STATEMENT

Minister's statement on the representative's report

VICTORIA - Minister of Children and Family Development Stephanie Cadieux issued the following statement today in response to the release of the representative for children and youth's report that investigates sexualized violence against children and youth in care:

"I'd like to thank the Representative's Office for their work on this important report. It helps shed further light on a very dark issue in our society - an issue we've explored extensively in other reviews, including most recently in our file review of children and youth in Vancouver's Downtown Eastside.

"The factors behind the sexual abuse of children are both disturbing and complex, and the report does a thorough job of detailing those factors as well as identifying those populations that are most vulnerable.

"In an effort to prevent the victimization of youth who come into our care the ministry has rigorous standards in place for assessing caregivers. Those standards require, for example, criminal record checks for all adults residing in the home, home studies and caregiver training.

"We are also implementing a number of measures to strengthen the system of care including: revised standards for social workers who assess, train, support and monitor foster parents; an expanded audit program to include the work of these social workers; and revised protocols for responding to allegations of harm or poor quality of care for children in foster homes.

"This ministry is built on the principle of protecting children from harm. We know that many of the young people who come into our care have suffered from varying forms of abuse in their lives - and too often at the hands of those they've loved or trusted. We need to ensure we are doing all we can to make our system of care a safe haven for these children and youth.

"This report offers some interesting recommendations in support of that goal and we will be discussing those with our partner ministries and agencies in the coming weeks."

Provincial Funding for Child Advocacy

- The Province supports the integrated Child and Youth Advocacy Centre model as a means to strengthen and coordinate responses to child abuse investigations.
- In general, the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General provides support to the victim services component of the model by either funding a dedicated victim service worker or through existing contracted victim services.
- Since 2011, the Ministry has provided over \$500,000 in civil forfeiture grant funding to support the development of CYACs in BC.

Q. Minister what is your response to the recommendations in the report for child and youth advocacy centres and characterization of police interview techniques that add to a fear of reporting?

- This is a very important issue and we need to ensure we are doing all we can to make our system of care a safe haven for children and youth.
- We have just received the report and intend to give it a thorough review and consideration before responding to the content.

Q. How many child advocacy centres are there? Where are they? How much funding do they receive?

- British Columbia currently has operational CYACs in Surrey (Sophie's Place), Ridge Meadows (Alisa's Wish), Vancouver, Victoria, Vernon (Oak Centre) and the Kootenays (SKY Centre).

Minister's statement on the Representative for Children and Youth's report

VICTORIA – Children and Family Development Minister Stephanie Cadieux issued the following statement today in response to the Representative for Children and Youth's investigative report into the death of a youth who had been receiving ministry services.

"As this report points out, the circumstances around this young man's death have been reviewed by three separate agencies: the community agency he was being served by in his final days, the Coroner's Service and the Ministry of Children and Family Development, through the work of a contracted external expert.

"We appreciate the additional perspective offered by Representative's report. Recognizing that much of the recommended work extends beyond the youth justice system and this ministry's mandate, we will discuss with our partner ministries to determine how this report might inform further service improvements.

"With regard to provincial mental-health and substance-use services, I can tell you that this government convened a cross-ministry Cabinet Working Group on Mental Health with a key goal to identify and address gaps in the current system and make sure that individuals and families can access support services early – before they find themselves in a crisis.

"The working group is in the process of developing an integrated, cross-government mental-health and substance-use strategy for British Columbia.

"The various reviews that have been conducted into this case have provided considerable opportunity for organizational learning and service improvement, and my ministry has not been idle in embracing those lessons.

"In the last year, we've improved policy to ensure that sentencing recommendations are addressed, decisions around interventions for youth-justice clients are thoroughly informed and all options are considered. We now require that youth probation officers review police reports to Crown counsel so they can better understand the nature of the offense a youth has committed. We also now require that youth probation officers discuss any breach of bail conditions with the youth and the parents and consider any needed changes to the youth's service plan.

"Further, we are providing compulsory training sessions to youth probation officers on dealing with youth who have concurrent disorders, including training on how to recognize signs and symptoms of addiction and withdrawal.

"This death of the young man at the centre of these reports was a terrible tragedy. I feel for the family. No one should ever have to deal with the loss of a child.

"When the unthinkable does happen, we all search for answers. We want to know why it happened, how it happened and what we can do to help prevent anything like this from ever again taking place on our watch.

"Ultimately, it is incumbent on us to learn from the lessons of this young man's life. That is what this government is doing and we now have the benefit of four separate reviews to help guide that ongoing work."

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QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

RCY – Review of sexualized violence against CYIC

Ministry of Children and Family Development

Oct. 4, 2016

Q1. Will you accept the recommendations in this report?

- I'd like to thank the Representative's Office for their work on this important report.
- It helps shed further light on a very dark issue in our society and there are key lessons here, not just for the Ministry of Children and Family Development, but for government and our service delivery partners as well.
- This ministry is built on the principle of protecting children from harm. We know that many of the young people who come into our care have suffered from varying forms of abuse in their lives – and too often at the hands of those they've loved or trusted.
- We need to ensure we are doing all we can to make our system of care a safe haven for these children and youth.
- In B.C., there are some 7,200 young people in government care. For the vast majority, the system does offer them the safety, support and security they didn't have in their previous home.
- But even one instance of a child suffering abuse while in care is one too many.
- We need to do better and we will take a close review of this report to see what lessons can be incorporated to help us further improve B.C.'s system of care.

Q2. 75% of the reported sexual assaults on younger victims occurred while the child was in a care placement. Many of those assaults were committed by a foster parent or another child/youth in the home. How can you defend a foster system that actively places children in danger?

- It is completely unacceptable for any child in our care to be harmed in any way in the homes and families that social workers place them in.
- There are standards in place for assessing caregivers which include a criminal record check for all adults residing in the home, home study and foster parent education.
- Further, we are taking a number of measures to strengthen the foster care system, including:
 - Revised standards for social workers who assess, train, support and monitor foster parents;
 - An expanded audit program to include the work of these social workers; and
 - Revised protocols for responding to allegations of harm or poor quality of care

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for children in foster homes.

- The circumstances faced by the children discussed in this report are undeniably tragic and show that still more needs to be done to protect this vulnerable population.
- If even a single child is placed in harm's way while in care, that's one child too many.
- That said, it's important to recognize that the vast majority of the roughly 7,200 children in our care will never face an experience like this in foster care.
- Instead, foster and group homes provide them with the safety and security that many had never known before coming into care. We need to work harder to ensure that's true for every child who passes through our doors.

Q3. What do you say to the RCY's charge that the system itself is racist, citing the disproportionately high number of Aboriginal girls who suffer abuse?

- I agree that more needs to be done and that change must extend well beyond this ministry to other service agencies and society as a whole.
- I can tell you that in late September government took the next step in an engagement process to develop a shared 10-year Social Determinants Strategy for British Columbia First Nations people, with a focus on Child and family well-being, child welfare, education and justice.
- For our part, this ministry is committed to working with Aboriginal communities and partner groups to address this challenge and even the playing field.
- We brought in Grand Chief Edward John as senior advisor to the minister on Aboriginal child welfare to engage with Aboriginal, First Nation and Métis communities on permanency discussions, review policy and legislation within the ministry to find ways to address the overrepresentation of Aboriginal children in care, and provide Early Years advice to the minister.
- His research will address the over-representation of Aboriginal children in the child protection system, as well as their treatment while in that system. We expect this work will provide valuable input for future policy around Aboriginal children in care and we await his final summary report along with any recommendations it may contain for government going forward.

Q4. This report indicates there is a lower standard for investigations of alleged sexual violence when kids are in government care. Is this just social worker indifference? Does the group home model place kids at greater risk of sexual violence and exploitation? Why aren't you doing more to protect those who are most vulnerable?

- The ministry has special protocols for investigating allegations of child abuse and quality of care issues in foster homes. These require thorough investigations by senior social

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workers.

- The ministry is strengthening these protocols to include allegations of harm in group homes and foster homes operated by contracted agencies.

Q5. How much does government spend on prevention/treatment?

- The Province provides over \$70 million annually in funding for services to support victims of crime and women and children, including those children who suffer abuse.
- Children who have been abused are also eligible to seek counseling through the provincial Crime Victim Assistance Program.

Q6. What services are available in [community X]?

Q7. How many child advocacy centres are there? Where are they? How much funding do they receive?

- British Columbia currently has operational CYACs in Surrey (Sophie's Place), Ridge Meadows (Alisa's Wish), Vancouver, Victoria, Vernon (Oak Centre) and the Kootenays (SKY Centre).
- In 2010, the federal government announced \$5.25 million in funding for the development or enhancement of Child and Youth Advocacy Centres across Canada.
- The Province supports the federal government in exploring the Child and Youth Advocacy Centre model for strengthening and coordinating responses to child abuse investigations.

Q8. The RCY says 70% of these kids also suffered from mental health issues. Just a few weeks ago she pointed out that young people can wait up to 270 days to access CYMH services. What are you doing to fix this broken system and get kids the help they need?

- For the record, the 270 wait time was for one office — and it was the only office in B.C. reporting such a long wait at that time.
- Children and youth flagged as high-risk (experiencing psychosis or having suicidal thoughts, as examples) are immediately fast-tracked to supports and services. There is no wait.
- For lower-risk children and youth, waitlists vary throughout the province, but the median wait time across all CYMH offices is 87 days. That's still too high, and we're changing that. Stay tuned for an important announcement later this fall that will address mental health wait lists.

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- Some examples of recent changes/improvements we've made to better address mental health needs of children and youth in B.C., include:
 - We now have over 90+ walk-in intake clinics across the province that provide a more efficient intake process that is helping to reduce wait times for children and their families for the initial assessment of their mental health service needs.
 - In 2015, the ministry launched Community and Residential Information System (CARIS) waitlist enhancements to measure the number of clients waiting for service, their wait list time, and their priority ranking.
 - In 2015, the ministry launched an interactive Child and Youth Mental Health and Substance Use service map that offers up-to-date information on approximately 350 services that are offered in B.C. communities. Since its launch in early 2015, the map has helped over 8,900 youth and families to find the services they need.
 - Since 2011, MCFD has partnered with the B.C. Children's Hospital to provide videoconference-based psychiatric consultations to children and youth with mental health challenges and their families who might otherwise have to travel or wait for a psychiatrist to visit their community.
 - A telehealth implementation toolkit, soon to be released, will further support CYMH teams in launching new telehealth services and in expanding use of existing services.
 - A new Integrated Youth Services Initiative supports youth who are at risk of substance-use and mental-health concerns through youth health centres in five B.C. communities – Kelowna, Vancouver, Campbell River, Prince George and Abbotsford.

Q9. Half of these kids had problematic substance use issues. The RCY says there aren't enough treatment beds available for B.C. youth in general. What are you doing to increase capacity and improve access to drug treatment and rehabilitation services?

- There is a spectrum of care available to meet the needs of youth experiencing substance use challenges, including: primary care; withdrawal management and supportive recovery; youth concurrent disorders programs; and residential treatment.
- All health authorities provide community substance-use services for youth, including drop-in, outreach, counselling and post-detox programs, with virtually no waits.
- In addition to these outpatient services, the Province also has 203 beds available for children and youth with substance use challenges in B.C., including:
 - 78 child and youth acute and tertiary mental health and substance use beds.
 - 103 community-based youth (generally ages 15 -18) mental health and substance use beds, of which 20 are residential care beds specifically for youth with substance use disorders.

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- 22 beds funded by MCFD and provided through Full-Time Attendance Programs (FTAPs) for youth offenders with substance use issues. FTAPs are community-based programs used as an alternative to custody for youth aged 12 to 17 who are involved in the justice system.
- Government continuously works to review and enhance the mental health and substance use system of care to better meet the needs of children, youth and their families.

Q10. In “Eva’s” case a relief caregiver assaulted her. How do you screen relief workers? Are they held to the same standard as foster parents? (background and criminal record checks, etc?)

- Relief caregivers must be screened, assessed and approved using the same standards that apply to regular foster parents.
- This involves a comprehensive criminal record check, reference checks, medical checks and a full home study to assess the prospective caregiver’s experience, skills and qualities.

Q11. What circumstances are social workers required to log as critical incidents? How do you ensure compliance with reporting requirements?

- Social workers must submit a report whenever a child in care is critically injured or involved in a serious incident, including living in a foster home in which there has been an allegation of child harm.
- The ministry implemented new policy around recording and reporting critical incidents in June 2015. Comprehensive training was provided for staff prior to the release of the new policy.

Q12. Kids in this review moved between an average of 8 different foster homes; some moved as many as 30 times. What are you doing to help create placement stability for kids in care?

- Placement changes may sometimes be necessary and can be beneficial in terms of ensuring the right fit for the child or youth, but generally avoiding or minimizing moves while in care is a key goal of this ministry.
- I can tell you that in 2015 the vast majority (65%) of kids in care experienced no placement change at all.
- We have a process in place to track the number of moves that any child in care makes over a 12-month period.
