Project Summary The Sunnyside Trail Network is a new additional to Revelstoke's network of trails. The

network will be an "enduro" style trail network. This will mean that riders will climb only on the designated climb trail, and will descend on different trails. This will be a different

offering to Revelstoke's existing trails crosscountry and downhill trails.

Link to BC Trails Strategy This project was identified as a key opportunity in the Trail Plan for Revelstoke. It will offer

a one-way system of trails that will be open to e-bikers and minimize user conflict. The

network will be a draw for both tourists and locals.

Revelstoke's Trail Plan, developed in 2018, identified the Sunnyside area as an area with

opportunity to develop and expand Revelstoke's trail offering and to alleviate user conflict

on the lower Mt Cartier recreation trail.

Description

The Sunnyside network is being completed in phases. To date, we have built a climb trail and a flow style descent trail which has brought phase 1 to completion. For our next phase, we plan to refurbish an existing trail and a technical descent trail.

This trail network will differ from the existing Mount Macpherson area, which is oriented for cross country riders, and the Boulder area, which is accessible by vehicle. Additionally, we intend to make this network e-bike friendly. This network will enable riders to extend their season and enjoy a greater variety of trails.

Sunnyside's southern exposure will mean that it will be free of snow before our other riding areas, expanding opportunities for mountain biking and hiking in the shoulder season Its other advantage is that there are no plans to log the area. Revelstoke's trails are constantly under threat from logging, and many trails have had to be rebuilt due to destruction from logging.

We hope to expand Revelstoke's trail options to keep up with the increasing demand from riders. We are seeing more riders each year on Revelstoke's trails, both visitors and tourists. We hope that this trail network will:

- extend our biking season;
- satisfy e-bikers, who are looking for options for riding in Revelstoke;
- offer a new modern "enduro" style trail network;
- attract visitors to Revelstoke in the shoulder season.

We will monitor use of the network by way of trail counters and data collected rom Strava and Trailforks.

An expanded tourism season will help make our economy more resilient.

Revelstoke's tourism economy is growing. A number of guiding businesses and bike shops rely on our trail network. They service both locals and tourists, and a longer mountain biking season with more trails means more business for shops and services.

Additionally, the Revelstoke Cycling Association employs a trail crew each year. Increased ridership and trail use will likely create an additional position on the trail crew.

The land on which the project will be completed is actually slightly outside of Revelstoke's city boundaries, on Crown land and in the Controlled Recreation Area for Revelstoke Mountain Resort, in an area that has been designated for recreation.
