APPENDIX A TERMS OF PERMIT

AMMENDED (May 18, 2017) PERMIT VI16-227313

REPORTING REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. The permit holder will maintain accurate and up to date records of the reported harassment, attacks or kills of livestock. This information will be collected according to the established COS verification procedures and contained in Verification Report Forms (Appendix E) which will document:
 - a. the date and location of the harassment, attacks or kill(s)
 - b. the type of livestock harassed, attacked or killed (i.e. beef, dairy, or sheep) and impacts.
 - c. the class of the livestock animal harassed, attacked or killed (e.g. cow, calf, bull, ewe, ram, lamb),
 - d. the evidence used to identify the species of predator involved,
 - e. the Best Management Practices used by the producer, and
 - support findings with photos/videos.
- The permit holder must maintain accurate up to date records of the wildlife hunted, trapped or killed under the permit. This information will be contained in Mitigation Report Forms (Appendix F) which will document:
 - a. observations of the behaviour of the predator(s).
 - the BMPs that were in place to prevent predation.
 - c. The number, type and characteristics of animals removed.
 - a. Including incidental catch and outcomes (i.e. killed by trap, euthanized or released),
 - d. the success of the individual predator or whole pack removal outcome (will include an indication of the level of confidence that the animals removed were the predators involved in the attack),
 - e. the UTM location of mitigation activity,
 - the land status of mitigation activity (Private land or Crown land), f.
 - f. the land status of mitigation activity (Private land or Grown land),
 g. the type of bait (livestock or wildlife carcass) and techniques used, and
 - h. the disposal of any predator carcasses.
- The permit holder will provide further information in Quarterly Reports which will document:
 - a. the total number of reported livestock injuries, harassment and deaths,
 - the total number of verified livestock harassments, injuries and death and a quantification of the financial losses.
 - c. the total number or animals controlled (species, age, sex),
 - Including incidental catch and outcomes (i.e. killed by trap, euthanized or released),
 - d. the methods and techniques used to control predation,
 - e. observations of predator behaviour,
 - observation on the scope/scale of conflict incidents,
 - financial reporting for the Livestock Protection Program, and
 - recommendations.
- The Wildlife Specialists must submit all completed Verification Report Forms (Appendix E) to the permit holder (Program Coordinator) within 10 days of the completion of the verification. The permit holder (Program Coordinator) must also forward the copies of the Verification Report Forms with the positive results (i.e. a verified predation event) to the Conservation Officer Service representative on the Oversight Committee. All Verification Report Forms will be maintained by the permit holder and made available to the Oversight Committee upon request.
- 5. The Wildlife Specialists must submit the completed Mitigation Report Forms (Appendix F) to the permit holder (Program Coordinator) within 10 days of the cessation of the mitigation activities. All Mitigation Report Forms will be maintained by the permit holder and made available to the Oversight Committee upon request.
- 6. The Quarterly Reports are to be submitted by the permit holder (Program Coordinator) to the Oversight Committee on a quarterly basis quarterly (July 1, October 1, January 1, and April 1).
- 7. The Wildlife Specialists must produce a copy of the Mitigation Reports on the demand of an officer.

GENERAL CONDITIONS:

- The permit holder and the designated Wildlife Specialists must comply with all laws applicable to the activities carried out under this permit.
- This permit extends to the permit holder's designated Wildlife Specialists, but only when they are engaged in the activities authorized by this permit on behalf of the permit holder.
- The permit holder must ensure that all designated Wildlife Specialists hold a valid British Columbia trapping licence when they are undertaking trapping activities unless the individual is exempt from holding one.
- 4. The permit holder must ensure that all designated Wildlife Specialists hold a valid British Columbia hunting licence when they are undertaking hunting and shooting activities unless the individual is exempt from holding one.
- 5. The permit holder must ensure that all designated Wildlife Specialists have received the appropriate training.
- The permit holder must provide all designated Wildlife Specialists with a letter that identifies the permit number and the individual as a designate under the permit.
- The permit holder and the designated Wildlife Specialists must carry a copy of this permit when conducting the activities authorized by this permit.
- Designated Wildlife Specialists must carry a copy of a letter from the permit holder that identifies them as a designate under this permit when conducting the activities authorized by this permit.
- The permit holder or the designated Wildlife Specialists will take all reasonably necessary steps to ensure that public safety is not jeopardized and fish or wildlife habitat is not damaged by any action taken under authority of this permit. Public safety issues will be reported, without delay, to the Conservation Officer Service (COS) through the RAPP hotline (1-877-952-7277).
- The permit holder or the designated Wildlife Specialists will ensure that all wildlife are treated in a humane manner, and are not subjected to any unnecessary harm or suffering.
- Designated Wildlife Specialists must employ techniques to prevent and avoid the capture of incidental (i.e. nontarget) wildlife.
- 12. Any incidental species that are live trapped wildlife must either be humanely euthanized or released without delay based on direction provided by the COS.
- Every reasonable effort to retrieve wounded wildlife must be made. Wildlife wounded, but not killed, must be reported to the COS immediately through the RAPP hotline (1-877-952-7277).

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APPENDIX B DEFINITIONS

AMMENDED (May 18, 2017) PERMIT VI16-227313

In this permit the following words have the following meaning.

designate – a person who is designated by the permit holder and who is identified, for the purposes of this permit, as a Wildlife Specialist.

harassment of livestock – means the act of worrying, stalking or chasing after livestock by wolves or coyotes but not an actual attack on livestock resulting in death or injury. It does not mean the mere presence of wildlife near livestock.

livestock - means beef and dairy cattle or sheep.

mitigate (or control) - means killing by shooting, trapping, snaring in order to kill, or hunting with dogs in order to kill.

Oversight Committee – is the body that will provide input and direct the Livestock Protection Program and will consist of representatives from the BC Cattlemen's Association, the BC Sheep Federation, the BC Trapper's Association the Ministry of Agriculture, the Ministry of Environment (Conservation Officer Service), and Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations.

Permit Issuer - The Statutory Decision Maker responsible for 'sign-off' on this permit.

predation of livestock - means an actual attack on livestock by wolves or coyotes resulting in death or injury.

predator - means wolf and coyote.

producer - means an individual who raises livestock within the Province of BC.

Program Coordinator – is, for the purposes of this permit, is the BC Cattlemen's Association employee or contractor who is responsible for the operational coordination of the Livestock Protection Program.

Regional Manager – means the Regional Manager, Recreational Fisheries & Wildlife Programs, Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations, who is responsible for the Region in which a mitigation activity is to occur.

verification – is a formal field investigation and reporting procedure developed by the Conservation Officer service that is used to determine the species of predator involved in an attack, killing or harassment of a domestic animal.

verified predation event – is a positive determination of harassment, attacks or kills of beef or dairy cattle or sheep caused by wolves or coyotes.

Verifier – A person who has received the Conservation Officer Service 'Verification Training' or who is determined to be qualified to undertake verification by the COS.

Wildlife - means wildlife as defined by the Wildlife Act [RSBC 1996] or any of its attendant regulations.

Wildlife Specialist – means a person who identified by the permit-holder as a Wildlife Specialist and as a designate under this permit and who may thereby undertake the mitigation activities authorized under this permit.

APPENDIX C PROCEDURES

AMMENDED (May 18, 2017) PERMIT VI16-227313

PROCEDURES:

1. Investigation and confirmation

- 1.1 The Wildlife Specialists will investigate complaints respecting occurrences of alleged predation, injury or harassment of livestock by predators as soon as possible.
- 1.2 The Program Coordinator will provide the Oversight Committee with information on the start date, location nature, and completion date of all mitigation activities.
- No control action may be taken unless the predator attack is a verified predation event and documented in the Verification Report (Appendix E). A predator feeding on dead livestock is not evidence of a predator attack.
- 1.4 In situations where predator harassment, injury or attack cannot be verified, or in the absence of other substantiating evidence, a Verification Report Form describing the losses and all relevant circumstances must filled out by Wildlife Specialist and maintained on file by the permit holder. However, no predator mitigation action may be taken in this circumstance.
- BC Parks must be notified where the predation occurrence or response to an occurrence is within the boundaries of a park, protected area, or conservancy. A Park Use Permit is required to trap animals in a park, recreation area or conservancy. Any control action undertaken within the boundaries of a provincial park or protected area must have prior approval from the BC Parks Regional Manager.

2. Prevention

- 2.1 In situations where, in the opinion of the Program Coordinator, it has been determined that faulty or negligent husbandry practices encouraged harassment, injury, or death of livestock by predators; Wildlife Specialists must not take actions to remove predators. Records of occurrences of faulty husbandry practices (e.g. exposed carcasses, remote and uncontrolled calving grounds, or malnutrition of livestock) must be maintained by the permit holder and must be included in the Verifications (Appendix E) and Mitigation Reports (Appendix F).
- A minimum, all producers that experience a verified predation event must be provided the most up-to-date information on husbandry practices (best management practices) by Wildlife Specialists, or other qualified personnel, to educate and inform ranchers/farmers on management and planning techniques to prevent or minimise potential wildlife predation on livestock. By March 31 of each year of the period of the permit, the Program Coordinator must submit to the Oversight Committee, copies of the information or documentation on husbandry practices that he intends to distribute to livestock producers.

3. Authority for Predator Control Actions

- 3.1 Control of the offending predator(s) under authority of this permit must be undertaken only by the designated Wildlife Specialists.
- 3.2 The Wildlife Specialists must comply with all provincial regulations regarding Compulsory Reporting and Compulsory Inspection of killed wildlife.
- 3.3 All wildlife killed under the activities authorized by this permit will remain the property of the Crown and must be surrendered to the Crown (if requested) or handled and then disposed of within 24 hours of being killed.
- 3.4 Handling (when not surrendered to the Crown):

- 3.4.1 All wolf carcasses must be destroyed by having the skull crushed and the hide slashed. The slash should extend along the back (dorsal side) of the animal starting from the area between the ears to the base of the tail and the slash must go completely through the hide.
- 3.4.2 All coyote carcasses must be destroyed by having the hide slashed. The slash should extend along the back (dorsal side) of the animal starting from the area between the ears to the base of the tail and the slash must go completely through the hide.
- 3.4.3 The slash must be documented with an electronic image which must then be appended to the Mitigation Report.
- 3.4.4 The Wildlife Specialist and the producer that is involved will confirm that the hides and skulls have been destroyed through their signatures on the Mitigation Report.
- 3.5 Disposal (when not surrendered to the Crown):
 - 3.5.1 After handling, as per the instructions in section 3.4, wolf and coyote carcasses should be disposed of through natural decomposition, through destruction in accordance with community by-laws and practices (e.g. sanitary landfill or incineration), or through burial or composting on private land in accordance with community by-laws and practices, and in a manner that is compliant with all environmental legislation and consistent with all Best Management Practices.
 - 3.5.2 If carcasses are disposed of through natural decomposition, they should be distributed and dispersed on Crown land and well away from private property, hiking trails and other areas where people congregate.
 - 3.5.3 If carcasses are disposed of through natural decomposition, their disposal locations (e.g. UTM coordinates or description of location) must be reported by the Program Coordinator by email to the COS Sergeant that is responsible for the "area", as identified in Appendix G.
 - 3.5.4 In special circumstances where government wishes to retain carcasses for use, it will communicate this to the Program Coordinator and specific arrangements for handling, transportation and surrender will be made.

4. Predator control

- 4.1 Killing by shooting, trapping, snaring, or hunting with dogs are the only control measures that may be applied to remove wolves and coyotes. Lethal predator control must be conducted in the most humane way possible.
- 4.2 Killing (neck) snares may be used between December 1st and March 31st only.
- 4.3 All non-killing traps that are set must be checked on a schedule of not less than once every 24 hours when on private land and every 72 hours when on Crown land.
- 4.4 All killing traps must be inspected not less than once every 14 days.
- 4.5 The use of poisons is strictly prohibited.
- 4.6 Mitigation activities may take place only following a verified predation event involving the harassment, attacks or kills of beef and dairy cattle or sheep caused by wolves or coyotes and when, in the opinion of the Wildlife Specialist, the success of control action is probable. All control actions must be directed to the effective removal of the offending predators while taking precautions to minimise harm or risk to members of the public, non-target animals, and the environment.
- 4.7 The presence of predators in grazing areas or on private land is not a reason to take predator control action.
- 4.8 All incidental captures and outcomes (i.e. killed by trap, euthanized or released) must be recorded in the Mitigation Report Forms and reported by the Program Coordinator to the Oversight Committee in the Quarterly Reports.
- 4.9 All incidental captures that involve a non-target animal that is still alive must be reported immediately by the Wildlife Specialist to the permit holder (Program Coordinator) who will immediately contact and seek direction from the COS representative who sits on the Oversight Committee. The permit holder (Program Coordinator) will then relay the direction to the Wildlife Specialist that is contending with the incidental capture. At the discretion of

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- the COS representative, instructions that cover usual circumstances may be provided in advance, and in writing, to the permit holder (Program Coordinator).
- 4.10 If the verification procedure reveals that a pack of wolves (or coyotes) was responsible for harassment or an attack or kill on livestock then the Wildlife Specialist will attempt to kill all members of that pack. Following the removal of all wolves or coyotes reasonably suspected of having been involved in a verified predation event, all mitigation activities must cease in an area unless a verified predation event re-occurs.
- 4.11 Following a verified predation event, a post-event mitigation period of 60 days is allowed for the Wildlife Specialist to undertake mitigation (control) activities and remove the predatory animals that the wildlife specialist reasonably believes were involved in the verified predation event.
- 4.12 Following a verified predation event, the post event mitigation period may be extended to as much as six months if the Conservation Officer Service representative that sits on the Oversight Committee agrees to the extension and if the rationale and agreement are documented and made available to all members of the Oversight Committee.
- 4.13 Following a verified predation event, mitigation activities may occur within 500 metres of the verified harassment, attack or kill. In specific verified predation events, this distance may be increased if the Conservation Officer Service representative that sits on the Oversight Committee agrees to the increase and if the rationale and agreement are documented and made available to all members of the Oversight Committee.
- 4.14 Wildlife Specialists, when operating under the direction of the Regional Manager, are authorized to transport and dispose of wildlife, or parts of wildlife, that are killed by activities that are authorized under this permit.
- 4.15 The permit holder (Program Coordinator) must notify the COS, at the "area" level (see Appendix G), when any mitigation works on Crown land commences and must provide information on the location of mitigation activities (UTM coordinates) and the techniques that will be employed. The Program Coordinator must also notify the COS, at the zone level, that mitigation activities on Crown land have ceased immediately after the mitigation report has been completed and the file has been is closed by the Program Coordinator.
- 4.16 The Wildlife Specialists will ensure that, when setting traps on Crown land, signage is placed prominently along roadways and public trails in order to alert the public that trapping, for the purposes of wildlife control, is occurring in the area. The signs must be placed within 1 kilometre of the sets and signs must cover all reasonable approaches.
- 4.17 When operating on Crown land the permit holder will attempt to notify the holder(s) of the registered trapline(s) on which permitted control measures will occur. The permit holder will maintain a record of these discussions or will document the reasons why such contact was not practicable under the circumstances.

5. Wildlife Specialists

- 5.1 Wildlife Specialists under this permit may investigate and verify all alleged incidences of livestock predation, injury or harassment; determine the responsible predator; promote application of current prevention measures by producers; and apply mitigation strategies where warranted.
- 5.2 Wildlife Specialists under this permit may carry out predator control measures on wolf and coyote, and must be proficient in all aspects of predator control including appropriate, humane and up-to-date lethal and non-lethal wildlife control.

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APPENDIX D ADVISORY

AMMENDED (May 18, 2017) PERMIT VI16-227313

GENERAL

- It is the permit holder's responsibility to be aware of all applicable laws and the limits of this permit. For example, this permit does not give the permit holder authority to access or travel though any private land without permission from the landowner.
- The Province is not liable for any illness contracted through wildlife handling. It is the responsibility of the permit holder to inform themselves of possible health hazards, and to ensure that all reasonably necessary safety measures are undertaken.
- If applicable, the permit holder is responsible for renewing his or her own permit. The issuer is not obliged to send a reminder notice.

LEGISLATION

Here are some, but not all, relevant excerpts from the Wildlife Act:

Property in Wildlife

- 2 (3) A person who lawfully kills wildlife and complies with all applicable provisions of this Act and the regulations acquires the right of property in that wildlife.
- 2 (4) If a person by accident or for the protection of life or property kills wildlife, that wildlife, despite subsection (3), remains the property of the government.
- 2 (5) Despite anything in this Act, no right of action lies, and no right of compensation exists, against the government for death, personal injury or property damage caused by
 - a) wildlife, or
 - b) an animal that escapes or is released from captivity or is abandoned

In British Columbia

Hunting and licences

- 11 (1) A person who hunts wildlife commits an offence unless the person holds all of the following:
 - a) a hunting licence issued to the person under this Act;
 - b) any limited entry hunting authorization that is required by regulation;
 - c) any other licence that is required by regulation;
 - d) any other permit that is required by regulation
- 11 (8) A person commits an offence if the person traps fur bearing animals unless he or she holds a trapping licence.

Trafficking in wildlife

22 A person who traffics live wildlife or wildlife meat, except as authorized by regulation or a permit, commits an offence.

Accidental killing of wildlife

- 75 (1) A person who kills or wounds wildlife, other than prescribed wildlife, either by accident or for the protection of life or property, must promptly report to an officer
 - (a) the killing or wounding, and
 - (b) the location of the wildlife.
- (2) A person who fails to report as required under subsection (1) commits an offence.

Documents not transferable

- 81 Except as authorized by regulation or as otherwise provided under this Act, a licence, permit or limited entry hunting authorization is not transferable, and a person commits an offence if the person
 - a) allows his or her licence, permit or limited entry hunting authorization to be used by another person, or
 - b) uses another person's licence, permit or limited entry hunting authorization.

Failure to pay fine

- 85 (1) This section applies if a person
 - (a) fails to pay, within the time required by law, a fine imposed as a result of the person's conviction for an offence under this Act or the *Firearm Act*, and
 - (b) has been served with notice of this section.
 - (2) In the circumstances referred to in subsection (1),
 - (a) the person's right to apply for or obtain a licence, permit or limited entry hunting authorization under this Act is suspended immediately and automatically on the failure to pay the fine,
 - (b) all licences, permits and limited entry hunting authorizations issued to that person under this Act are cancelled immediately and automatically on the failure to pay the fine,
 - (b.1) the person must not apply for employment as an assistant guide,
 - (b.2) the person must not guide as an assistant guide, and
 - (c) the person commits an offence if, before that fine is paid, the person
 - (i) applies for, or in any way obtains, a licence, permit or limited entry hunting authorization under this Act.
 - (ii) does anything for which a licence, permit or limited entry hunting authorization under this Act is required.
 - (iii) applies for employment as an assistant guide, or
 - (iv) guides as an assistant guide.

Production of licence or permit

97 If a person who is required to hold a licence, permit or limited entry hunting authorization issued under this Act

- a) fails to produce it for inspection to an officer on request, or
- b) fails or refuses to state his or her name and address to an officer on request,

the person commits an offence.

Regulations

This excerpt from the Permit Regulation, made under the Wildlife Act, is relevant:

8 A person who holds a permit under the Act or the Permit Regulation commits an offence if he or she fails to comply with a term of the permit.
