Hi there – brief update/wrap up on where we are at with the courthouse issue as of this afternoon:

Following Wed, when staff went to the campsite with Don from Our Place to speak with the campers during their 10 a.m. healing circle, the flyers were handed out to the campers this a.m. and posted around the perimeter of the camp. It was relatively peaceful – although S.22 made a point of taking copies of the flyer and ripping them up. No media onsite today.

The campers have indicated that they will be forming a collective response to the flyer.

Staff spoke with the fire department and Victoria Police again this afternoon. There had been a plan to have the fire department go down the campsite at 1 p.m. today to distinguish/remove the burn barrel, which is causing a lot of smoke and is if significant concern to residents. Efforts to do so were not successful - there was an organized resistance and a decision was made (by fire department and police) not to enrage the campers by proceeding.

However, the fire department's position is that the fire/s are in contravention of municipal bylaws and a solution needs to be found.

Of note, VicPD reported that there were some high-risk youth accessing and staying on the site this week. They have been in touch with MCFD about this - their GCPE shop is aware.

ADVICE AND RECOMMENDED RESPONSE:

- The B.C. Government is aware that some people have taken shelter overnight at the Victoria Courthouse property.
- Government has been working closely with the Victoria Police Department, the City of Victoria and community outreach organizations to identify a solution to the situation.
- The Province provides a range of supportive housing options for individuals without shelter.
- BC Housing works with local non-profit providers to find housing for people identified as homeless at the camp.
- Outreach workers also determine if any of the people at the camp need any support services, such as mental health and addictions services.
- Last year, the Province invested over \$19 million to support affordable housing for more than 5,100 low-income households in Victoria.
- Since 2001, we have developed or preserved more than 420 subsidized or supportive housing units in Victoria.

If asked about the City of Victoria's motion to request \$75,000 from BC Housing:

 The Province is aware of the City's request for funding and additional support; we are considering options that will provide more permanent shelter for these individuals.

BACKGROUND:

On Nov. 26, 2015, a motion was brought to Victoria City Council and passed unanimously, requesting \$75,000 to go towards 40 new rent supplements requested by Pacifica Housing for the Streets to Homes program. There was also a request BC Housing for \$75,000.

The motion was passed to provide \$75,000 from the City's Strategic Objectives Fund to provide 40 rent supplements, however the motion was passed contingent on the City receiving additional funding from partners including BC Housing.

This money would expand the Streets to Homes Program which provides rent supplements to those who need it most

On Nov. 23, 2015, media inquired as to the Province's intended plan in response to an increasing number of homeless campers tenting at the Victoria Courthouse grounds.

There are approximately 20 campers currently set up at the courthouse lawn.

Media reports that a loophole exists whereby campers can stay at the property without having to leave by 7a.m.because the property is privately owned by the province. Overnight campers in city parks are required to abide by a local city parks bylaw that requires them to not camp between the hours of 7a.m. and 7p.m.

The Cool Aid Society has met with the campers, and identified some of them as having been barred from shelters for behavioral reasons. Other campers have been identified as not wanting to stay in shelters for various reasons.

There are two shelters located close to the encampment, both are operating at close to capacity each night.

- The Victoria Cool Aid society's downtown community centre has 40 beds, and is open 7 nights a week
- Our Place Society operates a 40-bed shelter at first metropolitan church, which is also open 7 nights a week

EWR shelters in Victoria will be activated in the case of cold or wet weather, providing additional spaces for people who are homeless, or at risk of homelessness

Following a court ruling in 2009, homeless campers have been allowed to stay in Victoria parks as long as they pack up their tents and move every morning. In this case however, the courthouse lawn belongs to the Province and that rule does not apply.

The Province will provide approximately \$380,000 to fund a new 40-bed temporary shelter with the city of Victoria and Island Health. We are looking at locations and hope to have one identified shortly. Timing will depend on any modifications required and zoning. Discussions are taking place with a potential operator, and we anticipate the shelter will operate 24/7 and provide meals and other supports.

Shelter staff will assess people once they have been moved to the shelter, and relocate them to appropriate housing and health services. This shelter will operate until the end of April and be in addition to the 150 year-round homeless shelter spaces in Victoria, as well as the 145 shelter spaces that open during extreme weather.

The Province also recently provided \$184,000 to Our Place to open a new 40-bed winter shelter.

The Provincial Government is the owner of the Victoria Courthouse Lands, which is the grass area bounded by Courtney, Quadra and Burdett Street. This is not a City Park.

Over the past month, campers have spent many nights sleeping on the Courthouse Lands and the number of occupants and tents has steadily grown. Personal belongings and tents now cover the majority of the grass area. There is concern that with time, the situation of so many people with a variety of needs living in close proximity will lead to risks to the safety of campers. The Provincial Government recognizes that campers have chosen this location for a variety of reasons; however, this camp is not a suitable solution. We are in close contact with outreach workers, health care providers, shelters, City staff, income assistance workers, police, courthouse staff, and numerous other concerned citizens and we would like to provide you with a number of options that are available.

The Province is committed to helping each and every camper. We will ensure that outreach workers will continue to connect with you with the support services options, including health care, counselling and shelter. The Province will open a new 40 bed 24/7 shelter (location to be confirmed in this letter once determined) and we encourage campers to consider this option. The Province also provides a range of other supportive housing options elsewhere in Victoria for individuals without shelter; information on these shelters will be provided by on-site counsellors

In the end, this camp is not a sustainable solution. Our society has better options available, run by people who care about your health and wellbeing. We ask that campers cease camping at this location and remove your property from the Courthouse Lands.

The B.C. government will provide \$400,000 in operating funding plus \$25,000 toward start-up costs for a 40-bed shelter that will be open 24/7 and provide three meals per day. The City of Victoria will provide \$75,000 in rent supplements and the United Way will contribute \$25,000.

Our Place will operate the shelter. Shelter staff will assess people once they arrive, relocate them to appropriate housing and refer them to health services.

The Province and the City of Victoria are working to finalize a suitable location for the shelter, which once opened, will operate until the end of April 2016.

The B.C government and the city have been working together to identify housing solutions for people living at the homeless camp at the Victoria courthouse property. Outreach workers continue to attend the camp to make sure the campers are aware of the services available to them.

The new shelter will be in addition to the 150 year-round homeless shelter spaces in Victoria, as well as the 145 shelter spaces that are available during extreme weather. The Province also recently provided \$184,000 to Our Place to open a 40-bed overnight shelter at First Metropolitan United Church.

- Despite the timeliness of the City of Victoria's motion, the request for funding came from Pacifica Housing over a month ago.
- Motion was to provide \$75K from the City's Strategic Objectives Fund to provide 40 rent supplements,
 which is conditional on additional funding from partners like BC Housing.
- Pacifica will administer the rent supplements.
- It is not solely for the campers at the Courthouse. Rent supplements will be assessed according to need. This
 will potentially open up shelter beds and support services for those campers, or if they demonstrate need,
 they will receive the rent supplement.
- According to the Streets to Homes program, the amount of supplements will vary up to \$450. The entire
 program costs \$7,500 per person, per year to provide rent supplements and comprehensive case
 management support.
- Eligibility to be a part of the Streets to Home program are:
 - o Must be homeless
 - Must exhibit chronic or episodic homelessness
 - Must have significant barriers to finding stable housing such as mental health issues, substance abuse, etc..
- The program is geared towards individuals (as opposed to families).
- Motion at Council was passed unanimously to request funding.

While the province appreciates the complex issues facing many of the people campers at the site, due to health and safety concerns, the courthouse property is not a long-term solution.

-at-the-site, the courthouse property is not a long-term option for your-housing needs. There is concern that campers find appropriate housing and services for their safety, health-and wellbeing.

For this reason, we are encouraging campers are encouraged to seek to work with our assistance from support homeless outreach workers who have been on site and are there to help-withmake alternate housing arrangements.

In addition, outreach workers from the Our Place Society and the Victoria Cool Aid Society societies are also available to connect campers with support services such as health care and counselling services.

Our Place Society is now operating a new <u>24/7</u>, 40-bed transition house at 1240 Yates Street that will be open 24 hours a day, seven days a week that that can provide many of you with provides-shelter, meals and other supports. Campers are encouraged to take advantage of this shelter space until while support workers work with you to find longer-term housing solutions options can be found.

Please recognize that there are There are better options available, run by people here to help you who can assist you with your health and wellbeing, while we work with you to return the We ask that campers vacate this location and remove all personal property from the courthouse lands as seen as possible to their original condition and purpose.

The B.C. Government is the owner of the Victoria Courthouse Lands, which includes the grassy area bounded by Courtney, Quadra and Burdett Street. The Courthouse performs a necessary function in our society.

Over the past month, the number of campers has steadily grown. There is concern that campers find housing and services to improve their safety, health and wellbeing.

Each individual camper will be offered alternate housing arrangements. The B.C. Government is in close contact with outreach workers, health care providers, shelters, City of Victoria staff, income assistance workers, police and courthouse staff to assist campers with alternate housing arrangements. In addition, outreach workers from the Our Place Society and the Victoria Cool Aid Society are available to connect campers with support services such as health care and counselling services and can be contacted on site.

VICTORIA COURTHOUSE HOMELESS CAMP

<u>Topic:</u> A group of homeless people have set up camp outside the Victoria courthouse. On Jan. 5, Our Place opened a new, 40-bed shelter. The Province is providing \$400,000 in operating funding plus \$25,000 toward start-up costs.

- The Province continues to work closely with the City of Victoria, Victoria Police Department and community service organizations to assist the campers currently situated at the courthouse.
- Outreach workers have been working with the campers to provide information on shelters and services available in the Victoria area.
- For issues of health and safety, it's hoped they take advantage of the dry, safe location that the new shelter will offer, or other facilities in the Victoria area.
- The new shelter is in addition to the 150 year-round homeless shelter spaces in Victoria, as well as the 145 shelter spaces that open during extreme weather.
- The Province also recently provided \$184,000 to Our Place to open a new 40-bed winter shelter at First Metropolitan United Church.

Background:

There are about 110-120 campers at the site.

Our Place will be taking 5 to 6 people a day to the new shelter to give them the chance to settle in. The 40-bed shelter is expected to be fully occupied by Friday, Jan. 8. Outreach staff will then determine the needs of the remaining campers.

It's not yet known how many of the remaining campers will need housing. It's believed some campers have housing and some are visiting from outside of Victoria.

BC Housing is also working with Pacifica Housing to use rent supplements to help campers find housing in the private market, however the vacancy rate in Victoria is posing a challenge.

Background:

There are about 110-120 campers at the site.

Our Place will be taking 5 to 6 people a day to the new shelter to give them the chance to settle in. The 40-bed shelter is expected to be fully occupied by Friday, Jan. 8. Outreach staff will then determine the needs of the remaining campers.

It's not yet known how many of the remaining campers will need housing. It's believed some campers have housing and some are visiting from outside of Victoria.

BC Housing is also working with Pacifica Housing to use rent supplements to help campers find housing in the private market, however the vacancy rate in Victoria is posing a challenge.

The Ministry of Technology, Innovation and Citizens' Services (MTICS) will be distributing a flyer to the campers requesting they vacate and providing assurance they will be offered alternate housing arrangements.

MTICS will have to a make a decision to apply to the courts for an injunction. This could be challenged and take anywhere from 4 to 6 weeks.

Court ruling:

Following a court ruling in 2009, homeless campers have been allowed to stay in Victoria parks as long as they pack up their tents and move every morning. In this case however, the courthouse lawn belongs to the province and that rule does not apply.

The B.C. Government is the owner of the Victoria Courthouse Lands, which includes the grassy area bounded by Courtney, Quadra and Burdett Street. The Courthouse performs a necessary function in our society.

Over the past month, the number of campers has steadily grown. There is concern that campers find housing and services to improve their safety, health and wellbeing.

The B.C. Government is in close contact with outreach workers, health care providers, shelters, City of Victoria staff, income assistance workers, police and courthouse staff to assist campers with alternate housing arrangements. In addition, outreach workers from the Our Place Society and the Victoria Cool Aid Society are available to connect campers with support services such as health care and counselling services and can be contacted on site.

The B.C. Government is opening a new 40 bed transition house at 1240 Yates Street that will be open 24 hours a day, seven days a week and provide meals and other supports. Campers are encouraged to take advantage of this shelter space until long-term housing options can be found. The Province provides a range of other housing options in Victoria for people without shelter; information on these options is available from outreach workers.

To conclude, the courthouse property is not a sustainable solution for your needs. There are better options available, run by people who can assist you with your health and wellbeing. We ask that campers cease camping at this location, utilize the available better options and remove your property from the Courthouse Lands.

Victoria Courthouse campers have a news conference schedule for this morning.

In the news:

Media coverage continues on the tent city at the Victoria courthouse. The Times Colonist, The Province and CFAX are reporting that campers aren't impressed with a letter from the provincial government suggesting the time has come for them to move on. The letter mentions the temporary, 40-bed shelter set up on Yates Street, and suggests that Our Place and the Victoria Cool Aid Society can offer help. In response, campers have scheduled a press conference at the courthouse site at 11 a.m. Monday. A statement issued by residents of what is being called "Super InTent City" said the press conference will include speakers talking against the "one-size-fitsall" approach they see the government taking to the diverse needs of homeless people.

CP News is reporting that Canada could see final approval of the first natural gas export projects on the West Coast this year. Proponents behind some of the 20 proposed liquefied natural gas projects in B.C. say they should be in a position to make final investment decisions this year as environmental approvals, permits and First Nations support fall into place. The article says while a supply glut has pushed down natural gas prices, experts say projects remain viable. Altacorp Capital analyst Mark Westby says current gas prices are only one factor and sees LNG Canada and the Altagas-led Douglas Channel project as developments most likely to proceed this year. Racim Gribaa, who leads Deloitte Canada's LNG business, said the downturn in the resources sector presents an ideal time to start building projects. He said that despite current prices, the future demand for natural gas looks strong, giving Canada a chance to still play a role in the global LNG market.

The Vancouver Sun and CFAX are reporting that the B.C. government will formally oppose the Trans Mountain oil pipeline expansion in a written submission to the National Energy Board today. Environment Minister Mary Polak says the government believes that Kinder Morgan has failed to provide the NEB with an adequate plan to prevent or respond to an oil spill. The article references B.C.'s five conditions oil pipeline projects have to meet before they would be allowed in the province. Polak said outside of the NEB process on oil spills, the project has failed to meet any of the province's five conditions, such as obtaining First Nations support and providing the province a fair share of economic benefits. The NEB must make recommendations to the federal cabinet on the Trans Mountain project by May 20.

Below is some information available on background. Sorry again for the delay.

- The camp at the courthouse is a complex situation as many of the campers suffer from mental health and addictions issues.
- Right now, we have outreach workers at the camp every day and the campers are aware of the services
 available to them.
- The Province has provided \$425,000 in funding for a new winter shelter to address this situation, which will be

- Including the new shelter on Yates Street, we have provided about \$600,000 to help open 80 new winter shelter spaces in Victoria.
- There are also 145 extreme weather shelter spaces available across Greater Victoria to make sure everyone has access to a safe, warm place at night.
- These spaces are activated by the community depending on weather conditions. The average occupancy rate has been 66% this winter.

Background:

Update - Nov. 27:

A motion was brought to Victoria City Council on Nov. 26, and passed unanimously, requesting \$75,000 to go towards 40 new rent supplements requested by Pacifica Housing for the Streets to Homes program. There was also a request BC Housing for \$75,000.

The motion was passed to provide \$75,000 from the City's Strategic Objectives Fund to provide 40 rent supplements, however the motion was passed contingent on the City receiving additional funding from partners including BC Housing.

This moncy would expand the Streets to Homes Program which provides rent supplements to those who need it most.

About the allocation of rent supplements:

Pacifica will administer the rent supplements via their Streets to Homes Program.

The rent supplements are not solely for the campers at the courthouse, but will be distributed according to need in the community.

Providing rent supplements according to need will potentially open up shelter beds and support services for those campers, as others move into more permanent housing.

According to the Streets to Homes Program, the amount of supplements will vary up to \$450. The entire program costs \$7,500 per person, per year to provide rent supplements and comprehensive case management support.

Eligibility to be a part of the Streets to Home program:

- Must be homeless
- Must exhibit chronic or episodic homelessness
- Must have significant barriers to finding stable housing such as mental health issues, substance abuse, etc.

VICTORIA COURTHOUSE HOMELESS CAMP

<u>Topic:</u> A group of homeless people have set up camp outside the Victoria courthouse. There are currently about two dozen tents at the location, which is on provincial property.

- These types of situations are complex as many of the campers suffer from mental health and addictions issues.
- We have outreach workers at the camp every day and the campers are aware of the services available to them.

New shelter:

- We are working with the city and Island Health to open a new 40-bed temporary shelter.
- We anticipate it will be open 24/7 and provide meals and other supports.
- We are looking at locations and hope to have one identified shortly.
- Shelter staff will assess people once they have been moved to the shelter, and relocate them to appropriate housing and health services.
- This shelter will be in addition to the 150 year-round homeless shelter spaces in Victoria, as well as the 145 shelter spaces that open during extreme weather.
- The Province also recently provided \$184,000 to Our Place to open a new 40-bed winter shelter.

Background:

The Cool Aid Society has met with the campers, and identified some of the campers as having been barred from shelters for behavioral reasons. Other campers have been identified as not wanting to stay in shelters for various reasons.

There are two shelters located close to the camp, both of which have been close to capacity each night:

- The Victoria Cool Aid society's downtown community centre has 40 beds, and is open 7 nights a week.
- Our Place Society operates a 40-bed shelter at first metropolitan church, which is also open 7 nights a week.

Extreme Weather Response (EWR) shelters in Victoria will be activated in the case of cold or wet weather, providing additional spaces to sleep for people who are homeless, or at risk of homelessness.

Court ruling:

Following a court ruling in 2009, homeless campers have been allowed to stay in Victoria parks as long as they pack up their tents and move every morning. In this case however, the courthouse lawn belongs to the province and that rule does not apply.

The Victoria School District has asked the Province and the city to cover \$44,000 in estimated security costs. The shelter is located near Central Middle School.

Our Place will be taking 5 to 6 people a day to the new shelter to give them the chance to settle in. The 40-bed shelter is expected to be fully occupied by Friday, Jan. 8. Outreach staff will then determine the needs of the remaining campers.

It's not yet known how many of the remaining campers will need housing. It's believed some campers have housing and some are visiting from outside of Victoria.

FROM: The Province of BC, Ministry of Technology, Innovation and Citizens' Services

The Provincial Government is the owner of the Victoria Courthouse lands, which includes the grassy area bounded by Courtney, Quadra and Burdett Street. This grassy area is not a city park, and as such, is considered private property.

Over the past month, the number of campers has increased, posing health and safety concerns. As a result, the Province requires campers to cease camping at this location between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. seven days a week. All campers are asked to remove their property from the courthouse lands during that time.

The B.C. Government is in close contact with outreach workers, health care providers, shelters, City of Victoria staff, income assistance workers, police and courthouse staff to assist campers with alternate housing arrangements. In addition to housing arrangements, outreach workers are available to connect campers with support services options such as health care and counselling services.

The Province is opening a new 40 bed shelter that will be open 24 hours a day, seven days a week and provide meals and other supports [Give examples from BC Housing]. (location to be confirmed in this letter once determined) Campers are encouraged to take advantage of this shelter space until long-term housing options can be found. The Province provides a range of other supportive housing options in Victoria for people without shelter; information on these shelters is available from on-site counsellors.
