B.C. investment in Indigenous language revitalization puts reconciliation into action

VICTORIA – First Peoples' Cultural Council will work in partnership with First Nations communities to develop and implement revitalization plans for each of the living Indigenous languages in B.C., to reverse the disruption to Indigenous languages from Canada's history of colonization and residential schools.

"Language is critical for connecting Indigenous peoples to their culture, spirituality, identity and land," said Scott Fraser, Minister of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation. "For too long, Indigenous language has been under threat. The time has come for us to support First Nations in exercising their human right to speak and pass on their language and culture."

In Budget 2018, B.C. allocated a \$50-million grant to the First Peoples' Cultural Council (FPCC) to help revitalize Indigenous languages in British Columbia, and address the current language crisis. Fewer than 6,000 people speak one of the 34 Indigenous languages in B.C.

"We are taking action now to support Indigenous communities' work to preserve and revitalize endangered languages – languages that are cornerstones of cultural and social identities across our province," said Carole James, Minister of Finance. "By investing in Indigenous languages, we invest in the future of Indigenous communities. I am proud our government is making this historic commitment."

As a result of the funding, the First Peoples' Cultural Council will expand community immersion programs that support the development of fluent speakers of Indigenous languages. These include the Mentor-Apprentice program, which pairs fluent speakers with apprentices for one-on-one immersion training, and the Pre-school Language Nest program, which supports the creation of language and culture immersion environments for children and their parents. The pilot Silent Speakers program will become permanent. Silent Speakers helps those who understand, but do not speak their language, overcome challenges with using it in their communities.

"We sincerely thank the B.C. government for its strong leadership and new investment in the revitalization of Indigenous languages across B.C., and for recognizing the importance of Indigenous languages to the well-being of Indigenous peoples," said Cynthia Callison, FPCC board chair. "This funding is essential to restore and continue the unique diversity of Indigenous languages in B.C. It is a concrete example of implementing the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's calls to action toward reconciliation."

The language revitalization plans will be developed with Indigenous communities and tailored to their individual needs. The First Peoples' Cultural Council will also provide funding to increase the number of words and phrases uploaded to the FirstVoices online oral dictionary,

and expand the online resources available for language learners and speakers.

"Urgent action is needed as many Indigenous languages are in danger of becoming extinct," said Melanie Mark, Minister of Advanced Education, Skills and Training. "One of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's key priorities is revitalizing language. That's what this work is about — not just giving lip service to reconciliation, but taking action."

FPCC will work in collaboration with communities and partners to support additional priority actions to revitalize languages. These include creating new speakers and developing new language resources that will support communities to build skills and capacity for language mobilization.

"The First Nations communities we have been working with are seeing clear and measurable results, creating fluent language speakers as new knowledge keepers and documenting languages for future generations," said Tracey Herbert, CEO of the FPCC. "This new funding will help us to build on our strong track record of success, and expand our work to all Indigenous communities in B.C., to help their mother-tongue languages flourish again."

Quick Facts:

- British Columbia has the greatest diversity of Indigenous languages in Canada. The 34 unique Indigenous languages, and over 90 dialects, represent 60% of all Indigenous languages in the country.
- Investing in languages aligns with the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada's
 calls to action and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples,
 which recognize that knowing and being able to speak one's language is a human right.

First Peoples' Cultural Council

The First Peoples' Cultural Council is a unique organization in Canada. As a First Nations-run Crown corporation with a mandate to support the revitalization of Indigenous languages, arts, culture and heritage in British Columbia, First Peoples' Cultural Council provides funding and resources to communities, monitors the status of Indigenous languages and develops policy recommendations for First Nations and government.

New funding

The B.C. government has committed a significant investment of \$50 million to support Indigenous language. This funding is the result of many years of advocacy, educating policy makers, and developing investment models by First Peoples' Cultural Council and community partners.

Why Indigenous language revitalization matters

Restoring connections to Indigenous language and culture builds resilience and supports healthy individuals and communities. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action Report outlines the need to protect and invest in the restoration of Indigenous languages as a concrete step toward reconciliation. Knowing and being able to speak one's language is recognized as a human right for Indigenous peoples. The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples identifies that Indigenous peoples have the right to revitalize, use, develop and transmit to future generations their histories, languages, oral traditions, philosophies, writing systems and literatures, and to designate and retain their own names for communities, places and persons. First Peoples' Cultural Council has been working with the Assembly of First Nations and the federal government to advance the recognition and protection of Indigenous language rights in federal law.

How the funding will be used

The new funding will be used for language preservation and revitalization activities, including community grants, community language planning, and documentation and training aimed at rebuilding community-based language supports. The funding will also be used to expand language immersion programs and learning resources to support Indigenous languages in communities throughout the province.

The First Peoples' Cultural Council has served First Nations in B.C. for 28 years. The First Peoples' Cultural Council has mapped and documented Indigenous languages in B.C.; built tools and programs in community and online that support language learning; created partnerships with communities throughout the province; and worked with leaders in Indigenous languages around the globe to share their pioneering and proven approaches to language reclamation,

documentation and revitalization.

Their efforts have been recognized as establishing British Columbia and Canada as leaders in Indigenous language revitalization. Limited resources have meant that the First Peoples' Cultural Council were able to touch only a handful (10% or less) of the Indigenous languages in the province. With this new provincial funding, it will work with the Indigenous language groups and communities that belong to the same cultural groups and speak the same language throughout the province. The program will be flexible in order to respond to the needs of the community. First Peoples' Cultural Council works collaboratively with communities, supporting leading language work led by Elders and other knowledge keepers of the land.

Language programs supported in communities include:

- The Mentor-Apprentice program pairs a fluent language speaker (mentor) with a language learner (apprentice) to transfer language knowledge and increase fluency.
- FirstVoices is the internationally recognized online Indigenous language archiving and teaching resource that allows Indigenous communities to document their language for future generations. FirstVoices provides state-of-the-art technologies, training and technical support to community language champions. Teams of fluent Elders and technically savvy youth upload dictionaries, alphabets, songs, stories, words and phrases, as well as audio and video to their community archives. FirstVoices keyboards includes apps for Apple and Android mobile devices, and more.
- The Silent Speaker program is for people who understand, but do not speak, their First
 Nations language. The course is based on a successful program that was developed in
 Norway and Sweden for, and by, Indigenous Sami people. The model uses cognitive
 behaviour therapy (CBT) to support silent speakers in overcoming barriers to using their
 Indigenous language in their communities.
- The Pre-School Language Nest program creates language and cultural immersion environments for pre-school children and their parents. In addition to creating an immersion environment with staff, volunteers and Elders, Language Nests allow young parents to learn the language and bring it back into their homes and daily lives, which is necessary for revitalizing a language.
- First Peoples' Cultural Council partners with Google.org on the Endangered Languages project, whose governance First Peoples' Cultural Council chairs.





- I am honoured to be in your company this morning.
- I bring greetings from Premier Horgan and my colleague
 Minister Mark, who are unable to be here.
- I'd also like to acknowledge Rob Fleming, Minister of Education, who has joined us today for this important event.

- We're here today to highlight our commitment to Indigenous languages – through our recent \$50 million commitment to the First Peoples' Cultural Council.
- It's a significant investment.
- I'll add my voice to Carole's...
- I'm proud to be part of a government that recognizes that
 Indigenous languages have been under-funded for far too long.
- I'm very happy we are taking steps to address that.
- And I'm proud to work in partnership with the First Peoples'
 Cultural Council...
- Because partnership and collaboration is the best way to move forward to ensure the needed supports are there.
- This funding will build on the current work of the Council which you'll here more about shortly – and other parts of government.

- It was done through government, the residential school system and the Indian Act.
- Language and culture were suppressed.
- Children were removed from their homes and lands.
- There were severe punishments physical and mental for Indigenous children and adults who tried to stay connected with their heritage...
- All of these actions had devastating outcomes for Indigenous communities.
- If you take away someone's language, you take away their voice.
- Many Indigenous languages have words that cannot be expressed in the English language.

- And when you take away a person's ability to express concepts, you take away their identity.
- Many years ago, I learned an important phrase from Ahousaht Hereditary Chief Earl Maquinna George.
- He passed a few years ago, but this teaching has never left me.
- 'Hishuk ish tsawalk' 'all things are one everything is connected.'
- This phrase has shaped my world view.
- But I am aware that it is a translation into my own vocabulary.
- It is constrained by the English language.
- My words cannot express the richness of the original phrase.
- It is a phrase that speaks to the depth of interconnection known to Ahousaht chiefs – whose people have lived on the land for millennia.
- 'Isaak' is another example.

- It is the Nuu-chah-nulth word for respect, but its meaning is so much deeper.
- "Respect" in English is the closest we can come.
- We are committed to supporting communities to ensure their languages thrive.
- They are too important to lose.
- Indigenous languages are a cause for celebration and pride –
 never for shame.
- By investing in culture, in identity and pride, communities can begin to heal together...
- To address the fundamental social issues stemming from Canada's history of colonization, residential schools and cultural extermination..
- There's a reason both the TRC's Calls to Action and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples highlight the importance of language.

- If we want to pursue true reconciliation, this happens through strong partnerships with Indigenous communities...
- So that communities themselves are leaders in finding solutions to language preservation – to taking their languages back.
- This is powerful work and I look forward to working with the First Peoples' Cultural Council and with communities on this.
- 'Hishuk ish tsawalk.'
- It's an honour to be with you all today. Thank you for listening.
- Klecko, klecko.

Remarks by Cynthia Callison, Chair, FPCC, on March 16, 2018

Revitalization of Indigenous languages is important for all British

Columbians. Our history is rich with 34 unique and original languages.

These languages are not spoken anywhere else in the world.

However, Indigenous languages are endangered in this province. As many of the fluent speakers are elders, time is of the essence. We must act now to sure Indigenous languages survive and thrive.

This provincial government funding is a concrete example of reconciliation as it responds to the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action.

The recommendations for revitalization of our languages come directly from residential school survivors who were punished and shamed as children for speaking their languages. Personally, my family's transmission of the Tahltan language was disrupted because my father and his siblings attended residential school.

The survivors of residential school have put their faith in Canadians and created a sacred trust in government to address the harms created by the residential school system, including the loss of Indigenous language speakers.

Remarks by Cynthia Callison, Chair, FPCC, on March 16, 2018

The Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action for the revitalization of Indigenous languages includes the implementation of the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. Knowing and being able to speak our languages is a human right for Indigenous peoples.

We applaud the government of British Columbia for acting on its commitments to implement the Truth and Reconciliation Recommendations and the Principles in the UN Declaration.

It will take sustained effort and investment over the long term to redress more than 150 years of systemic government policies, including the residential school system, that aimed to extinguish our voices, and our languages.

In addition to provincial funding, First Peoples' Cultural Council looks forward to federal government funding that recognizes and supports the diversity of Indigenous languages in British Columbia.

B.C. investment in Indigenous language revitalization puts reconciliation into action

VICTORIA – First Peoples' Cultural Council will work in partnership with First Nations communities to develop and implement revitalization plans for each of the living Indigenous languages in B.C., to reverse the disruption to Indigenous languages from Canada's history of colonization and residential schools.

"Language is critical for connecting Indigenous peoples to their culture, spirituality, identity and land," said Scott Fraser, Minister of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation. "For too long, Indigenous language has been under threat. The time has come for us to support First Nations in exercising their human right to speak and pass on their language and culture."

In Budget 2018, B.C. allocated a \$50-million grant to the First Peoples' Cultural Council (FPCC) to help revitalize Indigenous languages in British Columbia, and address the current language crisis. Fewer than 6,000 people speak one of the 34 Indigenous languages in B.C.

"We are taking action now to support Indigenous communities' work to preserve and revitalize endangered languages – languages that are cornerstones of cultural and social identities across our province," said Carole James, Minister of Finance. "By investing in Indigenous languages, we invest in the future of Indigenous communities. I am proud our government is making this historic commitment."

As a result of the funding, the First Peoples' Cultural Council will expand community immersion programs that support the development of fluent speakers of Indigenous languages. These include the Mentor-Apprentice program, which pairs fluent speakers with apprentices for one-on-one immersion training, and the Pre-school Language Nest program, which supports the creation of language and culture immersion environments for children and their parents. The pilot Silent Speakers program will become permanent, helping those who understand, but do not speak their language, overcome challenges with using it in their communities.

"We sincerely thank the B.C. government for its strong leadership and new investment in the revitalization of Indigenous languages across B.C., and for recognizing the importance of Indigenous languages to the well-being of Indigenous peoples," said Cynthia Callison, FPCC board chair. "This funding is essential to restore and continue the unique diversity of Indigenous languages in B.C. It is a concrete example of implementing the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's call to action toward reconciliation."

The language revitalization plans will be developed with Indigenous communities and tailored to their individual needs. The First Peoples' Cultural Council will also provide funding to increase the number of words and phrases uploaded to the FirstVoices online oral dictionary, and expand the online resources available for language learners and speakers.

"Urgent action is needed as many Indigenous languages are in danger of becoming extinct," said Melanie Mark, Minister of Advanced Education, Skills and Training. "One of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's key priorities is revitalizing language. That's what this work is about — not just giving lip service to reconciliation, but taking action."

FPCC will work in collaboration with communities and partners to support additional priority actions to revitalize languages, including creating new speakers and developing new language resources that will support communities to build skills and capacity for language mobilization.

"The First Nations communities we have been working with are seeing clear and measurable results, creating fluent language speakers as new knowledge keepers and documenting languages for future generations," said Tracey Herbert, CEO of the FPCC. "This new funding will help us to build on our strong track record of success, and expand our work to all Indigenous communities in B.C., to help their mother-tongue languages flourish again."

The First Peoples' Cultural Council is a unique organization in Canada. As a First Nations-run Crown corporation with a mandate to support the revitalization of Indigenous languages, arts, culture and heritage in British Columbia, First Peoples' Cultural Council provides funding and resources to communities, monitors the status of Indigenous languages and develops policy recommendations for First Nations and government.

New funding

The B.C. government has committed a significant investment of \$50 million to support Indigenous language. This funding is the result of many years of advocacy, educating policy makers, and the developing investment models by First Peoples' Cultural Council and community partners.

Why Indigenous language revitalization matters

Restoring connections to Indigenous language and culture builds resilience and supports healthy individuals and communities. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action Report outlines the need to protect and invest in the restoration of Indigenous languages as a concrete step toward reconciliation. Knowing and being able to speak one's language is recognized as a human right for Indigenous peoples. The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples identifies that Indigenous peoples have the right to revitalize, use, develop and transmit to future generations their histories, languages, oral traditions, philosophies, writing systems and literatures, and to designate and retain their own names for communities, places and persons. First Peoples' Cultural Council has been working with the Assembly of First Nations and the federal government to advance the recognition and protection of Indigenous language rights in federal law.

How the funding will be used

The new funding will be used for language preservation and revitalization activities, including community grants, community language planning, and documentation and training aimed at rebuilding community-based language supports. The funding will also be used to expand language immersion programs and learning resources to support Indigenous languages in communities throughout the province.

The First Peoples' Cultural Council has served First Nations in B.C. for 28 years. The First Peoples' Cultural Council has mapped and documented Indigenous languages in B.C.; built tools and programs in community and online that support language learning; created partnerships with communities throughout the province; and worked with leaders in Indigenous languages around the globe to share their pioneering and proven approaches to language reclamation, documentation and revitalization.

Their efforts have been recognized as establishing British Columbia and Canada as leaders in Indigenous language revitalization. Limited resources have meant that the First Peoples' Cultural Council were able to touch only a handful (10% or less) of the Indigenous languages in the province. With this new provincial funding, it will work with the Indigenous language groups and communities that belong to the same cultural groups and speak the same language throughout the province. The program will be flexible in order to respond to the needs of the community. First Peoples' Cultural Council works collaboratively with communities, supporting leading language work led by Elders and other knowledge keepers of the land.

Language programs supported in communities include:

- The Mentor-Apprentice program pairs a fluent language speaker (mentor) with a language learner (apprentice) to transfer language knowledge and increase fluency.
- FirstVoices is the internationally recognized online Indigenous language archiving and teaching resource that allows Indigenous communities to document their language for future generations. FirstVoices provides state-of-the-art technologies, training and technical support to community language champions. Teams of fluent Elders and technically savvy youth upload dictionaries, alphabets, songs, stories, words and phrases, as well as audio and video to their community archives. FirstVoices keyboards includes apps for Apple and Android mobile devices, and more.
- The Silent Speaker program is for people who understand, but do not speak, their First
 Nations language. The course is based on a successful program that was developed in
 Norway and Sweden for, and by, Indigenous Sami people. The model uses cognitive
 behaviour therapy (CBT) to support silent speakers in overcoming barriers to using their
 Indigenous language in their communities.
- The Pre-School Language Nest program creates language and cultural immersion environments for pre-school children and their parents. In addition to creating an immersion environment with staff, volunteers and elders, Language Nests allow young parents to learn the language and bring it back into their homes and daily lives, which is necessary for revitalizing a language.
- First People's Cultural Council partners with Google.org on the Endangered Languages project, whose governance First People's Cultural Council chairs.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

First Peoples' Cultural Council Funding event March 16, 2018

Why is B.C. giving the First Peoples' Cultural Council this funding?

- Indigenous languages are in a state of emergency less than 6,000 people speak one of the 34 Indigenous languages in British Columbia.
- We're working with the First Peoples' Cultural Council on a plan to make significant strides to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- Language is a right under the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples.
- The teaching of language strengthens the cultural and social health of a community, and connects children to their heritage, community values and the lands they come from.

2. Is \$50M for languages annual, ongoing funding?

- The \$50 million to support the revitalization of Indigenous languages is three-year funding to address the current crisis of languages that may disappear forever.
- B.C. and the First Peoples' Cultural Council are also seeking federal support for this effort.

3. How much funding did Province provide the FPCC this year?

- In 2017/18, the Province is contributing \$1.75 million in annual operating funding to the First Peoples Cultural Council.
- The Province will continue to provide First Peoples' Cultural Council annual operating funding over and above \$50 million announced in budget 2018.

4. This is a significant budget increase the FPCC. Does the FPCC have the capacity to manage this budget increase?

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council has been working with Indigenous language experts throughout Canada and internationally for over 25 years, and is well-placed to undertake this work.
- First Peoples will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan on revitalizing Indigenous languages across B.C.

5. Are organizations other than the FPCC receiving funding for language revitalization?

• The Province is providing \$50 million to the First Peoples' Cultural Council, and is working with the First Peoples on a plan to manage and allocate that funding in ways to make significant strides to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council will be seeking to co-ordinate this work through partnerships with Indigenous communities and organizations, and other provincial ministries to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- FPCC will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan on revitalizing Indigenous languages across B.C.

6. How will Indigenous language support from the FPCC intersect with work underway with other BC government ministries?

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council will co-ordinate their work through partnerships with Indigenous communities and organizations, and other provincial ministries to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- This will ensure that the council's work will complement and build from current work underway on Indigenous language revitalization.

7. Will any of this new funding go directly to First Nations who are working on revitalizing their languages?

- Many individual First Nations have taken a lead role in teaching and preserving their respective languages, and we will continue to support those First Nations.
- First Peoples' Cultural Council's existing programming supports First Nations communities implementing language revitalization programs, as well as programs that create fluent speakers of First Nations languages in communities across B.C.
- FPCC will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan and to manage and allocate the \$50 million in funding in ways to make significant strides to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.

8. What other Indigenous language revitalization work does government support?

- Ministry of Education is working closely with First Nations Education Steering Committee to develop an Indigenous Language Learning policy for the K-12 system.
- There are 17 First Nations languages that have developed approved curriculum to be taught in B.C. schools. And there are six more in development.
- Last year, the ministry provided an extra \$190,000 to support resource development for Indigenous language curricula of the 17 languages.
- The Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills training is currently working with academic and Indigenous partners to develop and Indigenous Language Fluency Degree.
- Public post-secondary schools in B.C. offer a range of Indigenous language courses and programs, all the way up to Masters level, and the ministry also supports language programs through the Aboriginal Community-Based Training Partnerships Program.

- 9. How do you answer people who say that the funding could be better used to address the many social challenges facing Indigenous communities such as increasing the level of policing?
- It's not an either/or situation. It's not language support or policing.
- Community safety in Indigenous communities is an important issue. Many of the challenges communities face are systemic and are founded on our colonial past. By investing in Indigenous languages and culture, we start to address those systemic social challenges at community level.
- Having a higher police presence is reactive and doesn't address root problems. By
 investing in language, culture, in identity and pride, we become part of the solution to
 these key social issues.

10. What are the priorities for the funding?

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council will be seeking to co-ordinate their work through partnerships with Indigenous communities and organizations, and other provincial ministries to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- FPCC will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan on revitalizing Indigenous languages across B.C.
- The funding will be targeted in a number of priority areas:
 - Programs and projects that will turn new speakers into fluent speakers;
 - Projects for documentation of languages;
 - Language planning across communities; and.
 - Develop high quality resources, tools and training to support language programs.

11. Will the funding be shared with partner organizations?

- FPCC will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan and to manage and allocate the \$50 million in funding in ways to make significant strides to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- This will ensure that the council's work will complement and build from current work underway on Indigenous language revitalization.

12. How many living languages are there?

- British Columbia has the greatest diversity of Indigenous languages in Canada. The 34
 unique Indigenous languages and over 90 dialects represent 60 per cent of all Indigenous
 languages in the country.
- Part of the work will be to map out the number of living Indigenous languages in B.C. and work in partnership with First Nations communities to develop and implement revitalization plans.

13. What does a language revitalization plan entail?

• Every Indigenous language group in B.C. is unique and we will work in partnership with First Nations communities to develop and implement revitalization plans that work for their needs.

Why is B.C. giving the First Peoples' Cultural Council this funding?

- Indigenous languages are in a state of emergency less than 6,000 people speak one of the 34 Indigenous languages in British Columbia.

• The Province is providing \$50 million to the First Peoples' Cultural Council, and is working with the First Peoples on a plan to manage and allocate that funding in ways to make significant strides to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council will be seeking to co-ordinate this work through
 partnerships with Indigenous communities and organizations, and other provincial
 ministries and agencies such as Advanced Education and Skills Training and Education –
 on the strategy to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- FPCC will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan on revitalizing Indigenous languages across B.C.

6. How will Indigenous language support from the FPCC intersect with work underway with other BC government ministries?

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council will co-ordinate their work through partnerships with Indigenous communities and organizations, and other provincial ministries and agencies – such as Advanced Education and Skills Training and Education – on the strategy to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- This will ensure that the council's work will complement and build from current work underway on Indigenous language revitalization.

7. Will any of this new funding go directly to First Nations who are working on revitalizing their languages?

- Many individual First Nations have taken a lead role in teaching and preserving their respective languages, and we will continue to support those First Nations.
- First Peoples' Cultural Council's existing programming supports First Nations communities implementing language revitalization programs, as well as programs that create fluent speakers of First Nations languages in communities across B.C.
- FPCC will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan and to manage and allocate the \$50 million in funding in ways to make significant strides to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.

8. What other Indigenous language revitalization work does government support?

- Ministry of Education is working closely with First Nations Education Steering Committee to develop an Indigenous Language Learning policy for the K-12 system.
- There are 17 First Nations languages that have developed approved curriculum to be taught in B.C. schools. And there are six more in development.
- Last year, the ministry provided an extra \$190,000 to support resource development for Indigenous language curricula of the 17 languages.
- The Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills training is currently working with academic and Indigenous partners to develop and Indigenous Language Fluency Degree.
- Public post-secondary schools in B.C. offer a range of Indigenous language courses and programs, all the way up to Masters level, and the ministry also supports language programs through the Aboriginal Community-Based Training Partnerships Program.

- 9. How do you answer people who say that the funding could be better used to address the many social challenges facing Indigenous communities such as increasing the level of policing?
- It's not an either/or situation. It's not language support or policing.
- Community safety in Indigenous communities is an important issue. Many of the challenges communities face are systemic and are founded on our colonial past. By investing in Indigenous languages and culture, we start to address those systemic social challenges at community level.
- Having a higher police presence is reactive and doesn't address root problems. By
 investing in language, culture, in identity and pride, we become part of the solution to
 these key social issues.

10. What are the priorities for the funding?

- The First Peoples' Cultural Council will be seeking to co-ordinate their work through
 partnerships with Indigenous communities and organizations, and other provincial
 ministries and agencies such as Advanced Education and Skills Training and Education –
 on the strategy to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- FPCC will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan on revitalizing Indigenous languages across B.C.
- The funding will be targeted in a number of priority areas:
 - Programs and projects that will turn new speakers into fluent speakers;
 - Projects for documentation of languages;
 - Language planning across communities; and.
 - Develop high quality resources, tools and training to support language programs.

11. Will the funding be shared with partner organizations?

- FPCC will work with a range of partners to develop a robust plan and to manage and allocate the \$50 million in funding in ways to make significant strides to revitalize B.C.'s Indigenous languages.
- This will ensure that the council's work will complement and build from current work underway on Indigenous language revitalization

BACKGROUNDER

First Peoples' Cultural Council

The First Peoples' Cultural Council is a unique organization in Canada. As a First Nations-run Crown corporation with a mandate to support the revitalization of Indigenous languages, arts, culture and heritage in British Columbia, First Peoples' Cultural Council provides funding and resources to communities, monitors the status of Indigenous languages and develops policy recommendations for First Nations and government.

New funding

The B.C. government has committed a significant investment of \$50 million to support Indigenous language. This funding is the result of many years of advocacy, educating policy makers, and developing investment models by First Peoples' Cultural Council and community partners.

Why Indigenous language revitalization matters

Restoring connections to Indigenous language and culture builds resilience and supports healthy individuals and communities. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action Report outlines the need to protect and invest in the restoration of Indigenous languages as a concrete step toward reconciliation. Knowing and being able to speak one's language is recognized as a human right for Indigenous peoples. The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples identifies that Indigenous peoples have the

right to revitalize, use, develop and transmit to future generations their histories, languages, oral traditions, philosophies, writing systems and literatures, and to designate and retain their own names for communities, places and persons. First Peoples' Cultural Council has been working with the Assembly of First Nations and the federal government to advance the recognition and protection of Indigenous language rights in federal law.

How the funding will be used

The new funding will be used for language preservation and revitalization activities, including community grants, community language planning, and documentation and training aimed at rebuilding community-based language supports. The funding will also be used to expand language immersion programs and learning resources to support Indigenous languages in communities throughout the province.

The First Peoples' Cultural Council has served First Nations in B.C. for 28 years. The First Peoples' Cultural Council has mapped and documented Indigenous languages in B.C.; built tools and programs in community and online that support language learning; created partnerships with communities throughout the province; and worked with leaders in Indigenous languages around the globe to share their pioneering and proven approaches to language reclamation, documentation and revitalization.

Their efforts have been recognized as establishing British Columbia and Canada as leaders in Indigenous language revitalization. Limited resources have meant that the First Peoples' Cultural Council were able to touch only a handful (10% or less) of the Indigenous languages in the province. With this new provincial funding, it will work with the Indigenous language groups and communities that belong to the same cultural groups and speak the same language throughout the province. The program will be flexible in order to respond to the needs of the community. VICTORIA - First Peoples' Cultural Council will work in partnership with First Nations communities to develop and implement revitalization plans for each of the living Indigenous languages in B.C., to reverse the disruption to Indigenous languages from Canada's history of colonization and residential schools.

"Language is critical for connecting Indigenous peoples to their culture, spirituality, identity and land," said Scott Fraser, Minister of Indigenous Relations and Reconciliation. "For too long, Indigenous language has been under threat. The time has come for us to support First Nations in exercising their human right to speak and pass on their language and culture."

In Budget 2018, B.C. allocated a \$50-million grant to the First Peoples' Cultural Council (FPCC) to help revitalize Indigenous languages in British Columbia, and address the current language crisis. Fewer than 6,000 people speak one of the 34 Indigenous languages in B.C.

"We are taking action now to support Indigenous communities' work to preserve and revitalize endangered languages - languages that are cornerstones of cultural and social identities across our province," said Carole James, Minister of Finance. "By investing in Indigenous languages, we invest in the future of Indigenous communities. I am proud our government is making this historic commitment."

As a result of the funding, the First Peoples' Cultural Council will expand community immersion programs that support the development of fluent speakers of Indigenous languages. These include the Mentor-Apprentice program, which pairs fluent speakers with apprentices for one-on-one immersion training, and the Pre-school Language Nest program, which supports the creation of language and culture immersion environments for children and their parents. The pilot Silent Speakers program will become permanent. Silent Speakers helps those who understand, but do not speak their language, overcome challenges with using it in their communities.

BACKGROUNDER

First Peoples' Cultural Council

The First Peoples' Cultural Council is a unique organization in Canada. As a First Nations-run Crown corporation with a mandate to support the revitalization of Indigenous languages, arts, culture and heritage in British Columbia, First Peoples' Cultural Council provides funding and resources to communities, monitors the status of Indigenous languages and develops policy recommendations for First Nations and government.

New funding

The B.C. government has committed a significant investment of \$50 million to support Indigenous language. This funding is the result of many years of advocacy, educating policy makers, and developing investment models by First Peoples' Cultural Council and community partners.

Why Indigenous language revitalization matters

Restoring connections to Indigenous language and culture builds resilience and supports healthy individuals and communities. The Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action Report outlines the need to protect and invest in the restoration of Indigenous languages as a concrete step toward reconciliation. Knowing and being able to speak one's language is recognized as a human right for Indigenous peoples. The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples identifies that Indigenous peoples have the right to revitalize, use, develop and transmit to future generations their histories, languages, oral traditions, philosophies, writing systems and literatures, and to designate and retain their own names for communities, places and persons. First Peoples' Cultural Council has been working with the Assembly of First Nations and the federal government to advance the recognition and protection of Indigenous language rights in federal law.

How the funding will be used

The new funding will be used for language preservation and revitalization activities, including community grants, community language planning, and documentation and training aimed at rebuilding community-based language supports. The funding will also be used to expand language immersion programs and learning resources to support Indigenous languages in communities throughout the province.

The First Peoples' Cultural Council has served First Nations in B.C. for 28 years. The First Peoples' Cultural Council has mapped and documented Indigenous languages in B.C.; built tools and programs in community and online that support language learning; created partnerships with communities throughout the province; and worked with leaders in Indigenous languages around the globe to share their pioneering and proven approaches to language reclamation, documentation and revitalization.

Their efforts have been recognized as establishing British Columbia and Canada as leaders in Indigenous language revitalization. Limited resources have meant that the First Peoples' Cultural Council were able to touch only a handful (10% or less) of the Indigenous languages in the province. With this new provincial funding, it will work with the Indigenous language groups and communities that belong to the same cultural groups and speak the same language throughout the province. The program will be flexible in order to respond to the needs of the community. First Peoples' Cultural Council works collaboratively with communities, supporting leading language work led by Elders and other knowledge keepers of the land.

Language programs supported in communities include:

- * The Mentor-Apprentice program pairs a fluent language speaker (mentor) with a language learner (apprentice) to transfer language knowledge and increase fluency.
- * FirstVoices is the internationally recognized online Indigenous language archiving and teaching resource that allows Indigenous communities to document their language for future generations. FirstVoices provides state-of-the-art technologies, training and technical support to community language champions. Teams of fluent Elders and technically savvy youth upload dictionaries, alphabets, songs, stories, words and phrases, as well as audio and video to their community archives. FirstVoices keyboards includes apps for Apple and Android mobile devices, and more.

- * The Silent Speaker program is for people who understand, but do not speak, their First Nations language. The course is based on a successful program that was developed in Norway and Sweden for, and by, Indigenous Sami people. The model uses cognitive behaviour therapy (CBT) to support silent speakers in overcoming barriers to using their Indigenous language in their communities.
- * The Pre-School Language Nest program creates language and cultural immersion environments for pre-school children and their parents. In addition to creating an immersion environment with staff, volunteers and Elders, Language Nests allow young parents to learn the language and bring it back into their homes and daily lives, which is necessary for revitalizing a language.
- * First Peoples' Cultural Council partners with Google.org on the Endangered Languages project, whose governance First Peoples' Cultural Council chairs.

B.C. investment in Indigenous language revitalization puts reconciliation into action

VICTORIA - First Peoples' Cultural Council will work in partnership with First Nations communities to develop and implement revitalization plans for each of the living Indigenous languages in B.C., to reverse the disruption to Indigenous languages from Canada's history of colonization and residential schools.

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"We are taking action now to support Indigenous communities' work to preserve and revitalize endangered languages - languages that are cornerstones of cultural and social identities across our province," said Carole James, Minister of Finance. "By investing in Indigenous languages, we invest in the future of Indigenous communities. I am proud our government is making this historic commitment."

As a result of the funding, the First Peoples' Cultural Council will expand community immersion programs that support the development of fluent speakers of Indigenous languages. These include the Mentor-Apprentice program, which pairs fluent speakers with apprentices for one-on-one immersion training, and the Pre-school Language Nest program, which supports the creation of language and culture immersion environments for children and their parents. The pilot Silent Speakers program will become permanent, helping those who understand, but do not speak their language, overcome challenges with using it in their communities.

"We sincerely thank the B.C. government for its strong leadership and new investment in the revitalization of Indigenous languages across B.C., and for recognizing the importance of Indigenous languages to the well-being of Indigenous peoples," said Cynthia Callison, FPCC board chair. "This funding is essential to restore and continue the unique diversity of Indigenous languages in B.C. It is a concrete example of implementing the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's call to action toward reconciliation."

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"Urgent action is needed as many Indigenous languages are in danger of becoming extinct," said Melanie Mark, Minister of Advanced Education, Skills and Training. "One of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's key priorities is revitalizing language. That's what this work is about - not just giving lip service to reconciliation, but taking action."

FPCC will work in collaboration with communities and partners to support additional priority actions to revitalize languages, including creating new speakers and developing new language resources that will support communities to build skills and capacity for language mobilization.

"The First Nations communities we have been working with are seeing clear and measurable results, creating fluent language speakers as new knowledge keepers and documenting languages for future generations," said Tracey Herbert, CEO of the FPCC. "This new funding will help us to build on our strong track record of success, and expand our work to all Indigenous communities in B.C., to help their mother-tongue languages flourish again."

Quick Facts:

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- * British Columbia has the greatest diversity of Indigenous languages in Canada. The 34 unique Indigenous languages, and over 90 dialects, represent 60% of all Indigenous languages in the country.

BACKGROUNDER

First Peoples' Cultural Council

The First Peoples' Cultural Council is a unique organization in Canada. As a First Nations-run Crown corporation with a mandate to support the revitalization of Indigenous languages, arts, culture and heritage in British Columbia, First Peoples' Cultural Council provides funding and resources to communities, monitors the status of Indigenous languages and develops policy recommendations for First Nations and government.

New funding

The B.C. government has committed a significant investment of \$50 million to support Indigenous language. This funding is the result of many years of advocacy, educating policy makers, and the developing investment models by First Peoples' Cultural Council and community partners.

Why Indigenous language revitalization matters

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How the funding will be used

The new funding will be used for language preservation and revitalization activities, including community grants, community language planning, and documentation and training aimed at rebuilding community-based language supports. The funding will also be used to expand language immersion programs and learning resources to support Indigenous languages in communities throughout the province.

The First Peoples' Cultural Council has served First Nations in B.C. for 28 years. The First Peoples' Cultural Council has mapped and documented Indigenous languages in B.C.; built tools and programs in community and online that support language learning; created partnerships with communities throughout the province; and worked with leaders in Indigenous languages around the globe to share their pioneering and proven approaches to language reclamation, documentation and revitalization.

Their efforts have been recognized as establishing British Columbia and Canada as leaders in Indigenous language revitalization. Limited resources have meant that the First Peoples' Cultural Council were able to touch only a handful (10% or less) of the Indigenous languages in the province. With this new provincial funding, it will work with the Indigenous language groups and communities that belong to the same cultural groups and speak the same language throughout the province. The program will be flexible in order to respond to the needs of the community. First Peoples' Cultural Council works collaboratively with communities, supporting leading language work led by Elders and other knowledge keepers of the land.

SPEAKING NOTES:

Good morning

I'm delighted to be here on the territory of the Lekwungen [Lakwung-en] people and the Songhees and Esquimalt Nations.

Thank you to Elder, Butch Dick for your welcome to this wonderful territory and to this magnificent museum.

Thank you to Tracey and Cynthia and all the representatives of the First Peoples' Cultural Council for being here today.

And to the elected and hereditary chiefs, Elders and youth.

I am honoured to be in your company this morning and I bring greetings from Premier Horgan and my colleague Minister Mark, who is unable to be here today.

I'd also like to acknowledge Rob Fleming, Minister of Education who's in the audience.

We're here today for two purposes.

The first is to highlight our commitment to Indigenous languages through the \$50 million commitment to the First Peoples' Cultural Council.

It's a significant investment.

I'll add my voice to Carole's - I'm proud to be part of a government that recognizes that the Indigenous languages have been underfunded for far too long.

I'm very happy we are taking steps to address that.

And I'm proud to work in partnership with the First Peoples' Cultural Council.

Because partnership and collaboration is the best way to move forward to ensure people have the supports they need.

And this funding will build on the current work of the Council and also of other parts of government.

For example, the Ministry of Education is working closely with the First Nations Education Steering Committee on an Indigenous Learning policy for K-12 and on the development of curriculum for First Nations languages.

There are 17 First Nations languages that have developed approved curriculum to be taught in B.C. schools. And there are six more in development.

There's also great work going on at the post-secondary level.

But if the funding supports is about the 'what, it's the second purpose that I really want to talk about.

I want to talk about the 'why'.

I want to talk about 'why' this funding is important.

Our colonial history tells us when settlers arrived, there were premeditated attacks on Indigenous peoples and their cultures.

It was done through government, the residential school system and the Indian Act.

There was suppression of language and culture, and removal of children from their homes...

There were severe punishments – physical and mental – for Indigenous children and adults who tried to stay connected to their heritage...

All of these actions had devastating outcomes for Indigenous communities.

If you take away someone's language, you take away their voice.

Many languages have words that cannot be expressed in the English language.

When you take away a person's ability to express concepts, you take away their identity.

Many years ago, I learned an important phrase from Ahousaht First Nation Hereditary Chief Earl Maquinna George.

'Hishuk ish tsawalk' – 'all things are one – everything is connected.'

This phrase has shaped my world view.

But I am aware that it is a translation into my own vocabulary.

It is constrained by the English language.

My words cannot express the richness of the original phrase.

It is a phrase that speaks to the depth of interconnection known to Ahousaht chiefs, whose people have lived on the land for millenia.

My words fail me.

'Isaak' is another example.

It is the Nuu-chah-nulth word for respect, but its meaning is so much deeper.

But respect is the closest we can come.

If language is the heart of a nation, then by removing it, we kill the organ that pumps the lifeblood of communities.

We are committed to giving communities the help they need to thrive.

By supporting Indigenous languages, we recognize the harm that was done.

We say - we care.

Indigenous languages are a cause for celebration and pride never for shame.

By investing in culture, in identity and pride, people start to care about themselves, their neighbours and their communities.

That is how we start to address the fundamental social issues facing us.

There's a reason both the TRC's Calls to Action and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples highlight the importance of language.

If we want to pursue true reconciliation we must help people take back their voice...

This is powerful work and I look forward to working with the First Peoples' Cultural Council and with communities on this.

We can make progress.

We can help that lifeblood to flow.

'Hishuk ish tsawalk.'

It's an honour to be with you all today. Thank you for listening. Klecko, klecko.
