilometer upstream. To replace this licensed surface flow of fresh water to the clay lined pond for winter, I rightfully tapped into an existing underground 3" penstock, also licensed from 1947 (see license). Both the 1947 and 2010 water licenses are ambiguous, devoid and inaccurate in description and diagram in that the 1947 license describes the 3" underground penstock as the creek itself (the straight line is the clean out) and the 2010 license states "in substitution of" instead of "in substitution of surface flow of the 1947 license". They are not reliable.

I'm hoping you can converse with Minister Heyman to get this resolved.

ALL I SEEK is a determination that the Pond was, is, and will continue to be an integral part of the Domestic Water License as to storage so I can continue to receive my first rights water year round as has always been the case. I do not want to lose my 1947 first rights priority date either.

I have prepared a draft letter for Mr. Michael Epp (see below DRAFT) but I'm afraid it will fall on deaf ears "again" and further he has threatened me in writing if I continue to pursue my rights he will pull out additional SANCTIONS AGAINST ME but wouldn't elaborate (attached), that he's been lenient up to now. At this point I've got nothing more to lose based on Michael Epp's uninformed position as to how it is and has worked since 1947.

My 2010 licensed diversion point for surface water has been dammed (unauthorized) by the Polluter Seeland Dairies in 2013 as part of an abatement order. That is fine, I can live with that abatement order remedy the polluter has chosen, but that water to the Pond needs to be replaced with something AND IT'S MY RIGHT TO DO WHAT IS NECESSARY. That something will be the 3" penstock water dating back to 1947 from above the polluted farm, into a longstanding freshwater holding pond near my house where I drew my winter water from, albeit I expanded its size

somewhat in 2005. Other than my 1000 gal/day of consumptive use, all unused water flows into the Shuswap River as it has always done. Although I'm first rights user from 1947, I'm downstream of the other two licensed users so there is no effect on them nor the environment.

By taking Mr. Epps position he empowers the rich polluting dairy farmer for the water who is in breach of the Water Sustainability Act using 20 times his licensed allowance of 500 gallons per day for stock watering supporting an ever increasing herd of 200 large dairy cows (their numbers). Each animal drinks on an average of 40 gallons per day (yearly average, more in summer) plus 10 gallons per day for barn clean out. Doing the math that's 10,000 gallons per day against a 500 gallon per day stock watering allowance. I may make a formal request for investigation in due course and that is not my concern right now.

The pond has yet to be decontaminated and remediated since 2009 and again in 2012 because the polluter refuses to accept any financial responsibility leaving me with a ceese pool and I can't even sell the property in its current state, however this request for clarification and interpretation/discretion has nothing to do with litigation whatsoever but instead the Necessity of Life itself.

Splatsin First Nations have offered to get involved if required but I'm hoping that you can assist me instead, caught in the middle staring in the mirror.

I'm glad to have been of assistance and to see every one of my recommendations have been included. Congratulations to us all on this epic achievement for our children and future

However at that time in 2012 an Abatement Order was issued to my polluting neighbor SeeLand Dairies, and in the process as a remedy to the Abatement Order, it somehow allowed the polluter to cut off (dam) my licensed surface water flow to my pond dating back to 1947. This flow fed a pond which is also used for fire protection as I'm outside of a fire protection zone, and most importantly for fresh domestic drinking water in the Winter when the intake culvert 1 kilometer upstream above the polluter's farm completely freezes over for two to three months per year (see frozen intake culvert.... attachment). This water was cut off because of See Land Dairies pollution so I've been victimized again and left starring in the mirror.

To replace this licensed surface flow of fresh water to the clay lined pond, I rightfully tapped into an existing underground 3" penstock, also licensed from 1947. Both the 1947 and 2010 water licenses are somewhat ambiguous in description and diagram in that the 1947 license inaccurately describes the 3" underground penstock as the creek itself (the straight line is the clean out) and the 2010 license states "in substitution of" instead of "in substitution of surface flow of 1947 license". The unused water flows in and flows out of the pond to the Shuswap River as it's done since day one and I'm the last user of the water yet have first rights thereto so it does not affect the other two licensees nor the environment nor has it. I had trout in the pond pursuant to long standing trout rearing provincial permits, which all died in 2012 as a result of the Eutrophication and resultant fish kill (Anoxia).

Recently when I approached a somewhat hostile water allocation officer for FLNR for clarification, I was suddenly advised I'm not entitled to have a pond at all and to stop any water from filling or refreshing the Pond, thereby also cutting off my winter drinking water of 1000 gal/day, let alone the fire protection aspect. That's not right! The pond was and is an integral part of the 1947 and 2010 licenses because without, how am I going to access my fresh winter drinking water?

I therefore seek interpretation/clarification that my first rights Domestic water license of 1000 gal/day did, is and will continue to allow mandatory storage in the form of an earthen pond in this unique situation that seems to now

require some discretionary power.

The pond has yet to be decontaminated and remediated since 2009 and again in 2012 because the polluter refuses to accept any financial responsibility however this request for clarification and interpretation/discretion has nothing to do with litigation whatsoever but instead the Necessity of Life itself.

I'm hoping that given this problem originated with the MoE Abatement Order, that you will communicate with Minister Donaldson to come up with a solution. I am available for a telephone conference at your convenience \$.22

Dear Sir/Madame.

Please see the attached .pdf brief outlining my pollution dilemma. I bring this matter to your attention for possible amendments to the Statutes regarding pollution from Dairy Farmers emptying their liquid manure pits at the most inappropriate times causing wide spread unwanted pollution on neighboring lands. Mostly, the amount of Land they the Producers own will not absorb the volume of liquid wastes generated from their herd.

There are alternatives to saturating/polluting one's *limited* land at the worst times of the year (and consequently polluting neighboring lands and watercourses) to empty manure pits before Winter sets in and upon the Spring rains. I make reference to one such alternative..." Insist they put it, for pay or free of charge, on someone else's field(s) who actually want it and who doesn't have a Dairy Farm manure pit, but don't allow them to dump it for the sake of dumping it because they got no where else to put it!"

Today, on a wide spread basis, this is unfortunately the case, and pertains to the pollution of my property as well. Yes, they the producers will have to be far more *proactive* in their local contact network of local land owners and perhaps drive another few kilometers with their large manure tanks behind their tractors; maybe even 15 kilometers if need be, to the many other hay field owners that aren't subject to impending pollution, that may benefit from it.

Producers must be made to keep records of the waste generated by their herd, available for inspection, and a maximum allowable dosage rate per acre should be specified depending on the soil type (ie: clay based), the crop (ie: non-growing), maximum number of applications per year, minimum temperatures and the time of year. The Manure Spreading Advisory bulletins are *not* heeded by the majority of Producers. They are spreading liquid waste at their convenience just before major forecasted rain storms, on non-growing crops with temperatures below 35 degrees F, on frozen and snow covered ground, on sloping lands to neighboring properties, all of which leaches into watercourses then into the Rivers polluting our environment.

I believe existing laws need to be more defined and additional laws need to be enacted and look forward to your comments and support.

On behalf of the Honourable Terry Lake, Minister of Environment, thank you for your email of November 5, 2012, regarding pollution from dairy farms. I am pleased to have this opportunity to respond.

The Agricultural Waste Control Regulation is currently undergoing a comprehensive review. Your email and concerns have been forwarded to ministry staff responsible for the review for their consideration. There is no fixed timeline for this review; however, it is not anticipated that regulatory changes will occur before spring 2014.

Regional staff have advised me that your email and attachment pose two serious concerns to the ministry. The first is that environmental protection staff in the Penticton office are already actively investigating your concerns regarding possible violations of the *Environmental Management Act* and the Agricultural Waste Control Regulation, and that other agencies are monitoring the situation as well. Second, the submitted material also implies that civil court action is being considered. Accordingly, it is inappropriate for the Minister to involve himself or additional staff in these matters at this time. Any comment or further action could be seen to be inappropriately influencing the outcome of these matters.

Thank you for your reply. Please also refer *this* email to your ministry staff responsible for the Agricultural Waste Control Regulation review for their consideration.

Just as the former "burning advisories" are no longer simple advisories, but now *mandates*, I believe the same policy revision should happen to "manure spreading advisories"...making them manure spreading *mandates* instead. My opinion is widely shared including that of field officers dealing with this problem Province wide.

As detailed in my letter to the Minister, there are many manure spreading alternatives for the producers to prevent pollution, and it will require them to become more proactive and creative. They have the smarts and they have the money to accomplish this quickly.

I won't identify anyone specific, but the Shuswap River is polluted according to local officials, requiring substantially elevated intake treatment procedures for Enderby's drinking water, to name but one town.

They attribute this pollution in most part to wide spread manure run-off from the dairy farmer's less-than-best practices who own large tracks of land adjacent to the water courses and River.

The FOI is due to me end of this month and may give us more info however Epp has stated his report and notes are the property of the Province and will not likely be supplied. What is he hiding? Michael Epp has broad discretionary powers and is not listening to reason as to how else do we get our winter drinking water of 1000/gal/day without the pond as an **integral** part thereof going back to 1947. He is showing no discretion whatsoever. A complete refusal to understand how and where I get my water which has nothing to do with a frozen underground penstock. Not protecting my 2010 licensed water rights in 2013, not providing me his promised report from the Kamloops supervisor and findings thereof, sudden lack of memory as to the Y branch confirmation conversations of Smidsk Creek as clearly shown on the amended 2010 water license and that this Y branch was an active waterway based on gravel deposits prior to being dammed in 2013 by the polluter, failure to order me to stop any pond flow in 2013 then

ordering me to do just that five years later upon a simple enquiry regarding any winter domestic drinking water let alone the surface flow I had from the Y branch, calling three different property owners and provincially licensed trout pond permits in non-compliance and falsified, threatening further action if we continue to stand up for our rights, failing to recognize a conflict between MoE and FLNR allowing the polluter to cut/plug my 2010 licensed water rights and his negligence for the Water Branch to protect it. By taking his position he empowers the rich polluting dairy farmer who is in breach of the Water Sustainability Act using 20 times his licensed allowance of 500 gallons per day for stock watering supporting a herd of 200 large dairy cows.

Maybe the Minister will listen to reason and show some discretion. Let's get that letter in final form because continuing to work with Michael Epp is fruitless and dangerous.

Hello Michael Epp,

I'd like to start with your last point of your October 19 2018 response and as per Numbers 1., 2., 3., 4., 5., 9., . Finally, the long standing pond is a integral part of the domestic water licenses cause of Winter Freeze drinking water requirements. See section 29 complaint (attached). The Provincial Trout Permits using Smidsk Creek water are also long standing even well before I bought the property 15 years ago.

Your response..."Please see my previous responses. I've seen many domestic water systems, and yours is the first I've witnessed where the land owner constructed a large pond to combat freezing. Typically, burying the pipes 4 feet or more is sufficient to prevent a freeze."



The attached pdf was created Feb 2, 2014. The Penstock is in fact buried 4' underground for one kilometer down to the house and winter drinking pond. It's the "water intake culvert" above the polluted farm a kilometer South which totally freezes up and that's the problem. Without the winter drinking pond, how am I going to get my 1000/gallons per day of domestic water in January and February as has been done since day one?

We would then drill a hole in the pond ice and with a short 3/4" insulated line, pump the water directly into the house

during those times. At least that is what we did prior to the main pollution events of 2009 then again 2012. The excess water (not the 1000 gal/day domestic) that enters the pond from the 3" penstock to keep it fresh for winter domestic use is unused water which immediately exits the pond via a 6" penstock into a wooded area some distance away then empties into the Shuswap River. The pond is not connected to a waterway at either the pond intake or outflow and can be turned on or off.

The local Federal Fisheries Officer John Ball inspected the pond with trout prior to the 2009 pollution event and told me he has no concerns whatsoever as to fish escapement and no further discussion was required.

The long standing pond is a integral part of the domestic water license cause of Winter Freeze drinking water requirements. The license does not state anywhere that unused water cannot empty into a pond then into the Shuswap River. A few trout in it pursuant to long standing provincial trout permits is not a deal breaker. This will be a lot better than that water that is going through the polluted farm (see MOE Order and Testing Results)

- Your position is.... the Pond and/or expansion was never allowed. The Trout Permits were falsely filled out by all three permit holders including **S.22** the polluter's brother, over a 15 year period with three different property owners. Had you have known from Wildlife that permit applications were falsely filled out you would have Ordered that pond flow be shut off in 2013. Now your ordering it today now that you've looked into it last month simply because I requested further information of you.
- My response.... "Pond has always been an integral part license for Winter Drinking Water." Combined with historical Trout Permits and a few trout as allowed as inspected by Federal Fisheries Officer, John Ball prior to pollution.
- Where does it say in the Water Licenses that "unused water" cannot go into a Pond first, then into the River? The old farmers adage, you got to keep the tap flowing in the Winter.
- The 1947 License clearly shows underground penstock with cleanout (straight line) and surface flow to the Pond along the West side of the forest on my property. This original diversion point for surface flow was substituted to the 2010 license position by the polluter for his farming convenience.
- When my 2010 Licensed surface water was without authority cut off by the Polluter, I tapped into the 3" underground penstock to replace the cut off surface flow as altered by the polluter from 1947 to the Pond that you refused to enforce and be reinstated because of the MOE abatement proposals in play and conflict.
- Expansion of the Pond size is irrelevant. It's clay, holds water, takes a couple of days to fill and then all unused water flows to the River.
- Just because you failed to enforce my 2010 License and allowed my water to be cut off by the Polluter doesn't mean I can't do "anything" to replenish it for Winter Drinking Water. \$22

- Had you have done your due diligence in 2013 and inquired as to Trout Permits, Water Licenses and the like, and ordered me in 2013 like you are doing now, I would have simply drilled a well back then and applied for the commercial drilled well water license. But why would I have? It is polluted by the polluter Seeland Dairies and it's their financial responsibility. You closed a blind eye at the time. Was your allowing the water to flow since then as you confirm you observed, your hope it would flush the pollution from the Pond or something? You witnessed a high capacity flow of water coming into the Pond in 2013 and the same flow exiting the Pond and let it continue for 5 years, but now you're saying I can't have water flowing into the Pond? Please explain.
- My lawyer has recently put Seeland Dairies on notice of their over usage of water pursuant to their License allowing only 500 gal/day for stock watering. I want to be kept apprised of any water applications and given my 180 days notice to oppose in favor of my first rights License and eventual aquaculture operation once the Pond has been decontaminated and remediated to its former state at the Polluter's expense. The polluter has refused to compensate me even one red cent at all even in light of the MOE Order and Findings of 2012 (see attached).
- -You have suggested I apply for a new aquaculture license at this time in lieu of my domestic license. However I'm informed that such a license requires a satisfactory water sample to be approved knowing my site has been polluted. Where will this get me? Another denial?
- -You advise me you have never heard the term Y branch off a stream, and never used it, yet the 2010 license clearly shows a Y branch (see attached).
- -Do you also not remember the term you used in 2013 that it, the Y branch was "plugged with a recent excavation"? Your own recent photos confirm it.

- -Your lack of discretion to include the winter drinking water pond as an integral component of the water license since 1947 as first rights holder favors a rich dairy farmer with last rights upstream of me who is using 20X their consumptive license rights for a huge expanding herd who is a proven polluter. And I'm downstream of him! In fact you're not exercising any discretion at all, instead you are merely following a predetermined interpretation and policy. -We'll see what the two Ministry's Ministers have to say about this, if required.
- -I'm willing to see the existing license redefined, split 500 gallons/day domestic and 500 gallons/day pond provided my first priority rights from 1947 are maintained and that unused water flow be confirmed to continue in and out of the winter drinking water pond. Remember, although I hold first rights, I'm downstream of the two other license holders so there is no effect on them nor the environment.
- -Finally, I don't appreciate your threats, that you have been lenient, that if I continue exercise my rights to this water, that you have other enforcement options that have not been used, which remain available to you. Sincerely,

Hi Michael, Number 1.

I'm first priority Rights user from 1947. 71 Years ago.

Yes, I agree. You have a domestic water right for 1000 gallons per day for domestic purpose.

Number 2.

SeeLand Dairies is last rights user from 1988, 41 years earlier.

Yes, I agree. They hold two rights. One for domestic, 500 gallons per day, and one for stockwatering at 500 gallons per day.

Number 3.

They are using 20X plus their allowance of 500 gal/day. A current violation of the Act as you say.

I haven't verified this information. If you wish for this claim to be investigation you need to submit a report of a natural resource violation. I provided you with a link to the NRO tips line in a previous email. Here it is again:

Number 4.

SeeLand dairies are a proven Polluter as per MOE Order. Attached.

Pollution is outside of my responsibility and scope of practice. I encourage you to continue working with the correct authority in this regard.

Number 5.

I am downstream of his pollution and now live in a cease pool without any compensation from the Polluter. See #4

Number 6.

Seeland Dairies has illegally cut off my water to the North East end of the trout Pond pursuant to my licenses of 1947 and 2010. There is a conflict of interests between your Ministry and MOE. I was not given any notice of this illegal cut off pursuant to the Act as per emails to you in 2013, unanswered.

- You hold one licence on Smidsk Creek, which is Conditional Licence \$.22 This licence was issued in substitution of \$.22
- Your licence does not grant you authority to fill the pond with water from Smidsk Creek. It is not referenced in any way in your water licence. Your licence authorizes a "diversion structure, pipe, pump and tank" and is for domestic purpose only. Because the pond is not authorized with a water licence, there is no protection afforded to it under the Water Sustainability Act.
- I have not seen a conflict of interest. Can you clarify what you mean? Different branches of government have different authorities and responsibilities and we work together when issues are multijurisdictional. Your file was originally brought to my attention by MOE staff.

Number 7.

You are now denying me any information to this file. Why?

I provided you with 42 photos, a link to the water application web page, a link to the Natural Resource Violation web page, and a link to the Freed of Information (FOI) Request webpage. I was made aware this week that you have submitted an FOI request, which is great. The FOI request is the correct process for you to obtain government information.

Number 8.

You have sent me photos of your overdue 2013 unaltered report, without the report itself. Why? I'm afraid you may be misunderstanding my role in this. In 2013 I inspected your property at your request. I made some contemporaneous notes when I returned to my desk. These notes are the property of the province, and may be provided through the FOI process. I do not owe you a report and I did not indicate I would provide one. If you need professional services conducted on your land I would be happy to provide you a list of qualified environmental professionals (QEPs).

Number 9.

I have been screwed from a worthy aquaculture operation without cause, that is supported otherwise and suitable to the area for a U-Catch Ecotourism operation.

I need to be very clear with you on this point, because I am afraid my efforts so far have not been successful.

- 1. It is unlawful for you to fill your constructed pond with water from Smidsk Creek for the reasons described in Number 6.
- 2. Your expired permit under the *Wildlife Act* which was active between 2012 and 2017 did not authorize construction of the pond or diversion of water. The <u>only</u> way you can be granted permission to divert and use water in the province of BC is to have a water licence, issued by my department.
- 3. I have provided you with instructions on how you can apply for a water licence and hopefully get into compliance with the *Water Sustainability Act*. So far, I have been lenient on this point. I have other enforcement options that have not been used, which remain available to me.

I have attached the Rainbow Trout Pond Permit Application you submitted on August 5, 2012. On it, you stated that Water Licence §.22 allowed fish rearing. This is false for the reasons I have described above. When asked "is the pond connected to a natural watercourse" you stated "no". This is also false based on my site observations where I saw outflow from the pond entering Shuswap River.

The permit that was issued to you (also attached) expired on September 27, 2017. I have made inquiries with the Fish and Wildlife section, who have advised you have not applied for a new permit. When the permit was current, Condition 2 expressly stated that "the pond must not be used for commercial aquaculture". Condition 3 stated that "the pond must be a CLOSED SYSTEM that is NOT connected to a natural watercourse in any way".

You have failed to admit your own words that the water to my property \underline{was} a part of the natural watercourse, A \underline{Y} branch of Smidsk Creek, with proven flow of at least 4 years of based on gravel deposits at test site #2 from the Conservation Officers Report.

I am not going to permit you to put words in my mouth. A "Y branch" is not a term I am familiar with. I do not know how someone could definitely state that they were looking at 4 years' worth of gravel accumulation. A brief site visit could not have yielded such a conclusion and I did not make that claim.

Finally, the long standing pond is a integral part of the domestic water licenses cause of Winter Freeze drinking water requirements. See section 29 complaint (attached). The Provincial Trout Permits using Smidsk Creek water are also long standing even well before I bought the property 15 years ago.

Rights acquired under authorizations

- 7 (1) A licence entitles its holder to do the following in a manner provided in the licence
- (a) divert and beneficially use the quantity of water specified in the licence;
- (b) construct, maintain and operate the works authorized by the licence and related works necessarily required for the proper diversion or use of the water or the power produced from the water;
- (c) make changes in and about a stream necessary for the construction, maintenance or operation of the works referred to in paragraph (b) or to otherwise facilitate the authorized diversion;
- (d) construct fences, screens and fish or game guards across streams for the purpose of conserving fish or wildlife.
- (2) A use approval entitles its holder to do *anything* described in subsection (1) for the period or at the times and in the manner specified in the use approval.

Section 7 (1) is applicable here, but not Section 7 (2), since you hold a water licence and not a use approval. I've added my own highlights in red to help clarify what this section of the WSA means. What this section of the Act means is a licensee is entitled to make beneficial use of the water licence, in the manner that is written in their licence, and by following all of the terms and conditions of the licence (as well as any other enactments). Your licence simply does not make reference to a fish pond or a commercial aquaculture venture. I have provided you with instructions on how you can apply for the correct licence and bring yourself into compliance. I hope you follow this advice.

Hi Lori,

As discussed on the phone, here is a bit of an update and more to come from staff.

Staff advised they haven't received any updates in 2018 and hadn't been out to look since the spring. Staff have said they will look into it for a further update and get back to us shortly.

From staff, because I anticipate the question will be why the licenses aren't cancelled for non-beneficial use –

In regards to cancellation because of non-beneficial use I don't think that would be an option on the table anytime soon. The ministry can propose to cancel after three consecutive years of non-beneficial use but this is not the common practice and only happens in specific situations. Because of the extreme weather patterns that we have been having, this is not an isolated incident and there are many licence holders in the same situation. It is of no fault of their own that these works are in disrepair and because of this they will be given a fair chance to rebuild.

I did look at Dairy Lake levels this spring and it was full to capacity and spilling without any water being diverted into it from Cache Creek. This is a concern because if the licensee had diverted into the lake during freshet there could have been serious downstream impacts to the Trans Canada Hwy and adjacent downstream properties. During one of the rain events in August the Battle creek gulley did have a major wash event that backed up on to the hwy. I'm not sure how much water was being released from Dairy Lake during this even, if any, but there are consequences of sending too much water down that valley.

The Battle Creek Forest Service Road suffered extreme damage during the spring freshet and has been closed indefinitely. This area was identified as a concern during a terrain stability assessment that was done after the 2017 wildfire and is where the releases from Dairy Lake flow.

Another point to be aware of is, since the reservoir was full after freshet, I would assume that the licensee did make beneficial use of their irrigation licences by way of the stored water during the summer months.

There are lots of things to consider before a licence is cancelled. The decision to cancel is also an appealable decision so it is not taken lightly.

I've attached a link to the *Water Sustainability Act* if you would like to review the beneficial use section. It is section 30.

When was the diversion to Dairy Lake decommissioned and under what circumstances (i.e. nature)?

- This diversion (point of diversion 45884) has had years of repeated spring freshet complications. CN Railway is the holder of both licenses (C106482 and C129600) on this diversion.
- Staff believe that in 2012 the diversion structure was destroyed during a high water event.
- CN rebuilt the structure, which was then completely destroyed again during freshet in 2017.
- To add complications, the creek channel moved during 2017 freshet, and then the diversion ditch that is used to carry water from the diversion to the lake was damaged during fire guard installation during the Ashcroft fire in the summer of 2017.

Will the diversion be reinstated, and if so when?

- Yes the diversion will be reinstated as it is part of the condition of the water licence.
- CN Railway and the rancher that leases the appurtenant land to the water licence (lease holder) are aware of the issues, and will be coming up with a plan.
- FLNRORD hasn't had an update on progress from the license holder since last fall.

Who manages the weir on Dairy Lake, and what criteria is used for managing the flows out of the lake?

- The lease holder manages the dam on Dairy Lake on behalf of CN.
- The release is based on schedules set out in the water licences and needs for irrigation.
- The diversion of water to storage in Dairy Lake is licenced from November 1st to June 15th each year.
- Irrigation season is from April 1st to September 30th each year.
- Water can be released for irrigation as needed during the irrigation season.

Regarding the diversion referred to that is closer to Hwy 1 for irrigation purposes:

- There are three diversions lower on Cache Creek which have numerous licences on them. Attached is a spreadsheet that lists the volumes and timing windows for release.
- Staff note that all of these diversions have suffered the same fate as the Dairy Lake diversion. The licence holders have consistently been trying to fix the diversions since 2012 but every spring for the last two years they have been severely damaged. FLNRORD staff have been in contact with all of the licensees repeatedly for the last 3 years.

Staff have indicated there is no legislation/reform being considered.

The *Livestock Act* is under the mandate of the Minister of Agriculture.

In 2015, AGRI underwent a policy review of the Livestock Act. We were told that they would not be pursuing any changes to the Act regarding Livestock District, Pound Districts, or Livestock at Large (the parts that relate to the livestock grazing under the Range Act). Then in 2017, they indicated that there might be interest in completing a policy analysis on livestock at large. This never happened.

The <u>Trespass Act</u> is under the mandate of the Attorney General.

OIC 500 (2018) completed "housekeeping" of the Trespass Act through a re-ordering of the statutes. Nothing changed in terms of application.

Staff were on a call last week regarding the <u>SC of BC re Douglas Lake Cattle Co vs Nicola Valley Fish and Game Club</u> and asked the AG staff directly whether any changes are being contemplated to the Trespass Act. They replied that no changes are being contemplated.

Administration Fee invoices will be in the mail to owners in early February.

Owners of private managed forest land are required to pay an annual administration fee in accordance with Section 9(2) of the Private Managed Forest Land Act. The fees fund the operation of the Managed Forest Council and Managed Forest Program for the year.

Council sets the rate of the annual fee for each fiscal year. The fee has two parts:

a general administration fee applied equally to all owners, and

a fee calculated as a percentage of the bare land assessed value of the owner's private managed forest land

The 2019 annual fee rates are: \$250 + (managed forest bare land assessed value/1000 x 0.276).

Increase in general administration fee: Upon review Council has increased the 2019 General Administration Fee from \$120 to \$250. The increase will deliver a more equitable coverage of costs to administer the program over the range of managed forest sizes within the program.

Late Administration Fees - Council has implemented a new late administration fee procedure. For

payments that have not been received by March 15, 2019:

March 15– a \$25 late administrative fee will be applied to each outstanding invoice

June 15— a second \$25 late administrative fee will be applied to each outstanding invoice.



Dear Hon. Doug Donaldson:

I am forwarding to you the letter below, written on your behalf regarding the use of Round up in British Columbia by Lorne Bedford, Manager, FLNR in Prince George. It was written Nov 19 and addressed to s.22 who posted it on Facebook and gave me permission to use it. I therefore copy this message to her with my comments.

As somebody who has been involved the last 20 yrs with the very serious issues associated with the use of Round up, I cannot help being profoundly shocked by the lack of knowledge shown in the letter. To tell us that because it is approved by Health Canada, it is safe to use is a great leap of faith. So was MSMA. a pesticide with arsenic supposed to fend off the beetle infestation in BC. It was deregistered after fierce claims of its safety against the new scientific evidence I had presented but could no longer be denied. This fiasco has left us with the legacy of 1/2 million dead trees full of arsenic contaminating the environment all the way into the smoke of forest fires. In 2011, I succeeded in forcing Health Canada to look at the toxicity of Round up (a mix of glyphosate and POEA which has its own toxicity) to Amphibians through a court case for which the agency had threatened to have me pay for the costs if I would lose. I won and Health Canada had to pay \$12,000 for the expenses incurred. In reality, the agency made us all pay for their mistakes. If one adds the way Health Canada has handled the tobacco issues, the asbestos issues, claiming safety of those products until they absolutely have to surrender to the evidence, and after inflicting undue hardships and even deaths to Canadians, one has to be very naive to believe in Health Canada's claim that Round up is safe if applied according to the label, -- something NOBODY monitors in BC--. I remember telling you of my experience in s.22 a farmer using Round up on GMO canola, in documented windy conditions contrary to the label, and the impossibility of having a Health Canada inspector come to look at his practices. As you may recall, I had explained to you that BC Environment does not monitor the application of pesticides, except for roadways and buffer zones for waterways.

Moreover, the BC Ministry of Environment is hardly present when it comes to pesticides; there is only one pesticide officer out of Prince George, who is unable to do his job for obvious reasons. So the reality of the Big Wild West for pesticides in forestry (and agriculture) seems to escape your manager. The expression "Integrated Pest Management" is utterly devoid of meaning. BC Environment has not only completely gutted the number of its pesticide officers, it is using the controversial Professional Reliance model with PMPs (Pest Management Plans) which are handed to to the logging companies on a silver platter every 5 yrs. The so called public consultation does not allow the public to oppose the use of pesticides, or simply know where the pesticides will be applied, how much and when. Neither is there an account of how much and what has been applied over the years, and there is total ignorance of other pesticide usages for cumulative effects. Those PMPs are registered and are not appealable. It is simply defrauding the public of our voices in regard to the management of our Crown Lands.

Worse, the professionals supposedly consulting with the owning public have no interest in new scientific findings like Suzanne Simard's research on the interconnectivity of all forest flora. I

presented the article to the Canfor silviculturist, arguing that calling aspens, willows, shrubs "weeds" was a misnomer for those important species for the regeneration of the forest but it fell on deaf ears. He preferred to retreat behind the approval of Health Canada. He also refused to provide me with data showing the efficacy of "chemical brushing".

The Prince George manager is also poorly informed on the damages from aerial spraying. Aerial spraying has been shown repeatedly to drift outside the intended sprayed areas, hence, relying on buffer zones for protection of waterways is rather problematic to say the least. It is even more problematic for those who live nearby, even kilometres away.

I strongly recommend that your staff familiarizes itself with the Monsanto Papers easily accessible on internet. The historic ruling in San Francisco of August 2018, exposed troubling evidence of manipulations of data by Monsanto to prove the "safety" of Round up, as well as the corruption of some high level bureaucrats of the US-EPA. The plaintiff, who had contacted Non Hodgkin disease from spraying glyphosate for 20 yrs on school grounds, was awarded \$289 million recently revised to \$78 million. The verdict is being appealed to day but the evidence is indisputable.

The last issue ignored by the manager is the relationship of the forest management aiming at destroying leaf species like aspens and cottonwoods and the forest fires we have been witnessing recently. I would like to know if your Ministry has researched this area actively and come to some conclusions about it.

Further, I request that your Ministry produce a map of all glyphosate sprayed areas for the last 20 yrs in BC, with the amount used and methods of applications.

I also would like to be shown what is gained, if at all, by chemical brushing compared to no brushing and mechanical brushing.

I would like to see the results of inspected sprayed areas by your Ministry and/or BC Environment for the last 20 yrs

I would like to know how Amphibians are protected with aerial spraying.

As always, I look forward to your reply.

Thank you for your email of November 7, 2018, regarding the use of herbicides in British Columbia's forests. Your email was referred to me and I am happy to respond on behalf of Minister Donaldson.

Chemical brushing treatments are used to improve survival and growth of trees, and to help ensure planted trees meet free growing standards required by the *Forest and Range Practices Act* (FRPA). If forestry companies choose to use chemical brushing, they must work under BC's *Integrated Pest Management Act* (IPMA), administered by the Ministry of Environment. Prior to obtaining an authorization under the Integrated Pest Management Regulation (IPMR) for large scale operations on public land, there must be consultation with the public and First Nations. It's important to note that since 1990, herbicide use has declined by 50 percent in British Columbia.

British Columbia's reforestation practices are updated when new scientific research and information becomes available. Recently, this saw the Ministry start to allow increased levels of aspen and broadleaves in managed stands throughout British Columbia, which will cause a further decline in chemical brushing. Use of superior orchard seed, improved nursery techniques and well-timed planting is also reducing the amount of brushing required. Seedlings are now quite often able to outgrow competing brush species on certain sites.

These fast growing seedlings will reduce the number of brushing treatments.

Authorization holders are required to meet the environmental protection standards listed in the IPMR such as setbacks from streams and lakes, no treatment zones surrounding water, and public notification (posting of signs). When aspen or other deciduous species are not the preferred species for reforestation, some areas within harvested openings are brushed manually with brush saws, or with herbicides. However, areas adjacent to creeks, streams and wetlands, do not get sprayed. These non-treatment zones, and unharvested wildlife tree retention areas within cutover areas, ensure biodiversity in our forests is maintained.

Ministry of Environment staff is not aware of negative environmental impacts from the use of glyphosate in forestry when applied according to the label. Additionally, before a herbicide is allowed to be sold or used in Canada, it must be evaluated and registered with Health Canada's Pest Management Regulatory Agency (PMRA). The PMRA will only approve a pesticide if satisfied its use will not result in unreasonable adverse impacts.

I hope all is well.

Our constituent, Rick Hammer, visited the office again yesterday at the end of the day to get an update. I filled him in on your notes below. He was surprised because he has no record of being told in April that the society could proceed with their paddling operation at the site for the 2018 season. They have been using a different, temporary site. Mr Hammer had actually asked on a few occasions if they in fact could use the site and never received an answer. If there is record (an email/letter etc) of the society being told they could use the site is it possible to receive a copy?

Part of the issue is that they need to build a dock and boat storage on the water – they cannot build on land because city by-law does not allow for them to build a permanent structure.

The last information we received would indicate that the application should be complete by end of August or October at the latest. According to the bullets below, the last bullet indicates another 2-4 months, but it isn't clear whether that is from August (meaning completion October-December) or the previous 2-4 months given (meaning completion end of August-October).

You can see the confusion and frustration

I appreciate your help on this one. If you need any more info from me let me know. Otherwise I will wait to hear from you on an update/feedback from this and my previous email (with the email string of Mr Hammer and my communications).

- December 2016, a new application was submitted by the Pitt Meadows Dike Usage Enhancement Society (Society) to use the foreshore of a property to host a paddling club.
- FLNRORD received complaints about the condition of the foreshore area from the upland owner of the property.
- In August 2017, FLNRORD Lands representative and C&E staff person were conducting a site inspection and found that the site under application was being used to store boats, canoes, buoys and other material. The site was not in a safe, clean and sanitary condition. The Society was notified to clean up the site before their new application could be processed.
- In October 2017, MLA Lisa Beare contacted FLNRORD Authorizations staff to discuss the situation. She was informed that we required the applicant to clean up the site and when he had completed the actions and notified us, his application would be processed. She was out of her office until December 2017 and staff spoke to her about how the site was to be cleaned up and the applicant was to notify us that the work was done.
- In March 2018, FLNRORD representative confirmed, with evidence provided by the applicant, that the site had been cleaned up and the application would be processed.
- In April 2018, FLNRORD representative told Mr. Hammer (the applicant) that as the
 application has passed the critical stages, that the Society could proceed with their paddling
 operation for the 2018 season. His application was being reviewed and would move to the
 documentation stage.
- The applicants activities are not impacted by FLNRORD's delay in processing as they have continued use and access to the site
- Due to a backlog of applications, the review of the draft Land Use Report was not completed until May 2018 and the application is currently with the documentation team.
- MLA Lisa Beare requested an update on the status of the application in August 2018. Her office was informed that the application was being processed and due to current workload, an estimate of 2 4 months to completion was likely.

- All aquaculture applications are required to be advertised in local papers and are posted online on FLNRORD's Applications and Reasons for Decision web page. Comments are usually received for 30 days. [note: this process has recently changed]
- The posting in the local paper for this application occurred the week of August 8, 2018 and the public comment period for this application was open until September 6, 2018.




Staff have issued notifications in place this year and with the plan to continue to do so.

(those are for people who don't want to use a computer and go to sporting store to buy licences....the vendor is instructed to advise the hunter of when his FWID will expire).

It has recently been brought to my attention that a sporting goods store called Chilcotin Guns, 1542 Broadway Ave South, Williams Lake, BC is conducting a "wolf-whacking" contest which closes March 31. 2019. The Facebook announcement requires only date-stamped photographs and states "The most wolves wins." (Link attached below).

British Columbia's wildlife belongs to all BC residents. The term "urban/rural divide" is misleading in that it implies that those of us who do not live in close proximity to our wildlife can have no say regarding their treatment and/or "management." Those who currently live within close proximity to wildlife are demonstrating that they can shoot and trap species for their own agendas; namely to raise the survival rates of the animals they would prefer to hunt/trap for their own purposes such as bushmeat, hides, recreation and heads to hang on walls.

Some MUs of Region 5 have no bag limit for wolves, with some containing bag limit restrictions of 3 kills during arbitrary seasons. The goal of the Chilcotin Guns wolf killing contest to kill as many wolves as possible is extremely achievable, with no accountability to the public. Assuming that killing contests are legal in BC please advise how the ministries responsible for wildlife monitor such activities.

We had someone in here letting me know that the elk at Myrtle Point Golf Course have become a massive issue – they ruin the greens, etc.

My understanding is that they are Roosevelt Elk? They were brought to Pender Harbour Golf Course years ago but then became an issue there so they built a fence and then brought all or some of them to Powell River.

I believe there have been efforts in the past to bring the elk further into the mountains or up the logging road, but they always end up back on the golf course.

The individual is wondering if there are grants available to the golf course to deal with this issue OR if the ministry can assist in perhaps building a fence as well to help prevent this issue.

Ine problem for which the constituent has requested the MLA's assistance is: Chris purchased South Park RV and took possession June 30, 2017. The park is now named Northern Experience RV located at 9180 Cariboo Hwy, Prince George BC. Chris received a letter from the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations dated August 30, 2018 informing him that he needed to make an application for a Groundwater License. This licensing came into effect in 2016. The previous owner ignored this requirement which means Chris has been invoiced for \$167.78 (2016), \$200(2017), \$200(2018) for a total of \$767.78. The fee was paid on January 14. They are requesting that the 2016 amount and based on the possession date of June 30, 2017 – the prorated portion of the 2017 amount would be refunded as Chris was not the owner of the RV park.

Thanks for your reply. Here is what I'm hoping to discus with Melanie. Hopefully she has time to meet in the early part of this week. I can come there, we can meet in the park or anyway in Strathcona.

She is probably well aware of a lot of these facts already but I'll give a brief rundown before I get to the points I'm contacting about...

City of Vancouver has to figure out an arterial road to get from Main to Clark. They have arranged a 42 person committee and will be giving them 4 different routes. Not positive on routes as I was not selected to the committee.

Flats Arterial Community Panel



Once they decide the best route the company that the city hired to run the committee will present and recommend route to Mayor and Council. All info can be found in false creek flats link.

https://vancouver.ca/home-property-development/false-creek-flats.aspx

Challenge is 2 of the recommended routes should not be on the table as options. City Council already voted twice to calm Prior/Venables and turn it back into the local serving street it once was. The community is outraged that it is back on the table after COV knows how bad it is for the future of Strathcona. Here are just a few of the numerous reasons it is bad for the area:

- 1. Prior was designed to be a residential street. It only became an arterial to service a viaduct intended for a freeway that was never built. Now that the city finally recognizes that the viaduct was a mistake and should come down, Prior should be restored to what it was designed for, not permanently turned into an unsafe arterial.
- 2. It is not safe for pedestrian, bikes or cars. And it will get a lot worse if the overpass is built on Prior.
- 3. It divides residents from much needed green space. Imagine what a calmed Prior and revitalized park would do for the neighbourhood.
- 4. The width of the arterial that they are proposing will destroy homes and people will be displaced.
- 5. Increases air pollution beside residential homes etc etc

The second route that should never have been put on the table is the Malkin/William route right through the south end of Strathcona Park. It will:

- 1) Destroy valuable park space
- 2) Cause the removal of much needed track/field, tennis courts, trees etc
- 3) Destroy majority of Eagle nesting habitat and be located well within the distance for buffer zone set in the BC Gov Raptor protection Guidlines that clearly state Eagles need a 160m buffer for about 10 months of the yr.

This area needs park space more than any are in the city. It is some of the lowest per person at this time. There are thousands of new people coming here with the Hospital build as well and they too will need a place to enjoy.

My ask is for Melanie and your team to help with looking into and advising if this is a possibility...I have been told that there is a chance we could stop this road if BC Government agrees that building it will be "Environmentally Damaging". I believe it will be because it will:

- 1) Be harmful to the Eagles like the Raptor Protection Guidelines state. These Eagles have been in the park since 1940's
- 2) Remove a large majority of tree canopy in the park
- 3) Destroy songbird, waterfowl (south Strathcona Garden) nesting area
- 4) Increase air/noise pollution close to the remaining park
- 5) Contribute to Global Warming as much greenspace will be destroyed etc etc

I have contacted Hon. Doug Donaldson as well as I think he would be in charge of this analysis about figuring out if the route could be declared "Environmentally Damaging" Have not heard back but am hopeful you found out about this from him.

We are not saying don't build the road. We realize there is a need to build one but believe there are smarter alternatives to these two routes. Here is an example of just one of the options. It tries to take into

consideration as many groups needs and wants as possible along with what is best for the community. It is not getting the fair assessment it deserves as it should be replacing Prior/Venables and the Park Route in that Panels review.

Dear Honourable Doug Donaldson, Minister of Forest, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development; Honourable George Heyman, Minister of Environment and Climate Change Strategy:

Across northern BC, rivers are running at an all-time low. Ongoing drought has left the Skeena, Bulkley, Kispiox and Telkwa rivers flowing lower than ever for this time of year. That means thousands of salmon trying to return to their spawning grounds are at risk. Without enough water, these fish are being left for dead in shallow pools. Locals worry that if there isn't enough rain before things freeze, these drought conditions could continue for another year, impacting everything from salmon runs to local tourism and agriculture.

Now more than ever, the BC government needs to show strong leadership in defence of our communities and the water we depend on. Decision makers have the tools and authority they need to be water leaders, including those outlined in the Water Sustainability Act that are yet to be fully implemented. Here are some immediate steps that should be taken:

Give special designations to rivers that are essential sources of drinking water, support local salmon populations and are significant to First Nations, to protect them from drought, industrial activity, water extraction and other risks.

Establish a province-wide environmental flows regulation that ensures streams and rivers are thriving, not just barely surviving, and are a safe home for salmon.

Create rules that ensure water protection is a priority when decisions are being made about forestry, mining and other land-based activities that impact BC's freshwater.

Bring forward a wild salmon strategy that increases protection of water flows for fish and preserves and restores freshwater habitat, which also plays an important role in flood and drought mitigation.

Follow through on your commitment to review the royalties industry must pay to extract water, so these resources can be used to protect and restore our rivers and lakes.

It's easy to take water for granted, but each summer we're reminded that our sense of

abundance is a myth. More than 85% of British Columbians think the province needs to do a better job of protecting our rivers, lakes and streams or problems will get worse. Will you step up to the task?
