VICTORIA – The B.C. government has unveiled a new \$3-million plan to enhance transportation safety along the Highway 16 corridor from Prince Rupert to Prince George.

The plan consists of five actions the government will take to improve access to transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor and enable residents of First Nations communities and municipalities to travel safely to and from rural towns and villages along the corridor.

The five point action plan consists of:

- \$1.6 million over 2 years for transit expansion: These new funds will be available on a
 cost-shared basis with local communities to extend or enhance BC Transit services to
 better connect communities.
- \$750,000 over 3 years for a community transportation grant program to purchase and
 operate vehicles: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local
 communities to support community-based transportation programs operated by First
 Nations, local governments or non-profit organizations.
- \$150,000 over 3 years for a First Nations driver education program: These new funds
 will build upon the current driver training/education program to increase the number of
 Class 4 and Class 5 drivers in First Nations communities along the Highway 16 corridor.
- \$500,000 over 2 years for highway infrastructure safety improvements including
 webcams and transit shelters: These new funds will enable the ministry to increase the
 number of webcams on the highway and the frequency of photographs taken at these
 spots. New transit shelters will be built in communities that will be receiving new or
 expanded transit service.
- Collaboration to increase interconnectivity of services: The ministry will work to
 increase coordination of existing transportation services through BC Transit, Northern
 Health, not for profit organizations and private service providers including efforts to
 better synchronize schedules and expand user eligibility criteria.

The ministry has appointed a new ten-person Highway 16 Transportation Advisory Group to oversee implementation of the action plan and ensure that the actions address the input received at the transportation symposium. The advisory group will report to the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure and will be meeting over the months of January and February to review the specifics of the action plan and ensure it is implemented consistent with the input the ministry received at a recent transportation symposium held in Smithers.

Over the next couple of months, the ministry will work with the advisory group to develop a process for local communities and organizations to apply for all of the new funding. Once this work is complete, the ministry will reach out to First Nations communities and municipalities to

let them know how they can apply for the grant funding. By partnering with municipalities, First Nations communities and organizations, the ministry is ensuring they are active participants with vested interest in selecting the transportation services that best meet local needs.

On Nov. 24, 2015, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and the First Nations Health Authority co-hosted a transportation symposium in Smithers to engage with First Nations leadership, community members and local government representatives to help identify safe, practical and sustainable transportation options for communities along the Highway 16 corridor. Over 90 participants attended the forum, which was a big step forward in creating a safer environment for people living in communities along the nearly 800 km stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George. The ideas, recommendations and feedback from the transportation symposium were used to develop the foundation of the \$3-million action plan for the Highway 16 corridor.

Today's announcement builds on the \$5.2 million annual investment that the B.C. government makes towards transit services in communities along Highway 16, and is expected to connect communities not currently serviced by local transit service along the corridor.

B.C. unveils five point action plan for safe transportation options along Highway 16

VICTORIA – The B.C. government has unveiled a new \$3-million plan to enhance transportation safety along the Highway 16 corridor from Prince Rupert to Prince George.

The plan consists of five actions the government will take to improve access to transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor and enable residents of First Nations communities and municipalities to travel safely to and from rural towns and villages along the corridor.

The five point action plan consists of:

- \$1.6 million over 2 years for transit expansion: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to extend or enhance BC Transit services to better connect communities.
- \$750,000 over 3 years for a community transportation grant program to purchase and operate vehicles: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to support community-based transportation programs operated by First Nations, local governments or non-profit organizations.
- \$150,000 over 3 years for a First Nations driver education program: These new funds
 will build upon the current driver training/education program to increase the number of
 Class 4 and Class 5 drivers in First Nations communities along the Highway 16 corridor.
- \$500,000 over 2 years for highway infrastructure safety improvements including
 webcams and transit shelters: These new funds will enable the ministry to increase the
 number of webcams on the highway and the frequency of photographs taken at these
 spots. New transit shelters will be built in communities that will be receiving new or
 expanded transit service.
- Collaboration to increase interconnectivity of services: The ministry will work to
 increase coordination of existing transportation services through BC Transit, Northern
 Health, not for profit organizations and private service providers including efforts to
 better synchronize schedules and expand user eligibility criteria.

The ministry has appointed a new ten-person Highway 16 Transportation Advisory Group to oversee implementation of the action plan and ensure that the actions address the input received at the transportation symposium. The advisory group will report to the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure and will be meeting over the months of January and February to review the specifics of the action plan and ensure it is implemented consistent with the input the ministry received at a recent transportation symposium held in Smithers.

Over the next couple of months, the ministry will work with the advisory group to develop a process for local communities and organizations to apply for all of the new funding. Once this work is complete, the ministry will reach out to First Nations communities and municipalities to

let them know how they can apply for the grant funding. By partnering with municipalities, First Nations communities and organizations, the ministry is ensuring they are active participants with vested interest in selecting the transportation services that best meet local needs.

On Nov. 24, 2015, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and the First Nations Health Authority co-hosted a transportation symposium in Smithers to engage with First Nations leadership, community members and local government representatives to help identify safe, practical and sustainable transportation options for communities along the Highway 16 corridor. Over 90 participants attended the forum, which was a big step forward in creating a safer environment for people living in communities along the nearly 800 km stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George. The ideas, recommendations and feedback from the transportation symposium were used to develop the foundation of the \$3-million action plan for the Highway 16 corridor.

Today's announcement builds on the \$5.2 million annual investment that the B.C. government makes towards transit services in communities along Highway 16, and is expected to connect communities not currently serviced by local transit service along the corridor.

VICTORIA – The B.C. government has unveiled a new \$3-million plan to enhance transportation safety along the Highway 16 corridor from Prince Rupert to Prince George.

The plan consists of five actions the government will take to improve access to transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor and enable residents of First Nations communities and municipalities to travel safely to and from rural towns and villages along the corridor.

The five point action plan consists of:

- \$1.6 million over 2 years for Transit Expansion: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to extend or enhance BC Transit services to better connect communities.
- \$750,000 over 3 years for a Community Transportation Grant Program to purchase and operate vehicles: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to support community-based transportation programs operated by First Nations, local governments or non-profit organizations.
- \$150,000 over 3 years for a First Nations Driver Education Program: These new funds will build upon the current driver training/ education program to increase the number of Class 4 and Class 5 drivers in First Nations communities along the Highway 16 corridor.
- \$500,000 over 2 years for Highway Infrastructure Safety Improvements including
 Webcams and Transit Shelters: These new funds will enable the ministry to increase the
 number of webcams on the highway and the frequency of photographs taken at these
 spots. New transit shelters will be built in communities that will be receiving new or

Key Messages/ Questions and Answers Transportation Action Plan December 14, 2015

Key Messages

- The transportation symposium last month in Smithers was a big step toward creating a safer environment for people living in communities along the nearly 800 km stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George.
- The symposium was an essential element of the broader efforts of this government to address the recommendations in the Missing Women Commission of Inquiry Report.
- People were honest and open about conveying their experiences, and sharing their thoughts on practical, viable transportation options for the Highway 16 corridor between Prince George and Prince Rupert.
- Some great ideas came out of the symposium, and as promised, we got to work immediately to develop a transportation action plan for the Highway 16 corridor.
- And today, I am pleased to announce that this action plan has been created – with five concrete transportation actions to enhance and expand transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor.
- The BC government has committed \$3-million towards the action plan.
- The plan includes:
 - Transit expansion (up to \$1.6 million over 2 years)
 - Community transportation operating and capital grant program (up to \$750,000 over 3 years)
 - First Nations driver education program (up to \$150,000 over 3 years)
 - Webcams and transit shelters (up to \$500,000 over 2 years)
 - Collaboration to increase efficiencies of existing services and create interconnectivity

<u>QA's</u>

1. Do you think your action plan is going to solve the transportation challenges in the communities?

- I think that these five actions will go a long way towards creating a safe environment for people living in rural communities along the corridor, and connecting them to one another.
- The plan sets out a range of initiatives which will result in additional safe, sustainable transportation options, such as expanded transit, community-based transportation, more driver training, and more collaboration.
- The plan also includes the installation of more webcams and better technology, and more transit shelters for increased safety along the corridor.

2. Do your actions reflect what you heard at the symposium?

- Yes, definitely.
- The symposium provided us with collaborative and grassroots input for practical transportation models to connect communities along the stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George.
- People were honest and open about conveying their experiences, and sharing their thoughts and recommendations on practical, viable transportation options for the Highway 16 corridor.
- Some excellent ideas came out of the symposium, and as promised, we immediately initiated work on developing a transportation action plan for the Highway 16 corridor.

3. Why didn't you introduce a shuttle bus like the people were asking for?

- We heard during the symposium that there is not a one-sized fits all approach that would address the transportation challenges along the corridor.
- That's why we're announcing a much broader action plan that incorporates a combination of transportation options, including both intercommunity transit and community-based transportation services.
- This plan will go a long way to fill the transportation gaps along the corridor – addressing the community-based needs, as well as the broader Highway of Tears recommendation.

- For the transit expansion specifically, the Province will contribute up to \$1.6 million over 2 years to extend or enhance existing BC Transit services between communities along the Highway 16 corridor.
- The service will be implemented in partnership with the local governments using the BC Transit funding model for custom services (33% of funding coming from the local governments).
- And we are also funding community-based transportation services. The Province will provide up to \$750,000 over 3 years for cost-shared support of community-based transportation programs operated by First Nations, local governments or non-profit organizations.
- Cost-shared grants will be available to cover 70% of the purchase price of a vehicle to a maximum grant of \$70,000.

4. How will you prioritize the funding for the increased bus service and vans?

- Funding partners will have to identify the nature of the service to be provided, how that service will meet local needs, and how that service will support local residents who want to connect with other transportation services along the corridor.
- What works for one community may not work for another there is no "one size fits all" approach here.
- We want communities to have their say on what services they would like

 and what fits for their community.

7. When will you release details on how the communities can apply for the funding grants?

- Over the next couple of months, the ministry will work with the advisory committee to develop a process for local communities and organizations to apply for the grant funding.
- I expect this work to be complete this spring. At that time, the ministry will reach out to local government and First Nations communities to let them know how they can apply for the grant funding.
- By working collaboratively with local governments and First Nations, we
 are ensuring this is done in partnership and will identify funding
 opportunities that are tailored to the needs of the community.

8. What will happen after 2-3 years when the funding is finished?

- We are focused on providing a quick response as we committed to following the transportation symposium.
- This \$3-million in funding will support establishing new services and extending existing services.
- Over the first two to three years, the service providers will be able to confirm their services meet local needs, and refine the services as they gain experience, and possibly bring on other partners in the future.
- We will continue to work closely with stakeholders as the programs roll out to ensure they are meeting local and regional needs.

9. Why are some components two years and others three years?

- We are delivering a transportation action plan that is focussed on the priorities identified during the transportation symposium.
- The 2 and 3 year timeframes are based upon the immediate needs and optimization of the funding commitment at this time.
- The plan delivers five concrete transportation actions to enhance and expand transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor.

 We will continue to work closely with stakeholders as the programs roll out to ensure they are meeting local and regional needs.

Advisory Group

1. What is the mandate of the advisory group?

- A new ten person advisory group has been appointed to oversee implementation of the action plan and ensure that the actions address the input received at the transportation symposium.
- The advisory group will report to the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure, and will be meeting over the months of January and February to review the specifics of the action plan.
- They will ensure it is implemented in a way that is consistent with the input and recommendations received at the symposium.

2. How did you choose the nine advisory group members?

- The members were chosen to represent local governments, First Nations, Northern Health and a representative from the Highway of Tears Initiative.
- This means a cross-section of voices and experiences are represented as well as community representation from those who will most benefit from the outcomes of this initiative.

4. What if the advisory group doesn't agree with how you implement the action plan?

- It is the ten person advisory council who will be advising me on how to proceed with the action plan.
- The advisory group has been appointed to oversee implementation of the action plan and ensure that the actions address the input received at the transportation symposium.
- The advisory group will be meeting in the new year to fine tune the details of the action plan and establish criteria for the grants.
- The ministry will release more details on the action plan and how the funds will be allocated in the spring of 2016.

BC Transit service improvements (specific):

1. How will the funding work?

- This will be a special transit expansion for the Highway 16 corridor (provincial share is up to \$1.6 million over 2 years).
- Provincial funds will be available to extend or enhance existing BC Transit services to promote interconnectivity between communities.
- Over the next two years, the Province will contribute \$1.6 million towards these services – 2/3 of the operating costs and 100% of the amortized capital costs of the buses.

2. What BC Transit services are currently available?

- Today's announcement builds on the \$5.2 million that the ministry already spends on transit services in communities along Highway 16 in Northern B.C. each year.
- There are transit services available in Prince George, Prince Rupert,
 Terrace, Hazelton, and Smithers. These communities are all located along the Highway 16 corridor.
- The ministry also funds transit in other Northern B.C. communities, including Kitimat, Dawson Creek, Fort St. John, Telkwa, Port Edward, New Hazleton, the Regional Districts of Kitimat-Stikine and Bulkley-Nechako, as well as a number of First Nations communities.

3. How are you going to decide on the new or strengthened routes? When will you make a decision on routes?

- The advisory council, in consultation with the communities along the corridor, will review where these services can provide the greatest benefits.
- We will make decisions on routes in the spring of 2016, once the communities have had their chance to weigh in on what works best for them.

4. Will there be enough dollars for every community if every community wants to increase transit services?

 Funds will be available to extend or enhance existing BC Transit services to promote interconnectivity between communities.

- As far as the exact routes go, these details are still being fine- tuned. This
 will be the job of the nine person advisory council to take this important
 work forward.
- More specific details on the routes will be made available in the spring of 2016.

 This is a special fund for transit expansion along the Highway 16 corridor in response to what we heard at the recent transportation symposium in Smithers, and this is to improve the safety and mobility of people moving between communities along Highway 16.

Community-based transportation fund (specific):

1. How will this action address the transportation gap?

- The program will support local First Nations, communities or non-profit organizations in delivering transportation programs that meet local needs.
- There are already community-based transportation programs in place along the corridor which are currently meeting local needs. These programs confirm that the smaller community-based delivery model can work well.

2. How will the funding work?

- The funding will be for cost-shared community-based transportation services (up to \$750,000 over 3 years).
- Cost-shared grants will be available for 70% of the purchase price for new vehicles to a maximum of \$70,000.

 Grants will also be available for 70% of the operating costs to a maximum of \$20,000 per year for three years.

3. How and where do communities apply?

- Over the next couple of months, the ministry will work with the advisory committee to develop a process for local communities and organizations to apply for the grant funding.
- Once this work is complete this spring, the ministry will reach out to local government and First Nations communities to let them know how they can apply for the grant funding.
- By partnering with local governments, First Nations communities and organizations, the ministry is ensuring they are active participants with vested interest in selecting the transportation services that best meet local needs.

4. Will this be a big enough fund to cover all of the requests? There are 26 FN communities and a number of local governments.

- This is a significant commitment from government to improve transportation in the region.
- We believe there is sufficient funding over 3 years to support transportation services that may need extra dollars for operating. There may be communities who determine they need a new van, and that's what the capital portion will do.
- Since this is a cost-share program the ministry is maximizing the funds to make sure we can be as efficient as possible and allow as many communities as possible to participate.
- More details on the action plan and how the funds will be allocated will be released in the spring of 2016.

Driver training:

1. What is the driver training component?

- The program will provide up to \$150,000 over 3 years to support First Nations driver training/education.
- The ministry will build upon the current driver training/ education program to increase the number of Class 4 and Class 5 drivers in First Nations communities along the Highway 16 corridor.

2. Will the Carrier Sekani Family Services oversee the additional driver training funds? If not, why not?

- We are still working on the specific details of the program, including what organization or group will administer this program.
- As soon as we have firmed up these details, and how community members can access this funding, we'll make this information public.

3. Why are you investing in driver training? Why not just put that funding into more vans?

- We heard clearly that driver training for First Nations is a priority.
- Some communities indicated they have community vans but they do not have enough drivers with the appropriate licences to operate the vans.
- We recognize that having a valid driver's license and being able to drive is taken for granted by many, but there is a vast number of First Nations youth without a driver's license.
- Having the skill to drive a car, truck or van can lead to greater mobility and employment. So we believe this is a good investment to build capacity and skills.

New webcams and infrastructure:

1. What's the goal with this action?

- The goal is to increase safety (particularly for people who are hitchhiking) by using highway webcams to increase our ability to monitor key locations.
- The ministry will review the location of current highway webcams relative to common hitchhiking pickup spots, will increase the number of webcams on the highway, and will increase the frequency of photographs taken at these spots.
- Over the last year, the ministry has built four bus shelters to support
 existing transit services. The ministry will be installing additional transit
 shelters along the Highway 16 corridor.
- We'll also make sure that the webcams are pointed in the direction of the bus shelters where possible – to increase safety for those waiting for the bus.

2. Aren't the webcams an invasion of privacy?

- This is about increasing safety for people along the corridor. This is our top priority – increasing the safety and well-being of people – and in particular, increasing safety for women and teenage girls.
- The technology is designed so it doesn't compromise the privacy of an individual. We work within privacy laws to ensure that we uphold what we are legally required to do.
- We are already using highway webcams to increase our ability to monitor key locations.
- The ministry will review the location of current highway webcams relative to common hitchhiking pickup spots, will increase the number of webcams on the highway, and will increase the frequency of photographs taken at these spots.

Interconnectivity collaboration:

1. Why are you planning to increase collaboration?

- Collaboration is essential to ensure the transportation services connect with each other, are aligned, and do not provide overlapping services.
- By coordinating services and schedules, travelers will be able to plan trips using a combination of services.
- We are investing \$3-million towards this action plan and we want to ensure that our investments are spent as effectively as possible.

2. When will you have an update to this work?

 The ministry will release more details on the action plan in the spring of 2016.

Announcement:

1. Why are you having this announcement in Victoria – so far from the communities most affected by this strategy?

- Victoria is the seat of the provincial government, and lots of important provincial announcements are made here.
- We made a point of inviting all of the members of the advisory council, the First Nations Health Authority, plus other important stakeholders and ministries that have been involved in this work for a long time.

- The focus today is on unveiling the action plan and we have done just that.
- We are also notifying each of the participants of the Transportation Symposium, as well as all of those who were invited to the symposium, today of the action plan.

2. Who did you invite to be part of this announcement? Did you pay for their travel and if not, why not?

- We invited all of the members of the ten person advisory group.
- We also invited some of our key stakeholders, including the First Nations Health Authority, Northern Health, and others.
- No, travel was not paid for as we want our dollars to go directly into the important transportation services that we are announcing today - \$3million is going into safe transportation options along Highway 16 to service the stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George.

3. Why did you give short notice to those invited to participate?

- Following the symposium, I promised that the ministry would get to work immediately on putting together a comprehensive transportation action plan.
- That is just what we did, and I am very pleased with the quick turnaround on this plan.
- We have five concrete transportation actions to enhance and expand transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor.
- The BC government has committed \$3-million towards the action plan.

4. How many people attended the symposium, and what groups were represented?

- In total, 92 people attended the symposium.
- This included 40 people from the First Nations communities and aboriginal organizations, 42 from local government organizations, regional districts, and 10 ministry and First Nations Health Authority representatives.

Federal Inquiry:

1. How does this work fit into the federal strategy to address Missing and Murdered Women?

- Our government has been clear that we support a national inquiry.
- We welcome the news of the federal government launching its first phase of the inquiry into murdered and missing indigenous women and girls (announced by Justice Minister Jody Wilson-Raybould).
- We will be happy to share the learnings and progress coming out of our own Missing Women's Commission of Inquiry here in B.C. as well as any input we can provide on ways to improve safety for indigenous women and girls.
- As we understand it, the federal government will meet with the families to hear their views on the design of the inquiry and what it needs to achieve.
- As a provincial government, we will also participate in any consultations and discussions that the federal government choose to hold as they develop plans around their inquiry.

2. Have you connected with your federal partners on this strategy and will there be federal support?

• I had the opportunity to meet with my federal counterpart in Ottawa last week (Minister to answer based on meetings)

3. What are your thoughts on the federal decision for an inquiry?

- Our government has been clear that we supported a national inquiry.
- We will be happy to share the learnings and progress coming out of our own Missing Women's Commission of Inquiry here in B.C. as well as any input we can provide on ways to improve safety for Indigenous women and girls.
- I would expect we will also participate in any consultations and discussions that the federal government choose to hold as they develop plans around their inquiry.

4. Should the National Inquiry involve Hwy 16 discussions?

 Yes. I think that any discussion around missing indigenous women and girls should look at safety on northern highways, not only in BC, but around the country.

5. What progress has BC made?

- B.C. has made significant changes coming out of the missing women's inquiry, greatly improving safety for vulnerable women in our province.
- In addition, we have provided compensation to the children of the victims, have vastly improved police communications, are establishing new police standards for bias-free policing, and have established a robust provincial response for missing persons, including new missing persons legislation.
- We have also made our northern highways safer, helping to improve cell coverage on Highway 16 by almost 50%.
- Our work covers all the major themes recommended by Commissioner Wally Oppal, QC.
- B.C. is also taking action on feedback from family members by planning a
 gathering for relatives of missing and murdered Aboriginal women to
 heal together by sharing their stories and their strength, and further
 identifying a path forward to end violence against Aboriginal women and
 girls.
- These actions and the work that remains ongoing form a comprehensive response to the recommendations, and should give British Columbians confidence our province is a safer place than when these tragic murders and disappearances happened more than 15 years ago.

B.C. unveils five point action plan for safe transportation options along Highway 16

VICTORIA – The B.C. government has unveiled a new \$3-million plan to enhance transportation safety along the Highway 16 corridor from Prince Rupert to Prince George.

The plan consists of five actions the government will take to improve access to transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor and enable residents of First Nations communities and municipalities to travel safely to and from rural towns and villages along the corridor.

The five point action plan consists of:

- \$1.6 million over 2 years for Transit Expansion: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to extend or enhance BC Transit services to better connect communities.
- \$750,000 over 3 years for a Community Transportation Grant Program to purchase and operate vehicles: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to support community-based transportation programs operated by First Nations, local governments or non-profit organizations.
- \$150,000 over 3 years for a First Nations Driver Education Program: These new funds will build upon the current driver training/ education program to increase the number of Class 4 and Class 5 drivers in First Nations communities along the Highway 16 corridor.
- \$500,000 over 2 years for Highway Infrastructure Safety Improvements including
 Webcams and Transit Shelters: These new funds will enable the ministry to increase the
 number of webcams on the highway and the frequency of photographs taken at these
 spots. New transit shelters will be built in communities that will be receiving new or
 expanded transit service.
- Collaboration to increase interconnectivity of services: The ministry will work to
 increase coordination of existing transportation services through BC Transit, Northern
 Health, not for profit organizations and private service providers including efforts to
 better synchronize schedules and expand user eligibility criteria.

The ministry has appointed a new nine-person Highway 16 Transportation Advisory Group to oversee implementation of the action plan and ensure that the actions address the input received at the transportation symposium. The advisory group will report to the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure and will be meeting over the months of January and February to review the specifics of the action plan and ensure it is implemented consistent with the input the ministry received at a recent transportation symposium held in Smithers.

Over the next couple of months, the ministry will work with the advisory group to develop a process for local communities and organizations to apply for all of the new funding. Once this work is complete, the ministry will reach out to First Nations communities and municipalities to let them know how they can apply for the grant funding. By partnering with municipalities, First Nations communities and organizations, the ministry is ensuring they are active participants with vested interest in selecting the transportation services that best meet local needs.

On November 24th, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and the First Nations Health Authority co-hosted a transportation symposium in Smithers to engage with First Nations leadership, community members and local government representatives to help identify safe, practical and sustainable transportation options for communities along the Highway 16 corridor. Over 90 participants attended the forum, which was a big step forward in creating a safer environment for people living in communities along the nearly 800 km stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George. The ideas, recommendations and feedback from the transportation symposium were used to develop the foundation of the \$3-million action plan for the Highway 16 corridor.

Today's announcement builds on the \$5.2 million annual investment that the B.C. government makes towards transit services in communities along Highway 16, and is expected to connect communities not currently serviced by local transit service along the corridor.

B.C. unveils five point action plan for safe transportation options along Highway 16

VICTORIA – The B.C. government has unveiled a new \$3-million plan to enhance transportation safety along the Highway 16 corridor from Prince Rupert to Prince George.

The plan consists of five actions the government will take to improve access to transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor and enable residents of First Nations communities and municipalities to travel safely to and from rural towns and villages along the corridor.

The five point action plan consists of:

- \$1.6 million over 2 years for Transit Expansion: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to extend or enhance BC Transit services to better connect communities.

- \$150,000 over 3 years for a First Nations Driver Education Program: These new funds will build upon the current driver training/ education program to increase the number of Class 4 and Class 5 drivers in First Nations communities along the Highway 16 corridor.
- \$500,000 over 2 years for Highway Infrastructure Safety Improvements including
 Webcams and Transit Shelters: These new funds will enable the ministry to increase the
 number of webcams on the highway and the frequency of photographs taken at these
 spots. New transit shelters will be built in communities that will be receiving new or
 expanded transit service.
- Collaboration to increase interconnectivity of services: The ministry will work to
 increase coordination of existing transportation services through BC Transit, Northern
 Health, not for profit organizations and private service providers including efforts to

The ministry has appointed a new nine-person Highway 16 Transportation Advisory Group to oversee implementation of the action plan and ensure that the actions address the input received at the transportation symposium. The advisory group will report to the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure and will be meeting over the months of January and February to review the specifics of the action plan and ensure it is implemented consistent with the input the ministry received at a recent transportation symposium held in Smithers.

Over the next couple of months, the ministry will work with the advisory group to develop a process for local communities and organizations to apply for all of the new funding. Once this

work is complete, the ministry will reach out to First Nations communities and municipalities to let them know how they can apply for the grant funding. By partnering with municipalities, First Nations communities and organizations, the ministry is ensuring they are active participants with vested interest in selecting the transportation services that best meet local needs.

On November 24th, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and the First Nations Health Authority co-hosted a transportation symposium in Smithers to engage with First Nations leadership, community members and local government representatives to help identify safe, practical and sustainable transportation options for communities along the Highway 16 corridor. Over 90 participants attended the forum, which was a big step forward in creating a safer environment for people living in communities along the nearly 800 km stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George. Ministry launching Peachland transportation study

PEACHLAND – Today, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure is launching a transportation study which will look into Highway 97 improvements through and around the District of Peachland – both for the short term and the longer term.

This will be a two-year study focused on Peachland, and it will examine transportation alternatives, including the possibility of an alternate Highway 97 alignment around Peachland.

"We are listening to the people of Peachland, and we want to open it up to public discussion on ideas for short term and longer term traffic solutions for the community," said Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Todd Stone. "The study will look into the options that will meet the transportation needs of Peachland including developing an alternate route, or improving the existing highway."

This study will be carried out in concert with the ministry's Central Okanagan Planning Study, which was launched in the fall of 2014.

The Peachland study will use technical work that has been done as a part of the Central Okanagan Planning study, including traffic counts and future traffic growth projections, the needs of the travelling public, and community land use plans.

Peachland Mayor Cindy Fortin and Council have been advised of the study, and they are very encouraged with the launch. At the annual Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) Convention, they met with the Premier and Minister Todd Stone to discuss the possibility of a bypass study.

"This is wonderful news for Peachland," said Peachland Mayor Cindy Fortin. "We have been anxiously waiting for a definitive study on the Highway 97 corridor though Peachland, so that residents can get some answers regarding a bypass verses four-laning, and so that developers can confidently move forward with their plans."

The Peachland study will launch immediately and public engagement is being planned for spring 2016. The ministry will consider input from this consultation along with input from the local mayor and councilors, the Highway 97 Task Force committee, chamber of commerce as well as local First Nations, environmental stakeholder groups, and other local stakeholder groups.

"This is the most important issue affecting the future of Peachland," said Peter Warner, President of Highway 97 Task Force Society. "This decision will be much appreciated by the 820

members of our Highway 97 Task Force Society, who support the bypass option. This is an important step towards the possibility of achieving a bypass."

Since 2001, the B.C. government has invested more than \$400 million in upgrades to improve safety and mobility on the Highway 97 corridor in the Central Okanagan. Some examples of improvements are: the William R. Bennett Bridge, Highway 97 six-laning from Water Street to Highway 33, four-laning of Highway 97 from Winfield to Oyama, the Westside Road interchange, and the Campbell Road Interchange.

- B.C. has made significant changes coming out of the missing women's inquiry, greatly improving safety for vulnerable women in our province.
- Already we have provided compensation to the children of the victims, helped improve cell
 coverage on Highway 16 by almost 50 percent, and brought in new tools for police to find
 people who go missing.
- And today's announcement will help further address the vulnerabilities along the highway as we introduce community-based transportation solutions across the region.
- Our work covers all the major themes recommended by Commissioner Oppal.
- B.C. is also taking action on feedback from family members by planning a gathering for relatives
 of missing and murdered Aboriginal women to heal together by sharing their stories and their
 strength, and further identifying a path forward to end violence against Aboriginal women and
 girls.

• These actions – and the work that remains ongoing – form a comprehensive response to the recommendations, and should give British Columbians confidence our province is a safer place than when these tragic murders and disappearances happened more than 15 years ago.

B.C. unveils five point action plan for safe transportation options along Highway 16

VICTORIA – The B.C. government has unveiled a new \$3-million plan to enhance transportation safety along the Highway 16 corridor from Prince Rupert to Prince George.

The plan consists of five actions the government will take to improve access to transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor and enable residents of First Nations communities and municipalities to travel safely to and from rural towns and villages along the corridor.

The five point action plan consists of:

- \$1.6 million over 2 years for transit expansion: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to extend or enhance BC Transit services to better connect communities.
- \$750,000 over 3 years for a community transportation grant program to purchase and operate vehicles: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to support community-based transportation programs operated by First Nations, local governments or non-profit organizations.
- \$150,000 over 3 years for a First Nations driver education program: These new funds
 will build upon the current driver training/education program to increase the number of
 Class 4 and Class 5 drivers in First Nations communities along the Highway 16 corridor.
- \$500,000 over 2 years for highway infrastructure safety improvements including
 webcams and transit shelters: These new funds will enable the ministry to increase the
 number of webcams on the highway and the frequency of photographs taken at these
 spots. New transit shelters will be built in communities that will be receiving new or
 expanded transit service.
- Collaboration to increase interconnectivity of services: The ministry will work to
 increase coordination of existing transportation services through BC Transit, Northern
 Health, not for profit organizations and private service providers including efforts to
 better synchronize schedules and expand user eligibility criteria.

The ministry has appointed a new ten-person Highway 16 Transportation Advisory Group to oversee implementation of the action plan and ensure that the actions address the input received at the transportation symposium. The advisory group will report to the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure and will be meeting over the months of January and February to review the specifics of the action plan and ensure it is implemented consistent with the input the ministry received at a recent transportation symposium held in Smithers.

Over the next couple of months, the ministry will work with the advisory group to develop a process for local communities and organizations to apply for all of the new funding. Once this work is complete, the ministry will reach out to First Nations communities and municipalities to

let them know how they can apply for the grant funding. By partnering with municipalities, First Nations communities and organizations, the ministry is ensuring they are active participants with vested interest in selecting the transportation services that best meet local needs.

On Nov. 24, 2015, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and the First Nations Health Authority co-hosted a transportation symposium in Smithers to engage with First Nations leadership, community members and local government representatives to help identify safe, practical and sustainable transportation options for communities along the Highway 16 corridor. Over 90 participants attended the forum, which was a big step forward in creating a safer environment for people living in communities along the nearly 800 km stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George. The ideas, recommendations and feedback from the transportation symposium were used to develop the foundation of the \$3-million action plan for the Highway 16 corridor.

Today's announcement builds on the \$5.2 million annual investment that the B.C. government makes towards transit services in communities along Highway 16, and is expected to connect communities not currently serviced by local transit service along the corridor.

- \$150,000 over 3 years for a First Nations Driver Education Program: These new funds will build upon the current driver training/ education program to increase the number of Class 4 and Class 5 drivers in First Nations communities along the Highway 16 corridor.
- \$500,000 over 2 years for Highway Infrastructure Safety Improvements including Webcams and Transit Shelters: These new funds will enable the ministry to increase the number of webcams on the highway and the frequency of photographs taken at these spots. New transit shelters will be built in communities that will be receiving new or expanded transit service.
- Collaboration to increase interconnectivity of services: The
 ministry will work to increase coordination of existing
 transportation services through BC Transit, Northern Health,
 not for profit organizations and private service providers
 including efforts to better synchronize schedules and expand
 user eligibility criteria.

Advisory Group

- In addition, I am happy to announce the members of a new nineperson advisory group.
- This group has been appointed to make sure the action plan and implementation of the plan reflects the recommendations made at transportation symposium and that communities support the actions that best suit their needs.

- I am gratified to see significant progress in addressing the transportation recommendation in the *Missing Women Commission of Inquiry Report* by providing an action plan today that will lead to safe, practical and sustainable transportation services for the Highway 16 corridor.

Key Messages/ Questions and Answers <u>Transportation Action Plan</u> <u>December 14, 2015</u>

Key Messages

- The transportation symposium last month in Smithers was a big step toward creating a safer environment for people living in communities along the nearly 800 km stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George.
- The symposium was an essential element of the broader efforts of this government to address the recommendations in the Missing Women Commission of Inquiry Report.
- People were honest and open about conveying their experiences, and sharing their thoughts on practical, viable transportation options for the Highway 16 corridor between Prince George and Prince Rupert.
- Some great ideas came out of the symposium, and as promised, we got to work immediately to develop a transportation action plan for the Highway 16 corridor.
- And today, I am pleased to announce that this action plan has been created – with five concrete transportation actions to enhance and expand transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor.
- The BC government has committed \$3-million towards the action plan.
- The plan includes:
 - Transit expansion (up to \$1.6 million over 2 years)
 - Community transportation operating and capital grant program (up to \$750,000 over 3 years)
 - First Nations driver education program (up to \$150,000 over 3 years)
 - Webcams and transit shelters (up to \$500,000 over 2 years)
 - Collaboration to increase efficiencies of existing services and create interconnectivity

<u>QA's</u>

1. Do you think your action plan is going to solve the transportation challenges in the communities?

- I think that these five actions will go a long way towards creating a safe environment for people living in rural communities along the corridor, and connecting them to one another.
- The plan sets out a range of initiatives which will result in additional safe, sustainable transportation options, such as expanded transit, community-based transportation, more driver training, and more collaboration.
- The plan also includes the installation of more webcams and better technology, and more transit shelters for increased safety along the corridor.

2. Do your actions reflect what you heard at the symposium?

- Yes, definitely.
- The symposium provided us with collaborative and grassroots input for practical transportation models to connect communities along the stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George.
- People were honest and open about conveying their experiences, and sharing their thoughts and recommendations on practical, viable transportation options for the Highway 16 corridor.
- Some excellent ideas came out of the symposium, and as promised, we immediately initiated work on developing a transportation action plan for the Highway 16 corridor.

3. Why didn't you introduce a shuttle bus like the people were asking for?

- We heard during the symposium that there is not a one-sized fits all approach that would address the transportation challenges along the corridor.
- That's why we're announcing a much broader action plan that incorporates a combination of transportation options, including both intercommunity transit and community-based transportation services.
- This plan will go a long way to fill the transportation gaps along the corridor – addressing the community-based needs, as well as the broader Highway of Tears recommendation.

- For the transit expansion specifically, the Province will contribute up to \$1.6 million over 2 years to extend or enhance existing BC Transit services between communities along the Highway 16 corridor.
- The service will be implemented in partnership with the local governments using the BC Transit funding model for custom services (33% of funding coming from the local governments).
- And we are also funding community-based transportation services. The Province will provide up to \$750,000 over 3 years for cost-shared support of community-based transportation programs operated by First Nations, local governments or non-profit organizations.
- Cost-shared grants will be available to cover 70% of the purchase price of a vehicle to a maximum grant of \$70,000.

4. How will you prioritize the funding for the increased bus service and vans?

- Funding partners will have to identify the nature of the service to be provided, how that service will meet local needs, and how that service will support local residents who want to connect with other transportation services along the corridor.
- What works for one community may not work for another there is no "one size fits all" approach here.
- We want communities to have their say on what services they would like

 and what fits for their community.

7. When will you release details on how the communities can apply for the funding grants?

- Over the next couple of months, the ministry will work with the advisory committee to develop a process for local communities and organizations to apply for the grant funding.
- I expect this work to be complete this spring. At that time, the ministry will reach out to local government and First Nations communities to let them know how they can apply for the grant funding.
- By working collaboratively with local governments and First Nations, we
 are ensuring this is done in partnership and will identify funding
 opportunities that are tailored to the needs of the community.

8. What will happen after 2-3 years when the funding is finished?

- We are focused on providing a quick response as we committed to following the transportation symposium.
- This \$3-million in funding will support establishing new services and extending existing services.
- Over the first two to three years, the service providers will be able to confirm their services meet local needs, and refine the services as they gain experience, and possibly bring on other partners in the future.
- We will continue to work closely with stakeholders as the programs roll out to ensure they are meeting local and regional needs.

9. Why are some components two years and others three years?

- We are delivering a transportation action plan that is focussed on the priorities identified during the transportation symposium.
- The 2 and 3 year timeframes are based upon the immediate needs and optimization of the funding commitment at this time.
- The plan delivers five concrete transportation actions to enhance and expand transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor.

 We will continue to work closely with stakeholders as the programs roll out to ensure they are meeting local and regional needs.

Advisory Group

1. What is the mandate of the advisory group?

- A new ten person advisory group has been appointed to oversee implementation of the action plan and ensure that the actions address the input received at the transportation symposium.
- The advisory group will report to the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure, and will be meeting over the months of January and February to review the specifics of the action plan.
- They will ensure it is implemented in a way that is consistent with the input and recommendations received at the symposium.

2. How did you choose the nine advisory group members?

- The members were chosen to represent local governments, First Nations, Northern Health and a representative from the Highway of Tears Initiative.
- This means a cross-section of voices and experiences are represented as well as community representation from those who will most benefit from the outcomes of this initiative.

4. What if the advisory group doesn't agree with how you implement the action plan?

- It is the ten person advisory council who will be advising me on how to proceed with the action plan.
- The advisory group has been appointed to oversee implementation of the action plan and ensure that the actions address the input received at the transportation symposium.
- The advisory group will be meeting in the new year to fine tune the details of the action plan and establish criteria for the grants.
- The ministry will release more details on the action plan and how the funds will be allocated in the spring of 2016.

BC Transit service improvements (specific):

1. How will the funding work?

- This will be a special transit expansion for the Highway 16 corridor (provincial share is up to \$1.6 million over 2 years).
- Provincial funds will be available to extend or enhance existing BC Transit services to promote interconnectivity between communities.
- Over the next two years, the Province will contribute \$1.6 million towards these services – 2/3 of the operating costs and 100% of the amortized capital costs of the buses.

2. What BC Transit services are currently available?

- Today's announcement builds on the \$5.2 million that the ministry already spends on transit services in communities along Highway 16 in Northern B.C. each year.
- There are transit services available in Prince George, Prince Rupert,
 Terrace, Hazelton, and Smithers. These communities are all located along the Highway 16 corridor.
- The ministry also funds transit in other Northern B.C. communities, including Kitimat, Dawson Creek, Fort St. John, Telkwa, Port Edward, New Hazleton, the Regional Districts of Kitimat-Stikine and Bulkley-Nechako, as well as a number of First Nations communities.

3. How are you going to decide on the new or strengthened routes? When will you make a decision on routes?

- The advisory council, in consultation with the communities along the corridor, will review where these services can provide the greatest benefits.
- We will make decisions on routes in the spring of 2016, once the communities have had their chance to weigh in on what works best for them.

4. Will there be enough dollars for every community if every community wants to increase transit services?

 Funds will be available to extend or enhance existing BC Transit services to promote interconnectivity between communities.

- As far as the exact routes go, these details are still being fine- tuned. This
 will be the job of the nine person advisory council to take this important
 work forward.
- More specific details on the routes will be made available in the spring of 2016.

 This is a special fund for transit expansion along the Highway 16 corridor in response to what we heard at the recent transportation symposium in Smithers, and this is to improve the safety and mobility of people moving between communities along Highway 16.

Community-based transportation fund (specific):

1. How will this action address the transportation gap?

- The program will support local First Nations, communities or non-profit organizations in delivering transportation programs that meet local needs.
- There are already community-based transportation programs in place along the corridor which are currently meeting local needs. These programs confirm that the smaller community-based delivery model can work well.

2. How will the funding work?

- The funding will be for cost-shared community-based transportation services (up to \$750,000 over 3 years).
- Cost-shared grants will be available for 70% of the purchase price for new vehicles to a maximum of \$70,000.

 Grants will also be available for 70% of the operating costs to a maximum of \$20,000 per year for three years.

3. How and where do communities apply?

- Over the next couple of months, the ministry will work with the advisory committee to develop a process for local communities and organizations to apply for the grant funding.
- Once this work is complete this spring, the ministry will reach out to local government and First Nations communities to let them know how they can apply for the grant funding.
- By partnering with local governments, First Nations communities and organizations, the ministry is ensuring they are active participants with vested interest in selecting the transportation services that best meet local needs.

4. Will this be a big enough fund to cover all of the requests? There are 26 FN communities and a number of local governments.

- This is a significant commitment from government to improve transportation in the region.
- We believe there is sufficient funding over 3 years to support transportation services that may need extra dollars for operating. There may be communities who determine they need a new van, and that's what the capital portion will do.
- Since this is a cost-share program the ministry is maximizing the funds to make sure we can be as efficient as possible and allow as many communities as possible to participate.
- More details on the action plan and how the funds will be allocated will be released in the spring of 2016.

Driver training:

1. What is the driver training component?

- The program will provide up to \$150,000 over 3 years to support First Nations driver training/education.
- The ministry will build upon the current driver training/ education program to increase the number of Class 4 and Class 5 drivers in First Nations communities along the Highway 16 corridor.

2. Will the Carrier Sekani Family Services oversee the additional driver training funds? If not, why not?

- We are still working on the specific details of the program, including what organization or group will administer this program.
- As soon as we have firmed up these details, and how community members can access this funding, we'll make this information public.

3. Why are you investing in driver training? Why not just put that funding into more vans?

- We heard clearly that driver training for First Nations is a priority.
- Some communities indicated they have community vans but they do not have enough drivers with the appropriate licences to operate the vans.
- We recognize that having a valid driver's license and being able to drive is taken for granted by many, but there is a vast number of First Nations youth without a driver's license.
- Having the skill to drive a car, truck or van can lead to greater mobility and employment. So we believe this is a good investment to build capacity and skills.

New webcams and infrastructure:

1. What's the goal with this action?

- The goal is to increase safety (particularly for people who are hitchhiking) by using highway webcams to increase our ability to monitor key locations.
- The ministry will review the location of current highway webcams relative to common hitchhiking pickup spots, will increase the number of webcams on the highway, and will increase the frequency of photographs taken at these spots.
- Over the last year, the ministry has built four bus shelters to support
 existing transit services. The ministry will be installing additional transit
 shelters along the Highway 16 corridor.
- We'll also make sure that the webcams are pointed in the direction of the bus shelters where possible – to increase safety for those waiting for the bus.

2. Aren't the webcams an invasion of privacy?

- This is about increasing safety for people along the corridor. This is our top priority – increasing the safety and well-being of people – and in particular, increasing safety for women and teenage girls.
- The technology is designed so it doesn't compromise the privacy of an individual. We work within privacy laws to ensure that we uphold what we are legally required to do.
- We are already using highway webcams to increase our ability to monitor key locations.
- The ministry will review the location of current highway webcams relative to common hitchhiking pickup spots, will increase the number of webcams on the highway, and will increase the frequency of photographs taken at these spots.

Interconnectivity collaboration:

1. Why are you planning to increase collaboration?

- Collaboration is essential to ensure the transportation services connect with each other, are aligned, and do not provide overlapping services.
- By coordinating services and schedules, travelers will be able to plan trips using a combination of services.
- We are investing \$3-million towards this action plan and we want to ensure that our investments are spent as effectively as possible.

2. When will you have an update to this work?

 The ministry will release more details on the action plan in the spring of 2016.

Announcement:

1. Why are you having this announcement in Victoria – so far from the communities most affected by this strategy?

- Victoria is the seat of the provincial government, and lots of important provincial announcements are made here.
- We made a point of inviting all of the members of the advisory council, the First Nations Health Authority, plus other important stakeholders and ministries that have been involved in this work for a long time.

DRAFT and CONFIDENTIAL ADVICE TO MINISTER

- The focus today is on unveiling the action plan and we have done just that.
- We are also notifying each of the participants of the Transportation Symposium, as well as all of those who were invited to the symposium, today of the action plan.

2. Who did you invite to be part of this announcement? Did you pay for their travel and if not, why not?

- We invited all of the members of the ten person advisory group.
- We also invited some of our key stakeholders, including the First Nations Health Authority, Northern Health, and others.
- No, travel was not paid for as we want our dollars to go directly into the important transportation services that we are announcing today - \$3million is going into safe transportation options along Highway 16 to service the stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George.

3. Why did you give short notice to those invited to participate?

- Following the symposium, I promised that the ministry would get to work immediately on putting together a comprehensive transportation action plan.
- That is just what we did, and I am very pleased with the quick turnaround on this plan.
- We have five concrete transportation actions to enhance and expand transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor.
- The BC government has committed \$3-million towards the action plan.

4. How many people attended the symposium, and what groups were represented?

- In total, 92 people attended the symposium.
- This included 40 people from the First Nations communities and aboriginal organizations, 42 from local government organizations, regional districts, and 10 ministry and First Nations Health Authority representatives.

Federal Inquiry:

1. How does this work fit into the federal strategy to address Missing and Murdered Women?

- Our government has been clear that we support a national inquiry.
- We welcome the news of the federal government launching its first phase of the inquiry into murdered and missing indigenous women and girls (announced by Justice Minister Jody Wilson-Raybould).
- We will be happy to share the learnings and progress coming out of our own Missing Women's Commission of Inquiry here in B.C. as well as any input we can provide on ways to improve safety for indigenous women and girls.
- As we understand it, the federal government will meet with the families to hear their views on the design of the inquiry and what it needs to achieve.
- As a provincial government, we will also participate in any consultations and discussions that the federal government choose to hold as they develop plans around their inquiry.

2. Have you connected with your federal partners on this strategy and will there be federal support?

• I had the opportunity to meet with my federal counterpart in Ottawa last week (Minister to answer based on meetings)

3. What are your thoughts on the federal decision for an inquiry?

- Our government has been clear that we supported a national inquiry.
- We will be happy to share the learnings and progress coming out of our own Missing Women's Commission of Inquiry here in B.C. as well as any input we can provide on ways to improve safety for Indigenous women and girls.
- I would expect we will also participate in any consultations and discussions that the federal government choose to hold as they develop plans around their inquiry.

4. Should the National Inquiry involve Hwy 16 discussions?

 Yes. I think that any discussion around missing indigenous women and girls should look at safety on northern highways, not only in BC, but around the country.

DRAFT and CONFIDENTIAL ADVICE TO MINISTER

5. What progress has BC made?

- B.C. has made significant changes coming out of the missing women's inquiry, greatly improving safety for vulnerable women in our province.
- In addition, we have provided compensation to the children of the victims, have vastly improved police communications, are establishing new police standards for bias-free policing, and have established a robust provincial response for missing persons, including new missing persons legislation.
- We have also made our northern highways safer, helping to improve cell coverage on Highway 16 by almost 50%.
- Our work covers all the major themes recommended by Commissioner Wally Oppal, QC.
- B.C. is also taking action on feedback from family members by planning a
 gathering for relatives of missing and murdered Aboriginal women to
 heal together by sharing their stories and their strength, and further
 identifying a path forward to end violence against Aboriginal women and
 girls.
- These actions and the work that remains ongoing form a comprehensive response to the recommendations, and should give British Columbians confidence our province is a safer place than when these tragic murders and disappearances happened more than 15 years ago.

- We had a few goals going into the symposium...
 - 1. One...wanted to address recommendations made in Missing Women Commission of Inquiry Report. Commissioner Wally Oppal's transportation recommendation was this: 'To develop and implement an enhanced public transit system to provide a safer travel option connecting the Northern communities, particularly along Highway 16.'

- Two... needed to address what the people from these communities have been asking for – a more cohesive, interconnected transportation system, to enhance safety along Highway 16, and in particular enable residents to travel safely along the corridor.
- Discussions built upon existing services and explored different safe, practical, and sustainable transportation options.
- Discussions also built on results from recently conducted First
 Nations Transportation Survey, along with lessons learned from
 previous community engagement, surveys and reports.

B.C. unveils five point action plan for safe transportation options along Highway 16

VICTORIA – The B.C. government has unveiled a new \$3-million plan to enhance transportation safety along the Highway 16 corridor from Prince Rupert to Prince George.

The plan consists of five actions the government will take to improve access to transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor and enable residents of First Nations communities and municipalities to travel safely to and from rural towns and villages along the corridor.

The five point action plan consists of:

- \$1.6 million over 2 years for transit expansion: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to extend or enhance BC Transit services to better connect communities.
- \$750,000 over 3 years for a community transportation grant program to purchase and operate vehicles: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to support community-based transportation programs operated by First Nations, local governments or non-profit organizations.
- \$150,000 over 3 years for a First Nations driver education program: These new funds
 will build upon the current driver training/education program to increase the number of
 Class 4 and Class 5 drivers in First Nations communities along the Highway 16 corridor.
- \$500,000 over 2 years for highway infrastructure safety improvements including
 webcams and transit shelters: These new funds will enable the ministry to increase the
 number of webcams on the highway and the frequency of photographs taken at these
 spots. New transit shelters will be built in communities that will be receiving new or

The ministry has appointed a new ten-person Highway 16 Transportation Advisory Group to oversee implementation of the action plan and ensure that the actions address the input received at the transportation symposium. The advisory group will report to the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure and will be meeting over the months of January and February to review the specifics of the action plan and ensure it is implemented consistent with the input the ministry received at a recent transportation symposium held in Smithers.

Over the next couple of months, the ministry will work with the advisory group to develop a process for local communities and organizations to apply for all of the new funding. Once this work is complete, the ministry will reach out to First Nations communities and municipalities to

let them know how they can apply for the grant funding. By partnering with municipalities, First Nations communities and organizations, the ministry is ensuring they are active participants with vested interest in selecting the transportation services that best meet local needs.

On Nov. 24, 2015, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and the First Nations Health Authority co-hosted a transportation symposium in Smithers to engage with First Nations leadership, community members and local government representatives to help identify safe, practical and sustainable transportation options for communities along the Highway 16 corridor. Over 90 participants attended the forum, which was a big step forward in creating a safer environment for people living in communities along the nearly 800 km stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George. The ideas, recommendations and feedback from the transportation symposium were used to develop the foundation of the \$3-million action plan for the Highway 16 corridor.

Today's announcement builds on the \$5.2 million annual investment that the B.C. government makes towards transit services in communities along Highway 16, and is expected to connect communities not currently serviced by local transit service along the corridor.

Ministry launching Peachland transportation study

PEACHLAND – Today, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure is launching a transportation study which will look into Highway 97 improvements through and around the District of Peachland – both for the short term and the longer term.

This will be a two-year study focused on Peachland, and it will examine transportation alternatives, including the possibility of an alternate Highway 97 alignment around Peachland.

"We are listening to the people of Peachland, and we want to open it up to public discussion on ideas for short term and longer term traffic solutions for the community," said Transportation and Infrastructure Minister Todd Stone. "The study will look into the options that will meet the transportation needs of Peachland including developing an alternate route, or improving the existing highway."

This study will be carried out in concert with the ministry's Central Okanagan Planning Study, which was launched in the fall of 2014.

The Peachland study will use technical work that has been done as a part of the Central Okanagan Planning study, including traffic counts and future traffic growth projections, the needs of the travelling public, and community land use plans.

Peachland Mayor Cindy Fortin and Council have been advised of the study, and they are very encouraged with the launch. At the annual Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM) Convention, they met with the Premier and Minister Todd Stone to discuss the possibility of a bypass study.

"This is wonderful news for Peachland," said Peachland Mayor Cindy Fortin. "We have been anxiously waiting for a definitive study on the Highway 97 corridor though Peachland, so that residents can get some answers regarding a bypass verses four-laning, and so that developers can confidently move forward with their plans."

The Peachland study will launch immediately and public engagement is being planned for spring 2016. The ministry will consider input from this consultation along with input from the local mayor and councilors, the Highway 97 Task Force committee, chamber of commerce as well as local First Nations, environmental stakeholder groups, and other local stakeholder groups.

"This is the most important issue affecting the future of Peachland," said Peter Warner, President of Highway 97 Task Force Society. "This decision will be much appreciated by the 820

members of our Highway 97 Task Force Society, who support the bypass option. This is an important step towards the possibility of achieving a bypass."

Since 2001, the B.C. government has invested more than \$400 million in upgrades to improve safety and mobility on the Highway 97 corridor in the Central Okanagan. Some examples of improvements are: the William R. Bennett Bridge, Highway 97 six-laning from Water Street to Highway 33, four-laning of Highway 97 from Winfield to Oyama, the Westside Road interchange, and the Campbell Road Interchange.

B.C. unveils five point action plan for safe transportation options along Highway 16

VICTORIA – The B.C. government has unveiled a new \$3-million plan to enhance transportation safety along the Highway 16 corridor from Prince Rupert to Prince George.

The plan consists of five actions the government will take to improve access to transportation services along the Highway 16 corridor and enable residents of First Nations communities and municipalities to travel safely to and from rural towns and villages along the corridor.

The five point action plan consists of:

- \$1.6 million over 2 years for transit expansion: These new funds will be available on a
 cost-shared basis with local communities to extend or enhance BC Transit services to
 better connect communities.
- \$750,000 over 3 years for a community transportation grant program to purchase and operate vehicles: These new funds will be available on a cost-shared basis with local communities to support community-based transportation programs operated by First Nations, local governments or non-profit organizations.
- \$150,000 over 3 years for a First Nations driver education program: These new funds
 will build upon the current driver training/education program to increase the number of
 Class 4 and Class 5 drivers in First Nations communities along the Highway 16 corridor.
- \$500,000 over 2 years for highway infrastructure safety improvements including
 webcams and transit shelters: These new funds will enable the ministry to increase the
 number of webcams on the highway and the frequency of photographs taken at these
 spots. New transit shelters will be built in communities that will be receiving new or
 expanded transit service.
- Collaboration to increase interconnectivity of services: The ministry will work to
 increase coordination of existing transportation services through BC Transit, Northern
 Health, not for profit organizations and private service providers including efforts to
 better synchronize schedules and expand user eligibility criteria.

The ministry has appointed a new ten-person Highway 16 Transportation Advisory Group to oversee implementation of the action plan and ensure that the actions address the input received at the transportation symposium. The advisory group will report to the Minister of Transportation and Infrastructure and will be meeting over the months of January and February to review the specifics of the action plan and ensure it is implemented consistent with the input the ministry received at a recent transportation symposium held in Smithers.

Over the next couple of months, the ministry will work with the advisory group to develop a process for local communities and organizations to apply for all of the new funding. Once this work is complete, the ministry will reach out to First Nations communities and municipalities to

let them know how they can apply for the grant funding. By partnering with municipalities, First Nations communities and organizations, the ministry is ensuring they are active participants with vested interest in selecting the transportation services that best meet local needs.

On Nov. 24, 2015, the Ministry of Transportation and Infrastructure and the First Nations Health Authority co-hosted a transportation symposium in Smithers to engage with First Nations leadership, community members and local government representatives to help identify safe, practical and sustainable transportation options for communities along the Highway 16 corridor. Over 90 participants attended the forum, which was a big step forward in creating a safer environment for people living in communities along the nearly 800 km stretch of highway between Prince Rupert and Prince George.
